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## ON THE COVER:

The 2018 Houston Astros Media Guide cover looks back on a magical 2017 season, which ended in an Astros World Series Championship. The Astros were champions on and off the field, as the cover features both the Commissioner's Trophy and the Allan H. Selig Award for Philanthropic Excellence, which is Major League Baseball's highest honor for the charitable efforts of its clubs.
Five-time All-Star Jose Altuve is also prominently featured on the cover as the 2017 American League Most Valuable Player. This marks his fourth straight year to be featured on the Astros Media Guide cover and his fifth overall (2013, 2015-18).
The 2017 World Series MVP, George Springer, is the second player featured on the cover as he pushed the club to its first title in franchise history. In the Fall Classic, Springer dazzled, hitting . 371 (11x29) with five home runs and seven RBI. This marks his first time on the Astros Media Guide cover.
Looking forward to 2018, the Astros marketing campaign features the mantra "Never Settle." It follows their very successful 2017 campaign "Earn It," which the Astros certainly did with their efforts on and off the field.

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## ASTROS TITLE 56 YEARS IN THE MAKING

MAGICAL POSTSEASON RUN FEATURED VICTORIES


No team has been woven into the fabric of Houston sports longer than the Astros, who were founded in 1962 as the expansion Colt .45s and grew up with a city on the rise. Through heartbreak and triumph, unforgettable highs and crushing lows, the Astros persevered.

So when second baseman Jose Altuve fielded a grounder off the bat of Corey Seager and calmly threw the ball across the Dodger Stadium diamond to teammate Yuli Gurriel at first base for the final out of the 113th World Series, it was a moment 56 seasons in the making.
"We all put it on the line for seven months, and now we get to celebrate," veteran catcher Brian McCann said.

The Astros completed their decades-long odyssey to a championship. The final out was recorded at 10:58 p.m. CT on Nov. 1, before 54,124 fans at Dodger Stadium. The Astros beat the Dodgers, 5-1, in Game 7 of the World Series, setting off a celebration that could be felt all the way to Houston.
"We were at the bottom," said pitcher Dallas Keuchel, who endured a 111-loss season in 2013 that was the low point of the team's rebuild. "Nobody wanted to come here. It was an open tryout, and now it's a destination for players to come. We've got MVPs wanting to come here, we've got Cy Youngs wanting to come here. We're on top of the world ... literally."

The Astros mobbed one another on the field in a scrum of orange in an ending fit for Hollywood. Back home in Houston, the moment generations of fans had waited years to see brought unprecedented outbursts of emotion.

The Astros are World Series champions.
"It's unbelievable," World Series Most Valuable Player George Springer said. "It's indescribable. When you get to [Spring Training], you know who you have, you see


what you have, and there's always the thought of 'We could do it,' but the 162 -plus games is a lot of games. And lot of things have to go right in order to get here."

A city that only a couple of months ago was devastated by Hurricane Harvey rallied around its baseball team and held on tight.
"You know what, Houston? We're a championship city," manager A.J. Hinch said. "This team loves playing in Houston, and we're going to love bringing this World Series trophy back to Houston.
"We take great pride in being there for Houston at that time. Obviously, they responded by falling in love with this team. Our September was incredible, October was even better. And November, we're pretty good."

The Astros, who slumped through August, acquired Justin Verlander at the end of the month and zoomed to the American League West title. They took down the mighty Red Sox in the AL Division Series and the mightier Yankees in the AL Championship Series before meeting another iconic franchise -- the Dodgers, who haven't won a World Series since 1988. Those teams featured the three highest payrolls in baseball in 2017.


In a Fall Classic full of heart-stopping moments, the Astros rallied to win Game 2 in dramatic fashion in Los Angeles and walked off to win an epic Game 5 in Houston, 13-12, in a game started by two Cy Young Award winners. The Dodgers' Game 6 victory set the stage for the biggest win in Astros franchise history in Game 7.
"They put a lot of fight in the whole series, and we need to tip our cap to the Dodgers," Hinch said. "That's going to go down as one of the more remarkable World Series of all time, and that takes two teams to do that. That team across the way equally could have been champions. We just outlasted them."

How this team reached the pinnacle of baseball is in itself a remarkable story.

When an ownership group led by Jim Crane hired a forward-thinking general manager in Jeff Luhnow late in 2011, the Astros traded veteran players and began stockpiling Draft picks and young talent. Altuve was already in the fold, as were Springer and Keuchel. They were soon joined by Marwin Gonzalez, Carlos Correa and Alex Bregman.

After three consecutive seasons of at least 100 losses, the Astros made a postseason run in 2015, but they fell short in 2016. With a young core in place, management added veterans Carlos Beltran, McCann and Josh Reddick a year ago. Verlander, who came over in a trade from the Tigers, was the final piece. A championship team was built. Astros legends were made.
"This team was special from the get-go, even before we got the guys we acquired from the Deadline," Reddick said. "We knew this was a team that could get us to the stage we wanted to be. We all realized that from Spring Training with the moves we made, trading for Brian, getting Carlos Beltran, getting Charlie Morton and trading for Verlander and [Francisco Liriano] and Cameron Maybin, everybody contributed. There's not really many guys you can point out and say, 'They're the reason we're here.' You look around this whole clubhouse, and everybody participated."

After the early days of Judge Hofheinz and the magical Astrodome, to the rainbow uniforms and the Killer B's, the Astros' rich history now includes a championship.



Four years removed from their third consecutive 100loss season, the Astros delivered Houston's third major sports title -- and the first in 22 years -- led by a relentless offense and a pitching staff with grit and heart.
"It won't hit us until we get home in front of our whole city and we celebrate and we bring the trophy home," Hinch said.

For lifelong Astros fans, a World Series title means so much more.

It was a win for Bob Aspromonte, Jimmy Wynn and Bob Watson. It was for Joe Niekro, Art Howe and Cesar Cedeno. It was for Shane Reynolds, Brad Ausmus and Larry Dierker. It was for Craig Biggio and Jeff Bagwell -both of whom were in attendance on Wednesday. And it was for the Astros who left too soon -- Ken Caminiti, Darryl Kile and Jose Lima.

It was for every Astros fan who endured the playoff heartbreaks of 1980 and 1986, who left the Astrodome in frustration in the late 1990s when their team couldn't get past the Braves and who cringed when Albert Pujols' homer off Brad Lidge won Game 5 of the 2005 National League Championship Series -- a series the Astros won two days later for their first World Series appearance.

The ups and downs, they all make sense now. The Astros are champions.



RUBEN AMARO SR.: Our game suffered a significant loss on March 31, 2017, with the passing of Ruben Amaro Sr. During his long, distinguished career as a Major League player, coach, executive and scout, Amaro became one of the most respected figures in baseball, both domestically and internationally. His accomplishments in baseball were considerable, but the grace, class and dignity with which he carried himself were what made him special and unique. The Astros were extremely fortunate to have Amaro as part of the organization during the latter years of his outstanding career. As part of his long, memorable career in baseball, Amaro served as a professional and international scout for the Astros from 201016. He was 81 on the date of his passing.


BOB BRUCE: As a member of the original Colt .45 s team, Bob Bruce will always have a special place in the history of the Astros organization, playing a significant role in several milestone moments. Bruce holds the distinction of starting the final game ever played at Colt Stadium in 1964, and the very first official game in the new Astrodome in 1965 . He was a popular player both on and off the field and helped solidify the Astros as a Major League franchise in the early years. Bruce passed away on March 14, 2017, at the age of 83.


JAMIE HILDRETH: Popular, longtime Astros executive Jamie Hildreth passed away in West Palm Beach, Florida, on Friday, Feb. 24, 2017, at the spry age of 72 . Hildreth, who most recently served as the Astros Senior Vice President of Broadcasting and Alumni Relations, joined the Astros in 1987 as Director of Broadcasting. In his three decades with the club, Jamie had success in several areas, including sales, sponsorship and broadcasting. His infectious, entertaining personality helped him develop lasting relationships with generations of Astros broadcasters, players, front office staff, sponsors, fans and media members. Although he had many talents, his ability to make those around him smile may have been his strongest attribute. Prior to joining the Astros, Jamie had a successful career in radio, which included stops at KRBE and KTRH in Houston and KTRM/KALO
in Beaumont, TX. In 2014, he was nominated for induction into the Texas Radio Hall of Fame. Also in 2014, Jamie received the Fred Hartman Award for long and meritorious service, given annually by the Houston Chapter of the Baseball Writers Association of America. He received a Bachelor of Science degree from the University of Houston, majoring in radio and television. Jamie is survived by his wife, Theresa, two sons, Jeff and Shane, and five grandchildren: Hayward, John, Alexandra, Audrey and James.


LEE MAY: Former Astros slugger Lee May passed away on Saturday, July 29, 2017, at the age of 74 . May played first base for the Astros for three seasons from 1972-74, posting his best season in 1972, when he was an All-Star and finished ninth in the MVP voting. Nicknamed the "Big Bopper", May hit 81 home runs in his three seasons with Houston before the club traded him to Baltimore in December of 1974. He finished his 18-year Major League career in 1982 with 354 career home runs.


CHARLEY TAYLOR: Longtime Astros minor league coach Charley Taylor passed on Feb 18, 2017, after a long battle with cancer. Taylor spent an amazing 38 seasons with the Astros, his first seven as a player from 1969-75. After his retirement, Taylor had a brief stint in the Reds front office before returning to the coaching ranks with the Astros in 1982. He went on to coach for 31 years in the Astros system (1975-2008, 2011-12), finishing his coaching career as a pitching coach for the Astros GCL team in 2012. In 2011, Taylor was named the Astros Player Development Man of the Year.


ANTHONY YOUNG: On June 27, 2017, former Astros pitcher Anthony Young passed away at the age of 51 in Houston. Young pitched six seasons (1991-96) in the Major Leagues, the final for his hometown Houston Astros in 1996. Upon his retirement from baseball, Young remained in the Houston area, teaching the game he loved to hundreds of children and teens for several years. Young was a Houstonian by birth and graduated from Furr High School before attending the University of Houston.

JIM CRANE
OWNER \& CHARMAN


On Nov. 17, 2011, Major League Baseball unanimously approved the purchase of the Houston Astros by a group headed by Houston businessman Jim Crane, marking the beginning of a new era of Astros baseball. On Nov. 1, 2017, nearly six years from the date Jim purchased the team, the Houston Astros won the first World Series Championship in franchise history.

As Owner and Chairman, Jim Crane hit the ground running upon taking control of the Astros in 2011 by immediately putting his plan to rebuild the franchise into action. As a highly successful businessman in Houston and former standout college pitcher, Jim's credentials made him the perfect choice to build a winning team both on and off the field in Houston.

From the start, Jim was clear about his goals: to make the Astros a ballclub that can have sustained success at the Major League level by building a top-notch farm system and to provide Astros fans with an outstanding experience at Minute Maid Park.

In just six years, Jim Crane took the Astros from worst to first in spectacular fashion. Houston's farm system, which was ranked as one of the worst in baseball in 2011, was ranked No. 1 by ESPN in 2014 and has remained one of the best year after year, despite regularly graduating top prospects. The Major League club went from a 111-loss season in 2013 to winning 101 games in the 2017 regular season, the second-most in franchise history, and ultimately its first World Series Championship. With a strong core of young talent returning to the Major League squad in 2018 and more reinforcements coming up from the minor leagues, the future remains bright for the Astros organization.

In order to make the experience at Minute Maid Park one of the best in baseball, the Astros made several largescale renovations to the ballpark under Jim's leadership. Renovations include the Diamond Club, main concourse, Honda Club Level, installation of a state-of-the art sound system, refurbishment of the player's clubhouse and workout facility, installation of new grass on the playing field and the debut of the new and improved center field area in 2017. The multi-million-dollar investment in center field was the most recent innovative update that showcases Jim's commitment to making Minute Maid Park a great destination for fans of all ages.

Jim recognized the need for a new Astros Spring Training facility and successfully moved the team to West Palm Beach in 2017, where players and fans now enjoy a brand new, state-of-the-art facility. He also successfully brokered the purchase of the Double A Corpus Christi Hooks in 2015 and was closely involved with the recent acquisition of a Class A Advanced affiliate in the Carolina League.

Under Jim's leadership, the Astros have supported several of MLB's diversity initiatives, including MLB's eighth annual Civil Rights Game and ancillary activities as well as MLB's Diversity Summit, a sports employment and business opportunity career and trade fair. Houston has twice hosted the Urban Invitational, a nationally-televised collegiate baseball tournament designed to give HBCUs and their baseball programs national exposure, as well as the Breakthrough Series, a collegiate and professional scouting showcase featuring a diverse group of some of the top high school players in the country.

## Passion for the Game

Jim hails from St. Louis, Mo. where he became a loyal, spirited fan of the St. Louis Cardinals. As a teenager, he caddied for members of the Cardinals team at local golf clubs and parked cars for patrons at Cardinals games. Jim was impressed by the Cardinals' caring, family atmosphere and the team's close ties with the local community. He has carried these values forward throughout his life in business, philanthropic and personal relationships.

As a young man, Jim put his innate passion for baseball into action at Central Missouri State University (now the University of Central Missouri), where he was a standout pitcher for the Mules from 1973-76 under the late, revered coach, Robert Tompkins. He had a four-year record of 21-8 with an earned-run average of 2.42, and ranks first in career complete games (23), first in career shutouts (7) and third in career strikeouts (215). Jim still holds the Mules' single-game strikeout record with 18 , and in 1997, was in-

ducted into the Central Missouri State University Athletic Hall of Fame.
Jim was the primary underwriter of a \$1.2 million renovation in 1998 of the old Mules Field on the University of Central Missouri campus. On Jan. 21, 1998, the facility was renamed the James R. Crane Stadium/ Robert N. Tompkins Field in honor of Jim and his beloved coach. Jim continues to contribute to the college annually to provide athletic scholarships for Mules baseball. In October 2015, Jim and the UCM Foundation announced plans to upgrade the university's baseball facility with a new synthetic turf playing surface in a continuing effort to make the Central Missouri baseball program one of the best in the country. On Jan. 29, 2017, Jim was enshrined in the Missouri Sports Hall of Fame for his outstanding pitching career at the University of Central Missouri, his generous donations to the UCM baseball program and his successful efforts in rebuilding the Houston Astros franchise.

Jim earned a Bachelor of Science degree in industrial safety from Central Missouri State University in 1976. This led to a loss-control job
 evaluating commercial risks for an insurance company and then a move to Houston in 1982, where he entered the freight forwarding business.

## Success in the Business World

In March of 1984, at the age of 30 and with $\$ 10,000$ borrowed from his sister, Jim founded Eagle USA Airfreight (EGL, Inc.). In his first office located in Houston with a sole employee, Jim handled the loading and trucking himself. The company made money in its first month, and Jim ultimately built it into an organization of more than 10,000 employees with 400 -plus facilities in 139 countries. EGL was named one of Houston's "Best Places to Work," and reached No. 599 on the Fortune 1000 list during Jim's tenure. Jim has been the recipient of a long list of awards and honors for his entrepreneurial activities and business successes. The company was acquired in an LBO transaction in August 2007.

In August of 2008, Crane formed Crane Worldwide Logistics (CWL), a premier global provider of customized transportation and logistics services. CWL continues to grow rapidly with experienced members of Crane's management team and sales force at the helm.

Jim's love of baseball is unabated, and he has added the game of golf to his athletic endeavors. He acquired the Floridian, a private golf resort in Palm City, Fla., in 2010.

## Giving Back

As Astros Owner and Chairman, Jim has embraced the opportunity to give back to the City of Houston and beyond. In the immediate aftermath of Hurricane Harvey, Jim and the Astros ownership group were among the first to pledge \$4 million to relief efforts. Jim also facilitated the shipment of more than 240,000 pounds of disaster relief supplies to Puerto Rico, where he was instrumental in transporting families of Astros and other MLB players, as well as hospitalized patients in critical condition, to safety.

One of his first initiatives was the creation of the Astros Community Leaders program, which won the prestigious Allan H. Selig Award for Philanthropic Excellence in 2017. Formerly known as the Commissioner's Award, this award is MLB's highest recognition of the charitable and philanthropic efforts of its clubs.

Jim is committed to providing local children the opportunities he feels baseball afforded him in his youth, and there-
 fore developed the concept for the Community Leaders program. A multi-million-dollar partnership was formed with the City of Houston's Parks and Recreation Department and included participation from several corporate partners, whose financial donations supported the field refurbishments, year-round maintenance, league programming and uniforms. Now, tens of thousands of young athletes receive free uniforms, equipment, tickets to Astros games and professional instruction through the Community Leaders program. The parents, coaches and league participants also benefit from different types of clinics through the Community Leaders program, attending clinics on coaching, groundskeeping, nutrition, education, and much more.
"Baseball was very important to my own development," Jim said. "Playing baseball made me a lot more confident and comfortable in my ability to achieve things. I'd like to be able to help more kids get the opportunities I had through baseball."

PRESIDENT OF BUSINESS OPERATIONS


Reid Ryan enters his sixth season with the 2017 World Champion Astros after being named the club's President of Business Operations on May 17, 2013. Reid, 46, brings enthusiasm and energy to the organization while also providing a wealth of experience working in professional baseball.

Reid's unique background and history with the Astros franchise made bringing the first World Series Championship to Texas all the more special, especially in the aftermath of Hurricane Harvey. He was on-hand to help friends and neighbors recover from the storm, with a hammer and nail when necessary, and has supported the efforts of the Astros Foundation, Astros players and personnel to get Houston back on its feet. He worked closely with Houston Mayor Sylvester Turner to bring the Astros back home after the storm and supported the decision to
 postpone a regular season game in order to visit displaced Houstonians at the George R. Brown Convention Center with several Astros players and coaches.

From day one, Reid has emphasized the importance of the fan experience and has made it a personal mission to openly engage with the Astros fan base. At nearly every home game, Reid can be found in the stands speaking with Astros fans. Within a few weeks of starting his new position, Reid used fan feedback to open the ballpark earlier in order to give fans access to Astros batting practice, which is now stadium policy. He was also instrumental in securing the Astros new Spring Training facility in West Palm Beach, Fla. and new High A affiliate in Fayetteville, N.C. Additionally, Reid has played a critical role in the major renovations to Minute Maid Park over the past three years, including the new center field area that debuted in 2017. Reid proudly supports the efforts of the Astros Foundation and the Community Leaders program, which won the 2017 Allan H. Selig Award for Philanthropic Excellence, Major League Baseball's highest community-focused honor. Whether he's in the ballpark on game days, at one of the Astros Community Leaders ballparks or finding new ways to make Minute Maid Park one of the top destinations in baseball, Reid takes pride in being an active member of the Houston community.

Before joining the Astros, Reid was the founder and CEO of both the Corpus Christi Hooks and the Round Rock Express minor league franchises, both of which are perennially lauded as two of the top franchises in minor league attendance, stadium satisfaction and franchise value. Shortly after coming on board in Houston, Reid helped to bring the Corpus Christi Hooks into the fold as an owned and operated affiliate of the Houston Astros. The Round Rock Express remains the Triple A affiliate of the Texas Rangers.

Reid's history with Texas baseball goes back decades. During the 1980s, Reid was a bat boy for the Astros while his father and Hall of Famer Nolan was an All-Star pitcher in the Astrodome. He later pitched at the University of Texas and TCU, playing a part in two Southwest Conference Titles (Texas '91, TCU '94). Reid went on to pitch in the minor leagues for two seasons (1994-95) in the Rangers system after being selected in the 17th round of the June 1994 Draft.

A long-time respected member of minor league baseball's leadership group, Reid has maintained his ownership interests in the Pacific Coast League's Round Rock Express. He currently serves as the Gulf Coast League (rookie ball class A) Board of Trustees representative and is a member of the finance committee for minor league baseball. Reid serves on the Major League Baseball International Committee and was instrumental in planning and reviving Major League Baseball's return to international exhibition play in Mexico City in 2016.

Reid is involved in several other business ventures including $R$ Bank, a Texas-based community bank
 chartered in Round Rock, Texas, for which he serves as a founding board member and organizer. Reid is an active member in the Houston chapter of the Young Presidents Organization, on the board of the Greater Houston Partnership and the Astros Foundation and is a board member for Spring Spirit Baseball. Ryan is also a member of Second Baptist Church Houston. His passions include spending time watching his kids play youth sports and spending time at the Ryan family ranch. He and his wife Nicole are the proud parents of one son, Jackson (18), and two daughters, Victoria (16)

Jeff Luhnow was named the 12th General Manager in Astros franchise history on Dec. 7, 2011. In just six seasons under Luhnow's direction, the Astros went from consecutive 100-loss campaigns to World Series Champions. True to his initial plan, the 2017 Esurance Executive of the Year has transformed the Astros into consistent contenders with a potent arsenal of homegrown young talent and proven players acquired in trades and free agent signings.

The Astros will return the majority of the 2017 World Champion squad, headlined by blockbuster trade-deadline acquisition Justin Verlander, AL MVP and Silver Slugger Jose Altuve and World Series MVP and Silver Slugger George Springer. Also returning are Luhnow's 2016 free agent signings OF Josh Reddick, C Brian McCann and RHP Charlie Morton, all of whom added invaluable veteran experience and leadership to a young clubhouse. Morton in particular played a key role in the Astros 2017 World Series, pitching 10.1 innings between a Game 4 start and a Game 7 close, allowing only five hits and two earned runs vs. the LA Dodgers. Cuban sensation Yuli Gurriel, who Luhnow signed to a five-year contract in 2016, led all Major League rookies in batting average and set franchise rookie records for doubles, total bases, extra-base hits and doubles in his first full season in the Majors. Luhnow's 2015 No. 2 overall draft pick Alex Bregman also turned in a stellar campaign, playing postseason hero by homering off of Chris Sale (twice), Kenley Jansen and Clayton Kershaw en route to the Astros 2017 World Series Championship. Marwin Gonzalez, Luhnow's first acquisition as Astros GM via the Rule 5 Draft, became the first player in MLB history to play at least 19 games at each of five different positions in 2017 and was one of the best offensive players in the American League, despite not having a regular position. He rejoins the team in 2018 along with Luhnow's first two draft picks, Carlos Correa and Lance McCullers Jr., both of whom turned in All-Star seasons in 2017 and will continue to mature in what will be their third full seasons in the Majors.

The Astros farm system remains one of the best in MLB and features several top prospects making their way through the minors at a rapid clip. MLB.com ranked the Astros minor league system at No. 5; Houston is the only organization in the top five to finish the 2017 season with a winning record. Top prospect and 2017 All-Star Futures Game starter Derek Fisher made his Major League debut in 2017, scoring the unforgettable, game-winning run in Game 5 of the World Series. MLB.com No. 10 prospect Kyle Tucker also participated in the All-Star Futures Game, finishing his 2017 campaign at Double A Corpus Christi along with top pitching prospects Forrest Whitley and Rogelio Armenteros. The Astros Class A Quad Cities River Bandits finished the 2017 campaign as Midwest League Champions after closing the season with the best overall record in the Midwest League Western Division.

Prior to joining the Astros, Luhnow spent eight years with the St. Louis Cardinals as Vice President. During much of his time with the Cardinals, he oversaw the scouting, international, and player development functions of the club that brought in many players instrumental to the 2011 World Series victory, the 2012 NLCS team and the 2013 World Series team. Of the 25 players on the Cardinals 2013 World Series roster, 16 were drafted while Luhnow oversaw player development and scouting.

Jeff founded Archetype Solutions, where he served as President and COO before joining the Cardinals organization. His background also includes stints as General Manager and Vice President of Marketing at Petstore.com, and five years with the global management consulting firm of McKinsey and Company.

Jeff is a graduate of the University of Pennsylvania with dual Bachelor of Science degrees in economics and engineering. He also earned his MBA from Kellogg Graduate School of Management at Northwestern University. Jeff is a U.S. citizen, but was born and spent more than 15 years in Mexico City, Mexico, and is fluent in Spanish.

He and his wife, Gina, reside in Houston. Jeff has three children, Elizabeth, Jeffrey and Henry.

NOLAN RYAN
ExECUTIVE ADVISOR


Nolan Ryan, one of the most decorated pitchers in Major League Baseball history, enters his fifth season with the Astros organization as the club's Executive Advisor. In his current role, Nolan serves as an advisor to Astros Owner and Chairman Jim Crane, General Manager Jeff Luhnow and his son, President of Business Operations Reid Ryan. Nolan brings over 45 seasons of baseball experience as a player and executive to the ballclub.

Throughout his storied career, Nolan has achieved success in baseball both on and off the field. As a pitcher, he was one of the best ever, tallying 324 career wins in his Major League record 27-year career while establishing all-time records in strikeouts $(5,714)$ and no-hitters with seven (also threw 12 one-hitters). A native of nearby Alvin, Texas, Nolan signed with the Astros prior to the 1980 season and would pitch for nine seasons (1980-88) in Houston, his most for any club. Prior to his arrival, the Astros had not made the postseason in their history. However, in his nine seasons, Houston made the playoffs three times (1980, 1981, 1986), falling just shy of the NL Pennant in both 1980 and 1986. On July 25, 1999, Ryan was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame in what was his first year of eligibility.

After retiring as a player following the 1993 season, Ryan worked in the Texas Rangers front office before returning to the Astros front office in February 2004. In his four years as Special Assistant to the General Manager, he assisted the baseball operations staff in a variety of areas on the Major and minor league levels. In his first two seasons back with Houston, the Astros enjoyed great success, falling one game shy of winning the NL Pennant in 2004 before capturing the pennant in 2005 to become the first team from Texas ever to play in a World Series.

Most recently, Nolan served as CEO and President of the Texas Rangers and was part of the team's ownership group. He oversaw baseball and business operations for the franchise and was a member of the Board of Directors. Under Nolan's leadership, the Rangers had the highest per-game attendance increase in the Majors from 2008 to 2009 and the third largest increase from 2009 to 2010. The club established single-season home attendance records in 2011 and 2012, surpassing the 3 million mark for the first time in franchise history in 2012. His influence on baseball operations helped the Rangers to three consecutive postseason appearances, including consecutive American League championships in 2010 and 2011.

