## HISTORY OF THE ROYALS

## 1968

January 11 - Ewing M. Kauffman becomes the first owner of the expansion Kansas City franchise, paying $\$ 5.3$ million.

March 21 - Board of Directors selects the name "Royals" from more than 17,000 suggestions.
April 4 - Kansas City agrees to co-op with minor league team in Dubuque (lowa), beginning their farm system.

April 25 - Gerald Lyscio becomes the first player to sign with the Royals.
June 6 - KC selects 25 players in baseball's Free Agent Draft.
July 11 - Ground is broken for Truman Sports Complex.
$\stackrel{L}{4}$ September 9 - Joe Gordon is named first manager in club history.
$\Leftrightarrow$ October 15 - Kansas City selects 30 players in Expansion Draft.

1969
April 1 - Royals obtain Lou Piniella from the Seattle Pilots.

April 8 - Royals win first-ever game, 4-3, in 12 innings over the Twins.
July 16 - Ellie Rodriguez becomes the first Royal selected to an All-Star Game.

October 8 - Charlie Metro named manager.
November 26 - Lou Piniella named AL Rookie of the Year.

## 1970

January 20-Ground is broken for the team's minor league complex and Baseball Academy in Sarasota, Fla.

June 9 - Bob Lemon named manager.

## 1971

Le September 18 - The Royals defeat the Twins, $4-2$, securing their 81st win and their first winning record in 161-game season.

## 1972

$\leadsto$ October 3 - Jack McKeon named manager.



## 1973

April 10 - Royals Stadium opens with a 12-1 win over the Texas Rangers.

April 27 - Steve Busby hurls the first no-hitter in franchise history at Detroit.

June 12 - Frank White, a future Royals Hall of Famer and eight-time Gold Glove winner, becomes the first Royals Academy graduate to make the Majors.
July 24 - The NL defeats the AL, 7-1, in the MLB All-Star Game at Royals Stadium.
August 2 - George Brett makes his debut and collects first hit.

September 26 - Paul Splittorff beats the White Sox, 6-2, to become the Royals' first 20-game winner.

## 1974

June 19 - In Milwaukee, Steve Busby becomes the first pitcher in ML history to record nohitters in each of his first two seasons.

## 1975

July 24 - Whitey Herzog named manager.

## 1976

October 1 - Royals win first AL West title when California eliminates Oakland, 2-O.

October 3 - George Brett goes 3-for-4 on season's final day to win first batting title.

## 1977

May 14 - Jim Colborn tosses no-hitter against the Texas Rangers-the first by a Royal in KC.
August 31-September 15 - Royals put together a club-record 16-game winning streak.
September 29 - Royals win 100th game and finish with 102.

## 1978

October 6 - George Brett blasts three home runs in Game 3 of the ALCS at New York, but the Royals lose the game and the series.

1979
October 24 - Jim Frey named manager.


1980
Uuly 18-August 18 - George Brett sets a franchise record, hitting in 30-straight games.

August 17 - Brett goes 4-for-4 against Toronto, moving over the .400 mark. Brett goes on to win second batting title at 390 .
October 10 - Brett hits a three-run home run in the seventh inning at Yankee Stadium to send the Royals to their first World Series; Dan Quisenberry strikes out Willie Randolph for the final out.
October 17 - The Royals play the first World Series game ever in Kansas City, beating the Phillies, 4-3, in 10 innings.

October 18 - Willie Aikens hits two homers in Game 4 of the World Series, tying the series at two games apiece.

## 1981

Hugust 31 - Dick Howser named manager.
October 5 - Royals win second half and advance to AL Division Series.

October 8 - Joe Burke named president and John Schuerholz named general manager.

## 1982

July 13 - Five players represent the Royals in All-Star game in Montreal as well as manager Dick Howser and trainer Mickey Cobb.
$\leftrightharpoons$ August 24 - John Wathan breaks record for most steals by a catcher.

## 1983

May 17 - Avron Fogelman purchases 49 percent of the club.

Uuly 24 - George Brett hits infamous "Pine Tar" home run off the Yankees' Goose Gossage. The Royals would complete the win on Aug. 18.

## 1984

April 4 - Bret Saberhagen becomes the youngest Royal, debuting at 19 years, 359 days old.

May 7-George Brett signs "lifetime" contract.

## 1985

October 5 - Willie Wilson's RBI single wins the AL West for Kansas City.

October 11 - George Brett goes 4-for-4, hitting two homers including a game-tying two-run shot, and makes several sparkling plays in the field as KC knocks off Toronto, 6-5, in ALCS Game 3.

October 16 - Jim Sundberg's 3-run triple highlights a four-run sixth as KC defeats the Blue Jays, 6-2, in Game 7 and heads to its second World Series.

October 22 - Frank White hits a two-run home run as the Royals take Game 3 of the World Series, 6-1, trimming St. Louis' lead to 2-1.
October 26 - In the most famous inning in team history, the Royals score two runs in the bottom of the ninth on Dane lorg's two-run single, tying the series at three games apiece.

October 27 - The Royals win their first World Series title, defeating the Cardinals, 11-0, in Game 7. Bret Saberhagen pitches a five-hitter, while Darryl Motley homers and catches the final out.

## 1986

April 12 - After missing nearly three seasons because of an injury, Dennis Leonard hurls a three-hit shutout against Toronto.
June 7 - Amos Otis and Steve Busby are inaugural inductees into Royals Hall of Fame.
July 15 - Frank White homers as AL wins AllStar Game in Houston, 3-2. It is Dick Howser's final game as manager.

September 14 - Bo Jackson hits his first Major League home run, an estimated 475-foot blast, the longest in the history of the stadium, at the time.



1987
February 23 - Dick Howser steps down as manager due to cancer.
May 30 - Paul Splittorff and Cookie Rojas inducted into Royals Hall of Fame.

June 17 - Dick Howser passes away.
July $\mathbf{3}$ - Dick Howser's number 10 is retired and he is inducted into Royals Hall of Fame.
August 27 - John Wathan named manager.
September 28 - Kevin Seitzer becomes just the 13 th rookie to record 200 hits in a season.

## 1988

August 27 - Mark Gubicza strikes out a then Royals-record 14 Minnesota Twins. Zack Greinke tops him nearly 21 years later to the day.

September 26 - Gubicza earns win No. 20 vs. Seattle.

## 1989

June 5 - Bo Jackson nails Harold Reynolds at the plate in the 10th inning with an amazing throw, cutting off what would have been the winning run.

July 8 - Hal McRae and Dennis Leonard inducted into Royals Hall of Fame.

July 11 - Bo Jackson homers and is named MVP of All-Star Game in Anaheim.

September 30 - Bret Saberhagen wins his team-record 23rd game.
$\leadsto$ November 15 - Saberhagen wins second career Cy Young Award.

## 1990

August 7 - Brian McRae triples in his Major League debut. Brian and Hal become the first father-son duo to play for the Royals.
October 3 - George Brett finishes the season hitting .329, winning his third batting title in three different decades.

October 10 - Herk Robinson named general manager.

1991
May 23 - Hal McRae named manager.
August 26 - Bret Saberhagen throws the Royals' fourth no-hitter, topping the White Sox, 7-0.

## 1992

May 12 - Royals president Joe Burke dies of cancer at the age of 68. Later that season, he's inducted into Royals Hall of Fame.
September 30 - George Brett picks up hit \#3,000 off the Angels' Tim Fortugno in Anaheim. He is picked off a batter later.

## 1993

May 23 - Ewing Kauffman inducted into Royals Hall of Fame.

July 2 - Royals Stadium is officially re-named Kauffman Stadium in honor of owner Ewing Kauffman, who passes away less than a month later on Aug. 1.
$\Perp$ September 29 - George Brett plays his final game in Kansas City.

## 1994

May 14-George Brett's number 5 is retired and he is inducted into the Royals' Hall of Fame
July 23-August 5 - The Royals win 14 in a row and move within striking distance of first place. The season ends less than a week later due to the players' strike.

October 7 - Bob Boone named manager
October 19 - Bob Hamelin named AL Rookie of the Year.

October 25 - David Cone named AL Cy Young Award winner

## 1995

March 17 - The Royals' First Lady, Muriel Kauffman, passes away
April 7 - The Royals play on a grass field at Kauffman Stadium for the first time.

May 2 - Frank White's number 20 is retired.

## 1996

May 19 - Muriel Kauffman inducted in Royals Hall of Fame.

August 3 - John Mayberry inducted into Royals Hall of Fame.

## 1997

July 9 - Tony Muser named manager.
Le September 18 - Jay Bell hits his 21st and final home run of the season, a KC record for a shortstop.

## 1998

September 14 - Carlos Beltrán makes his debut at 21 years old and singles in first at bat.

## 1999

July 25 - George Brett is inducted into Baseball's Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, N.Y. Brett received 98.2 percent of the votes, the sixth-highest mark ever.
August 25 - Jeff Montgomery records his 300th career save.

## 2000

March 14 - Board of Directors announces David Glass will become the Royals' second full-time owner.

April 28 - David Glass officially becomes owner.
October 1 - Royals set club records in runs (879), hits $(1,644)$ and average (.288).

## 2001

October 7-Six Royals reach double figures in home runs, led by Mike Sweeney, who hits a career-high 29.

## 2002

September 25 - Mike Sweeney enters the final weekend neck-and-neck with Manny Ramirez for the batting crown. Sweeney misses out, but still records second-highest mark (.340) in KC history.

## 2003

February 27 - Royals and Rangers play the first game at their new spring facility in Surprise, Ariz.

March 31-April 12 - Royals open season with nine consecutive wins.

November 11 - Angel Berroa wins the AL Rookie of the Year.

## 2004

April 5 - Trailing Chicago 7-3 entering the bottom of the ninth, KC scores six runs including a game-tying three-run homer by Mendy Lopez and a game-winning homer by Carlos Beltrán to win, 9-7.

- June 24-Royals acquire Mark Teahen and John Buck in a three-team trade for Carlos Beltrán.

August 8 - Denny Matthews inducted into Royals Hall of Fame.

September 9 - The Royals set a club record scoring 26 runs in the first game of a doubleheader in Detroit.

## 2005

- May 31 - Buddy Bell named manager.

August 13 - Bret Saberhagen inducted into Royals Hall of Fame.

## 2006

April 4 - The citizens of Jackson County pass a proposition that paves for the way for major renovations of Kauffman Stadium

May 30 - Dayton Moore is named General Manager.

」une 6 - Luke Hochevar becomes the Royals' first No. 1 overall pick.

上 July 21 - Mark Gubicza inducted into Royals Hall of Fame.

November 2-Mark Grudzielanek is named the Rawlings Gold Glove winner at second base.

2007
July 29 - Denny Matthews is honored with the Ford C. Frick Award during induction ceremonies at Cooperstown.
October 3 - Groundbreaking for Kauffman Stadium renovations.

October 19-Trey Hillman named manager.

## 2008

June 28 - Art Stewart inducted into Royals Hall of Fame.

4 July 12 - Second baseman Mark Grudzielanek records hit No. 2,000 against the Mariners. Later in the game, David DeJesus hits a 2-run, 2-out walk-off home run to send the Royals to the 5-4 win.

## 2009

$\Leftrightarrow$ April 10 - The newly-renovated Kauffman Stadium is dedicated
$\Leftrightarrow$ September 26 - Billy Butler collects his 50th double, becoming the fifth player in MLB history to reach 50 doubles and 20 homers in a season before the age of 24 .
November 17 - Zack Greinke wins the AL Cy Young Award, joining Bret Saberhagen (1985, 1989) and David Cone (1994) as the only Royals pitchers to do so. Greinke led MLB with a 2.16 ERA.


## 2010

May 13 - Ned Yost named manager.
Uune 16 - Commissioner Bud Selig announces from the field that Kauffman Stadium will be the site of the 2012 MLB All-Star Game.
August 13 - Closer Joakim Soria, who earlier was named to his second career All-Star Game, saves his 25th consecutive game, a Royals record. Soria would go on to extend his streak to 36 straight.

## 2011

August 2-2012 All-Star logo unveiled.
September 15 - Melky Cabrera hits his 40th double as an outfielder, joining Jeff Francoeur and Alex Gordon as the first trio of outfield teammates in MLB history with 40 doubles.
$\because$ November 1 - Left fielder Alex Gordon wins his first Rawlings Gold Glove.

## 2012

- July 10 - The NL defeats the AL, 8-0, in the 83 rd MLB All-Star Game at Kauffman Stadium.

October 30-Left fielder Alex Gordon wins his second consecutive Rawlings Gold Glove

November 8 - DH Billy Butler wins an American League Silver Slugger. He will also win the Edgar Martinez Outstanding DH Award later in the offseason.

## 2013

Huly 16 - Salvador Perez, Alex Gordon and Greg Holland are selected to the All-Star Game at Citi Field.
September 22 - Justin Maxwell hits a walk-off grand slam in the 10th inning to beat Texas, 4-0, giving KC its most home wins (44) since 1992.
October 29 - Alex Gordon, Eric Hosmer and Salvador Perez win Rawlings Gold Glove Awards. Gordon becomes the first Royal to win threestraight awards since Frank White (1977-82).

