OAKLAND ATHLETICS (68-94, 5th place in AL West, -20)

ABOUT THE A'S: The A's compiled a 68-94 (.420) record, which was the worst record in the American League and tied for fourth worst in the majors...it also tied for the fourth worst record in Oakland history and was the worst since 1997 (65-97)...it marked the third time in Oakland history the A's had the worst record in the AL (1993 and 1997)...finished in last place in the AL West, 20 games behind first place Texas...it was the eighth time the A's finished last in the West (1977, 79, 93, 95, 97, 98, 2009)...

finished 18 games behind Houston for the second Wild Card...spent 142 days alone in last place, which are the third most such days in Oakland history (162 in 2009, 153 in 1997)...spent each of the final 74 days in last dating back to July 23 and all but four days in last dating back to May 8...also spent six days in sole possession of first, three days tied for first, five days in second, three days tied for second, two days in third, five days tied for third, nine days in fourth and three days tied for fourth.

ONE-RUN AND TWO-RUN GAMES: The A's went 19-35 (.352) in one-run games to set Oakland records for lowest winning percentage and most losses in one-run games...broke the previous marks of a .381 winning percentage in 1980 and 32 losses in 1976...the 35 one-run losses tied for third most in Athletics history and were the most since 1945 (38)...the .352 winning percentage tied for fifth worst in Athletics history and was the worst since 1946 (13-29, .310)...led the majors in one-run losses, had the second worst record to Toronto (15-28, .349) and ranked sixth in games (54)...the 54 one-run games match the most by an A's team over the last 39 years (went 32-22 in 2006)...were 31-53 (.369) in games decided by two runs or fewer to set Oakland records for lowest winning percentage (.369) and most losses (53) in games decided by two runs or fewer...the 53 losses by two runs or fewer tied for third in Athletics history and were the most since 1945 (55)...had the most losses in the majors by two runs or fewer, the second worst record to Cincinnati (26-45, .366) and tied for fifth in games (84).

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: The A's committed a Major League leading 126 errors, four more than Pittsburgh...it marked the first time the A's led the majors in errors since 1978 (179)...the errors were the most by an A's team since 2000 when they had 134...the errors led to 65 unearned runs, which were second most in the majors (San Diego, 76)...have made 569 errors over the last five seasons, which are the most in the majors (Pittsburgh, 561)...Marcus Semien led the American League in errors (35) and Brett Lawrie ranked second (24)...the 59 errors were the most by two A's teammates since Ed Busch (41) and Irv Hall (26) combined for 67 with the 1944 Philadelphia A's...they were the most by an AL duo since U.L. Washington (36) and George Brett (25) had 61 for the 1983 Kansas City Royals...they were the most in the majors by two teammates since 1993 when Wil Cordero (36) and Mike Lansing (24) combined for 60 with Montreal.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's compiled a 34-47 (.420) record at home and on the road...it was the first time in Oakland history and second time in Athletics history (1947) the A's had identical records both at home and on the road...the home record was second worst in Oakland history (31-50 in 1979) and it was the first time the A's finished more than one game under .500 at home since 1998...tied Cincinnati and Milwaukee for the worst record at home in the majors...had the worst home record in the majors for the first time since 1964 when the Kansas City A's went 26-55 (.321)...had a losing record on the road for the second consecutive season and seventh time in the last nine years...had the third worst mark on the road in the American League.

OFFENSE: The A's batted .251, which ranked ninth in the American League...set an Oakland record for triples in a season with 46...broke the previous mark of 40 set in 1968, the A's first season in Oakland...ranked second in the AL in triples but had the third fewest extra base hits (469) and second lowest slugging percentage (.395)...walked just 475 times, which was third fewest in Oakland history in a non-strike season...the only lower totals were 433 in 1978 and 472 in 1968...ranked 10th in the AL in on-base percentage (.312)...were ninth in runs scored (694)...set an Athletics record for fewest sacrifice hits in a season with a Major League low 14...broke the previous mark of 18 set in 2007...the sacrifice hits tied for fifth fewest in ML history...had the second fewest strikeouts in the AL (1119), tied for third in fewest hit by pitches (40) and hit the fourth fewest home runs (146)...led the AL and ranked third in the majors in infield hits (158)...the infield hits are second most by an A's team since Stats, Inc. began tracking infield hits in 1987 (165 in 1989).

PITCHING: The A's compiled a 4.14 ERA, which ranked 11th in the American League...it marked the A's lowest finish in the AL since 1997 when they were last...finished in the top three 12 times over a 16-year stretch

from 1999-2014 and never worse than sixth...were leading the AL with a 3.47 ERA as late as Aug. 13...compiled a 5.78 ERA after that, which was the highest in the majors by more than half a run (Atlanta, 5.11)...set a franchise record by using 30 pitchers, breaking the mark of 27 set in 1915...led the AL and tied for fourth in the majors in shutouts (15)...finished with 1179 strikeouts, which was the third best total in Athletics history behind the 2014 (1244) and 2013 (1183) A's...surrendered 172 home runs, which tied for sixth most in Oakland history and were the most since 1998 (179)...allowed just 13 triples, which were second fewest by a Major League team in a non-strike season since at least 1914 (source: Stats, Inc.)...the fewest triples are 11 by the 2014 A's.

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers were 47-63 with a 3.91 ERA...ranked third in the American League in ERA but tied Detroit for the fewest wins...had the second lowest winning percentage (.427) and tied for third in losses...the wins were the fewest by A's starters since 1997 (29)...led the AL in fewest home runs (98) and extra base hits (283), tied for the lead in fewest triples (8), ranked second in lowest opponents slugging percentage (.385) and fewest doubles (157) and third in OPS (.700)...the extra base hits were second fewest in the majors (LAD, 252) and the fewest by an A's team in a non-strike season since 1978 (233)...averaged just 92.5 pitches per start, which was fourth lowest in the AL and second lowest by an A's team since Stats, Inc. began tracking pitches in 1988 (91.6 in 1997).

BULLPEN: The A's bullpen compiled a 4.56 ERA, which was the highest in the American League, third highest in the majors and eighth highest in Oakland history...ranked last in the majors in saves (28) and save percentage (52.8%) and second in the AL in blown saves (25) and fewest save opportunities (53)...the save percentage was third lowest in Oakland history and the lowest since 1980 (52.0%)...the saves tied for fifth fewest in a non-strike season and were the fewest since 1982 (22), which was also the last time the A's finished last in the majors in saves...allowed 74 home runs, which was second most in the majors to Boston (76) and second most in Athletics history to the 1964 Kansas City A's (92 in 1964)...had the second highest opponents slugging percentage in the AL (.428)...tied an Oakland record for losses by the bullpen with 31 (also 1993)...allowed 88-of-257 (34.2%) inherited runners to score, which was the highest percentage in the majors...had the highest opponents slugging percentage in the majors against first batters faced (.469) and the most RBI (68)...yielded 19 first-batter home runs, which ranked third in the AL and were the most by an A's team since 1974 (first year data is available)...employed 24 relievers, which were the most in Oakland history and second most in Athletics history (26 in 1955).

