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We are committed to being authentic Miami, the city that celebrates family, fun and passion. Miami not only has a rich diversity and upbeat energy, but also a deep-rooted love for the game of baseball. Pair the ambiance of the city with the refreshed approach of the Miami Marlins organization and you get an exciting combination of past, present and future.

The Miami Marlins enter the third year under current ownership, with an ambitious vision that has thus far led an enhanced fan experience at Marlins Park, which is beginning to take its place as a world-class entertainment venue. The offseason prior to the 2019 season saw the organization and Marlins Park transform, and begin to take its place as a top destination in South Florida.

In the first year under the new ownership, the club launched the Dímelo campaign to listen to fans and build trust with the community. Then the Marlins invested in the cost of the fan experience in year two, and look to deepen the impact in 2020.

The evolution of the Miami Marlins began with the club's new logo and colors, announced in November 2018. Marlins Park transformed that same offseason with the reset of the premium space, addition of social spaces, and a reimagined food and beverage experience. The Marlins also reset ticket prices, making Marlins baseball an affordable entertainment option with tickets starting at just $\$ 10$ !

Heading into 2020, the organization announced a ticket price hold along with a price reset of parking rates at Marlins Park and a new line of value-priced merchandise. A new social space was also added to the venue in the Biscayne Bay Brew Hall, offering fans a new location for fans to gather pregame or postgame.

## COMMTIMENT TO INUEST IIT THE FAN EXPERENCE

Under the guidance of principal owner Bruce Sherman and CEO Derek Jeter, the Miami Marlins have made it a priority to invest in the cost of the fan experience, with the goal of being one of the most affordable entertainment options in South Florida.

The Miami Marlins are committed to investing in the fan experience and providing a first-class entertainment experience at Marlins Park. The organization has continuously reaffirmed this commitment since new ownership took control of the Club in 2017.

Prior to the 2018 season, the organization launched the Dímelo listening campaign and results from fan feedback were immediately enacted on desired enhancements to their ballpark experience. The offseason prior to the 2019 season, the Marlins re-imagined the premium standard with the transformation of The Club: DEX Imaging, added of two social-space concepts, AutoNation Alley and The Social: Estrella Jalisco, that offer unique viewing experiences and promote social engagement, and re-imagined the food and beverage experience at Marlins Park.

Making Marlins baseball one of the most affordable entertainment experiences in the South Florida market remains a priority. The commitment began with enhancements, extended to the food and beverage experience with the creation
 of the $\$ 30 \$ 5$ Menu, was highlighted by the ticket price reset heading into the 2019 campaign, and continued with reduced price of parking and a new line of value merchandise in partnership with Fanatics for the 2020 season.

## Investment in fan experience

With a focus on elevating the fan experience and an investment in the cost of the fan experience, the Miami Marlins turned Marlins Park into a go-to destination for a first-class experience for fans, friends, families and coworkers. . The re-imagining of Marlins Park began in the offseason heading into the 2019 season began with the transformation of The Club presented by DEX Imaging, and was followed by the creation of two social space concepts, AutoNation Alley and the The Social presented by Estrella Jalisco. The Marlins then developed a re-imagined food and beverage experience for guests at Marlins Park. In addition to new food partners, all of whom have great Miami stories, on the re-concepted Promenade Level, the Marlins launched a new $\$ 30 \$ 5$ Menu, which is a food and beverage value menu that offers ballpark favorites at an introductory price of $\$ 3$ or $\$ 5$, such a $\$ 3$ hot dog and $\$ 5$ beer. The final ingredient was the addition of El Mercadito, a grab-and-go market offering fans fresh and healthy food options for all Marlins home games. The newest enhancement to Marlins Park came this offseason with the addition of the Biscayne Brew Hall, a new 3000-square-foot space located in the atrium area near sections 15-16 on the Promenade Level.

The Miami Marlins Foundation has three key areas of focus in WELLNESS, EMPDWERMENT, and YDUTH BASEBALL AND SOFTBALL.
With the support of partners, stakeholders, and fans, the Miami Marlins Foundation makes an impact creating opportunities for youth to stay active, achieve academic success, and build leadership skills. The Foundation's wellness programs address barriers that students face to academic success and focus on food insecurity, healthy eating habits, and promote fitness. In the area of empowerment, the Foundation is focused on college scholarships, leadership development and providing educational resources to students and teachers, while the youth baseball and softball programs promote well-being, proper nutrition, and support social and emotional learning that builds champions on and off the field. The Miami Marlins Foundation utilizes the power of baseball and the support of the Miami Marlins to run and fund proven programs that enable the South Florida community to thrive.

## WELLNESS

The Miami Marlins Foundation wellness programs have provided nearly 90,000 pounds of foods, the equivalent of 74,000 meals to nearly 2,500 households.


MIAMI MARLINS HOME PLATE MEALS FOOD PANTRY PROGRAM was created to combat the challenges of food insecurity within our schools. This year, the Miami Marlins Foundation created two food pantries in two neighborhood schools in partnership with Feeding South Florida. A school pantry provides a variety of readily accessible food to low-income students and their families, in a safe environment with which they are already familiar, and has a focus on providing not only nonperishables, but also fresh fruits and vegetables through a monthly farmers market style distribution. The generous support of our players and fans have enabled us to support this program.

## EMPOWERMENT

The Miami Marlins Foundation's empowerment programs are providing access and opportunity to more than 11,000 students.
MIAMI MARLINS SCHOLARS are need-based academic scholarships that are awarded annually in two key categories:
Legacy Scholars: Awarded to students who have a commitment to making a significant impact in their community and live by Jackie Robinson's nine values through the RBI Scholarship and the Jackie Robinson Foundation Scholarship.

First Generation Scholars: Awarded to students who are first in their family to attend college.
The Miami Marlins Foundation SLUGGER SCHOOLHOUSE PROGRAM brings together year-round resources from the Miami Marlins, MLB, and our partners to schools in our Marlins Park neighborhood. We coordinate monthly connections with the students throughout the school year including educational, empowerment, and exercise programs., as well as food distributions. Participating schools include Lenora B. Smith Elementary, Poinciana Park Elementary, Kensington Park Elementary, and Alpha Charter of Excellence. Our sponsors include University of Miami Health System and PNC Bank.


The Foundation's BACK TO SCHOOL DISTRIBUTION in partnership with the Kiwanis Club of Little Havana, provides over 9,000 students with school supplies in select Miami-Dade and Broward County elementary schools. This upcoming school year AutoNation is sponsoring the school supplies for the schools in Broward County.

## YOUTh BASEBALL AND SOFTBALL

The Foundation provides sports-based youth development programs that utilize baseball and softball as the vehicle to provide kids with life-changing social and emotional learning experiences. The programs impact over 100,000 youth in South Florida, reinforcing what it means to be a team, providing character development and creating leadership opportunities for youth of all abilities.

## MIAMI MARLINS JR. RBI \& RBI PRESENTED BY UNIVERSITY OF MIAMI SPORTS MEDICINE INSTITUTE

Miami Marlins JR. RBI is a free youth outreach program designed for children 5-12 years old. The goal is to increase participation and interest in baseball and softball while including fun elements such as JR. RBI Day and clinics hosted by Marlins Players.

The Miami Marlins RBI program offers organized baseball and softball, which is designed to promote interest in baseball and softball, academic achievement, and social responsibility for underserved youth 13-18 years old.


## FUN AT BAT PRESENTED BY FLORIDA BLUE

In partnership with USA Baseball and MLB, the Foundation provided over 90,000 kids in Miami-Dade County public schools with character development lessons, while introducing them to baseball. Fun At Bat is an introductory level bat-and-ball program for kids with an emphasis on character development, functional movement, literacy, active play and fun. The overarching goal of this program is to promote fun and active lifestyles for children, while teaching them the fundamental skills of bat and ball sports. The program also includes a literacy component and teaches character traits such as leadership, honesty and teamwork.

## MIAMI MARLINS/ FOX SPORTS FLORIDA YOUTH PLAYER OF THE GAME

The Miami Marlins Foundation and FOX Sports Florida are celebrating youth baseball and softball players across South Florida. During each home game broadcast, one player is recognized as the youth player of the game.

## THE BASEBALL FANTASY CAMP FOR KIDS AT MARLINS PLAYER DEVELOPMENT COMPLEX

In partnership with the Baseball Fantasy Camp for Kids, youth and young adults with special needs are provided an opportunity to improve their baseball skills by gaining confidence on the field.

## YOUTH CLINICS

Through youth clinics, youngsters are provided the opportunity to join Marlins players and/or prospects for a day of fun while learning basic baseball skills. This year, our Nike Youth Clinic provided 200 kids an opportunity to learn the fundamentals at the Miami Marlins Player Development Complex in Jupiter with Marlins Major League players and top prospects.

## MIAMI MARLINS TEE BALL INITIATIVE PRESENTED BY ULTIMATE SOFTWARE

Our Tee Ball Initiative presented by Ultimate Software features more than 200 teams across 25 South Florida Leagues. Each team receives Marlins jerseys and Marlins branded equipment, and each player receives a complimentary Billy's Bunch Kids Club Membership and a voucher to a youth league day game.

## MARLINS SUMMER SLUGGER

Each summer, students lose critical math and literacy skills. This program provides a unique baseball- themed and game-based learning experience through an 18 -week program, targeted at 4th to 5th graders, which engages students by preparing them to enter the next school year on track.

## hOLIDAY CELEBRATION

This initiative celebrates the joy of the holidays. Families enjoy treats, music, movies, games and arts \& crafts. Our employees selected kids wishes and purchased gifts providing under-served youth with an unforgettable holiday experience.


## FANFEST COMMUNITY ACTIVATION

As part of FanFest, our 40-man roster made an impact on children across South Florida. Stops included a Fun at Bat event at Kensington Park Elementary, honoring Black History Month at Lenora B. Smith Elementary, sharing smiles at Holtz Children's Hospital, and ending the day at The Boys and Girls Club with baseball trivia!

## MIAMI LIGHTHOUSE FOR THE BLIND AND VISUALLY IMPAIRED TOUCH TOUR

The annual Touch Tour is a complex sensory experience for visually impaired students, helping them to experience the game in a special way. Participants engage with baseball in a unique way, touching the clay and grass on the field, touring the Marlins batting cages, sitting in the dugout and trying on the catcher's equipment. Our Touch Tour is a favorite for players too!

## PLAY BALL

MLB's Play Ball initiative is designed to encourage participation in baseball and softball activities in a fun environment.

## FIELD RENOVATIONS

The Miami Marlins Foundation refurbish or build baseball and softball fields to provide safe places for youth to play in their neighborhoods. Heading into the 2019 season, Marlins CEO Derek Jeter gathered at Tropical Park along with Mayor Miami-Dade County Carlos A. Gimenez and Miami-Dade County Commissioner Javier Souto to announce a $\$ 170,000$ donation from the Miami Marlins to Miami-Dade County Parks. The funds will cover the renovations of four baseball fields at Tropical Park, which hosts 1.5 Million visitors annually. The renovation project includes reconditioning the infield clay, drainage improvements, and re-grading the outfield turf. Since 2013, the Miami Marlins Foundation, along with its partners, has invested nearly \$2 Million in field renovations.

## EQUIPMENT DONATIONS

The Miami Marlins Foundation distributes baseball and softball equipment to youth and teams in need, ensuring every child can participate in recreational play. Beneficiaries include Miami Marlins RBI teams, Miami Marlins Jr. RBI leagues, as well as other local underserved youth baseball and softball program.

Marlins Park, a state-of-the-art retractable roof ballpark located in the heart of Miami and is the home of the Miami Marlins. The ballpark, which is fewer than two miles from downtown Miami, is a go-to destination for a first-class entertainment experience and features unobstructed views of Miami's skyline made possible by six operable glass panels and has a capacity of 37,446 . The ballpark features an open 360-degree Promenade Level, giving fans a live view of the playing field no matter where they are.

The ballpark replaced the legacy of the memorable Orange Bowl in Little Havana, continuing a legendary 77-year history of football, baseball, soccer, public events and major concerts attended by tens of millions of fans. Situated on the same footprint, the home of the Marlins is constructed on approximately 17 acres of the historic 42-acre site.

Miami-Dade County owns Marlins Park and the City of Miami owns the four adjacent parking garages. The Miami Marlins, however, are responsible for maintaining and operating the ballpark.