## 2014

Huly 6 - Alex Gordon, Greg Holland and Salvador Perez are once again All-Stars at Target Field in Minneapolis.
$H$ September 26-On a cool night in Chicago, the Royals clinch their first postseason berth since 1985 with a 3-1 victory over the White Sox.

- September 30-The Royals rally from a four-run deficit for an exhilarating 9-8, 12-inning triumph over Oakland in the AL Wild Card Game.
Uctober 15 - The Royals finish off a four-game sweep of the Baltimore Orioles in the American League Championship Series with a 2-1 victory.
- October 28 - Yordano Ventura tosses 7.0 scoreless innings vs. the Giants as the Royals force a deciding game in the World Series with a 10-0 win.

Hovember 3 - Alex Gordon, Eric Hosmer and Salvador Perez are named Rawlings Gold Glove winners. Gordon is honored as the club's first Platinum Glove winner.


## 2015

April 13 - Kansas City wins its first seven games of the season, marking the Royals' longest winning streak to open the year since 2003.

Hune 18 - Ned Yost becomes the winningest manager in franchise history, earning his 411th victory with the club in Kansas City's 3-2 triumph over Milwaukee.

Huly 14 - The Royals send a franchise-record seven players to the Midsummer Classic in Cincinnati, with four - Salvador Perez, Alcides Escobar, Lorenzo Cain and Alex Gordon named starters for the AL. Gordon does not play due to injury.

- September 24-Kansas City clinches its first Central Division title with a 10-4 win over the visiting Mariners. KC's 95 regular-season wins are the third-most in franchise history and top total in 35 years.

October 12 - The Royals rally from a fourrun deficit in the eighth inning to stave off elimination in Game 4 of the AL Division Series in Houston, 9-6. KC goes on to win the series in a decisive fifth game two days later.

November 1 - Despite trailing 2-0 after eight, the Royals rally for a 7-2 win in 12 innings to clinch the second World Championship in franchise history. Salvador Perez is named World Series MVP.

4 November 3 - More than 800,000 fans show up to celebrate with the 2015 World Series champions at a parade through downtown Kansas City.

- November 10 - Alcides Escobar, Eric Hosmer and Salvador Perez all win Rawlings Gold Gloves, marking the third-straight season that KC has had three honorees.


## 2016

$\triangle$ July 12 - Eric Hosmer becomes the second Royal to earn All-Star MVP honors, after he and teammate Salvador Perez connect for back-toback home runs in the Midsummer Classic in San Diego. Wade Davis and Kelvin Herrera are also selected to the game.
August 1 - Danny Duffy fans 16 Rays hitters over 8.0 scoreless innings to set a single-game franchise record. He allows just one hit in his 8.0 shutout frames.

November 8 - Salvador Perez is awarded his fourth consecutive Rawlings Gold Glove. He's the third Royals player to win a Gold Glove in four consecutive seasons.

## 2017

USanuary 22 - The Royals mourn the tragic death of pitcher Yordano Ventura, who passes away in a car accident in his native Dominican Republic.

July 10 - Mike Moustakas becomes the third Royal to participate in the Home Run Derby, slugging 10 in a first-round loss to Minnesota's Miguel Sano.

July 11 - Mike Moustakas, Salvador Perez and Jason Vargas all play in the 88th MLB All-Star Game in Miami. It's the fifth-straight year KC places at least three players on the AL squad.
$\Leftrightarrow$ September 20 - Mike Moustakas crushes his 37th home run of the season at Rogers Centre, breaking the club's single-season record previously held by Steve Balboni.
$\Leftrightarrow$ November 7 - Alex Gordon and Eric Hosmer are honored with Rawlings Gold Glove Awards. It's Gordon's fifth award, while Hosmer is honored for the fourth time.

## 2018

March 29 - Kansas City embarked on its 50th season, hosting the Chicago White Sox on Opening Day.

Huly 17-Salvador Perez makes his fifth-straight start in an All-Star game, serving as the American League's catcher at the Midsummer Classic in Washington, D.C.

September 8 - Recently acquired Jorge López retires the first 24 Minnesota Twins he faces, before walking the leadoff hitter in the ninth. López becomes the first Royal to take a perfect game into the ninth inning, helping KC to a 4-1 win at Target Field.

November 4 - Alex Gordon and Salvador Perez are honored with Rawlings Gold Glove Awards, giving Kansas City a Major League-best 16 award winners since 2011.

## 2019

April 10-Whit Merrifield extends his hitting streak to a franchise-record 31 games, collecting a game-tying RBI bunt single in the seventh inning vs. Seattle. The streak, which began on Sept. 10, 2018, topped George Brett's previous record from 1980 by one.

U June 13 - Kansas City downs division rival Detroit, 7-3, at TD Ameritrade Park in Omaha, Neb., in the Royals' first regular season neutral site affair. Creighton University product, Nicky Lopez, puts KC on the board with his first Major League homer in the second inning.

August 30-The Glass Family announces that it has agreed to sell the Royals to Kansas City businessman John Sherman and a group of local investors.
-September 3 - Jorge Soler clubs his 39th home run of the season to establish a franchise record, topping Mike Moustakas' total from two years earlier. Soler would become the first Royal to lead the American League in homers, finishing with 48.
September 23 - After serving as manager for 10 seasons, Ned Yost announces he will retire at the end of the season. He finishes the season with 746 victories with the Royals, which are the most in franchise history.

$\because$ October 31 - Mike Matheny named 17th full-time manager in franchise history.

November 3-Outfielder Alex Gordon wins his seventh Rawlings Gold Glove Award, which trail only Frank White's eight for most by a Royal.
November 26 - John Sherman and his partners finalize the purchase of the ballclub, becoming the franchise's third ownership group.

## 2020

March 12 - Major League Baseball puts a halt on the 2020 season due to the Covid- 19 pandemic. The Royals' last 13 exhibition games are cancelled as well as the first three months of the regular season.

July 24 - Kansas City plays its latest season opener, falling 2-0 in Cleveland.
$\triangle$ September 24 - Outfielder Alex Gordon announces his retirement from baseball. His 14-year career with only the Royals is the thirdlongest in franchise history by a position player, behind George Brett (21 years) and Frank White (18 years).
November 4 - Alex Gordon puts the final touch on his brilliant career, earning his eighth Rawlings Gold Glove and second Platinum Glove. His eight Gold Gloves match Frank White for most in franchise history, while he's the third position player to win a Gold Glove in his final season.
$\leftrightharpoons$ December 10 - Salvador Perez wraps up an impressive run of awards, earning his third Louisville Silver Slugger, the American League Comeback Player of the Year and is named First Team All-MLB.

## KAUFFMAN STADIUM

The Kansas City Royals will celebrate their 49th season at Kauffman Stadium in 2021. Kauffman has always been one of the crown jewel ballparks of Major League Baseball. Having hosted $84,977,012$ fans since 1973, 'The K' with its signature look, has proudly stood the test of time.

In 2019, the Royals replaced the original foul poles that had stood at the ballpark since the first game in 1973. Netting was also extended to cover the entirety of foul territory.

The Royals drew over 2 million fans to the park three seasons in a row (2015-17), something that hadn't been accomplished in three-straight years since the club did it in seven consecutive seasons, from 1985-91. 'The K' has played host to two World Series and an All-Star Game over the past nine seasons.

After years of planning and design, the Royals unveiled an exciting $\$ 250$ million renovation of this true Kansas City landmark prior to the 2009 season. Visitors enjoy an improved Kauffman Stadium experience with unsurpassed amenities and state-of-the-art technology that touches each and every fan entering the park.

At the end of 2020, updates were made to the video board, making it the tallest LED video display in baseball. The display will now show 3.5 million pixels allowing more contrast and a clearer picture.

Upon entering, fans have a chance to explore the stadium via a 360-degree expanded concourse while still keeping tabs on the action on the field. With 74 concession stands and 67 restroom facilities, time spent away from their seats is limited.

Fans who want a field level view of the action can sit in the CommunityAmerica Crown Club, behind home plate, or in one of four field-level suites, located down the line from both the home and visiting dugouts.

Introduced in 2016, Craft \& Draft featuring Boulevard Brewing Company is a unique approach to the social experience of baseball located in the left field corner of The K on the Loge Level. The area replaced the former . 390 Bar and Grill. The dining area provides 24 beers on tap and 50 bottled beers as well as a menu that takes a handcrafted approach to gastro pub fare with an emphasis on fresh and local ingredients.

The Outfield Experience provides the fans with entertainment for all ages. In addition, the views of the field are spectacular and give fans several photographic locations to watch a game. Unveiled in 2012 was the largest in-stadium solar array in MLB as part of an energy partnership with Evergy. At the time, the array was the largest in MLB. The 120 panels on the Outfield Experience canopy provide approximately $36,000 \mathrm{kWh}$ of renewable energy each year.

The renovation also created the Outfield Box seats in leftcenter field, which sit directly behind the outfield wall and in front of the world-famous fountains. Those seats hug

the newly renovated Miller Lite Fountain Bar, which is built on the old JumboTron base. The expanded area offer a variety of unique amenities, including two group areas, lawn/tailgate games, and photo opportunities.

In front of the fountains in left-center are the Sonic Slam seats. Right-center field offers a "standing room only" area between the outfield wall and the fountains, called the Pepsi Party Porch. This area is most popular on hot summer days and nights since, at times, they are in the "splash zone" of the iconic fountains.

The left-field area is home to the 7,000-square foot Royals Hall of Fame, presented by Commerce Bank, which opened in 2009. The Hall of Fame features numerous exciting and interactive exhibits as well as memorabilia that will delight Royals fans. Prior to the 2021 season, the digital board on the Hall of Fame was upgraded, making it five times taller than the board that was previously there.

Behind the Hall of Fame, fans will find the kids area complete with the Price Chopper Little K with a field turf surface. In addition, there is state-of-the-art batting and pitching cages, the New Era Cap Store, five holes of mini-golf at the Sluggerrr's Putt-Putt, a Royals-themed carousel, the base run, and several kids-friendly food options, including Belfonte's Ice Cream Shop.

Also in left field is the set for the Royals' official pre- and post-game show, Royals Live on Bally Sports Kansas City. Throughout the season, broadcasters Joel Goldberg and Jeff Montgomery will host shows from this set.

Fans move along the outfield "Walk of Fame" toward Sweet Baby Rays BBQ and the Rivals restaurant in right field, which boasts Baseline Bar and the Blue Moon Taproom, which features specialty beers that can only be found at Kauffman Stadium, or at the Blue Moon Brewery in Colorado. Next to Rivals you will find the Price Chopper Patio which offers a unique view of the game for groups of 40-60 people located just above the iconic Kauffman Stadium Fountains.

The third level, or ground level of the stadium, features wider concourses, fan amenities, the Konica Minolta Diamond Club premium seating area, and a 5,000-square foot retail store. On the third base side of the Konica Minolta Diamond Club, the Craft Cocktail Bar, presented by Kansas City's own Restless Spirits Distilling Company, offers a variety of innovative and refreshing cocktails to both the Konica Minolta Diamond Club members as well as fans on the main concourse.

The Loge Level has several suite options to fit any budget while the View Level (upper deck) has been completely renovated to include wider concourses, a food court, new concessions, new restrooms, and a retail store.

With the innovative renovations, Kauffman Stadium has become a breathtaking fusion of energetic surroundings and an intimate place to watch Royals Baseball.

## THE HISTORY OF KAUFFMAN STADIUM

Opened as Royals Stadium on April 10, 1973, Kauffman is recognized throughout baseball as one of the game's most beautiful ballparks. Since then, many exciting games have been contested, including the 1973 and 2012 All-Star Games, three no-hitters, and playoff games in 1976, '77, '78, '80, '81, '84, '85, 2014 and '15, with 13 World Series games in 1980, 1985, 2014, and 2015. The facility was officially renamed in honor of Ewing M. Kauffman in a ceremony at the stadium on July 2, 1993.

Before the 2004 season, the outfield fences in the gaps and in straight-away center field were moved back 10 feet to their original dimensions of 387 and 410, respectively, making Kauffman Stadium one of the most spacious parks in Major League Baseball. In addition, the warning track was changed to a natural surface, and the height of the fence is now at eight feet. The fences were moved in 10 feet from bullpen to bullpen prior to the 1995 season and lowered from 12 feet to nine feet. Also at that time, a grass playing field replaced the artificial surface at Kauffman Stadium.

Kauffman Stadium's unique features include a a 322foot wide water spectacular. The water spectacular is the largest privately funded fountain in the world. In keeping with the architecture of the stadium, the existing water spectacular featuring cascading water now extends near the left field corner.

Prior to the 1999 campaign, additional field level seating, known as "Crown Seats" and four dugout suites were added.

The renaming of the stadium was appropriate in that it was the strength and integrity of Ewing M. Kauffman's ownership that provided the cornerstone for the Royals success.