THE DISABLED LIST: The A's used the disabled list 23 times, which matched the 2010 club for second most in Oakland history (had 25 in 2008)...A's players combined to miss 1103 games while on the DL, an average of 48.0 games per stint...four players had two stints on the DL, including Coco Crisp, Ike Davis, Sean Doolittle and A.J. Griffin...Jarrod Parker was the only player to miss the entire season and Doolittle (121 games) and Taylor Thompson (112) also missed at least 100 games...had a season-high 11 players on the DL from May 22-24, which were the A's most players on the DL at one time since Aug. 20-21, 2010 when they also had 11...had at least six players on the DL every day through Aug. 2...the season low was three players from Aug. 22-23...have had at least three players on the DL every day since July 30, 2011 and have not had fewer than two players on the DL since the end of the 2006 season when they had just one.

THIS AND THAT: The A's had a .420 winning percentage but were out-scored 729-694 for a run differential of -35...are the first team in modern Major League history (since 1900) to finish with a record of .420 or worse and a run differential of -35 or greater...led the majors in slugging percentage (.580) and RBI (132) with the bases loaded, ranked third in batting average (.336) and tied for third in grand slams (6)...the slugging percentage was second best in Oakland history (.712 in 2000)...A's pinch hitters led the American League in walks (19) and ranked second in batting average (.255), on-base percentage (.340), hits (34) and plate appearances (159)...the hits were the most by an A's team since 1998 (35)...had a 15-32 (.319) record in games in which the opponent started a left-handed pitcher, which was the second worst record in the majors (Colorado, 11-32)...it was also the worst mark in Oakland history...went 10-23 (.303) against AL East competition, which was the worst mark in A's history...were 27-44 (.380) after the All-Star Break, which was the worst record in the AL and third worst in the majors...A's catchers hit 27 home runs, which were second most in the majors (NYY, 28) and third most in Athletics history (37 in 1996, 29 in 1970)...A's left fielders hit .199, which was the lowest mark by a Major League team since at least 1974...were the only team in the majors without a rain delay.

ATHLETICS PITCHING NOTES

56 LHP FERNANDO ABAD

Service Time: 4 years, 73 days (arbitration eligible)

- Compiled a 4.15 ERA in a team-leading 62 relief appearances after logging a 1.57 ERA in his first season with the A's in 2014...his games pitched were the fewest by an A's team leader in a non-strike season since Dennis Eckersley had 60 in 1988.
- Posted a 7.36 ERA over his first 20 games through May 19, a 0.83 ERA over his next 23 games through Aug. 9 and a 6.60 ERA over his final 19 contests
- Yielded a .251 opponents batting average, including .218 against right-handed hitters compared to .277 against left-handers.
- Allowed a career-high 11 home runs and matched his high by walking 19 batters...the home runs ranked third most among American League relievers and tied for ninth most in Oakland history by a reliever.
- Tied for the most first batter home runs in the majors (5), allowed the second most first batter RBI (15) and had the fourth highest opponents slugging percentage (.667)...since 1974, the home runs tied for second by an Athletic (Blevins, 6 in 2012), the RBI tied for fourth (most since Tam, 15 in 2002) and the slugging percentage tied for fourth.
- Inherited 46 runners, which tied for fifth most in the AL.
- Opponents hit .167 with runners in scoring position and two outs.
- Had a 3.38 ERA in 33 games at home, 5.14 in 29 contests on the road.

37 RHP R.J. ALVAREZ

Service Time: 91 days

- Had four stints with the A's and posted a 9.90 ERA in 21 relief appearances...the ERA was third highest in Oakland history among pitchers with 20 or more innings pitched and was the highest since Rick Langford had a 12.15 ERA in 20.0 innings in 1983.
- Struck out 23 batters in 20.0 innings (10.35 per nine innings) but also issued 13 walks (5.85 per nine innings) and surrendered seven home runs (3.15 per nine innings).
- Opponents batted .318, including .200 by right-handed hitters compared to .450 against left-handers...yielded 27 hits, 13 of which were for extra bases (.635 slugging percentage)...righties slugged .444, lefties .850.
- Yielded a .263 batting average with the bases empty compared to .362 with runners on base.
- Spent the balance of the season at Triple-A Nashville where he was 3-3 with a 4.11 ERA in 31 relief appearances...allowed two home runs in 35.0 innings...struck out 41 (10.54 per nine innings).

40 RHP CHRIS BASSITT

Service Time: 127 days

- Went 1-8 despite a 3.56 ERA and .244 opponents batting average in 18 games, including 13 starts, over four stints with the A's.
- His .111 winning percentage was the lowest in the majors among pitchers with at least 10 games started...it tied for fourth lowest in Oakland history among pitchers with at least 10 starts, but was the lowest among pitchers with an ERA under 5.00...the last Major League pitcher with at least 10 starts, an ERA under 3.75 and a winning percentage of .111 or less is Zane Smith, who went 1-13 (.071) with a 3.49 ERA in 48 games, including 17 starts, for the Braves and Expos in 1989...no American League pitcher has done it since 1968 when Rickey Clark (1-11, 3.53 ERA with California) and Fred Talbot (1-9, 3.36 ERA with New York) both did it.
- Received one run of support or fewer in nine of his 13 starts and his season run support average as a starter was 2.15...his overall run support of 3.14 was fifth lowest in the AL among pitchers with 81 or more innings pitched.
- Surrendered just five home runs in 86.0 innings for an average of 0.52 home runs per nine innings...that ranked third best in the AL among pitchers with at least 81.0 innings.
- Had a .244 opponents batting average, including .217 against lefties and .279 against righties...issued 22 of his 30 walks to lefties.
- Went 1-5 with a 2.28 ERA and .218 opponents batting average in nine games in Oakland, 0-3 with a 5.12 ERA and .274 opponents average in eight games on the road.
- Went 2-7 with a 3.65 ERA and .230 opponents batting average in 13 games, including 10 starts, in his Triple-A debut with Nashville...allowed just one home run in 69.0 innings...struck out 70 batters and issued 19 walks (2.48 per nine innings) for a strikeout-to-walk ratio of 3.68.

36 RHP AARON BROOKS

Service Time: 70 days

- Began the season in the Kansas City organization and went 0-0 with a 6.23 ERA in two relief appearances over four stints with the Royals...was traded to the A's with minor league pitcher Sean Manaea on July 28 for Ben Zobrist and cash considerations and went 3-4 with a 6.71 ERA in 11 games, including nine starts, with the A's...combined for a 6.67 ERA in 13 games overall...his ERA was fourth highest in the American League among pitchers with 50 or more innings.
- Allowed a .322 opponents batting average, including .347 against right-handed hitters...opponents hit .429 leading off an inning and .350 with runners in scoring position.
- Went 1-0 with a 2.41 ERA over his first four games, 1-3 with a 12.60 ERA over his next five games from Aug. 12 to Sept. 15 and 1-1 with a 4.32 ERA over his final three games.
- Had four starts with seven or more innings and three runs or fewer...had three starts with four innings or fewer and five runs or more.
- Went 6-5 with a 3.71 ERA in 18 games, including 17 starts, with Triple-A Omaha and 1-0 with a 2.25 ERA in two starts with Triple-A Nashville...

combined to go 7-5 with a 3.56 ERA and .275 opponents batting average in 20 games, 19 starts, overall...issued just 21 walks in 118.2 innings, an average of 1.59 walks per nine innings.

