## ASTROS 2020 TIMELINE

POSTSEASON APPEARANCES: The Astros are making their 14th appearance in the postseason in club history in what is the 59th year of the franchise that began in 1962...this season marks the fourth in club history for the Astros to enter the postseason as a non-division winner, previously doing so as a Wild Card winner in 2004, 2005 and in 2015.

FOUR STRAIGHT: The Astros secured their postseason spot by finishing second in the AL West...this appearance gives Houston four straight years in the playoffs, the first time they've done so in franchise history...only the Yankees and Dodgers have also played in the last four postseasons... Houston has also made the postseason in five of the last six years.

HOME COOKIN': The Astros did most of their damage this season at Minute Maid Park, evidenced by their 20-8 (.714) home record, the second-best in the Majors...this will also go down as the second-best home winning percentage in a single season in club history, trailing only the 2019 Astros and their 60-21 (.741) home record...the Astros only played 28 home games in 2020 due to a pair of postponements.

AT THE HELM: Astros Manager Dusty Baker, named to his position on Jan. 29, has become the first manager in MLB history to take five different teams to the postseason...Baker also managed the Giants (1997, 2000, 2002), Cubs (2003), Reds (2010, 201213) and Nationals (2016-17) into the playoffs....in his career, Baker has amassed 1,892 managerial victories in the regular season, which ranks 15th all time, immediately trailing Hall of Famer Bill McKechnie $(1,896)$.

LOCKED UP: On July 28, the Astros exercised the 2021 contract options for Manager Dusty Baker, third base coach Gary Pettis and pitching coach Brent Strom...Baker will return for his second season in Houston, while Pettis will be entering his seventh consecutive (2015-21) and Strom his eighth (2014-21).

GET WELL GARY: On Sept. 26, the Astros announced that third base coach Gary Pettis had been diagnosed with multiple myeloma...he will be sidelined through the 2020 season, but is expected to make a full recovery...Pettis last coached third base in a game for the Astros on Sept. 15 before being sidelined with hip discomfort...tests conducted to find out the cause of the discomfort led to the diagnosis of multiple myeloma.

IN THE BOX: This is the first postseason appearance for the Astros under General Manager James Click, who was named the 13th GM in club history on Feb. 3...Click joined the Astros from Tampa, where he served as the Rays VP of Baseball Operations.

ROOKIE HURLERS: The Astros matched the Marlins by using an MLB-high 15 rookie pitchers in 2020, including five rookie starters...of those 15 rookies, 10 made their Major League debuts...prior to this season, the most rookies to pitch for the Astros in a single season in club history was 13 back in 2011.

LIMITING K'S: Astros hitters combined for the fewest strikeouts in the Majors with 440 on the season.. this is a commonplace for this group of Astros, as the club had the fewest strikeouts in the AL in 2017 and 2019, while finishing with the second fewest in 2018.

QUICK STARTS: The Astros led the AL in 1st-inning runs, posting a healthy 47 runs in their 1st innings, besting the Yankees (42) and Mariners (42) in that category...CF George Springer was the catalyst for this, posting a 1.008 OPS in his 50 1st-inning plate appearances this season, which included three leadoff homers.

MARCH TO 2,000: The Astros finished the 2020 regular season having hit exactly 2,000 home runs in Minute Maid Park history, including 1,938 in regular season action and 62 in the postseason...Houston got there by virtue of OF George Springer, who hit No. 1999 and No. 2000 in the club's final home game of 2020...unsurprisingly, Springer also hit home run No 1500 at the stadium in the 2016 season...the final two homers for Springer gave him 79 in his career at MMP, which ranks tied for third all-time in stadium history.

THROWING SOME LEATHER: The Astros led the Majors with a .991 fielding percentage, committing just 20 errors in their 60 games this season.... Houston committed just four errors in their last 26 games.. that .991 fielding percentage is the second-best team fielding percentage in Major League history, trailing only the 2013 Baltimore Orioles (.991).

