## THE MIAMI MARLINS STRY

The Miami Marlins are one of baseball's youngest yet most exciting franchises, combining the tradition of America's pastime with the energy and excitement of South Florida. We are committed to being authentic Miami, the city that exudes culture, passion, attitude and style. Miami not only has a rich diversity and upbeat energy, but also a deep-rooted love for the game of baseball. Pair the ambiance of the city with the refreshed approach of the Miami Marlins organization and you get an exciting combination of past, present and future.

The club's official hashtag for the 2022 season is \#MakeltMiami, with a focus on celebrating the South Florida community, as the people are at the heart of everything the Marlins are and will become. The Marlins are "Of Miami" and not just in Miami.


In the brief 29-year history of the franchise, the club has hoisted two World Series championships and claims three National League playoff berths, with the latest coming in 2020. The two-time World Series Champion Marlins are dedicated to building sustained success on and off the field as a world-class entertainment venture, while making a positive impact on our community.

The efforts on the baseball side are highlighted by a talented roster and a top-ranked farm system. Both aspects of the organization played key roles in the postseason appearance in 2020, when the Marlins exceeded external expectations, finishing with the team's first winning season since 2009 and snapping a 17 -year span without reaching the playoffs. Following the season, Don Mattingly was named National League Manager of the Year, becoming the third manager in club history to receive the honor.

The Marlins now head into the 2022 season with one of the most exciting young pitching rotations, and a balanced lineup filled with sluggers. The evolving plan is in motion on the field, and there is a commitment to serve the South Florida community off the field. As an organization that lives through its values, the Marlins are dedicated to building sustained success on and off the field as a world-class entertainment venture.

The Marlins have an unwavering commitment to our community and making an impact with our future leaders and All-Stars. The organization features one of the most diverse front office staffs across professional sports, highlighted by a mix of homegrown talents along with exceptional individuals from across the globe. Our inclusive work environment encourages passionate, innovative, and driven individuals to exceed expectations.

Entering the fifth year under new ownership, the organization has seen steady progress and now boasts a world-class fan experience at loanDepot park that boasts a first-class experience for all. The transformation of loanDepot park occurred with a commitment from ownership to invest in the fan experience that features the look, taste and sounds of the South Florida community, while also being the top pick for family fun.

It all began in the first year with the launch of the Dímelo campaign in 2018 to listen to fans and build trust with the community. Then the Marlins invested in the cost of the fan experience in year two with the addition of social spaces and local food partners as well as the introduction of The $\$ 3$ 0 \$5 Menu. The re-imagined ballpark experience continued in 2021 with new enhancements for fans, with Free-Flow Parking, the Biscayne Brew Hall and the Fanatics Team Store in Section 26. New in 2022 is the addition of Recess Sports Lounge in Left Field, which exudes the South Florida vibe with a one-of-a-kind experience, located just beyond the left field wall.

The evolution of the Miami Marlins first began with the club's new logo and colors, announced in November 2018. loanDepot park transformed that same offseason with the reset of the premium space, addition of social spaces, and a re-imagined food and beverage experience. The Marlins also reset ticket prices, making Marlins baseball one of the most affordable entertainment option in South Florida, with tickets starting at just \$10!

# Ioanvepot park 

The Miami Marlins and loanDepot, the nation's second-largest nonbank retail lender, announced on March 31, 2021 that loanDepot will be the exclusive naming rights partner for loanDepot park, the home of the Miami Marlins and world-class special events, becoming the first naming rights partner in the venue's history. The multi-year partnership began on March 31, 2021 and unites two young, innovative organizations on the rise, with the common vision of providing first-class experience for consumers and positively impacting their community.

Both the Marlins and loanDepot know that "home means everything" as they joined together to continue a commitment to further grow loanDepot park as a jewel sports and entertainment venue. As one of the most versatile venues in sports, loanDepot park will be home to much more than just baseball, also playing host to a variety of diverse public and private events. In addition to Major League Baseball, loanDepot park is equipped to host jewel events such as the MLB All-Star Game, World Baseball Classic, Super Bowl Opening Night, Monster Jam, as well as concerts, community events, graduations and much more. The uniqueness and attractiveness of the venue make it ideal for world-class entertainment and business events.

A special announcement was made on March 31, 2021 to introduce loanDepot park to media as well as staff members from loanDepot and the Miami Marlins. The day began with a press conference featuring Marlins CEO Derek Jeter and loanDepot CEO and Founder Anthony Hseih. Then the group took the field with two young athletes from the Boys and Girls Club of Miami-Dade to score the first run and throw the first pitch in loanDepot park history. Young athlete Leslie Valle took the field at second base and came across to score the first run at loanDepot park, while CEO Anthony Hshieh took the mound and fired a strike to young athlete Adrian Blanco.

As one of the most versatile venues in sports today, loanDepot park also will play host to a diverse array of public and private events. In addition to being the ideal setting for Major League Baseball, loanDepot park is well-equipped to host such jewel sports events as the MLB All-Star Game, World Baseball Classic, Super Bowl Opening Night, college football and Monster Jam. The venue's unique architecture and atmosphere also make it an ideal backdrop for world-class entertainment, business, and community events.

Both loanDepot and the Marlins prioritize the importance of community involvement and are deeply connected to the communities in which they live and work. As part of their new alliance, loanDepot will donate $\$ 50$ for every Marlins run scored during the regular season to expand youth baseball and softball opportunities through the Miami Marlins Foundation programming at the Boys \& Girls Clubs of Miami-Dade. This is in addition to loanDepot's season-Iong "Home Means Everything" RBI campaign, for which the company will be donating $\$ 25$ for every regular season RBI to Boys \& Girls Clubs of America. IoanDepot is kicking off the "Home Means Everything" RBI campaign with a special Opening Day activation that will bring $\$ 250$ for every RBI for BGCA.

## PROGRAMS

Our key programs in wellness, empowerment, and youth baseball and softball are listed below:

## WELLNESS

In 2020, the Miami Marlins Foundation distributed more than 829,000 meals to local families, along with 24,000 bottles of hand sanitizer and 20,000 face coverings. Our wellness programs focus on food security and mental and physical well-being.


Our wellness initiatives include:

+ Great Minds, Great Athletes Program: The award-nominated mental wellness program returns for the third year, focused on providing studentathletes and their support group (coaches, staff, and parents) the skills to improve student's social and emotional needs. The program has grown to 27 schools in Miami-Dade County Public Schools, and provides a positive, character-building experience focused on the youth's social and emotional growth. In 2020, the Marlins launched the Great Minds, Great Athletes Program in partnership with Miami-Dade County Public Schools and the Positive Coaching Alliance, providing mental wellness support for student-athletes as well as their parents, coaches, and school administration. NIKE has joined the Marlins efforts and will entitle the program for the 2022-23 school year.
+ Home Plate Meals Food Pantry Program: In partnership with Feeding South Florida, we underwrite a food pantry at Charles Drew K-8 Center and Citrus Grove Elementary/Middle Schools to provide a variety of readily accessible food to students and their families, in a safe environment with which they are already familiar. The food pantry focuses on providing non-perishables and fresh fruits and vegetables through a monthly farmers market style distribution. The generous support of our players and fans have enabled us to support this program.
+ Home Plate Meals Food Distributions: Focusing on wellness challenges that prevent children from excelling in school, the Miami Marlins Foundation addresses food security, promotes healthy eating habits, and physical and mental fitness. Our Home Plate Meals program, consisting of food pantries, drive-thru and mobile distributions, and a Thanksgiving distribution program, has provided over 825,000 meals to our local community.
+ Home Plate Meals Thanksgiving Distribution presented by Tito's Handmade Vodka: The Miami Marlins Foundation hosted its annual Thanksgiving Distribution at loanDepot park thanks to the generous support of Tito's Handmade Vodka. Marlins players Sandy Alcantara and Jesus Luzardo were joined by Marlins staff and players, community leaders, and Love, Tito's volunteers to donate 1,000 Thanksgiving meals to low-income families in our local neighborhood. Each family receives a Thanksgiving bag which includes a 10-pound turkey and fixings that include stuffing, cranberry sauce, rice, pasta, canned tomatoes, fresh sweet potatoes, fresh corn, fresh zucchini and fresh squash, serving more than 20,000 meals.


## EMPOWERMENT

Our empowerment programs are providing access and opportunity to more than 54,000 students.


Our empowerment initiatives include:

+ Slugger Schoolhouse Program presented by PNC Bank: The Miami Marlins Foundation Slugger Schoolhouse Program presented by PNC Bank brings together year-round resources from the Miami Marlins, MLB, and our partners to schools in our loanDepot park neighborhood.

Each school year, the Miami Marlins Foundation coordinates quarterly initiatives with the students including educational opportunities, food distributions, empowerment projects, and exercise programs. Participating schools include Lenora B. Smith Elementary, Poinciana Park Elementary, Kensington Park Elementary, and Alpha Charter of Excellence.

## YOUTH BASEBALL \& SOFTBALL

The Foundation provides sports-based youth development programs that utilize baseball and softball as the vehicle to provide kids with life-changing social and emotional learning experiences. Our programs impact over 100,000 youth in South Florida, reinforcing what it means to be a team, providing character development and creating leadership opportunities for youth of all abilities.

+ Marlins Youth Academy Tee Ball Initiative: The initiative has grown the game across South Florida by alleviating some of the league costs while also providing team shirts, hats, and equipment to recreational Tee Ball programs. The current 2022 Tee Ball Spring Season presented by UKG features 243 teams from Monroe, Miami-Dade, Broward, and Palm Beach counties playing across 25 leagues, nearly twice the amount of teams since the inaugural Spring Season in 2019. In partnership with CITY Furniture, the Marlins will launch the Miami Marlins Youth Academy Tee Ball Fall Season, which will feature 50 teams across Miami-Dade, Broward, and Palm Beach Counties.
+ Miami Marlins RBI presented by UHealth - The University of Miami Health System: The Miami Marlins RBI program offers organized baseball and softball, which is designed to promote interest in baseball and softball, academic achievement, and social responsibility for underserved youth 13-18 years old.
+ Miami Marlins Jrr: RBI presented by NIKE: Miami Marlins Jr. RBI presented by NIKE is a free youth outreach initiative for children ages 5-12 creating an opportunity for kids to participate in baseball and encourages academic achievement while teachings the value of teamwork.