60 RHP JESSE CHAVEZ

Service Time: 5 years, 108 days (arbitration eligible)

- Began the season with four relief appearances but then made 26 starts before going on the disabled list Sept. 16 with a fractured rib...was 7-15 with a 4.18 ERA in 30 games overall.
- His .318 winning percentage tied for the lowest in the American League and he tied for second in losses...the losses were second most by an A's pitcher over the last 17 years (Greg Smith, 16 in 2008).
- Had career highs in games started (26), innings pitched (157.0), losses (15), hits (164), runs (78), earned runs (73) and home runs (18)...matched his best in strikeouts (136) and saves (1).
- Went 3-6 with a 5.59 ERA in 11 starts after the All-Star Break after going 4-9 with a 3.40 ERA in 19 games before the break...now has a 3.72 career ERA before the break compared to 5.97 after the break.
- Allowed a .268 opponents batting average, including .240 against right-handed hitters...lefties hit .291 with 14 of his 18 home runs and 37 of his 50 extra base hits (.487 slugging percentage)...righties slugged .316.
- Was 5-6 with a 3.38 ERA in 14 games at home compared to 2-9 with a 4.92 ERA in 16 games on the road...over the last two years, he is 10-8 with a 3.04 ERA in Oakland, 5-15 with a 4.53 ERA on the road.
- Went 4-7 with a 3.41 ERA in 13 games during the day, 3-9 with a 4.88 ERA in 17 games at night...the day losses tied for the Major League lead and were the most by an A's pitcher since 1998 (8, Tom Candiotti).
- Was 4-9 with a 3.47 ERA in 15 starts on four days rest compared to 3-6 with a 5.73 ERA in 11 starts on five days rest or more.
- Received two runs of support or fewer in 17 of his 26 starts and his season RSA of 3.73 was sixth lowest among AL pitchers with 150 or more innings pitched.
- Is 15-23 with a 3.83 ERA in 62 games, 47 starts, over his last two seasons after going 9-15 with a 5.48 ERA in 191 games, two starts, over his first six seasons.

67 LHP DANIEL COULOMBE

Service Time: 48 days

- Began the season in the Los Angeles (NL) organization and logged a 7.56 ERA in five games over five stints with the Dodgers...was traded to Oakland Sept. 10 for cash considerations and compiled a 3.52 ERA in nine games with the A's...had no decisions and a 5.63 ERA in 14 relief appearances overall.
- Did not allow a home run in 16.0 innings in the majors and surrendered just one in 41.1 minor league innings.
- Yielded a .270 opponents batting average, including .200 against left-handed hitters compared to .333 against right-handers...his minor league splits were .304 against lefties, .204 against righties.
- Allowed just 1-of-8 (12.5%) inherited runners to score and first batters faced were 2-for-13 (.154) with a walk (.214 on-base percentage).
- Spent the balance of the season at Triple-A Oklahoma City in the Dodgers farm system where he went 3-1 with a save, a 3.27 ERA and .235 opponents batting average in 38 relief appearances.

62 LHP SEAN DOOLITTLE

Service Time: 3 years, 122 days
(signed through 2018 with club options for 2019 and 2020)

- Missed 121 games due to two stints on the disabled list...began the season on the DL with a strained left rotator cuff...was reinstated May 26 and pitched the next day against Detroit before returning to the DL May 30 retroactive to May 28 with a strained left shoulder...was transferred to the 60-day DL June 13 and was reinstated Aug. 22.
- Went 1-0 with four saves, a blown save and a 3.95 ERA in 12 relief appearances.
- Opponents hit .235, including .225 by right-handed hitters compared to .273 by left-handers.
- First batters faced were 1-for-11 (.091) with a walk (.167 on-base percentage).
- Surrendered his only home run to a left-handed hitter, which was his first against a lefty since April 28, 2013.

53 LHP FELIX DOUBRONT

Service Time: 4 years, 41 days (arbitration eligible)

- Was released by the Cubs during spring training, signed a minor league deal with the Blue Jays April 2 and was traded to the A's for cash considerations July 31...combined with Toronto and Oakland to go 3-3 with a 5.50 ERA in 16 games, including 12 starts...his ERA was fifth highest among American League pitchers with 70 or more innings pitched.
- Was selected by Toronto July 3 and went 1-1 with a 4.76 ERA in five games with the Blue Jays...had no decisions and a 2.41 ERA over his first four games, two starts, with the A's through Aug. 24...then went 2-2 with a 7.68 ERA over his final seven games, six starts.
- Allowed a .298 opponents batting average, including .225 against left-handed hitters compared to .321 against right-handers...yielded just two extra base hits to lefties for a .282 slugging percentage...surrendered nine of his 10 home runs to righties for a .525 slugging percentage.
- Opponents batted .343 with runners in scoring position.
- Is now 7-8 with a 5.52 ERA in 37 games, 26 starts, over the last two seasons after going 24-18 with a 4.62 ERA in 81 games, 59 starts, over his first four years.
- Also went 1-3 with a 2.44 ERA in nine starts with Triple-A Buffalo...

66 RHP RYAN DULL**Service Time:** 34 days

- Began the year at Double-A Midland but finished it with a September call-up to Oakland...went 1-2 with a save and a 4.24 ERA in 13 games with the A's.
- Made his Major League debut Sept. 1 against Los Angeles (AL) and began his career with an eight-game, 11.0-inning scoreless streak...then allowed at least one run in four of his final five games (12.00 ERA).
- Held the opposition to a .203 batting average, including .167 against left-handed hitters...however, six of the 12 hits he allowed were for extra bases (two doubles, four home runs) for a .441 slugging percentage...yielded just two home runs in 61.0 innings in the minors.
- First batters faced were 3-for-13 (.231).
- Began the season with Double-A Midland and went 3-1 with a 0.60 ERA in 35 relief appearances...converted each of his 12 save opportunities and was named to the Texas League Midseason All-Star Team...was promoted to Nashville July 28 and went 0-1 with a 1.13 ERA and no save chances in 12 games in his Triple-A debut.
- Combined for a 3-2 record, 12 saves and a 0.74 ERA in 47 relief appearances overall in the minors...ranked second in the A's farm system in saves.
- Opponents hit .179, including .117 by right-handed hitters compared to .270 by left-handers...yielded a .118 average with runners in scoring position, including .041 with RISP and two outs.