## A VENUE LIKE NO DTHER

Marlins Park is a diverse venue that offers a variety of event spaces to suit any occasion inside and outside the ballpark, from intimate private parties and board meetings to large-scale corporate events, concerts. The left-field skyline wall is a feature unlike any other in Major League Baseball. Six (6) glass panels, towering at $60^{\prime}$ tall by $40^{\prime}$ wide, open to create a breathtaking view of downtown Miami's spectacular skyline. Hosts can take their event behind-the-scenes using one of the clubhouses, batting cages or press conference rooms.


## SIt CLISER THAN EVER

Seats at Marlins Park are among the closest to the playing field in all of baseball. Every seat has been placed with only one thing in mind - to provide guests with the ultimate fan experience. You will always be comfortable, cool and close to all the action and excitement.

With an eye on fan safety, in 2019, the netting was increased to 30 feet high at the ends of each dugout, and tapers down each foul line to the ends of Section 3 in right field, and FL11 in left field. The state-of-the-art netting is 30 percent thinner than traditional netting, utilizing Dyneema fiber with a knot-less "Ultra Cross" intersection supplied by Promats Athletics. It not only provides fans protection, but also is designed to blend into the playing surface.

To enhance the game experience, portions of the netting are adjustable, providing access points that allow fans to get autographs and interact with the players and coaches before each game. The access points will be located along the entire length of both dugouts, plus four areas down the first-base line and three down the third-base line. It marked the second consecutive offseason in which the organization proactively extended the safety netting at Marlins Park. Prior to 2018, the netting was expanded to the ends of each dugout, which also surpassed MLB guidelines.

## THE CLUB PRESENTED BY DEX IMAEING

The premium standard has been reset by the Miami Marlins with The Club presented by DEX Imaging. The premium space at Marlins Park re-imagined into a first-class lounge experience that speaks to those seeking a uniquely refined Miami vibe. With a re-imagined food and beverage experience, The Club presented by DEX Imaging features an elevated casual concept with DJ music and a variety of food and drink options, which extends to and enhances the in-seat experience. A versatile space for guests to dine or socialize aims to be the hot spot for Marlins games and events at Marlins Park. The award-winning interior design delivers a fresh Miami look, as designed by local Miami firm, Edge of Architecture.


The Club presented by DEX Imaging features more than a 20 percent increase in club function space as well as a redesigned entrance to welcome guests, a new stylish bar serving craft cocktails and featured beverages, and a new corridor to the club's premium seats behind home plate - which will transform and elevate the path from club to seat. The contemporary club atmosphere includes a live DJ setting an event appropriate vibe and a variety of in-club seating for dining and socializing. Fans can enjoy in-club views of the Marlins batting cages, while sampling drinks and passed small bites prior to first pitch and interacting with featured chefs during live in-club cooking demonstrations.

## SOCIAL AREAS

The re-imagining of Marlins Park into a first-class entertainment experience featured the addition of two social space concepts, AutoNation Alley and The Social presented by Estrella Jalisco. These ballpark enhancements offer fans new vantage points and unique viewing experiences at Marlins home games. Both areas, which were designed by MSA Sport - a national sports architecture firm, feature standing room only (SRO) space which enhances the ability to flow freely between locations for varied perspectives of the field and game action. A new low-priced ticket product, the Estrella Jalisco Party Pass, provides holders with priority access to both new locations and viewing experiences.

AutoNation Alley is a tiered viewing platform structure with three primary levels. The top level is accessible to all fans from the Promenade Level and features a craft cocktail bar experience; the middle level serves as an exclusive standing view platform with drink rail for Estrella Jalisco Party Pass holders; and the lower level serves as an exclusive group hospitality space.

With more than 2,250 total square feet of space across the three levels, AutoNation Alley is ideal for group outings and functions. The lower level of AutoNation Alley overlooks the center field wall, bringing fans closer to the action.


## WARLINS PARK

Redevelopment of this area at Marlins Park provides improved sightlines from the concourse to the field and back to the cityscape in the exterior through the Skyline Terrace. The re-imagined in-bowl visual experience is surrounded by a redesigned batter's eye with a lush, ivy-look that transitions to the State Farm signage on the left field façade.

The Social: Estrella Jalisco, with a spectator capacity of more than 200, is located in the foul territory corner of right field, composed of the former 10 rows of Sections $1-3$ closest to the Promenade Level concourse. The section will provide an exclusive access gathering spot for SRO Social Pass holders with a redesigned in-section view of the game from five tiered drink rails.


## BISCAYNE BAY BREW HALL

The Miami Marlins and Biscayne Bay Brewing Company teamed up to brew the newest ballpark enhancement at Marlins Park, the Biscayne Bay Brew Hall. Consistent with the Miami Marlins' commitment to invest in the fan experience, the new Biscayne Bay Brew Hall will feature a bar and social seating, with a performance space and a large video wall. The new space provides a unique social experience for fans attending Marlins games as well as non-baseball events. Fans can enjoy a stellar lineup of great beers and delicious bites, with food available for purchase.

The Biscayne Bay Brew Hall will be open on game days, and will also be available for group activities throughout the year. With a large garage door wall, the brew hall can also serve as an open-air space, perfect for the beautiful Miami nights. The partnership will also craft a signature Miami Marlins beer that will be available at the Biscayne Bay Brew Hall as well as retail locations at Marlins Park and throughout South Florida.

## RE-IMAEINED FOCD AND BEVERAGE EXPERIENCE

In an ongoing effort to enhance the fan experience at Marlins Park, the Miami Marlins re-imagined the food and beverage experience and re-concepted all concessions on the Promenade Level prior to the 2019 season. Levy is the official hospitality partner of the Marlins, welcoming each fan with world-class food and heartfelt hospitality.

The Marlins first introduced the $\$ 30 \$ 5$ Menu - a new food and beverage menu option for all Marlins home games. The $\$ 30 \$ 5$ Menu features core ballpark favorites at a new introductory price of either $\$ 3$ or $\$ 5$, giving fans the ability to purchase a hot dog for just $\$ 3$ or a beer for $\$ 5$. Larger value-sized options such as bottomless popcorn and soda will also be available for select items featured on the $\$ 30 \$ 5$ Menu. The $\$ 30 \$ 5$ Menu will be featured at concession stand locations at Section 13 and Section 37 on the Promenade Level, two of the largest concession areas at Marlins Park, providing convenient access to all guests. Marlins Member purchases of $\$ 30 \$ 5$ Menu items will be eligible for their exclusive Member Benefit savings rate on food and beverage, and retail purchases at Marlins Park, allowing for up to an additional 25 percent savings based on membership level.


The Marlins also added new food partners prior to the 2019 season to deliver an authentic Miami experience. The new partners, all of whom have great Miami stories and connections to the community, are Miami's Best Pizza, PINCHO, Novecento and SuViche. Marlins Park serves as the exclusive South Florida professional sports venue to host Novecento and Miami's Best Pizza. The ballpark will also showcase unique menu items and activations via new partnerships with PINCHO and SuViche. The diverse array of concepts and concessions are reflective of the ever-evolving South Florida community.

The new partner brand concession locations were part of a full re-concept and reposition of the Promenade Level food and beverage experience by the Marlins and hospitality partner Levy. The new program, based on fan feedback and industry leading practices, features new menu items and stand designs inspired by the community for ballpark favorites as well as other new specialty concepts, including a rotating feature location for test menus by Levy and through limited-time partnerships with guest chefs and local restaurants. In addition, Marlins Members and their guests located in The Club presented by DEX Imaging have exclusive access to an interactive chef experience in the expanded and new-look club, and an elevated in-seat dining and drink service as part of new industry standard for premium seating.

The evolution of the food and beverage experience at Marlins Park in 2019 continued with the addition of El Mercadito, a grab-and-go style market offering fans a new purchase experience for ballpark favorite drinks and snacks as well as fresh and healthy options for all Marlins home games, including wraps, salads, fruits, and gluten-free items.

## BOBCLEHEAD MUSEUM

The Bobblehead Museum display on the Promenade Level is the first of its kind in baseball and is located in Billy's Kids Zone in center field. It features a collection of current and former Marlins player bobbleheads, as well as current and past players, managers, broadcasters and mascots throughout Major League Baseball history. This display holds approximately 500 bobbleheads and regularly features new entries. The entire structure moves ever so slightly, which causes the heads to bobble. The interactive and fan-friendly exhibit features an electronic bobblehead locator.

## ART IN PURLIC PLACES AT MARLINS PARK

Marlins Park features art installations throughout the venue that differentiate it dramatically from other ballparks in the country. This effort was part of Miami-Dade County's Art in Public Places initiative. Miami-Dade Art in Public Places serves the community through the implementation of art installations and educational programming dedicated to enriching the public environment and to preserving and enhancing the artistic and civic pride of Miami-Dade County. Miami-Dade Art in Public Places promotes collaboration and creative art projects that improve the visual quality of public spaces. At their most successful, these public art installations can transform public spaces from ordinary civic areas to sites that can lift the spirit and connect with the community. From charity walks and concerts to football games and soccer matches, the ballpark hosts myriad of events each year that contribute immensely to the vibrant culture of Miami. On November 13, 2012, the national teams of Venezuela and Nigeria faced off in the first ever soccer match at Marlins Park. In addition, Marlins Park brought football back to the original Orange Bowl site by hosting the Miami Beach Bowl for three years, from 2014-16. On November 23, 2019, the ballpark reunited former Orange Bowl tenants as the football teams from Florida International University and the University of Miami will squared off.


In February 2020, the Miami Marlins and Major League Baseball jointly hosted a press conference announcing Marlins Park, which has hosted games in each of the last two WBC tournaments, will become the first venue in event history to host games in all three rounds of a World Baseball Classic in the same year. The first round of the 2021 World Baseball Classic will run from March 14-18 at Marlins Park.

Marlins Park's uniqueness and attractiveness have made the venue ideal for world-class entertainment, hosting many sporting events as well as many business and entertainment events. Thus far, the ballpark has hosted baseball games, football games, soccer matches, Super Bowl LIV Opening Night, MonsterJam, an international racing event, Stadiumlinks Golf, and more sporting events. DJ Khaled celebrated his son Asahd's second birthday by hosting the party at Marlins Park. The party had a carnival theme and featured a ferris wheel at second base.

Other non-sporting events hosted at the ballpark include 10X Growth Conference, Joel Osteen, La Feria de Las Americas, Grand Slam Party Latino, Tiger Direct Bash, Give Miami Day, Beck's Octoberfest and Miami Beerfest. The South Florida community has also been able to enjoy this unique facility. Bar mitzvahs and weddings have been held at the ballpark, as well as homecoming dances and graduations for local high schools. On October 14, 2017, Marlins Park hosted Somos LIVE!, a benefit concert to support disaster relief for Puerto Rico, South Florida, the Caribbean and Mexico following Hurricane Irma and a devastating earthquake in Mexico.

On February 13, 2015, Major League Baseball awarded the 2017 All-Star Game to the Miami Marlins and Marlins Park, marking the first Midsummer Classic hosted by the city of Miami. The 2017 Midsummer Classic took place on July 11, with the American League defeating the National League, 2-1, in 10 innings.

## TRANSPORTATION AND PARKING

The Miami Marlins continue to listen to their fans and implement ways to enhance their fan experience. Getting to and from Marlins Park is now easier than ever with Free Flow Parking, which was introduced by the organization this offseason in partnership with Miami Parking Authority. The Marlins became the first professional sports team to offer full on-site free-flow parking - with fans paying ahead of time or by using their mobile devices rather than stopping to pay in cash upon entry into the parking garages.

The Marlins Park parking garages and lots will feature free-flow parking, providing a much better arrival experience for guests, who will simply enter the garage and proceed to park. There is no longer a need to stop at the entrance to pay or show a parking pass. Marlins Park ambassadors will be stationed throughout the garages to welcome guests and direct them through a seamless parking process.

With the new arrival method, the Miami Marlins are also resetting the price of parking. Fans who pre-purchase parking at Marlins.com/Parking or via the MLB Ballpark App will pay $\$ 15$ for all Marlins home games this season, excluding Opening Day. Guests who purchase parking on-site will pay $\$ 15$ Monday-Friday, and $\$ 20$ Saturday-Sunday. The reset of the price of parking means up to 20 percent in savings compared to last year.

Transportation to Marlins Park includes the Civic Center Metrorail Station and Culmer Metrorail station, Tri-rail - Metrorail transfer and the City of Miami Trolley Service. Also, fans can park anywhere along the Miami-Dade Metrorail system, exit at Culmer Station and enjoy the dedicated Express Shuttle to Marlins Park. There is also pedestrian access, bicycle routes, taxi and limousine access, bridge opening regulations to alleviate traffic, civic center parking and group bus parking.