City of Fort Lauderdale Parks and Recreation, City of Miami Gardens Parks and Recreation, Centro Mater at Quesada Park (Little Havana), and Gwen Cherry Park (Liberty City) among other will participate in the Marlins Jr. RBI program that teaches athletes the values that will help them develop to be a champion on and off the field through the game. Overall, more than 200 youth athletes participate in Marlins Jr. RBI.

+ Marlins Rookies: Marlins Rookies is a program that introduces the game of baseball and softball to youth ages 6-12 through fundamental lessons, while incorporating social and emotional learning through Jackie Robinson's nine values. The program will operate out of General Jose Francisco Morazan Quesada Park in Little Havana and Gwen Cherry Park in Liberty City.
+ Jackie Robinson High School Baseball Classic presented by NIIKE: The inaugural Jackie Robinson High School Baseball Classic will take place at loanDepot park on April 18, featuring two Miami-Dade County high school teams (Northwestern and North Miami Beach High School) honoring Jackie Robinson's legacy and capping off the Marlins' 75th Anniversary celebration of Jackie Robinson breaking the color barrier in MLB. The teams will receive customized '\#42' warm up shirts with one of Jackie's nine values on the back. The game will provide the youth with the one-of-a-kind experience of playing on a Major League field!
+ Sports Can Battle Racism in partnership with Positive Coaching Alliance: In 2021, the Foundation alongside the Marlins organization launched Sports Can Battle Racism, an initiative in partnership with the Positive Coaching Alliance for the development of a national curriculum for studentathletes. The Marlins have invested to become an official partner of PCA's overarching Sports Can Battle Racism nationwide initiative, a focused effort to provide tools and develop solutions that work to battle racism within the environment of sports. The workshops deliver training to coaches and student athletes across South Florida, understanding the substantive role that coaches and student athletes play in furthering racial equality and social justice. The program furthers the development of courage, resilience and character on and off the field.
+ Fun At Bat: In partnership with USA Baseball and MLB, we provided over 90,000 kids in Miami-Dade County public schools with character development lessons, while introducing them to baseball thanks to the generous support of Florida Blue Foundation. In 2021, we continue to provide digital assets to Miami-Dade County and Broward County schools.
+ Miami Marlins / Bally Sports Florida Youth Player of The Game: The Miami Marlins Foundation and Bally Sports Florida are celebrating youth baseball and softball players across South Florida. During each home game broadcast, one player is recognized as the youth player of the game.
+ Field Renovations: The Miami Marlins refurbish or build baseball and softball fields to provide safe places for youth to play in their neighborhoods.
+ Equipment Donations: We distribute baseball and softball equipment to youth and teams in need, ensuring every child can participate in recreational play. With the support of NIKE, the Marlins will support the local community by providing needed resources to youth to get active. The Miami Marlins Foundation will give select South Florida high school baseball teams an at-home Play Pack to promote fitness, help with practice and improve their baseball and softball skills. Play Pack contents include a baseball, softball, fielding glove, bag, and shirt.
+Coaches and Player Development Series Workshops presented by NIKE: The Developmental Series is a program for our youth participants and coaches to offer opportunities for development and professional growth off the field. The series consists of various workshops at loanDepot park that highlight important topics from effective coaching methods to health and mental wellness for young athletes. Each event of the series is designed to enhance the experiences of learning the game and provide correlations between sports and life-lessons.


## IMPACT WEEK

The Miami Marlins Foundation, in conjunction with the Marlins organization, launched Impact Week in 2019. The new initiative consists of seven days of community impact aimed at making a difference in South Florida's youth by creating opportunities to foster an active lifestyle, achieve academic success, and build leadership skills.

## MIAMI MARLINS COMMUNITY IMPACT

At the Miami Marlins, we are committed to serving our community as together with our players, leadership, employees, fans, and the community, we make a Marlins Impact!

Our community programs include:

+ Marlins Summer Slugger in partnership with MLB and Everfi: Each summer, students lose critical math and literacy skills. This program provides a unique baseball- themed and game-based learning experience through an 18 -week program, targeted at 4 th to 5 th graders, which engages students by preparing them to enter the next school year on track.
+ MLB Charity Days: We celebrate MLB Days to raise awareness about key causes and pay tribute to historical figures. MLB Days include Jackie Robinson Day, Lou Gehrig Day, Roberto Clemente Day, the 100th Anniversary of The Negro League , and honoring the sacrifice of our nation's military.
+ Miami Marlins Play Ball: MLB's Play Ball initiative is designed to encourage participation in baseball and softball activities in a fun environment.
+ Miami Lighthouse for the Blind and Visually Impaired Touch Tour: The annual Touch Tour is a complex sensory experience for visually impaired students, helping them to experience the game in a special way. Participants experience baseball by touching the clay and grass on the field, touring the Marlins batting cages, sitting in the dugout and trying on the catcher's equipment. Our 'Touch Tour' is a favorite for players, too!
IoanDepot park, a state-of-the-art retractable roof ballpark located in the heart of Miami and in 2012, is the home of the Miami Marlins. The ballpark, which is fewer than two miles from downtown Miami, is a go-to destination for a first-class entertainment experience and features unobstructed views of Miami's skyline made possible by six operable glass panels and has a capacity of 37,446.

The ballpark replaced the legacy of the memorable Orange Bowl in Little Havana, continuing a legendary 77-year history of football, baseball, soccer, public events and major concerts attended by tens of millions of fans. Situated on the same footprint, the home of the Marlins is constructed on approximately 17 acres of the historic 42-acre site.

Miami-Dade County owns loanDepot park and the City of Miami owns the four adjacent parking garages. The Miami Marlins, however, are responsible for maintaining and operating the ballpark.

## FIRST-CLASS FAN EXPERIENCE

Under the guidance of principal owner Bruce Sherman, the Miami Marlins have made it a priority to invest in the cost of the fan experience, with the goal of being one of the most desired entertainment options in South Florida, providing an authentic South Florida experience and affordable family fun. The Miami Marlins are committed to investing in the fan experience and providing a first-class entertainment experience at loanDepot park. The organization has continuously reaffirmed this commitment since new ownership took control in 2017.

Prior to the 2018 season, the organization launched the Dímelo listening campaign and results from fan feedback were immediately enacted on desired enhancements to their ballpark experience. The Marlins have re-imagined the premium standard with the transformation of The Club: DEX Imaging, added social-space concepts that offer unique fan experiences and promote social engagement, and re-imagined the food and beverage experience at loanDepot park.

Making Marlins baseball one of the most affordable entertainment experiences in the South Florida market remains a priority. The commitment began with enhancements, extended to the food and beverage experience with the creation of The $\$ 30 \$ 5 \mathrm{Menu}$, was highlighted by the ticket price reset heading into the 2019 campaign, and continued with reduced price of parking and a new line of value merchandise in partnership with Fanatics for the 2020 season.

With a focus on elevating the fan experience, the organization has turned loanDepot park into a go-to destination for a first-class entertainment experience for you, your friends, your family and your coworkers.


## A Venue like no other

From intimate private parties and board meetings to large-scale corporate events, concerts, loanDepot park offers a variety of event spaces to suit any occasion inside and outside the ballpark. The left-field skyline wall is a feature unlike any other in Major League Baseball. Six (6) glass panels, towering at 60' tall by 40 ' wide, open to create a breathtaking view of downtown Miami's spectacular skyline. Hosts can take their event behind-the-scenes using one of the clubhouses, batting cages or press conference rooms. The ballpark features an open 360-degree Promenade Level, giving fans a live view of the playing field no matter where they are

## SIt CLISER THAN EVER

Rarely have the words 'ballpark' and 'intimacy' blended so well together. Seats at loanDepot park are among the closest to the playing field in all of baseball. Every seat has been placed with only one thing in mind - to provide guests with the ultimate fan experience. You will always be comfortable, cool and close to all the action and excitement. Under the new configuration in 2019, the netting was increased to 30 feet high at the ends of each dugout, and taper down each foul line to the ends of Section 3 in right field, and FL11 in left field. The state-of-the-art netting is 30 percent thinner than traditional netting, utilizing Dyneema fiber with a knot-less "Ultra Cross" intersection supplied by Promats Athletics. It not only provides fans protection, but also is designed to blend into the playing surface.

To enhance the game experience, portions of the netting will be adjustable, providing access points that allow fans to get autographs and interact with the players and coaches before each game. The access points will be located along the entire length of both dugouts, plus four areas down the first-base line and three down the third-base line. It marked the second consecutive offseason in which the organization was proactive in extending the safety netting at loanDepot park. Prior to 2018, the netting was expanded to the ends of each dugout, which also surpassed MLB guidelines.

## GREEN BALLPARK

loanDepot park is the first retractable-roof LEED Gold Certified facility in the world. The ballpark's environmentally friendly design incorporates conservation, sustainability and energy efficiency. During construction, the Miami Marlins recycled more than $98 \%$ of the construction waste and engaged in pollution prevention plans. The design of the ballpark and the materials selected help promote conservation, pollution prevention as well as water reduction and energy efficiency. The Marlins also engaged in an indoor air quality plan to ensure the comfort and well-being of all fans.

The organization's on-going green efforts include the elimination of single-use plastic straws in 2019 and the implementation of Free Flow Parking in 2021. Free Flow Parking reduces carbon emissions and fuel consumption with shorter wait times and less idling. In addition, bike share kiosks and electric vehicle charging stations were implemented in the parking garages at loanDepot park.

In 2021, IoanDepot park became the second MLB ballpark and the second sports venue in South Florida to receive WELL Health-Safety Certification. WELL Health-Safety Rating is an evidence-based, third-party verified rating through the International WELL Building Institute (IWBI) for all new and existing building and space types focusing on operational policies, maintenance protocols, stakeholder engagement and emergency plans to address a post-COVID-19 environment now and into the future.

This offseason, the Marlins team with Musco on a new LED Sports Lighting System that will enhance the fan experience at loanDepot park as well as elevate the viewing experience for fans at home when watching on Bally Sports Florida. The transition to the new LED Sports Lighting System also reaffirms the Marlins commitment to sustainability with a significant reduction in energy consumption. loanDepot park now features 414 light fixtures as opposed to the 771 light fixtures in previous years, meaning that the ballpark can maintain the same lighting levels with nearly 50 percent fewer fixtures.

IoanDepot park is now the first Major League ballpark in the United States to feature color capability with the LED Sports Lighting System. The Marlins now have the capability to incorporate special lighting effects to the game experience and host postgame light shows in the ballpark, syncing music with the color-shifting lights.