30 RHP KENDALL GRAVEMAN**Service Time:** 1 year, 14 days

- Was 6-9 with a 4.05 ERA in 21 starts over two stints with the A's before his season ended in late August due to an oblique injury.
- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and went 1-2 with an 8.27 ERA in four starts before he was optioned to Nashville April 26...returned May 23 and went 5-2 with a 1.78 ERA over his first nine starts following his return...then went 0-5 with a 5.82 ERA over his final eight starts beginning July 10...was placed on the 15-day disabled list Aug. 24 with a strained left oblique.
- Tied for fourth among American League rookies in games started (21) and ranked fifth in innings pitched (115.2).
- Allowed a .276 opponents batting average, including .275 (61-for-222) against lefties and .278 (65-for-234) against righties...surrendered 11 of his 15 home runs to righties but issued 24 of his 38 walks to lefties.
- Opponents hit .271 with the bases empty, .285 with runners on.
- Had a .235 opponents average the first time through the lineup, .289 the second time and .317 after that.
- Was 1-9 in 13 starts with two runs of support or fewer, 5-0 in eight starts with three runs of support or more.
- Also went 2-1 with a 1.85 ERA in four starts with Nashville...allowed one home run in 24.1 innings...held the opposition to a .213 batting average, including .118 against left-handed hitters.

54 RHP SONNY GRAY**Service Time:** 2 years, 61 days

- Was named to his first American League All-Star team...went 14-7 with a 2.73 ERA in 31 starts for the A's...led the A's in wins, starts, innings pitched (208.0) and strikeouts (169).
- Ranked third in the AL in ERA and now has a 2.88 ERA in his career, which ranks fourth on the Oakland career list...is sixth with a .623 winning percentage.
- Ranked second in the AL in opponents slugging percentage (.316) and OPS (.590), third in opponents batting average (.217) and fourth in opponents on-base percentage (.273)...the batting average and on-base percentage were seventh lowest in Oakland history and the OPS ranks eighth.
- Also tied for first in the AL in shutouts (2), tied for third in complete games (3), ranked fourth in fewest pitches per inning (14.8), tied for fourth in wild pitches (13), tied for sixth in winning percentage (.667), seventh in home runs per nine innings (0.74), eighth in innings pitched and tied for eighth in wins and opponents grounded into double plays (19).
- Was 10-3 with a 2.04 ERA in 18 starts before the All-Star Break, 4-4 with a 3.74 ERA in 13 starts after the break...it marked the second consecutive season he had 10 wins before the break and four after the break...is now 20-6 with a 2.40 ERA in 38 career games before the break compared to 13-14 with a 3.38 ERA in 38 games after the break.
- Set an Athletics single season record for putouts by a pitcher with 37...broke the previous mark of 35 set by Chick Fraser in 1901...the putouts were the most by a pitcher since Kevin Brown had 41 for the Dodgers in 1999...did not commit an error in 60 chances, which were second most in Oakland history among pitchers with no errors (Langford, 62 in 1979).
- Was 5-2 with a 1.78 ERA in nine starts during the day compared to 9-5 with a 3.12 ERA in 22 starts at night...his day ERA is sixth lowest in Oakland history among pitchers with at least 50 day innings and is the lowest since Tim Hudson had a 1.39 ERA in 2003.

64 RHP A.J. GRIFFIN**Service Time:** 3 years, 34 days (arbitration eligible)

- Did not appear in a game with the A's due to two stints on the disabled list.
- Began the season on the DL as he continued his recovery from April 30, 2014 Tommy John surgery...started a rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton June 2 and did not allow a run in two starts with the Ports (7.0 ip, 2 h, 1 bb, 8 so).
- Was transferred to Triple-A Nashville and went 0-1 with a 7.36 ERA in two starts...made his first start June 12, was reinstated from the A's DL and optioned June 13, made another start June 18 and then went on

the Nashville DL June 20 with a strained right shoulder...missed the remainder of the season.

- Was recalled by Oakland Sept. 1 and added to the 60-day DL.

32 RHP JESSE HAHN**Service Time:** 1 year, 86 days

- Went 6-6 with a 3.35 ERA in 16 starts in a season cut short due to an injury...got off to a slow start as he went 1-4 with a 4.43 ERA over his first eight starts through May 20...then tossed a four-hit shutout May 25 against Detroit and went 5-2 with a 2.42 ERA over his final eight starts...was placed on the disabled list July 11 retroactive to July 6 with a right forearm strain and missed the remainder of the season
- Yielded just five home runs in 96.2 innings, an average of 0.47 per nine innings...that was the lowest mark in the American League among pitchers with 90 or more innings pitched...has surrendered nine home runs in 170.0 career innings (0.48 per nine innings).
- Using the 90 innings pitched minimum, he also ranked third in the AL in opponents slugging percentage (.324) and fifth in OPS (.623).

- Was on the disabled list from May 22 to June 17 with a fractured right thumb...also missed 12 games with a strained right hamstring from Sept. 14 to 26.

- Allowed a .230 opponents batting average, including .167 against left-handed hitters compared to .250 against right-handers...yielded one double and two walks to lefties for a .190 slugging percentage and .205 on-base percentage...surrendered all five of his home runs and nine of his 10 extra base hits to righties

- Had a .531 opponents slugging percentage, which was the highest among Major League relievers and second highest by a reliever in Oakland history (Gene Nelson, .577 in 1991)...ranked second among ML relievers in opponents batting average (.333) and earned runs (35) but was third in fewest walks per nine innings (1.16).
- Logged a 7.68 ERA in 30 games over his first three stints before posting a 4.26 ERA in 11 outings in September.
- Compiled a 4.56 ERA in 19 games in Oakland compared to 9.00 in 22 outings on the road.
- His .333 opponents batting average included a .328 mark against lefties and .336 against righties.
- First batters faced were 12-for-39 (.308) with a double and three home runs (.564 slugging percentage).
- Was 2-0 with a 1.95 ERA in 15 games, including two starts, with Triple-A Nashville...allowed just one home run in 27.2 innings pitched...yielded a .223 opponents batting average, which included .159 against right-handed hitters compared to .325 against left-handers.

13 LHP DREW POMERANZ**Service Time:** 3 years, 13 days (arbitration eligible)

- Began the season in the A's starting rotation and went 2-3 with a 4.63 ERA and .244 opponents batting average in nine starts...was placed on the disabled list May 20 retroactive to May 19 with a sprained left AC joint and moved to the bullpen after being reinstated from the DL June 3...compiled a 2.61 ERA and .205 opponents batting average in 44 relief appearances before he was shut down for the season in late September with an AC joint inflammation.
- Was 5-6 with three saves and a 3.66 ERA in a career high 53 appearances overall...the saves were the first of his career and the wins matched his career high from last year.

33 RHP FERNANDO RODRIGUEZ**Service Time:** 4 years, 32 days (arbitration eligible)

- Started the year at Triple-A Nashville and logged a 2.81 ERA and .143 opponents batting average in 10 games before he was promoted to Oakland May 7...spent the balance of the season with the A's and went 4-2 with a 3.84 ERA and .200 opponents batting average in 56 relief appearances...the ERA and opponents batting average were the best of his three full seasons.
- Allowed 4-of-30 (13.3%) inherited runners to score, which tied for the lowest percentage in the American League (Cedeno, TB) and was the fifth lowest mark by an Athletic since 1974.
- Ranked third in the AL in opponents on-base percentage against first batters faced (.179), fourth in slugging percentage (.189) and tied for fifth in batting average (.132).
- Struck out 65 batters in 58.2 innings (9.97 per nine innings) and now has 205 strikeouts in 191.0 career innings (9.66 per nine innings).