Marlins Park also features four state-of-the-art parking facilities with a capacity of 4,700 vehicles. The parking garages are managed by the City of Miami. The parking garages are located along first base, third base, home plate and center field, which render their names. In addition to garage parking, there are 1,000 parking spaces in surface lots to the east and west of the ballpark.

In addition to free-flow parking, the parking garages at Marlins Park will feature bike share stations and ChargePoint electric vehicle charging stations for guests. Fans can utilize the Citi Bike ${ }^{\circledR}$ program to get to and from Marlins Park. The Citi Bike program is intended to provide locals and visitors with an additional transportation option for getting around the city in a fun, efficient and convenient manner. Parking lot East \#1, on 14th Avenue and between NW 4 ST and NW 5 ST, will be designated the Ride Share lot. The Ride Share Lot will be up and running for all events, including concerts.

## "GREEN" BALLPARK

Marlins Park is the first retractable-roof LEED Gold Certified facility in the world. The ballpark's environmentally friendly design incorporates conservation, sustainability and energy efficiency. During construction, the Miami Marlins recycled more than $98 \%$ of the construction waste and engaged in pollution prevention plans. The design of the ballpark and the materials selected help promote conservation, pollution prevention as well as water reduction and energy efficiency. The Marlins also engaged in an indoor air quality plan to ensure the comfort and well-being of all fans.

The newly-introduced Free Flow Parking will reduce carbon emissions and fuel consumption with shorter wait times and less idling. In addition, bike share kiosks and electric vehicle charging stations were implemented in the parking garages at Marlins Park this offseason.

## TICKET DPERATIONS



Bruce Sherman enters his third season as Principal Owner of the Miami Marlins. Mr. Sherman serves as Chairman of the Board, representing the fourth ownership in Club history after receiving unanimous approval from Major League Owners to acquire the team effective October 2, 2017. Mr. Sherman currently serves on Major League Baseball's Investment Committee, Strategic Planning Committee, and Audit Committee.

Mr. Sherman is currently Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of M4 Capital, having retired from his position as Chief Executive Officer of Private Capital Management ("PCM") in 2009. He launched PCM in 1986 and built it into the largest independent asset manager in the Southeastern United States prior to selling the firm to Legg Mason in 2001. Following the sale, he retained autonomy over PCM's portfolio management and investment research and led the company to a prestigious \#1 ranking in the country as measured by Nelson's "World's Best Money Managers" for ten years, ending December 31, 2005.

Mr. Sherman has invested professionally and personally in the South Florida community. He has two daughters and four grandchildren, and is married to Cynthia Sherman, a retired partner of international law firm Rogers \& Wells. He formerly served on the Board of Directors of Artis-Naples, the premier center for the performing and visual arts in Southwest Florida. He and his wife are also Lifetime Trustees for the Naples Children \& Education Foundation supporting underprivileged and at-risk children in Collier County.

Mr. and Mrs. Sherman founded the Bruce and Cynthia Sherman Charitable Foundation. The Foundation administers the Sherman Prize to recognize and reward leading individuals who go above and beyond to make exceptional, pioneering contributions and inspire tomorrow's innovators in the fight to overcome Crohn's disease and ulcerative colitis. Honorees in 2019 hailed from the University of Miami Health System, Cleveland Clinic, and UC San Diego Health. The Foundation also endows the Bruce and Cynthia Sherman Professorship in Urological Research and Innovation at New York University's School of Medicine.

Mr. Sherman graduated from the University of Rhode Island in 1969 and earned his MBA from Bernard Baruch College in 1973.

## DEREK JETER

CHIEF EXEDUTIVE OFFICER

Derek Jeter enters his third season as CEO of the Miami Marlins. He is also part of the Miami Marlins' ownership group, the fourth in Club history, achieving unanimous approval by Major League Owners and acquiring the team on October 2, 2017. In his current role, he is the first African-American Owner/CEO in Major League Baseball history. He is also a member of MLB's Competition Committee.

As CEO, Mr. Jeter oversees the organization's day-to-day business and baseball operations. He was the driving force behind the club's rebranding for the 2019 season, implementing a logo and branding marks representative of the rich baseball history, diversity and energy of the South Florida community. Mr. Jeter has also overseen the numerous enhancements to Marlins Park over the past two offseasons, as the organization reimagines the fan experience and invests in the cost of fan attendance. Under his guidance, the organization relaunched the Miami Marlins Foundation in 2019 with a focus on wellness, empowerment and youth baseball and softball. His guidance on community outreach has also seen the launch of the Marlins Tee Ball initiative presented by Ultimate Software, with more than 200 local teams enrolled to receive uniform tops, hats and equipment for the community's future Major Leaguers.

In 2014, Mr. Jeter launched The Players' Tribune and serves as the founding publisher. The online venture provides athletes with a platform to connect directly with fans, in their own words, showcasing first-person stories from athletes, and giving fans unique insight into the daily sports conversation while bringing them closer to the game. The publication received the inaugural Sports Breakthrough of the Year award at the 2017 Sports Business Awards and appeared on Fast Company's 2017 Most Innovative Companies list.

Earlier this year, Mr. Jeter was elected to the Baseball Hall of Fame and will be inducted on July 26, 2020 in Cooperstown, NY. During his 20-year career as a Major League Baseball player, he was a 14 -time All-Star, winning five World Series championships, five Rawlings ${ }^{\circledR}$ Gold Gloves, and five Louisville Slugger ${ }^{\circledR}$ Silver Slugger awards. He compiled the sixth-most hits in Major League history $(3,465)$, while setting club records in hits, games played $(2,747)$, doubles ( 544 ), stolen bases (358), at-bats $(11,195)$, singles $(2,595)$ and hit-by-pitches $(170)$. On May 4,2017 , Jeter became the 22nd player in Yankees history to have his number retired.

In the midst of his American League Rookie of the Year season in 1996, Mr. Jeter started the Turn 2 Foundation, designed to create and support signature programs and activities that motivate young people to turn away from drugs and alcohol and 'Turn 2' healthy lifestyles. Since its inception, the Turn 2 Foundation has awarded more than $\$ 30$ million to create and support its programs.

Mr. Jeter's community service has been recognized throughout his career. He received the Joan Payson Award for community service in 1997, presented annually by the New York chapter of the Baseball Writers Association of America; was honored with the Sporting News' Good Guy in Sports award in 2002; and was selected as the 2009 Roberto Clemente Award winner - given annually to the Major League Baseball player who combines a dedication to giving back to the community with outstanding skills on the baseball field. During his first season as Marlins CEO, the organization received the Miami Beach Chamber of Commerce Distinguished Service Award, recognizing extraordinary community involvement that has generated extensive contributions to South Florida.

In addition to his focus on philanthropic efforts, Mr. Jeter established several personal business ventures upon his retirement from Major League Baseball. In 2013, he launched Jeter Publishing under Simon \& Schuster, with a focus on adult nonfiction and children's books. Mr. Jeter has authored both adult and children's books.

Michael Hill enters his seventh season as the Marlins' President of Baseball Operations, and his $18^{\text {th }}$ season with the organization. Mr. Hill was promoted to his current position on September 29, 2013. Mr. Hill previously served as the Marlins' General Manager for six full seasons; he was promoted to that position on Sept. 29, 2007, after serving as VP and Assistant General Manager. Mr. Hill is currently one of two African-Americans (fifth in MLB history), as well as one of two Hispanics, that presides over baseball operations for a Major League club.

Under the guidance of Mr. Hill, the Miami Marlins continue their plan to build a club that can achieve sustainable success with young, premium talents. This offseason, the Miami Marlins acquired All-Star veteran talents in INF Jesús Aguilar, OF Corey Dickerson, OF Matt Joyce and RHP Brandon Kintzler to pair with the blossoming young talents. Since December of 2017, eight of the club's top 10 prospects as ranked by Baseball America, including the top seven, were either drafted or acquired in that span. This offseason, the organization was recognized by MLB Pipeline for the most improved farm system. In 2014, Mr. Hill's first season as President of Baseball Operations, Miami made a 15-win improvement and became one of only three teams in MLB history to win 77-or-more games following a 100-loss season.

Mr. Hill is entering his $26^{\text {th }}$ season of MLB experience in various front office capacities following his retirement as a Minor League player. Mr. Hill spent three seasons with the Colorado Rockies, serving as the Club's Director of Player Development. Mr. Hill joined Colorado in 1999 after five years with the Tampa Bay Devil Rays (1995-99), where he worked as an assistant in the scouting and player development departments.

Mr. Hill was a 31st-round draft pick by the Texas Rangers in the June 1993 Draft. He played two seasons (1993-94) in the Rangers' system and one year (1995) in the Reds' organization before joining the Devil Rays' front office.

A 1993 graduate of Harvard University, Mr. Hill was elected senior class marshal (the equivalent of class president) while starring as the Crimson football team's top rusher and the baseball team's captain. Mr. Hill was born and raised in Cincinnati, Ohio, where he played football, baseball and basketball at the city's Country Day School.

Mr. Hill is quite active in the South Florida community, volunteering his time at several elementary and high schools, and serving as a mentor for the 5000 Role Models of Excellence Project.
In February 2016, the Hill Family Scholarship was launched as part of Mr. Hill's commitment to philanthropy and education in South Florida. The scholarship is inspired by the core values of Mr. Hill's family and looking to support a deserving student in the pursuit of a college career.

In addition, Mr. Hill has completed over 20 marathons and half marathons, the most recent being the World Marathon Challenge in 2018, in which he ran seven marathons in seven days on seven continents.

- Don Mattingly is entering his fifth year as manager for Miami, following a five-year stint with the Los Angeles Dodgers.
- In 2019, he became the longest-tenured manager in Club history.
- His 276 wins as Marlins manager are tied with Fredi González for the second-most in franchise history, trailing only Jack McKeon (281).
- Following the 2018 season, was manager of MLB Team during seven-game Japan All-Star Series with Nippon Professional Baseball. Marked 37th time since 1908 that Major Leaguers have toured Japan for exhibition games.
- After 2017 campaign began with 21-30 record through May, ranking 27th in the Majors and 12th in the National League, guided club to a 45-37 record from June 1-August 31 and finished season with eighth-best record in NL, 18th in Majors.
- In 2016, his first season with Marlins, led team to third-place finish in National League East with 79-82 record. Marked an eight-win improvement over 2015 club that went 71-91, and 79 wins were most by any Marlins team since 2010 (80).
- As manager of Los Angeles Dodgers from 2011-‘'15, owned winning records in each of his five seasons, including three consecutive division titles from 2013-15, the first time in Club history that the Dodgers reached the postseason in three straight seasons.
- Mattingly's .551 winning percentage ranked sixth in Dodgers history among managers with at least 250 games at the helm.
- In his five seasons, Dodgers led Majors with . 590 winning percentage (206-143) after All-Star break.
- The 2014 Dodgers remained over the .500 mark all year and finished the season without a losing streak longer than three games, joining the 1988 (161 games) and 1924 clubs ( 154 games) as the only teams in franchise history to go the entire season without a four-game slide (Stats LLO).
- Finished second in NL Manager of the Year voting in 2013 after guiding Dodgers from 12 games under . 500 and 9.5 games out of first place in June to a division title by 11.0 games over Arizona.
- From June 22-Aug. 17, 2013, guided Dodgers on an historic 42-8 (.840) stretch, the franchise's best 50-game run in Modern Era (since 1900). According to the Elias Sports Bureau, the Dodgers' 42 wins were tied for second-most by a Major League team in a 50-game span since 1900: the 1912 Giants, 1941 Yankees and 1942 Cardinals also posted 42-8 records during 50-game runs, while the Cubs went 45-5 during a 50-game stretch in 1906.
- Won Major League managerial debut with a 2-1 victory over Giants on March 31, 2011.
- On Sept. 17, 2010, it was announced that Mattingly would replace Joe Torre at the end of the season and become the 29th manager in Dodger franchise history (ninth in Los Angeles).
- Prior to managing, served as a coach under Torre from 2004-‘10. Was Yankees hitting coach from 2004-'06, Yankees bench coach in 2007, and took over as Dodgers' hitting coach at All-Star break in 2008 until being named manager.
- Also spent seven seasons as a special instructor during Yankees' Spring Training in Tampa, FL from 1997-2003, and managed Phoenix Desert Dogs in the 2010 Arizona Fall League.