## INVESTMENT IN FAN EXPERIENCE

With a focus on elevating the fan experience and an investment in the cost of the fan experience, the Miami Marlins turned loanDepot park into a go-to destination for a first-class experience. The offseason projects began in 2019 with the transformation of the PNC Club presented by DEX Imaging, and was followed by the creation of two social space concepts, AutoNation Alley and The Social.

The Marlins then developed a re-imagined food and beverage experience for guests at loanDepot park. In addition to new food partners, all of whom have great Miami stories, on the re-concepted Promenade Level, the Marlins launched a new $\$ 30 \$ 5$ Menu, which is a food and beverage value menu that offers ballpark favorites at an introductory price of $\$ 3$ or $\$ 5$, such as a $\$ 3$ hot dog and $\$ 5$ beer. The final ingredient in 2019 was the addition of El Mercadito, a grab-and-go market offering fans fresh and healthy food options for all Marlins home games.

The additions continued this year with the new LED Sports Lighting System and Recess Sports Lounge, the newest spot in town for food and entertainment with a truly unique vibe and a unique view, located in left field just beyond the outfield fence. in 2021 with the Biscayne Brew Hall, a new 3000-square-foot space located in the atrium area near sections 15-16 on the Promenade Level, and new Fanatics Team Store, an open retail concept located in left field near section 27. The latest enhancement at loanDepot park is the new lounge space in left field, that provides fans a one-of-a-kind experience by combining a unique field perspective and a fun atmosphere that can only be found in the Wynwood neighborhood.

## PNC CLUB

The premium standard has been reset by the Miami Marlins with the PNC Club. The premium space at loanDepot park received a transformation into a first-class lounge experience that speaks to those seeking a uniquely refined Miami vibe. With a re-imagined food and beverage experience, The Club presented by DEX Imaging features an elevated casual concept with DJ music and a variety of food and drink options, which extends to and enhances the in-seat experience. A versatile space for guests to dine or socialize aims to be the hot spot for Marlins games and events at loanDepot park. The interior design delivers a fresh Miami look, as designed by local Miami firm, Edge of Architecture.

The PNC Club features more than a 20 percent increase in club function space as well as a redesigned entrance to welcome guests, a new stylish bar serving craft cocktails and featured beverages, and a new corridor to the club's premium seats behind home plate - which will transform and elevate the path from club to seat. The contemporary club atmosphere includes a live DJ setting an event appropriate vibe and a variety of in-club seating for dining and socializing. Fans can enjoy in-club views of the Marlins batting cages, while sampling drinks and passed small bites prior to first pitch and interacting with featured chefs during live in-club cooking demonstrations.

## RECESS SPORTS LOUNGE

The Miami Marlins and Biscayne Bay Brewing Company teamed up to brew the newest ballpark enhancement at loanDepot park, the Biscayne Bay Brew Hall. Consistent with the Miami Marlins' commitment to invest in the fan experience, the new Biscayne Bay Brew Hall will feature a bar and social seating, with a performance space and a large video wall. The new space provides a unique social experience for fans attending Marlins games as well as non-baseball events. Fans can enjoy a stellar lineup of great beers and delicious bites, highlighted by the signature Marlins Lager. The special craft beer was done in partnership with Biscayne Bay Brewing Co. and is also available at retails locations throughout South Florida.


## BISCAYNE BAY BREW HALL

## AUTONATION ALLEY \& THE SOCIAL

The on-going transformation of loanDepot park into a first-class entertainment experience featured the addition of social space concepts with AutoNation Alley and The Social in 2019 These ballpark enhancements offer fans new vantage points and unique viewing experiences at Marlins home games.
AutoNation Alley and The Social, which were designed by MSA Sport - a national sports architecture firm, feature standing room only (SRO) space which enhances the ability to flow freely between locations for varied perspectives of the field and game action. A new low-priced ticket product, the Party Pass, provides holders with priority access to both new locations and viewing experiences.

AutoNation Alley is a tiered viewing platform structure with three primary levels. The top level is accessible to all fans from the Promenade Level and features a craft cocktail bar experience; the middle level serves as an exclusive standing view platform with drink rail for Estrella Jalisco Party Pass holders; and the lower level serves as an exclusive group hospitality space.

Redevelopment of this area at loanDepot park provides improved sightlines from the concourse to the field and back to the cityscape in the exterior through the Skyline Terrace. The re-imagined in-bowl visual experience is surrounded by a redesigned batter's eye with a lush, ivy-look that transitions to the State Farm signage on the left field façade. With more than 2,250 total square feet of space across the three levels, AutoNation Alley is ideal for group outings and functions. The lower level of AutoNation Alley overlooks the center field wall, bringing fans closer to the action.

The Social, with a spectator capacity of more than 200, is located in the foul territory corner of right field, composed of the former 10 rows of Sections 1-3 closest to the Promenade Level concourse. The section will provide an exclusive access gathering spot for SRO Social Pass holders with a redesigned in-section view of the game from five tiered drink rails.

## RE-IMAGINED FOUC AND BEVERAGE EXPERIENCE

In an ongoing effort to enhance the fan experience at loanDepot park, the Miami Marlins re-imagined the food and beverage experience and re-concepted all concessions on the Promenade Level prior to the 2019 season and have continued those efforts to provide delicious options for all fans! Levy is the official hospitality partner of the Marlins, welcoming each fan with world-class food and heartfelt hospitality.


The Marlins first introduced the $\$ 30 \$ 5$ Menu - a new food and beverage menu option for all Marlins home games. The $\$ 30 \$ 5$ Menu features core ballpark favorites at a new introductory price of either $\$ 3$ or $\$ 5$, giving fans the ability to purchase a hot dog for just $\$ 3$ or a beer for $\$ 5$. Larger value-sized options such as bottomless popcorn and soda will also be available for select items featured on the $\$ 30 \$ 5$ Menu. The $\$ 30 \$ 5$ Menu will be featured at concession stand locations at Section 13 and Section 37 on the Promenade Level, two of the largest concession areas at loanDepot park, providing convenient access to all guests. Marlins Member purchases of $\$ 30 \$ 5$ Menu items will be eligible for their exclusive Member Benefit savings rate on food and beverage, and retail purchases at loanDepot park, allowing for up to an additional 25 percent savings based on membership level.

The Marlins also added new food partners prior to the 2019 season to deliver an authentic Miami experience. The new partners, all of whom have great Miami stories and connections to the community, are Miami's Best Pizza, PINCHO, Novecento and SuViche. IoanDepot park serves as the exclusive South Florida professional sports venue to host Novecento and Miami's Best Pizza. The ballpark will also showcase unique menu items and activations via new partnerships with PINCHO and SuViche. The diverse array of concepts and concessions are reflective of the ever-evolving South Florida community.

The partner brand concession locations were part of a full re-concept and reposition of the Promenade Level food and beverage experience by the Marlins and hospitality partner Levy. The program, based on fan feedback and industry leading practices, introduced new menu items and stand designs inspired by the community for ballpark favorites as well as other new specialty concepts, including a rotating feature location for test menus by Levy. In addition, Marlins Members and their guests located in The Club: DEX Imaging have exclusive access to an interactive chef experience in the expanded and new-look club, and an elevated in-seat dining and drink service as part of new industry standard for premium seating.

The evolvement of the food and beverage experience at loanDepot park in 2019 continued with the addition of El Mercadito, a grab-and-go style market offering fans a new purchase experience for ballpark favorite drinks and snacks as well as fresh and healthy options for all Marlins home games, including wraps, salads, fruits, and gluten-free items.

## BORBLEHEAD MUSEUM

The Bobblehead Museum display on the Promenade Level is the first of its kind in baseball and is located in Billy's Kids Zone in center field. It features a collection of current and former Marlins player bobbleheads, as well as current and past players, managers, broadcasters and mascots throughout Major League Baseball history. This display holds approximately 500 bobbleheads and regularly features new entries. The entire structure moves ever so slightly, which causes the heads to bobble.

## TRANSPORTATION AND PARKING



The Miami Marlins continue to listen to their fans and implement ways to enhance their fan experience. Getting to and from loanDepot park is easier than ever with Free-Flow Parking, which was introduced by the organization in 2020 in partnership with Miami Parking Authority. The Marlins became the first professional sports team to offer full on-site free-flow parking - with fans paying ahead of time or by using their mobile devices rather than stopping to pay in cash upon entry into the parking garages. The loanDepot park parking garages and lots will feature free-flow parking, providing a much better arrival experience for guests, who will simply enter the garage and proceed to park.

Transportation to loanDepot park includes Brightline, the Civic Center Metrorail Station and Culmer Metrorail station, Tri-rail - Metrorail transfer and the City of Miami Trolley Service. Also, fans can park anywhere along the Miami-Dade Metrorail system, exit at Culmer Station and enjoy the dedicated Express Shuttle to loanDepot park. There is also pedestrian access, bicycle routes, taxi and limousine access, bridge opening regulations to alleviate traffic, civic center parking and group bus parking.

IoanDepot park also features four state-of-the-art parking facilities with a capacity of 4,700 vehicles. The parking garages are managed by the City of Miami. The parking garages are located along first base, third base, home plate and center field, which render their names. In addition to garage parking, there are 1,000 parking spaces in surface lots to the east and west of the ballpark. In addition to Free-Flow Parking, the parking garages at IoanDepot park will feature bike share stations and ChargePoint electric vehicle charging stations for guests.

## WORLD-CLASS SPECIAL EVENTS

loanDepot park is home to much more than just baseball. During its brief existence, the ballpark has played host to a variety of diverse events.

 park brought football back to the original Orange Bowl site by hosting the Miami Beach Bowl for three years, from 2014-16. On November 23, 2019, the ballpark reunited former Orange Bowl tenants as the football teams from Florida International University and the University of Miami squared off.

In the first few months of 2022, IoanDepot park has hosted a concert performance by Kanye 'Ye' West, Monster Jam, Family First Life Convention, ALA Fight For Air Climb, Wounded Warriors Ride and much more. Additionally, it was announced that loanDepot park will be the first Major League Baseball stadium to host the prestigious 2024 Caribbean Series (Serie del Caribe).
loanDepot park's uniqueness and attractiveness have made the venue ideal for world-class entertainment, hosting many sporting events as well as many business and entertainment events. The ballpark has hosted the 2017 MLB All-Star Game, Super Bowl LIV Opening Night, international soccer and racing events, Stadiumlinks Golf, and more sporting events. Non-sporting events hosted at the ballpark include 10X Growth Conference, Joel Osteen, Grand Slam Party Latino, Tiger Direct Bash, Give Miami Day, and DJ Khaled celebrated his son Asahd's second birthday, which had a carnival theme and featured a ferris wheel at second base!

