The 2020 season welcomes the groundbreaking of an exciting mixed-use development called Mission Rock. In 2010, the Giants won the exclusive rights to develop Mission Rock at parking Lot A located across McCovey Cove just south of Oracle Park. The team has collaborated with the Port of San Francisco, city agencies, and neighbors on the overall vision for the new neighborhood. In 2018, the Giants selected Tishman Speyer as a development partner on the project. Tishman Speyer is a leading owner, developer, operator and fund manager of first-class real estate around the world. Together the project team invited world-class designers Studio Gang, MVRDV, Henning Larsen, WORKac, and SCAPE to partner with local architects to design the four premier buildings and major waterfront park that make-up phase one of the project.

As a centerpiece for the emerging Central Waterfront neighborhood, Mission Rock at full completion will include approximately 1,200 housing units - 40 percent of which will be affordable for low and moderate income families and individuals; 1.4 million square feet of high quality office space; and 250,000 square feet of eclectic, neighborhood-serving retail and local manufacturing facilities. Historic Pier 48 will be rehabilitated and a new parking structure will be constructed to serve ballpark and neighborhood needs. Capped by an expanded China Basin Park on McCovey Cove, the Mission Rock project will enhance public waterfront access with a total of eight acres of open space, and link the neighborhood to the broader San Francisco shoreline with a segment of the Bay Trail.



Greg Johnson ▶▶ **Chairman**

Greg Johnson is Chairman of the Board of Directors and Control Person of the San Francisco Giants. A long-time Giants fan, Mr. Johnson's family has been part of the team's ownership group since 1993.

Apart from his responsibilities with the Giants, Mr. Johnson is the Chairman of the Board and Director of Franklin Resources, Inc. [NYSE:BEN], a global investment management company with offices in 35 countries managing \$700 billion in assets, and serves as the Executive Chairman of the company. During his over three decades with Franklin Templeton, Mr. Johnson has been instrumental in developing the company's overall strategic direction, executing on its strategy, and advancing Franklin Templeton's client-centric culture. Mr. Johnson was elected co-CEO of Franklin Resources in 2004 and served as the company's CEO beginning in 2005 until February 2020. In 2020, Mr. Johnson became Executive Chairman.

Mr. Johnson earned a B.S. in Accounting and Business Administration in 1983 from Washington and Lee University, and his Certified Public Accountant (CPA) certificate in 1985. He is a board member and past Chairman of the Investment Company Institute's Board of Governors. Mr. Johnson is a past Vice Chairman of the Mutual Fund Forum and a past Chairman of the Western district of the Securities Industry Association. He is a current board member of Jumpstart, an early literacy and education organization, and the San Francisco Symphony, and chairs the symphony's investment committee.

He also serves on the board of the US Olympic and Paralympics Foundation (USOPF).

Mr. Johnson and his wife, Tracy, have two children and reside on the Peninsula.

Robert Dean, CFA, is the President and founder of Harmony Capital LLC, a private investment management company headquartered in Redwood City, CA. Harmony Capital, founded in 2007, provides investment advice, asset management, estate planning, and various other family office services to its clients, which include family limited partnerships, high net-worth individuals, and foundations. In addition to managing Harmony Capital, Dean is the managing member of Harmony Services LLC, which specializes in real estate development opportunities.

He serves on the Board of Trustees at the University of San Diego, in addition to serving on their Athletics Committee, Investment Committee and is the chair of the Finance Committee.

Dean is also a member of the San Francisco Baseball Associates LLC board of directors and serves on the MLB Pension Committee and the MLB Investment Committee.

Prior to starting Harmony Capital, Dean was a vice president and portfolio manager with Franklin Templeton Investments. He managed the Franklin Aggressive Growth Fund and specialized in equity research of the IT services, computer hardware, and data storage industries. He joined Franklin Templeton in 1995. Dean received his Bachelors of Business Administration from the University of San Diego in 1994.





Larry Baer ►► President & Chief Executive Officer

A fourth generation San Franciscan, Larry Baer has gained a national reputation as one of professional sports' leading visionaries. Baer joined the team in 1992 as the Executive Vice President after he and Peter Magowan led the effort to assemble a new ownership group that kept the Giants in San Francisco. A limited partner and board member of the ownership group, Baer was named CEO on January 1, 2012. In his first year as president and CEO, the Giants won their second World Series Championship in three years. In 2014, the Giants won their third World Series title in five years.

Baer is responsible for the overall day-to-day operations of the organization. Under his direction the Giants developed and constructed Oracle Park -- the first privately-financed Major League ballpark. Since opening in 2000, Oracle Park has been widely praised as one of the "best ballparks ever built." In 2008, Oracle Park was named *Sports Business Journal's* Sports Facility of the Year, and in 2011 the Giants received *Sports Business Journal's* Professional Sports Organization of the Year award.

Baer also serves as a key strategist and negotiator of the club's major transactions. This includes the Barry Bonds signing in November 1992, the naming rights agreement with AT&T (then Pacific Bell) in 1996, the naming rights agreement with Oracle in 2019 and other strategic partnerships. He led the effort to host the 2007 All-Star Game in San Francisco and was the driving force behind the Giants partnership with Comcast to create a regional sports network for the Bay Area.

Baer also serves as Chairman and CEO of Giants Development Services, which is currently developing Mission Rock -- a new, mixed use urban neighborhood located on a 28-acre site across McCovey Cove from Oracle Park. Once completed, Mission Rock will include more than eight acres of parks and open space, 1,500 residential units, approximately 1.3 million square feet of office space, a parking structure to serve ballpark and Mission Rock patrons, and 250,000 square feet of retail, restaurants, and public amenities.

Baer serves on Major League Baseball's Business and Media Board of Directors and on the Long-term Strategic Planning Committee. He is also a member of the Board of Directors of the San Francisco Committee on Jobs, the Bay Area Council, NBC Sports Bay Area and is a member of the Boys and Girls Clubs of America Pacific Region Board of Trustees. He is an immediate past governing board member of the United States Holocaust Memorial Council.

A graduate of UC Berkeley and Harvard Business School, Baer has been the recipient of a number of prestigious awards throughout his career with the Giants. In 2010, Baer was named the "Person of the Year" by San Francisco Boys and Girls Clubs, and in 2012 he was honored as the Harvard Business School's "Alumnus of the Year." In 2014, Baer was honored by the University of California Berkeley with its "Excellence in Achievement" award and received the Civic Leadership Award from the American Jewish Committee. In 2019, Baer was recognized by the University of California Berkeley's Baseball Foundation with its Excellence in Leadership Award.

Baer and his wife, Pam, reside in San Francisco and have four children.

Farhan Zaidi >>> President of Baseball Operations

Farhan Zaidi enters his second season as the President of Baseball Operations for the Giants, joining the organization on November 6, 2018. In his first year at the helm, the team saw a four-game improvement in the standings from 2018 and posted a Major League-best 19-6 record in the month of July. Zaidi acquired five of the Giants' top nine position players in WAR ranked by FanGraphs in Mike Yastrzemski, Kevin Pillar, Donovan Solano, Stephen Vogt and Alex Dickerson. The team also had 23 different rookies appear in 2019, with 12 making their big league debuts, the Giants' highest total since 2008.

San Francisco's farm system had an overall win-loss record of 415-401 (.509), the 11th-best winning percentage of all organizations, an improvement from 2018 when SF's minor league chain had the 26th-best winning percentage in baseball. Five of seven Giants' stateside affiliates reached the playoffs, with Sacramento winning the Triple-A National Championship. When the 2019 season began, the Giants had the 28th-best farm system according to *Baseball America* in preseason rankings. In their 2020 re-ranking, the Giants moved up to 14th. Zaidi has acquired/drafted 15 of the team's Top 36 Prospects according to Fangraphs. Entering the 2020 season, San Francisco has five players in MLB's top 100 ranking: C Joey Bart (14th), IF Marco Luciano (35th), OF Heliot Ramos (65th), OF Hunter Bishop (71st) and LHP Seth Corry (99th).

Prior to joining the Giants, Zaidi spent four years as the Los Angeles Dodgers' General Manager, joining the club in November 2014. Working alongside President of Baseball Operations, Andrew Friedman, Zaidi helped pilot the Dodgers to four consecutive division titles while advancing to the National League Championship Series from 2016-18, and the World Series from 2017-18. The Dodgers posted one of the best seasons in club history in 2017, when the team established a Los Angeles record with a MLB-best 104 wins and won the National League pennant, earning recognition from *Baseball America* as its Organization of the Year.

During his time in Los Angeles, the Dodgers drafted and developed notable players such as Walker Buehler (2015), Tony Gonsolin, Gavin Lux, Dustin May and Will Smith (2016); traded for Kike Hernandez (2014), Chris Taylor, Rich Hill (2016), Tony Watson, Yu Darvish (2017), Manny Machado and David Freese (2018); and signed Kenta Maeda (2015) and Max Muncy (2017) as free agents. Los Angeles posted the second-best winning percentage in all of baseball (.584, 379-270) during Zaidi's four-year stint.

Prior to his work with the Dodgers, Zaidi spent 10 seasons with the Oakland A's. He started as a baseball operations analyst in 2005 before being promoted to Director of Baseball Operations in 2009 and Assistant General Manager/Director of Baseball Operations in 2014. A's General Manager Billy Beane credited Zaidi as playing a key role in the signing of Cuban outfielder and two-time All-Star Yoenis Cespedes in 2012. During Zaidi's tenure with the A's, the team reached the postseason four times, including three straight seasons from 2012-14.

Before entering baseball, Zaidi served as business development associate for Small World Media, the fantasy sports division of *The Sporting News*, and also worked as a management consultant for the Boston Consulting Group. Zaidi earned his Bachelor of Science degree in Economics from Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1998. While at MIT, he was named a Burchard Scholar and elected to Phi Beta Kappa. He completed his Ph.D in Economics from the University of California, Berkeley in 2011.

Scott Harris ►► General Manager

Scott Harris is in his first season as the General Manager for the Giants, joining the organization on November 10, 2019. Harris is the ninth person to hold the title of General Manager for the Giants since the team moved to San Francisco in 1958, joining Chub Feeney (1947-1969), Horace Stoneham (1970-1975), Spec Richardson (1976-1981), Tom Haller (1981-1985), Al Rosen (1986-1992), Bob Quinn (1993-1996), Brian Sabean (1996-2015) and Bobby Evans (2015-2018).

Prior to joining the Giants, Harris spent seven years working in the Chicago Cubs' Baseball Operations department, most recently serving as Assistant General Manager. Under Cubs President Theo Epstein and GM Jed Hoyer, he assisted in all potential player acquisitions, contract and trade negotiations, and player evaluations while overseeing several departments including research and development and high performance.

During his stint in Chicago, the Cubs reached the postseason in four consecutive seasons from 2015-2018 and ended a 108-year World Series drought by beating the Cleveland Indians in 2016.

Harris started with the Cubs in 2012 as Director of Baseball Operations after serving two years at Major League Baseball as the league's Coordinator of Major League Operations. With Major League Baseball, he provided transaction support and analysis to all 30 clubs and worked on the First-Year Player Draft, the Rule 5 Draft, the World Baseball Classic and various industry studies within the league office. Harris also worked for the Washington Nationals in 2008 and the Cincinnati Reds in 2010.

A native of Redwood City, California, Harris attended Columbia Business School while working at Major League Baseball and later transferred to Northwestern's Kellogg School of Management to complete his MBA in 2015. He also graduated from UCLA in 2009 with a Bachelor's Degree in Economics and studied at the London School of Economics in 2007.

Mario Alioto ►► Executive Vice President, Business Operations

Mario Alioto, a member of the Giants Executive Committee, is responsible for all revenue and marketing areas of the organization. This includes all ticket sales functions, sponsorship and media sales, promotions, special events, ballpark entertainment, branding and advertising, creative services and publications. He also oversees the relationship with the team's food concessionaire Bon Appetit, and the organization's TV and radio partners (NBC Sports Bay Area, NBC Bay Area, KNBR 104.5 FM/680 AM and KSFN - Unamino Deportes - 1510AM).

Since Oracle Park opened in 2000, Alioto has been responsible for overseeing a record breaking sales strategy that has consistently placed the Giants as one of the top sponsorship generating teams in all of Major League Baseball. Over the past eight seasons, Alioto has led the effort that has attracted more than 26 million fans through the turnstiles, and is also a key member of the leadership team that is responsible for making the ballpark experience at Oracle Park one of the best in professional sports.

Alioto served as Vice President, Sales & Marketing during the final years at Candlestick Park. He oversaw a promotional lineup in 1999 that included the first ever bobblehead promotion, which has since become one of the most popular premium items in professional sports. Alioto also played an integral role in developing the Charter Seat program and Winner's Circle sponsorship program as the Giants prepared to build Oracle Park.

Alioto is a board member and Chairman Emeritus of the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce, a board member of the San Francisco Giants Community Fund and Chairman of the Board of the Bay Area Sports Hall of Fame.

The St. Mary's graduate lived out every youngster's dream by starting with the organization as a batboy in 1973 and later served as visiting clubhouse manager prior to moving to the front office in 1983.

Alioto and his wife, Kelly, live in the East Bay and have four children.

Jack F. Bair ►► Executive Vice President & Chief Legal Officer



Jack Bair has served as a trusted counselor and key strategist to the San Francisco Giants baseball team since January 1993. As he enters his 28th season with the Giants, Bair has made his mark on many aspects of the organization. As Executive Vice President & Chief Legal Officer, he is responsible for all of the team's legal matters and for managing the team's many and complex relations with the City & County of San Francisco and other governmental entities. Bair also serves as President of Giants Development Services, the wholly-owned subsidiary of the San Francisco Giants responsible for real estate matters, including the planned Mission Rock Project just south of Oracle Park. Bair also lead the effort to develop the team's international headquarters and player development facility in the Dominican Republic.

Bair played a critical role in the Giants successful effort to develop a new ballpark in downtown San Francisco. Bair coordinated the effort to select the site for the new ballpark and contributed significantly to the ballpark's architectural design. Bair was the Giants liaison to the successful 1996 ballpark campaign for the Giants. Bair also negotiated the business transaction with the City and coordinated the successful effort to gain all of the local, regional, state and federal governmental approvals necessary for the project to meet its timetable for Opening Day in April of 2000.

Bair serves as an officer of the Giants Community Fund and co-founded the San Francisco Neighborhood Theater Foundation and continues to serve as an officer and member of the Board of Directors. Bair also co-founded and co-directs the Mostly British Film Festival in San Francisco. Bair serves as Vice President of The Olympic Club in San Francisco. Bair is a graduate of the University of California, Davis and Yale Law School.



Alfonso Felder ►► Executive Vice President, Administration

Alfonso Felder, who enters his 25th season in the Giants front office, oversees the Ballpark Operations, Event Strategy and Services, Guest Services and Giants Enterprises departments. Felder is also responsible for the Giants' spring training operations in Arizona where he manages the Giants relationship with the City Scottsdale and the development of the Giants new minor league training complex at Papago Park in Phoenix (scheduled to be complete in 2021). Felder works with the Giants' executive team to lead strategic organizational initiatives and is actively engaged in the Mission Rock development.

Felder began his front office career at Candlestick Park where he was a key player in the planning and construction of Oracle Park. Felder oversaw the development of the original transportation plan for the ballpark and is now responsible for assuring the continued operational success of Oracle Park. Felder manages the Giants capital improvements at the ballpark encompassing a wide range of projects including the new bleacher bullpens, the Gotham Club and the Garden at Oracle Park. Felder was the point person for hosting the Major League Baseball All-Star Game in 2007 and the World Baseball Classic in 2006 (Scottsdale) and in 2013 (San Francisco).

Felder's first job was as a 16-year-old Giants usher at Candlestick Park. He attended UC Berkeley and graduated from Harvard. Felder is also a graduate of the City Year national service program (Boston). He is the President and co-founder of the San Francisco Neighborhood Theater Foundation, the non-profit behind the Vogue Theatre, the Balboa Theatre and San Francisco's longest running outdoor film series. Felder resides in San Francisco with his wife Tara, and sons, Leo and Max.



Brian R. Sabean ►► Executive Vice President

Brian Sabean begins his 28th season with the San Francisco Giants. In 2019, he transitioned into a new role as Executive Vice President, working on strategic initiatives as a senior advisor and evaluator.

As head of the baseball division from 1997-2018, Sabean oversaw the most successful era in the club's history, including three World Championships (2010, 2012, 2014), four National League pennants (2002, 2010, 2012, 2014), five NL West Division flags (1997, 2000, 2003, 2010 and 2012), two Wild Card entries (2002, 2014). During this stretch, the Giants joined the Cardinals and Yankees as one of only three teams in the Major Leagues to have been to the World Series four-or-more times.

Under Sabean, the organization was named the Topps Organization of the Year in both 2009 and 2011 and the *Baseball America* Organization of the Year in 2010 for outstanding performance, depth and talent throughout the Major and Minor league teams.

In 2003, Sabean was named MLB Executive of the Year by both *The Sporting News* and *Baseball America*. *Baseball America* named him Executive of the Year again in 2012 following the Giants' second World Series championship in three years. He also was awarded the 2010 Major League Baseball Executive of the Year by the Boston Chapter of the BBWAA. In 2018, Sabean received the John Schuerholz Longevity Achievement Award.

Prior to joining the Giants, Sabean played a vital role in developing the Yankees' farm system into one of baseball's finest. During his eight-year tenure with the Yankees, he held several positions of, including Director of Scouting from 1986-90 and Vice President of Player Development/Scouting from 1990-92.

A graduate of Eckerd College, Sabean began his career in coaching at the collegiate level. From 1983-85, he served as the head coach at University of Tampa, compiling a 61-36 record and making the school's first-ever appearance in an NCAA regional tournament in 1984.

Sabean and his wife, Amanda, have two sons, Aidan and Declan. They are also the proud dad and stepmom to Colin, Sean, Brendan and Darren.



Staci A. Slaughter ▶▶ Executive Vice President, Communications & Senior Advisor to the CEO

Staci Slaughter serves as a member of the organization's executive committee and oversees media relations, public affairs, marketing communications programs, crisis communications and community outreach activities on behalf of the organization. In addition to day-to-day responsibilities overseeing the Club's communications activities, Slaughter helps manage the organization's major public events, including the media operations for the 2007 All-Star Game, the public relations efforts surrounding the development and opening of Oracle Park and the 2010, 2012 and 2014 World Series games and parades. Slaughter is also responsible for the Giants' charitable endeavors including the 100% Player Participation program and the Giants Community Fund. Under her leadership, the Giants were named the 2016 Sports Humanitarian Team of the Year by ESPN.

In 2012, Slaughter received Major League Baseball's Robert O. Fishel Award for ethics, professionalism and humanitarianism and was named a *Sports Business Journal* Game Changer. In 2017, Slaughter received a Most Influential Women in Business award from the *SF Business Times* and was named a *Sports Business Journal* Power Player.

Prior to joining the Giants in 1996, Slaughter was press secretary to former San Francisco Mayor Frank Jordan, where she served as his primary spokesperson, media liaison and speechwriter. Slaughter has lived in San Francisco for nearly 30 years and serves on the boards of trustees of the Golden Gate National Parks Conservancy, USA Gymnastics, Lick-Wilmerding High School and the Baseball Assistance Team (B.A.T.). She is a past trustee at the San Francisco Friends School.

A University of California, Berkeley graduate, Slaughter lives in San Francisco with her husband, Jamie, and their two sons, Jake and Ben.



Jorge Costa ▶▶ Senior Vice President & Chief Venue Officer, Oracle Park

Jorge Costa enters his 32nd year with the Giants. Costa oversees all operations staff and event personnel, which includes First Aid, security, guest services, groundskeepers, parking, janitorial and engineering. He also serves as the team's liaison to local, state, and federal law enforcement agencies.

Under Costa's direction, the Giants implemented the TEAM (Techniques for Effective Alcohol Management) program in 1989 and became pioneers in venue management by being the first professional sports team to create a Traffic Safety Day in 1990. Because of his continued growth of safety and alcohol awareness programs, Costa has been bestowed numerous awards such as the Superior Achievement Award from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration and was named a charter member of the Designated Driver Advisory Committee.

Costa has been instrumental in Oracle Park's LEED Certification success. The park earned Silver Certification in 2010, Gold in 2015 and finally Platinum in 2019. Oracle Park is the only MLB Park to achieve this level of greening sustainability excellence. In addition, in 2019 MLB named the Giants as the recipient of the 2019 Green Glove Award securing the Club's 11th Green Glove Award in 12 seasons.

Prior to his tenure with the Giants, the St. Mary's College graduate served as Commissioner Peter Ueberroth's West Coast liaison for stadium operations and security, and was Director of Operations for eight years at the Oakland Coliseum. Costa has also worked dozens of world-class international events as a venue operator. These events include the Melbourne Cricket Grounds in 1988, baseball venues in Spain for the 1992 Olympics, Stanford Stadium for the 1994 FIFA World Cup, the first international regular season baseball game in Monterrey, Mexico in 1996, the Pan-American Games in Rio de Janeiro in 2007 and the Olympics in Beijing, China in 2008. In 2012, Costa operated the World Baseball Classic Qualifier in Regensburg, Germany followed by hosting the 2013 World Baseball Classic Finals at Oracle Park. Most recently, Costa worked the inaugural MLB London Series in 2019 at London Stadium.



Shana Daum ►► Senior Vice President, Public Affairs & Community Relations

Shana Daum is entering her 22nd season with the Giants. She initially joined the Giants in 1999 to assist with the public relations efforts during the final construction phase of Oracle Park as well as its opening celebrations. Since 2001, she has overseen public affairs and community relations, and is responsible for community outreach, partnerships and initiatives; business public relations, communications strategy and media activities; player, alumni and family relations; and archives. She also works in collaboration with the Giants Community Fund to support the organization's flagship community program Junior Giants. Daum has played an integral role in many of the organization's ceremonies, celebrations and awareness events including Until There's A Cure Day, Strike Out Violence Day, Girls Day, Opening Day festivities, Wall of Fame inductions, World Series Trophy tours and Bochy's farewell.

Daum's career in sports media and public relations spans three decades and includes stops with three professional Bay Area teams before joining the Giants, including the Golden State Warriors, San Francisco Spiders (International Hockey League) and San Jose Lasers (American Basketball League).

She is a graduate of the University of California, Davis and received her Master's in Sport Management from the University of San Francisco. Daum serves on the board of Bishop O'Dowd High School and is a member of Multiplying Good/Jefferson Awards Students In Action Bay Area Advisory Board.

Daum lives in Oakland with her husband, Rick, and their daughters, Eleanor and Grace.



Sara Grauf ►► Senior Vice President, Event Strategy & Services

Sara Grauf oversees event strategy and services for the Giants organization. She played an integral role in the production of the organization's three World Series celebrations and managed the first-ever commercial spectator program for the America's Cup. Grauf recently led the organization's effort to secure and produce the 2018 Rugby Sevens World Cup, which the Giants hosted at Oracle Park in July of 2018. In 2010, Grauf initiated the Giant Race, which has evolved into an annual health and wellness initiative for the club, operating in four cities and drawing 20,000 participants to the San Francisco events. In addition to her event responsibilities, Grauf oversees the club's spring training operations and is engaged in open space design and programming for the Mission Rock development.

Grauf began her career with the Giants 20 years ago, interning for the club's community relations department while attending the University of California, Berkeley. Grauf is Past President of the International Live Events Association, a member of the Board of Directors for Leadership San Francisco and serves on the board of Experience Scottsdale and the marketing committee for San Francisco Travel.

Jose Martin ►► Senior Vice President & Chief People Officer

Jose Martin is entering his second season leading the club's global Human Resources function. He brings 25 years of progressive human resources experience distinguishing himself as a proven multifaceted executive who works in close partnership with Leadership teams to develop and operationalize creative people strategies and initiatives. Pantages serves as the Treasurer of the Giants Community Fund and a member of the Board of Directors of The Marine Mammal Center in Sausalito.

The fourth generation San Franciscan is a graduate of San Francisco State University with both a Bachelors in Accounting and Masters in Business Administration - Finance.



Jason Pearl ▶▶ Senior Vice President & Chief Business Development Officer

Jason Pearl, in his 28th season with the Giants, oversees the organization's business development efforts. Pearl works cross-departmentally to consider and pursue business opportunities with a specific focus on corporate marketing partnerships, the Mission Rock real estate development, the G-Tech investment portfolio and other non-traditional revenue generating programs.

The San Rafael, CA native started his career with the Giants in the ticket office in 1993, before moving his focus to corporate sponsorship within the marketing department in 1994. Pearl played an integral role in developing the original naming rights agreement with Pacific Bell as well as the creation of the Winner's Circle sponsorship model as part of the funding strategy to build the privately financed ballpark. More recently, Pearl led the negotiations on the new 20-year naming rights agreement with Oracle this past season. In addition to his business development responsibilities, he oversees the organization's Hispanic marketing, broadcast and outreach efforts, and the business relationship with the team's flagship radio station, KNBR.

Pearl has been a longtime supporter of the non-profit social enterprise, Juma Ventures, and currently serves on the Juma's National Board of Directors.

A 1991 graduate of Cornell University, Pearl lives in San Francisco with his wife, Nikki, daughter, Ella, son, Ruben and their two dogs, Redmond and Juniper.



Stephen Revetria ▶▶ President, Giants Enterprises

Stephen Revetria oversees the strategy and vision for Giants Enterprises, who is dedicated to the curation and development of new ventures beyond the Major League Baseball franchise. Currently in his 21st year, Revetria is focused on the creation of larger-than-life experiences for millions through increasing visibility and use of Oracle Park, Pier 48, Lot A, The Gotham & Cloud Clubs and Giants Maritime Services.

Revetria played an integral role in the development and creation of the first dedicated full-time events team at a privately financed Major League ballpark and under his direction, Giants Enterprises has received international recognition for the execution of its events during the 2007 All-Star Game and the 2010, 2012 and 2014 World Series, including the Official World Series Galas and ticker-tape parades.

In July 2018, Giants Enterprises hosted Rugby World Cup Sevens 2018 at Oracle Park, marking the first time this tournament was held on American soil. The tournament featured 40 teams from 28 countries, making it the largest rugby event ever to be held in the U.S. Over the course of the tournament, more than 100,000 fans poured into Oracle Park, making it the highest-attended rugby event in U.S. history.

The Giants were the first team to provide free Wi-Fi to all fans beginning in 2004, and Oracle Park is currently the home of the largest video board in California and first 4K-capable screen in MLB. Schlough's IT team has also supported the baseball operation in implementing an array of proprietary analytic tools that helped the team secure three World Series titles in recent years.

An Olympic enthusiast, Schlough served on the committees for San Francisco's bids to host the 2012, 2016 and 2024 Olympic Games. His event experience includes assignments at the 1994 World Cup along with Olympics in Atlanta, Salt Lake, Torino, and PyeongChang. Previously, he worked as a consultant with Booz-Allen & Hamilton and EDS. More recently, Schlough served as Interim President of the Giants' Class-A San Jose affiliate and was appointed to the team's board as Chairman in 2012.

In addition to his Giants and Olympic activities, Schlough has served as a board member of Junior Achievement of Northern California for the past 15 years. He is also an avid supporter of Junior Giants, raising over \$150,000 through speaking appearances and other fundraisers. He is a native San Franciscan and currently resides in the city with his wife, Bridget, and their two daughters.



Willie Mays ►► Assistant to the President

Regarded by many as the best all-around player in baseball history, Willie Mays returned to San Francisco in 1986 and now enters his 34th season in the Giants' front office. In 1993, in one of his first public statements after assuming ownership of the team, former Giants President and Managing General Partner Peter Magowan announced that the franchise was signing Mays to a lifetime contract.

Magowan also announced in 1997 that the front entrance of the club's new ballpark would feature a world-class statue of Mays and the official address of the park would be 24 Willie Mays Plaza. The 88-year-old Mays serves as a Giant emissary. He visits the Giants' minor league teams, as well as Spring Training camp and attends nearly every single Giants home game during the season. The Westfield, AL native also makes appearances on behalf of the club at a variety of civic and charitable events throughout the Bay Area for the Giants Community Fund. He has also made generous contributions to needy children throughout the country through his own Say Hey Foundation charity.

During his 22-year Major League playing career, Mays was named Most Valuable Player twice, 11 years apart, first as a New York Giant and then as a San Francisco Giant. He holds the all-time record for putouts by an outfielder, with a career total of 7,095. He compiled 3,283 hits, won 12 Gold Gloves and appeared in 24 All-Star games. He was third on the all-time home run list with 660 until 2003 when his godson, Barry Bonds, passed him. His career batting average was .302 and for eight consecutive years, he drove in more than 100 runs a season. The "Say Hey Kid" was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1979, the first year of his eligibility (the ninth player to make it on his first try). Mays' uniform number, 24, has been retired by the Giants, as he remains the franchise leader in games played (2,857), at-bats (10,477), runs (2,011), hits (3,187), doubles (504), home runs (646), total bases (5,907) and extra base hits (1,289). He was named team captain of the Giants prior to the 1961 season by manager Alvin Dark.

Mays was presented with the Presidential Medal of Freedom by President Barack Obama in 2015. He joined fellow Hall of Famers Ernie Banks, Yogi Berra and Stan Musial as the only baseball players who have been awarded the Medal of Freedom. Mays has also received numerous honors as one of the premier athletes of the past 100 years. *The Sporting News* ranked him second only to Babe Ruth among the 100 greatest baseball players of the 20th century. ESPN listed him as eighth in their ranking of the top 50 athletes of the century. In 2003, former Governor Gray Davis appointed Willie Mays to the State Board of Directors of the California African American Museum. He spent part of his 85th birthday aboard cable car No. 24, which was dedicated to him.

He is the spokesperson for The Institute on Aging in San Francisco as well as the President and CEO of the Say Hey Foundation, supporting underprivileged youth. He is also a member of the Concordia Club and re-signed with The Topps Company, Inc., an association that began in 1952, that publishes baseball cards. Mays has received honorary degrees from Dartmouth, Miles College, Ohio State University, San Francisco State and Yale University.

Mays makes his home in Atherton.

Barry Bonds ►► Special Advisor

Barry Bonds serves as a Special Advisor to the CEO. Bonds represents the organization at various community and organizational events in San Francisco. He also attends the Giants' Spring Training Camp in Scottsdale, AZ and works with the organization's young players.

Bonds signed with the Giants in 1993 and spent his final 15 Major League seasons in a San Francisco uniform, compiling a .312 batting average with 381 doubles, 41 triples, 586 home runs and 1,440 RBI in 1,976 games. He can be found throughout the SF-era record books, ranking in the top 10 for batting average (first), games (third), at-bats (third - 6,263), runs (first - 1,555), hits (third - 1,951), doubles (first), triples (fourth), home runs (first), RBI (first), stolen bases (first - 263) and walks (first - 1,947).

Bonds won seven NL MVP awards, eight Gold Glove awards and received 14 All-Star selections during his storied 22-year Major League career with the Pittsburgh Pirates (1986-92) and San Francisco Giants (1993-2007). He was a two-time winner of the National League batting title and the lone member of baseball's 500 homer-500 steal club holds Major League Baseball's all-time records for home runs (762) and walks (2,558).

Bonds' impressive resume also includes baseball's single-season records for home runs (73 in 2001), walks (232 in 2004), intentional walks (120 in 2004), on-base percentage (.609 in 2004) and slugging percentage (.863 in 2001).

In 2018, the Giants retired Bonds' uniform number 25. Bonds joined an elite group of New York and San Francisco Giants players as the 12th player to receive this honor.





Bruce Bochy ►► Special Advisor

Bruce Bochy is in his first year as a Special Advisor after retiring from 25 seasons as a big league manager at the end of last season. During his 25-year managerial career he compiled 2,003 victories, the 11th-most by any manager in MLB history, and his 4,032 games managed are the seventh-most in MLB. He's the only manager in MLB history to win 900-plus games with multiple franchises, winning 951 games with San Diego and 1,052 with San Francisco, the second-most managerial wins by a Giants manager behind Hall of Famer John McGraw. Bochy managed four All-Star teams (1999, 2011, 2013, 2015) and was a member of the All-Star coaching staff eight times: 1997, 1999, 2001, 2007, 2010, 2011, 2013, 2015. In 2011, he was the skipper for the MLB All-Stars in Taiwan and in 2020, he's slated to manage Team France in the 11-day WBC qualifying tournament.

Named the 38th manager in Giants franchise history, and 16th in San Francisco annals on October 27, 2006, Bochy guided the Giants to three World Series titles in 2010, 2012 and 2014. The Giants' championship in 2010 was their first in San Francisco history (since 1958) and their first overall since the New York Giants won in 1954. Overall, Bochy led his teams to four Pennants and three World Series championships with his teams posting a 44-33 (.571) record in postseason play.

Prior to joining the Giants' organization, Bochy was the manager of the San Diego Padres from 1995-2006. To this day, his 951 victories with the Padres are the most in franchise history. Bochy became the first Padres skipper to earn NL Manager of Year honors when he led the 1996 club to their first NL West title since 1984. Overall, Bochy logged a 24-year affiliation with the Padres organization from 1983-2006. He was named Padres manager on October 21, 1994.

The former catcher spent parts of nine Major League seasons with Houston (1978-80), New York-NL (1982) and San Diego (1983-87) and compiled a lifetime .239 batting average with 26 home runs and 93 RBI in 358 career games. He made his big league debut on July 18, 1978 in an Astros uniform, going 2-for-3 at Shea Stadium.

Born in Landes de Bussac, France on April 16, 1955, Bochy is one of eight Major Leaguers to be born in France, where his father, Sgt. Major Gus Bochy, was stationed as a U.S. Army NCO at the time. He graduated from Melbourne (FL) High School and attended Brevard Community College for two years on a partial scholarship, winning a state championship in 1975. He decided to turn pro when he was drafted in the first round (24th overall) by the Astros in 1975.

Bochy and his wife, Kim, reside in San Diego and have two sons, Greg and Brett, and two grandchildren, Braxton Douglas, born Jan. 24, 2018 to Greg and McKenna and Blakely Grace, born Aug. 4, 2018 to Brett and Kelsey.

Greg spent several seasons playing minor league baseball in the Padres system. Brett was drafted by the Giants in 2010 and was called up to the Majors on Sept. 2, 2014, making Bruce the eighth manager in MLB history to manage his own son. On Sept. 13, 2014, Bruce became the first manager to give the ball to his son coming out of the bullpen.



Will Clark ►► Special Assistant

Longtime Giants icon Will Clark joined the Giants front office in January 2009. In his role, the six-time All-Star first baseman represents the organization at various in-season and off-season community events in San Francisco. He also attends the Giants Spring Training Camp in Scottsdale, AZ and visits several of the Giants' minor league teams each year. Clark, who brings the experience of a 15-year Major League playing career to the Giants, previously worked as an advisor to the Arizona Diamondbacks' coaching staff in spring training from 2004-2008.

Drafted by the Giants in the first round (second overall pick) of the 1985 June draft, Clark spent his first eight big league seasons in a San Francisco uniform, compiling a .299 batting average with 176 home runs and 709 RBI in 1,160 games. One of the best clutch hitters of his time, Clark hit over .300 on 10 occasions. In 1988, he became the first Giants player to drive in 90 or more runs in consecutive seasons since Bobby Murcer in 1975-76. He had one of his finest seasons in 1989, when he batted .333 with 111 RBI, and finished second in the NL Most Valuable Player voting to Giants teammate Kevin Mitchell. He was, however, named MVP of the '89 NLCS, after batting .650 with a pair of homers and eight RBI, helping San Francisco defeat Chicago four-games-to-one.

One of the premier first basemen in the National League during his time with San Francisco, Clark was also an outstanding defensive player, winning a Rawlings Gold Glove in 1991. The New Orleans, LA native owned a .303 lifetime average with 284 home runs and 1,205 RBI over 1,976 career games for the Giants (1986-1993), Rangers (1994-98), Orioles (1999-2000) and Cardinals (2000).

Clark, who was a two-time All American at Mississippi State University, was the winner of the Golden Spikes Award as the country's top collegiate player in 1985, hitting .420 with 25 home runs and 77 RBI in 65 games. He was inducted into the inaugural class of the College Baseball Hall of Fame in 2006 and was inducted into the Mississippi Sports Hall of Fame in 2008.

He resides in Prairieville, LA with his wife, Lisa, and their son, Trey, and daughter, Ella.



Orlando Cepeda ►► Community Ambassador

Orlando Cepeda, who was inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1999, is recognized nationally for his humanitarian efforts as an ambassador for baseball and the San Francisco Giants. He begins his 25th season as a community representative for the team and is a member of the Giants Community Fund Advisory Board.