Nolan compiled a career 324-292 record with a 3.19 ERA in 807 appearances in an unprecedented 27 seasons with the New York Mets (1966; 1968-71), California Angels (1972-79), Astros (1980-88), and Rangers (1989-93). The eight-time All-Star owned or shared 53 Major League records. He is fifth in lifetime innings (5387.0), tied for seventh in shutouts (61), and tied for 13th in victories while his 773 starts are second only to Cy Young (815).

In his nine seasons with the Astros, Nolan posted a 106-94 record with a 3.13 ERA in 1854.2 innings over his 282 starts. He holds the franchise records for career strikeouts in an Astros uniform $(1,866)$ and ERA in a single season $(1.69$ in 1981). He represented Houston in the All-Star Game twice $(1981,1985)$ and also clinched both of his NL pitching titles in an Astros uniform $(1981,1987)$. The club retired his number, 34 , in 1996.


Off the field, The Nolan Ryan Foundation built the Nolan Ryan Center for Continuing Education at Alvin Community College, a facility which opened in 1996. Through the years, the Nolan Ryan Foundation has served the Alvin community in many ways benefitting students, teachers and other community service organizations.

Nolan and his wife, Ruth, were married on June 26, 1967, and have three children: Robert Reid (11/21/71), Nolan Reese (1/21/76), and Wendy Lynn (3/22/77). Nolan and Ruth have seven grandchildren.

Nolan was born on Jan. 31, 1947, in Refugio, Texas. His family moved to Alvin when he was six weeks old, and he remained an Alvin resident until 2003, when the Ryans moved to Georgetown.



Mike Elias was named Assistant General Manager, Player Acquisition in August of 2017, a position in which he leads both the club's domestic and international scouting efforts. Now in his 12th season in Major League Baseball, Elias has been instrumental in assembling the Astros' roster and building its top-ranked farm system since he joined the club in January of 2012.

As the club's scouting director, Elias served as one of the major contributors to the accumulation of young talent that has occurred during General Manager Jeff Luhnow's tenure. His involvement and leadership in the organization's amateur draft efforts helped to rapidly elevate the Astros' talent pipeline to one of the best in baseball and furnished key pieces that contributed to the organization's 2017 World Series Championship.

In 2012, as Special Assistant to the GM - Scouting, Mike was a driving force behind the decision to select Carlos Correa with the first overall pick, and helped assemble a draft class that has produced nine Major League players thus far. Under Elias' direction, Astros drafts from 2013-2017 have already graduated an additional eight MLB players, including Alex Bregman, and yielded some of the current top prospects in baseball.

In August of 2016, Elias was promoted to Assistant General Manager and added oversight of player development and minor league operations to his responsibilities that year.

Mike, 35, began his career as a scout for the St. Louis Cardinals in 2007, and was promoted to Manager of Amateur Scouting in 2010. While with the Cardinals, he signed and scouted several Major League players and contributed to the development of a scouting department and draft process that supported one of baseball's top farm systems.

He is a graduate of Yale University, where he was a left-handed pitcher on the baseball team, earning four letters. He and his wife, Alexandra, reside in Houston with their daughter, Evelyn.


## BRANDON TAUBMAN

SR. DIRECTOR, BASEBALL OPERATIONS, RESEARCH + INNOVATION


Brandon Taubman joined the Astros in June 2013 and enters his first season as Senior Director of Baseball Operations and Analytics. In his current role, Brandon assists the General Manager in areas including player evaluation, contract valuation and negotiation, roster construction and economic modeling. His main responsibility outside of assisting the General Manager is to serve as a program manager to the Research and Development team, which entails helping to direct the day-to-day operation and the long-term vision of the team along with Director of Research and Development, Mike Fast. Brandon has been heavily involved in analytics initiatives affecting various areas of the Astros organization, including scouting and player development. Brandon also oversees the pro scouting analysis group, which is responsible for pro player personnel evaluations.

Brandon previously served as an analyst, Manager of Baseball Operations, and Director of Baseball Operations, before earning his recent promotion.

Prior to coming to Houston, Brandon worked for Ernst \& Young as a derivative valuation expert. He was also a member of the Ernst \& Young advisory team which consulted with the federal government during the 2008 subprime mortgage crisis. Following his time at E\&Y, he worked for Barclays Investment Bank in their Equity Derivatives group as an Analyst.

Brandon graduated with a degree in Applied Economics from Cornell University. He and his wife Leah reside in Houston.

## CRAIG BIGGIO

SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO THE GM


Hall of Famer and longtime Astros icon Craig Biggio is in his 11th season as a special assistant to the General Manager. In this role, Craig works in several areas, including with the baseball operations staff in its Major and minor league player development programs with special emphasis on instruction, the amateur draft and scouting, and Major and minor league talent evaluation. Additionally, Craig participates in the club's community development program.

On Jan. 6, 2015, Craig Biggio became the first player in Astros history to earn induction into the Baseball Hall of Fame after receiving 82.7 percent of the total votes from the Baseball Writers' Association of America.

The franchise career leader in hits, games played, runs scored, and at-bats, Craig retired at the end of the 2007 season following a stellar, 20-year career, all with the Astros. His No. 7 was retired by the ballclub on Aug. 17, 2008.

He finished his career with 3,060 hits, 668 doubles, 291 home runs, 1,175 runs batted in, and a .281 career average in 2,850 games played. He remains the franchise leader in several categories, including hits, doubles, games played and runs scored (1844).

A first-round selection by Houston in the June 1987 draft, Craig became the first Astro to reach the 3,000-hit plateau with a seventh-inning single against Colorado's Aaron Cook on June 28, 2007 at Minute Maid Park. His 3,060 hits rank 20th all-time, and his 668 career doubles are the most of any right-handed hitter in Major League history and rank fifth all-time.

Craig's 20 seasons with Houston are a franchise record, and he also made a club-best 19 consecutive Opening Day starts. He is also the only player in Major League history to reach all of the following milestones: 600 doubles (668), 250 home runs (291), 2,700 hits ( 3,060 ), and 400 stolen bases (414). Craig and Cal Ripken Jr. are the only middle infielders (only 13 players all-time) to collect 3,000 hits and 1,000 extra-base hits.

Craig was named to a franchise-record seven National League All-Star teams, received five Silver Slugger Awards, four Rawlings Gold Glove Awards and was a member of six Astros playoff teams. Craig holds National League records for leadoff home runs with 53 (ranks second all-time) and for hits in interleague play with 201. He also led all players during the 2005 postseason with 18 hits.

Additionally, Craig was the 2007 recipient of the Roberto Clemente Award, a prestigious honor bestowed upon one Major League player each season by Major League Baseball and the Clemente family recognizing community service. Craig has been actively involved with the Sunshine Kids throughout his career, a support organization for children with cancer and their families.

Craig and wife Patty reside in Houston and have two sons, Conor and Cavan, and one daughter, Quinn. In 2010, Craig coached his sons'St. Thomas High School baseball team to the Texas Class 5A state championship. Both Conor (graduate '15) and Cavan (drafted'16) played baseball for the University of Notre Dame; Quinn will play softball at Notre Dame when she matriculates in the fall of 2018.


ENOS CABELL
SPECILL ASSISTANT TO THE OW


Enos Cabell is in his 14th season as a special assistant to the General Manager after being named to the post on Nov. 17, 2004. He had been serving as a consultant since joining the Astros front office on July 29, 2004. Enos assists General Manager Jeff Luhnow and the Astros scouting department in evaluating the Astros Major and minor league players, along with other projects and assignments within the scouting area.

During his 15-year Major League playing career, Enos played for the Astros from 1975-80 and 1984-85 and is in the top 10 in franchise history in several categories. In 1978, he was named the team's MVP after setting club records in at-bats (660) and games (162) and tallying a then-record 195 hits, which ranked third in the National League. He currently ranks tied for eighth on the club's all-time list in stolen bases (191) and tied for sixth in career batting average (.281).

Enos stole more than 30 bases for four straight seasons (1976-1979) while with Houston. In 1,688 career big league games from 1972-86, he hit . 277 ( $1647 \times 5952$ ) with 60 home runs and 596 RBI. He started 149 games at third base for the 1980 National League West Champion Astros and played on two other division-winning clubs, the 1974 Baltimore Orioles and the 1985 Los Angeles Dodgers.

From 1991-94, Enos provided analysis on Home Sports Entertainment telecasts of Astros home games and from 1991-96, he hosted the weekly call-in show, Astros Report, on KCOH Radio. He was a member of the Texas Southern University's Board of Regents from 1995-2001 and served as interim athletic director for the school in 2000.

Enos is a graduate of L.A. Harbor Junior College in San Pedro, Calif., where he was an all-conference selection in baseball. He is a cousin of former Major Leaguers Dick Davis and Ken Landreaux. He and his wife, Ruby, make their home in Missouri City, Texas. Enos has three sons, Marcus, Stephen and Cordell.


## ROGER CLEMENS

## SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO THE GM



The 2018 season is Roger Clemens' sixth as a special assistant to the General Manager for the Astros. In his current role, Roger works with Astros pitchers on both the Major League and minor league levels, providing instruction and player evaluation. He will spend time in uniform during Spring Training in the Astros Major League and minor league camps.

The Rocket was one of the best pitchers in Major League history during an outstanding 24-year career, which included a record seven Cy Young Awards, two World Series Championships, 11 All-Star nods, and two pitching triple crowns. His 354 career wins rank ninth all-time while his 4,672 strikeouts are third all-time. He also hurled 46 shutouts and 118 complete games while posting a 3.12 ERA.

Roger came out of retirement to play for Houston, his adopted hometown, from 2004-2006. During his two and a half seasons with the Astros, he collected his seventh Cy Young Award, won the 2005 NL ERA title, and helped take the Astros to their first-ever World Series. In 2004, at the age of 42, Roger became the oldest pitcher in MLB history to win the Cy Young Award, the seventh of his career, after posting an 18-4 record with a 2.98 ERA.

His 2005 season was one of the best of his 24 -season career; he posted a 1.87 ERA, the lowest in the Major Leagues that year as well as of his entire career, and was named to the 2005 NL All-Star team. On Oct. 9 of that year, Roger made his first relief appearance since 1984, entering as a pinch-hitter in the 15th inning of Game 4 of the NLDS versus the Atlanta Braves. That final game of the series was the longest postseason game in MLB history, going 18 innings, and Roger closed it out with three scoreless innings to help move the Astros to the NL Championship Series.

Clemens' career spanned four teams in four cities, including AL rivals the New York Yankees and the Boston Red Sox. In his third season with the Red Sox (1986), The Rocket was named AL MVP and All-Star MVP, and earned his first Cy Young Award with a 24-4 record while leading the Red Sox to the AL Pennant. In the two years he spent with the Toronto Blue Jays (1996-97), he won two pitching triple crowns (most wins, lowest ERA, and most strikeouts) as well as two more Cy Young Awards. Roger spent the following four years with the Yankees, and in 1999 and 2000, helped them to two World Series Championships. In 2003, Roger clinched his 300th win and his 4,000th strikeout in the same game vs. the St. Louis Cardinals. In 1999, he was named to the Major League Baseball All-Century team after collecting over 600,000 of the fan votes, and was one of only four players active at the time.

Roger and his wife, Debra, live in Houston and have four sons: Koby, Kory, Kacy, and Kody.


## KEVIN GOLDSTEIN

SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO THE GM, PLAYER PERSONNEL


Kevin Goldstein joined the Astros on Aug. 31, 2012, and was named Special Assistant to the General Manager, Player Personnel in August 2017. In his new role, Goldstein will be part of the Baseball Operations leadership group and will advise and assist with all player-related matters, including evaluation of internal and external talent.

Goldstein previously served as the Director of Pro Scouting. In that role, he consulted with the General Manager on trades, free agent signings and other baseball transactions while overseeing the Astros pro scouting efforts.

Prior to joining the Astros, Kevin developed a reputation as one of the top specialists in scouting and player development for several years as a national writer for Baseball Prospectus and ESPN.

He was named Special Assistant to the GM, Process Improvement in 2015. In this role, Sig supports the development, implementation and monitoring of the improvement initiatives throughout the organization. In 2017, Sig joined the NYPL affiliate as a uniformed Development Coach working with the players and other coaches to take advantage of the latest technologies and data.

The Fishel Award goes to the "active, non-uniformed representative of Major League Baseball whose ethics, character, dedication, service, professionalism and humanitarianism best represent the standards propounded by Robert O. Fishel."

Gene plays a major role in all baseball and business communications for the Astros and supports initiatives throughout the organization. Gene and his staff have guided the Astros through two of the last three Postseasons, including Houston's first World Series Championship in franchise history last season. In 2017, the Astros also received the Allan H. Selig Award for Philanthropic Excellence in recognition of the Houston Astros Community Leaders program. Additionally, Gene and his staff oversaw the recent Hall of Fame inductions of Craig Biggio (2015) and Jeff Bagwell (2017), who were the first two Astros ever to reach Cooperstown. The Astros' PR team assembled far-reaching media campaigns for each player.

From 1989 to 2008, Gene worked for the Phillies, first as an intern in the ticket sales office before joining the Media Relations staff full-time. After serving as Media Relations Manager, he was promoted to Director of Community Relations in 2000 where he was instrumental in creating a number of community-based programs and events, many of which are still in place today. Gene also helped to grow the club's footprint in the community through increased media coverage and by increasing the dollars raised for the club's charity. He was also successful in increasing the player's community involvement and was a member of the Phillies Charities, Inc. Board of Directors. In 2003, the Phillies received the prestigious Philadelphia Sports Congress Community Service Award for the first time. Prior to joining the Phillies, Gene worked as a sports editor for Associated Newspapers in Stoughton, Mass.

Throughout his career in baseball, Gene has worked with Major League Baseball, assisting with the media relations duties at several World Series, League Championship Series and All-Star Games. Gene is also currently a board member for the Houston Chapter of the NAACP and volunteers his time to assist with the charitable efforts of the Astros Foundation.

Gene received his Bachelor of Arts degree in journalism from the University of Massachusetts where he was a member of the varsity baseball team. He and his wife Kandee live in Kingwood, Texas, with their two children, son Maxwell (17) and daughter Sydney (12).



Michael Dillon joined the Astros organization in June of 2012 and now enters his sixth full season with the ballclub. In his role as Vice President of Strategy and Analytics, Mike utilizes research and data analytics to develop a deeper understanding of the Astros fan base in order to provide a meaningful fan experience both inside and outside of the ballpark. Mike also works with the Astros Ticketing, Premium Sponsorship, Business Operations and Community Relations departments to optimize revenue and coordinate organization-wide efforts.

Prior to joining the Astros, Mike was a management consultant at Bain \& Co., where he worked on a variety of projects in diverse industries, including consumer packaged goods, financial services and technology.

Marian also assists with the team's community relations efforts, which includes organizing the Astros wives programs as well as utilizing her extensive knowledge of local non-profit organizations and her dedication to the Houston community. BILL BROWN

## COMMUNTTY OUTREACH EXECUTIVE

The 2018 season marks Bill Brown's 32nd with the Houston Astros organization, and his second as a community outreach executive. Brown called his final games as the Astros primary TV play-by-play broadcaster in 2016 after 30 seasons in the booth.

At 18 years of age, Brown landed his first broadcasting job at KDRO Radio in Sedalia, Missouri doing news and play-by-play for local high school sporting events. He later graduated from the University of Missouri in 1969. While in the service, Brown became a U.S. Army broadcast specialist working as a sportscaster for the Armed Forces Vietnam Network in Saigon in 1970-71. After leaving the service in 1971, Brown earned a job at WLWT-TV in Cincinnati. In 1976, Brown earned his first full-time Major League broadcasting job as the television play-by-play announcer for the defending World Champion Cincinnati Reds, where he would remain until 1982.

On February 6, 1987, the Astros announced the hiring of the then 39-year-old Brown. Over the course of his illustrious career, Brown called several important moments in Astros history, including seven postseason appearances and the National League Pennant-winning season in 2005. Brown also called Jeff Bagwell's 400th career home run in 2003, the 2,000th career hits for Bagwell, Miguel Tejada and Carlos Lee and Craig Biggio's historic 3,000th hit in 2007.

As a veteran MLB broadcaster, Brown has been honored several times over the course of his career. The National Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association honored him with its Sportscaster of the Year Award in Texas for 2013, and he received the award in June of 2014 at a ceremony in Salisbury, N.C. Brown was presented with the Fred Hartman Award for Long and Meritorious Service at the 2012 Houston Baseball Dinner and was inducted into the Houston Media Wall of Honor in September 2011. He was honored by the Astros with a pregame ceremony in June of 2011, recognizing his 25 seasons with the club, and again in 2016 for his 30th anniversary. Brown was honored by the Texas Italian-American Sports Foundation, receiving an award for "outstanding accomplishments as a television broadcaster for the Houston Astros and community service". He was inducted into the Texas Baseball Hall of Fame on Nov. 12, 2004. Brown was also recently inducted into Smith-Cotton High School's athletic Hall of Fame in Sedalia, MO.

Brown is a member of the Advisory Board at Houston Sight into Sound and has been a volunteer reader for 24 years. He and his wife Dianne have been involved with "Salute to Our Heroes," a fundraiser for scholarships for the Cy-Fair Educational Foundation, for 10 years. Brown also sits on the Board of Trustees for the Cy-Fair Educational Foundation.

Brown has authored and co-written several books. My Baseball Journey, A Sportscaster's Story, co-authored by Tim Gregg, documents Brown's career and personal influences (2012). Houston Astros: Deep in the Heart, coauthored by Mike Acosta, gives a pictorial history of the Houston Astros organization from inception to its 50th anniversary (2013). Breathing Orange Fire, Brown's first self-published book, documents the Astros 2016 season and two-time batting champion, Jose Altuve. Brown's latest book, Houston's Team, Houston's Title: 2017 World Champion Astros, tells the story of the Astros first World Championship title and the historic season that brought them there.

Brown and Dianne reside in Houston. They have one daughter, Allison, and three grandchildren: Luke, Emma Kate and Caitlynn.


JOSE CRUZ

## COMMUNTY OUTREACH EXECUTIVE

The 2018 season is Jose Cruz' 35th with the Houston Astros, having spent five years as a special assistant to the general manager and the previous 13 seasons (1997-2009) as a coach for the Major League club. In his fifth year as a community outreach executive, Jose makes public appearances on behalf of the team and acts as an ambassador for the organization.

As an outfielder, the two-time All-Star had an 18-year Major League career, playing for the Cardinals (1970-74), Astros (1975-87) and Yankees (1988). Nicknamed "Cheo", Jose is an Astros icon and held franchise records in games, at-bats, hits, total bases and triples at the time of his retirement after the 1988 season. His 80 career triples remain the franchise record.

Jose holds the distinction of being involved with all nine of the Astros postseason appearances, three as a player ( 1980, ' 81 and ' 86 ) and six as a coach (1997-99, '01, '04-05). He was the Astros Team MVP four times and hit . 300 six times in his career while stealing 317 bases.

Jose's uniform No. 25 was retired by the Astros on Oct. 3, 1992, along with former teammate Mike Scott's No. 33. They were the third and fourth numbers retired by the team. In 1999, Jose was selected by a panel of experts as one of the three outfielders on the franchise's All-Astrodome team. In 2003, he was inducted into the Texas Baseball hall of Fame.

Jose and his wife, Zoraida, make their home in Houston and have four children: Jose Javier, Jose Cheito, Shakira and Jose Enrique. His son, Jose Jr., was the first-round selection (third player overall) of the Seattle Mariners in the 1995 June free agent draft. Jose Jr. graduated from Bellaire (TX) High School and attended Rice University. He led Bellaire to the number one national ranking by USA Today and was a finalist for the Golden Spikes Award while at Rice.


JIMMY WYNN

## comvunity Outreach exedutive

Jimmy Wynn spent the first 11 seasons of his 15-year Major League career with the Houston franchise from 1963-73, the first two as a member of the Colt. 45 's. In his current role as a community outreach executive, Jimmy is an active member of the Houston community, working closely with the Astros Community Relations department and the Astros Foundation.

On June 24, 2011, the Astros and Minute Maid officially dedicated the Jimmy Wynn Training Center, a new, state-of-the art baseball facility located at the Astros Youth Academy in North Houston. The \$500,000 indoor facility measures 4,431 square feet and includes batting cages, pitching mounds, locker rooms and showers. The facility, which was funded by Minute Maid's Grand Slam For Youth Baseball program and the Astros Foundation, is available for youngsters of all ages at no cost to their families.

As a player, despite his small frame ( $5^{\prime \prime} 9^{\prime \prime}$ ), Jimmy boasted enormous power and a strong throwing arm, earning him the nickname "The Toy Cannon." He ranks among the top 10 in almost every significant Astros career hitting category and led the franchise in hits $(1,291)$, home runs $(223)$, and $\mathrm{RBI}(719)$ when he left the club after the 1973 season.

In 1967, the slugging center fielder finished second in the National League in home runs (37) while posting 107 RBI. He also became the first Astro to hit three home runs in a game. As a member of the 1974 Dodgers, Jimmy smashed 32 home runs with 108 RBI, finishing in fifth place for the National League Most Valuable Player Award. He also homered for LA in the 1974 World Series vs. Oakland. Jimmy was a two-time All-Star, making the NL squad in both 1967 and 1974.

Jimmy's No. 24 was officially retired by the Astros on June 25, 2005. He and his wife, Marie, reside in Rosharon, Texas.

Major League coaching career
Manager, Arizona Diamondbacks (2009-10); Manager, Houston Astros (2015-present)

AJ Hinch was named the 18th manager in Astros franchise history on Sept. 29, 2014.

In just three years on the job with Houston, Hinch has already proven himself as one of the best managers in Major League Baseball and one of the most successful managers in franchise history. Since his hire, Hinch has produced a World Series Championship and two playoff appearances, with the first (2015) following a nine-year postseason drought for the franchise.

His 2017 Houston Astros were dynamic and historic on and off the field. He managed the club through the wake of Hurricane Harvey and secured the city's first major sports championship in over 20 years (since the Houston Rockets won the NBA Championship in 1995).


The 2017 Astros won 101 games, the second-highest total in franchise history, before embarking on an 18game trek to the World Series title. The club dispatched the Red Sox, Yankees and Dodgers on that journey, and won two Game 7's, in the ALCS vs. New York and in the World Series at Los Angeles.

For his efforts in 2017, Hinch was named the Baseball America Manager of the Year and won the 2017 Esurance MLB Award as Major League Baseball's Best Manager. He also finished third in the voting for the BBWAA AL Manager of the Year Award, his second time to be a finalist for that honor (also, 2015). Additionally, Hinch was named the Manager of the Year by the Boston Chapter of the BBWAA and earned the American Baseball Coaches Association Honor Award, which is presented each year to individuals involved in baseball who have distinguished themselves and are recognized for achievements in their profession.

In his three years, Hinch has amassed a 271-215 overall record and .557 winning percentage, which is the highest in franchise history. His 14 postseason wins are also the most in franchise history, one win more than Phil Garner's 13.

Hinch now has three winning seasons under his belt, including an 84-78 record in 2016 and an 86-76 record in 2015. The 2016 club missed the playoffs but were in postseason contention going into the final weekend of the regular season. In 2015, Hinch guided the Astros to their first playoff appearance in nine years (last, 2005), which

included a 16-win improvement over the 2014 Astros (70-92). In recognition for his efforts in 2015, Hinch was named a finalist for the BBWAA American League Manager of the Year, finishing second, and was a 2015 All-Star, as Royals Manager Ned Yost named Hinch as a coach for the AL All-Star Team. By earning this honor, Hinch became the first Astros manager selected to an All-Star Game since Jimy Williams in 2004.

Hinch has a diverse background in the game, having more than 20 years of playing, managing and front office experience in Major League Baseball.

This is his second managerial position, having served as Arizona's manager for parts of two seasons from 200910. At the time of his appointment, Hinch was 34 years old, by far the youngest manager in the Major Leagues. While his hiring by Arizona was considered unconventional at the time, Hinch's hire paved the way for many other first-time managers to get their shots at skippering for the first time at the Major League level, including current managers Aaron Boone (NYY), Craig Counsell (MIL), Mike Matheny (STL) and Scott Servais (SEA).

Nine years later, at 43 years old and manager of the Houston Astros, Hinch ranks as the sixth-youngest manager in the Major Leagues, behind Kevin Cash (TB) and Andy Green (SD), who are both 40, and Alex Cora (BOS), Gabe Kapler (PHI) and Mickey Callaway (NYM), who are all 42.

Between his managerial posts, Hinch worked with the San Diego Padres, where he most recently served as the club's Vice President and Assistant General Manager for three years (2011-14). In that role, Hinch oversaw all aspects of the club's professional scouting and medical departments, while assisting with the club's roster composition, player acquisitions, talent evaluations and contract negotiations.

Prior to joining a front office, Hinch played parts of seven Major League seasons with Oakland (1998-2000), Kansas City (2001-02), Detroit (2003) and Philadelphia (2004-05). A former catcher, Hinch played in 350 career Major League games after a wildly successful collegiate career at Stanford.

At Stanford, Hinch established himself as one of the best catchers in school history. A three-time All-American and All-Pac10 team selection, Hinch earned Pac10 Player of the Year honors twice. In 1996, Hinch led the Cardinal to the College World Series and was a finalist for the Golden Spikes Award, given annually to the best collegiate player in the country. Hinch still ranks among the top 10 all-time in eight statistical categories for Stanford, including hits ( 305 , fourth), triples ( 15 , fifth), doubles ( 58 , sixth), runs ( 219 , sixth), batting average (.351, seventh), RBI ( 191 , seventh), at-bats ( 868, ninth) and games played (229, 10th). He led the Cardinal in hitting three times in four years, including an impressive . 381 mark in 1996.

For his achievements on the field and his contributions to the school, Hinch was inducted into the Stanford University Athletics Hall of Fame on Oct. 11, 2014. During his time in Palo Alto, Hinch earned his Bachelor of Science in psychology in 1996 and was a member of the 1996 bronze medal-winning U.S. Olympic Baseball Team.