- His .200 opponents batting average included a .174 mark against left-handed hitters and .217 with all four of his home runs and right-handers...yielded a .193 average with runners in scoring position.
- Compiled a 2.13 ERA in 24 games during the day, a 5.13 ERA in 32 games at night.

58 RHP EVAN SCRIBNER**Service Time:** 2 years, 142 days (super two arbitration)

- Spent the entire season in the majors for the first time in his career and was 2-2 with a 4.35 ERA in a career-high 54 relief appearances...missed the entire month of September with a torn right lat muscle (was placed on the 60-day disabled list Sept. 10).
- Had a 2.01 ERA, .209 opponents batting average and three home runs in 31.1 innings over his first 27 games through June 6...then compiled a 6.91 ERA, .293 opponents batting average and allowed 11 home runs over his final 28.2 innings and 27 appearances.
- Surrendered 14 home runs for the season, which were the most among Major League relievers, second most in Oakland history by a reliever (Keith Atherton, 17 in 1985) and third most in Athletics history (John Wyatt, 23 in 1964).
- Walked just four batters in 60.0 innings and his average of 0.60 walks per nine innings was the lowest among ML relievers and third best in Oakland history by a reliever (Eckersley, 0.47 in 1989, 0.49 in 1990)...struck out 64 for a ML leading 16.00 strikeout to walk ratio, which was also third best behind Eckersley (18.33 in 1989, 18.25 in 1990).
- Yielded 26 extra base hits, which tied for the most among American League relievers.
- First batters faced hit .389 with eight doubles, four home runs and 13 RBI (.759 slugging percentage)...the batting average and slugging percentage were the highest in the majors...also led the majors in doubles and tied for third in home runs and RBI...the slugging percentage was the highest by an Athletic since 1974, the doubles matched the most and the batting average ranked third.
- Allowed 10-of-21 (47.6%) inherited runners to score.

29 SHP PAT VENDITTE**Service Time:** 121 days

- The switch-pitcher made his Major League debut with Oakland in 2015, going 2-2 with a 4.40 ERA in 26 relief appearances over two stints...became the first switch-pitcher to appear in a Major League game since Greg Harris on Sept. 28, 1995...is the first full-time switch-pitcher in the modern era (since 1900).
- Had a .210 opponents batting average but issued 12 walks in 28.2 innings (3.77 walks per nine innings).
- His opponents batting average included a mark of .109 against left-handed hitters compared to .288 against right-handers...yielded nine of his 13 extra base hits to righties for a .508 slugging percentage...lefties slugged .239...issued eight of his 12 walks to righties for a .373 on-base percentage...had a .176 mark against lefties.
- Allowed 7-of-18 (38.9%) inherited runners to score...first batters faced hit .292 with five doubles (.500 slugging percentage).
- Was recalled for the first time June 5 and made his Major League debut that day at Boston (2.0 ip, 1 h, 1 so)...did not allow a run in four games (5.2 innings) before he was placed on the 15-day disabled list June 12 retroactive to June 11 with a strained right shoulder...was reinstated from the DL and optioned to Nashville Aug. 3...returned to Oakland Aug. 15 and went 2-2 with a 5.48 ERA in 22 games during his final stint.
- Spent the balance of the season at Nashville and was 1-0 with a 1.55 ERA and .186 opponents batting average in 23 games.

75 LHP BARRY ZITO**Service Time:** 13 years, 91 days (eligible for free agency)

- Signed a minor league contract Feb. 17 and was a non-roster invitee with the A's this spring after sitting out the 2014 season.
- Spent the entire season at Triple-A Nashville where he went 8-7 with a 3.46 ERA and .234 opponents batting average in 24 games, including 22 starts...went 1-4 with a 5.29 ERA over his first nine starts through May 21...then compiled a 7-3 record and a 2.44 ERA over his final 15 games...was on the disabled list from Aug. 7 to Sept. 5 with a strained left shoulder.
- Was selected by the A's Sept. 16, more than a week after Nashville's season ended, and had no decisions, a 10.29 ERA and .387 opponents batting average in three games, including two starts with the A's.
- Made his first appearance Sept. 20 at Houston and allowed a two-run home run to Rasmus (1.0 ip, 2 h, 2 r, 2 er, 1 bb)...it was his first Major League outing since a relief appearance for San Francisco on Sept. 29, 2013 against San Diego.
- Then started against former teammate Tim Hudson Sept. 26 against San Francisco at the Coliseum and had a no decision in the A's 14-10 loss (2.0 ip, 6 h, 4 r, 4 er, 1 bb)...it was his first start with the A's since Game 1 of the 2006 ALCS against Detroit.
- Made his final start Sept. 30 at Los Angeles-AL, a no decision in the A's 8-7 win (4.0 ip, 4 h, 2 r, 2 er, 4 bb, 2 so).
- Ranks fourth on the Oakland career list in wins (102), games started (224), strikeouts (1098) and walks (566), fifth in innings pitched (1437.1), tied for sixth in losses (63) and seventh in winning percentage (.618).
- Announced his retirement Oct. 19.

Service Time: 171 days

- Spent the entire regular season at Triple-A Nashville where he batted .202 with three home runs and 25 RBI in 82 games...hit .181 over the first four months of the season before combining for a .277 batting average in August and September.

- Struck out a career-high 93 times.

- Began the season at Double-A Midland, made his Triple-A debut at Nashville in July and his Major League debut with Oakland in September.
- Went 4-for-31 (.129) with a home run and three RBI in 11 games with the A's...played his final game Sept. 24 and had surgery to repair a torn medial meniscus in his left knee Sept. 30.
- Opponents were successful in all five of their stolen base attempts off him and he committed four errors in 11 games.
- Was hitting .272 with six home runs and 29 RBI in 55 games with Midland when he was promoted to Nashville July 1...went on to bat .221 with three home runs and eight RBI in 33 games with the Sounds...hit a combined .251 with nine home runs and 37 RBI in a career-high 88 games.
- Hit .310 with runners in scoring position at Midland, .065 with Nashville.
- Combined with both clubs to appear in 71 games at catcher and one at first base...tossed out 16-of-66 (24.2%) attempted base stealers

1 BILLY BURNS

Service Time: 1 year, 20 days

- Batted .294 in 125 games in his rookie campaign...led the A's in batting, runs (70), hits (153), triples (9) and stolen bases (26).
- Led Major League rookies in stolen bases and multiple hit games (47)...topped American League rookies in hits, ranked second in runs and total bases (204), third in triples, sixth in RBI (42), seventh in walks (26) and tied for seventh in doubles (18) and extra base hits (32).
- His .294 batting average was second best in Oakland history by a rookie (Mitchell Page, .307 in 1977), his nine triples fell one short of Luis Polonia's rookie record of 10 in 1987 and his 47 multiple hit game were two short of the record of 49 set by Brent Gates in 1993 and matched by Terrence Long in 2000...his 153 hits and 26 stolen bases were sixth best in Oakland history by a rookie.
- Tied for third in the AL in stolen bases, ranked sixth in at bats per grounded into double play (104.0), tied for sixth in triples and ninth in stolen base percentage (76.5%) and batting average against left-handed pitchers (.315).
- His nine triples tied for the third best single season total in Oakland history and were the most since Eric Byrnes also had nine in 2003.
- Ranked eighth in the AL with a .326 home batting average...it was the eighth best home batting average in Oakland history and the best since Mark Kotsay hit .346 in 2004.
- Batted .296 as a center fielder, which ranked third in the AL and was the fourth best mark by a center fielder in Oakland history.
- Had 38 infield hits, which ranked second in the majors (Gordon, MIA 52) and were the most by an Athletic since Stats, Inc. began tracking infield hits in 1987.
- Hit .479 with four of his five home runs when putting the first pitch in play...his 56 first pitch hits were second most in the majors (Altuve, HOU 57) and were the most by an Athletic since Stats, Inc. began tracking pitches in 1988...ranked third in the AL in first pitch RBI (22).