In his current role, the "Baby Bull" visits hospitals, senior centers and inner-city schools in the Bay Area and throughout the United States, speaking to "at-risk" children about the dangers of drugs and alcohol. The 82-year-old Ponce, P.R. native also serves as the honorary spokesman for the Crohn's & Colitis Foundation of America, Meals on Wheels San Francisco and the Curry Senior Center.

A lifetime .297 hitter with 379 home runs and 1,364 RBI during his 17-year playing career with the Giants, Cardinals, Braves, A's, Red Sox and Royals, Cepeda hit a home run against the Dodgers in his very first Major League game April 15, 1958. He went on to win 1958 Rookie of the Year honors, the 1966 Comeback Player of the Year award, the 1967 NL Most Valuable Player trophy and 1973 Designated Hitter of the Year laurels. He appeared in three World Series, was a six-time All-Star and hit over .300 nine times in his career.

On July 25, 1999, Cepeda was inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame during ceremonies in Cooperstown, NY. He became only the second Puerto Rico native to enter the Hall, joining Roberto Clemente. Two weeks earlier on July 11, 1999, Cepeda had his uniform No. 30 retired by the Giants during ceremonies at Candlestick Park. As one of the 12 players in the Giants' 136-year history to have their jersey number retired, he joins Willie Mays, Willie McCovey, Juan Marichal, Gaylord Perry and Barry Bonds as the only six San Francisco players to receive such an honor.

In 1993, the Baby Bull was also inducted into the Puerto Rico Sports Hall of Fame, while in 1999, he was elected to the Missouri Sports Hall of Fame for his great years with the St. Louis Cardinals which followed his tenure with the Giants. In 2004, he was one of four men to receive the Major League Baseball Players Alumni Association's Achievement Awards, the MLBPA's highest alumni honor. He was joined by Jim Bunning, Al Kaline and Roger Maris.

Orlando and his wife, Nydia, reside in Pleasant Hill, CA. He has four sons – Orlando Jr., Carl, Malcolm and Ali Manuel.



Dave Dravecky ►► Community Ambassador

Former San Francisco Giant pitcher Dave Dravecky currently serves as a community ambassador for the team. In his role, Dave represents the organization at a number of community and sponsor events in San Francisco and the Bay Area. He also attends Giants Spring Training Camp in Scottsdale, AZ, and enjoys representing the organization all over Northern California at various speaking engagements and alumni appearances.

Dravecky was an All-Star with the San Diego Padres in 1983, and was traded to the Giants in 1987. Winner of the 1989 Willie Mac Award, Dravecky's story is both touching and inspiring. After discovering a cancerous tumor in his pitching arm in October of 1988, Dave battled back and returned to the majors in August of 1989. After winning his first start, his humerus bone snapped just five days later while throwing a pitch in the 6th inning. The doctors discovered another mass in his left arm, and Dravecky was forced to retire from baseball. After two more surgeries in the next two years, Dravecky's left arm and shoulder were amputated.

Dravecky is currently a motivational and inspirational speaker, author, and proud grandfather. He and his wife, Jan, moved back to California to be closer to their family and the three-time World Series Champion San Francisco Giants.



Jeffrey Leonard ►► Community Ambassador

Jeffrey Leonard joined the San Francisco Giants front office as a Community Ambassador, prior to the 2014 season. In his role, the two-time All-Star outfielder represents the organization at various in-season and offseason community events in San Francisco. He also attends the Giants Spring Training Camp in Scottsdale, AZ to attend several organizational events.

Leonard, a 14-year Major League veteran played for the Giants from 1981-88, compiling a .275 batting average with 139 doubles, 24 triples, 99 home runs and 435 RBI in 789 games. His .275 average as a Giant ranks ninth in the SF-era record books and his 115 stolen bases rank seventh.

Nicknamed "HacMan" after the popular video game PacMan, Leonard was known for his "one flap down" routine, running around the bases after hitting a home run with one arm hanging motionless at his side. He had one of his finest seasons in 1987, when he batted .280 with 19 home runs and was named to the National League All Star team. He was named MVP of the '87 NLCS, after batting .417 with four homers and five RBI, despite San Francisco losing the series to St. Louis four-games-to-three.

The Philadelphia, PA native owned a .266 lifetime average with 144 home runs, 614 runs scored and 723 RBI over 1,415 career games for the Dodgers (1977), Astros (1978-81), Giants (1981-1988), Brewers (1988) and Mariners (1989-90).

Leonard, who currently lives in Roseville, CA, is heavily involved in youth sports. He has his own organization, "Hac-Man Baseball," centered around youth baseball but supporting kids of all ages.



Jeremy Affeldt ►► Community Ambassador

Jeremy Affeldt joined the San Francisco Giants front office as a Community Ambassador prior to the 2016 season. In his role, Affeldt represents the organization at various in-season and offseason community events in the Bay Area.

The former left-handed reliever was drafted by the Kansas City Royals in the third round of the 1997 MLB June Amateur Draft and spent 14 years in the big leagues with Kansas City (2002-06), Colorado (2006-07), Cincinnati (2008) and San Francisco (2009-15), where he won three World Series Championships in 2010, 2012 and 2014. Through three postseasons with the Giants, Affeldt recorded 22 consecutive scoreless innings, a streak bettered only by Hall of Famer Mariano Rivera. He was the winning pitcher in Game 7 of the 2014 World Series, pitching 2.1 innings of scoreless baseball before giving way to series MVP Madison Bumgarner, who finished the game.

Affeldt is a leader to end human trafficking and modern day slavery, while also being an advocate to support and feed the hungry at home and around the globe. He's also the co-founder of Generation Alive, a non-profit organization that works to teach and inspire a generation of young people to act by serving others.

He is active on the speaking and appearance circuit, is the author of *To Stir A Movement*, *Life, Justice and Major League Baseball*, and his new book is scheduled for release in spring 2021.

Affeldt, his wife Larisa and their three boys make their home in Boerne, TX.



J.P. Ricciardi ▶▶ Senior Advisor to the President of Baseball Operations

Ricciardi enters his second season with the Giants as Senior Advisor to the President of Baseball Operations. Prior to his current role, Ricciardi spent eight seasons as a Special Assistant to then General Manager Sandy Alderson in the New York Mets front office after being appointed to the position on November 2, 2010. From November 14, 2001 through the end of the 2009 season, Ricciardi served as the fourth General Manager in Toronto Blue Jays history.

Ricciardi began the first of his 16 years in the Oakland Athletics organization in 1986, working as a New England Area Scout with the A's while also serving as a minor league instructor. He held that role until he became the A's East Coast Scouting Supervisor following the 1992 season. Ricciardi was named the club's National Crosschecker in 1994.

He became a Special Assistant to the General Manager for the A's in 1996, working under two General Managers in Alderson and Billy Beane. In 1999, Ricciardi was appointed the Director of Player Personnel for Oakland and remained in that role until being named the Blue Jays GM in 2001.

In 2000, Ricciardi was a member of the selection committee for the gold-medal winning 2000 United States Olympic Baseball team and was also part of the 1999 Pan American Baseball selection committee.

The Massachusetts native began his post-baseball playing career as a coach for Short-season Oneonta of the New York-Penn League in the Yankees organization from 1982-1984 before working as a coach for rookie-level Helena of the Pioneer League in the Brewers organization in 1985. He spent two seasons as an infielder in the New York Mets' organization after signing as a non-drafted free agent, playing for Little Falls (A) of the New York-Penn League in 1980 and Shelby (A) of the South Atlantic League in 1981.

Ricciardi attended St. Leo University where he played baseball and was inducted into the school's Athletic Hall of Fame in 2003. He played baseball for St. Peter-Marian High School and was part of the 1977 High School State Championship team. In 2008, he was inducted into the St. Peter Marian's High School Hall of Fame. Ricciardi also coached boy High School basketball for 11 years at Holy Name High School in Worcester, MA, advancing to the State Finals in Division 1 three times.

Ricciardi and his wife, Diane, have been married for 36 years and have two sons, Dante (23), and Mariano (21).



Dick Tidrow ▶▶ Senior Advisor to the President of Baseball Operations

A former American League Rookie Pitcher of the Year and 13-year Major League veteran, Dick Tidrow embarks on his 27th year overall with the club. Tidrow came to the organization prior to the 1994 campaign, serving as the club's Major League scout for the American League. He was promoted to Special Assistant to the General Manager in 1996, and was elevated to Director of Player Personnel prior to the 1997 season.

Prior to joining the Giants organization, Tidrow served as a special assignment scout with the New York Yankees from 1985 through 1993. The former right-handed pitcher, nicknamed "Dirt," enjoyed parts of 13 years in the Majors from 1972-84. He was honored as The Sporting News A.L. Rookie Pitcher of the Year as a starter with the Cleveland Indians in 1972, while also capturing pennant and World Series rings as a reliever with the Yankees in 1976 and '77, respectively. He later pitched for the Cubs, White Sox and Mets. His lifetime numbers show a 100-94 record with 55 saves and a 3.68 ERA.

The San Francisco native graduated from Mt. Eden High School in 1965 and Chabot Junior College in 1967, both located in Hayward. Tidrow and his wife, Mari Jo, have three children—Andy, Matt and Richelle—and make their home in Lee's Summit, MO.



John Barr ►► Senior Advisor to the President of Baseball Operations

John Barr will begin his 36th season as a baseball executive and his 13th season with the Giants. This past December, Barr was honored as the Scout of the Year for the East Coast region, an award voted on by his peers. Under Barr’s guidance, the Giants have drafted players such as 2010 Rookie of the Year and 2012 National League MVP Buster Posey and All-Stars Brandon Crawford and Brandon Belt among many others; all of whom contributed to the Giants’ three World Series titles the last decade.

The Audubon, NJ, native entered the front office ranks in 1984 with the New York Mets as Administrative Assistant to Minor Leagues and Scouting where he remained until becoming the East Coast Supervisor for the Minnesota Twins in 1988. As Scouting Director for the Baltimore Orioles, (1989-90), Barr was responsible for selecting first rounders Ben McDonald (’89) and Hall of Famer Mike Mussina (’90). He served as Assistant General Manager for the San Diego Padres (1991-93) before returning to the New York Mets (1994-97) as Scouting Director. Barr then spent ten years (1998- 2007) with the Los Angeles Dodgers as East Coast Supervisor.

Barr was inducted into the Mid Atlantic Scouts Hall of Fame in November of 2008 and then inducted into the Professional Scouting Hall of Fame during the summer of 2009. He received the “Legends in Scouting Award” in January 2019 at the Professional Baseball Scouts Foundation Awards Dinner. The Rider University graduate resides in Haddonfield, NJ, with his wife, Marianne, daughters Kate, Eileen, and Mary, and son, Blake.

Jeremy Shelley ►► Vice President & Assistant General Manager

Jeremy Shelley enters his 27th season in San Francisco’s baseball operations department, currently serving as Vice President and Assistant General Manager. He assists President of Baseball Operations Farhan Zaidi and General Manager Scott Harris with the day-to-day operations of the baseball department including roster management, player acquisitions, player evaluations, Major League rules administration and interpretation, contract negotiations and salary arbitration.

During his time with the Giants he has been a part of eight postseason berths, including four World Series appearances and three Championships.

The Concord, CA native began his career for the Giants as a baseball operations intern in 1994. He was hired full-time as Administrative Assistant, Baseball Operations in 1996. Shelley was later promoted to Director, Baseball Operations in 2006, Senior Director, Baseball Operations/Pro Scouting in 2009 and Vice President, Pro Scouting and Player Evaluation in 2013.

He earned a BS in finance from Santa Clara University in 1995. Shelley and his wife, Suzanne, live in San Mateo with their two daughters.

Yeshayah Goldfarb ►► Vice President of Baseball Resources & Development

Yeshayah Goldfarb enters his 20th season with the Giants. During his tenure he has become an integral part of a baseball operations team and decision making process that has led to six playoff seasons, four World Series appearances, and three World Series championships. Goldfarb's daily focus is to strategically ensure our baseball staff and players have the resources and support needed to reach their potential. Additionally, he remains engaged in player acquisition, roster construction and player instruction.

Goldfarb graduated Cum Laude from the University of California, San Diego. A former pitcher and team captain, he played four seasons with the Tritons and was elected most inspirational Player by his teammates and also presented with the John Roth Memorial Award (Charlie Hustle) by the coaching staff in 2000.

The Berkeley, CA native began his career with the Giants as a scouting intern and video assistant in 2001 and was hired full time after the season as Assistant, Baseball Operations. Entering the 2016 season Goldfarb was promoted from Senior Director, Minor League Operations and Quantitative Analysis to Vice President of Baseball Operations and has now slid over to the new position of Vice President of Baseball Resources and Development. Goldfarb and his wife, Miranda, have a daughter, Eliana, and a son, Ezra, and reside in Oakland, CA.





Colin Cahill >>> Vice President of Player Performance & Wellness

Colin Cahill embarks on his first season with the Giants in 2020 after joining the club in October of 2019 as the VP of Player Performance and Wellness. In his role with the Giants, Cahill works across Baseball Operations to help drive the organization's efforts to capitalize on advances in medicine, sports science, and technology. Prior to the Giants, Cahill spent 20 years working at the intersection of healthcare and technology in the Bay Area and Boston.

Cahill double-majored while attending Stanford University, earning Bachelor's degrees in both Economics and Biological Sciences. He received his Master's in Biological Sciences from Stanford in 2004 and received his MBA from Stanford Business in 2006.

He lives on the Peninsula with his wife and three kids.



Zack Minasian >>> Director of Pro Scouting

Zack Minasian begins his second season with the Giants organization after spending the previous 14 seasons in the Milwaukee Brewers organization, most recently holding the position of Special Advisor – Baseball Operations. For six years he was the Club's Director – Professional Scouting and also worked for the Brewers organization as Manager of Minor League Scouting, Personnel/Coordinator of Pro Scouting and as Baseball Operations Assistant. At 27, Minasian took over as the Brewers' Professional Scouting Director, becoming the youngest Scouting Director in baseball. While with the Brewers, Minasian assisted in the Brewers three playoff appearances, most notably ending a 26-year playoff drought in 2008 and a franchise best 96 wins in 2011. While with Milwaukee, Minasian was a part of acquiring players such as: CC Sabathia, Zack Greinke, Carlos Gomez, Josh Hader, Corey Knebel, Jean Segura and Will Smith among others.

Minasian grew up in a Major League clubhouse beginning at age five and began working as an batboy/clubhouse attendant at age 14 for his father, Zack Sr., who is the longtime clubhouse manager with the Texas Rangers. Minasian's brother, Perry, is the Vice President, Baseball Operations for the Atlanta Braves and his brother, Calvin, is the Minor League Clubhouse & Equipment Coordinator for the Washington Nationals. Minasian is godson to Hall of Fame manager Tommy Lasorda and his wife, Jo.



Michael Holmes >>> Director of Amateur Scouting

Michael Holmes enters his second season with the Giants. He most recently held the title of Assistant Scouting Director for the Oakland Athletics. While with the A's, Holmes and Farhan Zaidi worked together for 10 years.

Holmes began his professional baseball career in 1997, when he was selected by the A's in the 18th round of the draft out of Wake Forest. With the Demon Deacons, Holmes was a four-year standout from 1994-97 and was named the team's MVP in 1996. After spending four seasons pitching in the lower levels of the A's system, Holmes joined the Wake Forest coaching staff in January, 2001. In addition to coaching at Wake Forest, Holmes spent his summer in 2001 as a Pitching Coach for Brewster in the Cape Cod League.

Holmes started his career as the A's Area Scout in the Carolinas and later served as the A's East Coast Cross-Checker before being named Assistant Scouting Director, a position he held since 2009.



Joe Salermo >>> Director of International Scouting

Joe Salermo enters his 24th season in professional baseball and his 12th full season with the San Francisco Giants, currently serving as the Director of International Scouting. In his role he oversees the scouting of International amateur players as well as Cuban amateur and professional players, while also providing coverage with Asian professional baseball leagues and International professional winter leagues.

Salermo's first year as a scout was with the Mets in 1997, working as an associate scout before becoming the South Florida Area Supervisor with the Mets in 1999. Salermo later won the South Florida Scout of the Year award (2007).

He was born in Manzanillo, Cuba and came to the United States with his family when he was 10 years old. Salermo played baseball at Monmouth University in New Jersey, and graduated from Kean University with a Bachelor's Degree in Education. He now makes his home in Hallandale Beach, FL.



Craig Weissmann ►► Special Assistant, Scouting

Craig Weissmann enters his second season with the Giants as a Special Assistant to Scouting. He has 28 years of Scouting experience and pitched professionally for 11 seasons.

Most recently he was VP of Player Personnel for the Miami Marlins before moving on to the Dodgers for two years as a Special Assignment Scout.

Weissmann attended USIU in San Diego where he received a Bachelor’s Degree in International Relations. He and his wife, Katharine, reside in La Costa, CA.



Kyle Haines ►► Director of Player Development

Kyle Haines will embark on his second season as Director of Player Development after spending the 2018 season as Assistant Director Player Development of Instruction. In 2017, he served as the manager for the Richmond Flying Squirrels and was named “Best Manager Prospect” in the Eastern League by *Baseball America*. Haines also managed Salem-Keizer for two seasons (2015-2016).

Haines was selected by the Giants in the 31st round of the 2004 draft. He was a member of four championship teams in the minor leagues (2004 Arizona Rookie League Giants, 2005 & 2007 San Jose Giants, 2009 Akron Aeros).

Haines was selected by the Phillies in the Minor League Phase of the 2008 Rule Five Draft. He graduated from Eastern Illinois University with a Bachelor’s Degree in Kinesiology and Sports Management and also has an Associate’s Degree from Olney Central College. He played baseball for two years at Olney Central and two years at EIU.



Felipe Alou ►► Special Assistant to Baseball Operations

Felipe Alou, a man whose name is synonymous with the Giants, returns for his 13th season as a Special Assistant to Baseball Operations after serving as the club’s field manager from 2003-06.

The organization named their facility in the Dominican Republic after Alou - The Felipe Alou Baseball Academy, which serves as the headquarters of the Giants’ Latin American operations and as the educational training and player development home for the team’s international prospects.

The Dominican icon continues a long and storied career with the franchise, beginning with his playing days as a member of the original San Francisco Giants club in 1958.

The 2020 campaign will mark Alou’s 65th season in professional baseball. Following a distinguished 17-year playing career that ended in 1974, he was appointed a minor league manager in 1976 and remained in uniform each year through the 2006 campaign. In 13 seasons as a Major League manager, the 1994 NL Manager of the Year posted a 1,033-1,021-1 ledger and became just the 53rd skipper since 1900 to register 1,000 wins. The Haina, Dominican Republic native is the first manager of Latin descent to win 1,000 games in the big leagues, and is only the third foreign-born skipper to reach the milestone (Bruce Bochy, France, 1,926-1,944; and Harry Wright, England, 1,000-825).

Alou became the first Dominican-born manager in Major League history when he assumed control of the Montreal Expos on May 22, 1992. Prior to the 2015 season, Alou was elected into the Canadian Baseball Hall of Fame, acknowledging his work with the Expos.

Primarily an outfielder during his playing days, the second Dominican-born player to reach the Majors (following Ozzie Virgil with the 1956 New York Giants) was a three-time All-Star during a 17-year career with the Giants (1958-63), Milwaukee and Atlanta Braves (1964-69), Oakland Athletics (1970-71), New York Yankees (1971-73), Montreal Expos (1973) and Milwaukee Brewers (1974).

Alou, and his wife Lucie, have two children, Valerie and Felipe, Jr. and make their home in Boynton Beach, FL. He’s also the father of daughters Maria, Christia, Cheri and Jennifer, along with sons Jose, Moises, Felipe Jose and Luis.



Dave Righetti >>> **Special Assistant to Player Development**

Dave Righetti enters his 21st year with the Giants and his third year as a Special Assistant. Righetti joined the organization in 1999 as a Roving Minor League Pitching Instructor. He joined the Major League staff in 2000 as the Pitching Coach, a role he held for 18 seasons.

As a player, Righetti made stops with the Yankees (1979, 1981-90), Giants (1991-93), A's (1994), Blue Jays (1994) and White Sox (1995). He began his career as a starter, then converted to a reliever in 1984. He won the American League Rookie of the Year award in 1981 after going 8-4 with a 2.06 ERA. He ended his career with 252 saves, which ranks 35th on Major League Baseball's all-time saves list.

Righetti was inducted into the Bay Area Sports Hall of Fame on May 23, 2013. Righetti and his wife, Kandice, have three children (triplets, Nicolette, Natalee and Wesley).



Shawon Dunston >>> **Special Assistant to Player Development**

Shawon Dunston begins his first season as a Special Assistant to Player Development after having spent the last 11 years working on San Francisco's coaching staff.

The two-time All-Star (1988 & 1990) played 18 seasons in the big leagues with Chicago-NL (1985-95, 1997), San Francisco (1996, 1998, 2001-02), Pittsburgh (1997), Cleveland (1998), St. Louis (1999, 2000) and New York-NL (1999). He was the first overall pick in the 1982 MLB draft by the Chicago Cubs and made his Major League debut on April 9, 1985 vs. Pittsburgh. He played four seasons with San Francisco and his only World Series appearance came with the Giants in 2002. Dunston won the Giants' Willie Mac Award in 1996 in what was his first season in San Francisco.

A three-time baseball All-Star and two-time MVP at Thomas Jefferson High School in Brooklyn, NY, Dunston was inducted into the New York State Baseball Hall of Fame in 2017.

Dunston and his wife, Tracie, have three daughters (Whitnie, Jasmine and I'Sha) and one son (Shawon Jr.).

Gabe Kapler was named the 39th manager in Giants history on November 12, 2019 when he was introduced to the media at Oracle Park.

Kapler, 44, spent the past two seasons as the manager of the Philadelphia Phillies where he guided them to a 161-163 (.497) combined record. In his first season, 2018, Kapler's Phillies finished 80-82, a 14-win improvement from 2017. The 2019 Phillies finished 81-81, reaching the .500 mark for the first time since 2012.

Prior to joining Philadelphia, Kapler was the Director of Player Development for the Los Angeles Dodgers from November 2014 until he was named the Phillies manager in October 2017. During those three seasons overseeing the Dodgers minor league system (2015-2017), their minor league clubs went a combined 1,299-1,128 (.535) that included eight first-place finishes. The .535 winning percentage over that span was the fourth-best among all Major League teams and the second-best among National League clubs, trailing the Phillies .548 mark. In that span, the Dodgers system produced future Major Leaguers Cody Bellinger, Walker Buehler and Max Muncy along with one of the game's current top prospects in Gavin Lux.

In 2013, Kapler served as a Coach for Team Israel during the World Baseball Classic qualifiers. From 2011-2013, he served as a Special Assignment Scout for the Tampa Bay Rays. He began his coaching career in 2007, taking a season out of his playing career to serve as the Manager of Class-A Greenville of the South Atlantic League in Boston's minor league system.

As a player, Kapler played in parts of 12 seasons in the Majors from 1998-2010 with Detroit (1998-1999), Texas (2000-2002), Colorado (2002), Boston (2003-2006), Milwaukee (2008) and Tampa Bay (2009-2010). A former 57th-round pick by Detroit in 1995, Kapler batted .268 over 1,104 career games with 176 doubles, 82 home runs and 386 RBI.

He made his Major League debut on September 20, 1998 for Detroit vs. Minnesota, going 1-for-4 with a stolen base. In the minors that season, Kapler was named the Southern League MVP after leading the league in runs (113), hits (176), doubles (47), home runs (28), RBI (146), extra-base hits (81) and total bases (319). *USA Today Baseball Weekly* and *The Sporting News* tabbed him as the Minor League Player of the Year for 1998.

In 1999, Kapler established his career high in homers (18), playing in 130 games for the Tigers. Following the 1999 season he was traded to Texas along with LHP Alan Webb, IF Frank Catalanotto, RHP Francisco Cordero, C Bill Haselman and LHP Justin Thompson in exchange for OF Juan Gonzalez, RHP Danny Patterson and C Gregg Zaun.

In 322 career games with Texas from 2000-2002, Kapler batted .280 with 73 doubles, 31 homers and 155 RBI. In his first game with Texas, Opening Day (April 3, 2000), Kapler homered in each of his first two at-bats, becoming the first Ranger in franchise history to homer in each of his first two at-bats with the team. Later that season, he established a Rangers franchise record that still stands today with a 28-game hitting streak from July 17-August 15.

On July 31, 2002, Kapler was traded to Colorado along with OF Jason Romano and cash considerations in exchange for OF Todd Hollandsworth and RHP Dennys Reyes.

In 2004, Kapler played in a career-best 136 games while hitting .272 for the eventual World Champion Boston Red Sox. His playing career also included a 38-game stint for the Yomiuri Giants of the Nippon Professional League in 2005 before returning to Boston later that season.

Outside of coaching and playing, Kapler spent the 2013 season working as an analyst for FS1.

Collegiately, Kapler attended Cal State Fullerton before attending Moorpark College in Moorpark, CA. In 1995, Kapler led Moorpark in home runs and RBI while batting .337 in his one season there. He was later inducted into the Moorpark College Athletic Hall of Fame in 2008.

Kapler makes his offseason home in San Francisco and has two sons, Chase and Dane.

Last season, Albernaz served as one of the Minor League Field Coordinators for the Tampa Bay Rays, a club he's spent a majority of his professional career with in both a playing and coaching capacity.

His coaching career began with the Rays in 2015 when he was a Hitting Coach at Rookie-level Princeton before holding the same role with Hudson Valley in 2016. In 2017, he began the season with Triple-A Durham as their Third Base and Catching Coach before managing Short-Season Hudson Valley when their season began. He guided the Renegades to a New York-Penn League championship after finishing the regular season 44-32 and defeating Staten Island in the semifinals two games to one in the best-of-three series. They swept a best-of-three Championship Series with Vermont to claim the crown. The Durham team that he began the 2017 season coaching with also won its championship that season.

In 2018, Albernaz was promoted to Class-A Bowling Green and repeated the feat, guiding the Hot Rods to a Midwest League championship. Bowling Green won a minor-league best 90 games in a campaign that earned him Midwest League Manager of the Year honors. Overall, his club went 90-49 during the regular season before nearly sweeping their way through the playoffs. They went a combined 5-1 in the playoffs, only dropping Game 2 of the Midwest League finals.

As a player, Albernaz spent eight of his nine minor league seasons in the Rays organization as a catcher, reaching as high as Triple-A Durham. He spent one season in the Tigers organization (2014) before moving to the coaching ranks. Over his nine minor league seasons he played in 371 career games and threw out 44 percent of would-be basestealers (145-of-329).

Albernaz was originally signed by the Rays as a minor league free agent on March 15, 2006. He graduated from Eckerd College in St. Petersburg, FL in 2005 where he was a three-year letterwinner for the Tritons.

Andrew Bailey sets out on his first season with the Giants organization in 2020 as the pitching coach on Gabe Kapler's staff.

Bailey, 35, served as the Bullpen Coach for the Los Angeles Angels in 2019, his first and only year in the role. Last year, the Angels bullpen had the second-most wins of any bullpen in the American League (44) while also pitching the second-most innings of any AL bullpen. The bullpen group finished the year with a 4.64 ERA.

In 2018, his first year as a coach after retiring from playing in February, he joined the Angels coaching staff as a Coaching Assistant and Video Replay Coordinator.

As a player, Bailey was a two-time American League All-Star as well as the 2009 American League Rookie of the Year. In his first Major League season, Bailey went 6-3 with a 1.84 ERA for the Oakland A's while posting 26 saves en route to being named the AL Rookie of the Year as well as the first of his two All-Star selections. He struck out 91 batters over 83.1 innings for the A's in 2009.

His second All-Star selection came in 2010, when the right-hander posted a 1.47 ERA and 25 saves in 42 games for the Athletics. In 2011, his final season in Oakland, he saved 24 games to become one of three players in Major League history to record 24 or more saves in each of his first three Major League seasons. The other two to accomplish the feat were Kazuhiro Sasaki from 2000-2002 and Billy Koch from 1999-2001.

From 2012-2017, Bailey played with the Red Sox (2012-2013), Yankees (2015), Phillies (2016) and Angels (2016-2017) before retiring in 2018. In 265 career Major League games, Bailey was 16-14 with a 3.12 ERA and 95 saves. He missed the entire 2014 season after recovering from right shoulder surgery.

He graduated from Wagner College (NY) in 2006 and set a school record with his 237 career strikeouts. In his time there, he led the team to three consecutive NEC tournament appearances. He had his number (17) retired by the school on January 28, 2010.

Bailey was selected by Oakland in the sixth round of the 2006 First-Year Player Draft when current Giants President of Baseball Operations Farhan Zaidi was in Oakland.

He and his wife, Amanda, have two children, Theodora and Matthew.

Brian Bannister begins his first season in San Francisco in 2020 and will be focusing on pitching analysis and ongoing pitcher development as the Director of Pitching for Gabe Kapler's staff.

Bannister spent the last five seasons working in the Boston Red Sox organization, originally being hired as a Professional Scout and Analyst in January 2015 before being named the Director of Pitching Analysis and Development on September 9, 2015.

The following year, Bannister was added to Boston's Major League coaching staff as an Assistant Pitching Coach on July 5, 2016. On November 3, 2016, he was named Vice President, Pitching Development and Assistant Pitching Coach.

Since Bannister was added to the Major League coaching staff on July 5, 2016, the Red Sox pitching staff ranked among AL clubs in ERA (3.98, fifth), SO/9ip (9.56, fourth), strikeout-to-walk ratio (3.02, fourth) and opponent's OPS (.712, fifth).

As a player, Bannister played five Major League seasons between the New York Mets (2006) and Kansas City Royals (2007-2010) and went 37-50 with a 5.08 ERA in 117 career games (114 career starts). He won a career-best 12 games for the Royals in 2007, going 12-9 with a 3.87 ERA in 27 starts to finished third in the 2007 AL Rookie of the Year voting behind Dustin Pedroia and Delmon Young. He was tabbed the AL Rookie of the Month for June and August in 2007.

He made at least 26 starts and threw at least 150.0 innings in each season from 2007-2009. From 2007-2010, Bannister ranked second on the Royals in starts (108), wins (35) and innings (629.1) behind Zack Greinke.

In 2011, Bannister signed a contract to play for Yomiuri Giants of the Nippon Professional Baseball league but retired in March 2011.

Bannister played collegiately at the University of Southern California, where he was drafted by the Red Sox in the 45th round of the 2002 First Year Player Draft (did not sign) and the Mets in the seventh round of the 2003 First-Year Player Draft.

He graduated cum laude in 2003 from USC with a Bachelor of Arts degree from the School of Fine Arts.

Bannister and his wife, Megan, have one daughter, Brynn, and one son, Atley.

Had his number retired by Chaparral High School (#15, 2007) and by the Brooklyn Cyclones (#19, 2006)...Bannister won a state title with Chaparral (AZ) HS in 1999, striking out seven of the nine batters he faced in the championship game.

Was the first member of the Brooklyn Cyclones to appear in the Majors.

Is an avid photographer and is the founder of Loft 19 Studios in Phoenix, AZ...they are a full-service photography studio complex and equipment rental house...his work has been featured in the *New York Times*, *New York Daily News* and *American Photo*.

An infielder, Ortiz was originally drafted by Boston in the 34th round of the 1990 First-Year Player draft. He played a total of 15 seasons in the minors with 12 of those coming in affiliated ball with Boston (1991-1998), Montreal (1998), Cleveland (1999), Los Angeles-NL (1999), Kansas City (2000-2001, 2003), New York-AL (2000) and Chicago-NL (2003). He appeared in games at the Triple-A level in 1998 with Ottawa, 1999 with Buffalo and 2001 with Omaha.

Over his 12 seasons of affiliated baseball, Ortiz batted .260 with 202 doubles, 23 triples, 52 homers and 414 RBI in 1,060 career games. In 2000, he was a Texas League Mid-Season All-Star with Wichita.

He also played three seasons in the Independent Leagues (2004, 2006-2007) in the Atlantic League where he hit a combined .281 with 23 homers in 333 combined games with Bridgeport, Long Island, and Somerset. His stats from the Atlantic League also include a 78-game stint in 2006 where he played on a club designated the Atlantic League Road Warriors, which was a team that did not have a home stadium and played the season entirely on the road.

In addition to his baseball during the summer, Ortiz suited up in the Puerto Rican Winter League for 16 seasons (1991-93, 1996-2007 and 2012) where he was named an All-Star six times. In 2010, he was a member of the Puerto Rico National Team in the 2010 Central American and Caribbean Games.

Ortiz an his wife, Rosalie Hernandez, have two children, Christian and Alexandra. Ortiz also has a daughter, Gabriella. A native of Puerto Rico, Ortiz and his family make their offseason home in Caguas, PR.

Antoan Richardson joins his first Major League coaching staff as he'll serve as the First Base Coach on Gabe Kapler's staff in 2020. Richardson will also oversee baserunning and outfield instruction.

In 2019, Richardson was the Giants Minor League Field Coordinator in what was his first season in the Giants organization as a coach. Prior to joining the Giants, Richardson worked as a fellow in the Toronto Blue Jays baseball operations department from late 2017 to October 2018 when he was promoted to minor league Outfield Coordinator. He joined the Giants organization three months later.

Prior to his coaching career, Richardson played professionally from 2005-2016 in a career that spanned 12 seasons that included 22 games at the Major League level (nine with the Braves in 2011 and 13 with the Yankees in 2014).

After being named class salutatorian at the end of his senior year at American Heritage High School, he was drafted by the Baltimore Orioles in the 27th round of the 2001 First-Year Player Draft. Richardson also had a full ride to Brown University but passed on that opportunity, as well as the Orioles opportunity, and decided to attend Palm Beach Community College to play baseball.

The Orioles took him again in the 2002 draft (also in the 27th round) but he returned to Palm Beach CC for a second season. The following year, he transferred to Vanderbilt for the 2004 season. He was selected again in the '04 draft, this time in the 13th round by Arizona, but once again returned to school. He was drafted a fourth and final time by the Giants in the 35th round of the 2005 draft.

Richardson was a member of the Giants organization as a player from 2005-2009, reaching Double-A Connecticut. He made his Major League debut for Atlanta on September 4, 2011, recording his first career hit off Los Angeles' Clayton Kershaw.

Three years later, Richardson scored the game-winning run for the Yankees in Derek Jeter's final game at Yankee Stadium on September 25, 2014. He scored on a walk-off single from Jeter himself as the Yankees beat the Orioles 6-5 with Richardson sliding headfirst into home plate ahead of the tag to win the game.

RICHARDSON NOTES

Retired from baseball in March of 2017 to found Project Limestone in the Bahamas, a nonprofit organization with the objective of creating environments, through academics and athletics, that cultivate a curiosity for learning, and respect for self and others. Ultimately, inspiring the hope that encourages the pursuit of their passions.

The name of the organization comes from the fact that the islands of The Bahamas rests on a plateau of limestone and limestone rock is made of diverse elements, that together are strong and resilient.

Their programs include an after-school baseball program, focused on player and team development, which is accomplished through teaching the fundamentals of baseball and team work, and a Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) program where students will be challenged to be innovative and see solutions through the use of industry leading software and hardware.

Justin Viele (pronounced vee-lee) begins his first season in the Giants organization as a Hitting Coach in 2020.

Prior to joining the Giants, Viele spent the last three seasons working in the Dodgers minor league system as the hitting coach at three different levels. Last season, Viele was the Hitting Coach at Class-A Great Lakes in the Midwest League where the Loons led the 16-team Midwest League in home runs (113), RBI (638), walks (597), runs scored (712), on-base percentage (.339) and OPS (.729) while finishing second in doubles and slugging percentage. The Loons' 712 runs scored were 71 runs more than the club with the second-most runs in the circuit.

In addition to his role in Great Lakes, Viele was also the Dodgers' Assistant Minor League Hitting Coordinator throughout the entire 2019 campaign. Following the end of last season, he was elevated to the club's overall minor league Hitting Coordinator before joining the Giants Major League staff.

In 2018, Viele was the Hitting Coach at Class-A Advanced Rancho Cucamonga where that club led the eight-team league in runs scored, doubles, home runs, RBI, on-base percentage, slugging percentage and OPS while finishing second in walks and hits. The Quakes hit a total of 202 homers in 2018, 52 more than the next-best club in the league that year. The club also scored 50 more runs than the next closest club after scoring 841 runs that season. The 202 homers and 841 runs were both the most by any minor league team at any level in 2018.