The South Florida community has also been able to enjoy this unique facility. Bar mitzvahs and weddings have been held at the ballpark, as well as homecoming dances and graduations for local high schools and universities. On October 14, 2017, loanDepot park hosted Somos LIVE!, a benefit concert to support disaster relief for Puerto Rico, South Florida, the Caribbean and Mexico following Hurricane Irma and a devastating earthquake in Mexico.

## FRONT IFFICE



Bruce Sherman serves as Principal Owner and Chairman of the Board, representing the fourth ownership in Club history after receiving unanimous approval from Major League Owners to acquire the team effective October 2, 2017. In just four years since taking over the organization, the Marlins snapped a 16 -year postseason drought in 2020 and have ascended to a sustained consensus top-10 player development system, being labeled by MLB Pipeline as the most-improved organization from 2019-20. Mr. Sherman currently serves on Major League Basebal's Business Board, Long-Term Strategic Planning Committee, and Audit Committee.

In addition to building sustained success on and off the field, improved fan experience and commitment to the South Florida community have been hallmarks to Mr. Sherman's ownership as the Marlins continue investing significantly into ballpark enhancements as well as making a positive impact on our future leaders and their families through community outreach and Miami Marlins Foundation programming.

Mr. Sherman is Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of M4 Capital, having retired from his position as Chief Executive Officer of Private Capital Management ("PCM") in 2009. He launched PCM in 1986 and built it into the largest independent asset manager in the Southeastern United States prior to selling the firm to Legg Mason in 2001. Following the sale, he retained autonomy over PCM's portfolio management and investment research and led the company to a prestigious \#1 ranking in the country as measured by Nelson's "World's Best Money Managers" for ten years, ending December 31, 2005.

Mr. Sherman has invested professionally and personally in the South Florida community. He has two daughters and four grandchildren, and is married to Cynthia Sherman, a retired partner of international law firm Rogers \& Wells. He formerly served on the Board of Directors of Artis-Naples, the premier center for the performing and visual arts in Southwest Florida. He and his wife are also Lifetime Trustees for the Naples Children \& Education Foundation supporting underprivileged and at-risk children in Collier County.

In addition to his participation and funding of Marlins community outreach initiatives and Miami Marlins Foundation programming, Mr. and Mrs. Sherman founded the Bruce and Cynthia Sherman Charitable Foundation. The Foundation administers the Sherman Prize to recognize and reward leading individuals who go above and beyond to make exceptional, pioneering contributions and inspire tomorrow's innovators in the fight to overcome Crohn's disease and ulcerative colitis. Honorees of the annual awards have hailed from the University of Miami Health System, Cleveland Clinic, University of Chicago, and Harvard Medical School, among many others. The Foundation also endows the Bruce and Cynthia Sherman Professorship in Urological Research and Innovation at New York University's School of Medicine. In 2021, the Foundation partnered with the Bascom Palmer Eye Institute at the University of Miami Miller School of Medicine to establish the Palm Beach Vision Health Initiative, a vision screening program for pediatric underserved communities.

Mr. and Mrs. Sherman reside in Boca Raton. He graduated from the University of Rhode Island in 1969 and earned his MBA from Bernard Baruch College in 1973.


Kim Ng enters her second season as General Manager, having joined the Marlins organization in November 2020 and becoming the fifth person in club history to hold the top position in baseball operations. She is the highest-ranking woman in baseball operations among the 30 MLB teams and was the first woman hired to the General Manager position by any of the professional men's sports teams in the North American Major Leagues. In 2021, she was recognized as the Best Hire in sports by the Sports Business Journal, the Trailblazer of the Year by Baseball America, a Game Changer by the Asia Society and received the Billie Jean King Leadership Award from the Women's Sports Foundation as well as the Lou Gehrig Sports Award from the ALS Association of Greater New York .

Ms. Ng owns more than 30 years in Major League Baseball, including a combined 21 years of previous experience in the front offices for the Chicago White Sox (1990-96), New York Yankees (1998-2001), and Los Angeles Dodgers (2002-11). She has been an integral part of eight postseason appearances, including six League Championship series and three World Championships (all with the Yankees, '98-'00).

Ms. Ng joined the Marlins having spent her prior nine years as Senior Vice President of Baseball Operations with Major League Baseball and the highest ranking Asian-American female baseball executive. During her tenure at MLB, she directed international baseball operations, working with the front offices of the 30 Major League Clubs and many other baseball leagues and entities around the world. In this capacity, she led a team that set policy for and enforced international signing rules, established MLB's first system for registering international players for signing and managed protocols for signing international players, raised the standards for international baseball academies, and negotiated agreements with international winter leagues. She also focused her efforts on growing the game of Baseball, leading MLB's efforts to improve the quality of play, caliber of talent, and rate of participation for amateur baseball around the world while also supervising MLB playing initiatives for girls and women. Additionally, Ms. Ng served on MLB's Diversity Pipeline Advisory Committee.

After beginning her baseball career as an intern with the White Sox in 1990, she ascended to Assistant Director of Baseball Operations. She then spent one season as the Director of Waivers and Records for the American League Office in 1997, before taking on the role as Assistant General Manager of the New York Yankees from 1998-2001. At the time Ms. Ng was hired, she was the youngest Assistant General Manager in Major League Baseball at 29 years of age, and only the second woman to attain the position with a Major League Baseball club.

During her nine-year tenure with the Los Angeles Dodgers as Vice President and Assistant General Manager, Ms. Ng's primary duties included assisting in all player transactions, trades, and free agent signings, while also overseeing the club's arbitration efforts along with the pro scouting, medical, and video departments. In 2004, she served as the Club's interim Farm Director, overseeing all player development.

Ms. Ng graduated from the University of Chicago, where she played softball and earned a degree in Public Policy. She has appeared on Forbes' list of the Most Influential Minorities in Sports, Forbes' list of the Most Influential Women in Sports, Adweek's Most Powerful Women in Sports, included as one of InStyle Magazine's Badass 50 Women, and included among the South Florida Business Journal's Power Leaders. She also serves on the Anti-Defamation League's Sports Leadership Council. Ms. Ng also took part in the 2021 Presidential Inauguration as part of the Celebrating America event.


Caroline O'Connor is in her fifth season with the Marlins, joining the organization in October of 2017 as Senior Vice President and Chief of Staff. In her role, Ms. O'Connor oversees all of the Marlins internal service departments, including Human Resources; Diversity, Equity and Inclusion; Finance; Legal; Communications; Outreach; Technology; Security; Facilities; and Special Projects. In addition, she works closely with the Marlins leadership team to execute organizational objectives and goals. Ms. O'Connor is a member of the Florida Council of 100 and sits on the Board of the Parks Foundation of Miami-Dade County. She was recognized in 2021 as an Influential Business Woman by the South Florida Business Journal.

Under Ms. O'Connor's leadership, the Marlins have continued to expand their efforts to create a workforce consisting of fair treatment, respect, a sense of belonging and access to opportunity; while also establishing enhanced security measures in and around the ballpark and making additional investment in technology infrastructure. She has also focused on guiding initiatives to continue the organization's investment in improving the Marlins' baseball facilities in South Florida and the Dominican Republic, as well as providing impact with the youth and future leaders in our community.

Prior to joining the Marlins, Ms. O’Connor spent five years as Managing Director at Morgan Stanley and six years as Director at UBS Investment Bank. She graduated from Rutgers University and received her Master of Business Administration in Finance from New York University Stern School of Business.

Jason Latimer is currently in his 17th season in professional baseball and fifth with the Miami Marlins, having joined the organization in November 2017 as Vice President of Communications and Broadcasting. In his new role as Senior Vice President of Communications and Outreach, Mr. Latimer is responsible for the internal and external communication efforts of the organization, including baseball information, corporate communications, player and alumni relations, publications, and broadcasting. He and his team also work alongside the Public Affairs department as well as the Miami Marlins Foundation, community outreach and Diversity, Equity and Inclusion areas of the organization to create consistent and streamlined messaging.

Mr. Latimer's previous MLB experience came in the communications departments for the Tampa Bay Rays and the New York Yankees. He is a graduate of the University of Florida, where he also returned in a communications role for two seasons with the Gators football team from 2012-13.

- Mel Stottlemyre Jr. is entering his fourth season as Marlins' pitching coach. It will mark his eighth season as a Major League pitching coach, and his 10th as a Major League coach.
- In his first season with the Marlins in 2019, Jr., Marlins pitchers showed marked improvements in a variety of categories. Marlins pitchers combined to allow 48 less hits in 2019 despite pitching 2.1 more innings than 2018, trimming their opponent batting average from . 254 in 2018 to .245 . The staff lowered its collective ERA from 4.76 to 4.74 , while the bullpen lowered its ERA from 5.33 to 4.97. The 'pen's strikeout-per-nine inning ratio jumped from 8.0 to 9.2. Marlins starters posted a 4.59 ERA (888.0/453), a . 240 average, and 808 strikeouts against 345 walks; they posted 96 more strikeouts than 2018 Marlins starters. Rookies accounted for 76 total starts ( $47 \%$ of starts), eight more starts than the previous season.
- Spent the previous three seasons as Mariners' pitching coach, during which time Seattle registered the sixth-best team ERA (4.19) and average against (.253) in the American League.

- In 2019, Yankees batters set a franchise record with 306 home runs, one shy of the Major League record set by the 2019 Minnesota Twins (307), who had Marlins Bench Coach James Rowson as a hitting coach. The Yankees also had a Major League-record 14 players hit at least 10 home runs.
- In 2018, Yankees batters set a then-single-season Major League record with 267 home runs, surpassing the 1997 Mariners (264) for the all-time team record. They tied a then-Major League record with 24 individual multi-HR games. The club became the first team in Baseball history to have 12 players hit at least 10 home runs in the same season and had five players with at least 25 homers, matching the franchise record. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, they became the first team in Major League history to hit at least 20 homers from all nine batting order spots.