SPRINGER SPRUNG: CF George Springer turned his season around on Sept. 3, as he posted a 341 ( $31 \times 91$ ) average with two doubles, two triples and nine homers in his last 23 games, hitting safely in 21 of those 23 contests, which included a season-long 12-game hitting streak....in this span, Springer raised his batting average by 71 points up to .265 , and his OPS by over 150 points from .719 to a club-high .899

LEADOFF LASERS: CF George Springer connected for three leadoff homers this season, giving him 39 for his career, which ranks eighth all-time in MLB history... 11 of Springer's leadoff homers have come against the Rangers, the most hit by any player against the Rangers in their franchise history...the only player to hit more leadoff homers against any single opponent was OF Rickey Henderson, who hit 12 leadoff homers against the Indians in his illustrious career.

UP THE CHARTS: OF George Springer moved up two spots on the Astros all-time home run list in 2020, surpassing Cesar Cedeño ( 163 HR) and Glenn Davis.

GOLD GLOVE CALIBER: SS Carlos Correa posted an MLB-bes .995 fielding percentage in 2020, committing just one error in 212 total chances...he also led all AL shortstops in DRS (8), while ranking second in double plays turned (35)...Correa's fielding percentage is the best in a single season in club history, topping the .990 fielding percentage posted by Adam Everett in 2006...Correa's 995 mark also ranks as the fourth-best in a single season in MLB history, trailing only seasons by Mike Bordick (. 998 in 2002), Cal Ripkin Jr. (. 996 in 1990) and Omar Vizquel (. 995 in 2000).

DR. SMOOTH: OF Michael Brantley was the Astros most consistent hitter this season, as he led the club in batting average (.300) and OBP (.364), while ranking second in OPS (.840)...the 2020 season marked Brantley's sixth season to hit .300-plus and his third consecutive (201820)...Brantley just missed the mark in 2017, hitting .299.

THE TUCKER TURRET: OF Kyle Tucker hit six triples in 2020, the most by any player in the Majors this season...he also finished his first full season ranking tied for sixth in the AL in RBI with 42...Tucker led the Astros in both categories, while also leading the club in hits (56), stolen bases (8) and extra-base hits (27).

BEHIND THE DISH: C Martín Maldonado was a near everyday presence behind the plate for Houston this season, as he led the Majors in starts (46) and innings played (392) behind the dish... he also excelled in the box, leading the club in walks (27) and ranking second among all AL catchers in RBI (24).

HIRED GUN: RHP Zack Greinke started this season 3-0, giving him a remarkable 11-1 record with a 2.97 ERA (36ER/109IP) in his first 18 starts with the Astros...Greinke tied the club record for most wins within a pitcher's first 12 decisions with the team (source: Elias Sports Bureau):

THE GREAT FRAMBINO: LHP Framber Valdez was a workhouse for the Astros this season as he led the club with 70.2 innings pitched, which ranked sixth in the AL...Valdez had a breakout campaign, in what is his third Major League season, setting career highs in wins (5) and strikeouts (76). he also led the Majors in groundball to flyball ratio (3.56) and groundball rate ( $60 \%$ )...Valdez generated 114 groundballs, the most in the AL.

HOMEBOY: RHP Lance McCullers Jr. continued his dominance at Minute Maid Park this season, going 3-0 with a 1.42 ERA (5ER/31.2IP) in five starts at the venue...in his career, he's 20-7 in 44 career starts at home with a 2.51 ERA, which is nearly half his career road ERA (4.99).

YOUNG CRISTIAN: Rookie RHP Cristian Javier had a solid start to his Major League career in 2020, going 5-2 with a 3.48 ERA in his 12 MLB appearances ( 10 starts)...his .188 opponent batting average was the lowest among all AL rookies and ranked fourth among all AL pitchers (min. 150 batters faced), behind only Shane Bieber (.167), Kenta Maeda (.168) and Lucas Giolito (.184).

PRESSLY ON POINT: Astros closer RHP Ryan Pressly converted 11 of his last 13 save chances dating back to Aug. 15...since that date, Pressly posted a 2.08 ERA (4ER/17.1IP) with 25 strikeouts in his 17.1 innings.

VERLANDER TO UNDERGO TOMMY JOHN: On Sept. 19, the Astros announced that reigning American League Cy Young Award winner RHP Justin Verlander would undergo Tommy John surgery, officially ending his 2020 campaign...the Astros got one start out of Verlander this season, a win on Opening Day, before he was placed on the IL with a right forearm strain...he attempted a comeback and even faced live hitters in September before deciding to undergo the medical procedure to repair the ulnar collateral ligament in his right elbow... a date for the surgery has not been announced.