Following the 2018 season, Viele went to Arizona and served as the Hitting Coach for Glendale during the Arizona Fall League.

In his first year in the Dodgers system (2017), Viele coached at Advanced Rookie Ogden of the Pioneer league. That club led the eight-team league in average (.319), total bases, slugging percentage and OPS while finishing second in runs scored, hits, home runs, RBI, stolen bases and on-base percentage.

Viele's coaching career began in the late summer of 2015 when he was hired by his alma mater, Santa Clara University, to be the team's Assistant Hitting Coach for the 2015-2016 season.

He also served as a Coach with Class-A Frederick of the Carolina League in 2015.

As a player, Viele was drafted out of Santa Clara in 2013 by the Baltimore Orioles in the 37th round of the 2013 First-Year Player Draft. A starting shortstop all four years at Santa Clara, Viele finished his career with the Broncos having started 161 consecutive games dating back to his freshman year. Viele graduated in 2013 with a Bachelor's Degree in Sociology.

In the minors, Viele played a total of three seasons in the Orioles organization from 2013-2014, reaching as high as Class A Delmarva of the South Atlantic League in 2014. In his minor league career, Viele hit .211 in 126 career games.

Ron Wotus will begin his 33rd year within the Giants organization and his 23rd on the Major League coaching staff. Wotus, who joined the Giants' staff as a Third Base Coach in 1998, is the longest-tenured coach in franchise history. He has worked under Dusty Baker, Felipe Alou, Bruce Bochy and will now work with Gabe Kapler in his first season with San Francisco. Wotus will handle the third base coaching duties for the third consecutive season after having been the team's Bench Coach for the previous 19 seasons.

Wotus is one of just six individuals since 1900 to serve as a Giants coach for at least 10 years, joining Mark Gardner (15 years, 2003-2017), Larry Jansen (12 years, 1954 and 1961-71), Bob Lillis (11 years, 1986-96), Dave Righetti (18 years, 2000-2017) and Wes Westrum (10 years, 1958-63 and 1968-71).

He has worked with four players that have won NL Gold Gloves under his watch: J.T. Snow (1999, 2000), Omar Vizquel (2005, 2006), Brandon Crawford (2015, 2016, 2017) and Joe Panik (2016).

Wotus coached at Class-A Clinton (Iowa) in 1990 before managing in San Francisco's minor league system for seven years from 1991-97. His clubs, ranging from Class-A to Triple-A, reached the playoffs in every year but one. He was twice named Manager of the Year, while posting an overall record of 554-412 (.574). Wotus was the manager of Class-A Advanced San Jose Giants (1991-92), Double-A Shreveport Captains (1993-95) and Triple-A Phoenix Firebirds (1996-97). He was named California League Manager of the Year in 1991 after leading San Jose to a 92-44 record. In 1997, he was named Pacific Coast League Manager of the Year after the Firebirds finished 88-55, winning 41 of their final 51 games. Wotus became the Giants Third Base Coach in 1998 under manager Dusty Baker and served as Bench Coach from 1999-2017 under Baker, Felipe Alou and Bruce Bochy.

The Connecticut native has been in professional baseball for just about his entire adult life. The Pirates selected him in the 16th round in 1979 and he enjoyed an 11-year professional career, including parts of the 1983 and 1984 seasons with Pittsburgh. A middle infielder, Wotus went 12-for-58 in parts of two seasons with the Pirates. He made his Major League debut on Sept. 3, 1983 in Atlanta and recorded his first big league hit, a single, off the Dodgers' Orel Hershiser at Los Angeles on July 4, 1984. His final two seasons as a player came with the Giants' Triple-A affiliate in Phoenix in 1988 and 1989.

Wotus graduated from Bacon (Colchester, CT) Academy in 1979. He and his wife, Laurie, reside in Pleasant Hill, CA.

WOTUS NOTES

Is the first Giants coach in franchise history to serve for 20+ years (1998-present).

He played baseball, soccer and basketball in high school and was named an All-New England center forward in soccer after scoring a then-record 89 career goals.

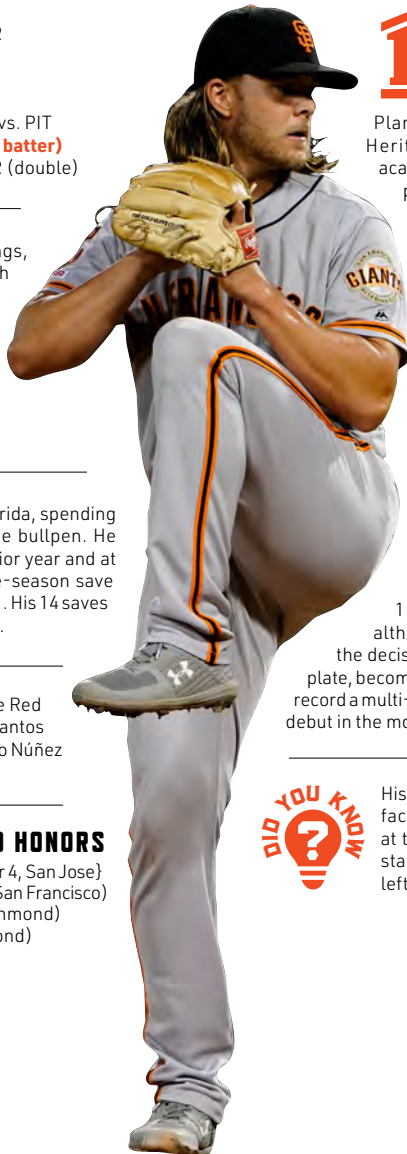

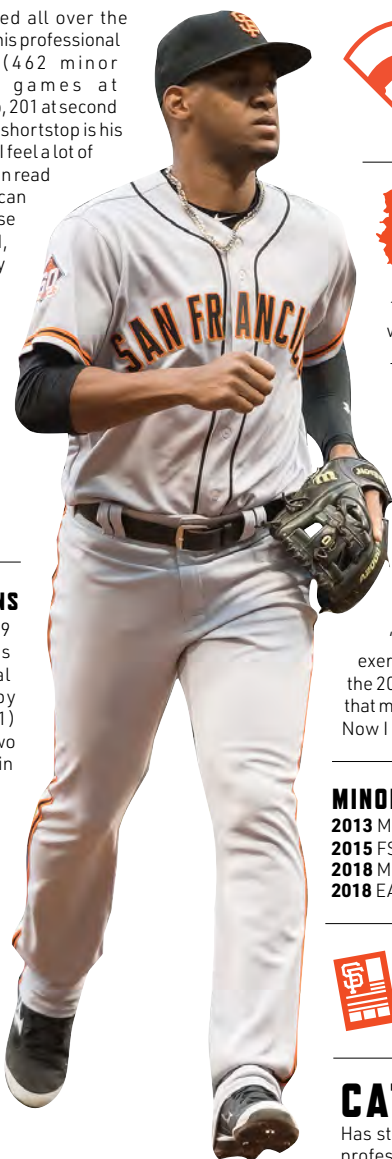

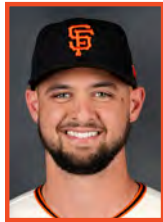

- Rookie right-hander completed his first full season in a Giants uniform, going 5-10 with a 5.08 ERA (66er, 117.0ip) in 24 games (22 starts).
- Among NL rookie leaders he ranked sixth in innings pitched and games started and seventh in strikeouts... his 113 strikeouts were the third-most by a Giants rookie since 2010 behind Chris Heston (141 strikeouts in 2015) and Andrew Suarez (130 in 2018).
- Started the season at Triple-A Sacramento and went 1-1 with a 1.99 ERA (5er, 22.2ip) in five starts before being recalled on May 3...at the time of his promotion was ranked among the PCL leaders in ERA (sixth), strikeouts (fifth, 34), WHIP (fifth, 1.06) and opponents' batting average against (fourth, .179)...started May 3 at Cincinnati and was touched for a career-high eight runs on seven hits in just 2.1 innings...gave up a pair of three-run homers to Derek Dietrich...was optioned back to Triple-A the next day (May 4).
- Recalled a second time on May 9, replacing LHP Drew Pomeranz (IL) and appeared in two games before being optioned May 14.
- Earned his Bachelor of Arts degree from Vanderbilt University on May 10.
- Recalled for a third time May 30 and started that day at Miami...recorded his first big league hit with a single to left field off RHP Sandy Alcantara.
- Earned his first Major League win in what was his ninth appearance and seventh start on June 17 at Los Angeles-NL...became just the fourth Giants pitcher to earn his first big league win in a start at Dodger Stadium, joining Shawn Estes (July 13, 1996), Larry Carter (September 11, 1992) and John Burkett (April 30, 1990).
- Had his best Major League start on July 2 at San Diego, tossing a career-best 7.0 innings and allowing one run... was pitching three days after his stepfather passed away of cancer in Massachusetts at 52...Andrew Rivers III had been married to Beede's mother, Cheryl, for 20 years...was optioned to triple-A after the game because he was not scheduled to pitch again until July 14 due to the All-Star break.
- Recalled from Double-A Richmond on July 14 and started that day at Milwaukee where he tossed 6.2 innings and allowed three runs on seven hits with seven strikeouts...also recorded his first career two-hit game and drove in his first career run, a go-ahead run-scoring single in the 7th.
- Tossed a career-best 8.0-scoreless innings in his start July 19 vs. New York-NL...matched up with 2018 Cy Young winner Jacob deGrom...threw 62 of his 89 pitches for strikes...it was just the fourth time in the past 30 years that a Giants pitcher threw fewer than 90 pitches and went 8.0 innings or longer.

- Was removed in the 4th inning from his final start of the season on September 26 vs. Colorado after an MRI revealed he suffered a mild strain of his left oblique... he had not allowed a hit and struck out seven of his 11 hitters.

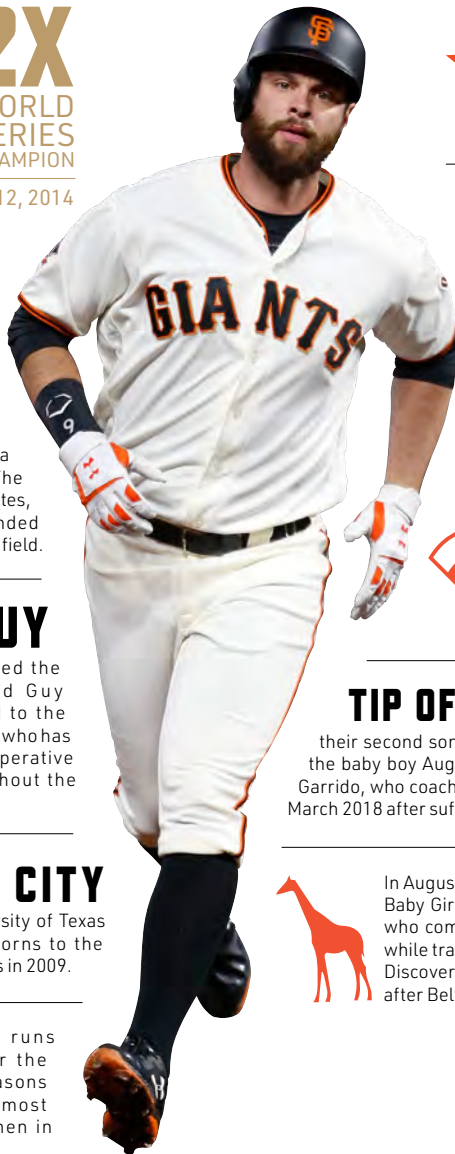

TIP OF THE CAP Belt and his wife, Haylee, welcomed their second son into the world in July 2018 and named the baby boy August Kyle Belt in honor of August "Augie" Garrido, who coached Belt at Texas. Garrido passed away in March 2018 after suffering a stroke in California.



In August 2011, Belt was given the nickname "The Baby Giraffe" by Giants announcer Duane Kuiper, who commented that Belt looked like the animal while tracking down a fly ball in left field. Six Flags Discovery Kingdom later named a real baby giraffe after Belt in 2011.



Graduated from Hudson High School in Lufkin, Texas. As a senior, garnered district MVP, All-State and All-America honors. Was a standout pitcher and thought he'd make the Majors one day at that position.

IT'S OUTTA HERE! In Game 2 of the 2014 NLDS at Washington, Belt hit a solo home run in the top of the 18th inning to break a 1-1 tie, helping the Giants to an eventual, 3-1, series win.

SHAKE AND BAKE On why he's into cars - "Maybe it's just the idea that there's so much power, and you control it. Maybe it's a subconscious thing, I don't know. The sound of it. The steering. How connected you feel to the road. It's a ton of different things. It's not just being in a sweet car and going fast. It's about experiencing a level of excitement you can't find anywhere else. I'm not going to do anything illegal, but if there's nobody around and I'm in safe place, I might step on the gas a little bit."

2019 SEASON

- Was his ninth season in a Giants uniform and his ninth Opening Day roster.
- Played in 156 games, matching his career-high mark from 2016.
- His .234 average and .403 slugging percentage were the lowest marks of his career over a full season.
- Walked 83 times to lead the team, the second-highest total of his career and the 10th-most in the NL in 2019.
- Reached base safely in 18-consecutive games from May 23-June 15.
- Played in his 1,000th career game on June 22 at Arizona. Batted in the leadoff spot for the second time in his career on June 25 vs. Colorado (also August 19, 2018 at CIN)...appeared in 34 games as the team's leadoff hitter, batting .224 (30-for-134) with a .314 OBP.
- Walked 24 times in June, the most by a Giants player in a month since Barry Bonds had 28 in June 2007...the last non-Bonds Giant with that many walks in a calendar month was Darrell Evans with 24 in July 1979.
- Hit his third career pinch-hit home run on July 30 at Philadelphia off RHP Nick Pivetta.
- Hit his second career grand slam on August 17 at Arizona off RHP Taylor Clarke...marked his first slam since April 7, 2017 at San Diego...matched his career-best for RBI in a game with six in that contest (other six RBI game came September 14, 2013 at LAD).

CAREER NOTES

- **2018:** Was named NL Player of the Week on May 21 after hitting .444 with eight runs scored, 12 hits, two doubles, five homers and 11 RBI over seven games.
- Was one of five candidates on the Final Vote campaign, joining STL's Matt Carpenter, MIL's Jesus Aguilar, LAD's Max Muncy and WSH's Trea Turner...finished second in the voting to the Brewers' Aguilar.
- Slugged his 100th career homer on April 18 at Arizona in the 10th inning to give the Giants a 4-3 victory.

- Had 13 defensive runs saved at 1st base, second-most in the Majors (min. 850 innings) behind OAK's Matt Olson.
- Recorded a 21-pitch at-bat in his first AB on April 22 at the Angels vs. Jaime Barria, the most pitches in a single plate appearance in the last 30 years (since 1988).
- The at-bat lasted 12 minutes, 45 seconds and was the longest at-bat in MLB history since at least 1988, the year accurate pitch counts began being recorded throughout baseball...Belt fouled off 16 pitches before lining out to right field.
- On the 10-day injured list from June 2-16 after recovering from an emergency appendectomy on June 1...left the June 1 game vs. PHI after one at-bat and playing 2.0 innings and was rushed to the hospital to be evaluated for appendicitis.

- Flew to Pittsburgh to meet with concussion specialist Michael Collins September 24...was shut down the remainder of the season.
- Following the season had surgery to repair a torn meniscus...had played through the injury most of the season and was often seen walking through the clubhouse with a big ice pack on his knee.
- **2014:** Had an injury-riddled campaign that saw him land on the injured list on three separate occasions, first with a broken left thumb (was HBP from LHP Paul Maholm May 9 at LA), then suffered a concussion that landed him on the injured list twice after the All-Star break (was hit by a ball thrown by Marco Scutaro in the face while taking throws at first base during batting practice July 19 at Miami)...overall, missed a total of 96 games (missed 50 games with a broken left thumb and 46 games with a concussion).
- Was sent to the University of Pittsburgh Medical Center on August 18 to visit Dr. Mickey Collins, who is considered one of the preeminent experts in sports concussions, in the hopes of gaining more clarity on his recurring concussion symptoms.

- Was the Giants' 2011 Opening Day first baseman, becoming the first player to make his debut at first base for the defending World Series Champions since Ryan Jackson started at first for the 1998 Marlins (*Elias*).
- At 22 years and 345 days old, became the fifth youngest Giant to start at first base on Opening Day since Will Clark in 1986 (22 years, 26 days).

- Sat out four games after getting hit by pitch on his left wrist from Cardinals' Trevor Miller on May 31 at Busch Stadium...X-rays originally came back negative, but it was later found that he had hairline fracture in his wrist...was placed on 15-day injured list on June 4, activated July 7 and optioned to triple-A Fresno.

- His 37 career postseason games as a first baseman are the most in Giants franchise history.
- **2014:** His 11 walks were the second most in a single postseason in Giants franchise history (Barry Bonds, 27 in 2002).

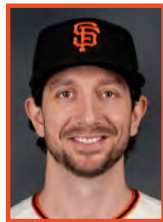

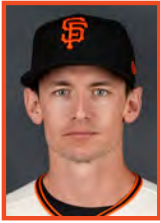

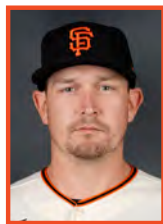

Each spring the family headed to the Cactus League in Scottsdale, AZ to soak in the sun and collect autographs. Come summer, the Crawfords spent nights at Candlestick Park.

GOLD GLOVER

The three-time Gold Glove award winner devoted a lot of his time with defense at the expense of almost everything else in his career – from Foothill High School to UCLA to the stops in San Jose, Richmond, Connecticut and Fresno.

From college coach Tom Savage: "We couldn't keep him off the field and we could barely get him in the batting cage. He wanted to play defense. That was his stage. It didn't matter what he did offensively. He'd run out there and make the routine play and the acrobatic play."

08/08/2016 At Marlins Park, Crawford became the first player in 41 years to record seven hits in a game, going 7-for-8 (five singles, double, triple, 10 total bases)...he tied the NL record for hits in one game, set by Baltimore's Wilbert Robinson in 1892 and tied by Pittsburgh's Rennie Stennett in 1975.

GRAND DEBUT Made his MLB debut on May 27, 2011 at Milwaukee. Hit a grand slam in the 7th inning to become only the sixth player in MLB history to hit a grand slam in his first big league game.



His sister Amy, a former softball player at UCLA, is married to another former Bruin, Gerrit Cole, who now pitches for the Yankees.



Attended UCLA, where he was a physiological sciences major. Played baseball for the Bruins from 2006 to 2008, and started 179 straight games where he helped lead the team to the NCAA Regionals in three consecutive seasons. Was named the team's MVP in 2006 and 2007.

BAY AREA NATIVE

Was born in Mountain View and grew up in Pleasanton, 25 miles east of Oakland. Attended Foothill High School where he was a three-sport athlete playing football, basketball and baseball. Was the starting quarterback for the Foothill Falcons and graduated in the class of 2005.

2019 SEASON

- Spent his ninth season in a Giants uniform and made his eighth Opening Day roster...has made seven consecutive Opening Day starts, the most by a Giants SS since moving to SF in 1958.
- His .228 batting average was the lowest of his career for a full season while his .654 OPS was his lowest since 2012 (.653).
- Had an 11-game hitting streak from March 30-April 10 during which he hit .316 (12-for-38) with one RBI...marked his longest hit streak since a 12-gamer in 2017.
- Recorded his 500th career RBI and became the second Giants shortstop since 1946 to record 500 RBI...Rich Aurilia amassed 574 RBI as a Giants shortstop from 1995-2003 and 2007-2009.
- Put SF in front with a two-run, pinch-hit home run on May 5 at Cincinnati...was his second career pinch-hit homer (also: August 13, 2013 vs. Washington off Gio Gonzalez).
- On May 20 vs. Atlanta, he broke Braves' RHP Mike Soroka's perfect game with a solo home run to lead off the 6th inning...that homer snapped Soroka's 61.1-inning homerless streak, which had been the longest such streak in the Majors.
- Collected his 1,000th career hit with a double on June 28 vs. Arizona off LHP T.J. McFarland.
- His 1,055 hits are the second-most by a Giants shortstop in SF-era history, trailing Rich Aurilia (1,226).

- According to *Elias*, Crawford is the fifth left-handed hitter in SF-era history with at least 1,000 hits, joining Willie McCovey (1,974), Barry Bonds (1,951), Will Clark (1,278) and J.T. Snow (1,007).
- On July 15 at Colorado, he went 5-for-6 with two homers and a career-best eight RBI...his eight RBI matched Orlando Cepeda (July 4, 1961 at CHC) and Willie Mays (April 30, 1961 at MIL) for the most in a game in SF-era history (since 1958)...he became the first Giants player since Willie Mays in 1961 to have at least two home runs and eight RBI in a game...since RBI became official in 1920, Crawford also became the first MLB shortstop to have at least five hits and eight RBI in a game...finally, he was the first MLB player to have those stats since Mark Reynolds, who allowed Crawford's fifth hit.
- Homered in the second game of a doubleheader at Colorado on July 15 to become the first Giant to homer in both ends of a doubleheader since Barry Bonds (three) and J.T. Snow (two) did so on August 25, 1999 at Chicago-NL.
- Also marked his fourth career multi-HR game and second in 2019.
- Totaled nine RBI in that July 15 doubleheader at Colorado, the most by a Giant in one calendar day since April 30, 1944, when Phil Weintraub drove in 11.

CAREER NOTES

- **2018:** Named a National League All-Star for the second time in his career...was the first time in his career he'd been voted in by the fans.
- Played in 151 games despite battling a right knee injury for most of the season.
- Hit .412 with nine doubles, four home runs and 21 RBI in 27 games during May, hitting safely in all but four contests...his .412 May batting average led all of MLB while his 42 hits were tied with ATL's Nick Markakis for most in the month.
- Named the Giants' Heart and Hustle award winner by the MLBPA.
- Hit his third career walk-off homer with his game-ending blast on June 27 vs. Colorado to break a 0-0 tie...marked the first time a Giant hit a walk-off homer to snap a 0-0 tie since Steve Decker on April 21, 1991 vs. Houston.
- The walk-off homer also marked the first time an NL shortstop hit a walk-off HR in the bottom of the 9th inning for a 1-0 win since Ernie Banks did so on August 17, 1960 vs. LAD.
- **2017:** Led the team in doubles (34) and RBI (77) and ranked second in homers (14).
- Won his third-consecutive NL Gold Glove at shortstop... became the first shortstop to win three-straight since Jimmy Rollins (2007-09) and the first Giant since J.T. Snow, who won four in a row (1997-2000).
- Helped Team USA win the World Baseball Classic against Puerto Rico...was one of the team's best players, hitting .385 (10-for-26) with three doubles, a triple and a team-high six RBI in eight games.
- Was placed on the three-day bereavement list on April 26 as he attended services for his sister-in-law, Jennifer Pippin, who passed away unexpectedly April 12 after suffering an asthma attack.
- Strained his right groin while rounding first base in the 8th inning on April 25 vs. Los Angeles-NL...was placed on the 10-day injured list on April 29 and was reinstated May 11.
- Named the Giants' Heart & Hustle winner, an award given to one player from each team who demonstrates a passion for the game of baseball and best embodies the values, spirit, and tradition of the game.
- **2016:** Won his second consecutive Rawlings Gold Glove award...became the first Giants repeat winner at any position since Omar Vizquel in 2005-06.
- Teammate Joe Panik won his first Gold Glove at second base in 2016...Crawford and Panik composed the first double-play combo to win in the NL since the Cardinals' Edgar Renteria and Fernando Vina in 2002.
- Finished tied for the ML lead with 11 triples.
- Was named the Giants' 2016 Heart and Hustle Award winner for the second straight season.
- Became just the third player in National League history to collect seven hits in a game and just the sixth in MLB history on August 8 at Miami, as he went 7-for-8 (five singles, double, triple, 10 total bases).
- Tied a National League record for hits in a game, set by Baltimore's Wilbert Robinson in 1892 and tied by Pittsburgh's Rennie Stennett in 1975...the ML record is nine (in 11 ABs) by Cleveland's Johnny Burnett in 1932.
- Crawford became the first player in Giants franchise history to record seven hits in one game.
- Dislocated his left pinky finger on September 20 at Los Angeles-NL while sliding headfirst into third base while running from first to third on a single...had his finger popped back into place in the tunnel following the injury and missed the next four games.
- **2015:** 2015 All-Star separated himself from the pack with a breakout season at the plate, making a big jump to elite-level production at shortstop...he won his first Rawlings Gold Glove Award and Silver Slugger Award, becoming the first Giant to win both awards in the same year since Barry Bonds in 1997.

- Set career-highs in nearly every offensive category, including batting average (.256), runs (65), hits (130), doubles (33), home runs (21), RBI (84) and slugging percentage (.462).
- Became the first Giants shortstop to win a Gold Glove since Omar Vizquel won it two years in a row in 2005 and 2006.
- Became the first Giants shortstop to hit 20-plus homers in a season since Rich Aurilia in 2001 (36).
- Also became the first shortstop to lead the Giants in home runs for a season since Bill Dahlen in 1905 (seven homers).
- Selected by the players for the All-Star team, his first All-Star selection...became the first Giants shortstop to be elected since Rich Aurilia in 2001.
- Missed 15 games in August and September with a tight left oblique and a tight calf...suffered the oblique injury on a swing in his final AB against CHC's Jake Arrieta August 25...the calf injury came after getting hit by a pitch from LAD's Chris Hatcher August 31.

Dominican-born pitcher, trailing Bartolo Colon (247), Juan Marichal (243), Pedro Martinez (219), Ervin Santana (149), Ramon Martinez (135), Pedro Astacio (129) and Joaquin Andujar (127).

FROM OUTFIELDER TO PITCHER

Growing up, Cueto was an outfielder. However, as he rose from Little League to higher levels of competition against hungry and talented Dominican players, he wasn't keeping up. He wasn't particularly fast and didn't have much of a bat. His talent was in his arm. He could nail a runner at home from the farthest depths of right field. One day, when he was about to turn 16, a coach told him that if he were going to make it in baseball, it would be from a pitcher's mound. So he learned to pitch.

Cueto does not miss being an outfielder. "Pitching is much easier," he says. "[As an outfielder,] you're hitting and running and throwing. You have to do too much. I say, 'No, I'll go on the mound.' I liked hitting when I was a kid. I hate it now. Too much running."



Cueto is the second of five children, four boys and a girl (his sister died several years ago of kidney failure). Says he never worked at anything except baseball. His mother encouraged him to focus on the game and would pull him out of bed in the morning to go workout. She made sure Cueto always had baseball equipment.



Underwent Tommy John surgery August 2, 2018. He missed 61 games trying to rehab the injury (a right elbow sprain), however after returning from the injured list his velocity was noticeably down. The surgery was performed by Dr. Neal ElAttrache in Los Angeles.

WORLD BASEBALL CLASSIC

In 2009, he was a member of the Dominican Republic national baseball team. He missed the tournament in 2013 due to injury. Was scheduled to represent the Dominican Republic once again in the 2017 World Baseball Classic, but was unable to attend the opening rounds due to his father falling ill (the Dominican Republic was eliminated in the second round), thus Cueto missed the tournament again.

CHANGING IT UP

Throughout most of his career, Cueto has used his pitches from four different windups: the traditional windup, the 'Tiant', the quick pitch and the 'rocking chair', which have contributed to his big league success.

SOCIAL MEDIA MOGUL

Cueto has nearly 100,000 followers on his Twitter account and 250,000 on an Instagram account as of February 2019. Some of Cueto's most popular Instagram photos are him climbing Camelback Mountain in Scottsdale, AZ, exercise photos, shots of food and candid pictures of him at home in the Dominican Republic on his ranch with his horses.

2019 SEASON

- Made four starts for the Giants in September after missing most of the season recovering from Tommy John surgery...went 1-2 with a 5.06 ERA in his four Major League outings...also went 0-2 with a 3.38 ERA in six minor league rehab starts.
- Returned to the big league rotation in September and did not allow a run in each of his first two outings totaling 10.0 scoreless innings...made his first Major League start since July 28, 2018 on September 10 vs. Pittsburgh.
- In his first two starts back vs. Pittsburgh and Miami, Cueto allowed no runs on four hits with three walks and six strikeouts (10.0ip)...in his final two starts vs. Atlanta and Los Angeles-NL, he allowed nine runs on seven hits with six walks and seven strikeouts (6.0ip).
- Won his first on September 10 vs. Pittsburgh...was the 126th win of his career, one behind Joaquin Andújar for seventh-most by a Dominican-born pitcher all-time.
- Allowed six hits in 14.0 innings in his three starts, the fewest by a Giants pitcher over his first three starts of a season (min. 10.0ip) since Hank Behrman in 1949 (five) (Stats, LLC).
- Lasted only 2.0 innings in his final start of the season on September 27 vs. Los Angeles-NL... was his shortest start since June 28, 2013 at Texas (with Cincinnati), when he pitched 1.0 inning before leaving the game due to injury...the last time Cueto was removed from a start in 2.0 innings or less for non-injury related was September 22, 2010 at Milwaukee...Cueto allowed eight runs in 1.1 innings in that outing.
- Made six total starts in the minors and went 0-2 with a 3.38 ERA in those six starts...he made two starts for the AZL Giants, two for Class A Advanced San Jose and two for Triple-A Sacramento...in those six outings, Cueto struck out 21 and walked only one batter.

CAREER NOTES

- **2018:** Spent most of the season on the injured list and underwent season-ending Tommy John surgery on August 2.

- Made just nine starts overall for San Francisco, going 3-2 with a 3.23 ERA (19er, 53.0ip) and a .238 opponents average...his nine starts marked the fewest he's made in a single season over his career.
- Was one of the best pitchers in the big leagues to start the season, as he led all of MLB with a 0.35 ERA through his first four starts...gave up just one earned run in first 26.0 innings of work...his 0.35 ERA marked the lowest by a Giants' pitcher through their first four starts of a season since Ray Sadecki in 1968 (0.25 ERA).
- Became one of seven SF Giants pitchers to hold opponents to one-run-or-fewer in each of his first four starts of a season.
- According to *Elias*, Cueto and Mike Krukow (1985) were the only Giants pitchers since 1893 to begin their seasons with four straight starts allowing one run or fewer.
- In his first start of the season on March 30 at Los Angeles-NL, he threw 7.0-scoreless innings...was perfect through 6.0 innings before allowing a single to Chris Taylor to start the 7th.
- Missed nine games from April 10-17 with a left ankle sprain, an injury he suffered while working out in the Giants' gym...missed just one start.
- Was placed on the injured list a second time on May 1 with right elbow inflammation...met with Dr. James Andrews on May 7 and was diagnosed with an elbow sprain not significant enough to warrant surgery and he recommended that Cueto strengthen the ligament through rehabilitation.
- Appeared in two rehab starts w/ Triple-A (June 23 & 29).
- Missed 61 games trying to rehab the injury and was reinstated from the injured list July 5...however, after returning from the injured list he gave up 16 runs in 21 innings over four starts, and his velocity was noticeably down, with his fastball sitting in the 86-87 mph range.
- Underwent season-ending Tommy John surgery on August 2...the surgery was performed by Dr. Neal ElAttrache in Los Angeles...he missed the remainder of the 2018 season and will miss most of 2019.
- Was transferred to the 60-day injured list on August 10.

- **2017:** Dealt with a blister on his middle finger all season...developed an additional blister on the pad of his index finger in late May.
- Was placed on the injured list July 15 and missed 45 games with blister issues on his right hand and then suffered a flexor tendon strain in his rehab start with Class A Advanced San Jose on July 31.
- Missed the first three weeks of Spring Training to take care of his ill father, Domingo...arrived in Phoenix on March 3 after traveling with his father, who was hospitalized in February with a mini stroke...their arrival was delayed because Domingo needed to obtain a visa... Cueto worked out at the Giants' facility in the Dominican Republic.
- **2016:** Among league leaders he ranked third in innings (219.2), fifth in ERA (2.79), sixth in strikeouts (198) and eighth in WHIP (1.09).
- His five complete games were the most in the NL and the second-most in MLB behind Chicago's-AL Chris Sale (6)...it marked the most by a Giants' pitcher in a single season since Jason Schmidt had five in 2003.
- Became the first pitcher in Giants history to start his tenure with the team by winning at least 13 of his first 14 decisions...three pitchers started 12-2 with the Giants - Hooks Wiltse (1904), Sick Castleman (1934-35), and Johnny Antonelli (1954) (*Elias*).
- Won a career-high 10-consecutive decisions from April 26-July 6, which marked the longest winning streak of any Giants starter in a single season since Jason Schmidt won 12-straight decisions from April 26-July 17, 2004 (*Stats, LLC*).
- Had a 29.1-consecutive scoreless innings streak at home from April 21-May 23...the streak was the second-longest home scoreless streak by a Giants pitcher since the team moved to San Francisco in 1958...Bud Black owns the record with 32.0-straight scoreless innings at home from April 15-May 15, 1991 (*Stats, LLC*).
- Was the starting pitcher for the NL in the All-Star Game at Petco Park...became the eighth pitcher in Giants franchise history to start an All-Star game (ninth time), joining Carl Hubbell (1934), Juan Marichal (1965 and 1967), Vida Blue (1978), Rick Reuschel (1989), Jason Schmidt (2003), Tim Lincecum (2009) and Matt Cain (2012).
- Surrendered three runs (two home runs) in 1.2 innings during his ASG start July 12 and took the loss...became the first Giants pitcher to take the loss in the AS Game since Shawn Estes in 1997.
- Tossed a shutout while striking out 11 to earn the 100th win of his ML career, a 1-0 triumph for the Giants over the Padres on April 26.
- Left his start early on September 20 due to a left groin strain he suffered in his previous start at Los Angeles-NL.
- Missed his second to last start scheduled for September 25 due to a left groin strain he suffered in his previous start at Los Angeles-NL on September 20th.
- **2015:** Was acquired by the Royals in a mid-season trade with Cincinnati, which sent left-handed pitcher Brandon Finnegan, John Lamb and Cody Reed to the Reds.
- Recorded the only complete game shutout by a Royals pitcher, firing 9.0 scoreless innings against Detroit on August 10, allowing just four hits...he became the second Royal to throw a shutout in his home debut, joining Eric Rasmussen, who did it on August 6, 1983 in a 4-0 win over the Red Sox.
- **2014:** Finished second in the NL Cy Young Award voting, 12th in the MVP Award voting and was a finalist for a Players Choice Award as the league's Outstanding Pitcher.
- Was voted by the players to his first NL All-Star team.
- Received the Wilson Defensive Player of the Year Award for his position.
- For the third time in four seasons received the Johnny Vander Meer Award as the Reds' Most Outstanding Pitcher in voting of the local chapter of the BBWAA... also was given the Ernie Lombardi Award as the club's Most Valuable Player, the first Reds pitcher to be named MOP and MVP in the same season since Danny Graves in 2000.
- Became the 24th pitcher in franchise history to win 20 games in a season, the first Reds pitcher with 20 wins since Danny Jackson in 1988 (23-8) and the first Reds right-hander since Sammy Ellis (22-10) and Jim Maloney (20-9) both won 20 games in 1965.
- Led the NL in starts (tied), innings, strikeouts (tied w/ WSH's Stephen Strasburg), opponents' batting average (.194) and day ERA (1.52) while ranking second in ERA and T2nd in wins.
- Became the first Reds pitcher to lead the league in innings since Bronson Arroyo in 2006 (240.2), the first Red to lead the NL or share the lead in strikeouts since Aaron Harang in 2006 (216) and only the third Reds pitcher since 1900 to lead the NL in both innings and strikeouts in the same season (Noodles Hahn in 1901, Bucky Walters in 1939).

- His career-high 242 strikeouts tied Mario Soto (1983) for the fourth-most in franchise history.
- **2013:** The Reds' Opening Day starter made just 11 starts around three stints on the injured list with a strained right lat (April 15-May 19, June 5-15, June 29-Sept. 15).
- **2012:** Finished fourth in the BBWAA's NL Cy Young Award voting and was a finalist for the Players Choice Outstanding Pitcher Award...finished 30th in the BBWAA's MVP voting.
- For the second straight season received the Johnny Vander Meer Award as the club's Most Outstanding Pitcher.
- His 2.78 ERA was the lowest by a Reds pitcher since Jose Rijo's 2.48 in 1993 and his 19 wins were the most by a Reds pitcher since LHP Danny Jackson in 1988 (23-8, 2.73) and the most by a Reds RHP since Jack Billingham in 1974 (19-11, 3.94).
- When he earned the 5-2 victory on August 28 at Arizona he became the first Reds pitcher to become the Major Leagues' first 17-game winner since Ewell Blackwell in 1947.
- From June 12-July 22 threw 23.0 consecutive scoreless innings at home, the second-longest scoreless streak ever at GABP (Carlos Zambrano, 30ip, July 29, 2007-April 10, 2010).
- In the first Opening Day start of his career threw 7.0

shutout innings to earn the 4-0 win vs. Miami...was the first Reds homegrown pitcher to start Opening Day since Brett Tomko in 1999.