## Ewing Kauffman

 Kauffman purchased the club as an expansion franchise in 1968 with the primary and continuous motivation of providing winning Major League Baseball for Kansas Citians.Kauffman founded Marion Laboratories in his mother's basement and built it into a diversified health care company. "Mr. K" also gave much personal attention to the Kansas City community, an important philosophy that was ingrained into the Royals' organization and still remains today.

Among the awards Mr. Kauffman won for his leadership include the Kansas City Press Club's 1973 Man of the Year, an induction into the Missouri Sports Hall of Fame and being named one of 20 finalists for enshrinement in the Baseball Hall of Fame in 2008. Mr. K passed away on August 1, 1993.

## Kg JOHN SHERMAN <br> CHAIRMAN AND CEO

On August 30, 2019, John J. Sherman reached an agreement to purchase the Kansas City Royals from the Glass family, officially becoming the franchise's third owner on November 25, 2019. Having lived in Kansas City for over 40 years, Mr. Sherman has been an entrepreneur, civic leader, and philanthropist who is extensively involved in the business, civic, and philanthropic communities in the region.
Prior to his purchase of the Royals, Mr. Sherman served as a Vice Chairman and minority ownership partner of the Cleveland Indians, beginning on August 19, 2016. During his three-plus seasons with Cleveland, he was active in the management of the ball club and was also active on Major League Baseball's Audit Committee.

He has been responsible for establishing two successful businesses in Kansas City. His first startup, LPG Services Group, grew rapidly and merged with Dynergy (NYSE: DYN) in 1996. Mr. Sherman later founded Inergy L.P., which went public in 2001. He led Inergy through a period of tremendous growth, merging it with Crestwood Holdings in 2013, and continues to serve on the board of (now) Crestwood Equity Partners (NYSE: CEQP).

Mr. Sherman was recognized as an Ernst \& Young Entrepreneur of the Year in 2002 and later inducted into the 2014 inaugural class of the University of Missouri-Kansas City (UMKC) Bloch School of Business Entrepreneurs Hall of Fame with a group that included Ewing Kauffman - the original owner of the Royals - and Lamar Hunt, a founder of the American Football League (AFL) and original owner of the Kansas City Chiefs.
John and his wife, Marny, reside in Kansas City, Missouri. The couple is active in numerous charitable efforts with heavy involvement in educational opportunities for the underserved. He is a past Chair of the Board of Directors for both the Civic Council of Greater Kansas City and The Truman Presidential Library Institute. He currently sits on the Board of Directors for the Civic Council, UMKC Foundation and Teach for America Kansas City, while also serving as a trustee of the Kauffman Foundation and the National World War I Museum.

Mr. Sherman earned his degree from nearby Ottawa University (Kan.), where he played quarterback for the Braves' football team.



## KC BROOKS SHERMAN <br> SR. VICE PRESIDENT-CHIEF OPERATING OFFICER

R. Brooks Sherman, Jr. (no relation to Mr. John Sherman) serves as the Sr. Vice President-Chief Operating Officer overseeing business operations and administration. Brooks also serves in a financial advisory role with Royal Blue Equity, LLC, the entity comprised of the Kansas City-based investment group formed to purchase the Kansas City Royals. He served in a similar capacity from 2016-19 as part of John Sherman's minority ownership in the Cleveland Indians.

From December 2000 to June 2013, Brooks served as Chief Financial Officer, and ultimately President, of Inergy, L.P. and its affiliates, including two additional publicly traded Master Limited Partnerships. Prior to its merger with Crestwood Midstream Partners, L.P. in 2013, Inergy had achieved total enterprise value of nearly $\$ 5$ billion through its ownership and management of growth oriented natural gas storage and transportation infrastructure and retail propane distribution businesses. He began his career as a CPA in public accounting with KPMG and Ernst \& Young before spending 17 years in executive accounting and finance roles with publicly-traded finance and energy companies.

Brooks earned his Bachelor of Science degree in accounting from Missouri State University in 1988.

He and his wife, Carol, live in Leawood, Kansas, and have three sons: Nick, Alex \& Hank.

She most recently worked for Fox, creating and managing the Brand Partnership Team. SR. VP-BASEBALL OPERATIONS/GENERAL MANAGER
Dayton Moore is in his 15th full season with the Kansas City Royals in 2021 after being named Sr. Vice President-Baseball Operations/General Manager on May 30, 2006. He officially assumed his duties, becoming the sixth general manager in franchise history, on June 8, 2006.

From day one, the goal Moore set out to accomplish was bringing a World Championship back to Kansas City, a dream that was brought to fruition in 2015. The Royals bested the New York Mets in five games to win the franchise's first World Series in 30 years. The club became just the fourth since 1997 to reach the World Series in back-to-back seasons after falling to the San Francisco Giants in the 2014 Fall Classic.
Despite a 2020 season that was shortened by the COVID-19 pandemic, Kansas City continued to make strides. Under first-year manager Mike Matheny, the Royals enjoyed a strong finish to the season, going 12-6 in their final 18 games, with series wins over playoff clubs, Cleveland and St. Louis. KC's final month of the season was highlighted by outstanding performances from young homegrown talent, fueling optimism for the 2021 campaign.

Moore's tenure in Kansas City has been one of the most successful runs in franchise history as the Royals have boasted 18 Rawlings Gold Glove Awards, 28 All-Star Game selections, six Silver Sluggers and a Cy Young Award winner. Since he took over as general manager in 2006, no Major League club has earned more Rawlings Gold Gloves, while KC's run of 10 -straight years with at least one Gold Glove winner is the longest active streak in the American League and second longest in the Majors, behind Colorado's 11.

The 2015 season was one for the ages as Kansas City stormed to their

Allard Baird . . . . . . . . . . 2006-present first AL Central Division title, winning an American League-best 95 games, their highest total since 1980. The club became just the second in Major League history to improve its win total in six-straight seasons. Along the way, the Royals set records in attendance, drawing 2.7 million fans to their 81 home games; local television viewership, recording an MLB-best 12.3 household rating during the 2015 season; and All-Star Game selections, sending seven players to the Midsummer Classic, which included four players who were selected as starters.

Moore has received several accolades over the last seven years, being named to the Kansas Baseball Hall of Fame and the Kansan of the Year in 2014. He has also been tabbed "Executive of the Year" by Major League Baseball (GIBBY Awards) in both 2014 and 2015 and earned the same distinction from the Kansas City Sports Commission in 2015. He was also recognized by the Boys \& Girls Club with the John J. "Buck" O'Neil Diamond MVP Award as well as the Negro League Baseball Museum's Rube Foster Award for A.L. Executive of the Year in 2016.

In 2016, Moore had the honor of being the featured speaker at the National Prayer Breakfast Leadership Luncheon in Washington, D.C. The National Prayer Breakfast is a series of meetings, luncheons and dinners, established in 1953 under Kansas native, President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Under the direction of Moore, the Kansas City MLB Urban Youth Academy officially opened in 2017. While being viewed as a model for youth baseball and softball development, the $\$ 21 \mathrm{M}$ facility is a center for character development and educational advancement for our Community's urban youth. Using a focused intent on treating the Academy as an extension of the Royals minor league system, Moore's vision of providing kids the opportunity to develop "The Royals Way" is also fostering a culture that eliminates economic and social barriers in the City.

A leader in the Kansas City community, Moore is also a regular speaker at numerous community events each year. In 2013, Moore started the "C" You In the Major Leagues Foundation to support youth baseball, education, families in crisis and faith-based programs and organizations. The foundation's mission is to provide hope and support to children and families in crisis, while reaching, teaching and developing future character-driven leaders.
In 2018, "C" You In The Major Leagues, under Moore's guidance, launched the C-10 Mentoring \& Leadership program. The purpose of $\mathrm{C}-10$ is to bring together a select group of high school students from urban, suburban and rural Kansas City and provide them with one-on-one mentoring, life and job-skill development, leadership lessons, service opportunities, and post-high school scholarships. Twenty-seven different students have been a part of the C-10 program. Additionally, since its inception, "C" You In The Major Leagues has granted over $\$ 1,000,000$ to more than 60 organizations. Some of the organizations that have benefitted from "C" You In the Major Leagues are the City Union Mission, Higher M-Pact, the Jewish Community Center, and Turn the Page KC. Following the 2014 season, Moore wrote a book, "More Than a Season" (updated in 2016), with all of the author proceeds going to "C" You In the Major Leagues.
Most recently, Moore founded Unite KC where he serves as President of the Board of Directors. His passion for people, unity and raising the next generation sparked a conversation among leaders in Kansas City. That conversation led to the birth of Unite KC, a grassroots, faith-based movement committed to taking action to pursue racial reconciliation in the greater Kansas City area.

Moore, a native of Wichita, Kansas, brought an impressive resume to the Royals in 2006, having previously worked for the Atlanta Braves' organization during their run of 14 -straight division titles.

With Atlanta, Moore served three years as Director of Player Personnel, beginning in 2002. He originally joined the Braves' organization as an area scouting supervisor and was promoted to the front office in August, 1996 as an assistant in the baseball operations department.

Before joining the Braves, Moore served as an assistant baseball coach at his alma mater, George Mason University (1990-94). He received a bachelor's degree (1989) and a master's degree (1992) from GMU.
Moore and his wife, Marianne, reside in Leawood, Kansas, and have two daughters, Ashley and Avery, and a son, Robert. Robert is a sophomore at the University of Arkansas and a member of the Razorbacks' baseball team.

## ROYALS OFFICERS



George Brett is in his 28th season as the Royals' Vice President-Baseball Operations, continuing his long-time association with the organization. The 67 -year-old Hall of Famer, who was selected by the Royals in the second round of the 1971 June Free Agent Draft, spent his entire big league playing career in Kansas City before moving into the front office following his retirement in 1993.

During the 2013 season, Brett took on the role of interim hitting coach, being named to the position on May 30. He served in that capacity until July 25, when he resumed his role as Vice President-Baseball Operations and Pedro Grifol was named full-time hitting coach.

Brett was inducted into Baseball's Hall of Fame in July of 1999 after receiving 98 percent of the votes, the eighth-highest mark in history. He played 21 seasons for the Royals, collecting 3,154 hits, three batting titles (1976, 1980 and 1990) and a Most Valuable Player Award (1980). The Royals retired Brett's number 5 and inducted him into the club's Hall of Fame on May 14, 1994.
Brett is involved in numerous charitable causes as well as several enterprises. He and his brothers own Brett Brothers Sports International which manufactures bats, gloves and other baseball equipment. Brett Brothers also own interest in several professional teams.

In 2018, Brett led a group of Royals alumni to visit U.S. troops in the Middle East as part of Fox Sports Kansas City's "This One's For You" broadcast.

George and his wife, Leslie, have three sons: Jackson, Dylan and Robin.


VP-MARKETING \& BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT
Michael Bucek is in his 12th season as the Royals' Vice President-Marketing \& Business Development. He oversees Royals marketing and branding, ticket sales and service, corporate partnerships, digital platforms, radio broadcast sales and in-game entertainment. The focus of Royals marketing will be to continue to build the Royals brand across the region and expand the Club's reach through enhanced partnership activations, events both in and outside the ballpark and branded content across Royals social media platforms. A special focus will be on developing more young and diverse Royals fans.

Prior to joining the Royals in 2009, Bucek spent five years with the NHL's Phoenix Coyotes where he was the club's Executive Vice President/Chief Marketing Officer. During Bucek's tenure, the Coyotes marketing department created numerous initiatives designed to grow the sport of hockey in a non-traditional market and received several prestigious awards, including the NHL's Best Member Club Marketing Campaign.

Bucek spent two years with the Indy Racing League where he served as Vice President of Sales and Business Development. In this capacity, Bucek was responsible for managing corporate sales, fulfillment, and business development for the IndyCar Series.

Bucek also previously was with the Milwaukee Brewers as Vice President of Ballpark Development for six seasons. He negotiated the naming rights and concessions agreements for Miller Park as well as primary sponsorship and broadcast rights agreements. He supervised suites sales and represented the franchise through the ballpark design process. Bucek developed new branding for the Brewers and for the 2002 MLB All-Star Game in conjunction with Major League Baseball. Bucek was the liaison to the City of Phoenix throughout the development of Maryvale Baseball Park and managed the club's spring training operations.
He served as the Director of Marketing and Broadcasting for the Chicago White Sox for seven years. He was responsible for corporate sales and fulfillment, marketing, promotions, broadcasting and game entertainment. He negotiated sponsorship and broadcast agreements for the White Sox and created new branding for the franchise, producing unprecedented licensed product sales in the early 1990's.
Bucek's career in sports started in the Pacific Coast League with the San Francisco Giants Triple-A affiliate, the Phoenix Firebirds, from 1985 to 1988. While with the Firebirds, he was responsible for the Club's business operations and Oakland Athletics spring training operations.

Bucek and his wife Sharon live in Lenexa, Kansas, and have three children: Tyler, Ali and Rachel.


Rene Francisco is in his 15th season with the Royals and seventh as the club's Vice President/Assistant General Manager-Major League and International Operations. He was appointed to his current role on Jan. 5, 2015.