- Played entire 14-year Major League career from 1982-95 with New York Yankees.
- Amassed 2,153 hits, 222 home runs, 1,099 RBI and a . 307 lifetime average in 1,785 games.
- Was six-time American League All-Star and was voted starting first baseman on American League squad in 1987 Midsummer Classic in Oakland.
- Was nine-time Rawlings ${ }^{\circledR}$ Gold Glove Award winner at first base, including five consecutive awards (1985-89) and four in-a-row from 1991-94.

Marlins pitchers combined to allow 48 less hits in 2019 despite pitching 2.1 more innings than 2018, trimming their opponent batting average from .254 in 2018 to .245 . The staff lowered its collective ERA from 4.76 to 4.74 , while the bullpen lowered its ERA from 5.33 to 4.97. The 'pen's strikeout-per-nine inning ratio jumped from 8.0 to 9.2. Marlins starters posted a 4.59 ERA (888.0/453), a . 240 average, and 808 strikeouts against 345 walks; they posted 96 more strikeouts than 2018 Marlins starters. Rookies accounted for 76 total starts ( $47 \%$ of starts), eight more starts than the previous season.
- Spent the previous three seasons as Mariners' pitching coach, during which time Seattle registered the sixth-best team ERA (4.19) and average against (.253) in the American League.

- Was hitting 225 with eight home runs and 34 RBI in 94 games for Milwaukee before July 31 trade to Tampa Bay, where he batted .261 with four home runs and 16 RBI in 37 games.
- Was on the Rays' Wild Card Game roster for their 5-1 win over Oakland but did not appear.

- Named a National League All-Star in 2018 with Milwaukee, when he was also named the club's Good Guy Award winner. Batted .274 with 35 home runs and 108 RBI in 149 games. Finished among NL leaders in RBI (108, T-4), slugging percentage (.539, fifth) HR ( $35, \mathrm{~T}-5$ ) and OPS (.890, ninth).
- Competed in the Home Run Derby during All-Star week at Nationals Park and fell to Philadelphia's Rhys Hoskins, 17-12, in the first round.
- Hit walk-off home runs on April 21 vs. Miami and June 22 vs. St. Louis. They were the first walk-off homers of his career.

## CARER MIGHLIGTS

- Sandy Alcantara (Al-CON-ta-RA) Montero finished his first full season with the Marlins in 2019 without missing a turn through the rotation, posting a 6-14 record with 3.88 ERA (197.1 IP/85 ER) in 32 starts. He held opponents to a 241 average against with 151 strikeouts.
- His 197.1 innings set a Marlins' rookie record, surpassing Scott Olsen's 180.2 innings in 2006, and the most by a Marlin overall since Nathan Eovaldi tossed 199.2 in 2014. It was also the most by a rookie in the Majors since Boston's Daisuke Matsuzaka threw 204.2 frames in 2007, and the most by an NL rookie since 1997, when Matt Morris had 217.0
 for St. Louis and Chris Holt had 209.2 for Houston.
- His 32 starts were the most by a rookie in Club history, besting the previous record of 31 starts held by Brian Meadows in 1998 and Scott Olsen in 2006. They were the most by any Marlins' starter since Dan Straily had 33 in 2017.
- His ERA and average against also made the Franchise rookie leaderboards. His ERA ranked second behind only José Fernández in 2013 (2.19), and his average against was the thirdlowest mark, trailing Fernández (.182) and Olsen (.239). His average against also ranked 18th among all qualified starters in Club history, the lowest since José Ureña held batters to a 238 average in 2017.
- Among qualified National League rookies this season, he ranked second in average against, behind Atlanta's Mike Soroka (.236), and third in ERA and strikeouts.
- He tossed two shutouts (May 19 vs. Mets, September 8 vs. Kansas City). He tied Dontrelle Willis in 2003 for the most shutouts by a rookie in Club history. He became just the eighth rookie pitcher since 2000 to record two shutouts in a season, the first since Mike Montgomery in 2015 for Seattle, and the first NL pitcher since J.A. Happ in 2009 for Philadelphia. His two shutouts in 2019 were tied with Cleveland's Shane Bieber and the White Sox' Lucas Giolito for the most shutouts in the Majors.
- He allowed just two hits and struck out eight in shutting out the Mets. He needed just 89 pitches, the second-fewest in a 9.0 -inning complete game in Club history, behind an 88 -pitch outing by Henderson Alvarez in 2014. It was the first shutout for Miami since Edinson Volquez's no-hitter on June 3, 2017 vs. Arizona. He became the first rookie pitcher to toss a shutout since San Francisco's Ty Blach did so on June 2, 2017 at Philadelphia.
- In his opening start of the season, on March 31 vs. Colorado, tossed a then career-high 8.0 shutout innings, allowing just four hits and striking out six. He retired 18 of the last 19 batters he faced, and was the first Marlins' starter with 8.0 shutout innings and no walks since José Fernández did so on September 20, 2016 vs. Washington. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, Alcantara was the second-youngest pitcher ( 23 years, 205 days) in Club history to toss 8.0 shutout innings; the youngest was Fernández, who did so at 21 years, 272 days on April 29, 2014 vs. Atlanta.
- Alcantara was Miami's lone representative in this year's All-Star Game at Progressive Field. He became the fifth rookie in Club history to be named an All-Star, joining Alex Gonzalez (1999), Dontrelle Willis (2003), Dan Uggla (2006), and José Fernández (2013). In the All-Star Game on July 9, he came on in relief in the eighth inning and tossed a scoreless frame, allowing just one hit and striking out one.
- He went 0-2 with a 7.89 ERA (21.2/19) in his first four starts to begin the second half, but bounced back over his final 11 starts of the season, posting a 2-4, 2.78 (74.1/23) line, limiting batters to a . 207 average with 62 strikeouts. His ERA from August 5 onward ranked eighth in the National League and his average against was 10th.

Alcantara is one of 11 children. He has seven sisters and three brothers. He left home at the age of 11 to live with his sister, Aridia, in Santo Domingo to attend better schools and baseball practices. While he was playing in the Arizona Fall League in 2017, his brother, Alexander, was killed in a motorcycle accident at the age of 17. Alcantara has dedicated his career to his younger brother and tattooed his nickname "Lexi" on his left arm.

- He worked at least 7.0 innings in 11 outings in 2019, the most by a Marlin since José Fernández did so 13 times in 2016. Miami went 7-4 in those starts and 4-17 in his other outings.
- Alcantara received an average of 3.06 runs of support per start, by far the lowest in the Majors among qualified pitchers, ahead of the Kansas City’s Brad Keller (3.81). It was the third-lowest single-season mark in Franchise history (Nathan Eovaldi, 2.70 in 2014 and Josh Johnson, 2.92 in 2012).
- Finished first season in Marlins' system in 2018 with six Major League starts, posting a 2-3 record and 3.44 ERA (34.0 IP/13 ER). In 19 starts at Triple-A New Orleans, went $6-3$ with a 3.89 ERA ( $115.2 \mathrm{IP} / 50 \mathrm{ER}$ ). Also had three rehab starts at Single-A Jupiter, where he had no

- At the time of his final promotion, ranked seventh in Pacific Coast League in ERA (3.89). Among PCL leaders, ranked second in average against (.246), third in WHIP (1.25), and fewest base runners per 9.0 (11.67).
- Made season debut with Miami on June 29, making first Major League start against Mets at Marlins Park. Allowed just one run on three hits with five walks and two strikeouts over 5.0 innings to record first Major League win.
- The night after his debut, Pablo López made his first career Major League start and also earned a win. The pair became the first set of teammates to earn wins in their first career starts in consecutive days since April 9-10, 2012, when Yu Darvish and Neftali Feliz each made their first career starts with the Rangers. The last National League team to have such a duo was the Reds on April 15-16, 1967 with Gary Nolan and Mel Queen. - Stats LLC
- Recalled by Miami on September 1 and made second start on Sept. 5 vs. Philadelphia. In that start, held Phillies scoreless on three hits and two walks, while striking out six, over a career-high 7.0 innings.
- Had contract selected by St. Louis on September 1, 2017 and made debut on Sept. 3 at San Francisco. Allowed one run and two hits over 0.2 inning, surrendering eighth-inning leadoff home run to Tim Federowicz. Recorded first MLB strikeout three batters later (Buster Posey).

He's doing a better job of throwing strikes and commanding his pitches, quieting talk that he'd wind up in the bullpen if he couldn't add more polish. If all goes according to plan, Sixto Sanchez and Cabrera should headline Miami's rotation in the near future." - MLBPipeline.com

- Combined to strike out 17 in two starts from April 13-19, which marked most strikeouts by a Marlins left-handed starter in consecutive appearances since Dontrelle Willis (18 from Sept. 10-15, 2006: Stats LLC). Did so for second time from June 1-7.

## CARER HIGKLIGKTS

- He became the first player in Club history to hit a go-ahead homer in the seventh inning or later in back-to-back games on Sept. 3 \& 4 at Pittsburgh. First was a go-ahead 10th-inning solo shot; second a game-tying two-run homer in the 7th inning.
- Miami was 10-5 when he homered, and 19-10 when he had an RBI.
- Limited to 14 games in 2018 due to two stints on disabled list for right wrist injuries.
- Missed 85 games from April 5 (retro to April 2) through July 5 with a contusion after being hit by a pitch; suffered a sprain and returned to DL on July 24 , eventually undergoing season-ending surgery to repair a torn tendon sheath.
- Was $1 \times 7$ with an RBI in just four games prior to first injury, suffered April 1 vs. Cubs.

## CARER KIGKLIEMTS

- McKenzie Corey Dickerson began the 2019 season with the Pittsburgh Pirates before being traded to the Philadelphia Phillies on July 31.
- Played 78 games, 44 with Pittsburgh and 34 with Philadelphia Hit .315 with 18 doubles, four home runs, and 25 RBI for the Pirates and 293 with 10 doubles, right homers and 34 RBI for the Phillies.
- Missed two months with Pittsburgh with a posterior right shoulder strain. Season ended with Philadelphia after he fractured his foot on September 17.

- Won the Rawlings Gold Glove Award for left field in 2018, his first season with the Pirates. Ranked first among National League left fielders with a . 996 fielding percentage and second among all NL outfielders in fielding percentage behind Charlie Blackmon (.997), who made one error in 297 chances. Made one error in 263 total chances and set career highs in assists (seven) and starts (122); made his lone error (a throwing miscue) on August 26 at Milwaukee.
- Ranked eighth among the National League leaders in batting average. His 55 extra base hits were the most by a Pirates left fielder since Jason Bay recorded 67 in 2006. Set career high in triples and matched career high in stolen bases.
- Was Pittsburgh's recipient of the MLBPA Heart and Hustle Award.
- Hit his first career walk-off home run on April 26 off Detroit's Alex Wilson in the Pirates' 1-0 win.
- As a member of the Tampa Bay Rays Dickerson was named to the American League All-Star team in 2017 for the first time in his career after being elected by the fans as the starting designated hitter.

Rather than play travel ball as a kid, he honed his swing with his older brother Craig. They buill

- Established career highs in games, runs, hits, extra base hits (64), their own pitcher's mound and competed hitting ping pong balls with a broomstick. home runs, total bases (288) and multi-hit games (51). Hit six leadoff home runs; tied for third in the Majors behind Houston's George Springer (nine) and Minnesota's Brian Dozier (eight).
- Set a club record with the six leadoff home runs. Hit three leadoff home runs within the Rays' first 21 games; the fastest in club history to do that. Hit a leadoff home run five times as the designated hitter; the only other instance of that in the Majors in 2017 was Cleveland's Francisco Lindor (it only occurred three times in club history from 1998-2016). Hit 15 home runs out of the leadoff spot; the third-most in a single season in club history behind Gerald Williams (21) in 2000 and Logan Forsythe (20) in 2016.
- Was the American League's outright leader in average (.330) through June 26; the latest into a season by date that a Rays player led the AL batting race, surpassing Jason Bartlett, who led the AL through June 6, 2009.
- Recorded four hits in a game five times; Jose Abreu was the only player in the Majors to record more games with four hits or more (seven).
- Became the fourth Rays player to start an All-Star Game (sixth selected for the honor).
- Spent first season with Tampa Bay and established a career high in doubles in 2016.
- Had 63 of his 125 hits ( $50.4 \%$ ) go for extra bases; the second-highest ratio in the American League behind Boston's David Ortiz (87 of 169, 51.5\%); was also the highest mark by a Rays player since Carlos Pena in 2009 (61.9).
- Recorded a club record 22 doubles after the All-Star break, which ranked fourth in the American League. Ranked sixth in the American League with 34 extra base hits in the second half.
- Was limited to 65 games during his final season with Colorado in 2015 making three trips to the disabled list.
- Was Colorado's Opening Day starter in left field; his first career Opening Day start. Went 2-for-5 with a career-high tying four RBI; hit a two-run homer in the first inning off Kyle Lohse and a two-run double in the fourth inning in a 10-0 win to become the fourth Rockie to homer in the first inning on Opening Day and the first since lan Stewart on April 5, 2010 at Milwaukee.