- **2011:** Received the BBWAA's Johnny Vander Meer Award as the club's Most Outstanding Pitcher.
- Posted a sterling 2.31 ERA in 24 starts around injuries that began and ended his season.
- Began the year on the 15-day injured list with irritation in his right biceps/triceps...following four rehab appearances for Louisville (April 16-May 1), made all 24 of his appearances for the Reds between May 8-Sept. 14 before he suffered a strained right latissimus dorsi muscle 46 pitches and 3.2 innings into his final start.
- Through his final appearance led the Majors in ERA but fell 6.0 innings shy of qualifying for the official title.
- Made four appearances in spring training before the onset of the biceps/triceps injury.
- **2010:** Established then career highs in victories (12) and innings pitched (185.2) and tied his career high with 31 starts...his .632 winning percentage was 10th-best in the National League...led the staff in strikeouts (138).

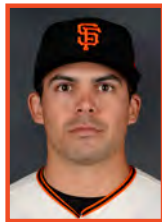

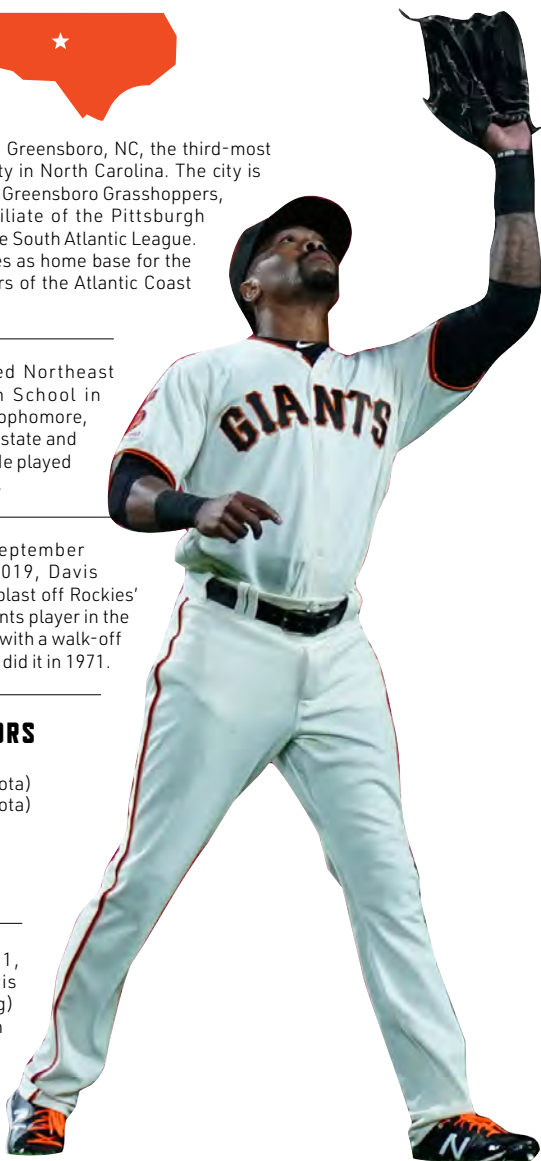

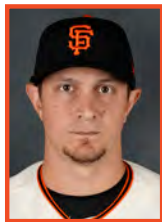

A football injury to his back - which doctors originally said would end his sports career -- forced him to sit out his sophomore year in high school. For six months, it was diagnosed as a knee injury. Then a physical therapist discovered that it was actually the back that was causing the knee pain. Doctors said he couldn't play sports. The risk was too great in someone so young. A Padres' doctor also said he didn't think Dickerson could play and said there was one surgeon doing micro-surgery who he should contact. The surgery worked. He was back on the field for his junior and senior years.



Dickerson didn't play in 2017 or 2018. A torn ulnar collateral ligament in his elbow in 2018 required Tommy John surgery.



His father, Ross, was a career Naval Flight Officer who retired in 2002 when Alex was 12. He flew F-14 Tomcats from aircraft carriers all over the world and was a graduate of TOPGUN, the Naval Weapons Fighter School. He made seven deployments generally lasting eight months at a time and returned to the States permanently in 1999, when Alex was nine. He retired in 2002 at the rank of Commander.

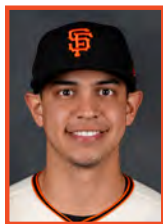

Was born in San Pedro Sula, Honduras. It is the capital

of the Cortés Department and is the primary industrial center and second largest city in the country. Is the only city in the country to hold two football stadiums, the Estadio Olímpico Metropolitano & the Estadio Francisco Morazán.



On July 7, 2019 while playing for Milwaukee, he became the second Honduran-born player to reach the Majors, joining Gerald Young, but the first to be born-and-raised in Honduras.



Dubón will never forget this day when he arrived at a baseball clinic in San Pedro Sula. There he met Andy Ritchey, who was running IMPACT, a Christian mission group from California that supplied baseball equipment to underprivileged children. Dubón expressed his desire to play in the U.S. and three days later he moved to Sacramento, CA to attend Capital Christian as a foreign exchange student and live with Ritchey, his wife Sandy and their three kids.



Quickly became a Giants fan and would wear a Brandon Crawford jersey to Giants games. Was in attendance for Game 5 of the 2014 NLCS vs. St. Louis, watching Travis Ishikawa's walk-off homer from the upper deck down the third base line.

Longoria shared Big West Player of the Year honors in 2006 with another infielder from Cal State Fullerton – the Dodgers' Justin Turner.

CHARITY Is a cook and a foodie. Fell in love with cooking when he was single and playing for the Rays in his mid-twenties. Enjoyed spending off-seasons having people over for dinner. His passion for food and cooking led him in 2013 to partner with friends in opening a restaurant in Tampa. They decided it had to have duckpin bowling, a game with shorter lanes and smaller balls and pins than regular bowling. They called it Ducky's.

BIG HIT Had one of the biggest hits in Rays history when he hit a walk off home run in extra innings of the last game of the 2011 season, snapping a tie with the Red Sox in the race for the American League Wild Card spot and sending his team into the postseason. According to *Elías*, Longoria was only the second player in MLB history to hit a walk-off home run in his team's final game of the regular season to clinch a postseason berth (the other was the Giants' Bobby Thomson with his "Shot Heard Round the World" against the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1951).

1 OF 3 Active players to hit at least 15 home runs in each of the last 12 seasons (also Albert Pujols).

LEADER Is the Rays' all-time leader in games played (1,435), runs scored (780), doubles (338), home runs (261), RBI (892) and walks (569).



Graduated from Saint John Bosco High School in Bellflower, CA. Did not receive any scholarship offers to play college baseball. Attended Rio Hondo Community College during his freshman season before Long Beach State offered him a scholarship. Because Long Beach already had an established shortstop, Troy Tulowitzki, Longoria played third base.

MILESTONES Recorded his 1,000th career hit on May 5, 2015 at Boston. Played in the 1,000th career game on May 21, 2015 vs. Oakland. Collected career hit 1,500 on May 5, 2018 at Atlanta.

CYCLE On August 1, 2017 at Houston, he became the second Ray to hit for the cycle, following Melvin Upton Jr. on October 2, 2009 vs. NYY.

297 297 Career home runs as a third baseman are the most in the Majors since his first season in 2008.

FUN FACT Played one season of water polo at St. John Bosco High in Bellflower, CA. The water polo coach happened to see him swimming in P.E. class and was impressed so he asked him to join the team. Played one year of varsity his sophomore year.

2019 SEASON

- Finished his second season with San Francisco...posted a 2.4 WAR, fourth-best on SF's roster.
- Has made 10 consecutive Opening Day starts at third base, the longest active streak by any third baseman in MLB.
- Is one of nine active players with at least 10 seasons of 20 or more (Albert Pujols, Miguel Cabrera, Nelson Cruz, Ryan Braun, Jay Bruce, Edwin Encarnación, Curtis Granderson, Brian McCann) (Stats, LLC).
- His 12 game-winning RBI were second-most on the Giants behind OF Kevin Pillar (15).
- Registered seven defensive runs saved at third base, fifth-most among qualified third basemen behind Matt Chapman (18), Josh Donaldson (15), Nolan Arenado (eight) and Eduardo Escobar (eight).
- Hit a bases-loaded double to drive home three runners to give the Giants an eventual 3-2 win on April 29 vs. Los Angeles-NL...according to Chuck Nan of SABR, the last player to execute a three-run extra-base hit to score all the runs to defeat the Dodgers was Mike Laga on September 19, 1989...Laga's pinch-hit double (batting for Matt Williams) off Dodger ace Orel Hershiser in the bottom of the 5th inning was all the Giants needed in a 3-2 victory.
- Gave the Giants a 12-11 win on May 3 at Cincinnati, hitting a go-ahead solo home run in the 11th inning...the homer was Longoria's fifth of his career in extra innings, all of which have given his team the lead.

- Had one of his best games in a Giants uniform on July 2 at San Diego, going 4-for-5 with three runs scored, a single, double, two home runs and five RBI...marked his 19th multi-HR game of his career and first since May 29, 2018 at Colorado...was also his first five RBI game as a Giant...his second homer reached the second deck of the Western Metal Supply Co. building.
- Had one of the best series July 1-3 at San Diego in which he went 7-for-13 (.538) with seven runs scored, two doubles, four home runs and nine RBI...he became just third player on any team to homer four-plus times in a series of any length at Petco Park, joining Andrew McCutchen (2017) and Hunter Renfroe (2017).
- On July 7 vs. St. Louis in the final game of the first half, he hit a solo home run off RHP Jack Flaherty in the 7th inning which accounted for the lone run of the game...his homer also broke up Flaherty's no-hitter, which marked the fourth time in his career he's broken up a no hitter in the 7th inning or later.
- Hit a go-ahead two-run homer off Milwaukee's Corbin Burnes on July 12, which had a 110.3 mph exit velocity...that was his second-hardest hit homer tracked by Statcast since 2015.
- Drove in his 1,000th career RBI on August 25 at Oakland, hitting a game-tying solo home run in the 3rd inning off LHP Brett Anderson.
- Was removed from the game on March 30 at San Diego after scoring a run in the Giants' three-run 6th inning... had fouled a ball off his left calf earlier in the game during his second at-bat and it became sore.

- Left the game on July 14 at Milwaukee in the 5th inning with left foot discomfort...was placed on the 10-day IL the next day at Colorado with left foot plantar fasciitis.
- Reinstated from the 10-day IL on August 4 after missing a total of 19 games.

CAREER NOTES

- **2018:** Completed his first season in a Giants uniform by batting .244 with 25 doubles, 16 home runs and 54 RBI in 125 games.
- Finished the year with six defensive runs saved, tied for third-most by an NL third baseman...his nine defensive runs saved in September were an MLB-best (Baseball Info Solutions).
- Recorded his first hit in a Giants' uniform in the home opener on April 3 vs. SEA, hitting a two-run homer off Marco Gonzalez in the 7th inning...the homer snapped a 17 at-bat hitless streak to start the year.
- Recorded his 1,500th career hit with a double on May 5 at Atlanta, becoming the 42nd player to reach that milestone in a Giants uniform (the most of any franchise).
- Suffered a left hand fracture (broken fifth metacarpal) on June 14 at Miami after getting hit by a pitch...placed on the 10-Day injured list on June 15 and underwent surgery in Los Angeles on June 19 performed by Dr. Shin...missed 34 games before being reinstated on July 26.
- **2017:** Broke the Rays club records for runs (780, topping Carl Crawford's 765) and walks (569, topping Ben Zobrist's 542)...was already the Rays' all-time leader in home runs, RBI, doubles, extra-base hits, slugging pct., games played and total bases.
- Hit 20 HR, his fifth straight season with at least 20 and ninth in his 10 first seasons in the Majors...Longoria joined Hall of Famer Eddie Mathews as the only third basemen in Major League history (min. half of games at 3B each year) to hit at least 20 HR in nine of their first 10 seasons in baseball...Mathews did it in each of his first 14 seasons, from 1952-65, with the Braves.
- Also became the second AL third baseman ever to record nine 20-HR seasons at any point in his career, joining Graig Nettles (10)...Longoria's nine seasons with 20 HR are more than twice the total of anyone else in club history (Carlos Peña and Aubrey Huff, four).
- Ranked second among AL third basemen with 11 defensive runs saved, according to FanGraphs, his best mark since 2013 (12)...in *Baseball America's* annual Best Tools survey, was rated the No. 3 defensive third baseman in the AL, behind BAL Manny Machado and TEX Adrián Beltré...from July 5-Aug 28, played a career-best 47 consecutive errorless games (prev. 46, April 27-June 18, 2015).
- Made his ninth consecutive Opening Day start, all at 3B, the longest active streak among 3B in the Majors...on Opening Day vs. NYY, hit his fourth career Opening Day home run, extending his franchise record...had the first RBI (1st inning, sac fly) and home run (2nd inning, 2-run) of Major League Baseball's regular season.
- On August 1 at HOU, became the second Ray to hit for the cycle, following Melvin Upton Jr. on October 2, 2009 vs. NYY...also passed Carl Crawford for most runs scored in club history...his homer was the front end of back-to-back shots with Logan Morrison in the 1st, his triple was his first since Sept 17, 2016 at BAL and his 9th-inning double completed the feat after it was overturned via instant replay...according to the *Elias*, it was the first time under the current replay system (2014-present) that a cycle included any hit that was involved in any type of umpire review or manager challenge.
- Named the Rays nominee for the Roberto Clemente Award, given to the player who best exemplifies the game of baseball, sportsmanship, community involvement and the individual's contribution to his team...it was the second time in his career he's been nominated (2014).
- **2016:** Turned in one of the best offensive seasons in Rays history, establishing career highs with 173 hits, 36 HR, 81 XBH and 330 total bases.
- Was honored by the Tampa Bay Chapter of the BBWAA with the Don Zimmer Award (as the team's most valuable player) as well as the Paul C. Smith Champion Award (given to the player who best exemplifies the spirit of true professionalism on and off the field)...it was Longoria's second time winning each award (Zimmer in 2013; Smith in 2014).
- Played in 160 games, all starts (152-3B, 8-DH)...marked his fourth straight season of at least 160 games...became only the third player in baseball history to play 160-plus games in four consecutive seasons while playing a majority of games at third base each year, joining Hall of Famers CHC Ron Santo (1962-65) and BAL Brooks Robinson (1961-64).
- Became one of three third basemen in Major League history to hit 20 HR in at least eight of his first nine seasons, joining Eddie Mathews (9) and Scott Rolen (8)...is one of three AL third basemen with eight 20-HR seasons at any point in their career, joining Graig Nettles (10) and Adrian Beltre (8).
- Recorded his fourth career 30-HR season (also 2009, 2011, 2013), breaking a tie with Carlos Peña for most in Rays club history.
- On April 3 vs. TOR, made his eighth straight Opening Day start, tying Carl Crawford for most in Rays franchise history.
- Hit nine HR in June, tying José Canseco (1999) for the most in franchise history for the month...they were his most in a calendar month since August 2011, his monthly record (10).
- **2015:** Played in 160 games in 2015, tied for third most in the Majors...led the team with 21 HR, 73 RBI, 35 2B, 57 XBH and 74 runs.
- Reached several career milestones in 2015...on April 11 at MIA, doubled for his 425th XBH, breaking Carl Crawford's Rays club record...on April 16 at TOR hit his 230th 2B, passing Ben Zobrist's club record...recorded his 1,000th hit on May 5 at BOS, a single off Rick Porcello, the third in club history to reach the mark...played his 1,000th game on May 21 vs. OAK...on September 2 at BAL, hit his 200th career home run, a 2-run shot off Kevin Gausman.
- Hit his 20th HR on September 24 at BOS, his seventh 20-HR season...tied Eric Chavez for most 20-HR seasons by a third baseman in AL history before turning 30.
- Became the first third baseman in Major League history to record 200 HR and 250 2B in his first eight seasons (min. 50 pct. of games at 3B)...was the 20th player all-time to reach those totals in their first eight seasons, joining a group including Ted Williams, Joe DiMaggio, Hank Aaron and Barry Bonds.
- Led AL third basemen with a career-high .976 fielding pct., which broke the franchise record for 3B held previously by Akinori Iwamura (.975 in 2007)...it was his first time leading the league.
- On May 7 vs. TEX, ended streaks of 198 straight starts and 270 games, both the longest active in baseball at the time...scratched from the starting lineup (flu-like symptoms).
- On April 6 vs. BAL, hit his third career Opening Day homer (off Chris Tillman) to set a club record, passing Ben Zobrist and Gerald Williams.
- **2014:** Started all 162 games in 2014...was one of three Major Leaguers to start every game that season along with ATL Freddie Freeman and KC Alcides Escobar...tied Delmon Young (2007) and Aubrey Huff (2003) for the single-season Rays club record.
- **2013:** Chosen as the Don Zimmer Award winner by the Tampa Bay Chapter of the BBWAA, as the team's most valuable player...placed sixth in AL MVP balloting, matching his own 2010 finish for the highest in club history...it was the third time he finished in the top 10.

- Led the Rays in runs (91), doubles (39), home runs (32), RBI (88), extra-base hits (74, third in the AL) and slugging pct. (.498).
- Reached base safely in 45 of the Rays first 46 games of the season...remains one of 14 AL players since 1913 to reach in 45 (or more) of his team's first 46 games.
- On August 10 at LAD, pulled the hidden ball trick on veteran Juan Uribe—one of two times it was successful in 2013, along with COL Todd Helton against STL Matt Carpenter on Sep 19.
- 2012:** On November 26, 2012, signed a contract extension through the 2023 season.
- Missed 85 games due to a partially torn left hamstring, sustained on April 30 vs. SEA...placed on the injured list the following day and was not activated until Aug 7.
- In the Rays season finale Oct. 3 vs. BAL, hit three HR to tie the club record and his career high (also Sept. 18, 2008 vs. MIN)...tied Melvin Upton Jr. (Sept. 9, 2012 vs. TEX) and Jonny Gomes (July 30, 2005 vs. KC)...became one of four players all-time to hit 3 HR in his team's final game of the season: CWS Gus Zernial (1950), PHI Dick Allen (1968) and CWS Dan Johnson (also 2012).
- 2011:** Strained his left oblique in the second game of the season and was removed from the game just 14 innings into the season...placed on the 15-day injured list the following day...reinstated on May 3.
- On September 28 vs. NYY, the final day of the regular season, hit a walk-off home run off Scott Proctor in the 12th inning to clinch the AL Wild Card...the Rays had trailed 7-0 in the 8th inning before Longoria's HR won it, 8-7...it was his second home run of the game...according to the *Elias*, Longoria was only the second player in major league history to hit a walk-off home run in his team's final game of the regular season to clinch a postseason berth...the other was NYG Bobby Thomson with his "Shot Heard 'Round the World" against the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1951.
- On June 12 at BAL, hit the first inside-the-park home run of his career off Jeremy Accardo in the Rays 9-6 win.
- 2010:** In 2010, finished sixth in the AL MVP voting, the highest finish of any Ray in club history (tied by Longoria in 2013)...at age 24, became the first 3B (AL or NL) to make the All-Star Team in each of his first three seasons...won his second consecutive Rawlings Gold Glove Award.
- Averaged 40 2B, 27 HR and 101 RBI in his first three seasons...only two other players in major league history averaged at least 40 2B, 25 HR and 100 RBI in their first three seasons: BOS Ted Williams and STL Albert Pujols.
- Became the fifth player all-time with 20 HR and 30 2B in each of his first three seasons, joining STL Albert Pujols, NYY Joe DiMaggio, BOS Ted Williams and SF Orlando Cepeda...CWS José Abreu has since joined that list.
- Played in 151 of the Rays first 152 games but missed the final 10 games with a left quadriceps strain suffered in the field on Sep 23 at NYY.
- At the All-Star Game—held on July 13 at Angel Stadium, just minutes away from his hometown of Downey, Calif.—doubled off COL Ubaldo Jiménez in the 2nd inning, then walked and scored the lone run for the AL in his second trip to the plate.
- Elected by fans as the starting AL third baseman—the second time he was voted to start, but his first start (did not play in 2009 due to injury)...Longoria, Carl Crawford and David Price together became the first Rays to start the Midsummer Classic.
- 2009:** Totaled 33 HR, 44 2B and 113 RBI...only three others in Major League history have reached those numbers in one season before the age of 24...joined STL Albert Pujols (2001, 2003), SEA Alex Rodriguez (1996) and CLE Hal Trosky (1934, 1936).
- Was one of seven players in Major League history to reach the 30-HR/40-2B/100-RBI/100-R milestones in one season before age 24, joining CLE Hal Trosky (1934, 1936), BOS Ted Williams (1939), SEA Alex Rodriguez (1996), STL Albert Pujols (2001-03) and FLA Miguel Cabrera (2005)...BOS Mookie Betts did it in 2016...remains the only player in Rays history to reach those numbers in any season
- Earned the Rawlings AL Gold Glove Award for 3B...was the youngest to win an AL Gold Glove at any position since OAK Eric Chavez in 2001.
- Earned the AL Silver Slugger Award for 3B, the youngest in either league to win the award in 2009...is one of three Rays to win the award: Carlos Peña in 2007 and Carl Crawford in 2010.
- Was the youngest 3B in either league to win both the Gold Glove and Silver Slugger in the same season since the Silver Slugger Award began in 1980.
- Named AL Player of the Month for April, becoming the first reigning Rookie of the Year from either league to earn Player or Pitcher of the Month honors in April of the following year.
- Was elected to the All-Star Game by the fans as the starting AL third baseman but was unable to play due to an infection on the ring finger of his right hand...finished with the third-most votes among AL players behind NYY Derek Jeter and MIN Joe Mauer.
- Was added to Team USA, replacing Chipper Jones...struck out as a pinch-hitter in his only plate app in USA's 9-4 loss to Japan in the elimination game.
- 2008:** Named the 2008 AL Rookie of the Year by the BBWAA...received all 28 first-place votes, becoming the seventh AL rookie to win the award unanimously and first since Nomar Garciaparra in 1997...was the first Ray to win a national BBWAA award.
- On April 18, signed a contract worth a guaranteed \$17.5 million over six years and potentially \$44 million over nine years.
- Despite missing 30 games with a fractured right wrist, led Major League rookies with 27 HR, 85 RBI, 60 XBH, 238 total bases and a .531 SLG...set Rays rookie records in HR, XBH and SLG.
- His 27 HR were most by an AL rookie since BOS Nomar Garciaparra (30) in 1997...his team-high .531 SLG ranked 8th in the AL.
- Selected from Triple-A Durham on April 12 and joined the Rays in their 11th game...played in every game, mostly batting fifth and cleanup, until he was hit by a pitch from J.J. Putz on August 10 at SEA and suffered a fractured right wrist...did not return to the lineup until September 13 at NYY.
- His .963 fielding pct. has been topped by only one other AL rookie third baseman since 1966: Akinori Iwamura (.975) with the Rays in 2007...also played his only game at shortstop in his pro career on June 29 vs. Chicago-NL after Jason Bartlett was a late scratch.
- Named the team's Outstanding Rookie by the Tampa Bay Chapter of the BBWAA.

- Made his Major League debut on April 12 vs. Baltimore, starting at 3B and batting sixth...went 1-for-3 with a RBI...his first career hit was a 6th-inning RBI single to left off Daniel Cabrera.
- Hit his first career home run on April 14 vs. NYY, a game-tying shot in the 7th inning off Brian Bruney...drew a curtain call as the tail end of back-to-back home runs with Melvin Upton Jr.
- On May 25 vs. BAL, tallied a Rays rookie- record six RBI...homered in both the 1st and 2nd innings, his first career multi-HR game.
- Hit three HR on September 18 vs. MIN, becoming the second Ray ever to hit three in one game, following Jonny Gomes on July 30, 2005 vs. KC...was the first rookie 3B to hit three HR in a game since BOS-NL Eddie Mathews on September 27, 1952 at Brooklyn.
- Became one of six Major Leaguers to get an at-bat in the World Series and the All-Star Game as a rookie: NYY Joe DiMaggio (1936), NYY Tom Tresh (1962), BOS Fred Lynn (1975), LAD Steve Sax (1981-82) and NYY Hideki Matsui (2003).
- Named to the AL All-Star Team after winning the "Final Vote" fan ballot with a then-record nine million votes... became the youngest Rays position player ever to make the club...was the third rookie 3B ever to make the AL squad, joining KC Kevin Seitzer (1987) and MIN Rich Rollins (1962).

- **2012:** Hit a game-tying three-run homer off BOS Clay Buchholz in the Rays 5-4 win in Game 3 of the ALDS...it came on Oct 7, his 28th birthday...according to SABR's David Vincent, he became the second player in MLB history to hit a postseason homer on his birthday...joined KC Willie Mays Aikens, who hit two HRs on his 26th birthday in Game 1 of the 1980 World Series at PHIL...it was his club-record ninth postseason homer, fourth of the game-tying or go-ahead variety.

- **2011:** In the ALDS, went 3-for-8 in Games 1 and 2 at Texas and 0-for-7 with 5 SO in Games 3 and 4 at home... in Game 2, hit a three-run homer off Koji Uehara in the 7th inning to trim the Rays deficit to 7-6 in the eventual 8-6 loss.
- **2010:** Went 3-for-4 with 2 2B and a 2-run homer the Rays 5-2 win in Game 4 at Texas...his three XBH remain tied for a Division Series record...was 1-for-16 in the other four games of the ALDS.
- **2008:** Slugged six HR to set a Major League record for a rookie in a single postseason (prev. 4, FLA Miguel Cabrera in 2003)...was the youngest player in major league history to hit six HR or more in a single postseason...turned 23 on October 7, between the ALDS and ALCS...4 of his 6 HR came in the ALCS vs. Boston, tying the all-time LCS record at the time...TEX Nelson Cruz broke the record in 2011 with six HR.
- Homered on his first two swings of the postseason, both coming in Game 1 of the ALDS vs. CWS at Tropicana Field...became the second player in MLB history to homer in his first two ABs of the postseason, joining MIN Gary Gaetti in 1987...at age 22, became the third-youngest player at the time to homer twice in a postseason game, behind ATL Andruw Jones in 1996 (19) and NYY Tony Kubek in 1957 (20).

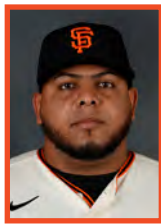

- Clubbed a pinch-hit grand slam on May 8 at Pittsburgh.
- Recorded his first career inside-the-park homer on June 11 at Boston.
- Had two stints on the 10-day injured list, June 17-July 14 with a right groin strain and August 27 to the end of the year with a lower back strain.
- Named 2019 Rangers recipient of MLB Players Alumni Association Heart and Hustle Award...marked the 5th time for Pence to win his team's award (also 2008-09, 2013-14).

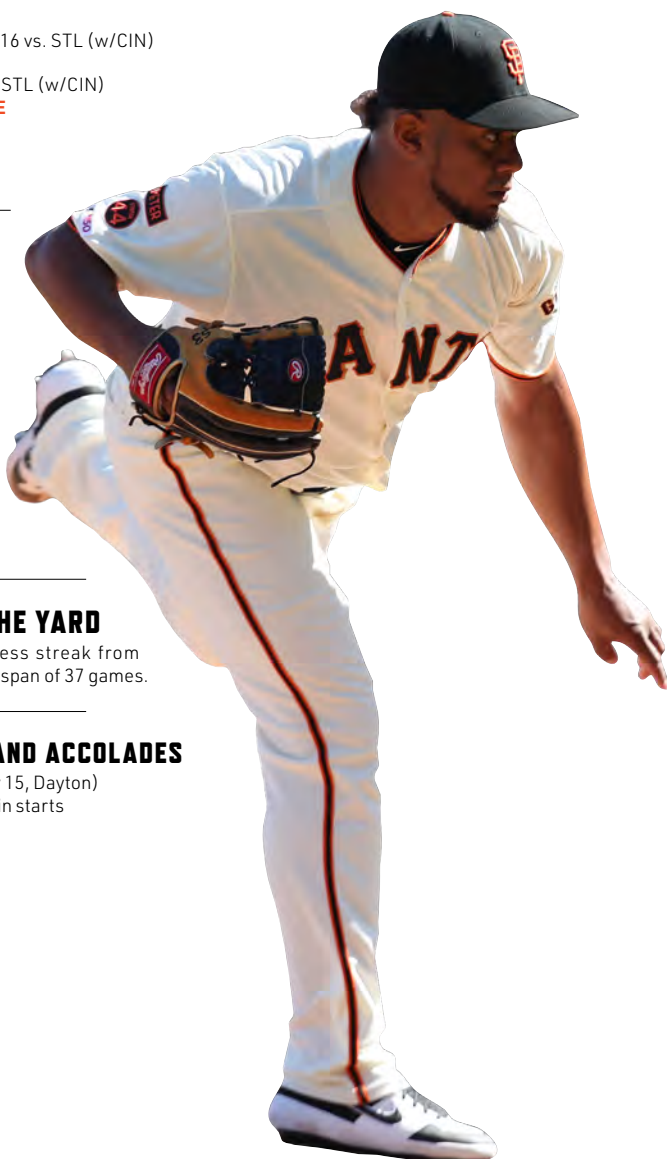

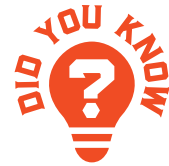

53/23 His 53 postseason games and 23 postseason RBI are both the highest totals in franchise history.

Created the Buster and Kristen Posey Fund for Pediatric Cancer Awareness in 2016. Since its inception, the Poseys have raised more than \$4 million for the Posey Family Research Grant and Fellowship Programs at UCSF Benioff Children's Hospital and The Buster and Kristen Posey Fund at the V Foundation, both of which fund research and less toxic treatment options for kids battling cancer.



Played all nine positions during one game vs. Savannah State while playing for Florida State. Posey also hit a grand slam in the game while using four different gloves in the field.



His full name is Gerald Dempsey Posey III. His father, known as Demp, was nicknamed Buster as a kid and passed it on to his son.

2019 SEASON

- Made his ninth consecutive Opening Day roster with San Francisco.
- Posted career lows in batting average, RBI, on-base percentage, slugging percentage and OPS.
- Hit his only Oracle Park homer of the season on September 24 vs. Colorado (his last homer of the season).
- Finished the season with 14 defensive runs saved at catcher, third-best among Major League catchers who caught a minimum of 800 innings...trailing CLE Roberto Perez (29) and SD's Austin Hedges (22) (Fangraphs).
- According to *Statcast*, Posey saved 10 runs from extra strikes with pitch framing (runs from extra strikes converts strikes to runs saved on a .125 run/strike bases and includes park & pitcher adjustments)...among qualified catchers, the 10 runs extra strikes was sixth-best in the Majors behind SD's Austin Hedges (20), ATL's Tyler Flowers (13), MIL's Yasmani Grandal (13), CLE's Roberto Perez (12) and BOS Christian Vazquez (11).
- Ended a 237 at-bat homerless drought on April 21 at Pittsburgh with a three-run go-ahead homer in the 5th inning...marked the longest home run drought of his career and was his first in 191 regular-season and playoff at-bats against the Pirates, the only National League team he had not taken deep.

- Recorded the sixth career walkoff hit of his career on May 1 vs. Los Angeles-NL, hitting a two-out single off Pedro Báez in the 9th inning that brought Steven Duggar home for a 2-1 victory and series win.
- Marked the third time in his career Posey delivered a walkoff hit against the Dodgers, tied with Matt Williams for the most walkoff hits by any Giants player against the Dodgers since both teams moved to California in 1958.
- Hit his fifth career regular-season grand slam on July 12 at Milwaukee off RHP Matt Albers...his 435-foot homer came in the 10th inning and gave the Giants a 10-6 lead in what was a 6-6 tie...marked his first grand slam since June 24, 2015 vs. San Diego...it also marked his longest home run tracked by *Statcast* since 2015.
- The last Giant prior to Posey to hit a go-ahead grand slam in the 10th inning or later was Hector Sanchez on April 23, 2014 at Colorado (*Stats, LLC*).
- Struck out four times on July 18 vs. New York-NL, the first time in his professional career (Major & minors) that he struck out four times in a game.

CAREER NOTES

- **2018:** Named to his sixth career All-Star team, third as a reserve...did not participate due to right hip impingement.
- His six All-Star nominations are the most by a Giants catcher in franchise history.
- Played in 105 games, his fewest since 2011 (45 games).
- Ended the season with a .337 home batting average, the third-best home batting average in the NL (min. 200 home plate appearances).
- Placed on the 60-day injured list on August 26 (retro to August 25) with a right hip impingement...underwent surgery August 27 to address his right hip impingement and repair a torn labrum...the procedure was performed by Dr. Marc Philippon at The Steadman Clinic in Vail, CO.
- Had his errorless streak snapped on May 28 at Colorado...had not committed an error since June 15, 2017.
- Reached base safely in 32 consecutive home games from September 19, 2017 to June 21 for the longest such streak of his career...was the longest streak by a Giant since Barry Bonds reached base safely in 52 consecutive home games from June 27, 2003 to May 11, 2004.
- **2017:** Won his fourth Silver Slugger Award.
- His .320 batting avg. was the fifth-highest figure in the National League...became just the 11th catcher in NL history with at least four career seasons batting .300 or better.
- Finished with a .400 on-base pct., marking the second time he's accomplished the feat in his career (2012 - .408 OBP).
- Became the first Giants player to record 150+ hits in six consecutive seasons since Will Clark did so from 1987-1992 (*Stats, LLC*).
- Started the All-Star Game and became the first NL catcher to make three straight All-Star starts since Hall of Famer Mike Piazza made six straight from 1994-99.
- Left the game in the 1st inning on April 10 vs. Arizona (Home Opener) after getting hit in the head by a 93.4 MPH fastball thrown by RHP Tajuwan Walker...was placed on the seven-day injured list the next day with concussion symptoms...was reinstated on April 18.
- Cracked a home run in the 17th inning to bring an end to a marathon game in San Francisco, with the Giants going home as 3-2 winners over the Reds on May 12...it was the latest inning for a walk-off homer in Giants history.
- Reached base safely in each of his first 37 road games, one of the longest streaks to start a season by any NL player in the last 100 years.

- Stole home in the 6th inning on September 8 at Chicago-AL.
- Was named the Giants' nominee for the Roberto Clemente Award, which honors a player for his community philanthropy.
- Helped Team USA win the WBC, batting .267 (4-for-15) with two home runs.
- **2016:** Was named to his fourth All-Star team and his third as the NL's starting catcher.
- Recorded his 1,000th career hit on September 27 when he homered in the fifth inning...he became the first Giants player with 1,000 hits all in a Giants uniform since Rich Aurilia in 2003.
- **2015:** Posted another stellar season, batting .318 with 28 doubles, 19 home runs and 95 RBI in 150 games.
- Won his third Silver Slugger award.
- Was selected to his third All-Star Game and second as a starter...received more than 9.9 million votes.
- Became the Giants' first three-time All-Star catcher since Walker Cooper in 1946-48...the only other Giants catcher with three All-Star nods in a Giants uniform was Harry Danning (1939, 1940, 1941).

- Caught Chris Heston's no-hitter on June 9 at New York-NL...according to *Elias*, he became one of three catchers to catch three no-hitters and win three World Series titles...the other two are Bill Carrigan (1912 to 1916) and Yogi Berra (which includes catching Don Larsen's perfect game in the World Series).
- Hit his 100th career home run September 6 at Colorado off LHP Yohan Flande...joined Tom Haller (107) as the only catchers in Giants franchise history to hit at least 100 home runs.
- **2014:** Finished fourth in the NL in batting average behind COL's Justin Morneau (.319), PIT's Josh Harrison (.315) and Andrew McCutchen (.314).
- Led the Majors with a .348 batting average on the road... Barry Bonds was the last Giants player to pace the big leagues in road batting average when he hit .386 in 2002.
- **2013:** Signed a nine-year contract (eight-year extension) through 2021 with an option for 2022 on March 29...marked the longest contract in Giants history.