- As a player, Thames was selected by the Yankees in the 30th round of the 1996 First-Year Player Draft and played in parts of 10 Major League seasons with the Yankees (2002, 2010), Texas Rangers (2003), Detroit Tigers (200409) and Los Angeles Dodgers (2011). - Sandy Alcantara (Al-CON-ta-RA) Montero made a team-leading and career-high 33 starts in 2021, becoming the 14th pitcher (18th time) in Marlins History to make 33 starts.
- Over his final 10 outings, RHP Sandy Alcantara went 3-5 with a 2.21 ERA (69.1 IP/17 ER) and struck out 80 batters, holding opponents to a .205 average.
- Pitched a Major League-most 6 games in which he worked 8.0 innings and allowed 1 run or less.

- Surpassed the 200.0-inning plateau, becoming the first Marlins pitcher to do so since Mark Buerhle in 2012 (202.1 IP) and first RHP since Josh Johnson (209.0 IP) in 2009. Became the fifth pitcher in franchise history to record 200 innings pitched and 200 strikeouts in the same season, joining Al Leiter (1996), Kevin Brown (1997), Ryan Dempster (2000), and A.J. Burnett (2002) with 6 strikeouts in his final start.
- Allowed a total of 18 earned runs in 2 starts this season (May 14 at Dodger Stadium and August 6 at Coors Field). Combined to surrender just 51 earned runs over his other 31 starts (2.47 ERA).
- Has a career record of 17-10 when receiving 3 or more runs in support of his starts. Has received 2 or less 35 times in 78 career starts (45).
- Set a career high in strikeouts 3 times in 4 starts from August 22 - September 8: 11 at CIN on $8 / 22,12$ vs. CIN on $8 / 28$, and 14 vs. NYM on $9 / 8$. Became the first Marlins pitcher with $14+$ strikeouts in a game since Dan Straily ( $14 \mathrm{~K} ; 4 / 22 / 17$ at SD) and first Marlins pitcher with 14+ strikeouts at home since Jose Fernandez (14 K; 9/9/16 vs. LAD).

Alcantara is one of 11 children. He has seven sisters and three brothers. He left home at the age of 11 to live with his sister, Aridia, in Santo Domingo to attend better schools and baseball practices. While he was playing in the Arizona Fall League in 2017, his brother, Alexander, was killed in a motorcycle accident at the age of 17. Alcantara has dedicated his career to his younger brother and tattooed his nickname "Lexi" on his left arm.

- Made his second consecutive Opening Day Start on April 1 vs. TB. Recorded 7 strikeouts, most by a Marlins starting pitcher on Opening Day since 2014 (José Fernández, 9 K). Alcantara pitched 6.2 innings, most by a Marlins starting pitcher on Opening Day since 2015 (Henderson Alvarez, 7.0 IP).
- Started 7 games for the Marlins in 2020, going 3-2 with a 3.00 ERA in 42.0 innings pitched.
- Made his first career Opening Day start in Philadelphia on July 24, 2020 earning the win with 6.2 innings, allowing 1 run and striking out 7. His 7 strikeouts were most by a Marlins starting pitcher on Opening Day since 2014 (José Fernández, 9 K). His 6.2 innings were most by a Marlins starting pitcher on Opening Day since 2015 (Henderson Alvarez, 7.0 IP).
- Made his first postseason start on September 30 in Game 1 of the Wild Card Series against the Chicago Cubs at Wrigley Field. Earned the win with 6.2 innings allowing just 3 hits and 1 run.
- Started Game 1 of the Division Series against the Atlanta Braves. Took the loss and allowed 5 runs over 6.0 innings, striking out 8.
- Finished his first full season with the Marlins in 2019 without missing a turn through the rotation, posting a 6-14 record with 3.88 ERA ( $197.1 \mathrm{IP} / 85 \mathrm{ER}$ ) in 32 starts. He held opponents to a .241 average against with 151 strikeouts.
- His 197.1 innings set a Marlins' rookie record, surpassing Scott Olsen's 180.2 innings in 2006, and the most by a Marlin overall since Nathan Eovaldi tossed 199.2 in 2014. It was also the most by a rookie in the Majors since Boston's Daisuke Matsuzaka threw 204.2 frames in 2007, and the most by an NL rookie since 1997, when Matt Morris had 217.0 for St. Louis, and Chris Holt had 209.2 for Houston.
- His 32 starts were the most by a rookie in Club history, beating the previous record of 31 starts held by Brian Meadows in 1998 and Scott Olsen in 2006. They were the most by any Marlins’ starter since Dan Straily had 33 in 2017.
- His ERA and average against also made the Franchise rookie leaderboards. His ERA ranked 2nd behind only José Fernández in 2013 (2.19), and his average against was the 3rd-lowest mark, trailing Fernández (.182) and Olsen (.239). His average against also ranked 18th among all qualified starters in Club history, the lowest since José Ureña held batters to a . 238 average in 2017.
- Among qualified National League rookies in 2019, he ranked 2nd in average against, behind Atlanta's Mike Soroka (.236), and 3rd in ERA and strikeouts.
- He tossed 2 shutouts (May 19 vs. Mets, September 8 vs. Kansas City). He tied Dontrelle Willis in 2003 for the most shutouts by a rookie in Club history. He became just the eighth rookie pitcher since 2000 to record 2 shutouts in a season, the first since Mike

Montgomery in 2015 for Seattle, and the first NL pitcher since J.A. Happ in 2009 for Philadelphia. His 2 shutouts in 2019 were tied with Cleveland's Shane Bieber and the White Sox' Lucas Giolito for the most shutouts in the Majors.

- He allowed just 2 hits and struck out 8 in shutting out the Mets. He needed just 89 pitches, the 2 nd-fewest in a 9.0 -inning complete game in Club history, behind an 88 -pitch outing by Henderson Alvarez in 2014. It was the first shutout for Miami since Edinson Volquez's no-hitter on June 3, 2017 vs. Arizona. He became the first rookie pitcher to toss a shutout since San Francisco's Ty Blach did so on June 2, 2017 at Philadelphia.
- In his opening start of the season, on March 31 vs. Colorado, tossed a then career-high 8.0 shutout innings, allowing just 4 hits and striking out 6 . He retired 18 of the last 19 batters he faced, and was the first Marlins' starter with 8.0 shutout innings and no walks since José Fernández did so on September 20, 2016 vs. Washington. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, Alcantara was the 2nd-youngest pitcher (23 years, 205 days) in Club history to toss 8.0 shutout innings; the youngest was Fernández, who did so at 21 years, 272 days on April 29, 2014 vs. Atlanta.
- Alcantara was Miami's lone representative in the 2019 All-Star Game at Progressive Field. He became the fifth rookie in Club history to be named an All-Star, joining Alex Gonzalez (1999), Dontrelle Willis (2003), Dan Uggla (2006), and José Fernández (2013). In the All-Star Game on July 9, he came on in relief in the 8th inning and tossed a scoreless frame, allowing just 1 hit and striking out 1.
- He went 0-2 with a 7.89 ERA (21.2 IP/19 ER) in his first 4 starts to begin the second half, but bounced back over his final 11 starts of the season, posting a 2-4, 2.78 ( $74.1 \mathrm{IP} / 23 \mathrm{ER}$ ) line, limiting batters to a .207 average with 62 strikeouts. His ERA from August 5 onward ranked 8th in the National League and his average against was 10th.
- He worked at least 7.0 innings in 11 outings in 2019, the most by a Marlin since José Fernández did so 13 times in 2016. Miami went $7-4$ in those starts and $4-17$ in his other outings.
- Alcantara received an average of 3.06 runs of support per start, by far the lowest in the Majors among qualified pitchers, ahead of the Kansas City's Brad Keller (3.81). It was the 3rd-lowest single-season mark in Franchise history (Nathan Eovaldi, 2.70 in 2014 and Josh Johnson, 2.92 in 2012).
- Finished first season in Marlins’ system in 2018 with 6 Major League starts, posting a 2-3 record and 3.44 ERA (34.0 IP/13 ER). In 19 starts at Triple-A New Orleans, went 6-3 with a 3.89 ERA (115.2 IP/50 ER). Also had 3 rehab starts at Single-A Jupiter, where he had no record and a 3.97 ERA (11.1 IP/5 ER).
- At the time of his final promotion, ranked 7th in Pacific Coast League in ERA (3.89). Among PCL leaders, ranked 2nd in average against (.246), 3rd in WHIP (1.25), and fewest base runners per 9.0 (11.67).
- Made season debut with Miami on June 29, making first Major League start against Mets at loanDepot park. Allowed just 1 run on 3 hits with 5 walks and 2 strikeouts over 5.0 innings to record first Major League win.
- The night after his debut, Pablo López made his first career Major League start and also earned a win. The pair became the first set of teammates to earn wins in their first career starts in consecutive days since April 9-10, 2012, when Yu Darvish and Neftali Feliz each made their first career starts with the Rangers. The last National League team to have such a duo was the Reds on April 15-16, 1967 with Gary Nolan and Mel Queen. - Stats LLC
- Recalled by Miami on September 1 and made second start on Sept. 5 vs. Philadelphia. In that start, held Phillies scoreless on 3 hits and 2 walks, while striking out 6 , over a career-high 7.0 innings.
- Had contract selected by St. Louis on September 1, 2017 and made debut on Sept. 3 at San Francisco. Allowed 1 run and 2 hits over 0.2 inning, surrendering 8th-inning leadoff home run to Tim Federowicz. Recorded first MLB strikeout 3 batters later (Buster Posey).
- Led all Cardinals' Minor Leaguers with 153 strikeouts and ranked 5th with 11.23 strikeouts/9.0 in 2016. He went a combined 5-11 with a 3.96 ERA in 23 starts and 122.2 innings between Single-A Peoria and Advanced-A Palm Beach.
- Went $4-4$ with a 3.22 ERA in 12 starts for GCL Cardinals in 2015. Struck out 51 batters in 64.1 innings.

## CARER MIGHLIGHS

- Brian Wade Anderson played in 67 games in 2021 and hit .249 with 7 home runs and 28 RBI.
- Missed 10 games with a left oblique strain from April 21 - May 4 . Missed 51 games with left shoulder subluxation from May 25 - July 24 . Missed the rest of the season after suffering the same shoulder injury in September.
- 4 of his 7 home runs in 2021 were go-ahead home runs; club was $7-0$ when he homered. Batted .346 (18x52) with runners in scoring position with 2 home runs and 23 RBI.