Tore his labrum at a baseball camp during his junior year, forcing a move from shortstop to the outfield, as well as a move from quarterback to wide receiver. Played two seasons at Meridian (MS) Community College. He was committed to transfer to Mississippi State when he signed with the Rockies in 2010. Grew up an Atlanta Braves fan, and Hall-of-Famer Chipper Jones was among the factors in choosing No. 10. with the Rays. Had his college jersey No. 23 retired in a ceremony in February 2018. His high school jersey No. 3 is also retired.

## CARER KIGKLIGUTS

- Robert Lee Dugger (DOUG-er) went 0-4 record with a 5.77 ERA (34.1/22) over seven starts for Miami in 2019, his first experience in the Majors.
- He had his contract selected on August 5 and was designated as the 26 th man for a doubleheader at the Mets, making his Major League debut with the start in game one. He allowed six runs on five hits, with three strikeouts, over 5.0 innings in a 6-2 defeat against Jacob deGrom.
- He was sent back to NOLA following the start, but made just two starts for the Baby Cakes before being recalled to Miami for the remainder of the season on August 28. In those two starts for NOLA, he allowed four runs over 13.0 innings, with 17 strikeouts.
- Had a career-best outing in his second start, on August 29 vs. Cincinnati, allowing two unearned runs on three hits and a walk, with a career-high seven strikeouts over 7.0 innings, in the 4-3 defeat.
- From August 29 to September 14 , he allowed two-or-fewer earned runs in all four of his outings. He held a 3.29 ERA ( $27.1 / 10$ ) with 19 strikeouts against 11 walks, limiting opponents to a 216 batting average. Over that stretch, his average against ranked sixth among rookies (min. 4 GS ), while his ERA ranked seventh.
- In his final start, on September 25 at the Mets, he allowed seven runs (six earned) on six hits and two walks, over 2.0 innings, in a 10-3 defeat.
- In 23 starts between Double-A Jacksonville and Triple-A New Orleans in 2018, he held an 8-10 record with a 5.15 ERA (124.0/71). His total innings of 158.1 marked a new career high.
- He was assigned to Triple-A New Orleans on June 20. He was tied for third in the Southern League in wins (6), while ranking seventh in strikeouts (73) at the time of his promotion.

Joyce has always wanted to wear 7 to honor his father and his father's favorite player, Mickey Mantle, but the number was always taken, including in high school when he lost a coin flip to his best friend for it. the lead in walks and tied for second in extra base hits (4).

- Signed a two-year deal with the A's following the before the 2017 season and hit a career-high 25 HR in his 10th season in the Majors. Had career bests in at-bats (469), runs (78), doubles (33),walks (66), extra base hits (58) and matched his high in games played (141). Tied for eighth in the AL in sacrifice flies (7) and ranked 10th in pitches per plate appearance (4.17).
- Signed a minor league contract with Pittsburgh in February of 2016 and spent the entire season with the Pirates. Added 59 walks for a careerhigh .403 on-base percentage. The OBP was fourth best in the NL among players with 250 or more plate appearances. Also had a career-high .866 OPS. 21 of his walks came as a pinch hitter, which set a Major League record for most walks by a pinch hitter. Broke the previous mark of 20 held by Matt Franco (1999 Mets) and Greg Norton (2009 Braves).
- Went $13 \times 59$ (.220) with four home runs, 15 RBI and a 452 on-base percentage as a pinch hitter. Led ML pinch hitters in RBI, tied for the lead in homers and ranked second with 81 plate appearances (Gosselin, ARI 83). The RBI fell one short of Willie Stargell's club record of 16 set in 1982.
- Spent his only season with the Los Angeles Angels after being acquired by the Halos in a trade with Tampa Bay during the offseason in 2015. Season was shortened by a one-month stint on the Injured List with a concussion.
- Set a Rays record on April 25, 2014 at Chicago (AL) after drawing five walks in the game. First AL player to walk five times in a nine-inning game without an intentional walk since Rickey Henderson on July 30, 2000.
- Spent all of 2013 with the Rays, hitting .235 with 18 home runs and 47 RBI in 140 games.
- Entered the game on September 29, 2012 at Chicago (AL) as a pinch hitter and later hit a solo home run in addition to a three-run shot. Became the first Rays player to hit two home runs in a game he didn't start and the first AL player with two home runs and four RBI as a sub since Minnesota's Matt LeCroy (September 13, 2002).
- The Rays Opening Day right fielder was named an American League All-Star in his first full season in the majors in 2011.
- Led the majors in hitting as late as June 2, with a highwater mark of . 377 on May 27 , and finished the season with a 277 ( 128 -for-462) average.

Ranked 3rd among AL rookies with a . 492 slugging pct. behind Texas' Chris Davis (.549) and Rays' Evan Longoria (.531). Had his contract purchased by the Tigers on May 5. Made his major league debut that night against Boston, starting in right field. He collected his first major league hit on May 7 vs. Boston, a single in the 5th inning off Julian Tavarez. - Matthew Ryan Kemp is one of only two active Major League players with at least 250 HR (280) and 150 stolen bases (183), joining Ryan Braun ( 322 HR, 204 SB).

- Pablo José López made just 21 starts in 2019, missing over two months on the Injured List with a right shoulder strain. He went $5-8$ with a 5.09 ERA ( $111.1 \mathrm{ip} / 63$ er) overall.
- His $2.19 \mathrm{BB} / 9$ ratio this season was the 13th-lowest in Franchise history (min. 21 GS ).

López, whose father (retired) and late mother were doctors, was accepted into medical school at the age of 16 , but opted to pursue his baseball career.

- On June 4 at Milwaukee, he scattered three hits and a walk, with seven strikeouts, across 6.0 shutout innings in a 16-0 victory. It was just the seventh time in Club history that a starter has been in the game for $15+$ runs of support (team record is 18).
- On September 11 vs. Milwaukee, issued a season-high four walks, snapping a streak of eight straight starts allowing one-or-zero walks. The stretch was tied for the fourth-longest streak by a starter in Club history, behind Ricky Nolasco (13), Dan Straily (9), and Justin Nicolino (9).

## CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Miguel Elias Rojas Naidenoff set career highs in hits (137), doubles (29), runs scored (52), and walks (32) in his fifth season with the Marlins in 2019.
- He hit . 284 ( $137 \times 483$ ), his highest single-season average since batting .290 in 90 games in 2017.

## CARER MIGHLIGTS

## CARER hIGKLIGUTS

- Caleb Anthony Smith went 10-11 with a 4.52 ERA ( 153.1 ip/77 er) in 28 starts in 2019, striking out 168 batters.
- Among pitchers with at least 28 starts, his 9.86 strikeout per nine rate ranked second in Club history, and his .223 average against ranked fifth. His 168 strikeouts were the third-most strikeouts by a left-handed pitcher (see charts at right).
- His . 223 average against ranked ninth in the Senior Circuit (min. 28 starts), his $27.8 \%$ swing and miss rate ranked ninth, his $26 \%$ strikeout percentage ranked 12th, and his strikeouts per nine rate ranked 11th.
- He began the season 3-1 with a 2.38 ERA (53.0/14) over his first nine starts, striking out 71 and walking just 14. He posted a 0.89 WHIP and held opponents to a .178 batting average. His WHIP was the best in Club history through nine starts, while his opponent batting average was the second-best (behind Dan Straily, . 164 in 2017).
- He struck out at least six batters in each of his first nine starts, the longest streak to open a season in Club history.
- He struck out a career-high 11 batters over 6.2 innings on a career-high 112 pitches on May 7 at the Cubs. He allowed two runs on five hits and three walks, but did not earn a decision in a 5-2 loss.
- He landed on the Injured List on June 7 with left shoulder tightness following his start at Milwaukee.
- At the time of his IL stint, he was $3-4$ with a 3.41 ERA ( $66.0 / 25$ ), holding opponents to .198 average, and
striking out 82 batters in 12 starts. His average against ranked seventh ( $\min .12 \mathrm{GS}$ ) in the Majors (third in NL), while his 11.18 strikeouts per nine rate also was seventh-best in the Majors (third in NL).
- He had a five-game hitting streak from July 6 to August 9 (.545; 6x11), which was tied with Dontrelle Willis in 2007 and Jack Armstrong in 1993 for the second-longest streak by a pitcher in Franchise history, behind a six-game stretch by Willis from May 23 to June 23, 2005.
- In 16 total starts after returning from the Injured List, he went 7-7 with a 5.36 ERA (87.1/52), striking out 86 batters and issuing 40 walks. Opponents batted . 241 against him. He allowed 20 home runs over the span, which was tied with Detroit's Matt Boyd and the Angels' Jaime Barria for the most home runs allowed from July 6 onward.
- Made just 16 starts for Miami in 2018 before suffering season-ending lat strain June 24.
- Underwent surgery to repair a Grade 3 lat strain on July 9. Led all MLB rookies in strikeouts (88) at time of injury.
- His 88 strikeouts were most by a left-handed rookie in the first half in Club history. They were second-most overall in Club history, behind only José Fernández (103 in 2013).
- Among pitchers with at least 15 starts, ranked 15 th in the National League with a strikeout rate of $27.0 \%$ ( $88 / 326 \mathrm{BF}$ ). He ranked 10th in NL in strikeouts/9.0 at 10.24. Among left-handed pitchers, ranked third in strikeouts/9.0 and fifth in strikeout percentage.
- Also among pitchers with at least 15 starts, ranked 15th in the NL in hits allowed per 9.0 innings (7.33). Ranked third among NL lefties, behind only Robbie Ray (7.06) and Patrick Corbin (7.29).
- His 220 ( $63 \times 286$ ) average against ranked 13th among NL starters (min. 15 GS), third among lefties behind Robbie Ray (.216) and Patrick Corbin (.218).

## CARER HIGKLIGMTS

- Ryne Stanek (STAN-ik) opened 2019 with the Tampa Bay Rays, making 41 appearances, including 27 as the team's "opener." Finished the season with 22 appearances out of the bullpen for Miami.
- With Tampa Bay, went $0-2$ with a 3.40 ERA ( $55.2 \mathrm{ip} / 21$ er) and held opponents to a 214 average, with 61 strikeouts ( 9.9 per 9.0 innings). He posted a 2.09 ERA (43.0/10), limiting opposing hitters to a 190 and 10.26 strikeout per nine rate ( $49 / 43.0$ ) in the 27 starts.
- Went 0-1 with 7.82 (12.2/11) ERA in 14 relief outings for Tampa, then went $0-2$ with a 5.48 ERA out of the 'pen for Miami.
- In 2018, made 59 appearances ( 29 starts as an opener) and became the first pitcher with 25 starts and 25 relief outings in a season since Hugh Mulcahy ( 26 GS, 30 relief appearances) in 1937 and the first AL pitcher since Eddie Rommel (31 starts, 25 relief appearances) in 1923.
- Also was the first rookie in Major League history with 25 starts and 25 relief appearances in a single season.
- From June 7 to July 10 , made nine consecutive scoreless starts to set an MLB record; though he totaled only 13.2 innings over the span. Surpassed Zack Greinke (6, 43.2 IP), Orel Hershiser (6, 55.0 IP) and Don Drysdale (6, 54.0 IP ).
- Was first pitcher in the Majors with at least 12 appearances and seven starts within a calendar month since Philadelphia's Karl Drews (12 games, seven starts) in June 1953, and first AL pitcher to do so since Jim Walkup (14 games, seven starts) of the St. Louis Browns in August 1935.
- Was the first pitcher to ever make 12 appearances and seven starts within a single calendar month without allowing a run.
- In 2017, made 21 appearances over three stints with the Rays, his first career Major League action. Made his MLB debut on May 14 at Boston, allowing one hit in 0.1 inning. Spent most of year with Triple-A Durham and went $3-0$ with a 1.21 ERA (44.2/6) and 60 strikeouts in 37 games.
- Split the 2016 season between Double-A Montgomery and Triple-A Durham. Made 11 consecutive starts in Double-A to begin season. Went 1-6 with a 4.62 ERA (60.1/31). Was moved to the bullpen and made 23 straight relief appearances between both levels to finish the year, posting a 3-4 record with a 3.83 ERA (42.1/18) in that time.