- Was listed first on 27 ballots, second on four and third on one of the 32 ballots submitted by two writers representing each league city to score 422 points, based on a tabulation system rewarding 14 points for first place, nine for second, eight for third and on down to one for 10th.
- Became the fifth catcher to win the MVP award, joining Johnny Bench (1970, 1972), Roy Campanella (1951, 1953, 1955), Ernie Lombardi (1938) and Gabby Hartnett (1935).
- At 25 years old, was the youngest player to win an MVP award since Ryne Sandberg in 1984.
- Became the first player since Frank Robinson to win a league MVP award, batting title and World Series in the same season...Robinson accomplished the feat with the Orioles in 1966...five players registered that hat trick prior to Robinson: Dick Groat (1960 Pirates), Mickey Mantle (1956 Yankees), Willie Mays (1954 Giants), Stan Musial (1946 Cardinals) and Joe DiMaggio (1939 Yankees) (*Elias*).
- Posey, Yogi Berra (1951 Yankees) and Roy Campanella (1955 Dodgers) are the only catchers to win a World Series and MVP award in the same season (*Elias*).
- It was the 13th time a Giants player had been honored and the first since Barry Bonds in 2004.
- Joined Willie Mays and Willie McCovey as the only Giants to win Rookie of the Year and a MVP award in franchise history.
- Is one of only three catchers to win Rookie of the Year, MVP and a World Series in their careers, joining Johnny Bench and Thurman Munson...Posey, Willie Mays and Willie McCovey are the only Giants to accomplish that trio of feats.
- Won Rookie of Year Award in 2010 & became the 14th former winner to be elected MVP.
- Became the 18th player to win both the NL batting title and NL MVP in the same season.
- Joined Mays (1954) and Barry Bonds (2002, 2004) as the only Giants players to win a NL batting title and a MVP award.
- Won the NL batting title, leading the league with a .336 average (also led Majors)...became the first catcher to win the NL batting title in 70 years, since Ernie Lombardi did so with the Boston Braves in 1942.
- Joined Lombardi and Eugene Franklin "Bubbles" Hargrave as the only catchers in the league's history to win a batting title.
- Became the first Giant to win the batting crown since Barry Bonds in 2004 (.362) & became the seventh player in Giants franchise history to lead the league in batting average.
- Won title after rule change making the final sentence of Rule 10.22(a) inapplicable to Melky Cabrera, who finished one plate appearance shy of qualifying due to his suspension (the stricken sentence would have allowed Cabrera, because of the size of his lead over his nearest competitor, to win the title though finishing with fewer than the requisite 502 PAs.
- His 103 RBI were the most driven in by a Giant since Jeff Kent had 108 RBI in 2002.
- Only players in Giants franchise history (since 1900) to drive in 100+ runs in a season with their primary position being catcher was Walker Cooper in 1947 (122 RBI) & Dick Dietz in 1970 (107).
- Joined Dick Dietz (22 HRs in 1970) and Tom Haller (26 in 1966) as the only Giants players with 20+ home runs "as a catcher" only since 1958.
- Was named an All-Star for the first time in his career, being named the starting catcher for the NL squad...registered 7,621,370 votes, setting the highest total by an NL player in ML history.
- 2011:** In his second full big league season Posey was limited to 45 games after a devastating injury in May ended his season.
- Was placed on the injured list on May 26 with a fractured bone in his lower left leg...suffered the injury the night before in a collision at home plate with Florida's Scott Cousins, who crashed into Posey as he was trying to block the winning run in the 12th inning...Posey was receiving the throw from right fielder Nate Schierholtz on Emilio Bonifacio's sacrifice fly to medium right field when he had dropped the throw right before Cousins went shoulder-first into him and his left cleat appeared to stick in the infield dirt while the rest of his body was hurled sideways...Giants trainers Dave Groeschner and Mark Gruesbeck helped carry him off the field...the manner in which Cousins hit Posey sparked conversation about rule changes for months.
- Underwent three MRI's - first on his ankle, second on his lower leg & the third on his knee...results showed torn ligaments in his ankle, fractured fibula in his lower left leg & nothing on his knee.
- Underwent successful surgery May 29 to repair torn ligaments in his left ankle...had two screws inserted in his leg in a 90-minute procedure that was performed at a medical facility in Burlingame by team orthopedist Ken Akizuki and Giants podiatry specialist Larry Oloff, along with Michael Dillingham, a former 49ers physician who had extensive experience with traumatic injuries.
- Had successful surgery on July 22 to remove screws from his left ankle.
- Made first career Opening Day roster and became youngest Giants starting catcher at 24 years and four days old since Tom Haller was 23 years and 292 days old when he started for SF in 1961.

- **2010:** Named National League winner of Jackie Robinson Rookie of Year Award, becoming sixth player to earn honor in Giants franchise history.
- Won the ROY Award with 129 points, receiving 20 first-place votes, nine second-place votes and two third-place votes.
- Became the sixth Giant and first in 35 years to win the award, which was established in 1947...joined Willie Mays (1951), Orlando Cepeda (1958), Willie McCovey (1959), Gary Matthews (1973) and John Montefusco (1975).
- Became the sixth NL catcher to be honored Rookie of Year, joining Johnny Bench (1968), Earl Williams (1971), Benito Santiago (1987), Mike Piazza (1993) and Geovanny Soto (2008).
- Became the first Rookie of the Year winner to also become World Series champion in same season since Boston's Dustin Pedroia in 2007...the last NL player to do it was Florida's Dontrelle Willis in 2003.
- With Posey winning ROY, it snapped a 35-year drought for the Giants organization, which had been the longest span without a rookie award for a NL team.
- Joined Texas' Neftali Feliz (AL Rookie of Year) as the third pair of players named ROY in their respective leagues after appearing in that year's World Series...previous pairs were Willie Mays and Gil McDougald in 1951 (Giants and Yankees) and Dave Righetti and Fernando Valenzuela in 1981 (Yankees and Dodgers).
- Named to TOPPS' ML Rookie All-Star team.
- Solidified his status as the Giants' most heralded position playing prospect since Matt Williams in 1987 after batting .305 with 23 doubles, 18 HRs and 67 RBI in 108 games for SF in 2010.
- His .305 batting avg. was third-highest for any player who started at least 50 games at catcher in his rookie season, behind Mike Piazza's .318 clip with Los Angeles-NL in 1993 and Ronny Paulino's .310 mark with Pittsburgh in 2006 (*Elias*).
- Missed the first two months in the big leagues as he was playing for Triple-A Fresno, and wasn't the number one catcher until July 1, 2010.
- In his season debut on May 29 vs. Arizona, had three RBI singles in four at-bats to help the Giants earn a 12-1 victory.
- Earned NL Player of the Week honors from July 5-11, 2010, hitting .556 (15-for-27) with five HRs and 14 RBI.
- Posted a career-best 21-game hitting streak from July 4-28, batting .440 with six HRs and 23 RBI...in his first 10 games of the streak, Posey had 19 hits, six HRs and 13 RBI - no rookie in NL history ever had those numbers for any 10-game stretch.
- His 21-game hit streak marked the second-longest hit streak by a rookie in SF-era history, behind Hall of Famer Willie McCovey's 22-game hit streak in 1959.
- Became the seventh player in SF-era history to have a hit streak of 20-or-more games and his 21-game tied Robby Thompson for the fifth-longest in SF history...also became just the 21st Major League catcher to post a hit streak of 20+ and only the second to accomplish the feat as a rookie, joining Benito Santiago (34-straight games in 1987).
- Was named NL Player of the Month, NL Rookie of the Month and "Major League Baseball's Clutch Performer of the Month", all for July 2010...finished with a NL-leading 43 hits and ranked third with a .417 avg., tied

for third with 24 RBI, fourth with a .466 on-base pct. and fifth in the league with a .699 slugging mark.

- Began the year at Triple-A Fresno to catch more innings and get consistent at-bats...with injuries to Mark DeRosa and Edgar Renteria, a window of opportunity opened for Posey to get at-bats at the Major-League level and he was called up to the big leagues on May 29.
- Played the majority of his games at first base (23 starts at first in 26 games), pushing Aubrey Huff to outfield, however, the trade of Bengie Molina to Texas on July 1 cleared an everyday catching job...at time of trade, Molina was hitting just .257 with a .312 on-base pct. and had been battling a sore left elbow.
- Hit first big league homer off Reds pitcher Aaron Harang at Great American Ball Park June 9.
- Hit his first career grand slam and posted his first multi-homer contest on July 7 at Milwaukee.
- **2009:** One of San Francisco's prized young players, Posey made quick strides in just his two minor league seasons, finishing the year with San Francisco.
- Had his contract purchased from Triple-A Fresno on September 2 and appeared in seven games for the Giants, going 2-for-17 (.118)...made four starts, all at catcher and caught 40.0 innings overall.
- Upon hearing of his call-up to Majors, caught an early flight at dawn out of Las Vegas with teammate Dan Runzler and landed in Philadelphia at 3 p.m. local time Sept. 2...his call-up was somewhat of a surprise, however, with catcher Bengie Molina missing time with a strained upper right quad, the Giants had no choice but to add Posey to the big league roster as an insurance option.
- After hitting a combined .325 with 18 HRs and 80 RBI in his first full season between Class A Advanced San Jose and Triple-A Fresno, Posey finally got his first Major League at-bat on September 11 in a 10-3 loss to the Dodgers in Los Angeles, when he entered the game as a late defensive insertion and struck out in his lone plate appearance against Hiroki Kuroda.
- Collected first ML hit in his third career at-bat on September 19 at Los Angeles-NL, with a bloop single to RF off Jeff Weaver.
- Caught Randy Johnson September 25, 2009 vs. Chicago-NL, which was largest age difference between a pitcher and catcher since Jesse Orosco and Rob Bowen threw together September 27, 2003 (23 years and 309 days)...the age difference between Posey and Johnson was 23 years and 198 days (Sports Features Group).
- Prior to his promotion to the big league club, split year between Class A Advanced San Jose and Triple-A Fresno...began year at SJ, hitting .326 with 23 2Bs, 13 HRs and 58 RBI in 80 contests, helping the Giants win the first half title in the CAL North Division with a 42-28 (.600) record...the Giants later went on to win the California League Championship.
- After earning CAL mid-season All-Star honors, Posey skipped Double-A and made the jump to Triple-A, being promoted July 14.
- Was scheduled to be promoted, however was hit in the head with a pitch by Stockton's Craig Italiano on June 26, and missed five games.

- His biggest contribution came in Game 5 of the Division Series at Cincinnati in which he hit the 54th grand slam in postseason history and the third in Giants history to help SF become the first team in ML history to overcome a 2-0 deficit in the division series...his second career grand slam off Mat Latos put the Giants up 6-0 in the 5th and sparked the Giants dugout.
- Joined Will Clark (Game 1 of 1989 NLCS) and Chuck Hiller (Game 4 of 1962 WS) as only Giants with grand slams in the postseason (Brandon Crawford then hit one in the Wild-Card game at Pittsburgh on October 1, 2014).

2019 IN REVIEW

2019 Year In Review

THE GIANTS: Finished the 2019 season (62nd in San Francisco and 137th overall) with a record of 77-85 (.475), placing third in the National League West and 10th overall in the NL...SF had a four-win improvement from 2018 (73-89, .451)...the Giants have now had three consecutive seasons of sub-.500 records for the first time since 2005-2008 (four-straight seasons of sub-.500 records)...the Giants were not officially eliminated from the postseason until September 20.

READY PLAYER ONE: San Francisco used a league-record 64 different players in 2019...the 64 players used were the most in team history and tied with the 2014 Texas Rangers for the second-most by any team in Major League history...the Seattle Mariners used a MLB-record 67 players in 2019...the previous Giants record for players used in a season was 51 in 1990.

HOME/ROAD: The Giants finished their home slate with a record of 35-46 (.432) while going 42-39 (.519) on the road...only the Marlins (30-51, .370) had a worse home record than the Giants among NL teams...SF's home record matched the 1984 team for the worst in the San Francisco era...in the modern era, only the 1902 New York Giants (22-44) were worse...the Giants won a total of 10 home series...SF's .519 road winning percentage was the fourth-best in the NL behind Atlanta (.580, 47-34), Los Angeles (.580, 47-34) and Washington (.531, 43-38)... San Francisco had an 11-win improvement on the road from last season (31-50, .383)...SF won a total of 12 road series.

BETTER ON THE ROAD THAN AT HOME: The Giants were three games over .500 on the road compared to 11 games under .500 at home...it was just the third season in franchise history with both a winning record on the road and a losing record at home...the only other MLB team in 2019 with a winning road record and losing home record was Boston.

BAND ON THE RUN: SF averaged 5.02 runs/game on the road compared to 3.35 runs/game at home...the 1.67 run difference was the fifth largest by any team in the live ball era (since 1920) according to *Stats, LLC*...the only teams with a larger difference were the 1939 New York Yankees (2.84 difference), 1957 Milwaukee Brewers (1.97), 1935 New York Yankees (1.75) and 1933 Washington Senators (1.68).

ON THE MOUND: Giants pitchers paced the National League in innings pitched (1,469.0), surrendered the fifth-most home runs (227), ranked seventh with a .249 opponents' batting average against and ninth in ERA (4.38)...the pitching staff went 41-for-63 in save opportunities for the seventh-best save percentage (65.1%)... SF's 22 blown saves were tied for the third-fewest in the NL.

WITH THE BATS: The Giants ranked second-to-last in the league in runs per game, averaging 4.19 (Miami was last at 3.80)...SF's team batting average of .239 was the second-worst in the league ahead of only San Diego (.238) and their OPS of .694 was the second-worst ahead of Miami (.673)...the Giants finished 11th in the NL in extra-base hits (493) and 13th in both home runs (167) and walks (475).

WITH THE GLOVES: The Giants finished fourth in the league in fielding percentage (.985) and their 46 defensive runs saved were the ninth-most in MLB, 14 more than they had all of last season...**C Buster Posey** ranked third among all catchers with 14 defensive runs saved while **1B Brandon Belt** (four) and **3B Evan Longoria** (seven) both ranked fifth overall at their positions.

EXTRA-INNING WINS: SF went 13-3 (.813) in extra-inning games, the best extra-inning winning percentage in MLB (Astros were second at .714, 10-4)...it was SF's best extra-inning winning percentage in a season since going 8-1 (.889) in 2002.

THANK YOU FANS: SF drew 2,707,760 fans to Oracle Park, the first time the team drew below 3 million at home since 2009...it was SF's lowest home attendance ever in the 20-year history of Oracle Park and their lowest since 1999 (2,078,399)...SF's total home attendance was still the 11th-highest in MLB.

JUST SCORE FIVE: The Giants were difficult to beat when scoring five-or-more runs in a game, posting a record of 48-11 (.814)...that was the fifth-best record in the NL behind Los Angeles (.867, 78-12), St. Louis (.865, 64-10), Atlanta (.845, 71-13) and Washington (.816, 71-16).

2019 SEASON

GIANTS INJURIES

The Giants had 635 total player days on the injured list in 2019, tied with the Cincinnati Reds for the second-fewest in MLB (Minnesota had the fewest at 620) (*Stats, LLC*).

- **RHP Johnny Cueto** missed 144 games while recovering from Tommy John surgery.
- **OF Steven Duggar** missed 60 games with a lower back strain and a left shoulder AC joint sprain.
- **RHP Trevor Gott** missed 31 games with a right elbow strain and a right forearm strain.
- **IF Evan Longoria** missed 19 games with left foot plantar fasciitis.
- **RHP Reyes Moronta** missed 24 games with a right shoulder strain.
- **C Buster Posey** missed 14 games with concussion symptoms and a right hamstring strain.
- **IF Pablo Sandoval** missed 43 games with a right elbow sprain and right elbow inflammation.
- **LHP Tony Watson** missed 13 games with a left wrist fracture.

COMEBACK KIDS: The Giants made a habit of coming from behind to win ball games, posting 40 come-from-behind victories, the ninth-most in MLB and sixth-best in the NL.

HOLDING LEADS: SF was the best NL team when holding late leads, posting a record of 77-4 (.951) when leading at the end of the 7th inning or later.

CLOSE CALLS: The Giants played 82 games that were decided by just two runs or fewer (46-36 record), the third-most such games of any MLB team behind Cincinnati (89) and Oakland (83).

GIANTS HOMERS: In a season in which 129 players hit at least 20-or-more home runs, the Giants had three such players (**Kevin Pillar**, 21, **Mike Yastrzemski**, 21 and **Evan Longoria**, 20) hit at least 20 homers, the first time since 2006 that the team had at least three players reach the 20-homer mark in the same season...SF hit the fifth-fewest homers in 2019 (167), hitting an NL-low 63 at Oracle Park and 104 on the road (10th in NL).

PINCH ME: The Giants connected on 12 pinch-hit homers, tied with the Diamondbacks for the third-most in MLB (Rockies and Dodgers led the way with 13 each)...the 12 pinch-hit homers were the most by an SF team since 2001 when they hit an SF-era best 14 pinch-hit home runs.

FIRST INNING BLUES: The 1st inning was a problem all season for the Giants as they had the second-worst run differential in MLB (-53) ahead of only Miami (-57).

ON THE MOVE: The Giants made 22 trades from January to September, acquiring a total of 19 players from 13 different teams...the Giants made trades with Arizona, Atlanta, Baltimore, Cincinnati, Chicago-NL, Detroit, Los Angeles-AL, Milwaukee, Minnesota, San Diego, Seattle, St. Louis, Tampa Bay, Toronto and Washington...in addition, the Giants claimed 14 players off waivers.

GIANTS ROOKIES: 23 different rookies appeared with the Giants, with 12 making their MLB debuts: **RHP Shaun Anderson**, **LHP Travis Bergen**, **RHP Sam Coonrod**, **OF Jaylin Davis**, **RHP Enderson Franco**, **IF Zach Green**, **OF Connor Joe**, **LHP Conner Menez**, **RHP Tyler Rogers**, **LHP Sam Selman**, **RHP Logan Webb** and **OF Mike Yastrzemski**.

YOUTH MOVEMENT: Giants rookies combined to hit 28 home runs, the most by an SF club since 1986, when Giants rookies teamed up to hit 30 homers that year.

ALL-STAR DOM: **LHP Will Smith** was the Giants' lone 2019 All-Star representative.

30th Major League Baseball All-Star Game

Tuesday, July 11, 1961 at Candlestick Park (San Francisco, CA)

In just its second year of existence, Candlestick Park—the Majors' first all-concrete stadium—played host to the first of two Major League Baseball All-Star Games played in 1961. Long before the days of the Home Run Derby and All-Star Gala, the game itself provided plenty of excitement, with a quartet of Hall of Famers leading the National League to a come-from-behind, 5-4, victory in 10 innings. Trailing the American League, 4-3, entering the bottom of the 10th, the senior circuit received a single from Hank Aaron, a run-scoring double by Willie Mays, a walk by Orlando Cepeda



and the game-winning single from Roberto Clemente – all off fellow Cooperstown resident Hoyt Wilhelm.

However, those last at-bat heroics were almost not needed, as they became necessitated by one of the more bizarre and memorable moments in All-Star Game history. With the National Leaguers clinging to a 3-2, ninth-inning lead and a runner on third, a gust of wind knocked Giants' pitcher Stu Miller from his set position on the mound, resulting in a balk that allowed the tying run to score.

A capacity crowd of 44,115 filled the 'Stick for a contest that featured four San Francisco Giants (Mays, Cepeda, Miller and Mike McCormick) and a combined 18 players who would later be enshrined in the Hall of Fame.

55th Major League Baseball All-Star Game

Tuesday, July 10, 1984 at Candlestick Park
(San Francisco, CA)

After a 23-year absence, the Major League Baseball All-Star Game returned to the Bay Area with the 1984 Midsummer Classic at Candlestick Park. Proving well worth the wait, 57,756 fans were treated to fifteen future Hall of Famers.

Pitching dominated this contest, with the National League battersmates for the fourth and fifth innings stealing the headlines in a 3-1 senior circuit victory. On the 50th anniversary of the Giants' **Carl Hubbell** striking out five consecutive batters, the duo

of Fernando Valenzuela and Dwight Gooden did "King Carl" one better. Valenzuela fanned all three American League hitters he faced in the fourth inning; then, the youngest player in All-Star Game history—a 19-year-old Gooden—whiffed all three batters in the fifth. Gary Carter, who caught both frames, also broke a 1-1 tie with a solo homer in the second en route to MVP honors.

Oakland's Bill Caudill, making his only All-Star appearance, also posted a perfect inning via strikeout, doing so in his lone frame (seventh). Fittingly, in a game that featured a combined 21 strikeouts, the tight contest ended when Goose Gossage fanned Henderson with a runner on base in the ninth.

78th Major League Baseball All-Star Game

Tuesday, July 10, 2007 at AT&T Park (San Francisco, CA)

The first All-Star Game at AT&T Park lived up to its billing, with the best of baseball turning in a thrilling contest in front of 43,965 fans. Most importantly, the game was San Francisco in all of its essence – beginning with an emotional pre-game tribute to Hall of Famer **Willie Mays**, the greatest Giant of them all.

True to Mays' greatness, the Midsummer Classic featured a little bit of everything – including the first inside-the-park home run in All-Star Game history, hit by Ichiro Suzuki en route to Most Valuable Player honors. In the end, the American League captured a 5-4 victory after withstanding the National League's furious two-out, ninth-inning rally.

Flexing its muscle and speed, the junior circuit jumped out to a 5-2 lead on the strength of three home runs.



The most memorable – and uniquely San Francisco – was Ichiro's two-run shot in the fifth that put the AL ahead 2-1. With a runner on first and one out, the Seattle star drove the first pitch he saw deep to right field – where it hit off the asymmetrical wall and caromed towards the 421-foot sign in right-center. By the time right fielder Ken Griffey, Jr. could relay the ball to the infield, Ichiro had scampered around the bases and set All-Star Game history.

Following Carl Crawford's solo home run in the sixth and Victor Martinez' two-run clout in the eighth, the AL gave a three-run lead to closer J.J. Putz in the ninth. After the first two National League hitters were retired, Dmitri Young singled and Alfonso Soriano hammered a two-run homer of his own to bring the senior circuit within 5-4. Three walks followed to load the bases – including two off new pitcher Francisco Rodriguez – but Rodriguez got Aaron Rowand to fly out and end the game.

Retired Uniform Numbers

In the storied 137-year history of Giants baseball, 12 former players or managers have enjoyed careers worthy of their jersey numbers being retired by the club. Only the New York Yankees (21) have retired more numbers. The 12 Giant greats are honored at Oracle Park with their names and retired uniform numbers displayed atop the Giants dugout and along the left field suite level facade.

Christy Mathewson and John McGraw, who both predated the use of numbers on jerseys, are recognized along with fellow New York Giants Bill Terry (#3), Mel Ott (#4), Carl Hubbell (#11) and Monte Irvin (#20). Willie Mays (#24), who played for the club on both coasts, joins former San Francisco stars Barry Bonds (#25), Juan Marichal (#27), Orlando Cepeda (#30), Gaylord Perry (#36) and Willie McCovey (#44) in this select group.

The Giants also honor Jackie Robinson, whose uniform number (42) was retired throughout Major League Baseball in 1997 to commemorate the 50th anniversary of his arrival in the big leagues.

In 2004, the Giants commemorated two of baseball's greatest broadcasters with disks honoring Russ Hodges and Lon Simmons.

The Giants recognize the following individuals, who have been honored by the National Baseball Hall of Fame for their contributions to the game: Lindsey Nelson (Ford C. Frick Award, 1988), Leonard Koppett (J.G. Taylor Spink Award, 1992), Bob Stevens (J.G. Taylor Spink Award, 1998), Nick Peters (J.G. Taylor Spink Award, 2009) and Jon Miller (Ford C Frick Award, 2010).



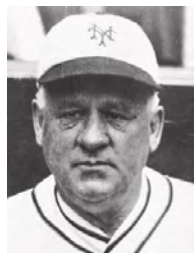

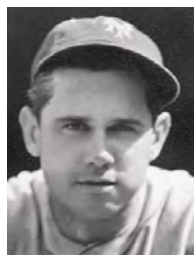

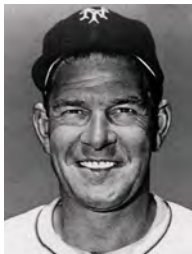

Frick Award recipient during Hall of Fame Weekend 2010.

Giants Wall of Fame

On September 23, 2008, the San Francisco Giants unveiled the team's Wall of Fame, which serves as a living tribute to the organization's greatest players and executives. It recognizes retired players whose records stand highest among their teammates on the basis of longevity and achievements. Those honored have played a minimum of nine seasons for the San Francisco Giants, or five seasons with at least one All-Star selection as a Giant.

53 Giants legends have plaques on the wall in honor of their achievements. Bronze plaques honoring these players and their baseball contributions line the wall of Oracle Park along King Street for all baseball fans to enjoy. As present and future generations of Giants players meet the criteria, plaques celebrating their careers will join the Wall of Fame upon their retirement.

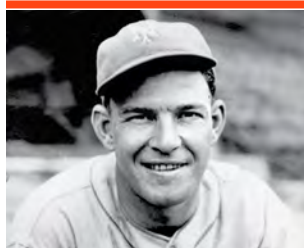

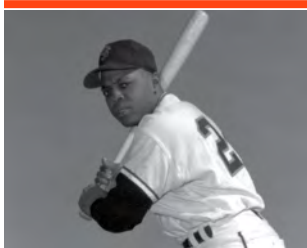

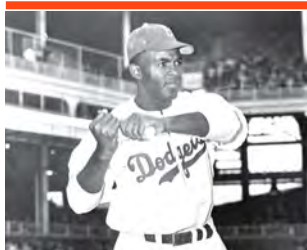

The Giants' 26 postseason appearances (since 1900) are the fourth-most all-time behind the New York Yankees (53), Brooklyn/Los Angeles Dodgers (33), St. Louis Cardinals (29) and Philadelphia/Kansas City/Oakland Athletics (28).

The Giants' eight championships are also the fourth-most in Major League history. Only the Yankees (27), Cardinals (11) Red Sox (9) and Athletics (9) have more.

The Giants are one of four major American professional sports franchise in this century (2000-present) with three titles during a five-year span. The others are the New England Patriots (2001, 2003, 2004, 2015, 2017, 2019), Los Angeles Lakers (2000, 2001, 2002) and San Antonio Spurs (2003, 2005, 2007).

(GIANTS WIN SERIES, 1 GAME TO 0)



The Giants defeated the Pirates, 8-0, in the National League Wild Card game backed by the arm of **Madison Bumgarner** and the bat of **Brandon Crawford**. Bumgarner threw a four-hitter while striking out 10 batters and Crawford hit a grand slam in the 4th inning off Edinson Volquez, sending the Giants from a winner-take-all wild-card game to a National League Division Series matchup with the Washington Nationals.

With the bases loaded in the 4th inning and nobody out in a scoreless game, Crawford turned on Volquez's hanging breaking ball and sent it to right field, landing a few rows deep and giving the Giants a 4-0 lead while silencing a

PNC Park crowd of 40,629. Crawford became the first shortstop to hit a grand slam in postseason history and he joined **Chuck Hiller** (1962 World Series), **Will Clark** (1989 National League Championship Series) and **Buster Posey** (2012 NLDS) as the only Giants to hit a grand slam in postseason play.

Bumgarner, meanwhile, dominated one of the NL's best lineups, walking one and allowing just four singles on 109 pitches, 79 for strikes. Moments after finishing his shut-out, Bumgarner found himself surrounded by teammates in the middle of the diamond celebrating a playoff victory.

2016 – SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS vs. NEW YORK METS

A game billed as a matchup between two of the Majors' most dominant pitchers proved exactly that as Noah Syndergaard and **Madison Bumgarner** matched zeroes for the first 7.0 innings. Syndergaard held the Giants hitless through 5.2 innings until a **Denard Span** single ended the no-hit bid. Bumgarner went the distance, scattering just four hits and two walks to go with six strikeouts.

With Mets closer Jeurys Familia on the mound and the game still locked in a scoreless tie in the top of the 9th, **Brandon Crawford** ripped a double to left-center on one of the few hard-hit balls of the night. Familia struck out

Angel Pagan, then walked **Joe Panik**.

Next up, **Conor Gillaspie**, who crushed a three-run homer that accounted for all the game's runs. Gillaspie became the third player in Major League history whose first career postseason home run was a go-ahead homer in the 9th inning or later in a winner-take-all game.

Meanwhile, Bumgarner became the first pitcher in baseball history with multiple postseason winner-take-all complete game shutouts.

National League Division Series

1997 – SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS vs. FLORIDA MARLINS
(MARLINS WIN SERIES, 3 GAMES TO 0)

San Francisco won its first National League West title since 1989 to become only the fourth team during the 20th century to win its division after finishing in last place the previous season.

The Giants outdueled the Dodgers in a classic pennant race for the N.L. West flag. Perhaps the crowning moment of San Francisco's magical ride came Sept. 18 when catcher **Brian Johnson** led off the 12th inning with a game-winning clout off Los Angeles' Mark Guthrie to put the Giants in a first place tie with nine games remaining.

New General Manager **Brian Sabean** revamped the Giants roster, bringing in 15 players who were not in the organization at the end of the 1996 campaign. He shocked the baseball world by acquiring All-Star pitchers **Wilson Alvarez** and **Roberto Hernandez** and 18-year Major League veteran pitcher **Danny Darwin** from the

Chicago White Sox in exchange for six minor leaguers at the July 31 trading deadline.

The renewed Giants made their first post season appearance in eight years when they faced National League Wild Card entry Florida Marlins in the Division Series. Despite losing all three games of the series, San Francisco gave Florida its toughest test en route to its first World Championship.

Both Games #1 and #2 came down to the last at-bat, with Florida taking advantage of being the home club and posting 2-1 and 7-6 victories, respectively.

Despite two solo home runs by Giants' second baseman **Jeff Kent** in Game #3, the Marlins finished off the sweep on the strength of Devon White's 6th inning grand slam off Alvarez.

2000 – SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS vs. NEW YORK METS
(METS WIN SERIES, 3 GAMES TO 1)

San Francisco won its second National League West title in four years as the club posted a Major League-best 97-65 mark, only to see its October run stopped short by the Wild Card New York Mets, a club that would eventually win the NL flag.

The Giants enjoyed a truly magical regular season, its first in its new jewel of a home, Pacific Bell Park. Playing in front of 81 straight sellouts that accounted for a franchise-record 3,244,320 fans, San Francisco rattled off a 55-26 ledger, matching the Mets for the best home mark in the majors.

Dusty Baker won his third NL Manager of the Year award after guiding his troops to a Major League-best 51-26 record after the All-Star Break, resulting in an 11-game cushion, the Giants' largest winning margin since 1913.

San Francisco produced its most prolific offensive attack in 70 years, led by National League Most Valuable Player **Jeff Kent**. Teammate **Barry Bonds**, who finished second in the MVP voting, clubbed 49 home runs.

The Giants jumped out to a 1-0 lead in the NLDS with a 5-1 victory in front of a raucous Game #1 crowd at Pacific Bell Park. **Livan Hernandez** held New York to one run over 7.2 innings while **Ellis Burks** clubbed a three-run, 3rd-inning homer off the left field foul pole.

J.T. Snow's dramatic three-run, pinch-hit homer in the bottom of the 9th tied Game #2 4-4, but the Mets would rally to win 5-4 in 10 innings and even the series at a game apiece.

Unfortunately for San Francisco, its offense went south when the club went East, as the Giants could manage only two runs in 22 innings at Shea Stadium. New York's Benny Agbayani gave the Mets a 3-2 victory in Game #3 with a 13th inning solo home run, and Bobby Jones hurled a one-hit shutout for a 4-0 win in the Game #4 clincher.

2002 – SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS vs. ATLANTA BRAVES

(GIANTS WIN SERIES, 3 GAMES TO 2)



Following a 3-0 loss at Florida on August 18, a stagnant San Francisco club stood at 66-56, four games behind Los Angeles in the NL Wild Card chase. From then on, the Giants would play like champions, going 29-10 down the stretch to capture the league's fourth playoff spot by three and a half contests over the Dodgers.

Despite a 95-win campaign that tied for the fourth-most victories in San Francisco history, the Giants entered the NLDS as heavy underdogs to the Atlanta Braves, who captured their 11th-consecutive division crown by an astounding 19.0-game margin.

Undaunted by their opponents and buoyed by the right arm of starter **Russ Ortiz**, the Giants stormed into Turner Field and won the series opener by an 8-5 count as **Rich Aurilia**, **Benito Santiago** and **J.T. Snow** all collected two RBI apiece.

Yet, the hope of Game #1 quickly turned into despair, as Atlanta backed the stout pitching of Kevin Millwood and Greg Maddux, respectively, with 17 combined runs in a pair of routs to take a 2-1 series lead.

2003 – SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS vs. FLORIDA MARLINS

(MARLINS WIN SERIES, 3 GAMES TO 1)



For the first time since 1936-37, the Giants earned consecutive appearances in postseason play, as the club won its third National League West title in seven years and became only the second team in franchise history to go wire-to-wire with an overall finish of 100-61.

A flurry of offseason moves brought new faces to San Francisco as the team introduced first year manager **Felipe Alou** and four new starters to the lineup. The revamped club breezed by their opposition, ending their campaign 15.5 games ahead of the Dodgers for the Giants' largest advantage in 91 years.

General Manager **Brian Sabean** garnered Executive of the Year accolades for constructing the team with the third best record in baseball and **Barry Bonds** earned his unprecedented sixth National League Most Valuable Player Award.

Headed into Game #1 of the NLDS rested and primed for success, pitching ace **Jason Schmidt** thrived in the intense atmosphere at SBC Park, tossing a complete-game three-hitter as the Giants blanked the visiting Marlins 2-0.

Facing the prospect of a long winter, San Francisco turned to past playoff hero **Livan Hernandez** to work his magic once again in Game #4 at Pacific Bell Park. The big right-hander responded by hurling 8.1-strong innings, while Aurilia finished 3-for-4 with a homer and four RBI as the Giants won 8-3 to force a return trip to Atlanta.

In the decisive Game #5, **Barry Bonds** exorcised his demons of postseasons past, singling and scoring the Giants' first run in the 2nd and clubbing an opposite-field, solo homer in the 4th that gave SF a 2-0 lead. Ortiz became the first Giants pitcher to win two games in the same post season series since **Carl Hubbell** went 2-0 in the 1933 World Series, yet San Francisco's 3-1 victory was in doubt until the end. With two men on and none out in the 9th, closer **Robb Nen** struck out Gary Sheffield then induced Chipper Jones to ground into a series-ending double play.

A sudden turn of events plagued the Giants in Game #2, as San Francisco saw their 4-1 lead quickly vanish as Gold Glovers made costly miscues and the Marlins escaped SBC Park with a 9-5 win.

Knotted up at 1-1, both teams headed to South Florida, but the Giants' run of bad luck seemed to follow. After taking a 3-2 advantage in the 11th inning of Game #3, SF let the Marlins slip back into the contest after a dropped fly ball by **Jose Cruz, Jr.** allowed the tying run on base. With two out, the bases loaded and a 1-2 count on Ivan Rodriguez, **Tim Worrell's** next pitch was drilled into right field for a game-winning, two-run single.

In Game #4, San Francisco's furious comeback in the 9th fell short as **J.T. Snow** was thrown out at the plate on **Jeffrey Hammonds'** two-out single to left, giving the Marlins a 7-6 victory and ending the Giants' hopes for another playoff run.

2010 – SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS vs. ATLANTA BRAVES

(GIANTS WIN SERIES, 3 GAMES TO 1)



After clinching the 2010 NL West Crown in the final game of the regular season, the Giants entered the NL Division Series at home vs. the Atlanta Braves. In order to get there, Giants' General Manager **Brian Sabean** had built a pitching staff that led the Majors in ERA with a 3.36 figure, while also revamping his offense throughout the season by acquiring difference-making outfielders **Pat Burrell** and **Cody Ross** as well as bringing up eventual 2010 NL Rookie of the Year **Buster Posey** from the minor leagues in late May.

San Francisco made a push for the 2010 NL West title on August 27. Entering that day, SF was 6.0 games back of the San Diego Padres, however the Giants were red hot in the season's final month, posting an 18-8 record, which was the second-best winning percentage in baseball.

The Giants would win the NLDS over the Braves 3-games-to-1 behind their stalwart pitching as all four games in the series were decided by a one-run margin, which marked the first time in postseason history in which every game

was decided by one run. The pitching staff posted a 1.66 ERA as **Tim Lincecum** was dominant in his postseason debut, tossing a two-hit, 14-strikeout shutout during the Giants' 1-0 win in Game #1.

San Francisco lost Game #2 as the Braves' Rick Ankiel hit a splash hit home run in the top of the 11th frame to help Atlanta pull ahead 5-4.