- Played in 59 games in 2020, hitting 255 with 11 home runs and 38 RBI. He was named a Rawlings Gold Glove finalist at third base at the conclusion of the season.
- Became the first player in loanDepot park history to hit 3 home runs in a game when he tied the Marlins club records with 3 home runs and 7 RBI in a game against Washington on September 18. Homered off RHP Wil Crowe in the 2nd inning, RHP James Bourque in the 5th inning and INF/OF Brock Holt in the 6th inning of a 7 -inning game.
- He made his first MLB appearance at first base on August 5 in Baltimore. He had previously only played first base professionally in 4 games in the Arizona Fall League in 2016 as a member of the Mesa Solar Sox.
- One of just five players, with RHP Pablo Lopez, INF Jesus Aguilar, RHP Brandon Kintzler, and RHP Brad Boxberger to spend the entire season on the active roster.

An avid video gamer, Anderson participated in the "Pro vs. GI Joe" initiative in 2019. He played Fortnite and Captain Marvel against troops stationed overseas in honor of Armed Forces Day.

- Had 20 home runs and 66 RBI in 2019, both single-season career highs.
- He was placed on the Injured List on August 24 (fractured left fifth metacarpal, hit-by-pitch) for the remainder of the season.
- He had 33 extra-base hits in a span of 50 hits from June 15 -August 15 . He became just the third player in Club history to do so, joining Giancarlo Stanton, who did it multiple times during the 2017 season, with a high of 35 extra-base hits in one span, and Dan Uggla, who also had 33 from June 8-20, 2008. He led the NL in extra-base hits over that span. - Elias Sports Bureau
- Miami went 14-5 in games where he homered; 25-17 in games with an RBI.
- The team had a 10 -game winning streak when he homered from June 4 to July 29 , which was tied for the 3rd-longest such streak in Club history, behind a pair of 11-game streaks (Jeff Conine in 2004 and Justin Bour in 2017).
- Hit first 2 career grand-slams (June 5 at Milwaukee and July 31 vs. Minnesota).
- Had a career-long 18-game on-base streak from March 29-May 3 (.284, 19x67, 12 BB, 392 OBP).
- Made first 27 starts at third without an error, the 2nd-longest season-opening streak in Club history at the position (Placido Polanco, 28 in 2013).
- He picked up 2 outfield assists on August 17 in Colorado, giving him 9 in just 50 games in the outfield at the time (finished with 9 in 55 games). According to the Elias Sports Bureau, that was the fewest games needed to reach 9 outfield assists in Club history, well ahead of the previous low of 60 games for Mark Kotsay in 1999.
- Finished first full Major League campaign in 2018 batting .273 with 34 doubles, 4 triples, 11 home runs, and 65 RBI in 156 games played.
- Among Marlins' single-season rookie leaders, ranked 2nd in walks (62), 3rd in runs and OBP (.357), 4th in doubles, tied for 5th in hits (161), and 9th in average.
- Opened season with a 7-game hitting streak, which was snapped on April 7 at Philadelphia. Marked 3rd-longest streak by a rookie to start a season in Club history; Hanley Ramirez and Alejandro De Aza both recorded 8-game streaks to begin the 2006 and ' 07 seasons, respectively.
- Hit first career home run on April 2 vs. Boston, a solo shot off Brian Johnson.
- Had 2 game-tying hits on June 11 vs. San Francisco; first Marlin to do so since Cole Gillespie (2 on August 8, 2015) and first rookie since Chris Valaika (2 on April 21, 2013). - Elias Sports Bureau
- Had a career-long and team season-high 24-game on-base streak snapped on June 28 vs. Arizona; longest streak by an MLB rookie that season, tied for 5th-longest by a rookie in Club history, and tied for 19th-longest streak by any Major Leaguer that season.
- Set Club rookie record for hits in first-half (109); was 2nd in doubles (23) and RBI (49); tied for 2nd in walks (37), extra-base hits (34); 3rd in runs scored (55); and was 4th in average (.288) and on-base percentage (.363).
- Had first career hit, home run, and RBI as a pinch hitter on August 25 vs. Atlanta.
- Appeared in 25 games with Miami after having contract selected from Triple-A New Orleans on September 1, 2017.
- Made MLB debut and recorded first career hit on September 1 vs. Philadelphia, an infield single off Nick Pivetta.

## CARER highlights

- Trevor J'Daniel Rogers finished 2nd in 2021 NL Rookie of the Year voting after going 7-8 with a 2.64 ERA in 24 starts. Struck out 157 in 133.0 innings.
- Rogers produced one of the best rookie seasons of all time. Since the mound was lowered in 1969, there have been only six other rookie pitchers to match Rogers' total in wins (7) and strikeouts (157), while recording as low an ERA (2.64): Jose Fernandez (2013), Hideo Nomo (1995), Mark Eichhorn (1986), Dwight Gooden (1984), Fernando Valenzuela (1981), and Jon Matlack (1972). All but Eichorn went on to win Rookie of the Year in their respective leagues in
 those seasons.
- Among Marlins rookies, his strikeout total trailed only Scott Olson (166) and Jose Fernandez (187), while his ERA is 2nd only to Fernandez's 2.19 mark during his 2013 rookie campaign.
- Pitched the 4th inning of the All-Star Game in Colorado. Allowed 2 hits and 2 unearned runs. Struck out J.D. Martinez. Named an All-Star on July 4th, becoming the sixth Marlins rookie to be named an All-Star since 1993.

Rogers is the first cousin of a former Marlins fan-favorite, outfielder Cody Ross

- Named NL Rookie of the Month in April and May. Became the fourth Marlins player to win NL Rookie of the Month twice in the same season, joining Miguel Cabrera (2003), Josh Johnson (2006), \& Jose Fernandez (2013). Joined Johnson (May-June, 2006) \& Fernandez (July-August 2013) as the third to do so in consecutive months.
- Made 22 consecutive starts allowing 3 runs or less from September 26, 2020 to September 10, 2021 to set a Marlins record. Only 12 left-handers have longer such streaks in MLB history.
- Reached 100 career strikeouts on May 19 at Philadelphia. Did so in just 76.2 innings, becoming the quickest Marlins' starter to acommplish the feat and the third in Marlins' history behind Kyle Barraclough (66.0 IP) and Drew Steckenrider (73.2 IP).
- Missed the month of August on the Family Medical Emergency List.
- Made 7 starts for the Marlins in 2020 going $1-2$ with a 6.11 ERA. Struck out 39 in 28.0 innings.

Soler and former Marlins pitcher Liván Hernández (1997) are the only two Cuban-born players to be named World Series MVP in MLB history. 117 RBI.

- His 48 home runs were a Royals franchise record, 10 more than Mike Moustakas' previous record of 38 set in 2017. Became the first Royal to lead the American League in homers. His home run total set a new single-season record by a Cuban-born player, one more than Rafael Palmeiro hit in 1999 and 2001.

- He was honored by the Philadelphia Sports Writers Association (PSWA) with its Native Son Award in 2019. Other winners of the award include Mike Piazza, the NBA's Kyle Lowry, and U.S. women's soccer standout Carli Lloyd.
- Joey received his bachelor's degree in prephysical therapy at West Chester. He planned to attend school for physical therapy before being drafted and had gone as far as applying to a handful of programs. It's still a goal he'd like to pursue after baseball.
- Growing up in eastern Pennsylvania, he supported the Phillies and his favorite players were Scott Rolen and Chase Utley.

AUGUST 8, 1985 -Major League Baseball's new basic agreement permits the National League to expand by two teams to match the American League's 14.

OCTOBER 31, 1987 - U.S. Senators from eight states, including Florida, announce they have formed a congressional task force to investigate baseball expansion.

JUNE 15, 1989 - Baseball says it will announce a timetable for NL expansion within 90 days of the completion of a new basic agreement between the players and owners.

MARCH 7, 1990 - H. Wayne Huizenga announces he has purchased half of Joe Robbie Stadium and 15 percent of the Miami Dolphins for an estimated $\$ 30$ million. Huizenga states his intention to aggressively pursue an expansion franchise.

SEPTEMBER 13, 1990 - Dade County Commission repeals an ordinance that had limited Joe Robbie Stadium to 18 events a year.

SEPTEMBER 18, 1990 - The National League Expansion Committee hears presentations from all three South Florida groups and one from the Miami Beacon Council.

DECEMBER 18, 1990 - The NL unveils a list of six possible sites. South Florida is included, along with Tampa-St. Petersburg, Orlando, Denver, Buffalo and Washington, D.C. From the South Florida interests, Huizenga's group is chosen.

JANUARY 26, 1991 - Renovations begin to transform Joe Robbie Stadium into a baseball stadium.

FEBRUARY 25, 1991- The National League Expansion Committee tours Joe Robbie Stadium.

MARCH 30-31, 1991-Joe Robbie Stadium hosts two exhibition games between the New York Yankees and the Baltimore Orioles, which draw 125,013 fans. This includes a Spring Training record 67,654 sellout on the first night.

JUNE 10, 1991 - Baseball Commissioner Fay Vincent announces Denver and South Florida as the two areas chosen by the expansion committee.

JUNE 12-13, 1991 - Major League owners meet in Santa Monica, Calif., and an ownership committee unanimously approves the two ownership groups. National League owners informally ratify Denver and South Florida.

JULY 5, 1991-Owners unanimously approve the Florida Marlins and the Colorado Rockies as baseball's two newest franchises.

JULY 8, 1991-Carl Barger, President of the Pittsburgh Pirates since 1987, is hired as the Marlins first President.

JULY 18, 1991 - Marlins unveil their new team logo before approximately 1,700 guests at Turnberry Isle \& Country Club.

SEPTEMBER 18, 1991 - Dave Dombrowski, Montreal Expos General Manager, is named

NOVEMBER 7, 1991-Fredi Gonzalez is hired as the Marlins first Minor League manager.

DECEMBER 10, 1991 - Marlins obtain an agreement to join the Gulf Coast League's Central Division beginning in June of 1992. Carlos Tosca will manage the team.

DECEMBER 11, 1991 - Marlins sign a one-year agreement with the Erie (PA) Sailors of the New York-Penn League for 1992. The Short-Season team will begin play in June of 1992 with a 78 -game schedule. Fredi Gonzalez is named to manage the club.

DECEMBER 16, 1991 - Clemente Nuñez, a 16-year-old right-handed pitcher from the Dominican Republic, is signed to a Minor League contract by scout Edmundo Borrome. The Marlins' first player is assigned to the Gulf Coast rookie league.

FEBRUARY 28, 1992 - Marlins hold first-ever tryout camp at Bucky Dent Baseball School in Delray Beach and sign Ryan Whitman, a 20 -year-old right-handed pitcher from Palm Beach Gardens, to a Minor League contract. More than 600 baseball hopefuls participate in the camp.