He has a bachelor's degree from Kansas State University and has a master's degree in accountancy from the University of Missouri Kansas City. Laverentz is a member of the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants and is a licensed CPA.

J.J. Picollo is in his seventh season as the club's Vice President/ Assistant General Manager-Player Personnel. He was promoted to his current position on Jan. 5, 2015. He previously served as the Royals' Assistant General Manager-Scouting \& Player Development, a role he held since 2008. Picollo joined Kansas City's Baseball Operations Department on Aug. 13, 2006 as Director of Player Development.

He came to the Royals after serving as the Director of Minor League Operations for the Atlanta Braves beginning in 2005 and had been with the organization since 1999. Scott Sharp is in his 15th season in the Royals' front office and fourth as the Vice President/Assistant General Manager. He was named to his current role on Jan. 7, 2018. He has previously served as the Director of Player Development from 2013-14 and Assistant General ManagerBaseball Operations from 2015-17. He joined the organization on Sept. 28, 2006 as Assistant Director of Player Development and was promoted to Director of Minor League Operations on Aug. 1, 2008.

VP-COMMUNICATIONS \& BROADCASTING
In his 43rd season of Major League Baseball in 2021, this is Mike's 15th year as the Royals' Vice President-Communications \& Broadcasting. Known as "Swanee" throughout the industry, he has had the good fortune to work in the front office for a World Series Champion in each league. He returned to Kansas City prior to the 2007 season after nine years with the Arizona Diamondbacks, where he was the Sr.
Director of Public Relations, a stint that included a World Series title in 2001.
In 2002, Swanson earned the prestigious Robert O. Fishel Award for Public Relations Excellence. The award, named after the long-time baseball executive, goes to the "Active, non-uniformed representative of Major League Baseball whose ethics, character, dedication, service, professionalism and humanitarianism best represents the standards propounded by Robert O. Fishel." He has spoken on four occasions at the Major League Baseball Rookie Career Development Program in Leesburg, Va., becoming the first club PR representative to serve on a panel in the 27 -year history of the program. Swanee served as the Public Relations liaison for the MLB All-Star squad that played an eight-game series in Japan in November, 2000.

He was also the PR liaison for the 2013 World Baseball Classic champion Dominican Republic squad and acted in the same role during the 2017 tournament.

Prior to his start-up role with Arizona, Swanee had a similar experience with the Colorado Rockies, joining their staff in 1992 as the Public Relations Director, a year before they played their first game. He also worked in the PR department with the San Diego Padres for seven seasons.

He joined the Royals as Scouting Operations Coordinator in 2000, was promoted to Manager of Scouting Operations in 2001, Manager of Baseball Operations in 2002, Director of Baseball Operations in 2004 and Director of Baseball Administration in 2006.

Reggie Sanders is in his fifth season in the Royals' organization, joining as a Special Advisor-Baseball Operations in 2017. In his role, he works on special assignment projects throughout the club's minor league system and serves as a coach during Spring Training.

In 2018, Sanders traveled with a group of Royals alumni to the Middle East to visit American troops serving overseas as part of Fox Sports Kansas City's "This One's For You" broadcasts.

A native of Florence, South Carolina, Sanders resides in Myrtle Beach, South Carolina, with his wife, Wyndee. The couple has four daughters, Cody, Carrigan, Carson and Cooper and one grandson, Campton.


## Kc ART STEWART <br> SR. ADVISOR TO THE GM

The longest-tenured associate in the organization, Art Stewart is in his 52 nd season with the Royals, 69th in professional baseball and 19th as the Sr. Advisor to the General Manager. Stewart was inducted as the 23rd member of the Royals Hall of Fame as well as the Professional Scouts Hall of Fame in 2008. He was also the 2007 winner of the Roland Hemond Award for long-time service in scouting and player development. Stewart has held the position of Sr. Special Assistant to the General Manager since 1997 after serving as the Director of Scouting since 1984.

In 2016, Stewart was inducted into the Missouri Sports Hall of Fame at a ceremony in Springfield, Missouri. The previous year, he received the "Legends in Scouting" Award in Los Angeles, California, at the Professional Baseball Scouts Foundation's annual dinner.

During his tenure as Director of Scouting, the Royals were named Major League Baseball Organization of the Year by USA Today in 1984, Baseball America in 1994, and Topps, Inc. in 1984-85 and 1994-95. Stewart drafted more than 70 players who have reached the Major Leagues, including Bo Jackson, Royals Hall of Famers Kevin Appier and Mike Sweeney as well as Brian McRae, Johnny Damon, Joe Randa and Carlos Beltrán. He was a $22-y e a r$ member on the Major League Scouting Bureau Board of Directors.

Stewart has played a major role in the origination of the Royals Dominican program, helping the club start the Salcedo Academy in the Dominican Republic. He was recognized in 1998 when the former Royals Academy building was named in his honor.

Before joining the Royals front office, he spent 16 years covering the Midwest as a Royals scout. He began his career in professional baseball in 1953 as a territorial scout for the New York Yankees and was the Midwest Scouting Supervisor from 1958-69.

Stewart has received numerous awards during his 68 years in baseball, including the Ewing M. Kauffman Scouting Award in 1970 and 1983. In 1998 he received an award for "Long Meritorious Service to Baseball" from colleagues and the Topps Company. He received the Bing Devine Executive of the Year Award at the second St. Louis Major League Scouts Hall of Fame Banquet in 1998 and was named "Mister Baseball" at the 29th Kansas City Royals Awards Banquet in January of 1999.

Stewart was honored prior to the 2002 season at the Pitch and Hit Club of Chicago's 56th Annual Dinner with the prestigious Baseball Excellence Award, given for meritorious service to the game of baseball. In 2008, he received the Midwest Scout of the Year Award from the Scout of the Year Foundation. Also in 2008, the Royals honored Stewart by renaming the Surprise, Arizona observation tower overlooking four fields, The Art Stewart Tower.

Stewart resides in Racine, Wisconsin, with his wife, Rosemary. He has one daughter, Dawn, and two grandsons, David and Mark. In 2014, Stewart coauthored The Art of Scouting - Seven Decades of Chasing Hopes and Dreams in Major League Baseball.



Mike Sweeney is in his eighth season as part of the Royals' front office after rejoining the organization on Feb. 7, 2014, being named a Special Assistant-Baseball Operations.

He spent 13 of his 16 Major League seasons in Kansas City (19952007), batting . 299 and belting 197 home runs with the Royals. His standout seasons included 2000, when he knocked in 144 runs and 2002 when he batted .340 , second highest in club history to George Brett's .390 in 1980. He also served as KC's team captain from 2003-07.

Sweeney was elected to the Royals Hall of Fame on Feb. 25, 2015 and was officially inducted on Aug. 15 that season. He was a five-time All-Star (2000-03, 2005), and is one of five Royals to be selected to five All-Star Games or more. He was also named Royals Player of the Year three times and ranks among the top six in 17 different offensive categories.

He was selected by the Royals in the 10th round of the 1991 First-Year Player Draft after graduating from Ontario (Calif.) High School.

In 2018, Sweeney led a group of Royals alumni to visit U.S. troops in the Middle East as part of Fox Sports Kansas City’s "This One’s For You" broadcast.

Sweeney resides in San Diego, California, with his wife, Shara, sons Michael, Donovan and Ryan (born October 2019) and daughters, McKara, Fiona and Quinn.


Donnie Williams is in his 15th season with the Royals, serving as Sr. Advisor to the General Manager after previously working as a Major League Scout for the Tampa Bay Devil Rays, beginning in 1996. In 2003, Williams was named Midwest Scout of the Year. He is no stranger to Royals' General Manager Dayton Moore's philosophy of developing young talent, as he worked with the Braves as a scout from 1981-96. $\Perp$ Led the club to a 26-34 record in his first season as the skipper in a year that was shortened to 60 games due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Enters the 2021 season with a 617-508 career record (.548)...his winning percentage ranks sixth among active managers, trailing only Aaron Boone (.615), Dave Roberts (.614), Alex Cora (.593), A.J. Hinch (.558) and Joe Girardi (.552), while his career win total is ninth among active skippers.

## PRE-ROYALS MANAGERIAL CAREER

$\omega$ Managed the St. Louis Cardinals from 2012-18, being relieved of his duties on July 14, 2018...compiled a . 555 winning percentage (591-474) as the Cards' skipper... named to the position on November 14, 2011...when he was hired, he was the youngest (age 41) active manager in the Major Leagues and youngest St. Louis skipper since Jack Krol (also 41) in 1978.
4 Led St. Louis to the postseason in each of his first four seasons, becoming the first manager to do that in Major League history...led the Cards to a Wild Card berth in 2012, then followed that up with three-straight National League Central titles (2013-15).
Managed the club to a World Series appearance in 2013, falling to the Boston Red Sox, while his teams reached the National League Championship Series in 2012 and 2014, before bowing to the eventual World

consecutive errorless chances $(1,565)$, until it was broken by Mike Redmond in 2010.
$\leftrightarrow$ Led National League catchers in fielding percentage twice (2003, 2004)...his . 994 career fielding percentage ranks 21st all-time among Major League catchers (min. 500 games).
Earned the Darryl Kile Award in 2003 - an annual award that recognizes the Cardinals' player who best demonstrates the qualities that Kile brought to the clubhouse...also won the "Willie Mays Award" in 2005 for being the most inspirational player on the Giants.

$\mu$ Attended the University of Michigan, where he was co-captain of the Wolverines' baseball team...wife,

Kristin, was also a varsity athlete at Michigan, playing field hockey.

Made his Major League debut in Kansas City's eighth game of the season on July 31 vs. the White Sox, suffering a 3-2 loss...started 10 games during his rookie campaign.

## 2020 SEASON

L Completed his 10th Major League season (all with Kansas City), finishing second on the team in starts (11), innings (56.1) and strikeouts (57), while his four victories tied for second most on the team.
His $9.11 \mathrm{~K} / 9$ marked the second-highest rate of his career (min. 50 IP), trailing only his 2016 campaign, when he amassed a 9.42 rate ( 188 K in 179.2 IP ).
$\Leftrightarrow$ Allowed no more than five hits in each of his first six starts, surrendering just 20 hits in 105 at-bats (. 190 opponents' average) through Aug. 21...his streak of five hits or fewer matched Edinson Vólquez (2015) for the longest stretch to begin any season by a Royals starting pitcher.
$\Longleftrightarrow$ His six starts of at least 4.0 innings and five hits or fewer fell one shy of Tommy John (1968) for the most by an American League lefty to begin a season since 1901...his streak to start the year extended a run to 10 consecutive starts with five hits or fewer in 4.0 innings or more, dating back to Sept. 7, 2019, which matched the fifth-longest streak by an American League pitcher since 1901.
Held opponents to a . 200 average (7-for-35) with runners in scoring position, however four of those seven hits went for extra-bases...of the 33 runs he allowed, 17 of them (51.5\%) scored on his team-high 10 home runs.
Opposing No. 9 hitters went 8-for-21 (.381) with four extra-base hits (. 619 SLG)...only opposing No. 2 hitters
(9-for-27) had more hits against him.
$\stackrel{\text { Allowed a team-high } 10 \text { home runs, though six of them }}{H}$ were solo shots...surrendered two rare roundtrippers in his Sept. 18 start vs. Milwaukee, a solo shot to Christian Yelich, marking just the 10th homer he's allowed to a left-handed batter in 820 plate appearances since 2012, and a grand slam to Jacob Nottingham, just the sixth slam he's yielded in his career.
Made his third career Opening Day start on July 24 at Cleveland, tying him for third most in franchise history behind only Kevin Appier (7) and Dennis Leonard (4)... suffered a 2-O setback, being charged with two runs on three hits over 4.1 innings.
Held opponents to two runs or fewer in six of his 11 starts, which included back-to-back victories over Minnesota on Aug. 15-Game 2 and Aug. 21.
Went 2-2 in the month of September, earning victories at Cleveland (Sept. 9) and vs. St. Louis (Sept. 23)... tossed 5.2 scoreless innings in the win over the Tribe, and allowed one run in 5.2 frames vs. the Cardinals, but was charged with six runs in both losses - Sept. 3 vs. the White Sox and Sept. 18 at Milwaukee.
$\Delta$ Made his final appearance of the year out of the bullpen on Sept. 25, his first relief outing since May 11, 2016 at Yankee Stadium...allowed two hits, both of which came around to score, marking the third time in 29 career relief outings that he's allowed multiple runs.