ALVAREZ HAS KNEE SURGERY: DH Yordan Alvarez, the reigning AL Rookie of the Year, underwent season-ending arthroscopic surgery on Aug. 26 on both of his knees...a slight tear of the patellar tendon in Alvarez's right knee was repaired, while a routine cleanup was performed on his left knee...Alvarez began physical therapy immediately and is expected to make a complete recovery prior to 2021 Spring Training...Alvarez played in two games for the Astros this season, going $2 x 8$ with a homer and four RBI.

OSUNA OUT FOR SEASON: Astros closer RHP Roberto Osuna appeared in only four games this season, posting a 2.08 ERA (1ER/4.1IP) with one save...he was placed on the IL on Aug. 2 with right elbow soreness and did not return to action in 2020.

DEVENSKI OUT FOR SEASON: RHP Chris Devenski battled injuries all season, eventually undergoing an arthroscopic procedure on his right elbow on Sept. 15 to have a bone spur removed...the recovery time for Devenski was expected to be approximately four months, which ended his 2020 season...a five-year Major League veteran and an All-Star in 2017, Devenski made just four appearances for the Astros this season.

COVID-19: The Astros had a few players miss time this season due to positive COVID-19 tests, which were discovered on intake testing.. DH Yordan Alvarez missed the first 18 games of the season, while LHP Cionel Pérez missed the first 25 contests...RHP Jose Urquidy had the most difficult return after his positive test, as the Astos starter spent over a month quarantining in his apartment before receiving the necessary negative tests...when cleared, Urquidy had to build back up his strength and stamina, eventually missing 37 team games before a return to the club's rotation on Sept. 5.

QUADRUPLE DOUBLE: The Astros played four doubleheaders this season, going 1-1-2, due to a variety of postponements caused by COVID-19 positive tests, player protests and weather related issues...prior to this season, the last time the Astros had four doubleheaders in a single year was back in 1985, when they played five.

HOLLYWOOD COMEBACK: Trailing 5-2 entering the 9th on Sept. 12 at LAD, the Astros rallied for five runs on Dodgers closer RHP Kenley Jansen to win 7-5...prior to that night, the last time the Astros entered the 9th inning trailing and scored five-plus runs to take the lead was nearly five years ago to the date, on Sept. 13, 2015 at LAA.

GEORGE'S DAY: OF George Springer had a monster game in Sept. 20 vs. ARI, hitting two home runs, including an inside-the-parker, for his second multi-homer game of the season and the 14th of his career...per Elias, this marked just the fourth time in club history for a player to have a two-homer game, including an inside-the-park home run...Ken Caminiti did so twice $(1993,1994)$ and Jimmy Wynn once (1967).

THE FOUR HORSEMEN: On Sept. 24 at TEX, four longtime Astros CF George Springer, 3B Alex Bregman, 2B Jose Altuve and RF Josh Reddick all homered in the same game...this marked the first time for this quartet to all hit longballs in the same contest.

THE LONE STAR SERIES: The Astros and Rangers split their season series 5-5, but with a +5 run differential in those games, the Astros won their fourth consecutive Silver Boot (2017-20)...all-time, the Rangers own the advantage, winning the Silver Boot in 12 seasons of the 20-year rivalry.

REMEMBERING JIMMY AND BOB: The Astros lost franchise icons Jimmy Wynn and Bob Watson in March and April of 2020...both men were known as outstanding baseball players and even better people...they will be missed and will not be forgotten...the Astros Youth Academy already pays tribute to both men with the Jimmy Wynn Training Center and the Bob Watson Education Center on campus in Acres Homes.

FREE COVID TESTING AT MMP: The Astros and the Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM) have continued to offer free COVID-19 testing at Minute Maid Park's Lot C every day, seven days a week, from 8 a.m.-7 p.m...below are the full details:

- Testing is free to all patients.
- The testing site can handle up to 2,000 tests per day.
- With contact-free testing, all patients administer their own painless, oral test swab and collection.
- Spanish-speaking staff is available at the site.
- Patients will be notified of test results within 72-96 hours or sooner.
- No healthcare provider is required.
- Appointments can be booked online at Texas.curativeinc.com, but walkups will also be accommodated.