- Jordan Michael Michiru Yamamoto made his Major League debut in June 2019 and recorded one of the best starts to a career in Club history.
- His average against (.191) ranked third in the Majors (min. 15 starts), behind Houston's Justin Verlander (.172) and Gerrit Cole (.186), and was the second-lowest mark in Franchise history (min. 15 starts), behind José Fernandez in 2013 (.182).

- He was recalled from Double-A Jacksonville on June 12 and made his MLB debut that night vs. St. Louis. He tossed 7.0 shutout innings, scattering three hits and two walks, with five strikeouts, in a 9-0 victory.
- His 7.0 innings tied a club record for innings pitched in an MLB debut (Dillon Peters, Brad Penny, and Justin Nicolino); his three hits were tied for the fewest allowed in a start (Peters); and it was only the third scoreless debut (Peters and Nicolino).

- He followed that up with another 7.0 scoreless innings, also against the Cardinals, this time on June 18 in St. Louis ( $6-0$ win). According to the Elias Sports Bureau, he became just the second pitcher since 1893 (when the current mound distance was established) whose first two career outings were scoreless starts against the same opponent; the other was Atlanta's Larry McWilliams, who did so vs. the Mets on July 17 (7.0 ip) and July 23 ( 6.0 ip) in 1978.


Among the many hobbies that Yamamoto has outside of baseball - such as drawing, clay sculpting, and DIY home improvements - is hair cutting. He has served as the team barber for his Minor League clubs and during his Arizona Fall League stint in 2018.

- On June 23 at Philadelphia, won his third consecutive appearance to open his career, becoming the first pitcher in Club history to do so. He was just the second pitcher in the Modern Era (since 1900) to win each of his first three career starts and allow seven-or-fewer hits, joining Cincinnati's Wayne Simpson in 1970 (7 hits in 25.0 ip) - Elias Sports Bureau
- Yamamoto and San Diego's Chris Paddack (also 2019) both opened their careers with five straight starts allowing three-or-fewer hits, the only pitchers since 1900 to do so. St. Louis's Tom Cheney (1957-'59) did not allow more than three hits over his first five career starts, and the Angels' Cory Rasmus (2014-15) had a seven-start streak, but those were not their five career appearances. - Elias Sports Bureau
- Yamamoto allowed four-or-fewer hits in each of his first eight starts of his career. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, he was the only starting pitcher since 1893 to allow four-or-fewer hits in his first eight career starts (excluding openers).
- Picked up his fourth win in his sixth start, and was $4-0$ with a 1.59 ERA (34.0/6) at that point. Over his next seven starts, went 0-5, 8.13 (34.1/31). However, opponents batted just . 241 against him during the skid.
- He gave up his first home run in the first inning of his seventh start, which was also his first loss, on July 21 at the Dodgers. He became just the fourth pitcher in Club history to make six-plus starts without a home run allowed to open his career, joining Kevin Olsen (7 starts/40.1 ip from 2001-'02), Jason Vargas (6/38.1 in 2005), and Josh Johnson (6/37.0 from 2005-'06).
- After the seventh start of that stretch, was placed on the Injured List (right forearm strain) and missed 25 games. Returned on September 21 and made two starts. Did not factor in the decision in either outings (team was 1-1), but posted a 1.74 ERA ( $10.1 / 2$ ) and allowed just seven hits combined (. 189 average against).
- He was tied for 10th in strikeouts in the Southern League when promoted to Miami.
- Combined to go 6-1 with a 1.83 ERA ( $68.2 / 14$ er) over 13 starts for the GCL Marlins (rehab), High-A Jupiter and Double-A Jacksonville in 2018. Had 85 strikeouts and 14 walks in 68.2 innings, finishing with a 6.1 strikeout/ walk ratio.

AUGUST 8, 1985 -Major League Baseball's new basic agreement permits the National League to expand by two teams to match the American League's 14.

OCTOBER 31, 1987 - U.S. Senators from eight states, including Florida, announce they have formed a congressional task force to investigate baseball expansion.

JUNE 15, 1989 - Baseball says it will announce a timetable for NL expansion within 90 days of the completion of a new basic agreement between the players and owners.

MARCH 7, 1990 - H. Wayne Huizenga announces he has purchased half of Joe Robbie Stadium and 15 percent of the Miami Dolphins for an estimated $\$ 30$ million. Huizenga states his intention to aggressively pursue an expansion franchise.

SEPTEMBER 13, 1990 - Dade County Commission repeals an ordinance that had limited Joe Robbie Stadium to 18 events a year.

SEPTEMBER 18, 1990 - The National League Expansion Committee hears presentations from all three South Florida groups and one from the Miami Beacon Council.

DECEMBER 18, 1990 - The NL unveils a list of six possible sites. South Florida is included, along with Tampa-St. Petersburg, Orlando, Denver, Buffalo and Washington, D.C. From the South Florida interests, Huizenga's group is chosen.

JANUARY 26, 1991 - Renovations begin to transform Joe Robbie Stadium into a baseball stadium.

FEBRUARY 25, 1991- The National League Expansion Committee tours Joe Robbie Stadium.

MARCH 30-31, 1991 - Joe Robbie Stadium hosts two exhibition games between the New York Yankees and the Baltimore Orioles, which draw 125,013 fans. This includes a Spring Training record 67,654 sellout on the first night.

JUNE 10, 1991 - Baseball Commissioner Fay Vincent announces Denver and South Florida as the two areas chosen by the expansion committee.

JUNE 12-13, 1991 - Major League owners meet in Santa Monica, Calif., and an ownership committee unanimously approves the two ownership groups. National League owners informally ratify Denver and South Florida.

JULY 5, 1991-Owners unanimously approve the Florida Marlins and the Colorado Rockies as baseball's two newest franchises.

JULY 8, 1991-Carl Barger, President of the Pittsburgh Pirates since 1987, is hired as the Marlins first President.

JULY 18, 1991 - Marlins unveil their new team logo before approximately 1,700 guests at Turnberry Isle \& Country Club.

SEPTEMBER 18, 1991 - Dave Dombrowski, Montreal Expos General Manager, is named

## Executive Vice President and General Manager of the Marlins.

NOVEMBER 7, 1991 - Fredi Gonzalez is hired as the Marlins first Minor League manager.

DECEMBER 10, 1991 - Marlins obtain an agreement to join the Gulf Coast League's Central Division beginning in June of 1992. Carlos Tosca will manage the team.

DECEMBER 11, 1991 - Marlins sign a one-year agreement with the Erie (PA) Sailors of the New York-Penn League for 1992. The Short-Season team will begin play in June of 1992 with a 78 -game schedule. Fredi Gonzalez is named to manage the club.

DECEMBER 16, 1991 - Clemente Nuñez, a 16-year-old right-handed pitcher from the Dominican Republic, is signed to a Minor League contract by scout Edmundo Borrome. The Marlins' first player is assigned to the Gulf Coast rookie league.

FEBRUARY 28, 1992 - Marlins hold first-ever tryout camp at Bucky Dent Baseball School in Delray Beach and sign Ryan Whitman, a 20-year-old right-handed pitcher from Palm Beach Gardens, to a Minor League contract. More than 600 baseball hopefuls participate in the camp.

Sun Life Stadium, originally known as Joe Robbie Stadium, was the first of its kind to be constructed entirely with private funds. The late Joe Robbie led the financing campaign to build "Joe Robbie Stadium"(JRS) for the Miami Dolphins of the National Football League (NFL). JRS revolutionized the economics of professional sports when it opened in 1987. Inclusion of a Club Level, along with Executive Suites, helped to finance the construction of the stadium. The original multi-purpose facility had more than 1.5 million square feet, over 24,000 parking spaces, 75,000 seats and a playing field that meets standards for the NFL and World Cup Soccer.

On March 7, 1990, H. Wayne Huizenga, then Chairman of the Board and Chief Executive Officer of Blockbuster Video and Huizenga Holdings Inc., agreed to purchase 50 percent of Joe Robbie Stadium and became the point man in the drive to bring Major League Baseball to South Florida. That effort was rewarded in July of 1991, when South Florida was awarded a National League expansion franchise. To accommodate MLB baseball and the Florida Marlins, the stadium was retrofitted in 1992 to include retractable seating, a baseball press box, baseball dugouts, new lights and a hydraulic disappearing pitcher's mound. On January 24, 1994, Mr. Huizenga acquired the remaining 50 percent of the stadium to give him complete ownership.

In February 2008, Mr. Huizenga sold 50 percent of the Miami Dolphins, stadium and surrounding developable land to Stephen M. Ross of New York and Palm Beach. Mr. Ross, Chairman of the Related Companies, an international real estate development company, became an active partner. In January 2009, Mr. Ross closed on the purchase of an additional 45 percent of the team and stadium.

MARLINS PISTSEASIN RECDRIS

POSTSEASON FIRSTS: The Florida Marlins played their first franchise postseason game on September 30, 1997, a 2-1 win over the San Francisco Giants in Miami. Kevin Brown threw the first playoff pitch in franchise history, to Darryl Hamilton. Brown collected the first Florida postseason strikeout, fanning J.T. Snow to lead off the second inning. Brown retired the first 14 Giants he faced before allowing the first hit to an opponent, a single to Stan Javier with two outs in the fifth inning. Florida's first postseason batter was Devon White, who faced Kirk Rueter and popped out to second baseman Jeff Kent. The first Marlin to reach base was Gary Sheffield on a two-out first-inning walk. The first Florida hit came off the bat of Bobby Bonilla, following the Sheffield walk. The first run allowed by Florida came in the top of the seventh, when Bill Mueller hit a leadoff homer. The Marlins scored their first run in the bottom of the inning, on a Charles Johnson leadoff homer.

A FIRST FOR EVERYTHING: The Marlins became the first team to qualify for the postseason and win the World Series as a Wild Card. At the time, Florida was the fastest expansion team to win the World Series, done in their fifth season. The Arizona Diamondbacks surpassed Florida's mark, winning their World Series title in 2001, their fourth season.

RECORD WINNING STREAKS: The Marlins were the third team in postseason history to sweep their first playoff series in team history, joining the 1914 Braves, who swept the Philadelphia A's, and the 1969 New York Mets, who swept Atlanta. Florida began its postseason run with four straight wins, only the second team in baseball history with a franchise-opening playoff win streak of four or more games. The Braves won five straight games to open their postseason history, a four-game sweep in the 1914 World Series and a win over Cleveland in the 1948 playoffs.

## NATIONAL LEAGUE DIVISION SERIES NOTES

SWEEPING SUCCESS: With their 3-0 sweep over the Giants, the Marlins became the fastest expansion team to win a postseason series (surpassed by Arizona in 2001). Prior to the Marlins, the fastest NL team to win a playoff series was the New York Mets, in their eighth season. The Marlins won each of the three games over the Giants in comeback fashion, including games one and two in their final at-bats. The 1997 Marlins led the Majors with 24 last at-bat victories in the regular season.

## NATIONAL LEAGUE CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES NOTES

LIVÁN MOST VALUABLE, PART 1: Liván Hernández went 2-0 with a 0.84 ERA in two appearances (one start) in the NLCS vs. Atlanta. He became the first pitcher in LCS history to record a win as both a starter (Game 5) and as a reliever (Game 3) in the same series. In Game 5, Hernández established an NLCS record and tied an LCS record with 15 strikeouts, the second-highest strikeout game in postseason history. His 2-1, three-hit win in Game 5 was his first Major League complete game.

NUMBERS DON'T ALWAYS MATCH UP: The 1997 Marlins became the second team to advance to the World Series, despite posting a lower batting average and higher ERA than their LCS opponent. The Braves outhit the Marlins .253 to 199 and had a 2.60 ERA, compared to Florida's 3.57. The first time it happened was in 1992, when the Braves topped the Pittsburgh Pirates in a series managed by Bobby Cox and Jim Leyland.