16 BILLY BUTLER

Service Time: 8 years, 102 days (signed through 2017)

- Batted .251 with 15 home runs and 65 RBI in 151 games in his first season with the A's...the batting average was 20 points below his previous career low of .271 last year...his .323 on-base percentage matched his career low from last year and his .390 slugging percentage is second lowest to his .379 last year...the RBI were his fewest since 2008 (55).
- Hit .269 against right-handed pitching compared to .200 against left-handers...the mark against lefties was fourth lowest in the American League...entered the season with a .314 career average against lefties compared to .288 against righties.
- Batted .377 with three home runs and 12 RBI over his first 16 games and .317 with six home runs and 17 RBI over his final 35 contests...however, hit .207 with six home runs and 36 RBI in 100 games in between.
- Played 136 games at designated hitter, which ranked sixth in Oakland history and were the most since Dave Parker had 140 games in 1989...tied for third among AL designated hitters in games played but ranked seventh in RBI (61) and tied for eighth in home runs (14)...had the second lowest slugging percentage among the seven full-time DHs (.392)...has 674 games at DH over the last five years, which are the most in the majors (Ortiz, 611).
- Grounded into 26 double plays, which tied for second in the AL and in Oakland history.

20 MARK CANHA

Service Time: 1 year

- The Rule 5 selection batted .254 with 16 home runs and 70 RBI in 124 games with the A's.
- Led American League rookies and ranked fourth in the majors in RBI...his 70 RBI were eighth most in Oakland history by a rookie...also tied for second among AL rookies in doubles (22), ranked third in runs (61) and extra base hits (41), tied for third in home runs, fourth in hits (112), tied for fourth in total bases (188), fifth in walks (33) and tied for fifth in multiple hit games (28).
- Batted .271 with 13 of his 16 home runs against right-handed pitching compared to .221 against left-handers...slugged .486 against righties, .309 against lefties...hit .109 off lefties through July 2, .306 with all three of his home runs off southpaws after that.
- Had a .227 batting average, eight home runs and 35 RBI over his first 77 games through Aug. 7...then hit .289 with eight home runs and 35 RBI over his final 47 contests.
- Started 57 games at first base, 48 in left field and one in right field...did not have an assist in 61 games overall in the outfield, which were the fourth most games played in Athletics history by an outfielder with no assists...hit .297 as a first baseman, .217 as an outfielder.
- Went 0-for-11 with six strikeouts and a RBI as a pinch hitter.

4 COCO CRISP

Service Time: 12 years, 158 days
(signed through 2016 with a vesting option through 2017)

- Was limited to just 44 games due to two stints on the disabled list and batted a career-low .175...also had the lowest on-base percentage (.252) and slugging percentage (.222) of his career and his games played were his fewest since his rookie campaign of 2002 (32).
- Began the season on the 15-day disabled list after undergoing surgery on his right elbow and was reinstated May 6...went 2-for-45 (.044) in 13 games to start the season before going on the disabled list May 20 with a cervical strain...was reinstated Aug. 3 and hit .247 in 31 games following his return.
- Started just one of the A's final 32 games...went 7-for-23 (.304) in 15 games total over that stretch, including 6-for-12 (.500) as a pinch hitter.
- Was 6-for-15 (.400) with two walks and four RBI as a pinch hitter...tied for fourth in the American League in pinch hits...has a .387 (12-for-31) average as a pinch hitter with the Athletics, which is second best in Oakland history among pinch hitters with at least 30 plate appearances (McGwire, .393)...is 13-for-40 (.325) with 10 walks in the pinch in his career.
- Stole two bases to bring his career total to 299.
- Did not homer and has a career-high tying 66-game homerless streak.
- Was not hit by a pitch for the fourth consecutive season and his streak of 520 consecutive games without a hit by pitch is the longest active streak in the majors...it is the longest streak by an Athletic since at least 1914...has been hit by a pitch just five times in 6129 career plate appearances...in Major League history, the only player with more plate appearances and five or fewer hit by pitches is Sammy West, who was hit five times in 6972 plate appearances from 1927-42.

17 IKE DAVIS

Service Time: 5 years, 155 days (arbitration eligible)

- Batted .229 with three home runs and 20 RBI in 74 games in a season shortened by two stints on the disabled list...had career lows in home runs, RBI, runs scored (19) and on-base percentage (.301).
- Was batting .282 with two home runs and 11 RBI in 33 games when he placed on the 15-day disabled list May 17 retroactive to May 14 with a strained left quad...was reinstated June 19 and hit .180 with one home run and nine RBI in 40 games before going on the DL a second time Aug. 19...had surgery to repair a torn labrum in his left hip by Dr. Marc Philippon at the Steadman Clinic in Vail, Colo. on Aug. 28 and missed the remainder of the season.
- Made 60 of his 61 starts in games in which the opponent started a right-handed pitcher...hit .231 with all three of his home runs and all 20 of his RBI against righties...was 4-for-19 (.211) against lefties...162 of his last 163 starts have come against righties.
- Hit .267 at night, .169 during the day
- Also pitched twice (2.0 ip, 1 h, 1 bb, 1 so) to become the first A's position player to pitch twice in a season since Granny Hamner pitched in three games for the 1962 Kansas City A's.

23 SAM FULD

Service Time: 5 years, 140 days (arbitration eligible)

- Spent the entire season on the A's roster and hit .197 in a career-high 120 games...the batting average was fourth lowest in the American League and in Oakland history among players with 300 or more plate appearances.
- Made 65 of his 75 starts in games in which the opponent started a right-handed pitcher...hit .214 against right-handers and was just 5-for-47 (.106) against left-handers.
- Hit .305 over his first 17 games, .092 over a 33-game stretch from April 25 to June 6, .308 over a 16-game stretch from June 10 to 28 and .172 over his final 54 games.
- Hit .238 at night, .136 during the day.
- Started games at all three outfield positions (35 in center field, 31 in left field, nine in right field) and had a career-high 11 assists, which tied for seventh among AL outfielders...tied for fifth in double plays (3).
- Went 1-for-12 (.083) with a walk as a pinch hitter.