Pitched to a 3.21 ERA (17 ER in 47.2 IP) and held opponents to a .233 average (42-for-180) in his eight daytime starts... it marked his best day game ERA since 2016 (1.85) and lowest opponents' average since 2014 (.212).
Went 3-1 with a 3.12 ERA (12 ER in 34.2 IP) over his first six starts, including wins in three consecutive starts: May 7 at Houston, May 14 vs. Texas and May 19 at the Angels.
Went $0-4$ over a nine-start stretch from May 26-July 12 , despite recording five quality starts...received a total of 15 runs of support in 43.0 innings over the last eight starts in that run from May 31-July 12 for a 3.14 run support average, which was the third lowest in the American League during that time.
$\Perp$ Had a season-high 11 strikeouts and allowed just one run over 6.0 innings in a no-decision on July 23 in Atlanta... it was the second-most strikeouts in his career, trailing only a franchise-record 16-strikeout performance on Aug. 1, 2016 at Tampa Bay...it was just the sixth doubledigit strikeout effort in an Interleague game in Royals history, and the 11 strikeouts were the most by a Royal vs. a National League team since Zack Greinke had 12 on June 13, 2010 at Cincinnati.

Had a scoreless streak of 15.0 innings from the second inning on Sept. 13 through the third inning on Sept. 24, which was the second-longest run by a Royal in 2019, and was just 2.1 innings shy of his career-long scoreless streak in 2015.
2018: Named the Royals' Roberto Clemente Award nominee, which recognizes the player who best represents the game through extraordinary character, community involvement, philanthropy and positive contributions, both on and off the field.
Suffered a career-high-tying 12 losses, matching his 2014 total, but made a career-high 28 starts
$\omega$ Recorded three starts in which he held opponents to two hits or fewer in at least 6.0 innings, trailing only Blake Snell (5), Chris Sale (4), Mike Minor (4) and J.A. Happ (4) among American League left handers.
Named Royals Pitcher of the Month for July after leading the team in wins (3), starts (6), innings (37.1) and strikeouts (37)...three of his six starts were scoreless, and he allowed just one run over 7.0 innings in another... it was his fifth Royals Pitcher of the Month Award, fifth most since the honor was established in 1995.

2009: Tossed 0.2 scoreless innings with a hit and a walk in the 11th annual SiriusXM Futures All-Star Game in St. Louis on July 12.

2015: Made six relief appearances, going $1-0$ with a 6.00 ERA (4 ER in 6.0 IP), nine strikeouts and no walks.
$\lfloor$ Picked up his second career postseason win in Game 2 of the ALCS vs. Toronto, pitching a flawless seventh in front of a five-run rally in the bottom of the inning.
$\Perp$ Appeared in three World Series games and allowed just
one run, a solo shot to Michael Conforto in Game 4.

\(\lfloor\) Led the Royals with five wins in nine starts, despite missing the club's first 13 games on the Injured List (July 14-Aug. 6).
Le Ranked fifth in the American League (min. 50.0 IP ) with a 2.47 ERA (15 ER in 54.2 IP), trailing only Shane Bieber (1.63), Dallas Keuchel (1.99), Zach Plesac (2.28) and Chris Bassitt (2.29)...his ERA was tops by any Royals pitcher (min. 9 starts) since Zack Greinke's 2.16 ERA during his 2009 Cy Young Award-winning season.
\(\Longleftrightarrow\) Five of his nine starts were scoreless, including his first three of the season (Aug. 6-19)...became just the second Royals pitcher to win each of his first three starts and not allow a run, joining Greinke in 2009...he is one of six Major League pitchers to pull off the feat since the mound was lowered in 1969 and first since Jordan Zimmermann in 2016.
\(\Delta\) Did not allow a run over his first 17.2 innings of the season, marking the fourth-longest streak to open a season in club history, behind Greinke (24.0 IP) in 2009, Wade Davis (22.0 IP) in 2015 and Danny Jackson 18.0 IP) in 1985.
Became the fifth pitcher in Royals history to record three-straight scoreless starts and win each of them, joining Greinke (April 8-18, 2009), David Cone (May 11-22, 1994), Kevin Appier (Sept. 3-18, 1993) and Bret Saberhagen (Sept. 17-26, 1989).
\(\stackrel{\text { Surrendered }}{ }\) a total of eight hits in his first three outings, for a .140 opponents average (8-for-57)... dating back to 2019, he allowed no more than three hits in six consecutive starts (Aug. 14, 2019-Aug. 19, 2020), for the longest such streak in Royals history, in which he held opponents to a . 162 average (17-for-105).
\(\omega\) Went \(4-0\) with a 0.27 ERA ( 1 ER in 33.0 IP ) in his five home starts - in which KC went 5-0 - the best single-
season home ERA in the Live Ball Era (since 1920, min. 5 home starts)...the lone run came on an RBI double by Franmil Reyes in his Aug. 31 start vs. Cleveland.
Tossed his first career shutout on Sept. 13, an 11-0 victory vs. Pittsburgh...allowed five hits and one walk, recording two strikeouts...marked the only individual shutout by a Royals pitcher in 2020 and first vs. a National League team since James Shields blanked the Giants on Aug. 9, 2014.
\(\omega\) One of five Major League pitchers to record a shutout in 2020, joining Kyle Gibson (Sept. 16), Alec Mills (Sept. 13 no-hitter), Lucas Giolitto (Aug. 25 no-hitter) and Kyle Hendricks (July 24).
Allowed just two home runs, both of which came off the bat of Daniel Vogelbach on Sept. 20 in Milwaukee...the first-inning home run he allowed snapped a streak of 57.0 homerless innings, which was the second-longest active streak in the Majors at the time (Elias), behind only Max Fried (68.1 IP)...marked just his fourth career start in which he's allowed multiple home runs and just the second time to the same player (also Justin Smoak, June 30, 2019).
\(\lfloor\) The two home runs by Daniel Vogelbach marked half of the extra-base hits he allowed (4) in 2020...his . 244 opponents' slugging percentage tied for seventhlowest in Major League history (min. 9 starts), and was the lowest since Nolan Ryan held opponents to a . 216 SLG with Houston in 1981.
④ Six of his nine starts - including each of his first four came against National League opponents, matching Yordano Ventura (2015) and James Shields (2014) for the most Interleague starts by a Royals pitcher in one season.
\(\Perp\) Went 4-2 with a 2.52 ERA ( 10 ER in 35.2 IP ) in his Interleague starts, with all 10 runs coming in two starts: Aug. 24 at St. Louis ( 5 R in 4.0 IP ) and Sept. 20 at Milwaukee ( 5 R in 5.0 IP ), while his other four starts were scoreless, in which he allowed 13 hits in 26.2 innings...his four Interleague wins tied for most in the Majors with four other pitchers.

Earned Royals Pitcher of the Month honors in July after leading the team with three wins and a 2.12 ERA (8 ER in 34.0 IP ) in five starts, the second-best ERA in any calendar month of his career ( 20.0 IP ).
Tossed 7.0 scoreless innings and allowed just two hits in a \(5-3\) win vs. the White Sox on Opening Day, becoming the youngest in the Majors (at 23 years, 244 days) to win on Opening Day since José Fernandez (21 years, 243 days) in 2014, and the youngest in the American League since Félix Hernández ( 22 years, 363 days) in 2009...became the first Royals starter of any age to win on Opening Day since Edinson Vólquez in 2016.

Hecame the first rookie to earn Royals Pitcher of the Month honors three times in one season since Brian Bannister in 2007.
Induced 18 ground ball double plays, tied for fifth most in the American League, and second most by a Royal in his first Major League season, trailing only Rich Gale's 22 GIDP in 1978.
Acquired by the Royals on Dec. 14, 2017 from Cincinnati, who selected him from Arizona with the No. 5 pick in the Rule 5 Draft.
2017: Spent the season at Jacksonville (AA) in Arizona's organization...entered the year as the No. 7 prospect in the Diamondbacks' organization according to MLB.com and ranked eighth according to Baseball America.
4 2016: Spent the season with Visalia (A) in the California League...tied for seventh in the league in wins (9), tied for eighth in starts (24) and tied for fifth in WHIP (1.28).
2015: Pitched a career-high 142.0 innings with Kane County (A)...tied for third in the Midwest League with a 2.60 ERA ( 41 ER in 142.0 IP), sixth in WHIP (1.16) and 10th in innings.

His 27th HR of the season on Sept. 22 in Detroit was also his 500th career RBI, making him one of 13 Royals to reach the 500-RBI milestone.

\section*{SEASON SUMMARY}

SEASON 52: The Royals finished the 2020 season with a 26-34 record (.433), improving their win percentage for the second straight year, after going \(59-103\) (.364) in 2019 and 58-104 (.358) in 2018... the Royals' 26 wins in 60 games marked a pace of 70 wins over a 162 -game season, which would've been an 11-win improvement on 2019 and would've been their highest win total since 2017 (80-82)... they finished in fourth place in the American League Central for the second straight season, 10 games behind the division-winning Minnesota Twins (3624) and six games behind the Toronto Blue Jays (3228) for the second American League Wild Card spot.

After starting 3-10 through their first 13 games and 14-28 through their first 42, the Royals went 12-6 (.667) in their last 18 games from Sept. 8-27, which matched Tampa Bay for the best record in the American League during that time, and trailed only the Dodgers (13-5) and Reds (13-6) among all teams.

GORDO GOES PLATINUM, AGAIN: Outfielder Alex Gordon earned his second Rawlings Platinum Glove Award, while also matching the franchise record with his eighth Rawlings Gold Glove Award, and fourth in the last four seasons...in the 10 years of the Rawlings Platinum Glove Award, Gordon is the only outfielder to win twice (2014, 2020) and just the fourth player to win the award multiple times, joining: Nolan Arenado (2017-19), Matt Chapman (2018-19), Adrián Beltré (2011-12) and Yadier
Molina (2011-12, 2014-15)...his eight Gold Gloves (2011-14, 2017-20) matched Frank White (1977-82, 1986-87), for the most in franchise history...Gordon, who announced his retirement in September, became the third position player to win the award in his final Major League season, according to Sportradar, joining outfielder Roberto Clemente and first baseman Wes Parker, who both won in 1972...Gordo finished his career making just one error in his final 500 chances (since June 25, 2018), spanning 273 games, with the lone miscue coming on May 18, 2019 at the Angels.

SILVER SLUGGING SALVY: Catcher Salvador Perez received his third Louisville Silver Slugger Award, after also earning the accolade in 2016 and 2018, matching George Brett (1980, 1985, 1988) for the most in franchise history....he's the 12th Major League catcher to earn the award three times or more and first in the AL since Joe Mauer (2006, 2008-10, 2013)...Perez set career highs in batting average (.333), and slugging percentage (.633) and despite playing in just 37 of 60 games, led the Royals in homers (11) and go-ahead RBI (8), while ranking second in RBI (32) and extra-base hits (23)...his 11 home runs were tied for third most in Major League history by a player who appeared in 37 games or fewer, trailing only Frank Thomas (12 HR in 34 games) in 2005 (when he battled multiple injuries) and Ted Williams (13 HR in 37 games) in 1953 (when he missed most of the season after serving in the Korean War).

ILLNESS AND INJURY: The Royals had 20 different players on their 40-man roster spend time on the Injured List during the 2020 season...they started the season without several key players, including starting pitchers Brad Keller and Jakob Junis, and Mike Montgomery was placed on the IL following his first start in the team's third game...catcher Cam Gallagher, first baseman Ryan O'Hearn, third baseman Kelvin Gutierrez and right fielder Hunter Dozier all began the season on the Injured List, as did relief pitchers Chance Adams and Randy Rosario.
Eight Royals players tested positive for COVID-19 during Summer Camp, including six players who were expected to make the Opening Day roster in Gallagher, Salvador Perez, O'Hearn, Dozier, Keller and Junis...among that group-which accounted for \(20.0 \%\) of the club's expected Opening Day roster-only Perez recovered in time for Opening Day...no Royals player tested positive during the regular season.
\(\Leftrightarrow\) Shortly after Junis (Aug. 2), Keller (Aug. 6) and Dozier (Aug. 9) made their season debuts, Perez (Aug. 21, eye) and then Jorge Soler (Sept. 8, oblique) were placed on the Injured List...Dozier, Perez and Soler, who typically hit in the middle of the Royals' batting order, started just nine of the possible 60 games together ( \(15.0 \%\) ), in which the Royals went 5-4 (.556), while they went 21-30 (.412) without that trio in the starting lineup.
- The Royals used 11 different starting pitchers in 60 games, which tied for fourth most in the American League...they used seven different starting pitchers in their first 13 games, in which they went 3-10... Keller made his season debut on Aug. 6, and the Royals went 23-24 from that point on.

WHAT A RELIEF: The Royals' bullpen made a huge improvement in 2020, posting a 3.84 ERA (103 ER in 241.1 IP) over 60 games, which ranked eighth in the Majors, more than a full run lower than their 5.07 ERA ( 318 ER in 565.0 IP) over 162 games in 2019, which ranked 27 th in the Majors....Royals relievers finished fourth in the Majors (and 2nd in the American League) with 275 strikeouts, and their 19 saves were third most behind Tampa Bay (23) and Cleveland (20).