He was drafted three times as an amateur, in the second round of the 1992 draft out of high school by Chicago (AL), in the third round of the 1995 draft by Minnesota and in the third round of the 1996 draft by Oakland, before signing with the Athletics after his senior season at Stanford.

Hinch, who retired as a player after the 2005 season, joined Arizona's front office one month after retirement and was eventually named the team's Director of Player Development. He held that role until being named the Diamondbacks manager in 2009.

Hinch was raised in Midwest City, Okla., and now makes his residence in The Woodlands, Texas, with his wife Erin and his daughters Haley and Kaitlin.

## Major League coaching career

Third Base Coach, Miami Marlins (2010-13); Third Base Coach, New York Yankees (2015-17); Bench Coach, Houston Astros (2018-present)

Joe Espada was named the Astros bench coach on Nov. 6, 2017.
Espada joins the Astros after four years with the Yankees organization, serving the last three as the Yankees third base coach. The Yankees made the postseason in two of Espada's three seasons on the field, and were eliminated in both years by the Astros, in the 2015 Wild Card Game and in the 2017 American League Championship Series. In 2014, Espada served as a professional scout for the Yankees.

Prior to joining the Yankees, Espada had an eight-year run with the Marlins (2006-13), topping out as their third base coach for four seasons from 2010-13. He also served as the Marlins minor league infield coordinator (2008-09) and as a hitting coach for Class A Jupiter (2007) and Class A Greensboro (2006).

His coaching career followed a 10-year playing career (1996-2005), which started with Oakland as a second round pick in the 1996 draft. He would appear in 644 career minor league games, while splitting time with the Oakland (1996-2000), Florida (2001), Colorado (2001), Kansas City (2002), St. Louis (2003), Texas (2003) and Tampa Bay (2004) organizations. He also played two years (2004-05) of Independent League ball with Pensacola.

A native of Santurce, Espada has been active in Puerto Rican baseball in his career. He's twice served as the third base coach for runner-up Team Puerto Rico in the 2017 and 2013 World Baseball Classic. He also has experience managing in the Puerto Rican Winter League, as he led the Gigantes de Carolina in the 2014-15 offseason, and the Atenienses de Manatí in the 2012-13 offseason.

Espada is married to Dr. Pamela Espada and the couple has two daughters, Eliana Marie and Viviana Elena. He attended the University of Mobile (Ala.), where he still ranks among the offensive leaders in several categories, owning the school's top two single-season batting averages (. 468 in 1995 and .446 in 1996) and top career batting average (.442).

Hitting Coach, Oakland Athletics (1999, 2003-05); Hitting Coach, New York Mets (2011-14); Hitting Coach, Houston Astros (2015-present)

Dave Hudgens was named the Astros hitting coach on Oct. 17, 2014. In his three years in that position, Hudgens has coached one of the youngest position player groups in the Majors, while also overseeing the improvements of key holdovers and veterans.

Under his tutelage, the Astros had one of the most prolific offenses in franchise history in 2017, as the club led the Majors in runs (896), hits (1581), doubles (346), batting average (.282), on-base percentage (.346), slugging (.478) and OPS (.823) while striking out fewer than any other club (1087). By doing so, the Astros became the seventh team in Major League history to post the highest slugging percentage and the fewest strikeouts in a single season, with only two teams doing so since 1911: the 1948 Yankees and the 1995 Indians (Elias).

Perhaps the biggest beneficiary of Hudgens has been 2017 World Series MVP George Springer. In his three years under Hudgens, Springer has lowered his strikeout percentage each season from $24.2 \%$ in 2015, to $23.9 \%$ in 2016 to $17.6 \%$ in 2017. He did this without sacrificing his power, as his home run totals have increased each year as well, going from 16 to 29 to 34 .

Astros All-Star second baseman Jose Altuve has also seen his power numbers spike, as he went from seven home runs in 2014, to 15 in 2015, to 24 in 2016 and 2017. Altuve also won the batting title in 2016 and in 2017, hitting .338 and .345 over the last two seasons.

Hudgens is in his fourth stint as a Major League hitting coach, which included a four-season (2011-14) run with the New York Mets (2011-14). His other two stints came with Oakland for the 1999 season and then again with the A's from 2003-05. Hudgens and Astros manager A.J. Hinch crossed paths in Oakland in 1999 as Hudgens coached Hinch in what was his second Major League season.

Hudgens' coaching career dates back to 1985, when he managed Rookie Level Pocatello in the Pioneer League at the age of 28 . He would manage four years (1985-88) in the Oakland organization before joining Houston as a roving hitting instructor in the Astros system for seven seasons (1989-95).

Hudgens returned to Oakland in 1996 and spent the next 10 years (1996-2005) serving as Oakland's assistant director of player development (1996-98, 2000-02) or Major League hitting coach (1999, 2003-05), spending two stints in each position. After his successful 10-year run with Oakland, Hudgens joined the Cleveland organization and served as the Indians field coordinator for five years (2006-10).

Hudgens has also managed parts of six seasons (2009-14) in the Venezuelan Winter League, all with Caracas, guiding them to playoff appearances in five seasons, including winning a VWL Championship in the 2009-10 season.

His coaching days followed a six-year playing career (1979-84) with the Oakland and Cleveland organizations, which included a stint in the Major Leagues with Oakland in 1983.

Hudgens makes his home in Houston, Texas, and has four children: Jordan, Heather, Tressa and Rock.

## MAJOR LEAGUE COACHING CAREER

Pitching Coach, Houston Astros (1996); Pitching Coach, Kansas City Royals (2000-01); Pitching Coach, Houston Astros (2014-present)

Brent Strom was named to his current position with the Astros on Oct. 22, 2013, for what is his third Major League stint as a pitching coach. He was originally the Astros pitching coach in 1996, and then later joined the Royals Major League staff as pitching coach for two seasons (2000-01).

In 2017, Strom led the Astros pitching staff as they finished third in the AL in starters ERA (4.03) and fifth in team ERA (4.12). The group also set a franchise record for strikeouts for the second consecutive season, posting 1,593 in 2017, following a 1,396 total in 2016. Over the last few years, Strom has led the Astros staff to impressive heights, as the 2016 bullpen led the AL in strikeouts and the 2015 squad led the AL in ERA.

Prior to rejoining the Astros, Strom spent six seasons (2008-13) with the Cardinals organization, serving as their minor league pitching coordinator (2012-13) and as a minor league pitching instructor (2008-11).

Strom first joined Houston's organization in 1989, serving as a minor league pitching instructor for seven seasons (1989-95) before being elevated to Major League pitching coach in 1996. Prior to originally joining Houston, he spent time as a minor league coach with the Los Angeles Dodgers (1981-86) and as a pitching coordinator with the San Diego (1997) and Montreal/Washington organizations (1998-99, 2002-06).

His coaching career followed a professional pitching career that spanned from 1970-81, which included parts of five Major League seasons with New York-NL (1972), Cleveland (1973) and San Diego (1975-77). He also pitched two minor league seasons in the Astros system (1979-80). Strom holds the distinction of being just the second person to have Tommy John surgery (performed in 1978).

Prior to playing professionally, Strom attended USC, where he helped lead the Trojans baseball team to two NCAA championships. In 1970, he was a First Team All-American in his final season at USC. His professional career began after he was drafted third overall in the secondary phase of the 1970 draft by the New York Mets.

Strom is a member of the International Sports Group (ISG), a non-profit organization founded to grow the game of baseball across the globe, and has been participating in ISG clinics overseas for over 16 years.

Brent and his wife, Carrie, reside in Tucson, Ariz. Carrie was crowned Mrs. America in 1979, representing New Jersey. The couple adds a dog to the family with every trip to the postseason, and now has four dogs, two English bulldogs (Macie Mae and Bebe) and two French bulldogs (Angus and Virgil).

## major league coaching career

Major League Coach, Houston Astros (2017); First Base Coach, Houston Astros (2018-present)

Alex Cintrón was named the Astros first base coach on Nov. 13, 2017.
Cintrón spent the 2017 season as the Astros Spanish translator, advance scout and assistant coach. In his role, he assisted the Astros Spanish-speaking players with all matters, while working with the club's advance information department and assisting the Major League coaching staff. Cintrón spent much of the 2017 season on the bench as an active coach, first for a three-game stint in July and later in September once rosters expanded.

Cintrón had a professional career that lasted 16 years, from 1997-2012, which included parts of nine Major League seasons. He was originally a 36th-round pick by Arizona in 1997 and would make his debut with the Diamondbacks in 2001. He played parts of five seasons with the D-backs (2001-05), before finishing his career in Chicago-AL (2006-07), Baltimore (2008) and Washington (2009). He's a career . 275 Major League hitter, including a great 2003 season with Arizona, in which he hit . 317 ( $142 \times 448$ ) with 51 RBI in 117 games.

Born in Humacao, Puerto Rico, Cintrón is a resident of Houston and has run the Cintrón Baseball Youth Organization in the city since retiring from playing in 2012. He has one daughter, Alexandra.

Gary Pettis was named the Astros third base coach on Oct. 17, 2014. In addition to his third base coach responsibilities, Pettis is the club's outfield and baserunning instructor. Under Pettis' guidance, the 2017 Astros finished fourth in the American League with 98 steals, while the outfielders combined to finish tops in the AL with a .989 fielding percentage.

Prior to joining the Astros, Pettis spent eight seasons (2007-14) on the Major League coaching staff of the Texas Rangers. He spent his last two seasons (2013-14) with the Rangers as their third base coach after spending six seasons (2007-12) as the club's first base coach. Over those eight years, Pettis also served as the club's outfield and baserunning instructor.

Pettis also served on the Major League staffs of the New York Mets (2003-04) and Chicago White Sox (2001-02) as first base and outfield coach. Pettis began his coaching career as a roving minor league instructor for the Angels (1995) and White Sox (1997-2000), and later had a two-year stint as Milwaukee's Triple A hitting instructor (2005-06).

The former outfielder was a five-time Gold Glove winner during his 14-year Major League career with the California Angels (1982-87), Detroit Tigers (1988-89, 1992), Texas Rangers (1990-91) and San Diego Padres (1992). He amassed 354 career steals and stole at least 40 bases five times during his career, which included a pair of 50-steal seasons. His Gold Gloves came in 1985, 1986, 1988, 1989 and 1990, which made him the fifth player in Major League history to win a Gold Glove with three different teams.

Pettis makes his offseason home in San Clemente, Calif., with his wife Peggy. The couple has two daughters, Paige and Shaye, and two sons, Kyler and Dante. Dante just finished his senior year as a consensus All-American wide receiver at the University of Washington, where he has starred as a wide receiver ( 24 career touchdown receptions) and punt returner for four seasons. He owns the NCAA record for career punt return touchdowns with nine, including four in 2017. Kyler is a model and actor, who appeared on the television soap opera Days of Our Lives for three years (2015-17) and over 115 episodes.

He would pitch batting practice in the next two All-Star Games, throwing to Andruw Jones and Jason Bay in 2005 in Detroit and to Miguel Cabrera in Pittsburgh in 2006.

A former shortstop and second baseman, Bracamonte played at the New York Yankees Venezuelan Academy from 1988-90, which made him just the third Venezuelan to sign a professional contract after serving as a bat boy in the Venezuelan Winter League. He would join the Astros organization in 2001 after five years of giving private baseball lessons.

Born in Caracas, Venezuela, he now resides in Houston, Texas, with his wife, Katie, and his daughters, Jaelyn and Jade. His son Gustavo currently works in the Miami Marlins ticket office.


MICHAEL COLLINS
ASSISTANT BULLPEN CATCHER


Michael Collins is joining the Astros organization in 2018 to serve as an assistant bullpen catcher.
Collins joins the Astros after a seven-year stint (2011-17) in the San Diego Padres organization, including a sixyear run (2012-17) as a minor league manager. He last served as the manager in the Arizona Rookie League, holding that post for three consecutive seasons and four seasons overall (2013, 2015-17). He also managed in the Dominican Summer League (2012) and at Class A Fort Wayne (2014), where he led his club to a division championship and earned the Padres 2014 Jack Krol Award for his contributions to player development.

Additionally, over the last six offseasons, Collins has managed his hometown Canberra Cavalry of the Australian Baseball League. In his six years on the job, he led Canberra to one Australian Baseball League Championship (2012-13) and to two second place finishes (2013-14, 2017-18).

Collins is a former player, having played 10 years in minor league baseball with the Los Angeles-AL (2001-08) and San Diego (2009-10) organizations. He topped out at the Triple A level in 2009 and 2010 but had his best minor league season in 2005 at Class A Advanced Cedar Rapids. That season, Collins appeared in 100 games, hitting . 320 (116x363) with 32 doubles, seven home runs, 64 RBI and an .894 OPS.

Following his minor league career, Collin played two seasons (2010-11, 2011-12) for Canberra before taking the reigns as the club's manager in for the 2012-13 campaign.

A native of Canberra, Australia, Collins originally signed as a 16-year-old minor league free agent with the Angels in 2001.

## CLUBHOUSE MANAGER



Carl Schneider, who has been with the Astros organization since 1989, became the Astros clubhouse manager in 2011. While with the Astros, Schneider has worked eight Astros playoff runs, the 2004 MLB All-Star Game and the 2005 and 2017 World Series. He has also worked the 1998 and 2003 All-Star Games in Colorado and Chicago (AL), respectively.

For his efforts last season, Schneider was named the winner the 2017 Pete Sheehy Clubhouse Award (Clubhouse Manager of the Year), which is given out annually to a home and visiting clubhouse manager, and voted on by the MLB Clubhouse Manager's Association.

Schneider originally joined the Astros in 1989 as a bat boy and also handled clubhouse duties during the baseball season. He joined the home clubhouse staff full time in 1995 and would work in that role until assuming the clubhouse manager duties in 2011.

A Texas native, Schneider currently resides in Houston with his wife, Emilie, and their sons Zachry and Max and daughters Amie and Madyson.

Steve Perry has worked for the Astros organization since 1979 and has served as the visiting clubhouse manager since 1989.

Over the years, Perry has developed a fine reputation in Major League Baseball for his work. He is a three-time winner (2000, 2008-09) of the Pete Sheehy Clubhouse Award (Clubhouse Manager of the Year), which is given out annually to a home and visiting clubhouse manager. The award is voted on by his peers within the MLB Clubhouse Manager's Association.

He also earned the Fred Hartman Long and Meritorious Service to Baseball Award in 2013, named by the Houston Chapter of the Baseball Writers Association of America.

Perry joined the Astros as a bat boy at the start of the 1979 season, but by the All-Star Break was promoted to an assistant in the visiting clubhouse. He was named visiting clubhouse manager in 1989, and has filled that role since. During his Astros tenure, Steve has worked four All-Star games and eight postseason runs.

Perry is fluent in Spanish, having spent several years of his childhood in South America after his father was relocated for work. He and his wife, Jessica, reside in Houston with their daughters, Nicole and Amanda.

## CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- The five-time All-Star, four-time Silver Slugger (2014-17), 2015 Gold Glover, 2014, 2016 and 2017 AL Batting Champion and 2017 AL MVP is entering his eighth Major League season...owns a . 316 ( $1250 \times 3951$ ) batting average with 243 doubles, 84 homers, 231 steals and a .362 on-base percentage in 982 career Major League games...made his Major League debut on July 20, 2011 vs. WSH as a 21-yearold.
- His 1022 hits from 2013-17 are more than any other Major Leaguer over that time frame...sits directly ahead of 2B Robinson Cano ( 917 hits).

- The right-handed power hitter owns a career .252 ( $513 \times 2036$ ) batting average with 114 homers, 332 RBI and a .480 slugging percentage in his five seasons in the Major Leagues with Atlanta (2013-14) and Houston (2015-17).
- In 2016, set a career high in homers with 32 ... 19 of his homers came as a catcher, which became a new single season franchise record, surpassing the 16 hit by Jason Castro in 2013....along with home runs, set career highs in OPS (.826), on-base percentage (.319), slugging percentage (.508), walks (43), and stolen bases (2).

## CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- 2017 All-Star possesses one of the most electric arms in the Major Leagues...has made 58 starts in his career, posting a 19-16 record with a 3.60 ERA (130ER/325.1IP) and 367 strikeouts across three Major League seasons.
- No starting pitcher in the Major Leagues has thrown his curveball at a higher rate than McCullers Jr. since pitch data started being tracked in 2007, as $42.8 \%$ of the pitches he has thrown in his career have been curveballs...his curveball has had an average velocity of 85.5 miles per hour over his career, which is the hardest curveball thrown by any starting pitcher since the 2007 season (min. 300IP).
- Holds a career 10.15 strikeouts per 9.0 innings ratio (367SO/325.1IP)...only four pitchers in Major League history posted higher ratios prior to their age-24 seasons (min. 300IP): RHP Jose Fernandez (11.25), RHP Kerry Wood (10.82), RHP Mark Prior (10.70) and RHP Noah Syndergaard (10.36).

(7th, 3.22) and strikeouts (7th, 129) (min. 100IP)...led all American League rookies in ERA, opponent batting average and strikeouts per 9.0 innings (min. 100IP), while ranking third in strikeouts and wins above replacement (2.4)...made 22 starts in his debut season in the Major Leagues, going 6-7 while allowing three earned runs or less in 20 of his outings....was the second-youngest starting pitcher in the Majors, behind Yankees RHP Luis Severino...among AL pitchers with at least 100.0 innings pitched, ranked sixth in strikeouts per 9.0 innings and seventh in ERA and opponent batting complete game since RHP Roy Oswalt struck out 12 on Sept. 9, 2001 vs. MIL....became just the second rookie in franchise history to strike out 11 batters without a walk in a complete game, joining RHP Shane Reynolds, who did so on July 23, 1994 vs. PIT...on June 14 vs. SEA, tossed 5.0 hitless innings...at 21 years, 255 days, became the youngest pitcher to toss at least 5.0 hitless innings in a start since RHP Phil Hughes (20.311) on May 1, 2007 at TEX...finished June with a 2.11 ERA (9ER/38.1IP), which marked the lowest ERA posted by an Astros rookie during the month since RHP Darryl Kile put up a 1.80 ERA in June of 1991 ...his . 164 opponent batting average ( $22 \times 134$ ) in June was the lowest produced by an Astros pitcher since RHP Mike Scott in June of 1987 (.164, 26x159), and the lowest ever produced by an Astros rookie during the month...among AL rookies in June, ranked first in strikeouts (40), tied for first in wins (3) and third in ERA...received votes for AL Added to the Astros 40-man roster on April 16, 2014...avoided arbitration this offseason by siging a two-year contract with Houston covering the 2018-19 seasons...following this deal, he will have one year of arbitration left with the Astros (2020).
hits (8) and total bases (29) in a single World Series, and home runs by a leadoff hitter (5) in a single World Series....became the first player in MLB history to homer in four consecutive games of a single World Series... tied Reggie Jackson (1977) and Chase Utley (2009) for the MLB record for homers in a single World Series (5).

- In 2016, became the seventh player in club history to play all 162 games of a season, joining Carlos Lee (2007), Craig Biggio (1996-97, 1992), Jeff Bagwell (1999, 1996-97, 1992), Steve Finley (1992), Bill Doran (1987) and Enos Cabell (1978).

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## FRESNO GRIZZLIES

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FRESNO PDC: The Astros and Grizzlies are entering the second year of a two-year Player Development Contract extension they signed in 2016. The original contract between the two clubs was signed prior to the 2015 season. Fresno is the ninth Triple A affiliate in Astros history, joining Oklahoma City, Round Rock, New Orleans, Tucson, Charleston, Memphis, lowa and Denver.

POWER PLAYERS: The Grizzlies led all of minor league baseball with 200 home runs in 2017, which set a new franchise record. The club also set franchise records for runs (853) and RBI (805).

WINNING CULTURE: Despite not making the playoffs, the Fresno Grizzlies posted their third consecutive winning season in what was their third year of affiliation with the Astros. This marks the first time in Fresno franchise history that they have posted three straight winning seasons.

GOIN' DEEP: IF AJ Reed won the 2017 Joe Bauman Award for leading the minor leagues with 34 home runs. His homer total broke an 18-year Fresno franchise record that was previously held by Pedro Feliz (33 in 2000).

DON'T MESS WITH TONY: IF/OF Tony Kemp was named Fresno's MVP after leading all of Triple A baseball with 166 hits. Kemp hit . 329 (fifth-best mark in Triple A), tallying 23 doubles, nine triples, 10 homers, 62 RBI, 24 steals and an .845 OPS (. 375 OBP/. 470 SLG). Kemp also received Fresno's Defensive Player of the Year honors.

QUITE A CATCH: OF Derek Fisher was a Pacific Coast League Postseason All-Star and a Baseball America Triple A All-Star after hitting .318 with 26 doubles, 21 homers, 66 RBI and 16 steals in 84 games with the Grizzlies. In addition to making his Major League debut with Houston, Fisher started in the SiriusXM All-Star Futures Game.

## RODNEY LINARES

## MANAGER, FRESNO YEAR IN BASEBALL: 22 / YEAR WITH HOUSTON: 21

Two-time Manager of the Year Award winner Rodney Linares returns to the Astros organization for his 21st season, his 12 th as a manager and his first as manager at Triple A Fresno.

Linares has spent the last three seasons managing the Double A Corpus Christi Hooks, posting a combined 475-363 (.567) record in that span. From 2015-16, Linares led the club to the two winningest seasons in franchise history, as the Hooks won 85 games in 2016 and a club-record 89 games in 2015. Linares was named the Texas League Manager of the Year for his efforts in 2015, as Corpus Christi led all of minor league baseball in wins and became the second Texas League team in 20 years to reach 89 wins in a season.

Prior to joining the Hooks, Linares spent three seasons as manager at Lancaster (2012-14), where he helped guide the club to two California League Championship titles $(2012,2014)$. He was named the California League Manager of the Year in 2012.

Linares entered the coaching ranks in 1999 as a coach and scout for the Astros Dominican Republic operations following a two-year playing career in the Detroit (1997) and Houston (1998) minor league systems. He remained in that role through the 2004 season before becoming the hitting coach at Class A Lexington from 2005-06. Linares then spent three seasons as manager at Rookie Level Greeneville (2007-09) and two seasons as manager at Lexington (2010-11).

Linares has managed in the Arizona Fall League (2012), and three seasons in the Dominican Winter League, including the last two offseasons with Estrellas de Oriente.

The former infielder was originally signed by the Tigers as a non-drafted free agent in 1997.
Rodney and his wife, Rosanna, have two children, Steven and Ryan, and reside in San Pedro de Macoris, DR. His father, Julio, is the Astros Senior Advisor for Latin American Development and has been with the organization since 1973.

## DYAR MILLER

> PITCHING COACH, FRESNO YEAR IN BASEBALL: 51 / YEAR WITH HOUSTON: 6

Dyar Miller enters his sixth season in the Astros organization and his third as pitching coach at Triple A Fresno. Miller joined the Astros in 2013 as the organization's minor league pitching coordinator, a post he served in each of his first three seasons with the club. The 2018 season will be his 34th working in player development, and his 51 st working in baseball as either a player, coach, instructor or coordinator.

Prior to joining the Astros, the former Major League pitcher spent 18 consecutive years in the Cardinals organization. Miller served as the Major League bullpen coach for the 2012 Cardinals club that reached the NLCS, which followed a four-year stint (2008-11) as minor league pitching coordinator, nine years as Triple A pitching coach (1995-96, 2001-07), and four years as minor league pitching instructor (1997-2000).

Miller joined the coaching ranks in 1985 with Double A Arkansas of the Cardinals organization, before moving up to the Cardinals Triple A club (Louisville) in 1986. He then spent the next eight seasons with three different organizations, serving stints as Major League bullpen coach for the White Sox from 1987-88, a minor league coach for the Tigers from 1989-90, and a pitching coach in the Indians system from 1991-94.

Miller had a 17-year playing career (1968-84), which included nine Major League seasons with four different MLB clubs (BAL, CAL, TOR, NYM). In his seven seasons in the Majors, he went 23-17 with 22 saves and a 3.23 ERA.

The Batesville, Ind. native is a graduate of New Point High School (IN) and Utah State University, where he played baseball and basketball. Miller served in the United States Air Force Reserve from 1968-74.

In 2001, Miller was named the recipient of the George Kissell Award for excellence in player development, and in January of 2007 was inducted into the Indiana Baseball Hall of Fame.

Dyar resides in Indianapolis, Ind., with his wife Bertha Jo. They have a blended family of six children, 12 grandchildren and two great grandchildren. In the offseason, Dyar is involved in church functions and the American Legion, and mentors young pitchers.

Darryl Robinson returns to Fresno for his second season as the club's hitting coach. Prior to joining the Grizzlies, Robinson spent eight seasons as the Astros hitting coach at Class A Advanced Lancaster.

With the JetHawks, Robinson was part of two California League Championship clubs (2014 and 2012), and helped oversee the development of current Astros stars Jose Altuve, Alex Bregman, Carlos Correa and George Springer during their time at Lancaster. In 2013, Robinson was named the California League Coach of the Year after his JetHawks led the minors in runs (976), walks (669), OBP (.384) and OPS (.853).

The former infielder played in the minor leagues for seven seasons in the Royals system (1986-1992), and also played in the independent leagues in parts of five seasons (1993, 1995-98). He was originally drafted by Kansas City in the second round of the June 1986 draft.

ASTROS PURCHASE HOOKS: In 2013, the Houston Astros purchased the Corpus Christi Hooks baseball club from Ryan-Sanders Baseball LLC. The Hooks are one of four minor league affiliates owned and operated by the Astros, along with the Class A Advanced Buies Creek Astros, Gulf Coast League Astros and Dominican Summer League Astros.