MARCH 12, 1992 - Marlins kick off season ticket campaign, with tickets going on sale March 23.

MAY 2, 1992 - LHP Mark Stephens becomes the first player under contract with the Marlins to appear in a professional game. Stephens' contract is optioned to the Salinas Spurs of the California League.

MAY 18, 1992 - WQAM (560 AM) signs a four-year contract to become the official radio voice of the Florida Marlins.

JUNE 1, 1992 - Marlins select catcher Charles Johnson of the University of Miami with their first-ever, first-round draft pick in the June amateur draft.

JUNE 15, 1992 - Erie Sailors play the Marlins' first-ever Minor League game, losing 6-5 to the Jamestown Expos in 13 innings. John Lynch throws the first pitch, Brad Clem takes the first at-bat and later collects the first hit, and Lou Lucca drives in Scott Samuels with the first run in Marlins' organizational history.

JULY 28, 1992 - The rookie league Gulf Coast Marlins win their 14th game in a row, the longest streak by any Minor League club during the 1992 season.

AUGUST 20, 1992 - WCMQ (1210 AM) signs a two-year contract to become the official Spanish radio voice of the Florida Marlins.

SEPTEMBER 3, 1992 - Erie qualifies for the New York-Penn League playoffs as the wild card entry. They beat the Hamilton Redbirds, 5-2, in a one-game playoff and move into the finals where they are swept by the Geneva Cubs, 6-3 and 7-4.

OCTOBER 19, 1992 - Marlins sign a two-year agreement with the Edmonton Trappers of the Pacific Coast League (Triple-A).

OCTOBER 21, 1992 - Marlins sign their first Triple-A player in right-handed pitcher Matt Turner. He is assigned to Edmonton and invited to 1993 Spring Training.

OCTOBER 23, 1992 - Marlins announce Rene Lachemann as their first manager. Lachemann, who signed a three-year deal, names his older brother Marcel as his pitching coach.

NOVEMBER 17, 1992 - Marlins make OF Nigel Wilson their first pick in the Expansion Draft and select 35 additional players, including Jeff Conine and Pat Rapp.

DECEMBER 7, 1992 - Marlins participate for the first time in the Rule 5 draft and select RHP Stanley Spencer, LHP Mike Myers and OF Scott Pose. They lose C Jim McNamara.

DECEMBER 8, 1992 - Marlins announce the signing of their first two free agents. Infielder Dave Magadan agrees for two years and veteran knuckleball pitcher Charlie Hough for one.

DECEMBER 9, 1992 - Marlins' President Carl Barger collapses during an owners meeting during the baseball winter meetings in Louisville, KY, and dies a few hours later in the Humana University Hospital due to a ruptured abdominal aortic aneurysm.

FEBRUARY 29, 1993 - Marlins dedicate their Brevard County training complex. Owner Wayne Huizenga announces the complex will be called the Carl F. Barger Complex at Viera.

MARCH 5, 1993 - Marlins defeat Houston, 12-8, in their inaugural Spring Training game. Jeff Conine hits Florida's first homer before a crowd of 6,696 at the Cocoa Expo Sports Complex.

APRIL 5, 1993 - Florida defeats the Los Angeles Dodgers, 6-3, to win their inaugural game before a sellout crowd of 42,334 spectators at Joe Robbie Stadium.

In addition, the Club retired the No. 5 in honor of their late president, Carl Barger. The Marlins defeated the Los Angeles Dodgers, $6-3$, before a sellout crowd of 42,334 fans. Marlins starter Charlie Hough scattered six hits over six innings to pick up the Club's first win. Walt Weiss gave the Marlins a 2-0 lead in the second inning with a two-run triple. Jeff Conine went $4 \times 4$ and stole the first base in Marlins history. Bret Barberie collected Florida's first hit, a first-inning single to center. Bryan Harvey pitched a scoreless ninth to record the save.

## history of sul life stadiun

Sun Life Stadium, originally known as Joe Robbie Stadium, was the first of its kind to be constructed entirely with private funds. The late Joe Robbie led the financing campaign to build "Joe Robbie Stadium"(JRS) for the Miami Dolphins of the National Football League (NFL). JRS revolutionized the economics of professional sports when it opened in 1987. Inclusion of a Club Level, along with Executive Suites, helped to finance the construction of the stadium. The original multi-purpose facility had more than 1.5 million square feet, over 24,000 parking spaces, 75,000 seats and a playing field that meets standards for the NFL and World Cup Soccer.

On March 7, 1990, H. Wayne Huizenga, then Chairman of the Board and Chief Executive Officer of Blockbuster Video and Huizenga Holdings Inc., agreed to purchase 50 percent of Joe Robbie Stadium and became the point man in the drive to bring Major League Baseball to South Florida. That effort was rewarded in July of 1991, when South Florida was awarded a National League expansion franchise. To accommodate MLB baseball and the Florida Marlins, the stadium was retrofitted in 1992 to include retractable seating, a baseball press box, baseball dugouts, new lights and a hydraulic disappearing pitcher's mound. On January 24, 1994, Mr. Huizenga acquired the remaining 50 percent of the stadium to give him complete ownership.

In February 2008, Mr. Huizenga sold 50 percent of the Miami Dolphins, stadium and surrounding developable land to Stephen M. Ross of New York and Palm Beach. Mr. Ross, Chairman of the Related Companies, an international real estate development company, became an active partner. In January 2009, Mr. Ross closed on the purchase of an additional 45 percent of the team and stadium.

## MEDIA INFORMATIN

CREDENTIAL APPLICATIONS: The Marlins are using Major League Baseball's online credentialing system for the 2019 season. Media credential applications are ONLY available online at credentials.mlb.com. Credentials should be requested at least 24 hours in advance of the game or event requested.

CREDENTIALS: Credentials to any Miami Marlins game or loanDepot park event will be issued only to legitimate news gathering organizations. Credentials will be issued only to members of the working press 18 years of age and older. No spouses, guests or children of members of the press will be issued credentials. Press passes are not transferable. Credentialed members of the media are prohibited from obtaining autographs, personal photographs or equipment on the playing field, in the dugout or clubhouse. Any violation of these guidelines will result in immediate revocation of credential and future access. Only credentials issued by the Miami Marlins, Major League Baseball or the BBWAA will be honored. Credentials must be visible at all times.

PHOTO CREDENTIALS: Credentials will be issued to those photographers on assignment for legitimate news gathering organizations and those representatives of companies licensed by Major League Baseball. Priority in all areas will be granted to news organizations on nightly deadlines. No freelance photographers will be granted credentials and all photographs taken are to be used for news gathering purposes or officially licensed products. Any other use of photographs taken will be considered a violation of the conditions under which the credential is issued and result in no further credentials being issued.

CLUBHOUSE ACCESS: Access to the Miami Marlins clubhouse both before and after games will be limited to those organizations who are filing stories on a daily deadline. Clubhouse access will be granted to media, as determined by the Marlins Communications Department. The clubhouse is open to all media with proper credentials $31 / 2$ hours before game time and closes at the beginning of batting practice. It re-opens no later than 10 minutes after each game. Policies regarding access between games of doubleheaders and during rain delays will be determined by the Marlins Field Manager. Access to the visiting clubhouse is subject to the visiting club's guidelines.

CLUBHOUSE GUIDELINES: While in the Marlins clubhouse, media may use cell phones for recording audio or video only. No live web broadcasting, phone calls, or social media posting is allowed within the clubhouse. Still-photography of any type is prohibited in the clubhouse at all times. Broadcast television cameras are allowed only to conduct player interviews in front of a player's locker, with the player's permission. All footage must be shot facing into the player's locker. No B-roll footage is allowed at any time.
FIELD ACCESS: All credentialed members of the media will be given access to the playing field prior to each game. Media can access the field from the Dugout Club tunnels, located down the third-base and first-base lines. Media are not allowed to use The Club by DEX Imaging entrance located behind home plate. All non-uniformed personnel must clear the field at the conclusion of visitors batting practice unless that individual has credentials expressly for in-game field privileges (photo passes, pregame ceremonies, etc.). Live shots are permitted on the field until 35 minutes prior to the first pitch.
LIVE TRANSMISSIONS: Television and radio stations not holding broadcast rights for Marlins games will be allowed to transmit live reports prior to and after Marlins games. All live television shots will be done on the field. No live shots will be permitted from the clubhouses. No live transmissions inside the stadium by non-rightsholders will be permitted while the rightsholder is on the air or the game is in progress. Radio stations will be permitted to provide "scene setters" and score updates between innings but these reports may not continue once an inning is underway. Any violations of these policies will result in revocation of credentials.
ROVING CAMERAS: Roving cameras must obtain prior approval from the Marlins Communications Department. While roving, all photographers must not block any aisles or the views of any fans. Failure to adhere to these guidelines will result in the revocation of roving privileges for both the individual photographer and for the news organization that photographer represents.

ADMISSION TO LoanDepot park: All media covering Marlins baseball may enter LoanDepot park through the Media Entrance, which opens five hours prior to game time and is located on the West Plaza. At that time media may pick up any requested credentials. Credentials will be available for pick up until the end of the first inning, after which credentials may be picked up by calling the press box. All other media who require their credentials prior to the opening of the Media Entrance should contact the Marlins Communications Department.

PRESS BOX AND PRESS LOUNGE: Admission to the LoanDepot park press box will be limited to those individuals with appropriate credentials. These include: Marlins' season credentials, Marlins daily credentials, BBWAA cards, Major League Baseball Working Press, Radio and Photographer passes. Those individuals with the proper credentials will be able to purchase food in the Press Lounge (located directly behind the Press Box) from $21 / 2$ hours before game time through the middle of the sixth inning of each game. The Press Lounge area is considered a part of the working press area and only individuals with proper working credentials will be admitted at all times. No guests will be permitted.
AUTOGRAPH REQUESTS: As noted earlier, no members of the media may use their access to solicit autographs, personal photographs or equipment from players or staff of either participating team. Any autograph needs should be directed to the Miami Marlins Community Outreach Department in writing. Failure to do so will result in revocation of credential privileges and forfeiture of any items obtained.

DRESS CODE: Media covering games are expected to dress in an appropriate and professional manner that reflects their respect for their colleagues, the teams and the players they are covering. Media are expected to adhere to a business casual dress code in all working areas and should follow Major League Baseball's dress code guidelines.