ROOKIE RETURNS: Royals pitchers logged 517.0 innings during the 2020 season, 222.1 of which (43.0\%) were accounted for by rookie pitchers, second most in the Majors behind Houston's 266.0 rookie innings... the Royals had five different rookie pitchers account for 28 of their 60 starts ( \(46.7 \%\) ) in Brady Singer (12), Kris Bubic (10), Carlos Hernández (3), Ronald Bolaños (2) and Kyle Zimmer (1), the most combined starts by rookies among all Major League teams...this marked the second-highest percentage of games started by rookies in Royals history, trailing only the inagural 1969 season, in which 99 of the club's 163 games ( \(60.1 \%\) ) were started by rookies...the Royals' \(46.7 \%\) of games started by rookies in 2020 marked the highest rate by any American League team, according to Elias, since the 2012 Oakland A's started rookie pitchers in 101 of their 162 games ( \(62.3 \%\) ).
Singer finished his rookie season with 64.1 innings and 61 strikeouts, most among all rookies in 2020, becoming the second Royal to lead both leagues in innings and strikeouts as a rookie, joining Steve Busby ( \(238.1 \mathrm{IP}, 174 \mathrm{~K}\) ) in 1973 ...he's the fourth Royals rookie to lead the American League in both categories, joining Kevin Appier (185.2 IP, 127 K) in 1990, Busby in 1973 and Bob Johnson ( 214.0 IP, 206 K) in 1970.

Singer's 12 starts also paced all rookies in 2020, one more than Logan Webb and two more than teammate Kris Bubic (10), who tied for third.
According to STATS, the Royals had the third-youngest average age in the Majors (27 years, 266 days), trailing Detroit (27.224) and Seattle (27.256).
- Seven different players-including six pitchers-made their Major League debuts for the Royals in 2020, including Tyler Zuber (July 24), Singer (July 25), Foster Griffin (July 27), Nick Heath (July 30), Bubic (July 31), Hernández (Sept. 1) and Scott Blewett (Sept. 18).

DYNAMIC DUO: The Royals have one of the best one-two combos at the top of their lineup in Whit Merrifield and Adalberto Mondesi...Merrifield leads the Majors with 468 hits since 2018 and Mondesi leads the Majors with 99 stolen bases during that same stretch...according to Bally Sports Kansas City's Dave Holtzman and Kevin Cedergren, Merrifield and Mondesi are the first teammates to lead the Majors in hits and stolen bases over a three-year stretch since Hall of Famers Sam Crawford (559 hits) and Ty Cobb ( 183 stolen bases) turned the trick for the Detroit Tigers from 1913-15.
4 Mondesi led the Majors in 2020 with 24 steals and Merrifield tied for second in the American League with 12, becoming the first teammates on any club to finish first and second in the American League in steals since 1971, when Kansas City's Amos Otis (52) and Fred Patek (49) led the pack.

IRON MAN MERRIFIELD: Whit Merrifield has played in 307 consecutive games-including all 60 in 2020 and all 162 in 2019-which is the longest active streak in the Majors, according to Elias...the second-longest active streak is held by Francisco Lindor, at 203 games, 104 fewer than Merrifield... he's 2,325 games shy of Cal Ripken Jr.'s Major League record of 2,632 straight games played...to catch Ripken, the 31-year-old Merrifield would have to play more than 14 full seasons without missing a game... Merrifield's streak began on June 25, 2018, and he's appeared at six different positions during that span, including first base, second base, left field, center field, right field and designated hitter...his streak of 307 consecutive games is 114 shy of the Royals franchise record of 421 straight games played, set by Alcides Escobar from Sept. 26, 2015-July 7, 2018.

A SEPTEMBER TO REMEMBER: After batting . 289 ( 13 -for-45) through the first 12 games of the season, Mondesi fell into an 11 -for-89 slump (.124) over his next 25 games, including an 0 -for- 22 skid from Aug. 28-Sept. 3...over the remaining 22 games from Sept. 4 through season's end, Mondesi led the American League (min. 85 atbats) in runs (22), hits (32, tied), batting average (.376), extra-base hits (14, tied), OPS (1.130) and stolen bases (16), and ranked second with a . 424 on-base percentage....his 16 steals (in 19 attempts) in those 22 games were nine more than any other player, and were more steals than Milwaukee (15) and Minnesota (14) had all season.
\(\mu\) Mondesi's combination of 14 extra-base hits and 16 stolen bases in September has been achieved in a calendar month just seven other times in Major League history, making him part of an exclusive group that includes three Hall of Famers and another likely Hall of Famer...the list in chronological order includes José Reyes (April 2007), Carlos Beltrán (Aug. 2004), Rickey Henderson (May 1986), Eric Davis (July 1986), Cesár Cedeño (Sept. 1977), Ty Cobb (May 1911) and Frank Chance (July 1903).
\(\Perp\) Mondesi homered in three consecutive games from Sept. 10-12, becoming the third Royals shortstop to do so, joining Angel Berroa (3 games from July 13-18, 2003) and Kurt Stillwell (May 17-19, 1988)... he also homered on Sept. 7 to mark four homers in six games, after going homerless in his previous 51 games (192 at-bats)...he recorded a stolen base in all four of those games in which he homered, becoming the first player in the Modern Era (since 1900), according to Elias, to record four games with a home run and a stolen base within a six-game span...he also became just the second player since 1900 to record a home run and a steal in three consecutive games, joining Bobby Abreu (May 12-15, 2004)... his 12 games with a homer and a steal since the start of 2018 are second most in the Majors, trailing Christian Yelich (15), and his 13 career games with a home run and a steal match Bo Jackson for fourth most in Royals history, trailing only Carlos Beltrán (25), Amos Otis (21) and George Brett (16).
\(\mu\) Mondesi recorded a hit in nine consecutive at-bats from Sept. 24-26, one shy of the club record set by Joe Randa from June 8-12, 1999... Mondesi walked twice during that stretch to mark 11 straight plate appearances reaching safely, matching the club record held by Randa, Steve Braun (Aug. 7-17, 1978) and Amos Otis (April 30-May 2, 1970)... Mondesi ended the season with 12 hits in 14 at-bats in the four-game set vs. Detroit, joining George Brett (Sept. 12-14, 1975 vs. California) as the only players with 12 hits in a four-game series in Royals history, and he was the first American League player to accomplish that since Joe Mauer from Aug. 1-4, 2016 at Cleveland...that performance earned Mondesi American League Player of the Week honors.

THE RUNNING ROYALS: The Royals recorded 49 stolen bases in 60 games during the 2020 season, which tied for fourth most in the Majors behind San Diego (55), Miami (51) and Seattle (50)...those 49 steals were on pace for 132 over a 162-game season, which would've been their most since 2014 (153)...the Royals went 11-for-14 in steal attempts of third base, both of which led the Majors for the third consecutive season (32 in 2018 and 2019)...after converting on just 28 of 43 (65.1\%) steal attempts through their first 44 games, the Royals went 21-for-26 (80.7\%) over their final 16 games, including a season-high four steals on Sept. 16 at Detroit...the Royals led all Major League teams in 2020 with 69 stolen base attempts, one more than San Diego.
Adalberto Mondesi led the Majors with 24 stolen bases in 2020, eight more than Jonathan Villar, whose 16 steals ranked second... Mondesi's 24 stolen bases were more than the total of 13 teams, six of which made the postseason...his 16 steals in the month of September were more than Milwaukee (15) and Minnesota (14) had all season... Mondesi was on pace for 65 steals over a 162-game season, a total that would've marked the fourth-highest single season number in franchise history behind Willie Wilson (83 in 1979 and 79 in 1980) and Tom Goodwin (66 in 1996).
\(\mu\) Mondesi became the third Royal to lead the Majors in stolen bases, joining Wilson (83 in 1979) and teammate Whit Merrifield (45 in 2018).

McBROOM GOES THE DYNAMITE: Ryan McBroom led the Majors with five pinch hits, three of which were home runs (no other player had more than 1 pinch-hit homer in 2020)... all three of his pinch-hit homers came within a 19-day span from Aug. 11-29, including a game-tying shot in the eighth inning on Aug. 11 in Cincinnati, a go-ahead pinch-hit homer in the eighth inning on Aug. 26 in St. Louis, and a solo shot in a pinch in the seventh inning on Aug. 29 at the White Sox...McBroom's three pinch-hit homers set a new single-season franchise record, passing Steve Balboni (1987) and Carmelo Martinez (1991) and a career franchise record, breaking a tie with 13 other Royals-including current teammate Ryan O'Hearn-who were tied with two.
McBroom was the first American League player to record at least three pinch-hit home runs in a single season since Daniel Palka (4) in 2018, and McBroom's three pinch-hit homers in August were the most by an American League player in any calendar month since Del Wilber (3) in May 1953.
McBroom recorded a pinch hit in three consecutive games from Aug. 26-28, including two home runs and a single, becoming just the second Royal, according to Elias, to record a pinch hit in three consecutive team games, joining Hal McRae (July 27-29, 1986)...he was the first American League player with a pinch hit in three consecutive games since the Angels' Vladimir Guerrero did it from June 15-17, 2009.

McBroom went 5-for-15 (.333) as a pinch hitter in 2020, and his Majors-most five pinch hits were the most by a Royal since Brayan Peña (5) in 2009.
McBroom had a go-ahead RBI single in the eighth inning on Aug. 25 in St. Louis, and had a go-ahead, pinch-hit home run in the eighth inning on the following day, Aug. 26 in St. Louis...according to Elias, McBroom became the fourth Royal (5th time) to record a go-ahead RBI hit in the eighth or later in consecutive games, joining Jeff Conine (July 12-13), Amos Otis (Aug. 25-26, 1982 and May 24-25, 1979) and Hawk Taylor (June 27-28, 1969).

AFTERNOON DELIGHT: Kansas City went \(5-8\) in day games in 2020, including 3-3 in their last six after going 2-5 through the first seven...the Royals' 13 day games out of 60 (21.7\%) marked the lowest percentage of day games played in club history, just under the \(22.8 \%\) ( 37 of 162 ) in 1980...the Royals' 13 day games were 17 fewer than the Athletics, who led the Majors with 30, and only the Reds (10), Braves (12) and Red Sox (12) played fewer day games than the Royals.

GETTING DEFENSIVE: The Royals turned 62 double plays on defense during the 2020 season, which led the American League and finished second in the Majors to Colorado (78)...after committing an American League-most 16 errors through their first 13 games, the Royals were charged with a Major League-low 15 errors over their remaining 47 games...for the season, seven of the club's 31 errors (22.6\%) were charged to pitchers.
Royals catchers allowed just 17 stolen bases during the 2020 season, tied for third fewest in the Majors ahead of the White Sox (16) and St. Louis (8).
\(\Perp\) Only six pitchers in the Majors made at least nine starts in 2020 and did not allow a stolen base, and three of them were Royals: Danny Duffy (O attempts), Brad Keller (O), Brady Singer (1), Marco Gonzales (0), Charlie Morton (2) and Masahiro Tanaka (2).

HOMER HAPPY: The Royals homered 68 times in 60 games ( \(1.13 \mathrm{HR} / \mathrm{G}\) ), the second-highest per-game rate in franchise history, trailing only their 2017 season, in which they hit a club-record 193 home runs in 162 games ( 1.19 HR/G)...they had at least four homers in four different games during the 2020 season, matching their total from all of 2019 ...on July 27 in Detroit, the Royals hit six home runs, matching a franchise record previously done on May 21, 2003 at Seattle and July 14, 1991 at Detroit...the Royals homered in 10 consecutive games from Aug. 6-17-in which they hit a total of 16 home runs-to mark one of eight double-digit streaks in franchise history and their last longer homer streak came in 2004, when they had an 11-game run.
4 Of the Royals' 68 home runs in 2020, 38 were solo shots ( \(55.9 \%\) ), 17 were two-run shots ( \(25.0 \%\) ) and 13 were three-run shots (19.1\%)...the Royals did not record a grand slam in the shortened 60-game season for just the sixth time in 52 years, joining slam-less seasons in 2007, 1983, 1979, 1976-77.

\section*{SEASON SUMMARY/STANDINGS}

SUPER DUPER: Royals' replay specialist, Bill Duplissea, was successful on seven of his 10 challenges in 2020 (70.0\%), the third-highest overturned rate in the Majors behind Boston ( \(76.9 \%, 10\) of 13 ) and the White Sox ( \(72.7 \%\), 8 of 11), and well ahead of the league average of \(42.4 \%\)...all three of his challenges that were not overturned came back as "stands," making the Royals one of three teams with no "confirmed" calls against, joining the White Sox and Nationals.
Duplissea owns a Majors-best \(73.0 \%\) success rate (116-for-159) over the last five seasons (since 2016), well ahead of the Yankees, who rank second with a \(67.5 \%\) overturn rate...Duper's 116 overturns rank second to the Rays, who have 118-just two more than the Royals-despite challenging 91 more plays.