PLAYERS OF THE YEAR: The Astros Minor League Player and Pitcher of the Year both found their way to Corpus Christi in 2017, as OF Kyle Tucker and RHP Forrest Whitley continued their rapid ascent through the minors by ending their seasons with the Hooks. Tucker clubbed 16 home runs with an .837 OPS in 72 games with the Hooks as one of the youngest players in the Texas League at 20 years old. Whitley posted a 1.84 ERA (3ER/14.2IP) with 26 strikeouts and just four walks in four outings with the Hooks to close out the season.
J.D. POWER: IF J.D. Davis was arguably the top power hitter in the Texas League in 2017, and was rewarded with a Major League call-up for his efforts. The 24 -year-old hit .279 with 18 doubles, 21 homers, 60 RBI and an .850 OPS in 87 games with the Hooks, earning Texas League Midseason All-Star honors. After making his Major League debut with the Astros in August, he went on to hit four doubles and four homers in 24 games in the big leagues.

EXCITING ARM: In 2017, RHP Rogelio Armenteros put himself on the map as a prospect with a legitimate Major League future. The crafty right-hander posted a combined 10-4 record with a 2.04 ERA and 146 strikeouts with 38 walks in 123.2 innings between Corpus Christi and Triple A Fresno. ## OMAR LOPEZ

MANAGER, CORPUS CHRISTI YEAR IN BASEBALL: 23 / YEAR WITH HOUSTON: 20

Omar Lopez begins his 20th season in the Astros organization, and his first as manager at Corpus Christi.
Lopez has been a manager in the Astros system since 2008, serving stints at Buies Creek (2017), Quad Cities (2013-14, 2016), Lancaster (2015), Greeneville (2011-12), the Gulf Coast League (2009-10) and Venezuelan Summer League (2008). In 2013, Lopez led Quad Cities to a Midwest League Championship title after an 81-57 finish in the regular season.

Lopez was named the Manager of the Year in the Venezuelan Professional Baseball League for the 2014-15 season after guiding the Caribes de Anzoategui to a league-best 39-24 regular season record and an LVBP Championship title in what was his first year as the club's manager. The 38-year-old Lopez was the youngest manager in the league and became just the third manager in the history of the Caribes club to win the prestigious award.

In 2010, Lopez earned the Astros Player Development Man of the Year award, as he was credited with guiding the organization's Spanish-speaking prospects through their first year of professional baseball in the United States. Prior to starting his managerial career in 2008, Lopez served as a hitting and infield instructor in the Astros Venezuelan program and was a full-time scout from 1999-2007. While in Venezuela, Lopez was one of the scouts who recommended that the Astros sign Jose Altuve, who was a 16-year-old free agent at the time.

A native of Valencia, Venezuela, Lopez played three seasons of minor league baseball with the Chicago White Sox (1996-97) and Arizona Diamondbacks (1998). He played his first professional season with Rookie Level Bristol in 1996, leading the club in walks over 55 games. In 1997 at Bristol, the third baseman hit 276 with 23 RBI while setting career highs in almost every category. He finished his career in 1998 with Arizona's Class A affiliate at South Bend.

Omar and his wife Helen reside in Orlando, Fla. They have two children, Omar Eduardo and Emily Gabriela.

## BUIES CREEK ASTROS

GOIN' TO CAROLINA: After an eight-year run with the Lancaster JetHawks and the California League, the Astros moved their Class A Advanced affiliate to the Carolina League. The 2017 season was the first of two seasons that the Buies Creek Astros will serve as the temporary home of Houston's Class A Advanced club. The Buies Creek Astros make their home at Jim Perry Stadium at Campbell University in Buies Creek, N.C. With the move, the Astros agreed to provide and install a completely new synthetic turf at Jim Perry Stadium.

FAYETTEVILLE ON THE HORIZON: The Astros and the City of Fayetteville, North Carolina, signed a 30 -year lease agreement which will move Houston's Class A Advanced affiliate to Fayetteville for the 2019 season and beyond. The move will officially bring affiliated minor league baseball back to Fayetteville for the first time since 1998.

SPEED DEMON: OF Myles Straw was the Astros most consistent player during the 2017 Carolina League season. He was named both a Midseason and Postseason AllStar, batting . 295 with 17 doubles, seven triples, 36 steals and a Carolina League-best .412 on-base percentage.

LEFTY REINFORCEMENT: After turning heads during the Astros 2017 Spring Training camp, LHP Framber Valdez put together a strong 2017 season in the minor leagues. As a 23 -year-old, Valdez posted a 2.79 ERA and 73 strikeouts in 61.1 innings pitched at Class A Advanced Buies Creek. He closed out his season at Double A Corpus Christi, fanning 53 batters in 49.0 innings pitched.

UPSIDE ARMS: RHP Hector Perez and RHP Jorge Alcala are two of the most exciting arms in the Astros system, and both had solid seasons at Buies Creek in 2017. Perez made 21 appearances, including 14 starts, going 6-5 with a 3.63 ERA and 104 strikeouts in 89.1 innings pitched. Alcala put up a 3.45 ERA with 60 strikeouts and just 55 hits allowed in his 78.1 innings pitched.

CLOSING IT DOWN: RHP Nick Hernandez went nine-for-nine in save opportunities as the Buies Creek Astros closer, earning Carolina League Midseason All-Star honors. In his 34.0 innings, he struck out 48 batters while posting a 1.59 ERA.

## MANAGER, BUIES CREEK YEAR IN BASEBALL: 17 / YEAR WITH HOUSTON: 16



Morgan Ensberg returns to the Astros for his sixth season working in player development and his second as a manager. Ensberg served as manager at Tri-City in 2017, which followed stints as a development coach (2016), minor league special assignment coach (2014-15) and infield coach (2013).

The former third baseman played eight seasons in the Majors, which included his first seven seasons with the Astros (2000, 2002-07) and stints with the Padres (2007) and Yankees (2008). Ensberg was a key member of the 2005 Astros club that made it to the World Series, and the 2004 club that advanced to Game 7 of the National League Championship Series. His best season came in 2005, where he was an All-Star and Silver Slugger, and finished fourth in the National League MVP voting after hitting .283 ( $149 \times 526$ ) with 30 doubles, 36 homers, 101 RBI and a .945 OPS (. 388 OBP/ .557 SLG). He was also named the Astros MVP by the Houston Chapter of the BBWAA during that historic 2005 season. In 2004, he was honored by the BBWAA as the Astros recipient of the Darryl Kile 'Good Guy' Award.

Following his playing career, Ensberg returned to the University of Southern California in 2010 to finish his degree in finance while also serving as an undergraduate assistant coach for the school's baseball team. He then moved on to be an assistant coach at the University of California, San Diego in 2012. Ensberg has served as a college baseball analyst for ESPN, and from 2011-12 was the co-host on SiriusXM's MLB Roundtrip radio show.

The California native received his B.B.A. in finance from the Marshall School of Business at the University of Southern California, where he played for the school's baseball team from 1995-98. During his three-year playing career at USC, he hit . 331 with 40 home runs and 149 RBI and is the only Trojan to have a 20-homer, 20-stolen base season. He was a member of two College World Series teams, including the 1998 National Championship squad. Ensberg was selected by the Astros in the ninth round of the 1998 draft.

## HITTING COACH, GCL ASTROS

 YEAR IN BASEBALL: 39 / YEAR WITH HOUSTON: 31Former Major Leaguer and Astros legend César Cedeño returns for his 31st season with the organization and will be hitting coach for the GCL Astros in 2018. In 2012, Cedeño joined the Astros in a full-time capacity for the first time since 2001 as hitting coach at Greeneville, a post he held in six straight seasons.

The former outfielder played 12 seasons (1970-81) with the Astros, collecting five Gold Glove Awards while appearing in four All-Star games. During his 17-year Major League career, Cedeño played with the Astros, Reds (198285), Cardinals (1985) and Dodgers (1986), and hit . 285 (2087×7310) with 436 doubles, 60 triples, 199 homers, and 550 stolen bases in 2006 career games. In 1970, Cedeño finished fourth in the National League Rookie of the Year voting after hitting .310 with 21 doubles and 17 steals in his debut with Houston. Cedeño received MVP votes in five seasons (1972-74, 1976, 1980) and stole at least 50 bases in six consecutive seasons (1972-77). Signed by Houston as a 16-yearold non-drafted free agent out of the Dominican Republic, Cedeno set club records for total bases, slugging percentage and steals in a season during his tenure with the Astros.

Following his playing career, Cedeño served as a coach or instructor for the Houston organization for 10 seasons (1990-94, 1997-2001). Prior to being named Greeneville's hitting coach in 2012, his last full-time coaching stint was in 2009 with the Washington Nationals.


## RENE ROJAS

A two-story building contains locker rooms, manager and coaches offices, administrative offices, a dining room, full-service industrial kitchen, weight room, player and staff living accomodations, and a player entertainment room. In addition to developing young players and their baseball skills, the Astros new Latin American home also helps develop their educational skills and features a computer lab and classrooms.

The complex is located a half-mile from the new Tampa Bay and Los Angeles Dodgers facilities and in the same general area as other Major League Dominican Academies.

## 2017 CLUB NOTES

ASTROS WIN WORLD SERIES: The Houston Astros, in the franchise's 56th season of play (established in 1962), won the first World Series title in franchise history...en route to the championship, they downed the Red Sox in the ALDS (four games), the Yankees in the ALCS (seven games) and the Dodgers in the World Series (seven games)...by taking this route to the World Series, the Astros became the first team in MLB history to eliminate both the Red Sox and Yankees in the same postseason.

ASTROS WORLD SERIES HISTORY: This season marked the Astros second trip to the World Series, as Houston made the 2005 World Series, which ended in a sweep by the White Sox.

THE 100 CLUB: The 2017 World Series marked the eighth time in Major League history for two 100-win clubs to match up against each other in the World Series...it's also only the third time it has happened since 1950:

IN THE WORLD SERIES: The Astros and Dodgers played one of the most-thrilling Fall Classics in MLB history, with Houston topping LA in seven games... the series featured two extra-inning games (both Astros wins) and 25 combined homers, which set a new record for a single World Series.

THRIFTY GAME 1: The Astros and Dodgers made quick work in Game 1 of the World Series, with a time of game of two hours and 28 minutes...that was the shortest World Series game since Game 4 of the 1992 World Series between the Braves and Blue Jays in Toronto (2:21).

WHAT A GAME 2: The Astros and Dodgers played an instant classic in Game 2 in Los Angeles, with Houston coming out on top, $7-6$, in 11 innings...four different Astros hit home runs, none bigger than CF George Springer, who hit a two-run homer in the top of the 11th...RHP Chris Devenski earned the first World Series win in Astros franchise history.

MORE GAME 2: The Astros and Dodgers hit four home runs each in Game 2, including five home runs in extra-innings, the most extra-inning home runs in Major League history for any game, including regular and postseason contests...Houston also became the first team in Major League history to hit three home runs in extra innings of a postseason game.

EPIC GAME 5: Houston hosted an epic Game 5 in the World Series, with the Astros topping the Dodgers 13-12 in 10 innings...both teams finished with 14 hits, none bigger than a walkoff single by 3B Alex Bregman ( $2 \times 5$ ) in the 10th frame...per Elias, prior to Bregman, the last player to drive in a run in his first five World Series games was Amos Otis of the 1980 Royals...additionally, five Astros homered in the contest, marking the first time in MLB history for a team to have five players hit a homer in a single World Series game.

WORLD SERIES MVP: CF George Springer was named the 2017 World Series MVP after hitting .379 (11x29) with five home runs and seven RBI... Springer homered in four straight World Series games (Games 4-7), becoming the first player to do so in a single World Series...all five of his homers came out of the leadoff spot in the order, which also marked a new World Series record.

IN THE ALCS: The Astros beat the Yankees in a thrilling seven-game ALCS in which every game was won by the home team...in Major League history, this had only happened on four other occasions in a seven-game postseason series: the 2004 NLCS (Cardinals over Astros), the 2001 WS (Diamondbacks over Yankees), the 1991 WS (Twins over Braves) and the 1987 WS (Twins over Cardinals).

PITCHING PROWESS: In the ALCS, the Astros became the second team in MLB history to hold their opponent to one or fewer runs in four home games of a postseason series, also done by the Cleveland Indians in the 1920 World Series vs. the Brooklyn Robins.

ALCS MVP: RHP Justin Verlander was named the ALCS MVP after going 2-0 with a 0.56 ERA (1ER/16IP) in two starts, striking out 21 while allowing only 10 hits and two walks...he pitched an epic Game 2, tossing a complete game, allowing just one run on five hits with 13 strikeouts.

DOUBLE DIGITS: In Games 1 and 2 of the ALCS, LHP Dallas Keuchel (10K) and RHP Justin Verlander (13K) became the third and fourth pitchers in Astros history to record double-digit strikeout games in the postseason...they joined RHP Mike Scott (14K) and RHP Nolan Ryan (12K), who did so in Games 1 and 5 of the 1986 NLCS.

## 2017 CLUB NOTES

IN ELIMINATION GAMES: Per Elias, including 7.0 scoreless in Game 6 of the ALCS, RHP Justin Verlander has not allowed a run in his last 24.0 innings in which his team was facing elimination in the postseason, a streak that dates back to 2012... this matches the longest such scoreless innings streak in postseason history, also reached by LHP Madison Bumgarner from 2014-16.

SNAPDRAGON SEALS IT: RHP Lance McCullers Jr. pitched the Astros to the World Series in Game 7 of the ALCS, tossing a final 4.0 scoreless innings, while allowing just one hit and one walk, en-route to the Astros 4-0 win over the Yankees...marked his first career save (regular or postseason) and the seventh save of at least 4.0 scoreless innings in postseason history...McCullers also become the only pitcher in ML history to record six strikeouts and earn the save in a postseason appearance... he threw 24 straight curveballs to end the game.

IN THE ALDS: The Astros beat the Red Sox in a four-game ALDS behind two 8-2 victories in Games 1 and 2 in Houston and a thrilling 5-4 win in Game 4 at Boston...the series victory was just the fourth in franchise history and the first since they won the NLCS over the Cardinals in 2005.

SPECIAL DPS: Like in the regular season, the Astros offense continued it's dominance in the ALDS, as they posted a .974 team OPS, which is good for the third-highest team OPS in a single postseason series in MLB history.

ALTUVE'S HISTORIC GAME 1: 2B Jose Altuve hit three home runs in Game 1 of the ALDS vs. BOS...he became:

- the ninth player in Major League history (10th time) to hit three homers in a postseason game and the first since Pablo Sandoval in the 2012 World Series.
- the 10 th player in franchise history ( 13 th time) to hit three homers in a game, most recently Carlos Lee in 2007.
- the first player in franchise history to hit three home runs in a postseason game.
- the third player in franchise history with a multi-homer game in the postseason, joining Carlos Correa (2015) and Carlos Beltrán (2004).

HOT START TO POSTSEASON: Per Elias, by winning the first two games of the ALDS by scores of $8-2$, Houston became the third team in Major League history to win each of the first two games of a postseason series by six or more runs...also, the Yankees won the first two games of the 1937 World Series against the Giants by identical 8-1 scores and the Orioles beat the Mariners in the first two games of the 1997 ALDS by identical scores of 9-3.

FOUR HITS FOR YULI: In Game 3 of the ALDS, 1B Yuli Gurriel became the fourth player in franchise history to collect four hits in a postseason game, joining SS Carlos Correa ( 2015 ALDS, G4), CF Carlos Beltrán (2004 NLDS, G5) and CF Terry Puhl ( 1980 NLCS, G5).

ALDS GAME 4 CLINCHER: Game 4 of the ALDS featured a little bit of everything, including relief appearances from two of the best starters in the Majors (RHP Justin Verlander, LHP Chris Sale), a game-tying homer by 3B Alex Bregman and a game-winning single by RF Josh Reddick in the 8th inning.

POWER TRIPS: The Astros totaled 27 homers in the postseason, which was tied with the 2002 Giants for the most in a single postseason...Houston's 15 homers in the World Series were the most in a single Fall Classic, eclipsing the 14 hit by the 2002 Giants.

HOME COOKING: The Astros finished the postseason 8-1 at home, becoming just the second team in MLB history to win eight postseason games at home, joining the 2002 Champion Los Angeles Angels...additionally, Houston won their first seven home postseason games, becoming just the second team in MLB history to win their first seven home games in a postseason, also the 2008 Champion Philadelphia Phillies.

ASTROS GAME 7 HISTORY: The Astros played in two Game 7's this postseason, in the ALCS and the World Series...prior to this season, Houston had only played in one Game 7 in franchise history, losing Game 7 of the 2004 NLCS to St. Louis.

SPECIAL DPS: 2B Jose Altuve had one of the best postseason performances in franchise history as his 1.021 OPS ranked fourth in Astros history for a single postseason (min. 55 PA ).

SELECT COMPANY: 2B Jose Altuve became one of eight players in MLB history to hit seven-plus home runs in a single postseason, joining Carlos Beltrán (8, 2004), Barry Bonds (8, 2002), Nelson Cruz (8, 2011), Troy Glaus (7, 2002), Daniel Murphy (7, 2015), Melvin Upton Jr. (7, 2008) and Jayson Werth (7, 2009).

HOMEBDY: As good as 2B Jose Altuve was this entire postseason, he was on fire at home, hitting .472 (17x36) with six home runs and 12 RBI in nine games...his . 472 home average ranked fifth all-time in Major League history (min. 30 PA ), and was the highest since David Ortiz (.500, 14×28) and Albert Pujols (.484, 15x31) both reached that mark in the 2004 postseason.

YOUTH IS SERVED: SS Carlos Correa, who hit five home runs in the postseason, has combined to hit seven homers in 24 career playoff games... he is the only player in MLB history to hit seven postseason homers before turning 24 years old.

BREGMAN'S HERDICS: 3B Alex Bregman had a clutch postseason both defensively and at the plate...his offensive heroics featured four home runs off of perennial All-Stars, as he hit two off of LHP Chris Sale, and one each off of RHP Kenley Jansen and LHP Clayton Kershaw.

HIT MAN: 1B Yuli Gurriel hit .304 (21x69) with seven doubles, a triple and two homers in 18 games this postseason...Gurriel finished one double shy of tying the MLB record for doubles in a single postseason (8), held by David Freese (2011), Albert Pujols (2011) and Ben Zobrist (2015).

ALTUVE'S AWARD SEASDN: 2B Jose Altuve earned all the hardware this season, as he was named the American League MVP, the Sports Illustrated Sportsperson of the Year, the Sporting News Player of the Year, the Baseball America MLB Player of the Year, the AL Hank Aaron Award winner and the winner of two MLBPA Players Choice Awards for the Major League Player of the Year and the AL Most Outstanding Player....he also earned two Esurance MLB Awards, the Best Major Leaguer and the Best Major Leaguer, Postseason, splitting this award with RHP Justin Verlander.

FINAL RESULTS: The Astros won the AL West by 21 games over the Angels, marking the largest division win in franchise history...Houston's 101 wins were their second-highest total in club history.

REWRITING THE RECORD BOOKS: The Astros got off to a scorching start to the season, at one point owning a 42-16 record after an 11-game winning streak on June 5 ... Houston set a franchise record with their best 34 -game start (23-11) and continued that run through game number 117 with a $72-45$ record.

POSTSEASON APPEARANCES: This season marked the Astros 11th time in the postseason and their seventh time as a division winner, also winning the NL West in 1980 and 1986 and the NL Central in 1997, 1998, 1999 and 2001...Houston is the first team in Major League history to win three different divisions and the first team in MLB history to win the AL (2017) and NL (2005) pennant.

IT'S TIME: Prior to the World Series win, the Astros had completed 55 seasons without a championship since their inception in 1962, which ranked as the third-longest championship drought in the Majors.

BACK THEN: The 2017 Astros featured four players remaining from the 2013 Astros, which finished 51111: 2B Jose Altuve, IF Marwin Gonzalez, LHP Dallas Keuchel and RHP Brad Peacock...that group bottomed out in 2013 (51-111), made the playoffs in 2015 and won 101 games this season.

## AT THE HELM: Manager AJ Hinch has completed

 three seasons with the Astros (2015-17) with a 271-215 (.557) regular season record, two playoff appearances and a 14-9 postseason record...Hinch has already set the franchise record for postseason managerial wins, surpassing Phil Garner (13-13)... in recognition of his season, Hinch won the Esurance MLB Award as MLB's Best Manager, while also winning Baseball America's Manager of the Year Award.ON THE OFFENSIVE: The Astros offense led the Majors in runs (896), hits (1581), doubles (346), average (.282), OBP (.346), SLG (.478) and OPS (.823) while striking out fewer than any other club (1087)...this season, the Astros set club records in doubles (346), average (.282) and SLG (.478), while finishing second in OPS (.823)...this marks the first time in franchise history for the Astros to lead the Majors in runs.

WHAT A CDMBD: Per Elias, the Astros became the seventh team in Major League history to post the highest slugging percentage and the fewest strikeouts in a single season, with only two teams doing so since 1911: the 1948 Yankees and the 1995 Indians...additionally, the Astros narrowly missed out on becoming the second team in MLB history to finish a season with the fewest strikeouts by their batters, and the most strikeouts by their pitchers (only the 1911 NY Giants).

TEAMWORK: The Astros had 10 players with 50 -plus RBI and eight players with 15 -plus home runs, both franchise records...the Astros are just the fourth team in Major League history to have 10plus players collect 50 -plus RBI in a single season, also the 1930 Cardinals (10), the 2007 Tigers (10) and the 2009 Angels (11)...additionally, the Astros finished the season with nine players with an OPS+ of 100 or better (min. 325 PA ), becoming just the eighth team in Major League history to do this.

FIRST SINCE 1922: The Astros scored an MLB high 896 runs this season, the most in MLB history by a team without an individual player reaching 100 RBI...prior to this season, the last team to hold that distinction was the 1922 Pirates, which scored 865 runs, led by Carson Bigbee and his 99 RBI.

ON THE BUMP: The Astros pitching staff finished third in the AL in starters ERA (4.03) and fifth in team ERA (4.12)...the group ranked second in the Majors in strikeouts (1593), which set a franchise record, besting the 2016 team (1396).

ROAD WARRIORS: The Astros set a franchise record for road wins this season with a 53-28 mark, which also tied the Indians for the best road record this season.

ASTROS BY MONTH: The Astros posted winning months in five of the six months in 2017, topping out with a 22-7 record in May...Houston swooned to a 11-17 record in August, but recovered to post a 22-8 record in their final 30 games.

TAMING THE WEST: Houston went 50-26 (.657) vs. AL West opponents this season, with winning records against SEA (14-5), OAK (12-7), LAA (127) and TEX (12-7)...the Astros last posted a win percentage this high against their own division in 1998 (38-18, .679).

INTERLEAGUE PLAY: Houston went $15-5$ in Interleague play and became the first team in MLB history to win their first nine Interleague games of a season.

TURNSTILES: The Astros drew 2,390,668 fans to Minute Maid Park this season during 78 regular season games...despite losing three games at Minute Maid Park due to Hurricane Harvey, the Astros
posted their highest attendance total since 2009

THE HIT MAN: 2B Jose Altuve became the first player in MLB history to lead the AL or NL in hits outright in four straight seasons....he finished with 204 hits, which is 12 hits more than second-place Eric Hosmer (192).

EXCLUSIVE CIMPANY: With 204 hits, 2B Jose Altuve became just the fourth right-handed hitter in Major League history to reach 200 hits in four or more consecutive seasons...per Elias, the others: Michael Young (5, 2003-07); Kirby Puckett (4, 1986-89); Al Simmons (5, 1929-33).

LEADOFF PDP: OF George Springer hit 34 home runs this season, joining Charlie Blackmon (37 HR ) and Brian Dozier ( 34 HR ) as the only players in the Majors this season to his 30 -plus home runs while batting out of the leadoff spot...per Elias, before this season, no leadoff hitter had clubbed 30 homers in a season since Mike Trout in 2012, and the last time that multiple top-of-the-order players did so was in 2008 (Grady Sizemore and Hanley Ramirez).

MY SACRIFICE: OF Josh Reddick had 12 sac flies this season, which tied for the Major League lead along with 3B Evan Longoria...he fell one shy of tying the franchise record of 13, reached by Ray Knight (1982), Jeff Bagwell (1992) and Carlos Lee (2007).

THE HOT CORNER: 3B Alex Bregman led the AL and ranked fifth in the Majors in fielding percentage (.977) as a third baseman, committing only 10 errors in 337 total chances at the hot corner... his .977 fielding percentage ranked as the best by an Astros third baseman in a single-season in club history, besting 3B Bob Aspromonte (.973) in 1964.

FIREWORKS: After July 4, IF Alex Bregman hit .321 ( $93 \times 290$ ) with 25 doubles, 11 home runs, 45 RBI and a . 927 OPS (. 378 OBP/. 548 SLG) in 77 games...since that date, Bregman ranked third in the $A L$ in runs (57), third in doubles (25) and tied for fifth in extra-base hits (40).

FIRST IMPRESSIONS: After being acquired on the Aug. 31 trade deadline, RHP Justin Verlander went 5-0 in his five regular season starts as an Astro with a 1.06 ERA (4ER/34IP) with 43 strikeouts and a 149 opponent average, allowing just 17 hits in his 34.0 innings pitched....he was one of the best starters in the Majors in September, ranking fifth in the Majors in ERA.

PROUD PEACOCK: RHP Brad Peacock (13-2) allowed two-or-fewer earned runs in 16 of his 21 starts this season, including his last seven of the season...his success has been the product of an elite strikeout ratio, as he's fanned 161 hitters in 132.0 innings pitched.

CHARLES IN CHARGE: RHP Charlie Morton (14-7), a veteran of 10 Major League seasons (2008-17), posted career bests this season in wins, strikeouts (163) and opponent batting average (.228)...his biggest uptick was his strikeout numbers, as he posted a 10.00 strikeouts per nine ratio, which ranked ninth in the AL ( min .125 IP ), and represented nearly a four strikeout difference with his career ratio of 6.86.

MR. SEPTEMBER: RHP Collin McHugh is $16-0$ in 20 regular season starts in September and October since 2014 with a 2.94 ERA (40ER/122.1IP)...his 16 wins are tied for first in the Majors with LHP Jon Lester (16-6).

SMODTH SOUNDS: RHP Ken Giles converted all 19 of his save chances at home this season, the longest single-season home saves streak in franchise history...at home, Giles posted a 0.84 ERA (3ER/32IP) with 45 strikeouts in 31 appearances this season.