3 CRAIG GENTRY**Service Time:** 4 years, 152 days (arbitration eligible)

- Was on the A's Opening Day roster but got off to a slow start and ended up spending most of the season at Triple-A Nashville.
- Hit .120 with two triples and three RBI in 26 games over three stints with Oakland...batted .086 over his first 16 games before he was optioned to Nashville May 6...returned May 17 and went 0-for-3 in his only game before he returned to the Sounds May 25...joined Oakland at the conclusion of Nashville's season and went 3-for-12 (.250) over his final nine games.
- Did not homer for the second consecutive season and has a career-high 133-game homerless streak...has a 100-game homerless streak as an outfielder with Oakland, which is the longest drought by an A's outfielder since Willie Wilson had a 193-game streak from April 11, 1991-Oct. 4, 1992.
- Batted .256 with five home runs and 25 RBI in 101 games with Nashville...stole 25 bases, which tied for second in the A's farm system and tied for 10th in the Pacific Coast League.
- Hit .219 at home with the Sounds, .298 on the road...batted .177 with runners in scoring position.
- Appeared in 101 games, all in center field.

25 TYLER LADENDORF**Service Time:** 132 days

- Spent most of the season on the disabled list and combined to play in just 33 games between the A's and the minors.
- Was on the A's Opening Day roster and made his Major League debut, batting .235 with a triple and two RBI in nine games...went 2-for-10 (.200) with two RBI in four games before he was optioned to Nashville April 12.
- Hit .364 over his first six games with the Sounds before going on the disabled list April 21 with a sprained left ankle...underwent surgery and was added to the Oakland DL May 22...was reinstated from the DL Aug. 21 and optioned to Nashville...hit .265 with a home run and eight RBI in 20 games overall at Triple-A.
- Returned to Oakland Sept. 1 and went 2-for-7 (.286) over his final five games...did not play after Sept. 17 due to a left wrist injury.
- Appeared in three games in left field, two each at second base and center field and one each at third base and shortstop with the A's...in the minors, he played 12 games at shortstop, four in left field, three at third base, two at second base and one each in center field and right field.

15 BRETT LAWRIE**Service Time:** 4 years, 55 days (arbitration eligible)

- Stayed off the disabled list for the first time in five Major League seasons and responded by batting .260 with career highs in home runs (16) and RBI (60) in his first season with the A's...also had bests in games (149), at bats (562), hits (146), doubles (29), extra base hits (48) and strikeouts (144)...his .299 on-base percentage was a career low.
- Led the A's in doubles and strikeouts.
- Began the season as the A's third baseman and made 98 of his first 99 starts at third...after Danny Valencia reported to Oakland Aug. 5, he made 39 of his final 48 starts at second base.
- Hit .293 with seven home runs in 157 at bats against left-handed pitchers (22.43 at bats per home run) compared to .247 with nine home runs in 405 at bats against right-handers (45.00 at bats per home run).
- Batted .282 before the All-Star Break, .233 after the break.
- Ranked second in the American League with a career-high 24 errors...18 came as a third baseman, which tied for third in the AL...his .937 fielding percentage as a third baseman was the lowest in the majors and third lowest in Oakland history (Blowers, .927 in 1998; Gross, .932 in 1977).
- Walked just 28 times against 144 strikeouts and his average of 0.19 walks per strikeout was second lowest in the AL and in Oakland history (Tony Armas, 0.17 in 1981).
- Ranked seventh in the AL in infield hits (26) and tied for ninth in first pitch hits (31)...hit .437 when putting the first pitch in play.

50 MAX MUNCY**Service Time:** 106 days

- Batted .206 with three home runs and nine RBI in 45 games in his Major League debut.
- Had four stints with Oakland and saw his most playing time during his first stint from April 25-June 29 when he hit .203 with two home runs and six RBI in 34 games...played in just one game in each of his next two stints (July 28-Aug. 3 and Aug. 24-28)...returned to Oakland following the conclusion of Triple-A Nashville's season and went 3-for-19 (.158) in nine games.
- Had 21 hits, 12 of which were for extra bases (eight doubles, one triple, two home runs)...57.1% of his hits were for extra bases, which was the fourth highest percentage in Oakland history among players with at least 100 plate appearances.
- Had just two plate appearances against a left-handed pitcher and went 0-for-1 with a walk.
- Appeared in 23 games at first base and 16 at third base...with Nashville, he played in 32 games at third base and 26 at first base.
- Hit .274 with four home runs and 35 RBI in 60 games with the Sounds...batted .366 while playing first base, .310 with runners in scoring position and two outs and .301 at home.

19 JOSH PHEGLEY**Service Time:** 1 year, 114 days

- Spent the entire season with Oakland before his season ended in mid-September due to a concussion...hit .249 with nine home runs and 34 RBI in 73 games.
- Batted .305 over his first 32 games through June 26...then hit .208 over his final 41 contests.
- Started 40 of the A's 41 games against a left-handed starting pitcher before his injury...also made 22 starts against right-handers...hit .276 against lefties, .220 against righties.
- Appeared exclusively at catcher on defense where he made 62 starts...tossed out 17-of-45 (37.8%) attempted base stealers, which was the third best percentage in the American League among catchers with 60 or more games caught...using the same minimum, it was the best by an A's catcher since Mike Macfarlane tossed out 40.0% (24-of-60) in 79 games in 1999.
- Batted .344 with five of his nine home runs with runners on base compared to .178 with the bases empty...hit .306 with runners in scoring position, including .400 with RISP and two outs.
- Hit .218 against a pitcher the first time he saw him in a game, .276 the second time and .324 after that.

7 JASON PRIDIE**Service Time:** 1 year, 94 days

- Spent nearly the entire season at Triple-A Nashville before earning a September call-up to Oakland...was selected Sept. 1 and went 0-for-9 with a walk and four strikeouts in six games with the A's...has now seen action in the majors in seven of the last eight seasons but has appeared in just 133 games.
- Batted .310 with 20 home runs and 89 RBI in 127 games with Nashville...had minor league career highs in home runs, RBI and walks (55) and his batting average was his best since he hit .366 in 75 games in his first professional season in 2002.
- Ranked third in the Pacific Coast League in hits (148), fourth in runs (84), fifth in RBI and total bases (246), sixth in OPS (.894), tied for sixth in triples (7) and eighth in batting and slugging (.515).
- Led the A's farm system in RBI, ranked second in batting and home runs and fourth in stolen bases (20).
- Batted .310 against both lefties and righties...hit 17 of his 20 home runs against righties.
- Hit 16 of his 20 home runs on the road...13 came with runners on base.
- Was named to the PCL Midseason All-Star team.

22 JOSH REDDICK**Service Time:** 5 years, 50 days (arbitration eligible)

- Compiled his best numbers since his first season with the A's in 2012, batting .272 with 20 home runs and 77 RBI in 149 games.
- Had a career-high .333 on-base percentage and his batting average was his best as an Athletic...had the second best totals of his career in nearly every other offensive category including home runs and RBI.
- Led the A's in home runs, RBI, slugging (.449), total bases (236) and extra base hits (49).
- Struck out just 65 times and his average of 8.95 plate appearances per strikeout was seventh best in the American League.
- Hit .289 off right-handed pitching compared to .222 against left-handers...batted .120 with one extra base hit (triple) off southpaws through June 9...then hit .282 with nine extra base hits (five doubles and four home runs) off lefties from June 10 through the end of the season.
- Went 8-for-12 (.677) with 19 RBI with the bases loaded...ranked second in the AL in batting and slugging (1.083) with the bases loaded and fourth in RBI...matched the Oakland record for batting with the bases loaded (min. 10 PA), set by Josh Donaldson in 2013.
- Tied for sixth in the AL in RBI with two outs (41) and tied for eighth in RBI in the seventh inning or later (29).
- Hit .292 over his first 95 games through July 30 but batted .235 over his final 54 contests.
- Made 134 starts in right field, which were the most by an Athletic since Matt Stairs had 139 in 1999...committed five errors, which tied for the most among AL right fielders (Choo, TEX and Hunter, MIN).