The next two games were won in dramatic fashion as SF rallied past the Braves 3-2 in Game #3, thanks in part to three fielding errors by Atlanta second baseman Brooks Conrad.

Madison Bumgarner came up aces in Game #4 as he held Atlanta to two runs in 6.0 innings in his postseason debut.

However, it was **Cody Ross** who played hero in the clinching game as he homered in the 6th inning to break up Derek Lowe's no-hit bid, while also driving in the go-ahead run in the 7th inning as SF won 3-2 and clinched their first division series since 2002.

2012 – SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS vs. CINCINNATI REDS

(GIANTS WIN SERIES, 3 GAMES TO 2)



The 2012 edition of the Giants won the division title despite crushing injuries and unexpected slumps. All-Star closer **Brian Wilson** was lost for the year after a second Tommy John surgery, **Freddy Sanchez** never returned after battling back and shoulder issues, **Melky Cabrera**, acquired in the offseason, was lost in mid-August after testing positive for testosterone and two-time Cy Young award winner **Tim Lincecum** was having the worst season of his career.

Meanwhile, the Dodgers, with an influx of cash, shook the baseball world with a nine player trade with the Red Sox, centered around slugger Adrian Gonzalez going back to the West Coast.

However, All-Star catcher and 2012 MVP **Buster Posey**, along with mid-season acquisitions **Marco Scutaro** and **Hunter Pence**, ignited the Giants and after trailing the Dodgers by 7.5 games as late as May 28, they slowly chipped away and ended up winning the West by a whopping 8.0 games, their second division title in the last three seasons.

Their first round opponent in the playoffs, the Cincinnati Reds, led by Joey Votto and Brandon Phillips, stormed

into San Francisco and took the first two games from the Giants, winning by scores of 5-2 and 9-0. Facing the daunting task of being down 2-0 in the best-of-five division series, the Giants now had to win three consecutive games on the road, something that had never been accomplished in baseball postseason history.

With all the local and national media counting the Giants out, Pence stood up and fired up his teammates with a football-like huddle and rallying speech in the dugout prior to Game #3, a game in which SF won 2-1, avoiding a sweep.

In Game #4, **Angel Pagan** hit the first leadoff home run in Giants' postseason history, and **Gregor Blanco** and **Pablo Sandoval** connected later for an 8-3 victory that evened the series at 2-2.

Not just any comeback would get SF back to playing for a pennant. It would take one of Giant proportions and Posey helped make it happen as he hit the third grand slam in Giants' postseason history and San Francisco pulled off an unprecedented revival, moving to the LCS with a 6-4 victory over the Reds in the deciding Game #5.

2014 – SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS VS. WASHINGTON NATIONALS

(GIANTS WIN SERIES, 3 GAMES TO 1)



San Francisco defeated the heavily favored Washington Nationals, three-games-to-one in the National League Division Series.

Jake Peavy pitched no-hit ball for 4.0 innings and didn't allow a run in his 5.2-inning outing in Game #1. **Hunter Strickland** bailed Peavy out of a bases-loaded jam in the 6th by striking out Ian Desmond. Bryce Harper and Asdrubal Cabrera each hit solo homers off Strickland in the 7th as the Nationals cut a 3-0 deficit to 3-2. **Sergio Romo** worked out of a jam in the 8th and **Santiago Casilla** retired all three hitters in the 9th for the save.

What became the longest-ever postseason game in terms of time (6:23) and tied for the longest in terms of innings had seemed headed for a conclusion in the 9th in Game #2. Washington's Jordan Zimmermann had a 1-0 lead, was working on a three-hitter and had retired 20 consecutive batters before walking **Joe Panik** with two outs in the final frame. Manager Matt Williams then brought in Drew Storen to face **Buster Posey**, who hit a first-pitch single, and then **Pablo Sandoval** tied the game by slicing a double into the left-field corner to bring home Panik. The Nats' relay was just in time to cut down Posey at the plate. The game soon spun into extra innings. **Yusmeiro Petit** threw 6.0-shutout innings, during which he allowed one

hit and struck out seven. Leading off the 18th, **Brandon Belt** drove a Tanner Roark pitch over the right-field wall to put the Giants in front. Strickland preserved the edge in the bottom of the inning to pick up the save.

The Giants' 10-game postseason winning streak ended with an error in Game #3. **Madison Bumgarner** and Doug Fister were locked in a scoreless matchup in the 7th before the San Francisco ace inaccurately threw to 3rd after fielding Wilson Ramos' sacrifice bunt. Two runs scored on the errant throw.

A bases-loaded walk to **Gregor Blanco** and an RBI groundout by Panik gave the Giants a 2-0 lead in the second inning of Game #4. **Hunter Pence** made one of the Giants' top defensive plays of the postseason in the 6th when he banged into the right-field wall as he tracked down Jayson Werth's drive. However, Bryce Harper homered off Strickland in the following inning to tie the game at 2-2. The Giants regained the lead for good in the bottom of the inning on Aaron Barrett's wild pitch on which Panik came home. With two outs and the bases empty in the 9th, Casilla walked Harper before getting Wilson Ramos on a grounder to Panik at second. The Giants soon would spray champagne and prepare to meet the Cardinals in the NLCS.

The heavily favored Cubs defeated the Giants three-games-to-one in the best-of-five division series. Jon Lester outduelled **Johnny Cueto** in Game #1, a 1-0 Giants loss. Both Lester and Cueto logged 8.0 innings each, with the difference, a solo home run off the bat of Javier Baez in the 8th inning off Cueto making the Cubs Game #1 winners.

Game #2 pitted **Jeff Samardzija** against Kyle Hendricks and both starters lasted less than four innings, with Hendricks being removed due to injury and Samardzija getting roughed up for four runs on six hits in just 2.0 innings of work. Cubs relief pitcher Travis Wood homered off **George Kontos** and the Giants could not overcome an early 4-0 deficit as they dropped a 5-2 decision to go down 0-2 in the series.

The Giants needed a win in Game #3 or they would find themselves packing their bags for the offseason. It took 13.0 innings, but the Giants outlasted the Cubs by a 6-5

score to get into the win column. The Giants rallied for three runs off LHP Aroldis Chapman in the 8th to go ahead 5-3, then the Cubs stormed back to tie the score at 5-5 in the 9th. Four innings later, **Brandon Crawford** led off the 13th with a double and **Joe Panik** followed with a double off the right field wall, giving San Francisco the walk-off win.

Game #4 will leave a sour taste in Giants' fans mouths for a while as the team led 5-2 in the 9th and were just three outs away from pushing the series back to Chicago for a deciding fifth and final game. However, the Giants' bullpen, a problem for SF the latter part of the season, unraveled by giving up four runs on four hits and an error in the final frame to allow the Cubs to take a 6-5 victory.

Giants starter **Matt Moore** had one of his best starts of the year, allowing just two runs on two hits with 10 strikeouts in 8.0 innings of work.

National League Championship Series

1971 – SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS vs. PITTSBURGH PIRATES (PIRATES WIN SERIES, 3 GAMES TO 1)



After winning its first National League West crown, San Francisco entered the National League Championship Series as the favorite against Eastern Division titlists Pittsburgh. The Giants had posted nine wins in 12 contests vs. the Pirates during the regular season.

However, the Giants ran into the hot hitting of Pirates' first baseman Bob Robertson, who clubbed four home runs to lead Pittsburgh to a three games-to-one series victory.

Since staff ace **Juan Marichal** pitched San Francisco to the NL West flag in its season finale at San Diego, future Hall of Famer **Gaylord Perry** got the call in Game #1. The right-hander scattered four runs (three earned) and nine hits over his complete game effort as **Willie McCovey** and **Tito Fuentes** each delivered two-run home runs in the fourth inning to power SF to a 5-4 victory.

Then Robertson took over. He clubbed a NLCS record three home runs in Game #2 to lead the Pirates to a 9-4 triumph. The first baseman finished 4-for-4 with four runs scored and five RBI as Pittsburgh's victory ended a six-game losing streak at Candlestick Park.

Marichal pitched a four-hitter when the playoffs shifted to Three Rivers Stadium for Game #3, but home runs by Robertson and Richie Hebner gave the Pirates a 2-1 victory behind Bob Johnson and Dave Guisti. The Bucs advanced to the World Series when they tattooed Perry for seven runs and 10 hits over 5.2 innings in the fourth and final game of the series.

1987 – SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS vs. ST. LOUIS CARDINALS

(CARDINALS WIN SERIES, 4 GAMES TO 3)



The Giants became only the fourth team in Major League history since 1900 to finish first within two years of a 100-loss disaster. SF rattled off a 90-72 mark to win the 1987 National League West crown after going 62-100 in 1985.

San Francisco battled back from a five-game deficit on Aug. 7 and went 37-17 the rest of the way to capture its first NL West title in 16 years.

Jeffrey Leonard, whose “one-flap-down” home run trot was the story of the series, became the first player on a losing team to capture the NLCS MVP honor when he hit .417 with four home runs and five RBI despite the Giants falling to the Cardinals in seven games. San Francisco split the first two games of the series in St. Louis, with **Dave Dravecky**, who was acquired from the San Diego

Padres in a seven-player deal on July 4, shutting out the Cardinals on two hits in Game #2. When the series moved to Candlestick Park, the Giants took a 4-0, fifth-inning advantage in Game #3 but the Cardinals roared back to post a 6-5 victory and take a 2-1 lead in the series.

Leonard responded by crushing a two-run clout in the fifth inning of the fourth game to push San Francisco to a series-evening 4-2 triumph. His four homers in four games tied the Championship Series record for a league playoff of any duration.

The Giants took a three games-to-two series advantage back to St. Louis after posting a 6-3 victory in the fifth contest. However, San Francisco didn't score a run in either of the last two games.

1989 – SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS vs. CHICAGO CUBS

(GIANTS WIN SERIES, 4 GAMES TO 1)



Will Clark carried the Giants to their first NL pennant in 27 years when San Francisco defeated the Chicago Cubs in five games.

Clark provided offensive bookends in the series, starting with six RBI in the opener and ending with a two-out, bases-loaded, series-winning two-run single in the eighth inning of Game #5. “Will the Thrill” established new NLCS standards for average (.650), hits (13), runs (eight), total bases (24) and slugging percentage (1.200).

Included in those opening-game six RBI for Clark was his fourth-inning grand slam off Cubs' starter Greg Maddux, which gave San Francisco an 8-3 lead. The Giants' first baseman finished the contest 4-for-4 with four runs scored, a double and two home runs.

The Cubs claimed victory in Game #2, so the series

headed to San Francisco tied a game apiece. However, **Robby Thompson** clubbed a two-run, 7th-inning homer off Les Lancaster to give the Giants a 5-4 victory in the third game.

In one of the most intense at-bats in Giants' postseason history in Game #4, **Matt Williams** locked up with lefty Steve Wilson in a 12-pitch plate appearance that resulted in a two-run blast which propelled San Francisco to a 6-4 victory.

As broadcaster Hank Greenwald said, “27 years of waiting have come to an end” when the Giants posted a 3-2 come-from-behind victory in Game #5. Clark once again delivered the game-winner, a two-run single up the spine of the infield off Mitch “Wild Thing” Williams.

2002 – SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS vs. ST. LOUIS CARDINALS

(GIANTS WIN SERIES, 4 GAMES TO 1)



Following a furious late-season run to capture the Wild Card berth and a stirring five-game NLDS victory over Atlanta, the Giants provided the only truly fitting encore—they won the club's first NL pennant in 13 years by defeating the St. Louis Cardinals in a scintillating and highly competitive five-contest NLCS.

San Francisco began its run to the Fall Classic by winning each of the first two contests in St. Louis. The Giants pounded Cardinals ace Matt Morris early and often en route to a 9-6 victory in Game #1, while **Jason Schmidt** turned in a dominating Game #2 performance. The right-hander struck out eight and carried a shutout into the eighth inning, while **Rich Aurilia's** two-homer, three-RBI effort spurred a 4-1 triumph.

Despite **Barry Bonds'** dramatic three-run, fifth-inning homer into McCovey Cove that briefly tied Game #3 at Pacific Bell Park, a solo clout by St. Louis' Eli Marrero and stingy pitching by the Cardinal bullpen gave the visitors a 5-4 win and renewed hope.

St. Louis jumped out to a 2-0, 1st-inning lead in Game #4 and appeared on its way to evening the series until a pair

of Giants veterans turned the tide. In the 6th, **J.T. Snow** delivered a two-out, two-run double that knotted the contest. Following a two-out intentional walk to Bonds in the eighth, **Benito Santiago** cemented his series MVP honors by clubbing a full-count offering from Rick White into the left field bleachers for a 4-2 lead. **Robb Nen** struck out the final two hitters in the 9th to strand the tying run at third and close out a 4-3 SF victory.

Giants' lefty **Kirk Rueter** and Morris engaged in a classic October pitchers' duel in a Game #5 that was scoreless until St. Louis broke through with a run in the 7th. Bonds tied the contest 1-1 with an eighth-inning sacrifice fly, thus setting the stage for one of the most dramatic moments in San Francisco history.

Morris retired the first two Giants hitters in the bottom of the 9th inning, but was chased by consecutive singles from **David Bell** and **Shawon Dunston**. St. Louis turned to reliever Steve Kline, and **Kenny Lofton** greeted the southpaw by lining his first pitch into right-center field for a single that scored a sliding Bell as the jubilant NL champion Giants poured onto the field.

2010 – SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS vs. PHILADELPHIA PHILLIES

(GIANTS WIN SERIES, 4 GAMES TO 2)



The Giants again relied upon the strength of their pitching in the League Championship Series as they went on to win the best-of-seven LCS from the Phillies to clinch their 18th National League Pennant and fourth while in San Francisco.

Tim Lincecum outdueled Roy Halladay in Game #1 as **Cody Ross** hit a pair of solo home runs off of the eventual 2010 NL Cy Young award winner to help the Giants defeat the Phillies 4-3 in the opener.

Game #2 did not go as scripted for San Francisco as the Phillies' Roy Oswalt allowed just one run in 8.0 innings and Jimmy Rollins drove in four runs as the Phillies won 6-1. Ross was the lone bright spot for Giants' offense as he connected for his third home run of the series, which tied the game at one apiece in the 5th inning.

San Francisco grabbed a 2-1 edge in Game #3 with a 3-0 shutout behind **Matt Cain**, who stymied the Phillies in 7.0 innings, allowing just two hits. The Giants scored in the 4th as once again it was Ross who delivered a run-scoring single, which helped cement his status as the NLCS MVP.

Juan Uribe delivered a walk-off sacrifice fly off Roy Oswalt with one out in the 9th inning as SF took Game #4 by a 6-5 count. **Buster Posey** also contributed offensively

going 4-for-4 and becoming the first rookie in the San Francisco era and second in club history to record four hits in a postseason game.

The Giants entered Game #5 just one win away from clinching their 18th NL Pennant and had their ace on the mound with Lincecum. However, the Phillies countered with Roy Halladay, who was pitching with an injured right groin. The injury did not deter him as the Phillies won 4-2, which sent the series back to Philadelphia.

Early during Game #6 it appeared as if the series would go to seven games, as Giants' starter **Jonathan Sanchez** worked just 2.0 innings, allowing a pair of runs. However, the bullpen was stellar, combining for 7.0-scoreless innings to keep the Giants in the game. **Juan Uribe** hit an opposite-field home run that barely cleared the right-field wall in the 8th inning, sending the Giants' dugout into a frenzy. **Brian Wilson** was called upon after Lincecum, and, allowed consecutive one-out singles in the 8th. Wilson got Carlos Ruiz to lineout into a double-play to escape the frame. The Giants' closer then made things interesting in the 9th, issuing walks to Jimmy Rollins and Chase Utley, before striking out Ryan Howard looking to end the game.

2012 – SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS vs. ST. LOUIS CARDINALS

(GIANTS WIN SERIES, 4 GAMES TO 3)



After a historic win over the Cincinnati Reds in the Division Series, the Giants faced the St. Louis Cardinals in the League Championship Series for the third time in postseason history. It marked the first time in LCS history that the previous two World Series winners had met.

The clubs split the first two games in San Francisco, with Carlos Beltran and David Freese each hitting two-run home runs to lift the Cardinals to a 6-4 victory in Game #1. In Game #2, **Marco Scutaro** hit a two-run single in San Francisco's four run 4th inning before leaving with a hip injury and the Giants received their first home win in the postseason, with a 7-1 victory to even the LCS at one game apiece.

The series shifted to St. Louis and the Cards took advantage of the home field as Matt Carpenter hit a two-run home run after subbing for Beltran, and the Cardinals chased **Matt Cain** before a three and a half hour rain delay in the 7th inning of a 3-1 Red Bird Game #3 win.

The Giants were routed 8-3 in Game #4. Adam Wainwright threw 7.0 innings of four-hit ball and St. Louis' offense roughed up **Tim Lincecum** and the Giants' bullpen.

Facing elimination for the fourth time in the 2012 postseason, the Giants' sent **Barry Zito** to the mound in Game #5 and the soft-tossing lefty was at his best, pitching San Francisco back into the series with a 5-0 win that nar-

rowed SF's deficit to 3-2. Zito resembled the same guy who won the 2002 AL Cy Young Award with the A's, as he retired 11 consecutive batters in one stretch while striking out six in 7.2 innings.

Back in San Francisco for a Game #6, the Giants chased opposing starter Chris Carpenter to an early exit in their 6-1 victory that forced the series to a decisive Game #7. **Ryan Vogelsong** finished with nine strikeouts, a career-high for any game.

Hunter Pence got the Giants going with a weird double, Cain pitched his second clincher of the postseason and the Giants closed out Game #7 of the LCS in a rainstorm, routing the Cardinals 9-0 to advance to the World Series for the 19th time in franchise history, the fifth time since moving to San Francisco and for the second time in the last three seasons.

San Francisco won its record-tying sixth elimination game of the postseason, completing a lopsided rally from a 3-1 deficit. Scutaro recorded his sixth multi-hit game of the series and matched an LCS record with 14 hits and **Pablo Sandoval** drove in a run for his fifth straight game. After falling behind in the series 3-games-to-1, the Giants outscored the Cardinals 20-1 over the final three games behind stellar pitching performances from Zito, Vogelsong and Cain.

2014 – SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS VS. ST. LOUIS CARDINALS

(GIANTS WIN SERIES, 4 GAMES TO 1)



The underdog Giants beat the Cardinals four-games-to-one in the National League Championship Series.

In Game #1, **Madison Bumgarner** (named the NLCS MVP) threw 7.2 innings, extending his road postseason scoreless streak to a major-league-record 26.2 innings. He allowed four hits, struck out seven and walked one. **Sergio Romo** and **Santiago Casilla** retired the final four St. Louis hitters in order.

Game #2 was one of the Giants' best postseason games in 2014. St. Louis led 2-0 before the Giants scored single runs in the 5th, 6th and 7th innings to go in front 3-2. Cardinals rookie Oscar Taveras hit a pinch-hit homer off **Jean Machi** in the bottom of the 7th to tie the game. In the following frame, Matt Adams homered off **Hunter Strickland** to make it 4-3, Cardinals. With men at first and second and two outs in the 9th, Trevor Rosenthal uncorked a wild pitch on a 3-2 delivery to **Joe Panik**. Going on the pitch, pinch-runner **Matt Duffy** motored home for a 4-4 game. The tie didn't last 9th inning by hitting an 0-1 pitch from Romo into the right field seats, giving the Cardinals a 5-4 win.

The Giants won Game #3, 5-4 in 10 innings. **Tim Hudson** had a 4-0 lead before the Cardinals would whittle the margin to 4-3 and tie the game on Hudson's final pitch. **Brandon Crawford** opened the bottom of the 10th inning by drawing a walk from lefty Randy Choate. **Juan Perez** then lined a single to left before **Gregor Blanco** followed by dropping down a bunt between the mound and the

third-base line. Choate grabbed it and made an errant throw to first base allowing Crawford to score the winning run.

After St. Louis built a 4-1 lead in the 3rd off **Ryan Vogelsong** in Game #4, the Giants answered with two in the bottom of the inning, getting two-out RBI singles from **Buster Posey** and **Hunter Pence**. **Yusmeiro Petit** blanked the Cardinals over the next three innings to pick up the win.

Game #5 was perhaps one of the most memorable postseason games in Giants history. Panik put SF up 2-1 in the 3rd inning after hitting a two-run homer off Adam Wainwright. However, Matt Adams and Tony Cruz hit solo HRs off Bumgarner in the 4th, giving the Cards a 3-2 lead. Bumgarner did not allow a baserunner after Cruz's homer, setting down the final 13 men he faced. Wainwright had retired 10 straight through the 7th, but Pat Neshek replaced him to begin the 8th. Pinch-hitter **Michael Morse** greeted Neshek with a drive over the wall in left to tie the game and send the AT&T Park crowd into a frenzy. The Cardinals sent Michael Wacha to the mound in the 9th. **Pablo Sandoval** opened the inning with a single, and **Joaquin Arias** pinch-ran for him. With one out, Wacha lost all contact with the strike zone, throwing four consecutive balls to **Brandon Belt** and falling behind **Travis Ishikawa** 2-0. Ishikawa proceeded to etch his name next to **Bobby Thomson's** for hitting a home run that propelled the Giants to the World Series.

World Series

1905 – NEW YORK GIANTS vs. PHILADELPHIA ATHLETICS
(GIANTS WIN SERIES, 4 GAMES TO 1)

The Fall Classic returned after a year's hiatus and Hall of Famer **Christy Mathewson** made it his showcase, leading the Giants to their first World Championship with three shutout victories.

The 25-year-old right-hander, who had 32 victories in 1905 to register his third straight 30-win season, shut down the Philadelphia Athletics in New York's five-game victory. In the space of six days, he pitched three shutouts and permitted just 14 hits overall.

Mathewson even played a part in the Giants' offense during a 3-0 Game #1 victory in Philadelphia. He ignited a two-run rally in the fifth inning to break open a scoreless contest, then went on to shut out the Athletics on four hits.

New York skipper **John McGraw**, who boycotted the 1904 World Series vs. the Boston Red Sox, didn't have to rely solely on Mathewson to get him the title. He also had **Red**

Ames and **Joe McGinnity**, who won 22 and 21 games during the regular season, respectively, in his rotation.

Those two hurlers worked in Game #2, but McGinnity was ticketed with the defeat after surrendering three unearned runs in a 3-0 defeat.

Mathewson was staked to a 2-0, 1st inning lead in Game #3 and responded by blanking Philadelphia on four hits. First baseman **Dan McGann** was the Giants' big gun in the 9-0 romp, collecting two singles and a double while driving in four runs.

McGinnity rebounded from his Game #2 defeat to shut out Eddie Plank and Philadelphia in a classic 1-0 pitchers' duel in Game #4.

But it was Mathewson who got to finish off the job he started when he blanked the Athletics 2-0 in the fifth and deciding game.

1911 – NEW YORK GIANTS vs. PHILADELPHIA ATHLETICS
(ATHLETICS WIN SERIES, 4 GAMES TO 2)

The "running" Giants, who established a league record with 347 stolen bases, persevered through the rebuilding of the Polo Grounds and posted 99 victories to capture the National League pennant. New York had to play its home games through early June at the park of the American League's New York Highlanders (later the Yankees) after the Polo Grounds burned to the ground in April.

However, New York's offense was limited to only four stolen bases in its six-game World Series defeat to the Philadelphia Athletics.

1905 Series hero **Christy Mathewson** still anchored **John McGraw's** pitching staff, going 26-13 during the regular season. The Hall of Famer got New York off to a great start vs. Philadelphia in Game #1 of the Fall Classic, tossing a six-hitter in the 2-1 triumph.

The Athletics rebounded to take Games #2 and #3 with Frank "Home Run" Baker clubbing dramatic home runs in both outings.

Then the rains came. The World Series was put on hold for six days due to Mother Nature.

When the Fall Classic resumed exactly a week after Game #3 had been played, Mathewson was outdueled by Chief Bender in a 4-2 decision that gave the Athletics a three-games-to-one advantage.

The Giants escaped the inevitable in Game #5 by scoring a 4-3 triumph in 10 innings before getting clobbered 13-2 in the series' sixth and final game.

1912 – NEW YORK GIANTS vs. BOSTON RED SOX

(RED SOX WIN SERIES, 4 GAMES TO 3 - 1 TIE)



The Giants, bolstered by lefty **Rube Marquard's** modern Major League record 19-game winning streak, lived a storybook 1912 campaign. That's until the 10th inning of the final game of the World Series, when usually-reliable center fielder **Fred Snodgrass** dropped a fly ball that opened the door for a two-run Boston rally that gave the Red Sox the title.

New York, which featured two 20-game winners in Marquard (26) and **Christy Mathewson** (23), posted 103 victories during the regular season and coasted to the pennant with a ten-game cushion.

Newcomer **Jeff Tesreau**, who won 17 games for the Giants, got the nod in Game #1 but suffered a 4-3 defeat to the Red Sox.

Despite a see-saw contest that saw four lead changes, Game #2 was a wash as it was called due to darkness, thus making the 1912 World Series an eight-game affair.

The Giants evened the score in Game #3, posting a 2-1 victory behind Marquard before the Red Sox got the better of Tesreau again in the fourth contest, this time by a 3-1 count.

Trailing two-games-to-one, the Giants posted 5-2 and 11-4 wins, respectively, in Games #6 and #7.

The Series came down to the 10th inning of the eighth and final game, as the Giants and Red Sox were deadlocked at 1-1 after nine innings. New York took a 2-1 lead in the top half of the 10th before the wheels fell off in the bottom half. Boston pinch hitter Clyde Engle opened the frame with a routine fly ball that Snodgrass was camped under and then dropped.

Boston eventually won the game 3-2 on a sacrifice fly in the 10th and ruined New York's magical season.

1913 – NEW YORK GIANTS vs. PHILADELPHIA ATHLETICS

(ATHLETICS WIN SERIES, 4 GAMES TO 1)



New York won its third straight National League flag, but couldn't get over the hump in the World Series for the third consecutive year, falling four-games-to-one to the Philadelphia Athletics.

After winning the pennant with a twelve-game cushion, the Giants were beset by injuries during the Fall Classic. First baseman **Fred Merkle** was limited to 13 at-bats due to a bad leg. Center fielder **Fred Snodgrass** played in only two games and made three trips to the plate after suffering from a severe charley horse. **Chief Meyers**, the Giants' catcher, was shelved for the Series after suffering a fractured finger in practice preceding Game #2.

The Athletics jumped out to a 1-0 series advantage after shelling **Rube Marquard** for five runs and eight hits in five innings for a 6-4 victory in the opener.

Once again, **Christy Mathewson** provided New York with a fine postseason performance when he tossed a 3-0, 10-inning shutout in Game #2. He even drove in the game-winning run with his single in the 10th.

That was last highlight for the Giants as the Athletics rolled to the World Championship by posting victories in each of the last three contests.

Mathewson, pitching in what would be his final World Series, wound up with a 5-5 lifetime mark in the Fall Classic—he was 4-0 at one point—after splitting two decisions in 1913.

Skipper **John McGraw** was determined to restore his club to World Series glory. However, it would be another four years until the Giants would take the field again in the championship series.

1917 – NEW YORK GIANTS vs. CHICAGO WHITE SOX

(WHITE SOX WIN SERIES, 4 GAMES TO 2)



The Giants' run of bad luck continued in their fourth straight World Series defeat as they fell to the Chicago White Sox in six games.

In the sixth and deciding game, New York was in a scoreless deadlock with Chicago heading into the fourth inning. That's when the Giants' penchant for mistakes at inopportune times reared its ugly head once again. This time, Chicago second baseman Eddie Collins led off the frame with a grounder to New York third baseman **Heinie Zimmerman**, who made a two-base throwing error on the play. Joe Jackson's ensuing fly ball was dropped by right fielder **Dave Robertson**, positioning White Sox at the corners.

Chicago center fielder Happy Felsch then grounded back to the pitcher, **Rube Benton**, who saw Collins break from third and threw to Zimmerman in an attempt to get Collins

hung up. Zimmerman ran Collins toward the plate, but the runner bounded past catcher **Bill Rariden** to make it a Zimmerman-Collins race to the plate. The White Sox second baseman won the footrace and distracted the Giants' defense enough to allow the baserunners to advance to second and third. Both Chicago runners would score on an ensuing base hit. That's all the White Sox would need to salt away the World Championship as they went on to win Game #6 by a 4-2 count.

Famed Olympian and footballer **Jim Thorpe** was on the 1917 Giants' club, but made only one "appearance" during the World Series in Game #5. He was slated to start in right field, but never took the field. The right-handed hitting Thorpe was removed for a left-handed pinch hitter after the White Sox lifted lefty hurler Reb Russell in favor of right-hander Eddie Cicotte.

1921 – NEW YORK GIANTS vs. NEW YORK YANKEES

(GIANTS WIN SERIES, 5 GAMES TO 3)



The Giants snapped a four-World Series losing streak when they outdueled the rival Yankees in a thrilling eight-game series. With both clubs playing their home contests at the Polo Grounds, it was the first Fall Classic to be played in its entirety at one stadium.

The National League champions were headlined by third baseman **Frankie Frisch**, right fielder **Ross Youngs**, first baseman **George Kelly** and left fielder **Irish Meusel**, while Babe Ruth and his 59 home runs were the sparkplug for the Yankees.

The American Leaguers jumped out to a two games-to-none lead after posting consecutive 3-0 victories. The Giants battled back from a 2-0, 2nd inning deficit in Game

#3 to post a 13-5 victory. **John McGraw's** club knotted the Fall Classic at two games apiece when it logged a 4-2 triumph in the fourth game, despite Ruth's first World Series home run.

Ruth, hobbled by knee and arm ailments, spirited the Yankees to a 3-1 victory in Game #5 when he started the go-ahead rally with a bunt base hit.

However, the Bambino couldn't continue and the Giants took advantage of the situation to run off three straight victories and give the franchise its first World Championship since 1905. **Art Nehf** got the National Leaguers over the top with his four-hit, 1-0 victory in Game #8.

1922 – NEW YORK GIANTS vs. NEW YORK YANKEES

(GIANTS WIN SERIES, 4 GAMES TO 0 - 1 TIE)



The Giants, playing the second of four consecutive World Series, earned their berth by taking the National League pennant with a seven-game cushion.

John McGraw's club brought home its second straight title after defeating its fellow Polo Grounds tenants, the Yankees, in a four-victory sweep that actually took five games to complete due to a tie.

Third baseman **Heinie Groh**, who was acquired from Cincinnati the previous winter, led the Giants to a 3-2 triumph in the opener after logging a 3-for-3 showing. The National League entrant had been shut out by Joe Bush through seven innings, before it stormed back from a two-run deficit on **Irish Meusel's** two-run single and **Ross Youngs'** sacrifice fly.

Meusel got back in the act quickly in Game #2, drilling a three-run home run off Bob Shawkey in the 1st inning.

However, the Yankees battled back to tie the contest at 3-3 and it was inexplicably called because of "darkness" after the 10th inning by umpire **George Hildebrand**, despite at least a half-hour of daylight remaining.

Jack Scott, who went 8-2 in just 17 games for the Giants, tossed a four-hitter at the Yankees in Game #3 and led the National Leaguers to a 3-0 victory.

The Giants managed to post 4-3 and 5-3 victories in the fourth and fifth games, respectively, to advance to their second straight title. It also helped that the Giants' pitchers shut down Babe Ruth over the final three outings, holding him 0-for-9.

The 1922 World Championship would prove to be the third and final one in the illustrious career of the Giants' winningest skipper, John McGraw.

1923 – NEW YORK GIANTS vs. NEW YORK YANKEES

(YANKEES WIN SERIES, 4 GAMES TO 2)



It was an all-New York World Series for the third straight year, but there were a few changes. First, the Yankees moved into their own ballpark, Yankee Stadium. Entrant and most importantly, the American League entrant ended the Giants' two-year reign as World Champions.

The man who proved to be a thorn in the side of the Yankees was a Giants' outfielder who would later become synonymous with the club from the Bronx—**Casey Stengel**.

The 34-year-old outfielder christened World Series play in Yankee Stadium when he lined a ninth inning Joe Bush offering into left-center field that got between the outfielders for an inside-the-park home run, breaking a 4-4 draw and giving the Giants a 5-4 triumph in Game #1.

The Yankees, who had not defeated the Giants in their last nine World Series meetings (eight defeats, one tie), finally broke through in Game #2 when Babe Ruth clubbed two home runs in the 4-2 victory.

When the Series returned to Yankee Stadium for Game #3, Stengel shared the stage with pitcher **Art Nehf**. The outfielder broke open a scoreless duel with a home run into the right field stands. Nehf finished off the American Leaguers after allowing five singles and a double in the 1-0 win.

That was all she wrote for the Giants as the Yankees rattled off three consecutive victories to win their first World Championship. The American Leaguers coasted to 8-4 and 8-1 victories in Games #4 and #5, respectively.

In the sixth and final contest, Ruth got the Yanks off to a great start with his first inning, upper deck blast. But the A.L. entrant would need a five-run 8th inning to post the 6-4 decider.

1924 – NEW YORK GIANTS vs. WASHINGTON SENATORS

(SENATORS WIN SERIES, 4 GAMES TO 3)



The Giants made their fourth straight appearance in the Fall Classic, but they faced someone other than the Yankees for the first time during that span when they squared off with the Washington Senators.

New York was the National League representative in the World Series for the eighth time in 14 years, but it had to scramble to win the flag by one-and-a-half games over Brooklyn.

With the World Series tied at three games apiece, honored legacies of Merkle, Snodgrass and Zimmerman returned to longtime Giants' fans. Despite making three errors in the final contest, New York was done in twice by the infield at Washington's Griffith Stadium.

New York took a 3-1 advantage into the 8th inning of that final contest. With two outs and the bases-loaded, Senators' second baseman/manager Bucky Harris hit a

grounder that skipped over the head of 18-year-old third baseman **Freddie Lindstrom**. Two runs scored on the bad-hop single to tie the game.

The contest remained deadlocked until the bottom of the 12th inning, when Giants' catcher **Hank Gowdy** tripped over his mask and dropped a Muddy Ruel pop. The Washington catcher responded with a double down the third base line. One batter later with runners on first and second, center fielder Earl McNeely grounded to third. But once again, the ball skipped over Lindstrom's head and Ruel came around to score the winning tally.

This would prove to be the final World Series appearance for Giants manager **John McGraw**. Although he owned a 3-6 lifetime mark in the Fall Classic, only one other manager appeared in more series – Casey Stengel with 10 trips.

1933 – NEW YORK GIANTS vs. WASHINGTON SENATORS

(GIANTS WIN SERIES, 4 GAMES TO 1)



New York, in its first full season under new manager **Bill Terry**, won the National League pennant on the strong pitching of **Carl Hubbell** and **Hal Schumacher**.

The Giants entered the World Series as the underdog to the high-powered offense of the Washington Senators. However, the New Yorkers tacked up a 1.53 ERA (8er, 47.0ip) en route to their four games-to-one series victory.

Hubbell and Schumacher, who had combined for 17 shutouts during the regular season, were selected to start the first two contests vs. the Senators.

Hubbell, the second winningest pitcher in Giants history, struck out 10 and didn't allow an earned run in the 4-2 victory. Outfielder **Mel Ott** accounted for three of New York's four runs, with his two-run home run and RBI single. Schumacher followed Hubbell's lead and allowed only a solo home run in the Giants' 6-1 Game #2 victory.

The good pitching turned on the Giants in Game #3 as

Washington's Earl Whitehill tossed a five-hit shutout to give the Senators a 4-0 triumph.

Hubbell, who led the National League with 23 wins, carried a 1-1 game into the 10th inning in Game #4 when the Giants edged ahead on third baseman **Travis Jackson's** bunt single, a sacrifice and shortstop **Blondy Ryan's** single. King Carl escaped a one-out, bases-loaded jam in the bottom half of the inning with a double play to preserve New York's 2-1 victory.

Schumacher helped himself offensively in the decisive Game #5 with his two-run single in the 2nd inning. Then 43-year-old reliever **Dolf Luque** took over a 3-3 game and worked the final four-and-one-third innings to get the Giants in position to win. Ott took care of the offense when he drilled a solo blast into the center field stands at Griffith Stadium in the top of the 10th inning to give New York a 4-3 victory.

1936 – NEW YORK GIANTS vs. NEW YORK YANKEES

(YANKEES WIN SERIES, 4 GAMES TO 2)



The Giants locked horns with their cross-town rivals, the Yankees, in the Fall Classic for the fifth time after winning the National League flag by a five-game margin.