MODSE IS LODSE: RHP Joe Musgrove went 3-0 with a 1.44 ERA (5ER/31.1IP) in 23 games after moving to the bullpen in July.

MONTHLY AWARDS: The Astros had five monthly award winners this season, which tied the franchise record, also reached in 2015...this includes: April Pitcher of the Month (LHP Dallas Keuchel), May Pitcher of the Month (RHP Lance McCullers Jr.), May Player of the Month (SS Carlos Correa), July Player of the Month (2B Jose Altuve) and the July Rookie of the Month (1B Yuli Gurriel).

WEEKLY AWARDS: Three Astros earned AL Player of the Week Awards in 2017 in OF George Springer (May 29-June 4), 2B Jose Altuve (July 3-9) and SS Carlos Correa (Sept. 25-Oct. 1).

SIX ASTROS ALL-STARS: The Astros had six All-Stars this season, which led all AL teams and marks the most in a single season in franchise history...they were represented by starters 2B Jose Altuve, SS Carlos Correa and OF George Springer and pitchers RHP Chris Devenski, LHP Dallas Keuchel and RHP Lance McCullers Jr.

MAR-WIN: IF/OF Marwin Gonzalez became the first player in the modern era of baseball (since 1901) to homer in four straight starts, each at a different position, when he did so from April 27-May 3... he ultimately homered in five consecutive starts at these positions: 2B (4/27), 3B (4/30), LF (5/2), 1B (5/3), LF (5/4).

MIRACULOUS COMEBACK: On May 29, the Astros scored 11 runs in the 8th inning, overcoming a sixrun deficit to defeat the Twins in Minnesota, 16-8... marked the first time in club history the Astros won a game by at least six runs after trailing by at least six runs (Elias)...prior to game, the Astros had gone 0-921 in games where they trailed by at least six runs in the 8th inning or later in club history (Elias)...also marked the first time Houston came back to win while trailing by six runs or more since May 15, 2008 at SF....was the second time in club history that the Astros scored 11 runs in an inning (also July 18,1994 vs. STL, 6th inn.)...was one run behind the franchise record of 12 set on May 31, 1975 at PHI (8th inn.).

11 STRAIGHT WINS: The Astros recorded an 11 -game winning streak from May 25 -June 5 this season, which marked the third-longest single-season winning streak in club history, and longest by a Major League team this season.

## 2017 CLUB NOTES

DOUBLE TEAM: Houston doubled in a franchise-record 60 consecutive games from May 21-July 30, besting their previous record of 38 games set from July 27 -Sept. 6, 1977...the streak ranks as the second-longest streak by an MLB club since 1913, trailing only the 1996 Indians (75g).

IMMDRTALIZED: On July 30, Jeff Bagwell was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame along with Pudge Rodriguez and Tim Raines... Bagwell joins Craig Biggio as the only players to go into the Hall as Astros.

ELIAS SAYS: On the first four games of the Astros final road trip from Sept. 25-28, the Astros outscored their opponents 49-9, winning each game by at least nine runs...the last Major League team to win four consecutive games, each by at least a nine-run margin, was the Detroit Wolverines of the National League in 1887 ...Houston is only the third Major League team since 1931 to score 11-plus runs in four straight games on one road trip, joining the 1950 Boston Braves and the 2000 Seattle Mariners.

PITCHING IN: Monetary donations for hurricane relief are being accepted at YouCaring.com/AstrosHarvey...additionally, Astros Owner and Chairman Jim Crane, the Astros ownership group and the Astros Foundation have all pledged a donation of $\$ 4$ million to relief efforts.

WINS FOR WARRIORS: Organized by RHP Justin Verlander, the Wins for Warriors Foundation is launching a grantmaking program and taking applications to provide financial assistance to military and veteran families that have been impacted by Hurricane Harvey...Verlander is also personally donating $\$ 100,000$ towards starting this fund, and has committed his playoff share to Wins for Warriors...

AID TO PR: The Astros Foundation, in partnership with Crane Worldwide, FedEx and the Houston Mayor's Office, facilitated the transport of over 240,000 pounds of supplies, equivalent to approximately six truck-loads of air cargo, to aid in Puerto Rico relief efforts in the wake of Hurricane Maria... the Astros support the efforts of Carlos Beltrán and several of his teammates in providing relief.

32 : JIM UMBRICHT

1962-1963
BORN: 9/17/30 IN CHICAGO, IL

Jim Umbricht broke into the professional ranks with the Milwaukee Brewers farm system in 1953 and was traded to Pittsburgh for outfielder Emil Ranko on April 6, 1959. He was purchased by the Houston Colt . 45 s in the 1961 National League player pool for \$50,000 from Pittsburgh. Umbricht opened the season with the Colts and was one of the top relief pitchers in the National League. He posted a 4-0 record with a 2.01 ERA that year. He then made a remarkable comeback after a cancer operation in mid-March of 1963 and was once again one of the league's leading relievers with a 4-3 record and 2.61 ERA. Umbricht died April 8, 1964 at the age of 33 . His number, 32, was officially retired on April 12, 1965.


## 40 - DON WILSON

1966-74
BORN: 2/12/45 IN MONROE, LA
B: R T: R
Don Wilson is the only pitcher to throw two no-hitters while wearing a Houston uniform. He pitched a no-hitter on June 18, 1967 vs. Atlanta (2-0) and May 1, 1969 at Cincinnati (4-0). Wilson established the club record for single-game strikeouts (18) on July 14, 1968 vs. Los Angeles. He compiled a 103-92 record in nine seasons with the Astros and won a career-high 16 games twice in 1969 (16-12), and 1971 (16-10). He was named to the 1971 All-Star team. Wilson died on January 5, 1975 and his number, 40, was officially retired on April 13, 1975.


## 25 • JOSE CRUZ

1975-87 BORN: 8/8/47 IN ARROYO, PR B:L T:L
Jose "Cheo" Cruz ranks in the top 10 in every significant Astros career hitting category. He was the team's most valuable player four times $(1977,1980,1983,1984)$ and named a National League All-Star twice $(1980,1985)$. He started his career in the St. Louis organization but did not blossom until he was acquired by the Astros in 1975. Cruz made three trips into the postseason with the Astros, batting .400 in the 1980 NLCS against the Phillies and hitting .300 six times in his career. Cruz currently serves as a community outreach executive for the club. He previously served as the Astros' first base coach for 13 seasons from 1997-2009. His number, 25, was officially retired on Oct. 3, 1992.

## 33 • MIKE SCOTT

## 1983-91

BORN: 4/26/55 IN SANTA MONICA, CA
B: R T: R
Mike Scott is still remembered for doing the impossible: on Sept. 25, 1986, he became the first pitcher ever to throw a no-hitter in a clinching situation when he shut down San Francisco, 2-0, to wrap up the NL West title. Scott, who began his career with the New York Mets, was 110-81 with a 3.30 ERA as an Astro from 1983-90, winning the Cy Young Award in 1986 when he led the Majors in strikeouts (306), innings pitched (275.1) and ERA (2.22). He will also be remembered for his feats in the 1986 NLCS. Scott twice beat the New York Mets, limiting them to one run in 18 innings and striking out 19 batters. He became the first player from a losing team to win NLCS MVP honors. In 1989, he became Houston's fourth 20-game winner when he posted a 20-10 record. His number, 33, was officially retired on Oct. 3, 1992.


## 34 • NOLAN RYAN

## 1980-88

## BORN: 1/31/47 IN REFUGIO,TX

B: R T: R
The all-time strikeout king and 1999 inductee to the Baseball Hall of Fame played nine seasons for the Astros after signing as a free agent on Nov. 19, 1979. He helped the Astros to their first National League West Division title in 1980. He tossed his fifth career no-hitter on Sept. 26, 1981 against Los Angeles and posted one of the best post-World War II ERAs (1.69) in helping Houston to the second half title. On April 27, 1983, he surpassed Walter Johnson as baseball's all-time strikeout king when he fanned former Houston Astros manager and Montreal infielder Brad Mills. He led the league with a 2.76 ERA in 1987 despite an 8-16 record. He led the league in strikeouts in 1987 (270) and 1988 (228). Ryan made two All-Star appearances while wearing a Houston uniform $(1981,1985)$ and was the owner of 53 Major League pitching records upon his retirement. His number, 34, was retired on Sept. 29, 1996.


49 • LARRY DIERKER

1964-77
BORN: 9/22/46 IN HOLLYWOOD, CA
B: R T: R
On May 19, 2002, the Astros retired the number 49 of franchise icon Larry Dierker. In 40 years of service to the organization, Dierker served as a player, front-office member, broadcaster, and manager. In 13 seasons on the mound with Houston, he won 137 games, second only to Joe Niekro in team history. He owns the franchise records for innings pitched, starts, complete games, and shutouts. A two-time All-Star, Dierker pitched the fifth no-hitter in franchise history on July 9, 1976. After one season in the front office and 18 as a broadcaster, Dierker became the sixth manager in Major League history to win a division crown in his first season. In five seasons as the club's skipper from 1997-2001, he won four division titles, and the 1998 team won a franchise-record 102 games, allowing Dierker to earn NL Manager of the Year honors.


## 24 • JIMMY WYNN

1963-73
B: R T: R Jimmy Wynn spent the first 11 years of his 15-year Major League career with the Houston franchise, the first two as a member of the Colt $.45^{\prime}$ s. Despite his small frame ( $5^{\prime} 9^{\prime \prime}$ ), Wynn boasted enormous power and a strong throwing arm, earning him the nickname "The Toy Cannon." He ranks among the Top 10 in almost every significant Astros career hitting category and led the franchise in hits $(1,291)$, home runs $(223)$, and RBI $(719)$ when he left the club after the 1973 season. In 1967, the slugging center fielder finished second in the National League in home runs (37) while posting 107 RBI. He also became the first Astro to hit three home runs in a game. As a member of the 1974 Dodgers, Wynn smashed 32 home runs with 108 RBI, finishing in fifth place for the National League Most Valuable Player Award. Wynn remains an active member of the Houston community and currently works as a community outreach executive for the club. His number, 24 , was officially retired on June 25, 2005.

## 5 : JEFF BAGWELL

## 1991-2005

BORN: 5/27/68 IN BOSTON, MA

One of the greatest first basemen in baseball history, in 2017 Jeff Bagwell became the second Astros player to be inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame. Bagwell is the Houston franchise career leader in home runs (449) and RBI $(1,529)$, and was the first Astro to win a Most Valuable Player Award, having done so in 1994 after hitting .368 with 39 home runs and 116 RBI. Bagwell also became the first player in franchise history to win a Rookie of the Year award, capturing the honor in the National League in 1991. One of the most respected players and leaders in recent Major League memory, Bagwell's mark on the Astros franchise is indelible, from his play on the field to his impact on the younger Astros in the clubhouse. He earned three NL Silver Slugger Awards $(1994,1997,1999)$ and one Rawlings Gold Glove Award (1994), and was named to four All-Star teams. He is the only Astro with six consecutive 100-RBI seasons. Bagwell was the Astros Opening Day first baseman for 15 consecutive seasons, and his 2,314 hits rank second in franchise history. On Aug. 26, 2007, the Astros retired the No. 5 worn by Bagwell during his 15-year career with the team.


## 7 - CRAIG BIGGID

## 1988-2007

BORN: 12/14/65 IN SMITHTOWN, NY
B: R T: R
In front of close to 50,000 fans, many of which were from Houston, Craig Biggio was officially inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame on July, 26, 2015, along with pitchers Randy Johnson, Pedro Martinez and John Smoltz. Biggio became the first player ever inducted into Cooperstown as a member of the Houston Astros. On Aug. 17, 2008, the Astros retired the No. 7 worn by the second baseman during his 20-year career with the team. Biggio is the franchise career leader in runs scored (1844) and hits (3060) and is the only player to reach the 3,000-hit plateau while wearing an Astros uniform. At the time of his retirement, he ranked 20th in Major League history in that category and was one of only nine players to reach the milestone while playing his entire career with the same team. Biggio also leads the franchise in doubles with 668. In 1998, Biggio joined Hall of Famer Tris Speaker as the only players in the 20th century to collect 50-or-more doubles and 50-or-more stolen bases in the same season. He followed his 1998 campaign by hitting 56 doubles in 1999, becoming just the sixth player in MLB history to have back-toback 50-double seasons. Biggio has played more games (2850) than any other player in franchise history and has been hit by more pitches (285) than any player in modern MLB history (since 1900). A seven-time All-Star, Biggio received five Silver Slugger Awards and four Gold Gloves. He is the only player in Major League history to make the All-Star team at both catcher and second base. Biggio played in a franchise record 20 seasons with the club, including 19 consecutive Opening Day starts (1989-2007). He remains a member of the Astros organization as a special assistant to the general manager.


## 42 • JACKIE ROBINSON

1947-56
BORN: 1/31/19 IN CAIRO, GA
B: R T: R
On April 15, 1947, Jackie Robinson debuted at first base for the Brooklyn Dodgers, becoming the first African American in the 20th century to appear in a Major League Baseball uniform. He broke the color barrier, and quickly became one of the league's stars and a symbol of hope to millions of Americans. Known for his daring baserunning, Robinson stole home 19 times, and helped the Dodgers win the pennant in six of his 10 seasons. In 1949, he was named the National League MVP after batting .342 with 37 steals and 124 runs. In 1962, he became the first black player elected to the National Baseball Hall of Fame. To mark the 50th anniversary of his historic achievement, Major League Baseball dedicated the 1997 season to Robinson and retired his number, 42, throughout the league. Robinson died Oct. 24, 1972, at the age of 53.

## HOUSTON MAJOR LEAGUE HISTORY

1962 The Houston Colt .45s play their first Major League game on April 10, defeating the Chicago Cubs 11-2.

1963 Bob Bruce one-hits the Cincinnati Reds on April 26...Don Nottebart no-hits the Phillies on May 7.

1964 Ken Johnson becomes the first Major Leaguer to lose a nine-inning no-hitter on April 23 with a 1-0 loss to the Cincinnati Reds.

1965 The Houston Colt .45s become the Houston Astros and inaugurate indoor baseball with a 2-1 exhibition win over the New York Yankees on April 9 in
 the Astrodome...rookie Joe Morgan sets club marks for at-bats, runs, hits and triples.

1966 Mike Cuellar sets a club mark with a 2.22 ERA...home attendance mark which stood for 22 years, was set on June 22 as 50,908 watch Sandy Koufax and the Dodgers down Houston 5-2.

1967 Don Wilson fires a no-hitter vs. the Atlanta Braves, 2-0, on June 18, striking out Hank Aaron for the final out... Jimmy Wynn sets club records with 37 home runs and 107 RBI.

1968 Don Wilson strikes out 18 Cincinnati Reds in a 6-1 win on July 14...four Houston hurlers win 10-or-more games: Don Wilson (13), Larry Dierker (12), Dave Giusti (11) and Denny Lemaster (10)...the Astros down the Mets 1-0 in 24 innings on April 15.

1969 Cincinnati's Jim Maloney no-hits the Astros on April 30 and the next night, May 1, Don Wilson returns the favor by no-hitting the Reds, 4-0...Larry Dierker becomes Houston's first 20-game winner...the club records its first .500 season ( $81-81$ ).

Fred Gladding appears in 63 games, setting a club mark...three Astros hit over 300 (Cesar Cedeno, .310; Jesus Alou, .306; Denis Menke, .304).

1971 Cesar Cedeno leads the league with 40 doubles and Roger Metzger and Joe Morgan share the league lead with 11 triples each...during the 1971 winter meetings, Houston acquires Lee May, Tommy Helms and Jimmy Stewart from the Reds for Joe Morgan, Jack Billingham, Denis Menke, Cesar Geronimo and Ed Armbrister.

Astros finish in second place with their best record ever (84-69)... Jerry Reuss and Larry Dierker hurl back-to-back one hitters on June 18 against Philadelphia and June 19 vs. New York, respectively...Cesar Cedeno hits for the cycle on Aug. 2 vs. the Reds.


1973 Cesar Cedeno becomes the first player in history to steal 50 bases and hit 20 home runs in successive seasons...Roger Metzger leads the league with 14 triples...Lee May hits safely in a club record 21 straight games.

Rookie Greg Gross leads the club with a .314 average, and sets a club mark with 185 hits...Ken Forsch appears in a then-club record 70 games...Cliff Johnson has five pinch-hit home runs.

Bob Watson leads the Astros with a .324 average, 157 hits and 85 RBI...Dierker leads the staff with 14 wins.
J.R. Richard becomes Houston's second 20-game winner...Cesar Cedeno sets a club mark with 58 stolen bases and earns his fifthstraight Gold Glove.

Three Astros steal 40 bases (Cesar Cedeno, 61; Jose Cruz, 44; Enos Cabell, 42)...Watson sets a new club record with 110 RBI.
J.R. Richard strikes out 303 to become the first National League righthander to strike out 300 batters in a season...Enos Cabell sets club marks for at-bats (660), games (162) and hits (195).

1980 Houston claims its first title as the Astros win the NL West with a 93-70 record, defeating Los Angeles in a one-game playoff...Niekro wins 20 games again...Joe Morgan returns to Houston to add leadership in the pennant drive.

1981 Houston gets off to a slow start, but takes advantage of the split season created by the player's strike to win the "second season" with a 33-20 mark, earning a spot in the playoffs...Nolan Ryan hurls his Major League record fifth no-hitter, blanking the Dodgers on Sept. 26...Ryan also leads the league with a 1.69 ERA...Art Howe establishes a then-club record 23-game hitting streak.

1982 Ray Knight, an offseason acquisition from Cincinnati for Cesar Cedeno, remains among the league leaders in hitting for most of the season, finishing with a . 294 mark...Bob Lillis takes over as interim manager on Aug. 10 and the Astros finish 28-23 under Lillis.

1983 The Astros rebound from an 0-9 start with one of their finest seasons, finishing 85-77, the third-highest win total in club history...Jose Cruz battles for NL batting title to the last day and finishes third...Nolan Ryan surpasses Walter Johnson's all-time strikeout mark.

1984 The Astros bounce back from another slow start, finishing second in the NL West... 1983 All-Star Dickie Thon is lost for the season in the fifth game after being hit in the head by a pitch from the Mets' Mike Torrez...Cruz repeats as the club MVP by posting a . 312 average and a career-high 95 RBI.

1985 The Astros celebrate the Astrodome's 20th Anniversary with a 2-1 Opening Day victory over the Dodgers in front of 42,876 fans...Joe Niekro becomes Houston's all-time winningest pitcher with his 5-0 shutout of San Francisco on June 9...Nolan Ryan becomes first player to record 4,000 strikeouts in a career when he fans Danny Heep on July 11 at the Astrodome...Jose Cruz reaches the 2,000 hit plateau on Sept. 15.


1986 A Silver Anniversary season turns golden as the Astros win their second NL West title...Rookie skipper Hal Lanier guides the team to a club-record 96 regular season wins, earning Manager of the Year notice from four different press associations...right-hander Mike Scott becomes Houston's first ever Cy Young Award winner, leading the league in ERA (2.22) and strikeouts (306), and winning 18 games for the second straight year.

1987 Houston finishes the season with the third-highest attendance total in baseball (1,909,902)...Nolan Ryan leads the Majors in strikeouts with 270 and ties for the lead in ERA with a 2.76 mark...Mike Scott is named the NL starter for the All-Star game and throws 2.0 scoreless innings.

1988 Houston wins its 2,000th game, 6-3, over San Diego on Opening Night...Mike Scott comes within one out of his second career no-hitter on June 12 vs. Atlanta...Bob Knepper tosses a one-hitter on Sept. 21 vs. the Braves.

Mike Scott becomes the fourth Houston pitcher to win 20 games and wins his second Astros MVP award...the Astros win 10 straight on the road from May 7-31 to set a club record...their 10-game winning streak from May 26 to June 4 ties another club mark...Glenn Davis hits a career-high 34 homers.

1990 Danny Darwin posts a league-leading 2.21 ERA, becoming the third Houston pitcher in five years to lead the NL in ERA...Franklin Stubbs sets club mark for left-handers with 23 home runs...Houston ties a league record by playing in 27 extra-inning games...on May 17, Eric Anthony becomes the first Astro to hit an upper deck home run since 1970.

Despite a grueling 26-day road trip made necessary when the Astrodome played host to the Republican National Convention, the Astros rally in the second half to post the club's first non-losing season since 1989...Craig Biggio became the first MLB player to make the All-Star team at both catcher (1991) and second base (1992)...Doug Jones is named to the All-Star team and sets the club single-season record with 36 saves.
The club establishes several franchise offensive records including batting average (.267), homers (138) and doubles (288)...paced by Craig Biggio's
 career-high 21 round-trippers, seven Houston players total double figures in homers for the first time in club history...Mark Portugal sets a club record by winning his final 12 decisions...Darryl Kile posts a ninegame win streak and tosses the ninth no-hitter in Astros history on Sept. 8 against New York.

Jeff Bagwell becomes the first Houston player to win the NL Most Valuable Player award...Bagwell becomes a unanimous selection for only the third time in league history after batting .368 and setting club records with 73 extra base hits, 39 homers and 116 RBI...Bagwell earns All-Star honors along with Craig Biggio, Ken Caminiti, Doug Drabek and rookie John Hudek...Rookie skipper Terry Collins guides the club to a 66-49 mark, one-half game behind Cincinnati, before a players' strike ends the season on Aug. 12.

1995 The Astros take the chase for the NL's first-ever Wild Card playoff berth to the final day of the season before finishing one game behind Colorado...Craig Biggio earns the vote for the NL's starting second baseman in the All-Star Game and slugs a solo homer...he later receives team MVP honors and wins a second consecutive Rawlings Gold Glove Award.

A two-and-a-half game lead at the end of August slips away and denies Houston a shot at the NL Central title... the Astros suffer through an 8-17 September, which includes a nine-game losing streak to fall out of the playoff chase...Jeff Bagwell slugs 31 homers and sets single season records with 48 doubles and 120 RBI...Derek Bell knocks in 113 runs, marking the first time the Astros had two 100-plus RBI players in the same season...Craig Biggio collects his third consecutive Rawlings Gold Glove Award...Shane Reynolds wins 16 games, while he and Darryl Kile each top the 200-mark in strikeouts.

The Astros capture their first-ever NL Central title and their first division title in 11 years...Jeff Bagwell bangs 43 homers and swipes 31 bases to become Houston's first "30-30" man...Craig Biggio becomes the first player in Major League history to not ground into a double play in a 162-game season...fans select Bagwell and Biggio to play in the 1997 All-Star Game...Darryl Kile wins a team-high 19 games and also gets selected to the All-Star Team...Larry Dierker becomes one of only six skippers in Major League history to win a division title in his first year as manager.

Houston wins its second consecutive NL Central title en route to a franchise-best 102-win season...Larry Dierker gets voted NL Manager of the Year by the BBWAA and Baseball America...General Manager Gerry Hunsicker is named The Sporting News Executive of the Year...Biggio and Moises Alou represent the Astros in the 1998 AllStar Game in Denver...Biggio breaks Cesar Cedeno's record for the most runs scored by an Astro...he and Alou each receive Silver Slugger Awards...five Astros starting pitchers, including Randy Johnson who is acquired just minutes before the July 31 non-waiver trading deadline, finish the season with double figures in wins.

The Astros bid adieu to the Astrodome in dramatic fashion, clinching their third straight NL Central title...the pitching staff produces two 20-game winners for the first time in club history in Mike Hampton (22-4) and Jose Lima (21-10)...Hampton and Jeff Bagwell both receive Silver Slugger Awards...four Astros get selected to represent the National League in the 70th annual All-Star Game (Bagwell, Hampton, Lima, Billy Wagner)...Wagner is the recipient of the 1999 Rolaids Relief Man Award.


The doors of sparkling-new Minute Maid Park open for the first time on March 30 before an exhibition game with the New York Yankees.... a record 3,056,139 fans pass through the turnstiles during the Astros inaugural season at their new ballpark....Houston finishes the season at 72-90 to mark the club's first sub-. 500 season since 1991...Bagwell ends the 2000 season having logged 310 career homers and becomes only the 87th Major Leaguer to reach the 300-homer plateau...Shane Reynolds is named to the All-Star team, marking his first career selection to the Mid-Summer Classic.

The Astros clinch their fourth division title in five years with a 9-2 win over the Cardinals on Oct. 7 in St. Louis... play stops throughout the sports world following the tragic terrorist attacks on September 11; the regular season gets extended a week....Moises Alou, Billy Wagner and Lance Berkman represent the Astros at the 72nd Mid-Summer Classic...Jeff Bagwell becomes the sixth player in MLB history to have 30 homers, 100 RBI and 100 runs scored in six consecutive seasons...manager Larry Dierker resigns and is replaced by former Red Sox skipper Jimy Williams...the Astros are named Organization of the Year by SportsTicker, Topps, Baseball America and Baseball Weekly...Brad Ausmus receives a Gold Glove award.

2002 By Houston standards, the 2002 season is a disappointment after the club finishes with an $84-78$ record...Wade Miller and Roy Oswalt combine for 34-13 on the year while stringing together 12-and nine-game winning streaks, respectively...Astros hurlers throw 10 shutouts at home to contribute to a 47-34 record at home...in May, the Astros retire Larry Dierker's No. 49 in a pregame ceremony...Lance Berkman represents the Astros at the 2002 All-Star game...Houston's ballpark was re-christened Minute Maid Park when the Astros announce an agreement with the local beverage giant for naming rights on June 5 ...Brad Ausmus wins his second consecutive Gold Glove Award.

Houston ends the season in second place, one game behind the division champ Chicago Cubs...on June 11 at Yankee Stadium, six Astros pitchers combine to no-hit the Yankees for the 8-0 win: Roy Oswalt, Pete Munro, Kirk Saarloos, Brad Lidge, Octavio Dotel and Billy Wagner...it is the first time in MLB history that a team used five or more pitchers in throwing a no-hitter...Wagner records a career-high and franchise-record 44 saves on the season and represents the team at the All-Star game...Jeriome Robertson sets the franchise rookie record with 15 wins, leading all MLB rookies.