DOUBLEHEADERS: The Royals played two traditional doubleheaders in 2020 within a five day stretch from Aug. 15-19...the first one, on Aug. 15 at Target Field, was scheduled due to severe weather in the Minneapolis area on Aug. 14, which postponed the first of a four-game weekend set vs. the Twins...the Royals and Twins split two games on Aug. 15, including a Royals win in Game 2 to mark the 600th win of Mike Matheny's managerial career...three days later, their Aug. 18 game vs. Cincinnati was postponed out of an abundance of caution to allow for additional COVID-19 testing within the Reds' organization...that set the stage for two games on Aug. 19, marking the Royals' first traditional doubleheader vs. a National League team since June 10, 2004 vs. Montreal...the Royals split the two-game set with Cincinnati with a win in Game 1, in which Brad Keller took a no-hitter into the sixth inning
Both doubleheaders featured two 7.0-inning games in accordance with the agreement between MLB and the Players Association for the 2020 season...the Aug. 19 doubleheader vs. Cincinnati was the 76th traditional doubleheader in the 48-year history of Kauffman Stadium, and the first that featured two 7.0 -inning games...that day marked the 15th and 16 th games out of 3,766 ( \(0.004 \%\) ) at Kauffman Stadium that went 7.0 innings or fewer.

SHUTOUT CENTRAL: The Royals were involved in a shutout in 11 of the their 60 games (18.3\%), one behind Cleveland (12) for the most in the American League...the Royals were on the wrong side of seven of those, which matched Miami, Cincinnati and Detroit for most in the Majors...six of the 11 shutouts the Royals were involved in came within a 12-game span from Sept. 9-22, including three straight games from Sept. 13-16 (2 wins, 1 loss)...this marked just the second time in club history, according to Bally Sports Kansas City's Dave Holtzman, that the Royals pitched a shutout twice in three games sandwiched around a game in which they were shut out...the other time was from Sept. 11-13, 1969, when they shut out the Angels 3-0, were shut out by the Twins 3-0, then shut out the Twins 1-0...their four shutout wins were tied for fourth most in the American League behind Cleveland (7), Chicago (6) and Oakland (5).

ON THE TUBE: The 2020 Royals produced a 4.6 average rating on FOX Sports Kansas City, according to Nielsen...this marked a four percent increase over their 2019 average and-despite missing the playoffsranked sixth among local market ratings in Major League Baseball...the Royals, who finished fourth in the American League Central at 26-34, have ranked in baseball's top 10 for local market ratings in eight consecutive seasons.

NEW SKIPPER: Mike Matheny led the Royals to a 26-34 (.433) record in his first season as manager, which would've paced out to 70 wins over a 162-game season...that would've marked an 11-game improvement over 2019, when the Royals won just 59 games...Matheny's .433 win percentage matched that of Ned Yost (55-72) in his first season as Royals manager in 2010, when he took over on May 14... Matheny was one of four American League managers in their first season with a new team in 2020, and his 26 wins matched the Angels' Joe Maddon among that group, just three behind Houston's Dusty Baker (29) and two ahead of Boston's Ron Roenicke... Matheny, who was named the Royals' 17th full-time manager on Oct. 31, 2019, earned his 600th career win as a manager in Game 2 of a doubleheader on Aug. 15 in Minnesota and finished the season with a career record of 617-508, the ninth most wins among managers active in 2020 , behind Baker, Terry Francona, Maddon, Bob Melvin, Ron Gardenhire, Joe Girardi, Bud Black and Don Mattingly...his . 548 winning percentage is fourth-highest among active managers behind only Aaron Boone, Dave Roberts and Girardi.

George Brett wrapped up a 21-year Hall of Fame career with the Royals in 1993 after establishing himself as one of the greatest to ever play the game.

He became the only Royal and just the 11th third baseman to be inducted into the Hall of Fame on July 25, 1999 after receiving 98.2 percent of the votes, now the eighth-highest mark. He had his number retired by the Royals on May 14, 1994.

At the conclusion of Brett's career, he was the only player in Major League history to amass more than 3,000 hits, 300 home runs, 600 doubles, 100 triples and 200 stolen bases. He was the first player to win batting titles in three decades (1976, 1980, 1990) and retired as the AL career record holder for most intentional walks (229).

A 13-time All-Star, Brett is the club's all-time leader in every offensive category except stolen bases. He was the American League MVP in 1980, finished as the MVP runner up in 1976 and 1985, was a Rawlings Gold Glove
 Award winner in 1985 and was crowned the Royals Player of the Year eight times.

Brett hit . 390 in his MVP season, posting the highest batting average since Ted Williams' . 406 mark in 1941.

Born May 15, 1953 in Wheeling, W.Va., he captivated the baseball world with his performance in the 1985 ALCS and World Series, earning ALCS MVP honors after the Royals rallied from a three games to one deficit against the Toronto Blue Jays.

Brett posted a .373 career World Series average, going 19-for-51 in 13 games, with three doubles, one triple, one home run and four RBI. He holds numerous ALCS records after recording a career batting average of .340 in the league championships.

He culminated his career with his 3,000th hit on September 30, 1992. Overall, he guided the Royals to seven postseasons and two World Series. During his 21year career with the Royals, Kansas City posted 15 winning seasons, including eight years with at least 90 wins.

\section*{FRANE WITE}

Second Baseman, 1973-90

Frank White was the defensive star for the Royals from 1973 to 1990, winning eight Rawlings Gold Gloves, an American League record for second basemen at the time. Hall of Famer Bill Mazeroski (8), Ryne Sandberg (9) and Roberto Alomar (10) are the only second basemen in Major League history to accomplish the same feat. His number 20 was retired and he was inducted into the Royals Hall of Fame in 1995.
White claimed the Rawlings Gold Glove award six-straight seasons from 1977 to 1982 and missed an unprecedented ninth award in 1988 after committing just four errors that season and leading the league in fielding percentage.

He was selected to the All-Star team five times and earned the starting nod at second base in 1979. White, who ranked seventh all-time in fielding percentage among second basemen when he retired, was named the Royals' Player of the Year in 1983 and 1986.

A native of Kansas City, White was tabbed as the ALCS MVP in 1980 after hitting .545 ( 6 -for-
 11) and driving in three runs to lead Kansas City to its first-ever World Series by defeating the New York Yankees.

In the 1985 World Series, White led all players with six RBI, hitting three doubles and a home run as KC rallied from a three games to one deficit to beat St. Louis.

Following his career-best 1986 season, White was selected to the Major League All-Star team that toured Japan in the offseason. He was also named to The Sporting News Silver Slugger Team.
The first-ever graduate of the experimental Royals Academy, White ranks second on the club's career charts in games \((2,324)\), at bats \((7,859)\) and hits \((2,006)\). He also stands in the top five in career runs, doubles, triples, home runs, stolen bases, total bases and extra base hits. He hit three inside-the-park home runs during his playing career with the Royals.

White was honored with the Ernie Mehl Award for his contribution to the Kansas City community in 1988.

Dick Howser managed the Royals from August 31, 1981 to February 23, 1987 before losing a courageous battle to cancer on June 17, 1987. During Howser's regime, the Royals won three division titles and a World Series championship in 1985. His uniform number 10 was the first number retired by the Royals.

One of Major League Baseball's most successful and popular managers, he compiled a 404-365 record (.525) while skippering the Royals.

He guided the club in one of the most remarkable and endearing comebacks in Major League postseason history, defeating Toronto in the ALCS and St. Louis to win the 1985 World Series. His skills and ability to maneuver the lineup and roster played an important role in the club's success, as he capitalized on a strong starting pitching staff and maximized an offense that ranked 13th in average and runs scored.

Howser's World Series season was quite
 an encore for a manager who was named the ESPN Manager of the Year and finished second in the Baseball Writer's Manager of the Year balloting in 1984. His 1984 club was hampered by injuries throughout the year as his starting lineup was together for only 50 of the 162 games. Despite the injuries, he guided the Royals from a sixth-place standing and a 40-51 record on July 18, to capture the AL West crown by compiling an astonishing 44-25 record over the last 10 weeks.

Overall, he compiled a 507-425 (.544) record at the big league level after guiding the New York Yankees to 103 wins in 1980, becoming just the fourth manager in baseball to win 100 games in his first year.
Howser began his professional career after twice earning All-America honors at Florida State. The 1961 Sporting News Rookie of the Year with the Kansas City A's, he was a member of the 1961 All-Star team and enjoyed an eight-year Major League playing career.

Jackie Robinson broke the Major League color barrier in 1947．He went on to win Rookie of the Year that season and the 1949 NL MVP．Robinson was a six－time All－Star，compiling a ． 311 career batting average， 1,518 hits and 197 stolen bases in his 10－year Major League career．Prior to his historic stint in the Majors， Robinson played in Kansas City for the Monarchs in 1945．On April 15，1997，the 50th anniversary of his debut，Major League Baseball retired his number．

\section*{KK KEVIN APPIER \\ PITCHER: 1989-99, 2003-04 (INDUCTED 2011)}

Kevin Appier's one of a kind delivery and devastating mix of pitches made him one of the most dominant pitchers of his era. The three-time Royals Pitcher of the Year retired in 2004 as the club's all-time strikeout leader with 1,458 . He made more Opening Day starts (7) than any Kansas City pitcher before him. Appier posted the lowest ERA (2.56) in the league in 1993 and was named to the 1995 American League All-Star team. He is still the franchise's all-time leader in strikeouts and ranks in the top 10 in ERA, wins, winning percentage, shutouts, complete games, starts and innings.

He was president of the club from that time until cancer took his life in 1992. Burke was named Major League Executive of the Year in 1976 and "Mr. Baseball" at the Kansas City Baseball Awards Dinner in 1978.

Steve Busby was one of the Royals' best pitchers and top competitors despite having his career shortened by a shoulder injury. SCOUT/ADVISOR: 1969-PRESENT (INDUCTED 2008)
Art Stewart became the first scouting/player development associate to be inducted into the Royals Hall of Fame on June 28, 2008. Stewart joined the Royals organization as a scout following the 1969 season and served as the director of scouting from 1984-96. Since 1997, he has served the Royals GM as a senior advisor. The 2007 winner of the Roland Hemond Award, which is presented for long-time service in scouting and player development, is credited with signing or drafting more than 70 players that reached the Majors, including Bo Jackson, Kevin Appier, Johnny Damon and Carlos Beltrán.


Mike Sweeney became the 26th member elected to the Royals Hall of Fame on August 15, 2015. A five-time All-Star, Sweeney spent the first 13 years of his 16year Major League career in Kansas City. The club record-holder for RBI in a season with 144 in 2000, Sweeney ranks in the top six all-time in Royals history in 17 offensive categories, including second in average and home runs (197). He narrowly missed winning the 2002 AL batting crown, hitting . 340, the secondhighest single-season average in club history to George Brett's 390 mark in 1980.

George Toma became the first inductee elected through the Royals Hall of Fame Veterans Committee which was part of a redesigned voting process established in 2011. Toma served as the Royals Head Groundskeeper from their inception in 1969 through the 1995 season. He also served as a consultant to the ballclub from 1995-97. He originally came to Kansas City in 1957 as head groundskeeper for the Kansas City Athletics. Generally regarded as the finest groundskeeper in the history of team sports, he earned the Professional Football Hall of Fame Pioneer Award in 2001 and joined mentor Emil Bossard as the first two inductees into the MLB Groundskeeper Association Hall of Fame in 2012.

\section*{OUTFIELDER: 1976-90 (INDUCTED 2000)}

Willie Wilson became only the second player in baseball history to stroke 100 hits from each side of the plate in a season in 1980. The AL batting champion in 1982 (.332), he collected 2,207 hits and 668 stolen bases in his career, including a league-leading and Royals record 83 thefts in 1979. He was a Rawlings Gold Glove Award winner in 1980, was the Royals Player of the Year in 1981 and was on the American League All-Star team in 1982 and 1983.

\section*{66 YEARS OF BASEBALL IN KANSAS CITY}

2021 marks the 66th anniversary of the first American League game played in Kansas City. Left-handed pitcher Alex Kellner and the Athletics handed Ned Garver and the Detroit Tigers a 6-2 loss in the A's 1955 KC debut. Outfielder Bill Wilson hit the first home run in Kansas City A's history with a shot in the eighth inning. Pregame festivities included a ceremonial first pitch by Kansas City native and former president Harry S. Truman.
The A's played all their games at Municipal Stadium (pictured below), sharing the facility with the Kansas City Chiefs football team. The stadium, located at 22nd and Brooklyn, opened July 3, 1923. It was originally named Muehlebach Field and also housed the Kansas City Monarchs and Kansas City Blues (minor league). A pair of short-lived football franchises, The Kansas City Blues (1924) and Kansas City Cowboys (1925-26) also played at the stadium. The Royals used the stadium from 1969-72.

\section*{1985 WORLD SERIES VS. ST. LOUIS (ROYALS WIN, 4-3) \\ Kansas City rallied from two-games-to-none and three-games-to-one deficits to capture their first World Championship by defeating the St. Louis Cardinals in the "I-70 Series." The Royals became the first club in the 82-year history of the Fall Classic to lose their first two games at home and come back to win the title. The Royals became the first AL expansion club to win a World Championship and the second expansion team overall, joining the New York Mets (1969). KC's talented and youthful pitching staff held the Major League's best hitting club to 13 total runs and a batting average of .185-the lowest ever in a 7-game World Series. \section*{Game Summary}

Kansas City hosted an MLB All-Star Game for the first time on July 11, 1960. The 28th version of the Midsummer Classic was played at Municipal Stadium with the National League prevailing, 5-3. Two days later, the NL would win once again, shutting out the AL, 6-0, at Yankee Stadium.