## WORLD SERIES NOTES

LIVÁN MOST VALUABLE, PART 2: Liván Hernández (2-0, 5.27 ERA) became the second rookie in MLB history to win the World Series MVP award, joining Larry Sherry of Los Angeles-NL, who claimed the honor in 1959. Hernández also became the first rookie pitcher in 50 years to win two World Series starts. The last rookie to do it was the Yankees' Spec Shea in 1947. Hernández became the youngest pitcher to win a World Series opener at the age of 22 years, 7 months and 28 days. He was the first rookie to win a Series game since Atlanta's Mike Stanton on October 23, 1991 (G4 vs. MIN), and first rookie starter to win since Baltimore's Storm Davis on October 15, 1983 (G4 at PHI). Prior to Hernández, the last rookie starter to win a Series opener was Philadelphia's Bob Walk (October 14, 1980 vs. KC).

JIM LEYLAND: Marlins manager Jim Leyland became the first World Series manager not to have played in a Major League game since Boston's John McNamara in 1986. The last National League skipper without Major League playing experience was Philadelphia's Paul Owens in 1983. Leyland became the first manager to win his World Series debut since Cincinnati's Lou Piniella on October 16, 1990, vs. Oakland.

BRRR: In Game Three of the World Series, October 21, the Marlins and Indians played in 15-degree wind chill temperatures, the coldest World Series game ever played, according to records kept.

PLAYING EXTRAS: Game Seven of the World Series, won by Florida, 3-2, on an Edgar Rentería single off Charles Nagy in the bottom of the $11^{\text {th }}$ inning, was the third Game Seven in World Series history to go to extra innings. The others were played in 1924 and 1991.

NOTABLE ACCOMPLISHMENTS: Jeff Conine became the first player to go from the expansion draft to the World Series with the same team. Conine was selected from Kansas City with the $22^{\text {nd }}$ pick in the 1992 expansion draft. Conine and Alex Arias are the first players to play for a team in its inaugural season and reach the Fall Classic since the Mets' Ed Kranepool in 1969.

A WINNING DEBUT: The Marlins won their first-ever World Series game on October 18, 7-4, over Cleveland at home. The prior team to win their first-ever World Series game was Toronto in 1992.

ALTERNATING WINS: The Marlins won World Series games one, three, five and seven, while the Indians took games two, four and six. It marked the third time in World Series history that teams alternated victories in all seven games, joining the 1909 Fall Classic between the Pirates and Tigers, and the Yankees and Giants in 1962.

A HEART-STOPPER: Game Seven of the World Series marked the fourth time in World Series history that a winner-take-all game in the Fall Classic went into extra innings, along with the 1991 Series (MIN vs. ATL), the 1924 Series (WAS vs. NYG) and the 1912 Series (BOS vs. NYG). Overall, it marked the seventh time that a deciding World Series game went to extra innings, along with the 1933, 1939 and 1996 games. The 1997 Series was the 10th time a Fall Classic was won by the home team in the bottom of the ninth inning or later (with 1912, 1924, 1927, 1929, 1935, 1953, 1960, 1991 and 1993) and the fifth time in a winner-take-all situation.

## MARLINS NOTES

The Marlins entered the 2003 postseason as the National League's Wild Card entry, the fourth team in Major League Baseball history to enter the playoffs as the Wild Card multiple times. The Marlins (also Wild Card in 1997), joined the New York Mets (1999 and 2000), the New York Yankees (1995 and 1997) and the Boston Red Sox (1998, 1999 and 2003). Florida is one of three Major League Baseball expansion teams to make the postseason at least twice in their first 11 seasons. Kansas City came into play in 1969 and made the postseason in 1976, 1977 and 1978. Arizona began play in 1998, and saw postseason action in 1999, 2001 and 2002. The Marlins are one of six teams to advance to the World Series as a Wild Card team and one of four (with the Angels, Red Sox and Giants) to win it.

SIX STRAIGHT: The Marlins concluded the World Series with wins in each of their six playoff series to open the Club's franchise history. The six straight playoff series wins surpasses the mark of consecutive postseason series wins to begin a team's playoff history, done by the Boston Red Sox from 1903-1918. Of the 29 Major League franchises who have participated in postseason play, the Marlins are the only ones never to lose a series.

A WILD POSTSEASON: During the 2003 postseason, the Marlins posted three extra-inning victories, notched three wins when trailing by three or more runs and collected four wins in their final at-bats. According to Jayson Stark on ESPN.com, the Marlins are the fourth team in postseason history with three extra-inning wins and are the fourth team to win three games when trailing by three or more runs. Additionally, no postseason team had ever won more than four games in their last at-bat.

RECORD-SETTING CROWDS: The NLCS Game 4 crowd of 65,829 against the Cubs on October 12 set a new LCS attendance record, surpassing the previous mark of 65,476 (HOU @ PHI on 10/8/80). The Marlins also set a DS attendance record, drawing 65,464 in Game 4 vs. San Francisco (October 4). The October 23 World Series crowd of 65,975 was the largest World Series crowd since Game 7 of the 1997 Series when the Marlins drew 67,204 to see Florida host the Cleveland Indians.

## NATIONAL LEAGUE DIVISION SERIES NOTES

A SERIES FOR THE AGES: The NL Division Series between the Marlins and Giants featured 72 -year-old Jack McKeon and 68 -year-old Felipe Alou. McKeon was the oldest manager to participate in postseason play in Major League Baseball history, while Felipe Alou was the fourth-oldest. Below is a look at the list:

WHAT WAYS TO WIN IT: The Marlins closed out their series with the Giants in rather historic ways. On Friday, October 3, the Marlins downed the Giants, $4-3$ in 11 innings. The Giants scored an unearned run in the top of the 11th and the Marlins countered with two unearned tallies in the bottom. It marked the first time since Game 8 of the 1912 World Series that a team came from behind to win a postseason game with two unearned runs in the bottom of an extra inning, according to the Elias Sports Bureau.

The Marlins followed that classic ending with more excitement on Saturday afternoon, October 4, when the Fish ended the NLDS with a 7-6 win over the Giants. The game ended as Jeff Conine threw out J.T. Snow at home plate on a Jeffrey Hammonds single to left. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, the event marked the first time in Major League Baseball postseason history that a series ended with the tying run being thrown out at home plate.

CABRERA MATCHES POSTSEASON MARK: Migue Cabrera went $4 \times 5$ in Game 4 of the National League Division Series vs. San Francisco. The four hits tied a Major League postseason record for hits by a rookie, joining NYY's Derek Jeter (1996 ALCS G1), LAD's Chad Fonville (1995 NLDS G2), NYG's Freddie Lindstrom (1924 WS G5) and STL Browns' Joe Garagiola (1946 WS G4).

Cabrera had four home runs and 12 RBI in the 2003 postseason, the best single-season rookie home run and RBI marks in MLB playoff history. Entering this postseason, Willie McGee ( 1982 STL ) held the rookie RBI mark at 10 . Hideki Matsui had 11 RBI in the 2003 playoffs, one behind Cabrera.

OH THOSE LEFT ON BASE: The Marlins and Giants combined to leave 30 men on base on October 3, setting a new NLDS record. The previous mark was 26 , done by the Giants (16) and Mets (10) in a 13-inning contest on October 7, 2000.

## NATIONAL LEAGUE CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

PINCH ME: Mike Lowell became the sixth player in MLB post-season history to hit a pinch-hit home run in extra innings when he homered in the top of the $11^{\text {th }}$ inning on October 7 at Chicago. Below is a look at the all-time postseason extra-inning PH homer list:

HOMERS SHALL FLY: The Marlins hit a team postsea-son-high four home runs on October 7 at Chicago. Three of the homers (by Rodriguez, Encarnación and Cabrera) came in the third inning, marking the first time in NLCS history that a team homered three times in an inning. Cabrera's and Encarnación's homers were back-to-back, the seventh time in NLCS history that a team had players hit back-to-back homers.

A RECORD-SETTING NIGHT: The 17 extra-base hits by the Marlins and Cubs on October 7 set a new LCS record, surpassing the previous mark of 12 , done on October 5, 1975 (OAK and BOS) and October 9, 1993 (PHI and ATL). The seven HR by both teams also set a new LCS record.

CABRERA AMONG THE YOUNGEST: On October 7 at Chicago, Miguel Cabrera became the secondyoungest player to homer in the postseason, at 20 years, 182 days. The youngest player to go deep in the playoffs was Atlanta's Andruw Jones (19.178) on 10/17/96 vs. STL.

DONTRELLE WITH THE BAT: Dontrelle Willis became the first Marlins pitcher to collect a multi-hit game in postseason play as he went $3 \times 3$ on October 4 vs. SF. Willis' three hits set a postseason rookie pitcher record. He was the first pitcher to post a three-hit postseason game since LA's Orel Hershiser did it in Game Two of the 1988 World Series vs. Oakland.

BECKETT'S BEST: The Marlins forced a Game 6 in the NLCS as RHP Josh Beckett threw the first complete game (CG SHO) of his career (regular and postseason) on October 12. The two-hit shutout by Beckett tied the NLCS record for fewest hits allowed in a complete game, joining CIN's Ross Grimley (10/10/72), NY's Jon Matlack ( $10 / 7 / 73$ ) and SF's Dave Dravecky (10/7/87). Beckett's effort was the $15^{\text {th }}$ complete game shutout in NLCS history. Beckett became the first pitcher to shut out the Cubs in a postseason game since Boston's Babe Ruth, who blanked the Cubs in Game 1 of the 1918 World Series.

2003 POSTSEASDN NOTES

IN SELECT COMPANY: According to research by ESPN, Josh Beckett became the third pitcher in postseason history to throw a complete game shutout, allowing two hits or less and fanning 10 or more. Beckett joins Roger Clemens ( 2000 ALCS vs. SEA, 15 K) and Big Ed Walsh ( 1906 WS vs. CHC, 12 K) on that list.

IN AN ELIMINATION GAME: According to Jayson Stark of ESPN.com, Beckett became the fourth pitcher in the last 40 years to pitch a CG SHO with his team facing elimination (excluding G7's in LCS or WS or G5's in DS). Beckett joined the list with Curt Schilling (1993 WS), Danny Jackson (1985 ALCS) and Joe Coleman (1972 ALCS).

BIG INNING: The Marlins scored all eight of their runs in the eighth inning on October 14 at Chicago in an 8-3 win. The eight-run inning established a Marlins playoff record, surpassing their previous best of seven, done in the ninth inning of Game 3 of the 1997 World Series (October 21). The eight-run inning also tied an overall Marlins' record for runs scored in an inning, done for the ninth time overall and the first time since July 25,2003 vs. PHI. The Fish were one run from tying the all-time NLCS record (nine), done by St. Louis in the second inning on October 13, 1985 vs. LA.

According to ESPN, the Marlins became the fifth team in LCS history to come back from a three-run or greater deficit in postseason play to win when facing elimination, and the first since Game 5 of the 1986 ALCS (Game 5 - Boston at California).

BACK FROM 3-1: The Marlins became the fourth team in LCS history (since 1985) to overcome a 3-1 deficit to capture the pennant. Prior to Florida's accomplishment, only one NL team had done it, the 1996 Atlanta Braves, who won three straight over St. Louis to advance to the World Series. Below is a look at the list of 3-1 LCS comebacks:

AN MVP PERFORMANCE: Marlins' catcher Pudge Rodríguez was named the NLCS Most Valuable Player, as he hit .321 ( $9 \times 28$ ) with two home runs and 10 RBI. The 10 RBI set a new NLCS record, surpassing the previous mark of nine, done by San Francisco's Matt Williams in 1989. Rodríguez became the fifth catcher in NLCS history to win MVP honors. Pudge joins STL's Darrell Porter (1982), ATL’s Javy Lopez (1996), ATL's Eddie Pérez (1999) and SF's Benito Santiago (2002).

A TOUGH TRICK TURNED: The Marlins advanced to the World Series by winning consecutive road games trailing three games to one, a feat done for the fifth time in postseason history: 1958 (NYY over MIL Braves in WS), 1968 (DET over STL in WS), 1979 (PIT over BAL in WS), 1985 (KC over TOR in ALCS) and 2003 (FLA over CHC in NLCS).

## WORLD SERIES

The Marlins became the first team in MLB history to reach the World Series as a Wild Card entry twice.

OF HISTORIC SIGNIFICANCE: The Marlins became the third expansion team to win multiple World Series, joining the New York Mets and Toronto Blue Jays. The Jays won their two World Championships in their first 17 seasons, while the Mets did it in their first 25 campaigns. The Marlins won two World Championships in their first 11 Major League seasons. The Marlins would become the first team in the post-expansion era to accomplish the feat.