The Yankees, who were without Babe Ruth but had Joe DiMaggio, captured the Series in six games to start a run that saw them win 16 of the next 27 World Championships.

The National Leaguers rode the arm of Hall of Famer **Carl Hubbell** to their 11th World Series. The 33-year-old left-hander won his last 16 decisions of the regular season to finish with a 26-6 ledger that included a 2.31 ERA.

King Carl was on the mound for the Giants in Game #1 and got the National Leaguers a 6-1 victory after allowing just seven hits, including a third inning home run by George Selkirk. Trailing 1-0 in the 5th inning, shortstop **Dick Bartell** launched a solo blast of his own before the Giants

added another run in the 6th and four more in the 8th.

The National Leaguers' victory in Game #1 snapped a 12-game winning streak owned by the Yankees in World Series action.

The Yankees went on to win each of the next three games, outscoring the Giants by a cumulative 25-7 count.

Staving off elimination, the Giants scored a 5-4, 10-inning victory in Game #5. Manager **Bill Terry**, playing in the next-to-last game of his playing career, drove in the game-winner with a sacrifice fly.

The American Leaguers finished off the Polo Grounds tenants in Game #6 as they pounded out 17 hits en route to their series-clinching 13-5 victory.

The two New York teams squared off once again in the Fall Classic, but the Yankees' offensive firepower proved to be too much for the Giants as the American League entrants took home the title in a five-game series.

The Giants, who boasted two 20-game winners in **Carl Hubbell** and rookie **Cliff Melton**, only had one big bat to combat the Yankee arsenal. **Mel Ott** clubbed 31 home runs and drove in 95 runs.

However, that was no match for the Yankees' lineup that had five different 100-RBI men in Lou Gehrig, Joe DiMaggio, Tony Lazzeri, Bill Dickey and George Selkirk.

Hubbell was once again the Giants' Game #1 starter and was coasting along with a 1-0 lead into the bottom of the 6th. Then the Yankees produced one of their vaunted

big-run innings, posting a six-run frame. The American Leaguers went on to post the 8-1 victory.

It was much of the same in Games #2 and #3 as the Yankees posted 8-1 and 5-1 triumphs, respectively.

The Giants turned the tables in Game #4 as they plated six runs in the 2nd inning, with the big blows coming from center fielder **Hank Leiber**. He opened the frame with a single and scored before capping off the rally with a two-run single. The National Leaguers had Hubbell on the hill and he shut down the Yankees on six hits for the 7-3 victory.

The Yankees captured their second straight title with a 4-2 win in the fifth contest.

1951 – NEW YORK GIANTS vs. NEW YORK YANKEES (YANKEES WIN SERIES, 4 GAMES TO 2)

The 1951 World Series was overshadowed by an event that took place the day before it began – “The Shot Heard ‘Round the World.”

Bobby Thomson's three-run, 9th-inning homer off the Dodgers' Ralph Branca in the National League-deciding playoff game put an exclamation on one of the greatest stretch drives in the history of baseball.

Manager **Leo Durocher's** club trailed Brooklyn by 13-and-a-half games on Aug. 11. Then the Giants rattled off 16-straight victories and won 37 of their last 44 regular-season games to force a best-of-three playoff series with the Dodgers for the National League pennant.

The momentum seemed to carry over to the next day for the opener of the World Series as **Monte Irvin** stole home in the first inning to register the first swipe of home since

the Yankees' Bob Meusel did it in 1928. The Giants' left fielder finished the contest 4-for-5 and spearheaded a 5-1 victory.

Irvin would once again lead the National Leaguers' offense in Game #2, but his three hits weren't enough to overcome the Yankees in a 3-1 defeat.

Shortstop **Eddie Stanky** inspired a five-run, fifth-inning rally in Game #3 when he kicked the ball out of Phil Rizzuto's glove on a failed stolen base attempt and scrambled to third. The Giants would move on to a 6-2 triumph at the Polo Grounds.

Despite holding a two-games-to-one series lead, the Giants couldn't finish off the Yankees as the American Leaguers ran off three straight victories to claim the title.

1954 – NEW YORK GIANTS vs. CLEVELAND INDIANS (GIANTS WIN SERIES, 4 GAMES TO 0)



Willie Mays got the National League champion Giants off to a great start in the 1954 World Series when he made perhaps the greatest defensive play in baseball history.

With New York and Cleveland tied 2-2 in the 8th inning of Game #1 at the Polo Grounds and two Indian runners on base, the Hall of Fame center fielder made an over-the-shoulder catch of a 460-foot smash off the bat of the Indians' Vic Wertz.

The Giants went on to win 5-2 when pinch-hitter **Dusty Rhodes** hit a three-run, 10th-inning home run off Indians' starter Bob Lemon. Ironically, the game-winning clout went only 260 feet.

The Giants would go on to sweep the Indians in four games to register their last World Championship in an upset over the highly-touted American League champs.

Rhodes, who hit .341 in part-time duty and as a pinch-hitter deluxe during the regular season, also delivered the game-winning hits in both Games #2 and #3. However, his services weren't needed in the fourth and final contest as New York jumped out to a 7-0 advantage and coasted to the 7-4 championship-clinching victory.

New York was the surprise National League champion. After finishing fifth in 1953, the Giants were led by Mays, who won the N.L. batting title with a .345 mark that included 41 home runs and 110 RBI. The center fielder had returned to the Giants after missing the 1953 campaign due to military service.

Johnny Antonelli, another newcomer who was acquired from Milwaukee in exchange for **Bobby Thomson** in the off-season, won 21 games to help New York to the N.L. flag.

1962 – SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS vs. NEW YORK YANKEES

A matter of inches was the difference between the Giants bringing a World Championship to San Francisco for the first time or losing to the New York Yankees in the Fall Classic for the fifth time.

With the Giants trailing 1-0 with two outs and runners on second and third in the bottom of the ninth inning of Game #7, San Francisco's clean-up hitter **Willie McCovey** stepped in to face Ralph Terry. The Giants' Hall of Famer lined a one-ball, one-strike pitch toward right field, but Yankees' second baseman Bobby Richardson moved slightly to his left and threw up his glove to register the final out and the Yankees' 20th World Series crown.

San Francisco captured the National League flag by posting a late-season rally to catch Los Angeles and force a three-game playoff, which the Giants won 2-1.

The Giants carried a 2-2 tie into the 7th inning of Game #1 at Candlestick Park until Clete Boyer drilled a solo home run to spur the Yankees onto a 6-2 triumph.

1989 – SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS vs. OAKLAND ATHLETICS

(ATHLETICS WIN SERIES, 4 GAMES TO 0)



The Bay Bridge Series, which pitted the Giants against their local rival, the Oakland Athletics, will always be remembered more for the Loma Prieta earthquake than the four-game brooming by the American Leaguers.

That might be a good thing for the Giants, as they were outclassed in almost every phase of the game by the Athletics, as was evidenced by the 32-14 cumulative run total.

A's Game #1 starter Dave Stewart set the tone for this Fall Classic when he hurled a five-hit shutout at the Giants. He was backed by solo home runs from Dave Parker and Walt Weiss off San Francisco starter **Scott Garrelts**.

In much the same fashion, Oakland rolled to a 5-1 victory in Game #2 behind the pitching of Mike Moore.

Then it happened. Something that would make this four-game Series sweep stand out in history. At 5:04 p.m. on

Oct. 17, an earthquake with a 7.1-Richter scale reading rocked the Bay Area and the 60,000 fans at Candlestick Park. With reports of damage throughout the Bay Area, the ballpark was evacuated and the game was cancelled.

Finally, 10 days later, the Athletics picked up where they had left off, as they drilled five home runs on their way to a 13-7 rout in the rescheduled Game #3. The five-homer effort, two by Dave Henderson along with single clouts from Jose Canseco, Carney Lansford and Tony Phillips, tied a Series record set by the 1928 Yankees.

The A's never trailed in the series as Rickey Henderson opened Game #4 with a home run off Giants' starter **Don Robinson**. The Giants would close it to 8-6 in the seventh, but that was as close they would get in the 9-6 finale.

In the first World Series between two Wild Card teams, the Giants and Anaheim Angels lived up to the moniker, combining to set numerous offensive records in a memorable seven-game Fall Classic.

Anaheim emerged from the fireworks with its first World Championship in franchise history, while San Francisco was saddled with heartbreak after seeing a title slip away just five outs from the pinnacle.

The clubs split the first two contests in Anaheim, with **Barry Bonds** grabbing the spotlight in his first appearance on the World Series stage. San Francisco's left fielder clubbed a solo homer in his first at-bat to spark a 4-3 Giants win in Game #1, then connected for a mammoth 9th-inning shot in Game #2. Not to be outdone, the Angels' Tim Salmon homered twice as Anaheim won an 11-10 slugfest to even the series.

When the scene shifted north, the Angels seemed to take control with a convincing 10-4 win in Game #3. As they had all season, the Giants battled back in Game #4, rallying from a 3-0 deficit to earn a 4-3 victory on **David Bell's** two-out, RBI-single in the 8th inning.

Game #5 belonged to San Francisco, as the home club delighted the 42,713 fans at Pacific Bell Park with a 16-4 rout. **Jeff Kent** tied Giants World Series records with four runs, two homers and four RBI, **Rich Aurilia** drove in three runs to establish a franchise playoff mark with 17 RBI overall, and **J.T. Snow** had two of his series-high 11 hits.

The Giants were eight outs from their first World Series title since 1954, as **Shawon Dunston's** two-run homer, Bonds' record eighth post season clout (fourth of Series), and Kent's RBI-single propelled SF to a 5-0 lead in Game #6. But the ultimate prize was wrested away as Scott Spezio's three-run, 7th-inning homer and series MVP Troy Glaus' two-run, 8th-inning double highlighted Anaheim's rally to a 6-5 victory.

San Francisco scored first in Game #7, but ultimately could not overcome the pitching of John Lackey and the bat of Garret Anderson, who delivered the deciding three-run, 3rd-inning double in Anaheim's 4-1 triumph.

2010 – SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS vs. TEXAS RANGERS

(GIANTS WIN SERIES, 4 GAMES TO 1)



It was a different story for the San Francisco Giants during the World Series as the club was bolstered by their offense and pitching to win their sixth World Championship and first since they moved from New York to San Francisco in 1958 to capture the 106th Fall Classic, 4 games to 1 over the Texas Rangers. It marked the club's first World Series win since 1954, ending the Majors' 3rd-longest drought without a Championship at that time, behind the Cubs (102 years) and Indians (62 years) as the top 2 teams at the time.

The Giants' bats were on fire as they battered Cliff Lee and the Rangers' bullpen with an 11-7 victory in the opening game of the 2010 World Series. What was originally penned as a pitchers' duel between Lee and **Tim Lincecum** turned out to be an offensive outburst by both teams. **Freddy Sanchez** finished with four of the Giants' 14 hits as **Aubrey Huff** went 3-for-4 with an RBI and **Juan Uribe** capped a six-run 5th inning with a three-run home run, which set off the fog horn and blasts from water cannons out in right field. San Francisco took a commanding two game lead after **Matt Cain** held the Rangers' bats at bay in a 9-0 shutout in Game #2. Cain tossed 7.2-scoreless frames to extend his postseason scoreless total to 21.1 frames, while **Edgar Renteria** led the offense as he homered and drove in three runs.

The only mishap for the Giants was during Game #3 as they fell to the Rangers 4-2 at Texas. However, the team resorted back to their pitching heavy strategy in Game #4 as rookie **Madison Bumgarner** took to the mound and fired off 8.0-shutout innings as the Giants shut out the Rangers 4-0 on Halloween night. Huff (two-run home run) and **Buster Posey** (solo home run) supplied the club with enough offense as the team was one game away from winning their first Championship in over 54 years.

Lincecum and World Series MVP Renteria helped deliver the title in Game #5 as Lincecum outdueled Cliff Lee in a game that was scoreless until Renteria hit a three-run home run with two outs in the 7th inning. Lincecum defeated Lee for the second time in a week, allowing just three hits over 8.0 innings while recording 10 strikeouts. The game was scoreless until **Cody Ross** and **Juan Uribe** both singled to open the seventh inning before Huff laid down the first sacrifice bunt of his career to move the runners. Renteria stepped to the plate and sent a 2-0 pitch over the left-center field wall silencing a sold out crowd of 52,045. **Brian Wilson** was summoned for the 9th and retired Josh Hamilton on a called 3rd strike, getting Vladimir Guerrero on a grounder to shortstop and then struck out Nelson Cruz to cap the best season in San Francisco Giants history.

2012 – SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS vs. DETROIT TIGERS

(GIANTS WIN SERIES, 4 GAMES TO 0)



Playing in the World Series for the 19th time in franchise history and the fifth time since moving to San Francisco in 1958, the Giants were set to face the Detroit Tigers, the first time these two storied franchises had ever met in a postseason series.

Pablo Sandoval and **Barry Zito** both shined for the Giants in Game #1 as Sandoval hit three home runs, and joined Reggie Jackson, Babe Ruth and Albert Pujols as the only players to accomplish that in the Fall Classic, and Zito outdueled Justin Verlander, the reigning Cy Young winner, as the Giants won 8-3. Sandoval homered in his first three at-bats, hitting a solo shot in the 1st inning, a two-run blast in the 3rd that set off the fog horns and capped it with yet another solo shot to center that sent the festive AT&T Park crowd into a frenzy.

In Game #2, **Madison Bumgarner** tossed 7.0-scoreless innings, then the Giants took advantage of a bunt that stayed fair to scratch out the go-ahead run in a 2-0 win for a 2-0 advantage in the Series.

The Giants took a commanding 3-0 lead in the Fall Classic with a 2-0 win on a chilly night in Detroit in Game #3. SF won their franchise-record sixth straight postseason game as **Ryan Vogelsong** blanked the Tigers for 5.2 innings and **Gregor Blanco** hit an RBI triple and **Brandon Crawford** drove him home with a single in the 2nd inning. The Giants became the eighth team to post consecutive World Series shutouts and the first to accomplish the feat since the 1966 Baltimore Orioles.

Nearly knocked out in the playoffs time and time again, the Giants completed a four game sweep of the Tigers to win their second title in three seasons. **Marco Scutaro's** go-ahead single with two outs in the 10th inning lifted the Giants to a 4-3, 10-inning victory. **Sergio Romo** got Triple Crown winner Miguel Cabrera to look at strike three for the final out and the Giants finished the month of October with seven straight wins and their seventh World Series championship.

2014 – SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS VS. KANSAS CITY ROYALS

(GIANTS WIN SERIES, 4 GAMES TO 3)



Backed by the eventual World Series MVP **Madison Bumgarner**, the Giants beat the Kansas City Royals in seven games to capture their third championship in five years.

Kansas City hadn't lost in this postseason before the Series, but the Giants ended that streak at eight games with a 7-1 win in Game #1. SF scored three times in the 1st inning off James Shields; **Pablo Sandoval** hit an RBI double and **Hunter Pence** crushed a two-run homer to right-center. Bumgarner carried a shutout into the 7th before Salvador Perez homered, ending Bumgarner's World Series scoreless-innings streak at 21 and his road postseason scoreless-innings streak at 32.2. His three-hit, 7.0-inning performance gave the Giants the jump in the Series.

Gregor Blanco opened Game #2 by jumping on a 3-2 pitch from Yordano Ventura and jolting it over the wall in right. That lead was short-lived as the Royals scored single runs in the 1st and 2nd innings off **Jake Peavy**. The game was 2-2 in the 6th when the Royals put a five-spot on the board and finished it off with a 7-2 win.

Tim Hudson, made his first World Series appearance in Game #3 and retired 12 in a row in one stretch – but took the loss. The Royals scratched out a run in the 1st and added two in the 6th, the final run scoring on Eric Hosmer's single off **Javier Lopez**. **Michael Morse**'s pinch-hit RBI double keyed the Giants' two-run 6th, but that would be the extent of SF's offense. Kansas City relievers Kelvin Herrera, Brandon Finnegan, Wade Davis and Greg Holland combined for four hitless innings.

Ineffective pitching by **Ryan Vogelsong** and bad defense

by the Giants allowed the Royals to score four two-out runs in the third to grab a 4-1 edge in Game #4. However, another three shutout innings from **Yusmeiro Petit**, enabled the Giants to mount their comeback. The Giants scored one in the 3rd and two in the 5th to tie the game. **Joe Panik**'s two-run double highlighted a four-run 7th, and helped the Giants secure an 11-4 win.

The Giants' final home game of the postseason was highlighted by Bumgarner, who threw another four-hit shutout to become the Giants' first pitcher since 1962 to throw a complete game (**Billy Pierce**) and shutout (**Jack Sanford**) in the World Series.

In Game #6, the Royals scored seven runs in the 2nd inning to put the game away early. Yordano Ventura held the Giants to three hits in seven innings, setting up Game 7.

Sandoval went 3-for-3 and scored twice, Morse drove in two runs and **Jeremy Affeldt** earned the win with 2.1 innings of shutout relief. However, it was Bumgarner who stole the show for the Giants and helped the team win its eighth championship. On just two days' rest, he entered the game in the 5th inning. After allowing a single to Omar Infante, the first batter he faced, Bumgarner retired the next 14 hitters. With two outs in the 9th, Alex Gordon lifted a single into left-center that Blanco misplayed. Gordon wound up at third, 90 feet from tying the game. On a 2-2 pitch, Bumgarner got Salvador Perez on a foul pop clutched by Sandoval, who then collapsed in joy. Bumgarner, who had been the NLCS MVP, was the only choice for Series MVP. He went 2-0 with a save and gave up all of one run and nine hits in 21 innings.

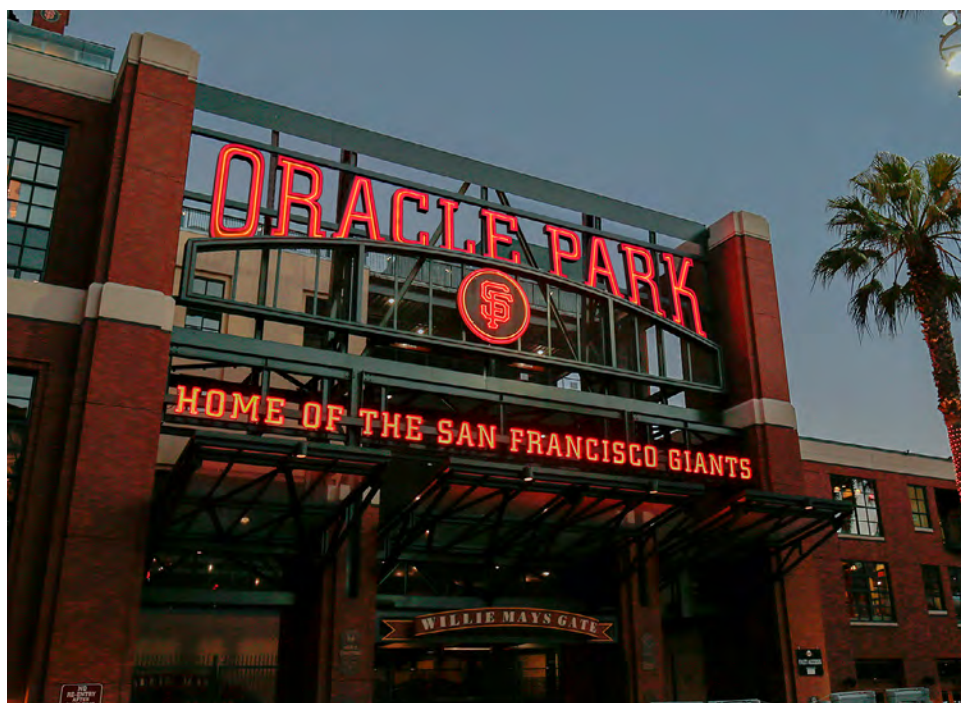

ORACLE PARK

Giants ace Tim Lincecum threw the second no-hitter of his career on June 25, 2014 in a 4-0 win against the San Diego Padres. Lincecum became the first player in the Giants' San Francisco era to throw multiple no-hitters.





Opening Date: April 11, 2000

Design: Classic urban ballpark with an old-time feel and all the amenities of modern ballparks. Inspired by Wrigley Field and Fenway Park and modeled after Oriole Park at Camden Yards, Jacobs Field and Coors Field.

Construction: Commenced on December 11, 1997. Construction lasted 28 months, with Opening Day on April 11, 2000.

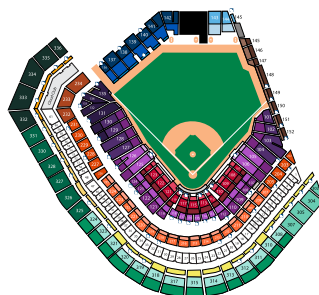
Name Change: Ballpark originally opened as Pacific Bell Park; name was changed to SBC Park on January 1, 2004; changed to AT&T Park on March 1, 2006 and then the name was changed to Oracle Park on January 10, 2019.

Financing: Oracle Park, the first privately financed Major League ballpark to be built in 38 years, cost \$357 million. The financing plan included \$172 million from naming rights, other sponsorships, pouring rights, concession rights and the selling of charter seats; a \$170 million bank loan; and \$15 million in tax increment financing from the City's Redevelopment Agency.

LEED Certification: In 2019, Oracle Park achieved LEED Platinum Certification for Existing Building Operations and Management, making Oracle Park the first Major League Baseball stadium to achieve this honor. The certification was achieved through numerous greening and sustainability programs the park has implemented and refined throughout the years since its first LEED Silver Certification in 2010.

Green Glove: Major League Baseball named the San Francisco Giants as recipient of the 2018 Green Glove Award, which recognizes the MLB Club with the highest waste diversion rate, after diverting 94 percent of all waste at Oracle Park from local landfills. The Giants, who collected nine consecutive awards between 2008 and 2016, secured their 10th Green Glove Award in 11 seasons in 2018.

Location: The 13-acre site is bounded by King, Second and Third Streets, and by the China Basin Channel. The site is owned by the Port of San Francisco and is leased to the Giants at fair market value.

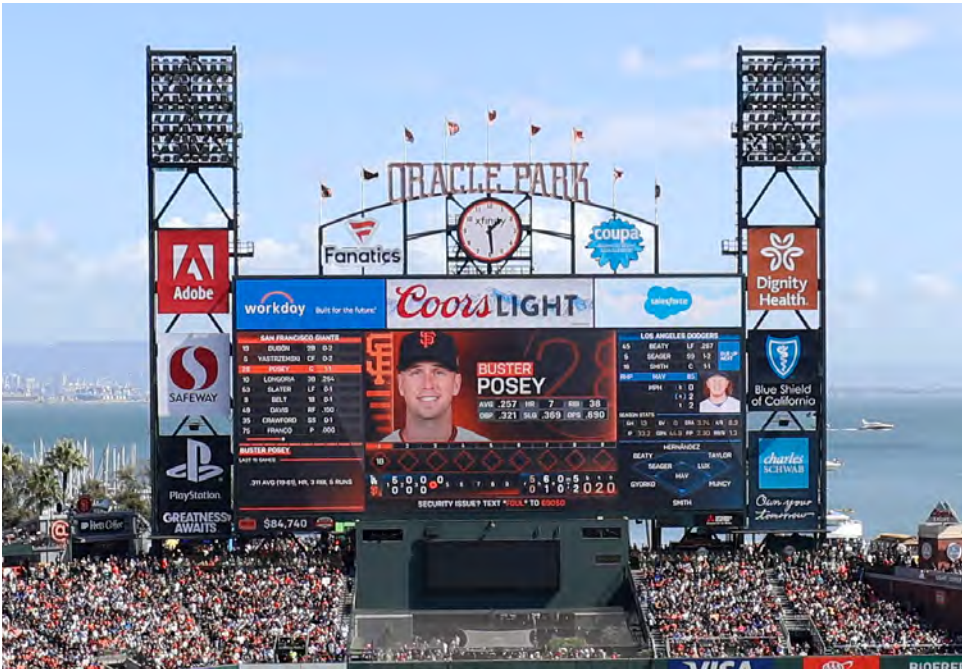

Lighting: In 2017, in partnership with PG&E, the ballpark upgraded more than 556 traditional light bulbs to new energy efficient LED lights. The switch resulted in an energy savings of 290,466 kilowatt hours during the regular baseball season, which is the same amount of energy it takes to power 30 homes.



Prior to the 2019, the Giants installed a brand new videoboard in center field, the third-largest videoboard in the Majors.

During the 2018-2019 offseason, the Giants embarked on a capital improvement project that greatly enhanced the fan experience at Oracle Park with the installation of a brand new videoboard in center field.

The \$10 million project represented the largest single capital improvement the Giants have undertaken at the ballpark since it opened in 2000. It replaced the old Mitsubishi Diamond Vision board (fifth-smallest and second-oldest in the Majors at the time) with the third-largest board in the Majors behind Cleveland and Seattle (and biggest in any sports venue in the state of California).

Fans can notice the difference as soon as they enter Oracle Park as the new board, also produced by

Mitsubishi, fills the entire width between the two outfield light standards. The new display is 50% wider and more than twice as high as its predecessor.

All told, the new board covers 10,700 square feet, which is more than three times the surface area of the previous board. It features more pixels and less space between them, making the image much bolder.

In addition to higher-quality video, the board provides ample room to display an array of additional information never before available to fans in the ballpark. This includes more in-depth and advanced stats, such as launch angle, exit velocity and home run distance, along with split stats based on fielder shifts, pitch types and much more.

Giants Statue Dedications

Since the opening of Oracle Park in 2000, the San Francisco Giants have dedicated five statues of their greatest players donning a Giants uniform. Sculptures of Hall of Famers Willie Mays, Willie McCovey, Juan Marichal, Orlando Cepeda and Gaylord Perry were created by well-known American sculptor William Behrends and have been placed outside of Oracle Park for everyone to enjoy.

Behrends' portrait sculptures have been widely praised for their likeness, quality of detail and sensitive evocation of character. Unlike many other sculptors, Mr. Behrends was personally involved in every phase of the creation of the five bronze sculptures, including research, molding and bronzing.

Behrends divides his time between home and studio in Tyron, NC, bronze foundries in Colorado and New York and a marble studio in Pietrasanta, Italy. He studied architecture at North Carolina State University and fine arts and sculpture at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, including anatomy training at the medical school. He has subsequently studied and worked in Italy, principally with Swietlan Kraczyzna and Enzo Pasquini. He is the twice recipient of the Richard Portrait Prize by the National Sculpture Society and is a fellow board member of the National Sculpture Society.



March 31, 2000 - The Giants unveiled a nine-foot bronze sculpture of Hall of Fame outfielder **Willie Mays**, located at the corner of Third and King Streets. The statue depicts Mays in the graceful conclusion of his powerful swing. The sculpture was developed over a 12-month period.



May 4, 2003 - A nine-foot tall bronze statue of Giants Hall of Fame first baseman **Willie McCovey** was unveiled. The statue is prominently featured at the northeast portion of Oracle Park, which was officially designated as McCovey Point by the San Francisco Port Commission. The statue of Willie McCovey pays tribute to a man who exemplifies the spirit and leadership shown by many of those who have worn the Giants uniform.



May 21, 2005 – Former Giants great and Hall of Fame pitcher **Juan Marichal** had his statue dedicated in 2005. The nine-foot bronze statue is located at Oracle Park's Lefty O'Doul Plaza and features Marichal's famous high-leg kick.



September 6, 2008 – The Giants dedicated a bronze statue in honor of Hall of Fame first baseman **Orlando Cepeda**. The statue, which stands at nine feet tall on a five foot base, is located at the Second Street entrance to Oracle Park. The sculpture portrays a youthful and smiling Cepeda.



August 13, 2016 – The Giants dedicated a bronze statue in honor of Hall of Fame pitcher **Gaylord Perry**. The statue, which stands at nine feet tall on a five foot base, is located at the Second and King Streets entrance to Oracle Park. The sculpture portrays Perry's intensity and focus on the mound at the point of his follow through.

Dr. Renel Brooks-Moon

Renel is a Bay Area native, entering her 21st season as P.A. Announcer. She is a graduate of Woodside High School, and received a B.A. in English Literature from Mills College. She spent 35 years as a local radio and television broadcaster, including stints at 106 KMEL, 98.1 KISS-FM and CBS-5, among others. Renel has been recognized by the Baseball Hall of Fame as the first woman to Public Address Announce a world championship game in any professional sport, following Game 3 of the 2002 World Series. Renel has received numerous awards, including honors from American Women in Radio and Television, Multi-Ethnic Sports Hall of Fame, 100 Black Women, Bay Area Black Journalists Association and Girls, Inc. Renel was a founding member of Friends of Faith, a non-profit that served low-income Bay Area breast cancer patients. March 18, 2005 was proclaimed "Renel Brooks-Moon Day" in San Francisco by Mayor Gavin Newsom, honoring her broadcasting career and community activism. Renel was profiled in O, The Oprah Winfrey Magazine, as "The Woman Who's Changing Baseball". In 2008, Renel received an honorary doctorate from her Alma Mater, Mills College, and in 2018 she received an honorary doctorate from the University of San Francisco and delivered the commencement address. In 2017, Renel was honored to MC the historic inauguration of San Francisco's first African-American Female Mayor, London Breed. Renel is an Emmy Award winner as host of the television series "Forever Giants", and is featured on a limited edition 2020 TOPPS baseball card.

- During the postseason, the Giants have one splash hit" (**Barry Bonds**) and opponents have recorded two postsea-son "splash hits" (**Rick Ankiel** & **Bryce Harper**).
- No right-handed hitter has ever hit an opposite field home run into McCovey Cove.
- Of visiting players who have hit the cove, Carlos Delgado and Adam LaRoche have performed the feat the most, doing it three times each.
- David Ortiz, Mitch Moreland, Adam Dunn and Rougned Odor are the only American League players to hit the cove.

ORACLE PARK ATTENDANCE HIGHLIGHTS

All Oracle Park information below is courtesy of David Kronheim

- 2019 attendance - 2,707,760, an average of 33,429 per date. Average per date ranked #11 among all MLB teams in 2019. The Giants ranked #4 in average per date in 2018, #3 in 2017, #4 in 2016, #3 in 2015, #4 in 2014, #3 in 2013, and they were #4 in average per date in 2012. This past season marked the lowest total attendance in Oracle Park history (2000-pres).
- **The Giants' National League record sellout streak ended on July 17, 2017. 530 consecutive regular season dates, plus 25 dates in the post-season, for a total of 555, were sold out. It was the second longest sellout streak in MLB history.** The streak began with the last three regular season dates in 2010, starting on October 1, continued through the next six full seasons, through the game of July 9, 2017.
- The old National League sellout streak record was 257 regular season games, plus 16 in the post season, for a total of 273, by Philadelphia from 2009 to August, 2012. Boston holds the MLB record of 820 straight sellouts (794 regular season, 26 post-season) from 2003 through Opening Day 2013.
- Oracle Park (cost-\$357 million) was the first privately financed MLB park since Dodger Stadium opened in 1962.
- Oracle Park opened on April 11, 2000. Its original name was Pacific Bell Park. The name was changed to SBC Park on January 1, 2004, changed to AT&T Park on March 1, 2006, and then changed to Oracle Park on January 10, 2019.
- **1,009 of the 1,620 (62.3%) regular season dates at Oracle Park have been sellouts.**
- **1,589 of the 1,620 (98.1%) regular season dates have attracted at least 30,000.**
- Of all teams that have moved into a new ballpark in the last 45 years, the Giants are the only team whose attendance has been higher every single year in their current park, than it ever was in their former park. Kansas City has drawn better at Kauffman Stadium each year than they ever did at Municipal Stadium. But the Royals only played four seasons (1969-1972) at Municipal Stadium before Kauffman Stadium opened in 1973.
- In 2015, the Giants surpassed 50 million in attendance at Oracle Park, reaching this level faster than at any ballpark in Major League history. This total was achieved in the park's 16th season, and on the 1,261st regular season date played there. The old record was held by Baltimore, who reached 50 million at Oriole Park at Camden Yards in 1,311 dates, and in that park's 17th season. San Francisco, Baltimore, Colorado, and Toronto are the only teams to reach 50 million in attendance at a ballpark in less than 1,500 regular season dates.
- Largest regular season crowd at Oracle Park was 43,503 vs. the Yankees on June 24, 2007. The biggest post-season crowd was 44,046 on October 8, 2010 for a National League Division Series game with Atlanta.
- The smallest crowd was 23,934 on May 11, 2009 vs. Washington. The only games that drew less than 30,000 at Oracle Park have been in 2009 (12 dates), in 2010 (five dates), and in 2019 (14 dates).
- Highest season attendance at Oracle Park is 3,387,303 (41,819 per date - all sellouts) in 2011.
- **Attendance has topped three million in 17 of the 20 years at Oracle Park, including eight straight years from 2000 through 2007, and also in nine straight years from 2010 through 2018.** The only teams with an equal or longer streak of three million seasons are the Dodgers (1996-2010), Yankees (2000-2018), Angels (2003-2018), Cardinals (2004-2018) and Rockies (1993-2001).
- The Giants have topped three million in 17 seasons. The only teams to draw three million more often than the Giants are the Dodgers (33 times), the Cardinals (23), and the Yankees (21). All these teams play in ballparks with a higher capacity than Oracle Park.
- The Giants have outdrawn the A's in 35 of the 52 years these teams have shared the Bay Area, including every year starting in 1993.

Prior to rejoining the orange and black during his current stint, he spent the previous three years as a senior advisor to baseball operations for the Dodgers from 2002-04. Amalfitano ended his coaching career with the Dodgers, manning the third base coaching box from 1983-98 under manager Tommy Lasorda. Gene Clines ►► Special Assistant, Player Development

Gene Clines, who enjoyed a 10-year big league playing career from 1970-79, returns to the Giants organization for the fifth season after having spent the previous nine years working for the Dodgers as a Senior Advisor, Player Development. Clines joined the Dodgers organization as the Outfield/Baserunning Coordinator in 2007 and then spent three seasons as the Hitting Coordinator for the Dodgers' minor league system. In 2009, Lehr started 11 games and went 5-3 with a 5.37 ERA for Cincinnati, throwing a complete game shutout against the Chicago Cubs on August 5, 2009. He was originally drafted in the eighth round out of USC by the Oakland Athletics in 1999, and pitched in relief for the A's and Milwaukee Brewers. Over his pitching career, he made 77 Major League appearances, totaling 84 strikeouts and a 5.35 ERA in 148.0 innings.

Jose Alguacil ►► Manager

Jose Alguacil will manage Double-A Richmond in 2020 after spending 2017-2019 as the Giants First Base Coach at the Major League level. Alguacil, who also managed Richmond in 2015, is managing for the first time since 2016 when he skippered Triple-A Sacramento. Overall, the 2020 campaign will be Alguacil's 14th with the Giants organization after joining them in 2007 as a Minor League Roving Infield Instructor. His coaching career began in 2002 when he worked as a Minor League Instructor with the Expos organization. He stayed with the Expos/Nationals organization through 2006 before joining the Giants in 2007. Additionally, he served as a coach with Spain during the 2013 World Baseball Classic. A native of Caracas, VZ, Alguacil played in the minors for the Giants and Chicago White Sox as well as the Independent leagues from 1993-2001.



Steve Kline ►► Pitching Coach

Steve Kline returns to Double-A Richmond for his second stint as the club's Pitching Coach in 2020 after previously serving as the team's pitching coach from 2015-2017. For the past two seasons (2018-2019), Kline was the Pitching Coach at Triple-A Sacramento. He also spent six seasons as the pitching coach for Augusta from 2009-2014. Long regarded as one of game's most durable left-handed relief pitchers, Kline appeared in 89 games in 2001 for St. Louis, a Major League single-season record for left-handed pitchers at that time. He also logged a 1.80 ERA that year for the Redbirds, one of two career campaigns with sub-2.00 ERA (also 1.79 in 2004). The 11-year Major League veteran compiled a 34-39 lifetime ledger with 39 saves and a 3.51 ERA over 796 big league contests (one start) with the Indians (1997), Expos (1997-2000), Cardinals (2001-04), Orioles (2005) and Giants (2006-07). He was originally an eighth round selection by Cleveland in the 1993 draft. Kline resides in Winfield, PA.