10 MARCUS SEMIEN**Service Time:** 1 year, 118 days

- Batted .257 with 15 home runs and 45 RBI in a team-leading 155 games in his first full season in the majors.
- Started the season strong and finished strong but struggled in between...hit .314 with six home runs and 15 RBI over his first 40 games through May 18, .195 with two home runs and seven RBI over a 63-game stretch from May 19 to July 31, and .283 with seven home runs and 23 RBI over his final 52 contests...finished the season by reaching base safely in a career-high and A's season-high 23 consecutive games.
- Committed a Major League leading 35 errors to set an Oakland record for errors in a season...broke the previous mark of 34 set by Bert Campaneris in 1968...the errors were the most by an Athletic since Campaneris had 35 with the Kansas City A's in 1965 and they were the most by an A's shortstop since Dick Howser had 38 in 1961...they were the most by a Major League shortstop since Jose Valentin had 36 with Chicago (AL) in 2000...had a .947 fielding percentage, which was the lowest by an A's shortstop since Campaneris had a mark of .938 in 1965 and the lowest by an American League shortstop since Mike Caruso fielded .944 with Chicago in 1998...committed 28 errors in 89 games at shortstop before the All-Star Break but just seven in 63 games after the break.
- Batted .329 against left-handed pitching compared to .230 against right-handers...his average against lefties ranked seventh in the AL...has a .306 career average against lefties, .228 against righties.
- Tied for second among AL shortstops with 15 home runs (Correa, HOU 22)...tied for fourth in the AL with six home runs batting ninth.
- Had the second highest line drive percentage in the AL (29.6%).
- Stole 11 bases, six of which came against a left-handed pitcher, which tied for seventh in the AL.

5 JAKE SMOLINSKI**Service Time:** 1 year, 52 days

- Was on the Opening Day roster with Texas and hit .133 with a home run and six RBI in 35 games over three stints with the Rangers before he was claimed off waivers by Oakland June 21...batted .226 with five home runs and 20 RBI in 41 games over two stints with the A's...combined for a .193 batting average in 76 games overall.
- Had 32 hits, 15 of which were for extra bases (seven doubles, two triples, six home runs).
- Batting .262 against left-handed pitching compared to .122 against right-handers...hit four of his six home runs off lefties for a .476 slugging percentage...slugged just .256 against righties.
- Make 39 starts in left field and 11 in right field...has not committed an error in 87 career games in the outfield.
- Hit .422 with four home runs and 14 RBI in 12 games with Triple-A Round Rock and .349 with five home runs and 17 RBI in 25 games with Triple-A Nashville...combined for a .374 batting average, 14 doubles, nine home runs and 31 RBI in 37 games overall...slugged .687.
- Batted .462 with six home runs against left-handed pitching (.885 slugging percentage) compared to .316 with three home runs against right-handers (.557 slugging percentage).

28 ERIC SOGARD**Service Time:** 4 years, 64 days (arbitration eligible)

- Saw action with the A's for the sixth consecutive season and batted .247 in 120 games...is one of two Athletics to play in each of the last six seasons along with Coco Crisp...his 435 games played over that stretch are third most by an Athletic (Crisp 632, Reddick 528).
- Had career highs in RBI (37) and at bats (372) and matched his best in triples (3).
- Hit just one home run for the second consecutive season and has two home runs in his last 289 games...both of those home runs have come while playing shortstop...has not homered as a second baseman since July 21, 2013 at Los Angeles (AL) and his 217-game homerless streak as a second baseman is the longest by an Athletics second baseman since Irv Hall had a 289-game streak from Oct. 2, 1943 to June 23, 1946.
- Made 91 of his 102 starts against right-handed pitching...hit .255 against righties, .210 against lefties...has made 324 of his 349 career starts against right-handers.
- Started 72 of the A's first 108 games at second base, but just 15 of the final 54...also started 14 games at shortstop and one at third base.

26 DANNY VALENCIA**Service Time:** 4 years, 118 days (arbitration eligible)

- Began the season with Toronto and was batting .296 with seven home runs and 29 RBI in 58 games when he was claimed off waivers by Oakland Aug. 3...hit .284 with 11 home runs and 37 RBI in 47 games with the A's...combined for a .290 average, a career-high 18 home runs and 66 RBI in 105 games.
- His 37 RBI in 47 games with the A's are the most in Athletics history by a player with fewer than 60 games played...his 11 home runs match the most (Rico Carty, 41 games in 1978)...only three players in Oakland history had more RBI over their first 47 games with Oakland (Dye 47, Kingman 45, Payton 38).
- Hit 13 of his 18 home runs off right-handed pitching for a .556 slugging percentage...slugged .458 against lefties.
- Had six home runs in 50 games before the All-Star Break, 12 in 55 contests after the break.
- Made 45 of his 47 starts with the A's at third base (two at designated hitter)...made most of his starts with Toronto in left field (27)...overall, made 54 starts at third base, 27 in left field, two at designated hitter and one each in right field and at first base...also appeared in three games at second base.

21 STEPHEN VOGT**Service Time:** 2 years, 84 days

- Was named to his first American League All-Star team as he batted .308 with 13 home runs and 53 RBI over his first 70 games through June 25... then hit .214 with five home runs and 18 RBI over his final 66 contests... had a .261 average, 18 home runs and 71 RBI in 136 games overall.
- Led the A's with 56 walks and a .341 on-base percentage.
- Had a .277 batting average while catching, which led AL catchers and ranked fifth in the majors...ranked fourth among AL catchers in home runs (17) and RBI (61)...the home runs were fifth most in Oakland history by a catcher and the most since Ramon Hernandez had 21 in 2003.
- Started 89 games at catcher and 20 at first base...committed just three errors behind the plate and his .996 fielding percentage was third best in Oakland history by a catcher (Miller, .999 in 2004; Steinbach, .998 in 1994)...tossed out 15-of-58 (25.9%) attempted base stealers...made 34 of his first 35 starts at catcher but just 55 of his last 80.
- Tied for seventh in the AL in sacrifice flies (8) and ranked eighth in pitches per plate appearance (4.11).
- Was 3-for-12 (.250) with the bases loaded, but two of the hits were grand slams, which tied for second in the AL.
- Was 3-for-15 (.200) with six walks as a pinch hitter...tied for the AL lead in pinch walks.
- Batted .303 in the seventh inning or alter, which ranked 10th in the AL.
- Hit 17 of his 18 home runs off right-handed pitching...13 came on the road.
- Had a .316 average with runners in scoring position.