Minute Maid Parkhosts the 2004 All-Star Game...Roger Clemens comes out of retirement and returns to his hometown to pitch - winning his first nine decisions, and on May 5, claiming the No. 2 slot on the all-time strikeout list with his 4,137th career strikeout...on May 8, Craig Biggio collects his 2,500th career hit... the Astros acquire outfielder Carlos Beltran on June 24, who finishes with a combined 38 home runs and 42 stolen bases between Houston and Kansas City...four Astros are named All-Stars: Clemens, Beltran, Lance Berkman, and Jeff Kent... on July 14, Phil Garner replaces Jimy Williams as manager... Houston claims the NL Wild Card and wins its first postseason series, defeating the Atlanta Braves in Game 5 of the NLDS...the NLCS gets pushed to Game 7 before St. Louis defeats Houston... Clemens claims his unprecedented seventh Cy Young Award.


The Astros advance to the World Series for the first time in franchise history after defeating St. Louis, 4-2, in a rematch of the 2004 NLCS...the Chicago White Sox go on to sweep the Astros in four games to claim their first World Series since 1917...the Astros host the first World Series game in the state of Texas, and Game 3 on Oct. 25 turns into the longest game in World Series history as the White Sox win in 14 innings, 7-5... Houston wins the NL Wild Card for the second season in a row, finishing in second place in the NL Central Division with a record of 89-73...the Astros win the longest game in postseason history, defeating Atlanta in the NLDS, $7-6$, in 18 innings after a Chris Burke solo home run in the bottom of the 18th, while Roger Clemens tosses 3.0 scoreless innings of relief...the club starts the season with a 2-21 record on the road, and overcomes a 15-30 record on May 24 to become the first team since the 1914 Boston Braves to make the postseason after falling to 15 games under .500...on June 29, Craig Biggio is hit by a pitch for the 268th time of his career, setting the modern MLB record...Roger Clemens returns to the Astros for a second year and finishes 13-8 with a career-best 1.89 ERA...Roy Oswalt posts his second consecutive 20-win season, finishing 20-12 with a 2.94 ERA...Andy Pettitte wins 17 games and records a career-low 2.39 ERA...for the second season in a row, four Astros are named to the All Star squad: Clemens, Oswalt, Brad Lidge and Morgan Ensberg...Ensberg sets career-highs in home runs and RBI, and takes home the National League Silver Slugger Award at third base...Willy Taveras makes the jump from Double A to the Majors and leads all NL rookies in hits, runs and steals...Taveras also leads the Majors with 70 infield hits and 29 bunt singles.

2007 The Astros finish 73-89, their lowest winning percentage since 2000 (.451), in fourth place in the NL Central...the Astros draw 3,000,000 fans to Minute Maid Park for the fourth time in franchise history...OF Carlos Lee is named team MVP after driving in
 a career-best 119 runs... Hunter Pence becomes the first rookie in Major League history to lead a league in hitting at the All-Star Break (.342)...Pence sets Houston franchise rookie records in doubles, extra-base hits, hitting, and slugging...on June 28, franchise icon Craig Biggio reaches the 3,000-hit plateau, all collected in an Astros uniform...on Sept. 20, Ed Wade is named the club's new General Manager, replacing Tim Purpura... just eight days later on Sept. 28, Wade and the Astros promote interim manager Cecil Cooper to the club's full-time managerial position...Cooper is originally named interim manager on Aug. 27, replacing Phil Garner.

The club finishes $86-75$, in third place in the NL Central and 11.0 games behind division-champion Chicago...Houston finishes 3.5 games behind Milwaukee in the NL Wild Card race and is not eliminated from playoff contention until the season's 159th game...Jose Valverde leads the National League with 44 saves and ties Billy Wagner's franchise single-season saves record, previously set in 2003...Roy Oswalt toes 17-10 and wins 10 of his last 12 starts.... Houston pitchers compile 13 shutouts, leading National League staffs...in May, Lance Berkman wins the NL Player of the Month Award after enjoying a 50 -at-bat span in which he hits $.620(31 \times 50)$ )..Berkman leads the league with a .345 average with runners in scoring position and ties the league lead with 46 doubles...the Astros commit 67 errors, the fewest errors for any team in National League history, anchored by shortstop Miguel Tejada.

The Astros play well through their first four months of the season, topping out at 49-46 and just 1.0 game out of first place on July 22...three new Astros emerge as stars, including center fielder Michael Bourn, right fielder Hunter Pence and left-handed starter Wandy Rodriguez...Bourn is named the Astros team MVP and is awarded a Gold Glove for his defensive work in the field....he becomes the first Astros center fielder to win a Gold Glove since Cesar Cedeno won the award in five straight seasons from 1972-76...he is also named as the recipient of the Cool Papa Bell Award from the Negro Leagues Baseball Museum after leading the National League in stolen bases...Pence is elected to his first career All-Star Game and leads all Major League outfielders with 16 outfield assists...he also becomes the first right fielder in club history to record consecutive $25+$ homer seasons...Rodriguez has a career year, leading the Astros pitching staff with a 14-12 record and a 3.02 ERA in 33 starts...other major contributors include Lance Berkman, Carlos Lee and Ivan "Pudge" Rodriguez, who become the first trio of teammates in MLB history to reach their 300th career home runs in the same season...Pudge also contributes to the record books by setting a new MLB record for games caught in a career when he catches his 2,227th game on June 17 at TEX.

2010 Despite their disappointing record, the Astros show steady improvement under first-year manager Brad Mills...the team loses its first eight games of the season, marking the second-slowest start in franchise history (0-9 in 1983)...the club bottoms out on May 31, dropping to 17-34 and in last place in the NL Central... Mills then guides the club to a 59-52 record through the remaining four months of the season...Jeff Bagwell joins the club as hitting coach at the All-Star Break...Roy Oswalt and first baseman Lance Berkman are both dealt in midseason trades that return J.A. Happ, Mark Melancon and Brett Wallace.... a free agent signing in the offseason, Brett Myers begins his campaign with a franchise record-setting 32 consecutive starts of 6.0 -or-more innings...Chris Johnson earns Astros Rookie of the Year honors after leading all Major League rookies in batting average ( min .300 ABs )...for the second consecutive year, center fielder Michael Bourn wins a Gold Glove and leads the National League in stolen bases.

2011 The Astros continue their rebuilding efforts in 2011, this time dealing Michael Bourn, Jeff Keppinger and Hunter Pence in July for a return of 10 prospects...Jose Altuve begins his season at High A Lancaster, hits a combined . 389 in the minor leagues and makes a rapid ascent to Houston in July...J.D. Martinez posts 28

RBI in August, his first full month in the Majors...Wandy Rodriguez wins 11 games on a team that lost 106 games on the season...following the season, the club is officially purchased by Houston businessman Jim Crane, who appoints George Postolos as President and CEO...Crane and Postolos make their first significant hire in Jeff Luhnow, who becomes the 12th general manager in club history.

In GM Jeff Luhnow's first season leading the Astros baseball operations, he makes a number of trades in an effort to build a pipeline of young talent...the Astros acquire 10 prospects in trading veterans Carlos Lee, Brett Myers, Wandy Rodriguez and Chris Johnson...Jose Altuve shines after leading the club in runs, hits, doubles, triples, extra-base hits and stolen bases while posting a .340 on-base percentage...Altuve is the Ione Astro to be named to the All-Star Team...Justin Maxwell leads the club in homers with 18 in his first season as an Astro...Lucas Harrell leads the club in wins, innings pitched and starts as a rookie, going 11-11... Tony DeFrancesco replaces manager Brad Mills on an interim basis after Mills is let go during the season... on Sept. 27, the Astros announce that Bo Porter will serve as the club's manager for the 2013 season.

2013 After 51 seasons in the National League, the Astros become an American League team...they are the first team in MLB history to move from the NL to the AL...the club makes its AL debut by defeating the Texas Rangers, 8-2, at Minute Maid Park on MLB Opening Night on March 31...Reid Ryan is named Astros President of Business Operations...Jason Castro becomes the first Astros catcher to make the All-Star team since Craig Biggio in 1991...Castro sets club records for a catcher in homers (18), doubles (35), slugging (.485), and OPS (.835), and also wins two Player of the Week awards...Houston has 14 players make their Major League debuts...RHP Jarred Cosart becomes the first pitcher in franchise history to throw 8.0 shutout innings in his Major League debut (July 12 at TB)...Brandon Barnes hits for the cycle on July 19 vs. SEA, going $5 \times 5$...the Astros purchase the Double A Corpus Christi Hooks on Sept. 30.

The Astros make a 19-game improvement, winning 70 games on the year...a core of young stars begin to emerge as Jose Altuve (24), George Springer (25), Dallas Keuchel (26), and Collin McHugh (27) all turn in excellent seasons...Altuve wins the first batting title in club history, leading the Majors in batting average (.341)...Altuve establishes a single-season franchise record for hits (225), surpassing Craig Biggio's mark of 210 set in 1998 ... his 225 hits are the most in a season for a second baseman since Charlie Gehringer (227) in 1936, and the most ever for a Venezuelan-born player...Altuve represents the Astros at the All-Star Game... he is the first MLB player since 1945 to lead his league in hits, batting and steals, and becomes the first player to reach 220+ hits, 40+ doubles, and 50+ stolen bases in one season since Ty Cobb (1917)...Keuchel becomes the first pitcher in club history to win a Gold Glove Award, and posts a 12-9 record with a 2.93 ERA from the mound...Springer blasts 20 home runs, one shy of the Astros rookie record....he also earns AL Rookie of the Month honors in May after becoming the second rookie player in baseball's modern era to hit seven home runs over a seven-game span...Collin McHugh leads AL rookies in ERA (2.73, min. 100IP)...Chris Carter finishes second in the Majors in homers with 37...following the season on Sept. 29, the Astros name former MLB catcher and manager A.J. 2015 The Astros snap a 10-year postseason drought, defying outside expectations by going 86-76 (.531) in AJ Hinch's first season as Astros manager... franchise icon Craig Biggio gets inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame...the Astros spend the majority of the season in first place (139 days) in the AL West division, ultimately finishing in second by 2.0 games...the club clinches an AL Wild Card spot on the final day of the season...Houston then defeats the Yankees at Yankee Stadium, 3-0, in the AL Wild Card Game before taking the eventual World Series Champion Kansas City Royals to five games in a back-and-forth ALDS...the Astros get off to a scorching start and post franchise-best records through several game numbers early in the season,
 including game 25 (18-7), 26 (18-8), 40 (26-14), 41 (27-14), 47 (30-17), 54 (34-20) and 55 (34-21)...the pitching staff leads the AL in ERA (3.57) while posting the second-highest strikeout total in club history ( 1,280 )... 11 Astros hit double digit homers, which ties a Major League record set by Detroit in 2004...the club leads the AL in steals (121) and ranks second in MLB in home runs (230)...Dallas Keuchel becomes the third pitcher in franchise history to win a Cy Young Award after leading the AL with 20 wins and ranking second in ERA (2.48)...Keuchel also wins three AL Pitcher of the Month awards and his second consecutive Rawlings Gold Glove Award...Carlos Correa makes his MLB debut

in June and wins AL Rookie of the Year honors, setting a club rookie-record and leading all MLB shortstops in homers with 22...Jose Altuve, Keuchel and Hinch represent Houston at the All-Star Game...Altuve wins a Silver Slugger Award and a Gold Glove Award...Lance McCullers leads all AL rookies in WAR (2.8), posting a 3.22 ERA in 22 starts...Mike Fiers throws the first no-hitter in Minute Maid Park history on Aug. 21 vs. the Dodgers...Collin McHugh wins 19 games.

The Astros post consecutive winning records for the first time since 2005-06, but miss the postseason by 5.0 games after finishing 84-78...an abysmal April (7-17) hamstrings the club throughout the season, as the Astros 77-61 (.558) finish over their final 138 games fails to push them into the playoffs...Jose Altuve is named the Sporting News Player of the Year and finishes third in the AL MVP voting after hitting .338 with 42 doubles, 24 homers, 96 RBI and a . 928 OPS...Altuve wins his second batting title, second Silver Slugger and is named to his fourth All-Star Team (second start)...Dallas Keuchel wins his third consecutive Rawlings Gold Glove Award...Will Harris is named to the All-Star Game for the first time in his career...Carlos Correa hits 20 home
 all 162 games, while hitting a career-high 29 homers, eight of which were leadoff shots (ties a club record)... In the Astros 56th season of play, the club wins its first World Series Championship after winning 101 regular season games, the second-highest total in club history...Houston also takes home its first Division Title since 2001...Jeff Bagwell is inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame...the Astros down the Red Sox in the ALDS (four games), the Yankees in the ALCS (seven games) and the Dodgers in the World Series (seven games) in one of the most thrilling postseason runs in recent memory...the Astros were dominant at home in the postseason, going $8-1$ and becoming the second team in MLB history to win eight home games in a single postseason...Houston hit 27 postseason

## HISTORY AND RECORDS

ASTROS STADIUM HISTORY


Colt Stadium served as the home to Houston's first Major League Baseball franchise: the Colt .45 s . The outdoor, single-deck facility was constructed as a temporary home until a domed stadium would be completed. It was in operation for three seasons, from 1962-1964, and was witness to two no-hitters, both by the Colts: Don Nottebart in 1962 and Ken Johnson in 1963. High heat and humidity moved many games to late afternoon starts and pushed the National League to lift its ban on Sunday night games. It was located in what is now the Astrodome's north parking lot.


By the time the Astrodome opened on April 9, 1965, for an exhibition game between the Houston Astros and New York Yankees, it was already heralded as the "Eighth Wonder of the World." The largest structure of its kind and the world's first multi-purpose domed stadium, the Astrodome came to symbolize the futuristic home of professional sports in America. In honor of Houston's significance to the country's space program, it was appropriately named the Astrodome, and to maintain the theme, the Colt . 45 s were proudly renamed the Astros. AstroTurf was developed and installed to start the 1966 campaign after natural grass was unsuccessful. It served as the Astros home for 35 seasons.

## ASTRDS FORD C. FRICK AWARD WINNERS

The Ford C. Frick Award is presented annually by the Baseball Hall of Fame to a broadcaster for "major contributions to baseball." The award, named after the late broadcaster, National League President, Commissioner, and Hall of Famer, has been presented annually since 1978. Frick was a driving force behind the creation of the Hall of Fame in Cooperstown and he helped foster the relationship between radio and the game of baseball.

The Ford C. Frick Award is presented annually during the Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony. Each award recipient (not to be confused with an inductee) is presented with a calligraphy of the award during the Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony and is recognized in the "Scribes \& Mikemen" exhibit in the Library of the National Baseball Hall of Fame.
HARRY KALAS (Astros broadcaster fiom 1965-197)


Harry Kalas, longtime announcer for the Philadelphia Phillies, was the 2002 recipient of the Ford C. Frick Award. A native of Naperville, III., Kalas graduated from the University of lowa in 1959 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Speech, Radio, and Television. The affable broadcaster was drafted into the military on graduation day and spent the following two years in Hawaii with the U.S. Army. In 1961, he served as sports director of radio station KGU and also began broadcasting for the Pacific Coast League's Hawaii Islanders as well as the University of Hawaii. An original member of the Astros broadcast team in 1965, he called games for Houston until 1970. In 1971, he moved to the Phillies broadcast booth, where he shared the microphone with Hall of Fame outfielder Richie Ashburn for 26 seasons. Kalas was honored as Pennsylvania Sportscaster of the Year 18 times. He also broadcast Big Five basketball and Notre Dame football. Kalas, revered for his uncanny ability to connect with his listeners, whether on radio or television, called more than 5,000 Phillies games. His passion for the game was unsurpassed, and his powerful, soothing voice was a summertime tradition throughout Pennsylvania, Delaware and New Jersey.

GENE ELSTON*
(Astros broadcaster from 1962-1986)


Gene Elston's baseball broadcasting career spanned 47 years, primarily as a radio announcer. The 2006 recipient of the Ford C. Frick Award, delivered baseball to a new legion of fans as the lead voice of the expansion Houston Astros for 25 years, from their beginnings as the 1962 Colt .45 s , through their 1986 National League West Division championship. While his voice became a beacon to fans in Texas and the Southwest, Elston's broadcasting responsibilities also included numerous national assignments. Elston broke into radio as a high school basketball broadcaster in 1941 in Fort Dodge, lowa. After serving in the Navy during World War II, he returned to the small midwest stations he knew so well. His break came in 1945 when he handled color commentary for the National Football League's Cleveland Rams. His entry into baseball came in 1946, when Elston was hired to call games for the Waterloo White Hawks of the Three I League. Three years later, he was named play-by-play for Des Moines of the Western League. In 1954 he made the major leagues as the number two man for the Chicago Cubs. In 1958, Elston was chosen to work with Bob Feller for Mutual's Game of the Day, which aired over 350 stations across the country, a position he held through 1960. In 1961, as baseball was expanding, he was the first announcer to handle play-by-play duties for the Houston franchise. He went on to work the CBS Radio Game of the Week from 1987-1995 and CBS postseason games from 1995-1997. A Texas Baseball Hall of Fame inductee, Elston also created a unique scorebook, Gene Elston's Stati-Score Baseball Scorebook, and authored two books, including the 2001 release, A Stitch in Time: A Baseball Chronology, 1845-2000.

## MILO HAMILTON*

(Astros broadcaster from 1985-2012)


Milo Hamilton, the 1992 recipient of the Ford C. Frick Award, broadcast Major League baseball for more than 40 years. His big league on-air career included stops with the St. Louis Browns (1953), St. Louis Cardinals (1954), Chicago Cubs (1956-57 and 1980-84), Chicago White Sox (1962-65), Atlanta Braves (1966-75), Pittsburgh Pirates (1976-79), and Houston Astros (1985-2012). It was no coincidence that he was behind the microphone for more historic baseball events than any other announcer. His smooth style appealed to his listeners and his knowledge of the game has earned him the respect of his peers. Among the milestones he broadcast were Hank Aaron's 715th home run, Ernie Banks' fifth grand-slam of the 1955 season, seven no-hitters and Roger Maris' 61 st homer (recreated on Western Union ticker). He was also on the Cardinals' broadcast crew when Stan Musial hit his record-breaking fifth home run in a doubleheader and he was doing the play-by-play 18 years later when San Diego's Nate Colbert duplicated Musial's feat. Wherever he has been, Hamilton involved himself in fund-raising activities, and over the years he helped raise over $\$ 1.5$ million for local charities. Born in Fairfield, lowa, on Sept. 2, 1927, Hamilton graduated from the University of lowa with a degree in radio speech. Milo shared the broadcast booth with numerous other Frick Award winners, including Jack Brickhouse, Bob Elson, Harry Caray and Jack Buck.

## THE HOUSTON BASEBALL MEDIA WALL OF HONOR

Each season, the Houston Baseball Media Wall of Honor, located on the club level at Minute Maid Park, inducts a current or former Houston media member who has made significant and lasting contributions to the landscape of Houston baseball through their work in journalism or broadcasting.

## ANITA MARTINI ${ }_{\text {(inaugural, } 2007 \text { inductee) }}$



The inaugural inductee into the Houston Baseball Media Wall of Honor was the late Anita Martini, a pioneer in the sports media field. Martini, a native of Galveston, was a pioneer for women in sports journalism. Martini began her career with Houston radio station KTRH during the 1960s and became the nation's first woman sports anchor in the early 1970s, at Houston television station KPRC. In 1974, she challenged Major League Baseball for the right to join her male colleagues in the clubhouse for post-game interviews with the players. Martini won her fight when she interviewed Jimmy Wynn in the Los Angeles Dodgers clubhouse after a game at the Houston Astrodome. By the 1980s, she was hosting one of the first call-in sports shows on Houston AM radio station KPRC. She died of cancer in 1993 at the age of 54. Martini also is an inductee of the Texas Baseball Hall of Fame.
(2008 inductee)


Elston broadcast Major League Baseball games in Houston for 25 years as the Voice of the Astros from 1962-1986. He was behind the microphone for the first game in franchise history on April 10, 1962, when the Colt .45s defeated the Chicago Cubs. Elston was the first play-by-play broadcaster for the Houston franchise, and a generation of baseball fans received their introductions to both the Astros and Major League Baseball by his broadcasts. Elston broadcast baseball for 47 years, beginning with Waterloo of the Triple I League in 1947. After nine seasons broadcasting minor league baseball, Elston made his Major League debut with the Chicago Cubs in 1954. He also called the Mutual "Game of the Week" from 1958-60 and the CBS Radio "Game of the Week" from 1987-97. In 2006, Elston was honored with the Ford C. Frick Award from the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum for his significant and lasting contributions to the game of baseball through his work in broadcasting. Among the highlights of Elston's career with the Astros included calling eight of the team's no-hitters, two Astros NL Western Division Championships $(1980,1986)$, and Nolan Ryan breaking Walter Johnson's all-time strikeout record in 1983. He was inducted in the Texas Baseball Hall of Fame in 1993.

NEIL HOHLFELD (2009 inductee)


Hohlfeld covered the Houston Astros as the beat writer for the Houston Chronicle from 1979 until 1995. He served as president of the Houston chapter of the Baseball Writers Association of America in 1993. In 1996, Hohlfeld went on to cover other sports, including Texas A\&M athletics and NASCAR, through 2006 before assuming an editing assignment for the Chronicle. In 2007, he returned to his first love as a baseball analyst for FS Houston's pre- and post-game shows. Hohlfeld graduated from the University of Missouri with a Bachelor of Journalism in 1973 and began his career in Hannibal, Mo. He worked for the Chicago Tribune from 1974-79 before joining the Chronicle in 1979. Hohlfeld passed away on July 19, 2008 at the age of 56 . He was honored by the Houston chapter of the BBWAA as the recipient of the 2008 Fred Hartman Long and Meritorious Service Award.

MICKEY HERSKOWITZ ${ }_{\text {(2010 inductee) }}$


Herskowitz was one of Houston's original beat writers and columnists, having covered the team since its inception in 1962. He wrote for both the Houston Post and Houston Chronicle. A graduate of the University of Houston, at age 26, Herskowitz became the nation's youngest sports editor of a major newspaper and later received international recognition for his coverage of the terrorist tragedy at the 1972 Munich Olympics. He was the first writer to win national first place awards in three Associated Press categories in one year, 1968. In addition to his journalism career, Herskowitz has authored books on historical figures, such as Gene Autry, Nolan Ryan, Paul"Bear"Bryant and Prescott Bush. He was also the ghostwriter of several autobiographies, including Dan Rather and Mickey Mantle. A former Marine, he has been inducted into the Houston Chamber of Commerce Hall of Fame, and received the national Headliners Award for excellence in sports writing. Herskowitz is also a former executive with the American Football League; a New York magazine editor; an original partner in the Houston Rockets; and a journalism professor at Sam Houston State University. He was inducted into the Texas Baseball Hall of Fame in 1997.

## THE HOUSTON BASEBALL MEDIA WALL DF HONOR

## BILL BROWN

(2011 inductee)


Bill Brown was the Houston Astros play-by-play announcer for 30 seasons. Brown, also known as "Brownie," was inducted into the Texas Baseball Hall of Fame on Nov. 12, 2004. He joined the Astros in 1987 after working as senior producer and anchor of the Financial News Network's SCORE program. Prior to that assignment, he was the sports director of the Sports Time Cable Network, which televised select Reds, Royals and Cardinals games. He spent one year with HSE in Pittsburgh and was the television voice of the Cincinnati Reds from 1976-82. Brown, who began his broadcast career on radio at 18 years old, graduated from the University of Missouri in 1969 and became a U.S. Army broadcast specialist, working as a sportscaster for the Armed Forces Vietnam Network in Saigon from 1970-71. After leaving the service in 1971, Brown completed one semester of graduate school at Central Missouri State College in 1971 and then earned a job at WLWT-TV in Cincinnati. Brown has broadcast for two teams in the World Series, the 1976 Reds and the 2005 Astros. He also called Craig Biggio's historic 3,000th hit in 2007, as well as many other memorable moments during both his Astros broadcasting tenure and overall broadcasting career.


Hall of Fame broadcaster Milo Hamilton spent a total of 59 seasons broadcasting Major League Baseball, which ranked as the second-longest broadcasting career in the game's history. A member of the Texas Baseball Hall of Fame, Hamilton has also been recognized by the National Baseball Hall of Fame, having won the Ford C. Frick Award in 1992. As an Astros broadcaster, he called many of the greatest moments in franchise history, including Nolan Ryan's 4,000th strikeout in 1985, the final out of Mike Scott's dramatic, division-clinching no-hitter in 1986, the Astros historic, six-pitcher, combined no-hitter at Yankee Stadium in 2003, the Astros 2005 Game 6 NLCS clincher, and Craig Biggio's 3,000th hit in 2007. Prior to joining Houston, Hamilton had already established himself as a top broadcaster in the game, having called Hank Aaron's historic 715th home run on April 8, 1974. His career accomplishments also include calling games at 59 Major League ballparks, being behind the mic for 11 no-hitters and broadcasting for the Pirates during their 1979 World Series championship season. At the conclusion of the 2012 campaign, he retired from his position as "The Voice of the Astros", having established himself as one of the all-time great broadcasters in Major League Baseball history.

RENE CARDENAS ${ }_{(2013 \text { inductee) }}$


Cardenas, a native of Managua, Nicaragua, started his professional baseball broadcast career with the Los Angeles Dodgers in 1958, becoming one of the first members of a Spanish radio broadcast team in the history of Major League Baseball. In the coming years, Cardenas further made history as a pioneer, as he and his team became the first Spanish radio broadcast team to call a World Series (1959) and an All-Star Game (1961). Cardenas was brought into the Houston organization by Judge Roy Hofheinz in 1962 as the Director of the Spanish Division for the Colt . 45 's, and stayed with the Astros through 1975. He also spent time with the Texas Rangers organization, where he started their very first Spanish radio broadcast. Following his time in Arlington, Cardenas returned to LA where he did Spanish radio and TV broadcasts for the Dodgers in the 1980s. Cardenas returned to Houston in 2000 where he began writing for the club. He returned to Spanish radio broadcast in 2007 and in 2008, became a television broadcaster for the team. He now writes for La Prensa, as well as the Astros Gameday Magazine and La Voz. Among his many honors are a place in both the Texas Rangers and former LA Dodgers Walks of Fame, and three nominations for the Ford C. Frick award in 1993, 2010 and 2011.