## INFORMCIÓN A LIS MEDIS

SOLICITUD DE CREDENCIALES: Los Marlins están utilizando el sistema de internet de las Grandes Ligas de Béisbol para solicitar las credenciales para los Medios de prensa de la temporada del 2018. Las solicitudes de credenciales para los Medios de prensa están disponibles SOLAMENTE yendo a la página credentials.mlb.com. Las credenciales deben ser solicitadas por lo menos 24 horas antes del inicio de los partidos en referencia.

CREDENCIALES: Las credenciales a los juegos de los Miami Marlins ó eventos en el LoanDepot park serán otorgadas exclusivamente a organizaciones periodísticas legítimas. Las credenciales serán otorgadas solamente a los periodistas mayores de 18 años de edad. No serán otorgadas a los esposos, hijos, familiares, ó invitados de los miembros de la prensa. Estos pases no son transferibles. Está absolutamente prohibido a los miembros de la prensa con credenciales pedir autógrafos ó recuerdos del equipo a los jugadores en el terreno, banco o los vestidores. Cualquier violación de estas regulaciones conllevará a la cancelación de la credencial y el futuro acceso al estadio. Solamente las credenciales otorgadas por los Miami Marlins, las Grandes Ligas de Béisbol o la BBWAA serán aceptadas. Las credenciales deberán ser visibles en todo momento.

CREDENCIALES PARA FOTÓGRAFOS: Las credenciales serán emitidas a aquellos fotógrafos con asignaciones para organizaciones legítimas de noticias y aquellos representantes de compañías con licencias emitidas por las Grandes Ligas de Béisbol. Prioridad en ciertas áreas se le dará a los fotógrafos de medios que tengan hora límite de cierre. Ningún fotógrafo independiente recibirá credenciales y todas las fotos obtenidas deberán ser utilizadas en función de noticias ó para productos con licencias oficiales. Cualquier otro uso de las fotos será considerado como una violación de las condiciones bajo las cuales se entregaron las credenciales y como consecuencia, no serán emitidas ningunas credenciales adicionales.
-ACCESO A LOS VESTIDORES: El acceso a los vestidores de los Miami Marlins, antes y después de los juegos, será limitado para aquellas organizaciones periodísticas que escriban artículos noticiosos para ser entregadas antes de la fecha límite del día. El acceso al cuarto de vestir de los jugadores será autorizado conforme lo determine el Departamento de Comunicaciónes de los Marlins. El vestidor de los Marlins está abierto para todos los miembros de la prensa con las debidas credenciales $31 / 2$ horas antes de cada juego, y cerrará al inicio de la práctica de bateo. Diez minutos después de terminar cada juego, los vestidores estarán abiertos de nuevo. En cuanto a las regulaciones en el intermedio de un doble partido, y demoras debido -a la lluvia, las decisiones serán determinadas por el responsable del terreno de juego de los Marlins. El acceso al cuarto de vestir del equipo visitante será regulado por la dirección del respectivo Club visitante.
REGLAMENTOS DE LOS VESTIDORES: Mientras esté en el clubhouse de los Marlins, los medios pueden usar teléfonos celulares para grabar audio o video solamente. No se permiten transmisiones web en vivo, Ilamadas telefónicas ni publicaciones en las redes sociales dentro de la sede del club. Aun así fotografías de cualquier tipo está prohibido en el clubhouse en todo momento. Las cámaras de televisión son permitidas solo cuando se lleve a cabo una entrevista con los jugadores frente al casillero del jugador, con el permiso del jugador. Todas las imágenes deben tomarse de cara al armario del jugador. No se permiten grabaciones de tipo edición "B-roll" en ningún momento.

ACCESO AL TERRENO DE JUEGO: Todos los miembros de la prensa debidamente acreditados, tendrán acceso al terreno antes de cada juego. Los miembros de la prensa pueden acceder al terreno de juego por los túneles del Dougout Club ubicados por la primera y tercera base. Los miembros de la prensa no están permitidos usar las entradas del The Club ubicadas detrás del home plate. Todo personal que no vista uniforme y esté en el terreno, deberá abandonarlo cuando el equipo visitante termine su práctica de bateo, a menos que posea una credencial especial que le permita estar en el terreno (credencial para fotos, ceremonias anteriores del juego, etc.). Transmisiones desde el terreno serán permitidas hasta 35 minutos antes del primer lanzamiento.

TRANSMISIONES EN VIVO: Las estaciones de televisión y radio que no posean los derechos de transmisión de los juegos de los Marlins, tendrán permiso para hacer reportes en vivo antes ó después de los juegos. Todas las tomas de cámara en vivo serán hechas desde el terreno. No serán permitidas las tomas de cámara en vivo desde los vestidores. No serán permitidas transmisiones desde el estadio, mientras los poseedores de los derechos están en el aire ó el juego está en pleno desarrollo. Estas emisoras de radio tendrán permiso para transmitir entre entradas avances del juego y actualizar la anotación, pero tan pronto como comience la entrada no podrán continuar sus reportes. Cualquier violación de estas regulaciones conllevará la suspensión de las credenciales.

CÁMARAS AMBULANTES: Todo uso de cámaras ambulantes en el estadio tendrá que ser previamente aprobado por el Departamento de Comunicaciónes de los Miami Marlins. Ninguna cámara ambulante podrá obstruir la vista ni la comodidad de los fanáticos. De no cumplirse estos reglamentos, el propietario de la cámara y la entidad informativa a la que pertenece, perderá todos los derechos que la credencial y el permiso previamente otorgados le conceden.

ENTRADA AL LoanDepot park: Todos los miembros de la prensa que cubran los juegos de los Miami Marlins deberán entrar al estadio por la puerta de la Prensa, la cual abre cinco horas antes de cada partido y está ubicada en la Plaza Oeste. Será entonces cuando los miembros de la prensa podrán recoger las credenciales solicitadas. Las credenciales estarán disponibles para ser recogidas hasta una hora después del comienzo de cada partido. Luego, podrán ser retiradas comunicándose con la sala de prensa directamente. Todos aquellos miembros de la prensa que necesiten acceso al estadio antes de la apertura de la ventanilla de credenciales, deberán comunicarse con el Departamento de Comunicaciónes de los Marlins.

ZONA DE PRENSA Y COMEDOR DE PRENSA: El acceso a la zona de prensa del LoanDepot park será limitado a aquellos miembros de la prensa previamente acreditados debidamente. Estas incluyen: aquellos con credenciales de temporada y credenciales diarias de los Marlins, miembros de la BBWA, credenciales de Las Grandes Ligas y miembros con pases de la Radio y fotógrafos. Aquellos miembros de la prensa con credenciales oficiales previamente mencionadas podrán accesar al comedor (ubicado directamente detrás de la zona de prensa) dos horas y media antes del comienzo del partido y hasta la parte baja de la sexta entrada del partido. La zona de comedor es considerada como área de trabajo y sólo aquellos miembros de la prensa con credenciales oficiales tendrán acceso. No se permiten invitados o personas sin credenciales oficiales.

PETICIÓN DE AUTÓGRAFOS: Ningún miembro de la prensa debe usar su acceso al estadio para solicitar autógrafos, fotografías personales ó parte del equipo de juego de los jugadores, ó de los miembros de la organización, de los equipos participantes. Cualquier solicitud de autógrafos debe ser hecha por escrito a través del Departamento de Relaciones Comunitarias. La violación de estas regulaciones dará lugar a la cancelación de la credencial y la confiscación de los artículos obtenidos.

CÓDIGO DE VESTIMENTA: Los miembros de la Prensa cubriendo los juegos deberán vestir apropiada y profesionalmente, reflejando el respeto a sus colegas y los jugadores de los equipos a quienes están cubriendo. Los miembros de la Prensa deberán adherirse a este código profesional de vestimenta en todas las zonas de trabajo y deberán seguir el código de vestimenta de Las Grandes Ligas.

The Miami Marlins enter their $20^{\text {th }}$ Spring Training at Jupiter's Roger Dean Chevrolet Stadium, approximately one and a half hours north of the Club's regular season home of LoanDepot park. The complex is located on approximately 110 acres within the Abacoa Community. Abacoa is located on Donald Ross Road, approximately $1 / 4$ mile east of Interstate 95. The Marlins share the Palm Beach County facility with the St. Louis Cardinals, one of only two multiple-team Spring Training sites in the Grapefruit League.

Roger Dean Chevrolet Stadium was named the Professional Baseball Field of the Year by the Sports Turf Managers Association in 2011.

In 2003, Baseball America recognized Roger Dean Chevrolet Stadium as baseball's fifth-best spring training facility.

The Marlins begin their $28^{\text {th }}$ Spring Training on Friday, February 23, when they open their Grapefruit

Miami will play 18 total games at the Dean, including 7:05 p.m. contests against the Washington Nationals (March 22) and Houston Astros (March 23). The Marlins spent their inaugural Spring Training at the Cocoa Expo Center in Cocoa Beach and played nine years (1994-2002) at Space Coast Stadium in Viera (Melbourne).

The $\$ 28$ million state-of-the-art complex opened on February 28,1998 and accommodates 6,839 fans with luxury suite seats, reserved box seats, bleachers and bullpen seating area in right field. The facility has undergone a series of upgrades in recent seasons, beginning with a new high-definition video board in 2012, reconfigured seats and new sound system in 2015, the addition of the Bullpen Club in 2016 and shade panels installed prior to the 2017 Spring season. Fans will have the opportunity to sit in the Bullpen Club, a 135 -seat area that includes table-top seating for a community feel next to the visitor's bullpen. The six air-conditioned luxury suites provide 320 square feet of interior entertainment, including a wet bar, refrigerator, sink, ice maker, color television with DVD, sofa, bar stools and additional seats. Each suite has seating for 12 (outdoors) and is available with a private entrance and elevator access. Prior to the 2018 Spring Training season, all suites at Roger Dean Chevrolet Stadium underwent a modernization by local design company V-Starr.

Following Spring Training, the complex is the home of the Single-A Jupiter Hammerheads (Miami affiliate) and the Palm Beach Cardinals (St. Louis affiliate) of the Florida State League.

Offices for the Marlins Communications Department and the media workroom are located in the Marlins executive offices, beyond the left field wall at Roger Dean Chevrolet Stadium. The Press Dining area is located in the main press box area. Admission to all Marlins Spring Training games requires either a Major League Baseball Spring Training credential, a BBWAA card, or a Marlins season or daily Spring Training credential.