AT THE ASTROS YOUTH ACADEMY: The Astros Foundation has partnered with local organizations to host weekly drive-through distributions of milk, fresh produce and disposable masks at the Astros Youth Academy, which serves Houston's Acres Homes Community...distributions began on Aug. 10 and are held at the AYA on Tuesdays and Thursdays, beginning at 3 p.m...as of mid-September, the Astros had distributed over 12,000 gallons of milk, over 250,000 pounds of fresh produce and over 20,000 masks.

EMERGENCY RELIEF DRIVE AT MMP: The Astros Foundation and Cheniere Energy hosted a successful emergency supply drive at Minute Maid Park in mid-September...the emergency items collected were shipped directly to the Catholic Charities of Lake Charles and were distributed to community members impacted by Hurricane Laura.

MEDIA WALL OF HONOR NOMINEES: The Houston Baseball Media Wall of Honor each year recognizes a Houston media member who has made significant and lasting contributions to the landscape of baseball in the City of Houston through their work in journalism or broadcasting...the five nominees for induction this year are KCOH radio host Ralph Cooper, AT\&T SportsNet SW broadcaster Kevin Eschenfelder, former Houston Post beat writer Kenny Hand, MLB.com correspondent Richard Justice and former Colt .45s and early Astros beat writer Clark Nealon...all five esteemed media members were nominated by fellow colleagues in the industry.

SPRING TRAINING 2021: The Astros 2021 Spring Training schedule is set to open on March 27 vs. WSH...the Astros will play a total of 30 Grapefruit League games, including 18 at the FITTEAM Ballpark of the Palm Beaches, the Astros home in West Palm Beach, FL.

went $3 \times 5$ with a double and a 3 -run home run and 2 runs scored on Sept. 24 at TEX....notched his first home run since Aug. 6 at ARI...marked his first 3 -hit game since Aug. 22 at SD...was his 155th career 3+ hit game, which is 2nd in club history behind only Craig Biggio (225g)...recorded a season-high 3 RBI, last reached on Sept. 29. 2019.
- went $1 \times 4$ with a double, run and 2 RBI on Sept. 19 vs. ARI...recorded his first multi-RBI game since Aug. 20 at COL...marked the first time this season he's recorded an extra-base hit in back-to-back games.
- from Aug. 19-22, posted multiple hits in all 4 games, marking his longest multi-hit game streak since a 4-game run from April 9-13, 2019...hit . 500 ( $9 \times 18$ ) with 3 doubles, 4 runs and 2 RBI during his streak.
snapped an $0 \times 13$ on Aug. 19 by recording singles in his final 2 at-bats of the game....was his first multi-hit game since a 3-hit performance on Aug. 6 at ARI... went 10 consecutive games without a multi-hit game, his longest streak of games without multiple hits since a 10-game streak from May 2-June 20, 2019.
started at the 7th spot in the batting order on Aug. 15 vs . SEA for the first time since Sept. 11, 2012 vs. CHC....was his 9th-career start batting 7th in the order... prior to last night, had not batted lower than 3rd in the order in a game since the 2014 season, and had not batted lower than 4th in the order since the 2012 season.
- recorded his 547 th RBI on Aug 14 vs, SEA, moved past Ken Caminiti for the 9th-most RBI in Astros history.
- on July. 27 vs. SEA, recorded his 300th career double...became the 6th Astros player to record 300 doubles in their career, joining Craig Biggio, Jeff Bagwell, Cesar Cedeno and Jose Cruz.
- on July 28 vs. LAD, notched his 5,000 th career at-bat, became the 7th Astros player to reach this milestone...joined Craig Biggio, Jeff Bagwell, Jose Cruz, Cesar Cedeno, Lance Berkman, and Jimmy Wynn.
- recorded his 1,600 th career hit on Sept. 4 vs. TEX....became the 6 th Astros player to record 1,600-or-more hits in his career, joining Craig Biggio (3,060 hits), Jeff Bagwell ( 2,314 hits), Jose Cruz (1,937 hits), Cesar Cedeno (1,659 hits) and Lance Berkman ( 1,648 hits).
- served one stint on the Injured List due to a right knee sprain from Sept 4-15. - was originally signed as a non-drafted free agent on Sept. 27, 2006...signed the largest contract in franchise history on March 19, 2018, a seven-year deal that will keep him in Houston through the 2024 season.