JACK McKEON: Marlins' manager Jack McKeon became the second manager in Major League Baseball history to lead his team to a World Series championship after taking over his Club during the season. The first manager to accomplish the feat was the Yankees' Bob Lemon in 1978, when he replaced Billy Martin.

EXPANSION NOTABLES: The Marlins were one of five expansion teams to reach the World Series multiple times. The New York Mets lead the list with five Fall Classic entries (win in 1969, loss in 1973, win in 1986, loss in 2000, and loss in 2015). The Kansas City Royals have the second-most with four (loss in 1980, win in 1985, loss in 2014, and win in 2015), while the Marlins, San Diego Padres (loss in 1984 and loss in 1998), and Toronto Blue Jays (win in 1992, win in 1993) have each made two World Series appearances.

AGE IS A STATE OF MIND: Marlins' manager Jack McKeon became the oldest skipper to lead his team to the World Series, as the Series opened with McKeon 72 years and 329 days old. McKeon is ahead of Casey Stengel ( 70.067 in 1960 with NYY), Connie Mack ( 68.283 in 1931 with PHA), Stengel ( 68.063 in 1958 with NYY), Mack ( 67.283 in 1930 with PHA) and Stengel ( 67.064 in 1957 with NYY).

McKeon was the first manager since Philadelphia's Paul Owens (in 1983) to lead his team to the World Series after not beginning the season as that Club's skipper.

HOW DO YOU DO, MR. GONZÁLEZ: Alex González hit a walk-off homer off the Yankees' Jeff Weaver in the bottom of the 12th inning on October 22. It marked the first walk-off homer in Marlins postseason history and holds significance in baseball history. It marked the $13^{\text {th }}$ time that a World Series game ended on a home run and the first time since October 31, 2001 (G4 vs. ARI), when Derek Jeter homered in the bottom of the $10^{\text {th }}$ inning.

According to research done by ESPN, González was the third player in baseball history to have his first career postseason homer come as a World Series walk off, joining Dusty Rhodes (1954 NYG vs. CLE) and Eddie Mathews (1957 MIL Braves vs. NYY). ESPN also noted that González was the third player to hit a walk-off homer against the Yankees in World Series play, joining Bill Mazeroski ( $1960 \mathrm{G7}$, with PIT) and Mathews ( 1957 G4, with MIL).

A PENNY FOR YOUR THOUGHTS: RHP Brad Penny went 2-0 with a 2.19 ERA in two World Series starts against the Yankees. Penny became the $13^{\text {th }}$ pitcher to beat the Yankees twice in the same Series, joining Sandy Koufax, Bob Gibson and Randy Johnson as the only four to do so in the last 40 years.

BECKETT NAMED WORLD SERIES MVP: Josh Beckett (1-1, 1.10 ERA in WS) became the youngest World Series MVP since 22 -year-old Liván Hernández claimed the honor for the Marlins in 1997. Beckett became the first pitcher since Minnesota's Jack Morris in 1991 to pitch a complete game shutout in a deciding World Series game, the $19^{\text {th }}$ overall in baseball history. It was the first complete game shutout in a World Series game since Arizona's Randy Johnson on October 28, 2001 at New York. Beckett's five hits were the fewest hits in a deciding complete game shutout since Baltimore's Scott McGregor (5) in 1983. He became the youngest pitcher to win a deciding World Series game ( 23 years, 5 months, 10 days) since Kansas City's Bret Saberhagen (21.6.16) in 1985. Beckett fanned 47 batters in the 2003 postseason, tying Randy Johnson (2001) for second-most strikeouts in a single postseason behind Arizona's Curt Schilling in 2001 (56).

## 2019 MINDR LEAGUE RECAP

- Marlins Minor League affiliates finished 374-368, marking the first winning season since 2012. The 374 wins were the second-most in franchise history, bested only by 383 in 2001.
- The Rookie-level GCL Marlins, Short-Season A Batavia Muckdogs, and Single-A Clinton LumberKings all won their divisions and made the playoffs. Three 2019 draftees went to Clinton, 19 went to Batavia, and 19 went to the GCL Marlins.
- The Batavia Muckdogs had their first winning season since 2012, finishing atop the Stedler Division and made the playoffs for the first time since becoming a Marlins affiliate in 2010. They reached the New York-Penn League semifinals before losing to Lowell.
- The GCL Marlins were leading their division at the end of the regular season, but the GCL playoffs were canceled due to the threat of Hurricane Dorian.

Clinton went 33-36 (.478) with a run differential of just +1 (272-271) in the first half, then posted a 45-25 (.643) record in the second half to storm into the playoffs, where the Lumberkings won the Western Division pennant but lost the Midwest League Championship Series to South Bend.

Fourth-round Draft pick INF Evan Edwards, third-rounder OF Peyton Burdick, and CBA OF Kameron Misner all helped lead the charge for Clinton's impressive second half. Burdick (59) and Edwards (48) ranked 1-2 in the Midwest League in RBI in the second half, with Burdick posting the highest second-half total in the league since 2014.

The seven position players that Miami drafted in the first 10 rounds combined to bat .280 with 244 runs scored, 69 doubles, 10 triples, 25 home runs, 199 RBI, 203 walks, 84 steals, and a .384 OBP. The 15 pitchers (1 UDFA) added to the ranks combined to go 20-11 with a 2.36 ERA ( $309.1 \mathrm{ip} / 81 \mathrm{er}$ ) in their debut seasons, with 27 saves, 107 walks ( 3.1 per 9.0 ), 343 strikeouts ( 10.0 per 9.0 ), a 1.00 WHIP, and a . 216 average against. They allowed just 10 home runs.

Media parking is available at any of the four garages and 4 parking lots at Marlins Park. Media can guarantee on-site parking and a $\$ 5$ discount on weekend games by pre-purchasing at Marlins.com/Parking. These general parking prepaid passes are valid at any of the on-site parking garages and lots. The First Base Garage is the closest to the Media Entrance and also has expanded hours convenient for media arrival ( 5 a.m. to midnight for 12:10 p.m. and 1:10 p.m. games and 7 a.m. to midnight for all other games times). Media members who have not bought parking in advance of arriving to the ballpark may use the Pay by Phone APP, subject to availability of parking spaces, when they arrive.

## MEDIA ENTRANCE

- He is a Bristol, Connecticut native and proud graduate of Endicott College in Beverly, Massachusetts.
- Todd Hollandsworth returns for his fourth season as color analyst for FOX Sports Florida television broadcasts. Hollandsworth, a member of the 2003 World Series Champion Florida Marlins, came to FOX Sports Florida from Comcast SportsNet Chicago, where he spent seven seasons as a television analyst covering the Cubs. Since 2014, he's also served as co-host on MLB Network Radio's The Leadoff Spot show on SiriusXM. During the 2008 season, Hollandsworth filled in as Comcast SportsNet's Cubs studio analyst on numerous occasions, in addition to making regular appearances on CSN's weeknight sports discussion program, Chicago Tribune Live.
- Hollandsworth played 12 seasons in the Major Leagues and was drafted by the Los Angeles Dodgers in the third round of the 1991 MLB Draft. In his first full season with the Dodgers in 1996, Hollandsworth was named the National League Rookie of the Year when he hit . 291 with 12 home runs and 59 RBI in 149 games. That season, he led all NL rookies in hits, doubles, home runs, RBI and stolen bases. His 12-year MLB career included stints with the Dodgers, Colorado Rockies, Texas Rangers, Marlins, Chicago Cubs, Atlanta Braves, Cleveland Indians and Cincinnati Reds.

- Dave Van Horne enters his 55th year broadcasting professional baseball, his 52nd season at the Major League level, and his 20th with the Marlins. In 2011 he received baseball's highest honor for a broadcaster when he was the National Baseball Hall of Fame's recipient of the Ford C. Frick Award at the annual induction ceremonies in Cooperstown.
- His baseball broadcast career began in the International League in 1966 where he broadcast Richmond Braves' games for three seasons. During his years in Virginia, he broadcast football, baseball and basketball and was a two-time winner of the Sportscaster of the Year Award for that state, presented by the National Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association.
- Dave began his Major League broadcast career when he became the Montreal Expos lead announcer in the team's inaugural season, 1969. He remained there for 32 years on radio and television as the team's primary voice. He became the Marlins' radio voice in 2001. The team honored Dave last September in a pre-game ceremony at Marlins Park on the occasion of completing his 50th year broadcasting Major League Baseball. Among the Honors that Dave has received:

1996: The Jack Graney Award, presented by the Canadian Baseball Hall of Fame, for contributions to baseball through broadcasting.
2011: Career Achievement Award from Sports Media Canada and the Ford C. Frick Award from the National Baseball Hall of Fame.
2012: Inducted into the Wilson High Schools Hall of Fame in his hometown, Easton, PA
2013: The Sonny Hirsch Excellence in Sports Broadcasting Award at the Eric Reid-Tony Florentine charity dinner in Miami.
2014: Induction into the Canadian Baseball Hall of Fame in June at St. Mary's, ONT

- Dave was born and raised in Easton, Pennsylvania. He's been a resident of South Florida since 1982 and currently lives in Palm Beach Gardens with his wife Josee. He has five sons, 11 grandchildren, and a daughter, Madison, a student at the University of Tampa.



## GIENN GEFFNER

 PLAY-BY-PLAY ANNOUNCER- Miami-native Glenn Geffner will mark his 13th season as a member of the Marlins radio broadcast team in 2020, his 24th in the Major Leagues and 29th in professional baseball as a broadcaster and front office executive. Geffner, who called games for the Boston Red Sox and the San Diego Padres prior to his 2008 return to South Florida, owns the rare distinction of having done baseball play-by-play at every level-from college, to Single-A, Double-A, Triple-A, and the Major Leagues.
- Geffner began his baseball career as the voice of the Rochester Red Wings in the International League. The Miami Marlins enter their 18 $8^{\text {th }}$ Spring Training at Jupiter's Roger Dean Chevrolet Stadium, approximately one and a half hours north of the Club's regular season home of Marlins Park. The complex is located on approximately 110 acres within the Abacoa Community. Abacoa is located on Donald Ross Road, approximately $1 / 4$ mile east of Interstate 95. The Marlins share the Palm Beach County facility with the St. Louis Cardinals, one of only two multiple-team Spring Training sites in the Grapefruit League.

Roger Dean Chevrolet Stadium was named the Professional Baseball Field of the Year by the Sports Turf Managers Association in 2011.
In 2003, Baseball America recognized Roger Dean Chevrolet Stadium as baseball's fifth-best spring training facility.
The Marlins begin their $28^{\text {th }}$ Spring Training on Friday, February 23, when they open their Grapefruit League slate as host to the St. Louis Cardinals, the first of six games between the cohabitants. Miami will play 18 total games at the Dean, including 7:05 p.m. contests against the Washington Nationals (March 22) and Houston Astros (March 23). The Marlins spent their inaugural Spring Training at the Cocoa Expo Center in Cocoa Beach and played nine years (1994-2002) at Space Coast Stadium in Viera (Melbourne).

The $\$ 28$ million state-of-the-art complex opened on February 28,1998 and accommodates 6,839 fans with luxury suite seats, reserved box seats, bleachers and bullpen seating area in right field. The facility has undergone a series of upgrades in recent seasons, beginning with a new high-definition video board in 2012, reconfigured seats and new sound system in 2015, the addition of the Bullpen Club in 2016 and shade panels installed prior to the 2017 Spring season. Fans will have the opportunity to sit in the Bullpen Club, a 135 -seat area that includes table-top seating for a community feel next to the visitor's bullpen. The six air-conditioned luxury suites provide 320 square feet of interior entertainment, including a wet bar, refrigerator, sink, ice maker, color television with DVD, sofa, bar stools and additional seats. Each suite has seating for 12 (outdoors) and is available with a private entrance and elevator access. Prior to the 2018 Spring Training season, all suites at Roger Dean Chevrolet Stadium underwent a modernization by local design company V-Starr.

Following Spring Training, the complex is the home of the Single-A Jupiter Hammerheads (Miami affiliate) and the Palm Beach Cardinals (St. Louis affiliate) of the Florida State League.

Offices for the Marlins Communications Department and the media workroom are located in the Marlins executive offices, beyond the left field wall at Roger Dean Chevrolet Stadium. The Press Dining area is located in the main press box area. Admission to all Marlins Spring Training games requires either a Major League Baseball Spring Training credential, a BBWAA card, or a Marlins season or daily Spring Training credential.