## THE HOUSTON BASEBALL MEDIA WALL DF HONOR

## ALEX TREVIND (2014 inductee)



Alex Treviño became a distinguished member of the Houston Baseball Media Wall of Honor on Thursday, Sept. 18, 2014, in what was his 19th year in the Astros Spanish radio booth .He joined the broadcast team in 1996 and has called over 3,000 Astros games and six postseason appearances, including the 2005 World Series run. As of 2014, his 19 seasons in the broadcast booth were the second-most in franchise history by a Spanish broadcaster, trailing only Orlando Sanchez Diago's 21 years. Prior to joining the broadcast staff, Treviño spent 13 seasons in the Majors, primarily as a catcher, including the 1988-90 seasons with the Astros. He also spent time with the Mets, Reds, Braves, Giants and Dodgers in his Major League career. Treviño finished his playing career in the Mexican League, playing three seasons (1993-95) in his hometown of Monterrey, Mexico. Treviño was a member of the 1972 Pony League World Series championship team, which hailed from Monterrey. He later would become one of seven Mexican-born players to play for the Astros, and was inducted into the Hispanic Heritage Baseball Museum Hall of Fame in 2003.

## HARRY SHATTUCK (2015 inductee)



Long-time sportswriter for the Houston Chronicle, Harry Shattuck, was inducted into the Houston Baseball Media Wall of Honor on Sept. 23, 2015. Shattuck covered the Astros beat for the Houston Chronicle for several seasons. Shattuck worked in the newspaper business for the Houston Chronicle for parts of four decades from 1970-2009. He began covering the Astros in 1970 and served as the Chronicle's beat writer from 1972-1985. He moved on to serve as the Chronicle's national baseball writer (1985-88), the assistant sports editor (1989-93) and the travel editor (1993-09) before his retirement. In his distinguished career, Shattuck covered 14 World Series, was the former chairman of the Houston Chapter of the BBWAA and voted for the Baseball Hall of Fame for over 30 years. While on the Astros beat, Shattuck covered the team during the tumultuous change in team ownership in 1976 and during the Astros 1980's playoff appearances.

## MARK BERMAN

On Monday, Sept. 26, 2016, long-time sports director at KRIV-TV Mark Berman was inducted into the Houston Baseball Media Wall of Honor. Berman has spent over 30 years at KRIV-TV in Houston, having joined the Houston FOX affiliate in 1986 and being named the station's sports director in 1988. In his role, Berman covers all sports in the Houston area, including professional, collegiate and high school athletics. A leader in his industry, Berman is best known for his relentless work ethic, his professionalism and his accuracy in breaking stories. Since joining the Houston media, Berman has covered every Astros playoff team in franchise history (1980-81, 1986, 1997-99, 2001, 2004-05, 2015), including the club's World Series appearance in 2005. Berman grew up in Hempstead, Texas, and graduated from the University of Houston with a degree in communications.


Houston sports anchor and director Bob Allen was inducted into the Houston Baseball Media Wall of Honor on Sept. 17, 2017. One of the most iconic members of the Houston media market, Allen sadly passed away in October of 2016 after a lengthy battle with cancer. Allen spent 38 years as sports director at ABC13 News (KTRK) after getting named to the post in 1975, making him the longest tenured major market sports anchor in the country. He also spent two years as sports director at KHOU 11 News following his run with KTRK. During his career, Allen covered virtually all of the Astros postseason runs, all five ownership groups in the history of the Houston franchise, the construction and opening of Minute Maid Park, the Astros first appearance in a World Series and Craig Biggio's 3,000th hit and Hall of Fame selection. A native of Houston, Allen was committed to giving back to his community, as he was an enthusiastic supporter and board member of both the Sunshine Kids organization and the Special Olympics.

Former Astros player and general manager Bob Watson scored the millionth run in Major League Baseball history in 1975. Watson was on base for Houston when Milt May slugged a home run against the Giants at Candlestick Park on May 4.

## ASTROS HOME RUNS IN HOUSTON

On May 11, 1998, Jeff Bagwell hit his 98th Astrodome home run off the Marlins' Livan Hernandez to put the first baseman one ahead of outfielder Jimmy Wynn, whose 97 Houston homers were the most by any player in the history of the franchise. Bagwell eventually hit 126 home runs in the Astrodome before the Astros moved to Minute Maid Park in 2000. Wynn hit 93 of his roundtrippers in the Astrodome and four in Colt Stadium during his 11-year career which lasted from 1963-73. And, speaking of Colt Stadium, the record for Houston homers in that facility stands at 21 by Bob Aspromonte.

## HOUSTON <br> $\qquad$ . 3 GAMES BOSTON 1 GAME

The Astros beat the Red Sox in a four-game ALDS behind two 8-2 victories in Games 1 and 2 in Houston and a thrilling 5-4 win in Game 4 at Boston. The series victory was just the fourth in franchise history and the first since they won the NLCS over the Cardinals in 2005.

Houston took the first two ALDS games by scores of 8-2, both of which were played at Minute Maid Park. Per Elias, Houston became the third team in Major League history to win each of the first two games of a postseason series by six or more runs. Also, the Yankees won the first two games of the 1937 World Series against the Giants by identical 8-1 scores and the Orioles beat the Mariners in the first two games of the 1997 ALDS by identical scores of 9-3.

Jose Altuve hit three home runs in Game 1, becoming the ninth player in Major League history (10th time) to hit three homers in a postseason game and the first since Pablo Sandoval in the 2012 World Series. He was also the first player in franchise history to hit three home runs in a postseason game and the third player in franchise history with a multi-homer game in the postseason, joining Carlos Correa (2015) and Carlos Beltrán (2004).

In Game 3 of the ALDS, 1B Yuli Gurriel became the fourth player in franchise history to collect four hits in a postseason game, joining SS Carlos Correa (2015 ALDS, G4), CF Carlos Beltrán (2004 NLDS, G5) and CF Terry Puhl ( 1980 NLCS, G5).

Game 4 of the ALDS featured a little bit of everything, including relief appearances from two of the best starters in the Majors (RHP Justin Verlander, LHP Chris Sale), a game-tying homer by 3B Alex Bregman and a game-winning single by RF Josh Reddick in the 8th inning.

The Astros beat the Yankees in a thrilling seven-game ALCS in which every game was won by the home team. In Major League history, this had only happened on four other occasions in a seven-game postseason series: the 2004 NLCS (Cardinals over Astros), the 2001 WS (Diamondbacks over Yankees), the 1991 WS (Twins over Braves) and the 1987 WS (Twins over Cardinals).

Houston dazzled in their four games at Minute Maid Park, allowing the Yankees to score no more than one run in each contest. The Astros became the second team in MLB history to hold their opponent to one or fewer runs in four home games of a postseason series, also done by the Cleveland Indians in the 1920 World Series vs. the Brooklyn Robins.

Justin Verlander was named the ALCS MVP after going 2-0 with a 0.56 ERA (1ER/16IP) in two starts, striking out 21 while allowing only 10 hits and two walks. He pitched an epic Game 2, tossing a complete game, allowing just one run on five hits with 13 strikeouts.

In Games 1 and 2 of the ALCS, LHP Dallas Keuchel (10K) and RHP Justin Verlander (13K) became the third and fourth pitchers in Astros history to record double-digit strikeout games in the postseason. They joined RHP Mike Scott (14K) and RHP Nolan Ryan (12K), who did so in Games 1 and 5 of the 1986 NLCS.

Lance McCullers Jr. pitched the Astros to the World Series in Game 7 of the ALCS, tossing a final 4.0 scoreless innings, while allowing just one hit and one walk, en-route to the Astros $4-0$ win over the Yankees. It marked his first career save (regular or postseason) and the seventh save of at least 4.0 scoreless innings in postseason history. McCullers also become the only pitcher in MLB history to record six strikeouts and earn the save in a postseason appearance. He threw 24 straight curveballs to end the game.

## HOUSTON <br> DODGERS <br> . 4 GAMES

The Astros and Dodgers played one of the most-thrilling Fall Classics in MLB history, with Houston topping LA in seven games. The series featured two extra-inning games (both Astros wins) and 25 combined homers, which set a new record for a single World Series. The Houston Astros, in the franchise's 56th season of play (established in 1962), won the first World Series title in franchise history.

The Astros and Dodgers made quick work in Game 1 of the World Series, with a game time of two hours and 28 minutes. That was the shortest World Series game since Game 4 of the 1992 World Series between the Braves and Blue Jays in Toronto (2:21).

Game 2 was an instant classic in Los Angeles, with Houston coming out on top, $7-6$, in 11 innings. Four different Astros hit home runs, none bigger than George Springer, who hit a tworun homer in the top of the 11th. Chris Devenski earned the first World Series win in Astros franchise history.

Houston hosted an epic Game 5, with the Astros topping the Dodgers 13-12 in 10 innings. Both teams finished with 14 hits, capped off by a walkoff single from Alex Bregman $(2 \times 5)$ in the 10th frame. Per Elias, prior to Bregman, the last player to drive in a run in his first five World Series games was Amos Otis of the 1980 Royals. Additionally, five Astros homered in the contest, marking the first time in MLB history for a team to have five players hit a homer in a single World Series game.

George Springer was named the 2017 World Series MVP after hitting .379 (11x29) with five home runs and seven RBI. Springer homered in four straight World Series games (Games 4-7), becoming the first player to do so in a single World Series. All five of his homers came out of the leadoff spot in the order, which also marked a new World Series record.

## ALL-STAR GAME \#3s | ASTRODOME. HOUSTON | JULY S. 1968



The 1968 All-Star Game reflected overpowering pitching. The two leagues combined for only eight hits and just one run, marking the first 1-0 contest in the history of the Midsummer Classic. The lone run - by the National League - was scored in the 1st inning on a single, an error, a wild pitch, and a double play.

Playing for the injured Pete Rose, Willie Mays led off in the bottom of the 1 st and singled to left field. In a failed pick-off at first, Luis Tiant's (CLE) throw went wild, advancing Mays to second. Curt Flood (STL) was then walked, and a fourth-ball wild pitch moved Mays to third. First baseman Willie McCovey (SF) grounded into a double play, but Mays took advantage to score the only run of the game.

With the victory, the NL stretched its winning streak to six. The sixman NL pitching staff held the AL to just three hits, as Tom Seaver (NYM) tossed five strikeouts late in the game and Juan Marichal pitched 2.0 perfect innings. Nine pitchers in the game did not allow a single walk.

The game was the first played indoors and on an artificial surface, as many players got their first look at the Astrodome.

Los Angeles left-hander Fernando Valenzuela fanned five consecutive batters to tie Carl Hubbell's 52-yearold All-Star record, but the National League's pitching triumphs weren't enough as the American League recorded the 3-2 victory on two home runs.

The NL pitching staff sat down 12 total batters, but the AL's Roger Clemens (BOS) had a strong night of his own. He tossed 3.0 perfect innings which included just three balls and 21 strikes. The AL bats came through at the same time as second baseman Lou Whitaker (DET) followed a Dave Winfield (NYY) double with a two-run shot off Dwight Gooden (NYM) in the 2nd. In the 7th inning, Frank White (KC) came in to pinch-hit for Whitaker, knocking an 0-2 pitch from Mike Scott (HOU) over the left-center field wall to seal the AL's second All-Star win in the 1980s.

Valenzuela tied the 1934 record for consecutive strikeouts, setting down (in order): Don Mattingly, Cal Ripken, Jesse Barfield, Whitaker, and Ted Higuera.

The American League displayed its offensive prowess early, scoring six runs in the 1st inning en route to a 9-4 win over the National League in the third All-Star Game played in Houston and the first at Minute Maid Park.

Astros right-hander Roger Clemens, who also started the 1986 All-Star Game in Houston, allowed six runs and five hits in suffering the loss. Clemens allowed two 1st-inning homers, to Manny Ramirez (BOS) and Alfonso Soriano (TEX). Mark Mulder (OAK) pitched 2.0 innings and allowed one run to earn the win. Soriano was named the game's Most Valuable Player after finishing $2 \times 3$ with three RBI. Soriano was the first leading vote-getter to also earn MVP honors in the same season.

The National League cut the lead to 7-4 with a three-run 4th, including an RBI double by Edgar Renteria (STL) and a two-run double by Albert Pujols (STL). David Ortiz' (BOS) homer against Carl Pavano (FLA) in the 6th ended the game's scoring.

The AL pitching staff held the NL scoreless through the final 5.0 innings, thanks to scoreless efforts from Javier Vazquez (NYY), Ted Lilly (TOR), Joe Nathan (MIN), Tom Gordon (NYY), Francisco Rodriguez (ATL), and Mariano Rivera (NYY).

The American League won its seventh consecutive victory, not counting the 2002 tie at Miller Park in Milwaukee. The NL remained winless since 1996.

## MEDIA INFORMATION

## CREDENTIALS

The Houston Astros utilize MLB's online credentialing system. All media credential requests and applications for coverage of the Houston Astros must go through MLB's online credentialing system at http://credentials.mlb.com. Additionally, all 2018 credentials - whether issued by Major League Baseball, the BBWAA, or the Astros - will bear photographs. Scout identification cards will also require photos.

- Houston Astros season credentials will be issued only to those legitimate news-gathering agencies that cover the Astros on a daily basis. Daily passes will be issued to approved media members who do not qualify for season credentials and who meet Major League Baseball's policies for media access. Requests for daily credentials must come directly from the affiliation editor, producer or director, via the online credential system at least $\mathbf{2 4}$ hours in advance of the game being requested. CREDENTIALS MUST BE DISPLAYED IN A VISIBLE MANNER AT ALL TIMES.
- ALL credential requests, whether season or daily, must go through MLB's online credential system. This will also be the process for Astros regular season, Spring Training, Wild Card and American League Division Series credential applications.
- Daily credentials will be available at the First Base Entrance, located in the Diamond Lot near the intersection of Preston and Hamilton Streets, four hours prior to first pitch.
- No spouses, guests or children of media members will be issued passes.
- Credentials are not transferable.
- Credentialed media are also prohibited from requesting autographs. Any violations will result in the immediate revocation of the credential.
- Credentials may be revoked at any time without cause.

SECURITY:To comply with security measures implemented by Major League Baseball and the Houston Astros, all media will be required to follow the following procedures upon entering Minute Maid Park and while covering the game.
When entering Minute Maid Park, please be prepared to:

- Enter the ballpark at the First Base Entrance, located in the Diamond Lot near the intersection of Preston and Hamilton Streets.
- Provide photo identification.
- Sign in at the media entrance.
- Allow bags to be searched upon entering the ballpark.

While covering the game, please be prepared to:

- Clearly display working credentials at all times.
- Allow bags and equipment cases to be randomly searched if requested by ballpark security officials.
- Observe credential regulations as set forth by Major League Baseball and the Houston Astros. Only those individuals with the proper credentials will be admitted in the clubhouses, on the field and in the press box.


## MEDIA SERVICES

PARKING: Working media may park in the B and C lots at Minute Maid Park with a season credential, BBWAA credential or media identification badge. Entrances to these lots are located on St. Emanuel St., Preston St. and Texas Ave.
MAIN PRESS BOX: The press box and broadcast booths are located on the Honda Club Level behind home plate and are accessible from the press box elevator and the elevator at the First Base Entrance (level C) prior to the opening of gates and after the game. The escalators on the main concourse are available at all times.
MEDIA DINING ROOM: Media dining is located in the press box on the Honda Club Level just behind the broadcast booths. There is a $\$ 12$ charge per meal. Media dining is open for service 2.5 hours prior to first
 pitch to accredited members of the media. Spouses/children are not allowed in the media dining room. Cash and credit card accepted. CLUBHOUSES: Both clubhouses are located on the Service Level and are accessible via the press box elevator. The Astros clubhouse is located on the first base side of the ballpark, while the visiting teams and umpires are on the third base side. Pre- and postgame access rules are determined by Major League Baseball. The Astros clubhouse opens approximately four hours before game time and closes once the team takes the field for batting practice. When the team does not hit outside or under unusual circumstances, the Astros will use their discretion on when to open and close the clubhouse. All times are approximate and subject to change.

## General clubhouse rules include:

- Absolutely no autographs or gifts of any kind.
- No still photography in the clubhouse.
- When shooting video interviews, please make sure it is only of the player at his locker or in front of a wall while he is giving the interview. Players should be shot from the chest up.

FIELD: All media must leave the field 45 minutes prior to the first pitch. No person will be allowed on the field unless that individual has credentials expressly specifying field privileges (i.e., club pass, photo pass).
PHOTOGRAPHERS/PHOTO WELLS: In-game access to photo wells is limited to still photographers and rightsholders broadcasting the game. There are four photo wells, located on either side of both the home and visiting dugouts. All photographers must remain in the photo wells while the game is in progress. Photographers are only permitted to change location between innings. No ball - in play or dead - should be handled by anyone other than a ballboy.
PHOTO ROOM: A photo room is located on the Service Level behind home plate.
PRESS CONFERENCE ROOM: The press conference room is located on the Service Level across from the home clubhouse down the first-base side.
NOTES: Game notes, updated Major League statistics, lineup sheets and other pertinent media information will be available near the entrance of the press box on the Honda Club Level two hours prior to first pitch. Box scores, play-by-play sheets and postgame notes will be available in the same area after each game.
MEDIA GUIDES: Media guides are available upon request in the press box from Astros Communications staff members and are available online at the MLB Pressbox website.
TELEPHONES: Land-line phones are available for media use in the main press areas upon request.
WI-FI: Wireless Internet access is available in Minute Maid Park. Contact the Astros Communications department for details.
ASTROS ON THE WEB: The official website of the Houston Astros is www.astros.com. The site is updated daily with news, statistics, game notes, feature stories and minor league information. The Major League Baseball website, www.mlb.com, can also be accessed via www.astros.com. The Astros also offer a Spanish website, www.astrosdehouston.com. The site features daily news coverage of the team as well as feature stories from international sports writers.
MLB PRESSBOX: With approved registration, media members gain electronic access to numerous Major League Baseball resources by logging onto www.mlbpressbox.com (on the official MLB website). Some of the information on this site includes: public relations contacts; daily statistical updates; daily game notes; current and archived press releases; media guides; press kits; credential language and media regulations; and historical information about MLB and its entities. In addition, this site provides media the opportunity to download HD-quality video, hi-resolution logos and information on special events for all 30 clubs, as well as headshots of players, coaches, umpires and select executives. All media covering the Astros should register on the MLB Pressbox site to access these resources.

## INFDRMACION DE MEDIOS

## CREDENCIALES

Los Astros de Houston utilizaron el sistema de credenciales de MLB en línea. Todos los pedidos para credenciales, para la temporada o para un día, deben hacerse por el sistema de credenciales en línea de MLB: http://credentials.mlb.com. Esto será el proceso para pedidos durante la temporada regular, los Entrenamientos Primaverales, y la Serie Divisional de la Liga Americana. Todas las credenciales para el año 2018, repartidos por las Grandes Ligas, la BBWAA o por los Astros, mostrarán su fotografía - Las identificaciones para los Scouts también requieren foto.

- Credenciales durante la temporada de los Astros de Houston serán distribuidas solamente a agencias de noticias con cobertura diaria de los Astros de Houston. Credenciales para partidos selectos serán distribuidas a miembros de la prensa que no califican para obtener credenciales de temporada y que cumplen con los requisitos de las Grandes Ligas. Los pedidos para credenciales deben venir directamente de su editor, productor, o director a través del sistema de credenciales en línea por lo menos 48 horas antes del partido deseado. SUS CREDENCIALES DEBEN ESTAR EXPUESTAS EN TODO MOMENTO.
- Credenciales estarán disponibles bajo su nombre por la puerta del lado de primera base, localizada en el Dlamond Lot, cerca de la interseccion de las calles Preston y Hamilton, cuatro horas antes del primer lanzamiento.
- Esposos/as, ninos, o invitados de la prensa no podrán utilizar sus credenciales.
- No se permite la transferencia de las credenciales por cualquier razón.
- Está prohibido pedir autógrafos con su credencial. Violaciones contra esta regla resultarán en la revocación de su credencial. SEGURIDAD: Para cumplir con medidas de seguridad implementadas por las Grandes Ligas y los Astros de Houston, usted estará obligado a seguir los siguientes procedimientos antes de entrar al Parque Minute Maid para su cobertura del juego.
Al entrar al Parque Minute Maid, favor de estar dispuesto a hacer lo siguiente:
- Entrar al parque por la puerta del lado de primera base, localizada en el Dlamond Lot, cerca de la interseccion de las calles Preston y Hamilton.
- Mostrar su identificación y firmar al ingresar por la entrada de prensa.
- Permitir que sus bolsos sean registrados al entrar al parque.


## Durante el juego, favor de estar preparado para:

- Portar su credencial en todo momento.
- Permitir que su equipo sea inspeccionado por seguridad.
- Cumplir con los reglamentos instituidos por las Grandes Ligas y los Astros de Houston. Sólo aquellas personas con credenciales apropiadas serán admitidas al clubhouse, terreno de juego y al palco de prensa


## SERVICIOS

ESTACIONAMIENTO: Los miembros de la prensa pueden estacionarse en los lotes B y C del Minute Maid Park con credenciales de temporada, credencial de BBWAA o identificacion de medios. Las entradas a estos lotes se encuentran en St. Emanuel St., Preston St. y Texas Ave.
PALCO DE PRENSA: El palco de prensa está localizado en el nivel Club, detras del plato de home. Todas las áreas de prensa están localizadas en el nivel Club y tienen acceso mediante ascensor y escaleras.
COMEDOR DE PRENSA: El comedor de prensa está localizado en el nivel Club detrás de la cabina de cronistas. Se cobra \$12 por comida.


- El comedor se abre 2.5 horas antes del primer lanzamiento.

CLUBHOUSES: Ambos clubhouses están localizados en el nivel de Servicio y tienen acceso al palco de prensa, ascensor y escaleras. El clubhouse de los Astros está localizado al lado de primera base, y el clubhouse de los visitantes y el clubhouse de los árbitros están localizados al lado de tercera base. Las reglas para el acceso a los clubhouses antes y después del juego son instituidas por las Grandes Ligas. Los clubhouses están cerrados durante la práctica de bateo.
Reglas generales del clubhouse:

- No se permite tomar fotografías, pedir autógrafos, dar o recibir regalos a los jugadores, sin excepción.
- No se siente en las sillas de las jugadores.
- Por favor mantenga el tono de su teléfono apagado y no hacer llamadas ni contestar dentro del clubhouse.

TRANSMISION EN VIVO: No se permite ningún tipo de transmisión en vivo (Facebook Live, Periscope, etc.) en cualquier parte de estadio, incluyendo el clubhouse y la sala de prensa.
FOTÓGRAFOS: Acceso a los areas de fotografo durante el juego está limitado a fotógrafos (no de vídeo) y estaciones de televisión con derechos de transmisión. Se encuentran cuatro (4) cajas para fotógrafos, dos a cada lado de los dugouts. Los fotógrafos tendrán que permanecer en la caja durante todo el juego. Se permite cambiar de caja entre entradas solamente. Ninguna pelota - considerada viva o muerta - puede ser manejada por el personal de la prensa, sólo por el recogepelotas.
PALCO DE CONFERENCIAS: Está localizada en el nivel de Servicio, opuesto del clubhouse de los Astros.
NOTAS: Notas del juego, estadísticas, alineaciones o cualquier otro tipo de información para la prensa está disponible en el palco de prensa dos horas antes del primer lanzamiento. Los resultados y las notas depues del juego estarán disponibles en el mismo lugar.
GUÍAS PARA LA PRENSA: Las guías de los equipos están disponibles en el palco de prensa. Solicite su guía con un representante de las comunicaciones de los Astros.
INTERNET INALÁMBRICO: Acceso inalámbrico a Internet está disponible en el Parque Minute Maid. Para más información sobre el acceso a Internet, comuníquese con un representante de las comunicaciones de los Astros.

## MAJOR LEAGUE BASEBALL DRESS GUIDELINES

Major League Baseball requests members of the media covering our games to dress in an appropriate and professional manner that reflects their respect for their colleagues, the teams and the players they are covering. Clubhouses, dugouts, press boxes, interview rooms and the playing field are working areas, and MLB expects members of the media to adhere to a business casual dress code. In that regard, media members are requested to adhere to following dress guidelines:

- Flip-flops are not permitted in clubhouses
- Jeans should be clean, neat and presentable (e.g., Ripped jeans should be avoided)
- T-shirts bearing offensive, disrespectful or inappropriate messages are not permitted
- Clothing bearing MLB club logos should not be worn in press areas
- Clothing should be appropriate for a business casual work environment. The following are some non-exclusive examples of apparel that should be avoided:
" Sheer or see-through clothing
" Excessively short skirts, dresses or shorts (e.g., Cut more than 3-4 inches above the knee)
" Tank tops, muscle shirts, one-shouldered or strapless shirts
» Clothing exposing bare midriffs or visible undergarments
We ask all members of the media to respect these guidelines. MLB will consider appropriate actions in those cases in which the guidelines are violated.