Doug Clark ►► Hitting Coach

Doug Clark enters his sixth season as a Hitting Coach with the Giants organization and his first with Double-A Richmond. In 2019, Clark was the Hitting Coach at Short-Season Salem-Keizer where the Volcanoes led eight team Northwest League in virtually every offensive category including batting average, runs scored, hits, doubles, home runs, and RBI. He also served as the Hitting Coach for the AZL Giants from 2017-2018. The former Giants farmhand was drafted in the seventh round of the 1998 draft by San Francisco. Nava managed Class A Augusta in 2011 and 2012, leading the GreenJackets to a spot in the SAL playoffs in 2011. He also spent three seasons (2008-2010) as a hitting coach for Augusta. Scottsdale Stadium



The 2020 campaign marks the opening of a new clubhouse and world class training facility at Scottsdale Stadium. Nestled in the heart of historic Old Town Scottsdale and surrounded by art galleries, restaurants and boutique shops, Scottsdale Stadium has become the home of not only the San Francisco Giants and the Arizona Fall League, but also of numerous special events, festivals, concerts, and parties. Designed by the architects of Camden Yards in Baltimore, the stadium is adorned with turn-of-the-century lamps, framed antique baseball gloves, and sidewalk bricks in the shape of home plate.

Headlining Phase 1 of the Scottsdale Stadium renovations is the new multi-story clubhouse and event center on the Osborn Road side of the ballpark. The 10,000 square-foot event facility will be the largest in downtown Scottsdale and will be used year-round by the Giants and the City of Scottsdale. The event space currently holds the team's dining room. The Giants also plan to utilize the space if rain keeps them from working out outside.



The new clubhouse will sit at the base of the three-story, 40,000 square foot building and includes 10 televisions, plenty of comfortable seating, and mood lighting that can be changed with a flick of a switch. In the back of the building will be the first floor of the two-story world-class weightroom and training facility, which has views of the back field at Scottsdale Stadium, where the Giants do workouts in the spring and hold simulated games. The second floor includes a float tank for players to recover. The third floor has a lounge for players to hang out and includes two decks overlooking the stadium.

From the fan side, there will be a new, expanded entrance to Scottsdale Stadium off Drinkwater Blvd that will also include a new box office. Fans also notice aesthetic changes to the ballpark in right field where there will be new right field concourse bleachers with standing room decks as well as an expansion of the Charro Lodge in right field. The expanded Charro Lodge will increase shade and capacity for Giants Spring Training games.

Lastly, there have been updates to the press and suite level at Scottsdale Stadium that include upgrades to the Giants administrative offices.

Phase Two of the project will bring further upgrades to fan amenities and the stadium concourses.

In 1990 when ESPN TV first began its coverage of Major League Baseball, Miller was chosen as the first play-by-play commentator on the award-winning ESPN Sunday Night Baseball game of the week broadcast. Miller and his Hall of Fame partner, Joe Morgan, teamed up on the prime time telecast for 21 seasons. During his tenure at ESPN, he was nominated twice for a national Emmy Award, and broadcast 13 consecutive World Series on ESPN Radio. He has broadcast 16 World Series overall. He was also nominated six times for an "ACE" award, emblematic of cable television excellence, and won the award in 1991 - the first ESPN play-by-play announcer to win the award, and 1996. Miller was named National Sportscaster of the Year by the American Sportscasters Association (ASA) in 1998. That same year, Miller was inducted into the Hall of Fame of the National Sportswriters and Sportscasters Association of America (NSSAA). In 2018, Miller received a Northern California Emmy Award, the fourth local Emmy for his Giants television work. Prior to his work on ESPN, Miller broadcast an occasional game on NBC-TV with either Tony Kubek or Joe Garagiola. Miller spent 14 years with the Baltimore Orioles before coming to the Giants. Prior to joining Baltimore in 1983, the talented broadcaster spent two seasons with the Texas Rangers (1978-79) and three seasons with the Boston Red Sox (1980-82). Miller got his first baseball play-by-play job in 1974 at age 22 calling radio and TV for that year's World Series Champion Oakland Athletics. The Bay Area native has also broadcast NHL hockey, NBA basketball and championship soccer games on national television in his distinguished career. In 2018, Miller was inducted into the College of San Mateo (CA) Hall of Fame. Miller began his broadcasting career as a student at CSM and broadcast baseball, football and basketball games on KCSM, the college's radio and TV stations. Jon and his wife, Janine, reside in Moss Beach. They are parents to three daughters, Misha, Holly (married to Paul Gallagher) and Emilie, and a son, Alexander.

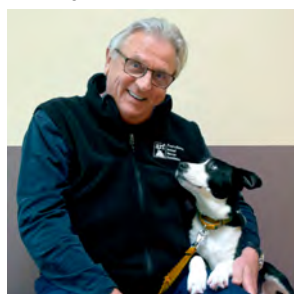

Duane Kuiper

Duane Kuiper, a 13-time Emmy award-winning broadcaster, begins his 36th season as a Major League announcer. He embarks on his 27th consecutive year in the NBC Sports Bay Area, NBC Bay Area and KNBR Radio broadcast booths in 2020. Kuiper was one of 10 finalists for the 2014 Ford C. Frick Award for baseball broadcasting excellence. Kuiper emerged as one of the top three fan selections in online voting. The former 11-year big league infielder has received 13 local Emmy awards for his distinguished broadcasting career: On-Camera talent (9); Sports Live Broadcast (2); and Sporting Event/Game-Live (2). He provided commentary for the Giants from 1987-92 and served a one-year stint with the expansion Colorado Rockies in 1993. The former infielder spent the last four years of his career with the Giants, following seven campaigns with the Cleveland Indians. In 2004 he was voted by Cleveland fans as one of the 100 greatest players in Tribe history. After retiring in 1985, Kuiper provided commentary on Giants radio and TV broadcasts through the end of that season, and had his own radio show on KNBR from 1982-85. Kuiper's scorecards from Barry Bonds' historic 756th home run game, Randy Johnson's 300th career victory, Matt Cain's perfect game in 2012 and the scorecard from Gaylord Perry Day (August 13, 2016 - BAL @ SF) are displayed at the National Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown. The Wisconsin native previously served as a board member of the Giants Community Fund and was a member of the Junior Giants Committee and the former Chair of the Junior Giants Glove Drive. Kuiper lends his time and support to ARF (Animal Rescue Foundation, <http://www.arflife.org>). A graduate of Southern Illinois University in Carbondale, IL, Kuiper and his wife, Michelle, reside in Danville. They are parents to two children, Cole (married to Rachel Jensen) and Dannon (married to Zach Rease), and have one granddaughter (Andy).



Mike Krukow



Mike Krukow enters his 30th season in the television booth, and his 26th full season on the radio side. A 13-time Emmy award winner, Krukow is the broadcast team's color analyst on NBC Sports Bay Area and NBC Bay Area telecasts, and on KNBR Radio broadcasts. Krukow was one of eight finalists for the 2017 Ford C. Frick Award for baseball broadcasting excellence. He was named California's 2015 and 2017 Sportscaster of the Year, as selected by the National Sports Media Association. The former big league pitcher has received 13 local Emmy awards: On-Camera talent (7); Sports Live Broadcast (2); Sporting Event/Game-Live (2); Arts/Entertainment-Program/Special (1); and Executive Producer Baseball Ballet (1). Krukow's playing career in the Major Leagues spanned 14 years and three teams: the Chicago Cubs (1976-81), Philadelphia Phillies (1982) and San Francisco Giants (1983-89), where his enthusiasm both on and off the field made him a fan favorite. "Kruk", named as the starting right-handed pitcher to the 1980's Giants All-Decade Team in a vote by Bay Area media in 1999, is noted for his deep knowledge of the game and tremendous sense of humor. A 20-game winner for the Giants in 1986, Krukow retired after the 1989 season with a 124-117 career record and a 3.90 ERA. In 2008, Kruk was honored as a member of the inaugural class of Giants alumni with a plaque in the Giants Wall of Fame which lines the wall outside of Oracle Park. Krukow's scorecard from Tim Lincecum's no hitter in 2014 is displayed at the National Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown. Krukow supports Canine Guardians (www.canineguardians.org), a non-profit organization that provides trained service dogs to assist and enrich the daily lives of wounded veterans with PTSD, diabetics, children with cancer and others with disabilities. Krukow resides in Reno, NV with his wife, Jennifer. The couple has five children, Jarek, Baker (married to Celina Roberge), Tessa, Chase (married to Alix Roe) and Weston, one grandson, Coen, and one granddaughter, Reagan.



Dave Flemming



Dave Flemming begins his 17th year of broadcasting for the Giants. The 43-year-old will join Jon Miller and Duane Kuiper on the team's KNBR radio broadcasts and is involved in select games on television. In addition to his work with the Giants, he serves as a lead play-by-play voice for ESPN television, working college football, Major League Baseball and basketball, as well as MLB playoffs for ESPN Radio. He has also served as a primary voice of the Little League World Series on ESPN since 2013. He was named California's 2019 Sportscaster of the Year, as selected by the National Sports Media Association. Flemming has previously called Major League Baseball on FOX, and for six years was the play-by-play voice of Stanford football and basketball. In 2008, named Flemming "the best of the new generation of baseball announcers". He has won three Northern California Area Emmy Awards for his Giants play-by-play work. The Alexandria, VA native received a Bachelor's and Master's degrees from Stanford, and a Master's degree in Broadcast Journalism from Syracuse University. For more than a decade, Flemming has served on the board of the Good Tidings Foundation, a Bay Area charity that has worked closely with the Giants in building and refurbishing baseball fields and other athletic facilities across Northern California. Good Tidings also grants college scholarships for economically disadvantaged students who have demonstrated extraordinary community service, and builds art studios in underserved schools and neighborhoods. In 2017, Good Tidings presented Flemming with the Nate Thurmond Medal, in recognition of lifetime contributions to community service. Since 2011, Dave has participated in the Giants Community Fund's annual Education Day pre-game program where 60 Harmon and Sue Burns scholars and their guests learn about the importance of higher education. Flemming has also participated in the Willie Mac Award Luncheon and the Junior Giants Commissioner's Meeting. Flemming and his wife, Jessica, reside in San Francisco with their twin daughters, Katie and Carter, and son, David Henry.

Javier Lopez

Javier Lopez enters his fourth season in the in the NBC Sports Bay Area TV booth and will broadcast select road games with Duane Kuiper. The former left-hander pitched for Colorado (2003-05), Arizona (2005), Boston (2006-2009), Pittsburgh (2010), and San Francisco (2010-2016). He won three World Series rings (2010, 2012, 2014) as a member of the Giants and one World Series ring with the Red Sox in 2007. Lopez attended the University of Virginia and earned a degree in psychology despite leaving early to begin his baseball career. In 2011, Lopez was one of two major league relief pitchers to throw at least 50 innings without giving up a home run. In 2013, Lopez posted a career-best 1.83 ERA. A left-handed specialist known for his sidearm delivery, Lopez, along with teammate Brandon Crawford, won the Willie Mac Award in 2016. The award honors the Giants' most inspirational player. Lopez supports two charities: Word of Honor Fund (www.wordofhonorfund.com) and The Ribbon Classic (www.ribbonclassic.org). Lopez is married to Renee, and they reside in Suwanee, GA with their two children, Kylan and Cristian.



Shawn Estes

Shawn Estes begins his second year in the NBC Sports Bay Area TV booth and will work with Duane Kuiper on select road telecasts. Estes pitched for the Giants (1995-2001), Mets (2002), Reds (2002), Cubs (2003), Rockies (2004), Diamondbacks (2005), and Padres (2006, 2008). Estes had his best professional season in 1997, when he went 19-5 with a 3.18 ERA for the Giants. He was selected to the NL All-Star team in 1997. He also had four career home runs and 28 RBI, including a grand slam in 2000. Estes initially committed to play college baseball at Stanford, but instead signed with the Seattle Mariners after being selected in the first round of the 1991 MLB Draft. In 2010, he was honored with a plaque on the Giants Wall of Fame that lines the wall outside of Oracle Park. Estes began his broadcast career as a television color commentator for the Reno Aces of the Pacific Coast League in 2011. He has appeared as a pre and post-game show host on Giants telecasts on NBC Sports Bay Area since 2011. He Supported the Multiple Sclerosis Read-A-Thon as a player, and continues his active support of charity work through his involvement with Challenged Athletes Foundation (www.challengedathletes.org). He and his wife, Nathalie, have four children and reside in Phoenix.

Erwin R. Higueros

Erwin Higueros, a 32-year veteran of Bay Area sports broadcasting, begins his 22nd full season, his 23rd overall in the Giants' Spanish language radio booth. In addition to his broadcast responsibilities, Higueros is a member of the Giants front office, working in both the media relations and Hispanic marketing departments, and serves as the official Spanish language translator for the Club. In 2016, Higueros received a Northern California Area Emmy Award in the category of Outstanding Achievement Sporting Game Live for the first Giants game to be televised in Spanish on Telemundo/KSTS-Channel 48. In 2018, Higueros was awarded a second Emmy for Outstanding Achievement Sports-News Feature/Segment (Spanish). In 2019, he was awarded a third Emmy for Outstanding Achievement Commercial-Single Spot or Campaign (Spanish). A multi-talented announcer, Higueros hosts G-Cast En Español in season which features exclusive interviews with Giants uniformed personnel in Spanish and four 30-minute television shows on Telemundo. In 2019, Higueros was the Spanish play-by-play radio announcer for the Anaheim Ducks first-ever hockey game in Spanish. The Ducks hosted the Vancouver Canucks as part of the celebration of Día de los Muertos at the Honda Center. Higueros began his broadcasting career with the Oakland A's (1988-97), and was the play-by-play announcer for games that were televised on Telemundo-Channel 48 from 1995-97. A versatile broadcaster, Higueros was the Spanish play-by-play voice for a number of Bay Area professional sports teams including the San Francisco 49ers in 2000 and 2012-2013 seasons, the San Jose Sharks in 1995, and the Oakland Raiders in 1995-96 and 2002-06. He also handled the radio play-by-play duties on Spanish radio for the Fresno State Bulldogs football team (2009-14). Higueros broadcast the League Division Series for FOX Sports International in 2004-06. In 2013, Higueros was the recipient of the Community Service Award from the Hispanic Heritage Baseball Museum. Born in Guatemala, he moved to the United States when he was 12 years old. A graduate of Fremont High School in Oakland, he attended Cal State Hayward and the Columbia School of Broadcasting. Higueros resides in Brentwood with his wife, Maria. The couple has two grown children, Claudia and Erwin, Jr., and two grandchildren, Alison and Erwin, III.



Tito Fuentes

Tito Fuentes returns to the Giants' Spanish language broadcast booth for his 17th straight season. Fuentes previously served as a member of the Spanish language broadcast team from 1981-92, and in 1996-2004 he broadcast for FOX Sports International which is aired in Latin America. An active participant in the Giants' marketing efforts, he is a regular participant in the Giants Fantasy Camps. A former Major League second baseman who played for the Giants from 1965-74, Fuentes saw big league action with San Diego, Detroit and Oakland. The Havana, Cuba native was initially signed as an 18-year-old amateur before the start of the 1962 season and was the last baseball player signed directly out of Cuba before the United States embargo against Cuba. A .268 hitter over his 13-year career, he was voted the starting second baseman on the Dream Team for the Giants 25th Anniversary team by San Francisco fans in 1982. In 1997, "23" was inducted into the Cuban Baseball Hall of Fame. He and his wife, Maritza, reside in Reno, NV.



Carlos Orellana

Carlos Orellana is entering his 12th season as a Spanish radio engineer and producer in Major League Baseball, his ninth overall with the San Francisco Giants (2009-2011, 2015-present). Orellana began his radio career with the Giants in 2009, at the age of 18, as an assistant producer for KIQI Radio. He was the Oakland Athletics Spanish radio network producer from 2012-2014. In 2015, he rejoined the Giants Spanish radio booth as one of the producers for ESPN Deportes Radio and has remained a part of the Giants broadcast team since. In addition to his producing duties, Orellana has been serving as the back-up play-by-play announcer for Erwin Higueros since the 2015 season. In addition to producing baseball games, the multi-talented San Francisco native has worked with the San Francisco 49ers (2009) and the Oakland Raiders (2013-2019). In a collaborative effort, the Giants Community Fund, the club's 501(c)(3) non-profit, and the team's Community Relations Department, work to identify, develop, support and raise awareness for people, issues and programs that are important to our fans and communities throughout the Bay Area and Northern and Central California.

Programs include: Girls Day, Alzheimer's Awareness, Salute to the Military, Pediatric Cancer Awareness, Until There's A Cure, Strike Out Violence Day, Autism Awareness, Family Safety, Mental Health Awareness, Junior Giants Glove Drive, ALS Awareness, Junior Giants Stretch Drive, Education Day, Donate Life Day, Fantasy Camp for Kids, AAA High School Championship Game, Bullying Prevention, Peanut Allergy Friendly Day, LGBTQ Night, Step Up to the Plate for Homelessness, and many others.

In addition, thousands of community organizations and groups gather at Oracle Park each season to celebrate their shared culture, heritage, and diversity while raising funds to support their school, organization or non-profit.

The Giants Community Fund's flagship program, Junior Giants, serves over 24,000 boys and girls in 90 underserved communities throughout California, Nevada and Oregon. It is a free and non-competitive baseball and softball program that has served as a model for MLB youth initiatives. Using baseball and softball as the hook, Junior Giants provides opportunities for children to learn the meaning of leadership, teamwork, confidence and integrity, as well as the importance of education, health and bullying prevention. Over 5,000 coaches, team parents and representatives of community organizations, generously dedicate their time and efforts to improve the lives of Junior Giants in their communities. After the Paradise Camp Fire, the Giants connected with victims and first responders from Butte County to provide support by way of care packages, fundraising assistance and in-kind donations. In the spring of 2019 the Giants hosted nearly 500 victims and first responders at Oracle Park for Opening Day. Representatives from CalFire, Butte County Sheriff's Department, Paradise Emergency Management and others were recognized during a pre-game ceremony to honor their bravery both during the fire and the months of recovery following the destruction. In addition, the Giants hosted the Paradise High School baseball team for their matchup against Union High School at Oracle Park. The school and athletic facilities closed due to damage from the fire and playing a game at Oracle Park offered athletes and their families a place to come together to celebrate their love for the game of baseball and their resilience after losing so much in the devastating fire.

Immediately following the mass shooting at the Gilroy Garlic Festival, the Giants teamed up with members of the Gilroy community to raise \$20k through the sale of "Gilroy Strong" t-shirts at Oracle Park. Representatives from the City of Gilroy were recognized on the field on Strike Out Violence Day where the Gilroy High School Choir performed the National Anthem. The Giants stood with the Gilroy community as they recovered from the senseless act of violence that impacted our fans and neighbors.

The Giants continue to respond to and fulfill many special needs and requests in the community providing experiences to fans confronting illness, experiencing life's milestones and other special circumstances.

Giants employees, from the players to the front office staff are expected to give back to the community and our fans. Players and uniformed personnel do this through developing their own community programs or supporting existing programs in the form of visits and appearances, financial contributions and relaying important messages through videos, press conferences and media interviews. The front office staff supports many of the organization's community initiatives and actively volunteers their time throughout the year.

In 2019, over 52,000 game tickets were donated to more than 400 community groups through the Take Me Out to the Ballgame ticket donation program, which is funded by Giants players, MLB's Commissioner's Community Initiative and MLBPA's Players Give Back. Additionally, autographed items and special field experiences were donated to over 1,300 groups who used them for fundraising purposes.

THE GIANTS MEDIA RELATIONS OFFICE: Located on the second level at Oracle Park behind the press box, the Giants' media relations department can be reached via the media elevator or adjacent stairs from the Field Club (service) level walkway.

ENTRY TO ORACLE PARK: Credentialed media must enter the ballpark through the Media Entrance near O'Doul Gate (next to the Giants Dugout Store) off Third Street, or at the Command Center at 2nd and King Streets.

CREDENTIALS: Credentials will be issued only to legitimate media. Season credentials will be issued only to those news agencies that cover the Giants on a daily basis. All requests for regular season media and photo credentials must be submitted on Major League Baseball's online credential site: <https://credentials.mlb.com>. Media that do not receive full-season Giants credentials may apply for single game credentials. Media will need to apply on the website 48 hours in advance of each game requested. Daily media credentials are subject to availability. All daily media credentials can be picked up at the Credential Distribution Center located at the Lefty O'Doul ticket windows (adjacent to the Dignity Health Center on the Portwalk and adjacent to McCovey Cove). Credentials must be visibly worn at all times.

BOB STEVENS PRESS BOX: The Bob Stevens Press Box is located on the Lower Box level of Oracle Park, directly above Sections 113-117 of the lower bowl seating in the ballpark. The entrance to the press box, situated one level above street level, can be accessed via the media elevator or adjacent stairwell from the Field Club (service) level walkway. The press box is a working area for the news media and no cheering or other distracting noise is permitted at any time. Anyone violating this policy will be asked to leave the premises. Persons without credentials will not be admitted.

HODGES-SIMMONS BROADCAST CENTER: All broadcast booths for live game coverage are located at the Hodges-Simmons Broadcast Center on the Club Level of Oracle Park (one level above the Press Box). From the Field (service) level walkway, take the media elevator or adjacent stairwell to the Club Level to access the broadcast booths. Persons without credentials will not be admitted.

CLUBHOUSES: Both clubhouses are located on the Field Club (service) level of Oracle Park. The Giants' clubhouse is on the third base side, while the visitor's clubhouse is on the first base side. Only credentialed media with clubhouse access will be admitted. Still photographers are not allowed in the clubhouse at any time (pre-game or post-game). TV cameras are permitted in the clubhouse pre-game and post-game. Training and weight rooms, as well as the club dining areas, are closed to everyone except players and club officials. The Giants clubhouse is open beginning three-and-a-half hours prior to game time, and will re-open 10 minutes following the conclusion

of the game. Media may NOT return to the home or visitors clubhouse once the Clubs have taken batting practice. Please do not lounge in the manager’s office or clubhouse during the pre-game period. If you have specific interview requests for a player or coach, we encourage you to contact a member of the Giants’ media relations staff, who will try to accommodate your needs.

FIELD ACCESS: Only credentialed media with field access will be allowed onto the field prior to the game. Due to Oracle Park having the smallest foul territory behind home plate in Major League Baseball, we kindly ask all video and still photographers to stay on the warning track when shooting. All media must clear the field 45 minutes prior to game time. Access to the field is available on the Field Club (service) level only by one of three tunnels: the Giants’ dugout, the visitors’ dugout, or the media tunnel directly behind home plate.

NICK PETERS MEDIA INTERVIEW ROOM: The Nick Peters Media Interview Room is located adjacent to the Giants clubhouse on the Field Club (service) level of the ballpark. The room will be used for media conferences and other special interviews.

POST-GAME PROCEDURES: Manager Gabe Kapler will be available to the media immediately after the game in the Nick Peters Media Interview Room. Please ask any questions of the manager related to the game during this post-game session. Post-game interviews with the manager and players are conducted by media with deadlines and should be limited to game comments. Please do not lounge in the manager’s office or clubhouse, or attempt to conduct feature-length interviews after a game.

SOCIAL MEDIA: In accordance with Major League Baseball guidelines, media are not permitted to use cellular phones, laptops, texting devices or similar portable equipment for Tweeting or transmitting via other social media networks in group settings in clubhouses, dugouts or manager’s office at any time. Digital photography, without the permission of the club media relations director, is prohibited in the clubhouse at all times.

MEDIA DRESS GUIDELINES: MLB and the BBWAA agreed to a set of dress guidelines for members of the media. The guidelines, which emphasize professionalism, will be in effect for the 2020 season. The guidelines will be posted in all media areas.

PHOTO WORKROOM, STILL PHOTO LOCATIONS: The photo workroom and the Giants’ team photographers’ office are located on the Field Club (service) level of the ballpark between both clubhouses. The photographers’ work room for photo transmissions via ethernet lines is located at Section 109 of the service level. A key code from the Giants Photography department is required for entry. Limited photo locations are available at various field level areas, as well as in the TV baskets situated on the Club Level. All still photo locations are reserved by contacting Giants photography department. The Giants’ media relations department requests that all season credentialed photographers use discretion in using their season pass, and ask that you only utilize your credential on a legitimate assignment.

TV PHOTO LOCATIONS: Due to limited photo space, no TV cameras are guaranteed locations on the field level. All still photographers will have priority in these locations. However, TV cameras are welcome if space permits.

LIVE SHOTS: Due to our downtown location, we do not have any ENG truck parking. If your organization plans to transmit ANY live shots from inside Oracle Park, please contact MediaOne Services, which serves as the official broadcast services provider for the Giants and Oracle Park. Please direct your inquiry to Michael Ciabattari via e-mail at michael@mediaonestudios.com or via telephone at (415) 939-1572.

SAM SKINNER MEDIA LOUNGE: The Sam Skinner Media Lounge is located directly behind the broadcast booths on the Club Level. Those media members located in the press box that wish to dine can access the Sam Skinner Media Lounge by taking one flight of stairs up one level. The lounge is open for pre-game meal service beginning two hours prior to game time to accredited media members. Meal service concludes one hour after first pitch. There will be a nominal charge for meals.

LIVE GAME-IN-PROGRESS BROADCASTS: Please be advised that no radio entity is allowed to file live in-game reports from Oracle Park when the Giants host a game in which MLB’s national radio rightsholder, ESPN Radio, is broadcasting. The ESPN Radio window of exclusivity begins 15 minutes prior to first pitch and concludes 15 minutes after the game or when ESPN Radio completes its broadcast, whichever comes first. Live broadcasts by non-rights holders during a game are permitted for the purpose of non play-by-play reporting of scores and game highlights, under the following guidelines: Reports must be confined to between-innings only, limited to 60 seconds in length, and limited to six per game. Radio and TV stringers must notify the Giants media relations department of their plans for such reports. A violation of the above Major League Baseball guidelines may result in the revocation of media credentials.

TELEPHONES: Media wishing to order temporary telephone lines must contact Lena Boswell, Giants telecommunications administrator at (415) 972-1711 or via e-mail at lboswell@sfgiants.com.

BLOGGERS, FREELANCE WRITERS AND PHOTOGRAPHERS: Bloggers, freelance writers and photographers may not request their own credentials. The sports editor or managing editor of a publication employing the blogger or freelancer must apply for credentials on the MLB credential website (see credentials).

WEBSITES: Due to the growth of on-line services and our limited number of press box seats, the Giants will only issue daily credentials to those website personnel affiliated with a major news gathering organization.

MEDIA INFORMATION SITE: All Giants’ game day information (lineups, game notes, stats, releases, etc.) audio/video interviews (English and Spanish) and press box information will be available on GiantsPressbox.com

NO AUTOGRAPHS: Media are not allowed to ask for autographs of uniformed personnel at Oracle Park. Anyone violating this policy will be asked to leave the premises and will have their credential revoked.

Información a los Medios

OFICINA DE RELACIONES PÚBLICAS DE LOS GIGANTES: Está localizada en el segundo piso en Oracle Park detrás del Palco de Prensa. Usted puede llegar al Departamento de Relaciones Públicas de los Gigantes para los Medios de Comunicación por el elevador o las escaleras que están ubicados cerca del túnel de servicio en el nivel Field Club.

ACCESO A ORACLE PARK: Todos los miembros de prensa con acreditación autorizada deben entrar a Oracle Park por la puerta designada para Medios que está ubicada cerca a la taquilla Lefty O'Doul (a un lado de la tienda Giants Dugout) en la calle Third o en el centro de comando entre las calles 2nd y King.

ACREDITACIÓN: Las Credenciales de Temporada le serán otorgadas solamente a medios informativos o agencias de noticias que reportan sobre el equipo a diario. Todos los medios informativos o agencias de noticias que deseen obtener acreditación tienen que someter su solicitud usando el sitio cibernético de Major League Baseball usando la siguiente dirección: <https://credentials.mlb.com>. Los Medios que no reciban acreditación de temporada pueden obtener una credencial para juegos individuales, sujetos a disponibilidad siempre y cuando sean pedidas con 48 horas de anticipación. Todas las credenciales de prensa diarias pueden ser recogidas en el Centro de Distribución de Credenciales situada en las taquillas Lefty O'Doul (adyacentes a Dignity Health Center).

PALCO DE Prensa BOB STEVENS: El Palco de Prensa Bob Stevens está localizado en el nivel Lower Box en Oracle Park, directamente arriba de las secciones 113 a 117. Se puede llegar al Palco de Prensa Bob Stevens por el ascensor o las escaleras que están por el túnel de servicio en el nivel Field Club. El Palco de Prensa es un área de trabajo para los periodistas y no se permiten las porras, vítores, aplausos o cualquier otro ruido que distraiga o impida a los periodistas ejercer su trabajo. Los individuos que no respeten esta regla serán expulsados de inmediato del palco. De hecho, las personas sin credenciales no serán admitidas al palco.

CENTRO DE TRANSMISIÓN HODGES-SIMMONS: Todas las cabinas de radio y televisión para transmisiones en vivo están localizadas en el Centro de Transmisión Hodges-Simmons en el nivel Club Level en Oracle Park (un piso arriba del Palco de Prensa). Se puede llegar al Centro de Transmisión Hodges-Simmons por el ascensor o las escaleras que están por el túnel de servicio en el nivel Field Club. Las personas sin credenciales no serán admitidas a esta área del estadio.

ACCESO A LOS VESTIDORES: Ambos vestidores están localizados en el nivel Field Club de Oracle Park. El vestidor de los Gigantes se encuentra en el lado de la tercera base y el del equipo visitante está en el lado de la primera base. El acceso a los vestidores será permitido sólo a periodistas con la acreditación apropiada. En ningún momento está permitida la entrada al clubhouse de fotógrafos (antes o después de los partidos). Cámaras de televisión si tienen el permiso de ingresar al clubhouse antes y después de los partidos. El cuarto médico y de entrenamiento así como el comedor de los jugadores son áreas que están cerradas para todos, excepto a los jugadores y empleados del club. El vestidor de los Gigantes estará abierto tres horas y media antes de cada partido y reabrirá 10 minutos después del juego. Los periodistas no pueden regresar al vestidor de los Gigantes o al del equipo visitante una vez que los equipos hayan salido a tomar práctica de bateo. Si no está autorizado para hacerlo, por favor no se quede en la oficina del manager o en el vestidor. Si desea hacer una entrevista específica con un pelotero o instructor le pedimos que se ponga en contacto con miembros de Relaciones para los Medios de los Gigantes, quienes harán todo lo posible para facilitar su necesidad.

ACCESO AL CAMPO/TERRENO DE JUEGO: El acceso al terreno de juego será permitido sólo a periodistas con la acreditación oficial antes de los partidos. Debido a que Oracle Park tiene la área más pequeña detrás del home en las Grandes Ligas, se le pide a las cámaras de televisión y fotógrafos que permanezcan en la pista de advertencia o zona de seguridad cuando estén filmando. Todos los miembros de los medios necesitan desalojar el campo 45 minutos antes del comienzo del partido. Se puede llegar al campo por el nivel Field Club solamente por uno de tres túneles: por el dugout de los Gigantes o el del equipo visitante y por el túnel que está directamente detrás del home.

SALA DE ENTREVISTAS NICK PETERS: La Sala de Entrevistas Nick Peters está localizada en el nivel Field Club del estadio, entre home y el vestidor de los Gigantes. Esta Sala de Entrevistas será usada para Conferencias de Prensa y otras entrevistas especiales.

PROCEDIMIENTO DESPUÉS DEL PARTIDO: El piloto Gabe Kapler estará disponible inmediatamente después de cada partido en la Sala de Entrevistas Nick Peters. Esta es su oportunidad de hacer preguntas con respecto al juego de ese día o noche. Las entrevistas con el manager y los peloteros deben de ser llevadas a cabo por reporteros que tienen que respetar un plazo de tiempo para ejecutar sus funciones. Por favor no se quede en la oficina del manager o el vestidor y no trate de hacer entrevistas largas después del juego.

MEDIOS SOCIALES: Conforme a las reglas de Major League Baseball, no se le permite el uso de teléfonos móviles, laptop, equipos para escribir texto o usar aparatos similares para enviar tweets o transmitir a otros medios sociales mientras esté el vestidor, clubhouse o en la oficina del manager. Las fotos digitales sin el permiso de un miembro de Relaciones para los Medios están completamente prohibidas en el Clubhouse o vestidor.

CÓDIGO DE VESTIMENTA: MLB y BBWAA se han puesto de acuerdo en un Código de Vestimenta para todos los miembros de prensa. La directriz, la cual enfatiza el profesionalismo, fue puesta en vigor desde la temporada 2020. Las reglas al respecto están delineadas y a la vista de todos en las áreas para los miembros de prensa.

CUARTO OSCURO, LUGAR PARA LOS FOTÓGRAFOS: El cuarto oscuro y la oficina de fotógrafos del equipo de los Gigantes se encuentran en el Field Club en el nivel de servicio entre los vestidores de los equipos. La sala de trabajo de los fotógrafos para las transmisiones de fotos a través de líneas Ethernet se encuentra en la Sección 109 del nivel de servicio. Se requiere un código del departamento de Fotografía de Gigantes para ingresar. Las ubicaciones limitadas de fotos están disponibles en varias áreas de nivel de campo, así como en las canastas de TV ubicadas en el Nivel Club. Todas las ubicaciones de fotos fijas se reservan contactando al departamento de fotografía de Gigantes. El departamento de relaciones con los medios de los Gigantes solicita que todos los fotógrafos acreditados de temporada utilicen su discreción para usar su pase de temporada y que solo utilice su credencial en una asignación legítima.

LUGAR PARA TV/FOTOS: Debido al espacio limitado, las cámaras de televisión no tienen garantizado un espacio en el campo. Todos los fotógrafos tendrán prioridad.

TOMAS EN VIVO: Debido a que el estadio se encuentra en el centro de la ciudad, no tenemos estacionamiento para los camiones con satélite. Si su organización tiene planes de hacer una transmisión en directo adentro de Oracle Park, por favor comuníquese con MediaOne Services, proveedor oficial para transmisiones en vivo de los Gigantes en Oracle Park. Diríjase a Michael Clabattari por email a michael@m1sf.com o por teléfono al (415) 939-1572.

COMEDOR DE Prensa SAM SKINNER: El comedor Sam Skinner está localizado directamente detrás de las cabinas de narración en el Club Level. Los periodistas que se encuentren en el Palco de Prensa y deseen ingerir alimentos pueden dirigirse al Comedor Sam Skinner por las escaleras al tercer piso. El comedor estará abierto dos horas antes de cada partido. El comedor cierra una hora después del primer lanzamiento. Hay un cobro mínimo especificado por la comida.

TRANSMISIONES EN VIVO: Se advierte que ninguna radio está permitida a hacer reportajes en vivo durante los juegos en Oracle Park cuando los Gigantes sean anfitriones y el partido sea transmitido nacionalmente por la cadena ESPN. La ventana de exclusividad para la cadena ESPN comienza 15 minutos antes del primer lanzamiento y concluye 15 minutos después que termine el juego o cuando ESPN concluya su transmisión. Reportes en vivo de estaciones de radio sin derechos de exclusividad están permitidos sólo para informar del marcador o jugadas relevantes y no para describir la acción bajo las siguientes reglas: los reportajes deben hacerse sólo entre innings, limitados a 60 segundos y seis por juego. Los reporteros de radio y televisión tienen que informarle de antemano al Departamento de Relaciones para Medios sobre sus planes para dichos reportes. La violación a esta regla de MLB puede resultar en la suspensión de la respectiva credencial.

TELÉFONOS: Los medios que quieran ordenar servicio de teléfono temporal tienen que ponerse en contacto con Lena Boswell, la administradora de telecomunicaciones para los Gigantes al (415) 972-1711 o por email al lboswell@sfgiants.com.

REPORTEROS Y FOTÓGRAFOS INDEPENDIENTES: Los reporteros y fotógrafos independientes no pueden solicitar su propia acreditación. El Director de Deportes o el gerente de la publicación a la cual representan tienen que hacer la solicitud por escrito en papel membretado de la compañía para los juegos específicos con por lo menos 48 horas de anticipación.

SITIO WEB: Debido al gran número de sitios cibernéticos y el espacio limitado en el Palco de Prensa los Gigantes sólo le otorgarán credenciales a aquellos sitios que estén asociados con una organización informativa legítima.

LUGAR CON INFORMACIÓN PARA LOS MEDIOS: Toda la información del juego (notas, alineaciones, estadísticas, comunicados de prensa, etc.), video y audio de entrevistas en inglés y español están disponibles en el sitio de la web de los Gigantes (GiantsPressBox.com).

PROHIBIDA ABSOLUTAMENTE LA PETICIÓN DE AUTÓGRAFOS: Los miembros de la prensa tienen terminantemente prohibido pedir autógrafos en Oracle Park. Cualquiera que viole esta regla se le pedirá que desaloje el estadio y su credencial será suspendida.