## LAS GRANDES LIGAS DE BÉISBOL PAUTAS DE VESTUARIO

Las Grandes Ligas de Béisbol (MLB) solicitan a los miembros de los medios de comunicación que cubren nuestros partidos que se vistan de una manera apropiada y profesional y que refleje su respeto por sus colegas, los equipos y los jugadores que cubren. Las casas club, los dugouts, las áreas de prensa, las salas de entrevista y el campo de juego son áreas de trabajo, y MLB cuenta con que todos los miembros de los medios de comunicación observen su código de vestir ejecutivo casual. Al respecto, les pedimos tener en cuenta las siguientes directrices en su vestuario:

- Las chancletas (flip-flops) no se permiten en las casas club.
- Los jeans deben estar limpios, y en buena condición (e.g. evitar los jeans rotos)
- Las camisetas que llevan mensajes ofensivos, irrespetuosos o inapropiados no están permitidas.
- Prendas con logos de clubs de MLB no se deben usar en las áreas de la prensa
- El vestuario debe ser apropiado a un ambiente de trabajo de negocios informal. Los siguientes son algunos ejemplos noexclusivos de prendas que se deben evitar:
» Ropa transparente
" Faldas, vestidos o shorts excesivamente cortos (e.g. más de 3-4 pulgadas arriba de la rodilla)
" Camisetas sin mangas, "muscle shirts", camisas de un solo tirante o camisas sin tirantes
» Ombligueras o prendas que dejen al descubierto la ropa interior
Les pedimos a todos los miembros de los medios de comunicación que respeten estas directrices. MLB considerará tomar las acciones apropiadas que sean del caso cuando considere que han sido violadas.


## Major League Baseball <br> Online Audio, Photography and Video Rules

The following are rules established by Major League Baseball regarding the usage of audio, photos and video online during the regular season by non-rightsholders.

1) Any media member credentialed to cover a Major League game must notify and receive permission from the host club or Major League Baseball that he/she intends to post audio or video content online.
2) The gathering of audio and video content in clubhouses pre-game and post-game is subject to the host club rules regarding electronic media access.
3) The manager's pre-game media availability may not be carried live and audio and video postings may be no longer than 120 seconds.
4) One-on-one interviews that are posted online with players, team personnel and baseball officials must be pre-arranged, can be posted for a maximum of 72 hours, must be no longer than 120 seconds long and cannot include any game highlights.
5) Any video captured within the ballpark, excluding press conferences, must be limited to 120 seconds and cannot be carried live.
6) No live or taped audio or video is permitted to be captured by any entities other than rightsholders from 45 minutes prior to game time until the game has concluded.
7) The post-game manager's press conference may be captured via video and audio and posted online but may not be carried live. This specific content may be archived for 72 hours.
8) Entities credentialed for photography may transmit on-line or display up to seven still pictures or photographs of any Game during its progress; provided, however, that under no circumstances may Bearer display any more than seven still pictures or photographs of any Game during its progress regardless of whether Bearer obtained such pictures or photographs at the Game.


## TODD KALAS

## TV PLAY-BY-PLAY BROADCASTER



The 2018 season marks Todd Kalas' second as the Astros play-by-play voice on television. Kalas, who is the son of Hall of Famer and former Astros broadcaster Harry Kalas, has 26 seasons of experience as a broadcaster in professional baseball.

- Prior to joining the Astros in 2017, Todd spent the previous 19 seasons (1998-2016) as part of the Tampa Bay Rays TV broadcast team. While his primary duties for the Rays were as pre- and postgame host and in-game reporter, Kalas also handled play-by-play duties for hundreds of Rays games on both television and radio during his time there.
- Known for his distinctive voice and personality, Kalas grew to be a popular figure with Rays fans as a result of his work on the broadcasts and was a two-time Suncoast Emmy award winner.
- Prior to joining the Rays, Kalas also worked with the New York Mets radio (1992-93) and Philadelphia Phillies television (1994-96) broadcast teams.
- A native Houstonian, Todd was born at St. Luke's Episcopal Hospital in Houston while his father, Harry, served as an Astros broadcaster from 1965-70. Harry would later call Phillies games from 1971-2009 en route to a Hall of Fame career. When the Phillies and Rays met in the 2008 World Series, Todd and his father called an inning together on radio during Game One of the Fall Classic.
- Kalas graduated with a degree in broadcast journalism from Syracuse University, and began his baseball career with the Louisville Redbirds in 1991.
- In the off-season, he has handled college football, basketball and baseball play-by-play as well as being a studio host for NHL and NBA teams.
- Kalas and his wife, Michele, reside in Houston.



## GEOFF BLUM

TV COLOB BROACCASTER


Geoff Blum returns for his sixth season with the Astros TV broadcast team in 2018, his second as the everyday color analyst for Astros telecasts. Blum, who retired after 14 Major League seasons as an infielder (1999-2012), made the transition from the playing field to the broadcast booth in 2013.

- During his playing career, Blum had two stints with the Astros, totaling five seasons in Houston (2002-03, 2008-10). Over the course of his tenure with the Astros, Blum hit . 259 with 228 RBI, 46 homers, 77 doubles and a .711 OPS.
- A switch-hitter, Blum was known as one of the top pinch-hitters and utility players in the game, appearing at all four infield positions for nine straight seasons (2000-08). He appeared in the postseason three times in his career (2005-06, 2011).
- Geoff and his wife, Kory, have four daughters: Mia Lea and triplets Ava, Audrey and Kayla.



## JULIA MORALES

 TV SIDELNE REPORTER

Julia Morales returns for her sixth season as the Astros TV sideline reporter.

- As a reporter and anchor for AT\&T SportsNet, Morales serves as the primary in-game reporter on Houston Astros telecasts.
- She previously spent two years at YNN-TV, a 24-hour news channel in Austin, where she covered the Texas Longhorns and Round Rock Express.
- Morales began her broadcast career as Weekend Sports Anchor at KTEN-TV in Sherman, Texas. From there, she took the same position at KYTX-TV in Tyler.
- A native of Crandall, Texas, Morales spent two years as a "World Famous Kilgore College Rangerette" before graduating from the University of Texas at Austin.
- She and her husband, Matt, reside in Houston.



## ROBERT FORD

RADIO BROADCASTER


Robert Ford was named to the Astros radio broadcast team to work alongside Steve Sparks as the play-by-play commentator on Feb. 13, 2013. He enters his sixth season on the Astros radio broadcast.

- Prior to joining the Astros, Ford had served as the radio pre- and postgame host for Kansas City Royals games on 610 AM KCSP, the Royals flagship station, since 2009.
- He has seven years of experience broadcasting minor league baseball, having called more than 800 games during stints with the Binghamton Mets, Kalamazoo Kings and Yakima Bears. Ford was twice named Frontier League Broadcaster of the Year (2003 and 2004). He also has extensive play-by-play experience in college basketball.
- He is a 2001 graduate of Syracuse University, where he earned a bachelor's degree in broadcast journalism.
- Ford has twice been a finalist for the Esurance MLB Award for "Best Call, TV/Radio," including in 2017 for his call of Alex Bregman's walk-off RBI single in Game 5 of the World Series.
- Ford lives in Houston and has a daughter, Elena.


Steve Sparks was named to the Astros radio broadcast team to work alongside Robert Ford as the color commentator on Feb. 13, 2013. He enters his sixth season on the Astros radio broadcast.

- Sparks, 53, has served as a pre- and postgame analyst for Astros television games over the last several seasons and has also filled in as a color analyst on Astros radio and television broadcasts.
- A knuckleballer in his playing days, Sparks pitched in the Major Leagues in parts of nine seasons (1995-2004) for the Brewers, Angels, Tigers, A's and Diamondbacks. His best season was in 2001 while with Detroit when he went 14-9 in 35 appearances ( 33 starts) with a 3.65 ERA while leading the Majors in complete games with eight. He also tallied a career high in innings pitched (232.0) that season.
- Sparks attended Sam Houston State University, where he led the Bearkats to back-to-back Gulf Star Conference baseball titles and an NCAA Division II Regional playoff appearance in 1986 and again in the school's first year at the Division I level in 1987. On Nov. 3, 2017, Sparks was inducted into the Sam Houston Letterman's Association Hall of Honor.
- Sparks, a couponing enthusiast, has racked up some impressive savings over the course of nearly two years. According to Clippers Digest, Steve ranks T-4th in Fort Bend County in the Creative Clippings category. Some estimates suggest an average savings of an astonishing $81 \%$, which nearly breaks the national record. He and his wife, Michelle, reside in Sugar Land and have three children: Alexa, Blake and Chloe.

## radio broadcaster engneer



Matt Boltz enters his fourth season with the Houston Astros and his 18th overall season in Major League Baseball.

- Boltz is the Radio Broadcast Engineer \& Producer for the Astros Radio Network. He generates, maintains and produces all live audio for the entire Spring Training, regular season \& postseason schedule. In addition, he orchestrates all broadcast material, live commercial inventory, promotions and live interviews with the broadcasters, the front office, the radio flagship and the entire radio network.
- His offseason duties include editing and archiving all recorded sound, managing and servicing technical elements and assisting with network affiliate relations. Boltz also engineers and produces Astroline, the Astros weekly offseason hot stove radio show which has been on the air since 1988.
- Prior to joining the Astros, Boltz served as the Radio Producer Engineer for the Chicago Cubs Radio Network from 20012014. During that time, he also engineered game broadcasts for WGN Chicago and Northwestern Wildcats basketball and football programs.

## SPANISH RADIO BROADCASTER



Francisco Romero enters his 11th season of play-by-play on the Astros Spanish radio network.

- Francisco joined the Astros in 2008 after spending five seasons broadcasting Milwaukee Brewers games in Spanish on Telemundo Wisconsin. His Major League broadcasting experience also includes selected Minnesota Twins games over five seasons from 2003-08.
- His Major League broadcast debut was for the Arizona Diamondbacks on Telemundo Arizona in 1999, and he spent two years on Diamondbacks broadcasts from 1999-2000.
- Other Major League broadcasting experience includes select games on Spanish Radio with the Cincinnati Reds in 2005. He also spent four seasons as the play-by-play broadcaster and pre- and postgame show producer on Spanish radio broadcasts for the Triple A Tucson Sidewinders of the Pacific Coast League.
- Additional sports broadcasting experience includes both football and basketball for the University of Arizona Spanish Radio Network (1999-present), as well as three seasons on the Arizona Cardinals radio halftime report.

SPANISH RADIO BROADCASTER


Alex Treviño returns for his 23rd season of analysis on the Astros Spanish radio network.

- A native of Monterrey, Mexico, he spent 13 seasons in the Majors, primarily as a catcher, including the 1988-90 seasons with the Astros. He also spent time with the Mets, Reds, Braves, Giants and Dodgers.
- Alex hit a career-high .290 while serving as Houston's backup catcher in 1989 and hit .364 ( $32 \times 88$ ) in 25 starts.
- He played in 939 Major League games and had a . 249 lifetime average.
- Alex joined the broadcast booth in 1996 and has called more than 3,000 Astros games, seven postseason appearances and the 2005 World Series run.
- As of 2018, Alex's 23 seasons in the broadcast booth are the most in franchise history by a Spanish broadcaster, besting Orlando Sanchez Diago's record of 21 years.
- In September 2014, Alex was inducted into the Houston Baseball Media Wall of Honor for his significant and lasting contributions to the landscape of Houston baseball through his work in broadcasting.

- He began his career as a PA announcer at Galveston's Pony-Colt Stadium at the age of 13 where he played shortstop and first base two nights a week and served as PA the other three nights.
- Bob started in radio at the age of 15 at Galveston's KGBC and KILE stations. He spent more than 20 years on the radio in the Houston market on KXYZ, KAUM, KSRR 97 Rock, KLOL Rock 101 and KZFX Z107 where he worked with longtime Houston DJ Crash Collins on the "Bob \& Crash" morning show.
- He also served as the backup PA announcer for the Dallas Cowboys at Texas Stadium, and was the image voice for the Cowboy's Silverstar Network.
- Bob currently owns and operates Bob Ford Productions, Inc. and has been doing voice-overs for radio and TV since 1986. He voiced award-winning projects for PBS, Showtime, Encore and Cartoon Network as well as TV and radio stations coast to coast.
- The 2018 season also marks Bob's fifth as the PA Voice of TDECU Stadium for University of Houston football.
- Bob is married to the former Pamela Terry from Humble, Texas. He has three sons: Chris (27), Charlie (25) and Colton (22).
- He is a fifth-generation Galvestonian, and still lives on the island.


## MLB EUJIDELINES FOR THE MDVEMENT OF RETRACTABLE ROOFS

- The decision as to whether a game begins with the roof open or closed rests solely with the home club.
- If the game begins with the roof open: it shall be closed only in the event of impending rain or other adverse weather conditions. The decision to close the roof shall be made by the home club, after consultation with the Umpire Crew Chief.
- The Umpire Crew Chief shall notify the visiting club, which may challenge the opening of the roof if it feels that a competitive imbalance will arise. In such an event, the Umpire Crew Chief shall make a final decision based on the merits of the challenge.
- Once the roof is closed during a game, it shall not be re-opened.
- If the game begins with the roof closed: it may be opened when, in the opinion of the home club, the climatic environment has reached a level where fan comfort and enjoyment will be best served by opening the roof to the natural atmospheric conditions. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the following guidelines should be applied to opening the roof during a game.
> The roof may only open once during a game.
$>$ The Umpire Crew Chief will be notified at the commencement of the inning that the roof will be opened at the inning's conclusion.
> The Umpire Crew Chief shall notify the visiting club, which may challenge the opening of the roof if it feels that a competitive imbalance will arise. In such an event, the Umpire Crew Chief shall make a final decision based on the merits of the challenge.
$>$ The opening of the roof shall only commence between innings.



## MINUTE MAID PARK

The 2018 season marks the 19th season of baseball at Minute Maid Park. The venue has hosted numerous special events, including the 2004 All-Star Game and Home Run Derby, the 2005 World Series, the 2014 Civil Rights Game, Super Bowl LI Opening Night, the 2017 World Series, major concert events, weddings, graduations and galas.

The year 2000 saw something the grand old game of baseball had not experienced since 1964 - a Major League team in Houston playing on natural grass outdoors. While clear skies and real grass were welcome additions for fans, the Bayou City hardball-faithful also enjoyed another first, Minute Maid Park's 242 foot-tall retractable roof. More than 3 million fans embraced the new ballpark in its inaugural season. Since then, the club has welcomed more than 44 million visitors during the facility's 18 -season tenure.

Minute Maid Park has become a welcome home for the Houston Astros and has ushered in a new era of Major League sports in the city. With the downtown ballpark, Houston continues to stand on the forefront of modern stadium construction that began with the club's previous home - the Astrodome. The park's
 retractable roof brought open-air baseball to Houston for the first time in 35 years, and the natural grass field and classic architecture provided the opportunity of capturing the same atmosphere from the great ballparks of baseball's golden age.

Approval of the ballpark, however, was not limited to the applause of the fans. Less than one calendar year after its opening, Minute Maid Park had already been recognized on local, state and national levels with several awards. The following are the first three major awards with which the new home of the Astros were honored:

- Greater Houston Preservation Alliance, $\mathbf{2 0 0 0}$ Good Brick Award. The President's Award was presented to former owner Drayton McLane, the Astros and the Harris County-Houston Sports Authority for the renovation of the 1911 Union Station building. The Good Brick Awards are presented annually in recognition of leadership and excellence in historic preservation.
- Most Outstanding Civil Engineering Project. This honor came from the Texas Section of the American Society of Civil Engineers (ASCE), a professional organization that represents the vast majority of civil engineers.
- National Honor Award for Engineering Excellence. This national recognition for engineering excellence came from the American Consulting Engineers Council (ACEC). This honor stamped Minute Maid Park as one of the top 24 engineering projects among all buildings and civil works projects nationally.
LOCATION: Minute Maid Park is located at 501 Crawford Street on the northeast end of downtown Houston. Situated near the George R. Brown Convention Center, Discovery Green and BBVA Compass Stadium, the ballpark is located one block west of U.S. 59 and is bound by Congress Avenue on the north, Texas Avenue on the south, Crawford Street on the west and Hamilton Street on the east.
HISTORY: The idea for a public-private financing drive for a downtown Houston ballpark was conceived in 1996. Fourteen leading Houston companies joined together to form the Houston Sports Facility Partnership. The Partnership agreed to provide a $\$ 35$ million interest-free loan with no repayment due until 10 years of ballpark operation had passed. With the Partnership's initial commitment, the Harris County-Houston Sports Authority had the support it needed to present a ballpark proposal to the public in November 1996 . Voters approved the $\$ 250$ million project.


ALL-STAR GAME: in 2004, Minute Maid Park played host to the 75th Major League Baseball All-Star Game. More than 350,000 people participated in All-Star Week activities, which included the Futures Game, the Legends/Celebrity Softball Game, and the Home Run Derby - all of which took place at Minute Maid Park - in addition to the John Hancock All-Star Fan Fest. The week culminated with the All-Star Game and a 9-4 American League win over the National League squad. Four Astros played for the National League squad, including the NL starting pitcher Roger Clemens, Carlos Beltran, Jeff Kent and Lance Berkman.
FIRST GAMES: The Houston Astros and New York Yankees played an exhibition game on March 30, 2000 , with Houston winning $6-5$. The Astros hosted the Philadelphia Phillies in the first official regular-season game on April 7,2000, with Philadelphia winning 4-1.
ARCHITECT: The Architect of Minute Maid Park was HOK Sports Facilities Group, along with Construction Manager Brown \& Root Services, a business unit of Halliburton Company.
THE NAME: On June 5, 2002, the Houston Astros and The Minute Maid Company announced that they had expanded their relationship to create a long-term marketing and community partnership. The multi-year partnership agreement included naming rights for the downtown ballpark, rechristening the field "Minute Maid Park."

The partnership agreement also stipulated the pouring rights for products of The Coca-Cola Company, ongoing advertising and marketing programs, and a commitment by Minute Maid to support youth baseball programs in the Houston area.

The Minute Maid Company is an operating unit of The Coca-Cola Company and the flagship of its worldwide fruit beverage business. The Minute Maid Company has been headquartered in Houston since 1967.

Houston's downtown ballpark was originally named Enron Field on April 7, 1999, and was renamed Astros Field on Feb. 27, 2002, by an agreement between the Houston Astros and Enron Corporation.
SIZE: The building dimensions cover 28.97 acres of gross square footage, a total of $1,263,240$ square feet. The height is 93 feet to the last seating tread, equivalent to a nine-story building.
TRAIN: A replica of a 19th century locomotive (circa 1860) and linked coal tender is a fan favorite. The train provides an architectural icon which combines sight, sound and motion for a dynamic entertainment and celebration feature. It also provides a link to the past for Houston and the Union Station site. The train was designed by Uni-Systems and built by SMI \& Hydraulics, which also provided the transporters for the retractable roof. Weighing close to 50,000 pounds, the train runs some 800 feet along the low roof track on the west side of the ballpark.

## MINUTE MAID PARK

UNION STATION: According to Hok's design platform, the most literal tie between Houston's past and its new ballpark is a physical line to Union Station. On March 2, 1911, Houston's second downtown Union Station, rebuilt at a cost of $\$ 500,000$, opened its doors for the first time. In the 104 years since, it has served as an epicenter of the city's population growth, been a catalyst for commercial evolution, and become an identifying landmark within the downtown skyline.

Houston was once described as "Where 17
 Railroads Meet the Sea". An article in a 1913 issue of "The Rotarian" called Houston the "City of First Consideration" and "The Largest Manufacturing City in the Southwest." Union Station was at the center of it all, the hub of a strong industrial municipality that specialized in oil, rice, sugar and lumber. The historic landmark has also served as a shelter for hurricane refugees and has been visited by Presidents of the United States.

Trains with names such as Acadian, Argonaut, Katy Flyer, California Special, Lone Star, Orleanean and Pioneer made hundreds of stops at Union Station during its active period (1911-1974). Other trains with monikers such as Sam Houston Zephyr, Southerner, Sunset Limited, Sunshine Special, Texas Chief, Texas Eagle, Texas Rocket and Valley Eagle routinely picked up passengers there as well.

The first-floor Great Hall still includes much of Union Station's original architectural work. It currently serves as a general reception area for guests, functions as an event space, and houses the Astros Team Store. Each Astros fan who enters Minute Maid Park through Union Station retraces the steps of passengers who boarded trains in another era.

Today, the conference rooms and event spaces occupying the second and third floor of the renovated Union Station at Minute Maid Park (open 365 days a year) are named after some of the trains listed above. They are honored as both a tribute to hardworking rail personnel and in remembrance of Union Station's historic importance.

The Houston Astros executive offices occupy the fourth and fifth floors of the building. The sixth floor houses the Roof Deck and Club House at Union Station, where groups of up to 100 people can watch Astros baseball with scenic views of downtown Houston as a backdrop.

Though it sat vacant for a quarter century from 1974-1999, the former transit hub has re-taken its rightful place on the Houston skyline, now serving as the gateway to Astros baseball and remaining an important landmark in downtown Houston.

PLAYING FIELD: Featuring Platinum TE Paspalum grass, the playing surface covers 2.5 acres. The drainage and irrigation systems include 6,682 linear feet of perforated pipe and 4,406 linear feet of PVC pipe, respectively. A total of 51 irrigation heads help make the job for Head Groundskeeper Izzy Hinojosa and his staff much easier.

All grassed areas of the playing field are also constructed to USGA golf green construction specifications, allowing for excellent drainage and a growing media which is ideal for maintaining highperformance turfgrass.


SOUNDS: More than 400 speaker cabinets are scattered throughout the seating areas and almost 1,000 are found along the concourses. The speakers are distributed throughout the ballpark to have cabinets as close to the fans as possible.
THE ROOF: Architects from the HOK Sports Facilities Group recommended early on that a retractable roof would be appropriate for the Texas climate. Since building the first retractable-roof ballpark - the Skydome in 1989 - designers have crafted several kinds of retractable roofs. Some, for instance, open only over a small central section. The roof at Minute Maid Park, however, retracts completely off the ballpark to reveal the largest open area of any retractable roofed baseball stadium in existence today. A total of 50,000 square feet of glass in the west wall of the retractable roof gives fans a view of the Houston skyline, even when the roof is in the closed position.

Uni-Systems provided the technical expertise to design the best roof structure for Minute Maid Park. Mechanized roof panels open and close in 14-20 minutes. The roof moves back and forth an estimated 160 times a year, a distance of 14.6 miles. To cover the ballpark, steel panels roll in sequence along tracks on the east and west sides of the stadium. When the roof is open, the southern and northern panels, each of which measures 537 by 120 feet and weighs 1,905 metric tons, rest at the north end below the large middle section with its dimension of 589 by 242 feet and a weight of 3,810 metric tons. Designers determined the roof's shape - lower side panels flanking the high center panel - by tracking a batted baseball's hyperbolic flight path. Forged steel wheels, 140 in total, measuring 35 inches in diameter transport the three roof panels.
SPECIAL AMENITIES: The Minute Maid Squeeze Play area along the right field line provides children with a fun, safe, interactive experience. The Clock Tower near home plate, along Texas Avenue is a popular gathering point for fans, and it also features a carillon to provide music at appropriate times of the day.
CONCESSIONS: Prior to the 2014 season the Astros and their exclusive food and beverage partner, Aramark, unveiled a $\$ 1.8$ million renovation to Minute Maid Park's main concourse, featuring eight new food and beverage concepts. As part of the transformation to enhance the dining experience, the Astros and Aramark completely overhauled the look and feel of the stands by re-branding each concept with a new name and menu, adding more vibrant signage and lighting, and introducing contemporary color schemes and decor. With the 2014 extension of the Astros and Aramark partnership, future enhancements will continue to incorporate fan feedback and market research into the development and design of new menu concepts and dining options throughout Minute Maid Park. In addition, they will explore new and unique ways to showcase Houston's cuisine and culinary talent, such as local top chef Bryan Caswell who has partnered with Aramark the past four seasons to bring his signature menu items to Minute Maid Park.
TECHNOLOGY: Following the 2010 season, the Houston Astros installed two new, high-definition video boards and a large ribbon board at Minute Maid Park in time for the start of the 2011 Major League Baseball season. The new primary video board is located in right field and measures 54 feet high and 124 feet wide (approximately 6,695 square feet), making it the third-largest board of its kind in the Major Leagues when installed. The Astros previous video board that had been in the ballpark since its inception in 2000 was 26 feet high and 45 feet wide. Additionally, the Astros have the largest video board in the Major Leagues featuring 1080i display format. A smaller video board, measuring 24 feet high by 40 feet wide, was installed in left field, and a ribbon board, stretching from foul pole to foul pole and more than 1,000 feet long, was also added. A speed pitch board and an old-fashioned, manually-operated scoreboard keep fans on top of the action in the ballpark and in every other big league venue. When it opened in 2000, Minute Maid Park was the first major sports facility to feature a closed-captioning board for the hearing impaired. Daktronics, one of the world's largest suppliers of electronic boards, is the company responsible for the Astros new boards. The new state-of-the-art HD video board high atop Minute Maid Park provides fans with award-winning special video features and effects created by Astros Productions that is unlike anything in Major League Baseball.

## CENTER FIELD RENOVATION

On Oct. 10, 2016, the Houston Astros broke ground on their center field renovation at Minute Maid Park.
The new center field area includes improved seating options, new food and beverage options, the addition of escalators and elevators to improve fan access and revisions to the playing field, including the removal of Tal's Hill. These improvements are part of a continuing effort to make Minute Maid Park one of Houston's premier destinations year-round.

On Dec. 1, 2016, the Houston Astros and Aramark, the exclusive food and beverage provider at Minute Maid Park, announced that Torchy's Tacos and Shake Shack will be featured as concession options in the newly renovated center field area of Minute Maid Park.

Torchy's Tacos is located on the mezzanine level of the new center field area and is accessible from the main concourse. Shake Shack is located on the main concourse in center field.

## FUN FACTS:

- The former center field distance of 436 feet moved to 409 feet, taking Minute Maid Park from the deepest center distance to the sixth-farthest in the league. In 2016 alone, the Astros hit approximately 10 balls to Tal's Hill for extra bases, all of which would have been home runs in the renovated center field area.

The seating capacity of Minute Maid Park remains essentially the same, with improved visibility for fans to enjoy the game from center field.

The renovation of center field resulted in a total of three new bar locations, four additional food locations and a premium group seating area at field level, creating the first and only field-level seating area available at Minute Maid Park.

The design of the new center field area was in partnership with MSA Sport and influenced by feedback from fans, current and former players and front office personnel. Astros executives also visited over 20 MLB ballparks as part of the center field project planning process.