The game in Kansas City was attended by 30,619 fans who witnessed the senior circuit get off to a scorching start against AL starter and losing pitcher, Bill Monbouquette of the Boston Red Sox.

Willie Mays led off for the NL and tripled to right. Mays scored when the next batter, Bob Skinner, singled. After consecutive outs from future Hall of Famers Eddie Mathews and Hank Aaron, another future Hall of Famer, Ernie Banks, homered to give the NL a 3-O lead.

The NL added a fourth run in the second inning on catcher Del Crandall's solo home run and a fifth in the third frame as future Hall of Famer Bill Mazeroski drove home Banks with a single to left.

Another future member of the Hall of Fame, AI Kaline, blasted a two-run home run in the eighth to bring the AL within two runs at 5-3, but that was as close as they were able to get.
No MVP was named, but Mays ended up 3-for4 with a run scored and Banks added two hits, drove in two and scored two runs.

The game featured 15 future Hall of Famers (plus Hall of Fame managers Walter Alston and AI Lopez), all indicated in bold in the box score. Ted Williams, who would retire at the end of the season, grounded out to second base as a pinch hitter in the second inning. Cardinals legend Stan Musial recorded an infield single as a pinch hitter in the road half of the eighth.

Al Lopez managed the American League and was joined by coaches Tony Cuccinello and Don Gutteridge. The National League was managed by Walter Alston, who was joined by coaches Solly Hemus and Fred Hutchinson.
Finally, Hall of Fame umpire Nestor Chylak umped both second and first base in 1960 and then returned to Kansas City to umpire home plate during the 1973 All-Star Game.

\section*{Game Summary}

Kansas City was the site of the 40th Major League Baseball All-Star Game in 1973 where the National League handed the American League a 7-1 loss.

The game marked the final All-Star appearance of Willie Mays and was attended by members of the first All-Star Game in 1933, including Carl Hubbell, Bill Hallahan, Lefty Gomez, Dick Bartel, Lefty Grove, Jimmie Dykes and Charlie Gehringer.
The AL jumped out to a 1-0 lead after a double from Reggie Jackson and an RBI single from KC's Amos Otis. However, the NL All-Stars countered with two runs in the top of the third and also scored in the fourth, fifth and sixth innings. Rick Wise earned the win for the NL after allowing two hits and one ER in 2.0 innings of work.


Bobby Bonds was named the game's MVP, coming off the bench to go 2 -for2 with a two-run homer in the fifth inning, giving the NL a 5-1 lead.

Johnny Bench hit one of the most mammoth home runs in the history of the Mid-Summer Classic, launching a 480 -foot solo shot off Bill Singer in the fourth inning over the left field concourse. His homer still stands as the longest in Kauffman Stadium history.

The game featured 17 future Hall of Famers (plus three Hall of Fame managers), including Hank Aaron, Willie Mays, Rod Carew, and Brooks Robinson to name a few, while Hall of Fame manager Joe Torre played in the game for the National League. The game also featured three Royals - Amos Otis, John Mayberry and Cookie Rojas - and one future Royals manager, Buddy Bell, who tripled as a pinch hitter in the third inning. Otis led the AL players, going 2-for-2 with the team's only RBI.

\section*{Game Summary}

Kansas City hosted its third MLB All-Star Game on July 10, 2012. The 83 rd version of the Midsummer Classic was played at Kauffman Stadium with the National League prevailing, 8-0, moving the senior circuit's record to a perfect 3-0 in All-Star Games playing in the City of Fountains.

Eleven pitchers combined on the six-hit shutout for the National League with the win claimed by starter Matt Cain.

The victory was the National League's third straight and clinched home field advantage which proved beneficial for the San Francisco Giants who won the first two games of the 2012 World Series en route to a sweep over the Detroit Tigers. Giants played key roles in the All-Star Game win, including MVP Melky Cabrera, starting and winning pitcher Matt Cain, and 2012 World Series MVP Pablo Sandoval, who connected for a threerun triple.

The game in Kansas City was attended by 40,933 fans who witnessed the senior circuit get off to a scorching start against AL starter and losing pitcher, Justin Verlander of the Detroit Tigers, scoring five times.

After a strikeout to open the game, a Cabrera single and Ryan Braun double scored the game's first run. A pair of two-out walks loaded the bases for Sandoval, who emptied the bags with a triple. Dan Uggla followed with a single, driving in Sandoval.

Neither league threatened until the fourth when the National League added three runs, all with two outs, to create the final 8-0 deficit. Rafael Furcal tripled, then scored as his Cardinals teammate Matt Holliday singled. Cabrera followed with a two-run home run to deep left field.

The American League's best scoring chance came in the bottom of the fifth as back-to-back oneout singles from David Ortiz and Mike Napoli and a two-out walk to Asdrúbal Cabrera loaded the bases. But Ian Kinsler flied out to end the threat.

Cabrera of the San Francisco Giants, who played with the Royals in 2011, was named the MVP after going 2 -for- 3 with two RBI and two runs scored.

In just his 10th Major League start, 23-year old Steve Busby recorded the first no-hitter in club history by shutting down Detroit on April 27, 1973. His no-hitter was the first in Tiger Stadium since 1952. He allowed 6 walks and struck out 4 in the \(3-0\) win.

In his next start, Busby allowed just 1 hit in 5.2 innings of work in a 5-3 win at Milwaukee on May 4. Busby picked up where he left off, tossing 5.1 hitless innings until Dave May homered in the sixth inning. Busby didn't allow any more hits but was removed later that inning because of wildness.

\section*{KANSAS CITY 2, MILWAUKEE 0 June 19, 1974 at Milwaukee}


Busby became the first pitcher in Major League history to collect no-hitters in each of his first 2 big league seasons when he defeated the Milwaukee Brewers on June 19, 1974 at County Stadium, 2-0.

George Scott, who walked to lead off the second inning, was Milwaukee's only baserunner in the game. Busby then retired 24 straight batters to establish a club record.

Busby then retired the first 9 batters faced in his next start against Chicago on June 24. The 33-straight batters retired established an American League record.

\section*{KG NATE ADCOCK \\ PRO SCOUT}

Nate Adcock rejoined the Royals' organization in 2020 as a pro scout following a 10-year playing career, including four seasons in the Majors with Kansas City (2011-12), Texas (2014) and Cincinnati (2015). A fifth-round pick by Seattle in 2006, Adcock underwent Tommy John surgery in 2015 and spent the 2016-17 seasons rehabbing in Baltimore's system, but did not pitch. \section*{Ka MIKE PAZIK \\ MAJOR LEAGUE SCOUT}

Mike Pazik is in his fifth season as a Major League scout with Kansas City after joining the organization in 2002 as the advance scout. He served in the same capacity for Colorado in 2001. Pazik began his professional baseball career as the Yankees first-round pick in the 1971 January Free Agent Draft. He played for nine seasons, including parts of three seasons with the Minnesota Twins. Dale Sveum is in his eighth season with the Royals and second as a special assignment scout. He previously served on the Royals' Major League coaching staff as the bench coach (2018-19), hitting coach (2014-17) and third base coach (2014).

During the 2017 season, Sveum's final year as the club's hitting coach, the Royals set the franchise record with 193 home runs, including a then-team record 38 by Mike Moustakas. He also helped lead the club to the 2015 World Series championship as well as back-to-back appearances in the Fall Classic in 2014-15.

Sveum came to Kansas City with an abundance of coaching experience at the Major League level, most recently serving as manager of the Chicago Cubs for two seasons (2012-13). He also served on the Milwaukee Brewers' (2006-11) and Boston Red Sox (2004-05) coaching staffs, which included a 12-game stint as the interim manager with Milwaukee in 2008. Prior to his tenure with Boston, he served as a manager with Altoona (AA) in the Pittsburgh Pirates' organization for three years (2001-03).

Sveum played 12 seasons in the Major Leagues with Milwaukee (1986-91), Philadelphia (1992), the Chicago White Sox (1992), Oakland (1993), Seattle (1994), Pittsburgh (199697, 1999) and the New York Yankees (1998). He enjoyed his best season in 1987 with the Brewers, slugging a career-high 25 home runs and collected 95 RBI. An infielder, Sveum was originally selected by Milwaukee in the first round (25th overall) of the 1982 Draft.
He graduated from Pinole Valley (Calif.) High School in 1982, where he earned all-state and All-America honors as a quarterback on the football team.

\section*{KC TONY TIJERINA}

ADVANCE SCOUT
Tony Tijerina is in his 15th season in the Royals' organization and second as an advance scout. His previous roles include five years as a pro/advance scout from 2015-19, four years as the minor league field coordinator from 2011-14, three years as the assistant field coordinator and catching coordinator from 2008-10 and one season as manager at Wichita (AA) in 2007. \section*{REMEMBERING THE ROYALS ACADEMY}

Former Royals owner Ewing Kauffman challenged the preconceived notions of the baseball world in 1970 with the creation of the Royals Baseball Academy.
"In a few years this will be called Kauffman's folly or they will be calling me the Branch Rickey of the '70s," Kauffman said.

The Academy, which ran 12 months a year, was designed to supply additional talent to the Royals organization by training athletes in Sarasota, Florida. The mission of the academy was to groom raw athletes into baseball players.

The Academy opened its doors on August 10,1970 with 42 original players. The campus, which also doubled as the Royals spring home, featured five playing fields, a 50-room dormitory, offices, lecture halls, laboratories, tennis courts and a swimming pool. Former Royals Scouting Director (and future Yankees General Manager) Syd Thrift was named as the
director of the Academy
Royals Hall of Famer Frank White joined the Academy in 1970 and was the first member to graduate to the Majors in 1973. White credits the Academy with instilling fundamentals which turned him into one of the best defensive second basemen in baseball history.

Despite the success of Frank White and 13 other graduates who played in the Majors, including U.L. Washington, d wind ling class sizes and the cost of the Academy eventually led to its closing in May, 1974.



John Wathan returns for his 50th year in baseball and 46th with the Royals, as a special assistant to player development. Wathan was the Royals' first-round pick in the 1971 January Free Agent Draft after three years at the University of San Diego. He played for 15 years, including 10 in the Majors from 1976-85. Wathan was a member of the Royals' World Series teams in 1980 and 1985 and still owns the modern record for stolen bases by a catcher with 36 in 1982. He served as a coach in Kansas City in 1986 prior to managing the Omaha Royals in 1987. Wathan was named Royals manager on August 27, 1987 and compiled a 287-270 record, including 92-70 in 1989. He worked for the California Angels in 1992 and 1993, serving as interim manager, third base coach and bench coach before becoming Boston's bullpen coach in 1994. "Duke" worked as a broadcasting analyst for The Baseball Network in 1995 and for the Royals Radio Network from 1996-97. His duties have included special assignments in scouting and player development since 1999. Wathan has been inducted into the Iowa Baseball Coaches Hall of Fame, Missouri Sports Hall of Fame, the West Coast Conference Hall of Honor and the athletic Hall of Fame at St. Augustine High School and the University of San Diego. He resides in Lee's Summit, Missouri. with his wife, Nancy. The couple has three children: Dusty, Derek and Dina, and eight grandchildren. Dina works in the Royals' community impact department and Dusty is the third base coach for the Philadelphia Phillies.


SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO PLAYER DEVELOPMENT
Harry Spilman enters his seventh year with the Royals as a special assistant to player development. He had the same role with the Texas Rangers from 2009 to 2014 and was the hitting coach for Milwaukee's Triple-A club in Nashville from 2007 to 2008. Spilman was an instructor in the Astros' system from 1998-2006, including 1999-2004 as the Major League hitting coach. His coaching career began with seven years as minor league manager and roving instructor in the Indians' system. Spilman played for the Reds, Astros, Tigers and Giants over a 12-year Major League career. He resides in Mount Vernon, Indiana, with his wife, Kim. They have two children: Kelly and Ryan, and three granddaughters: Dawson, Sydney and Marlee.


\section*{KG EDDIE RODRIGUEZ \\ INFIELD COORDINATOR}

Eddie Rodriguez returns for his fifth season with the Royals, his second as the minor league infield coordinator. Prior to his second stint with the Royals, he spent the previous three seasons in the San Diego Padres' organization. He was previously with the Royals from 2009-13, most recently as the club's third base coach from 2011-13. Before that, he was Seattle's first base coach in 2008 and served as manager for Seattle's Double-A team in West Tennessee in 2007. He was Frank Robinson's bench coach in Montreal (2004) and in Washington (2005-06) for three years after serving on Arizona's Major League staff from 2001 (first base coach) and 2002-03 (third base coach). Eddie was the manager at Queens (A) in Toronto's organization in 2000, and served as the Blue Jays' third base coach in 1998. He began his coaching career and spent 15 seasons in the Angels' organization from 1983-97. He had a six-year career as a minor league infielder with Baltimore and California. Rodriguez and his wife, Adele, have a son, Joshua.

J.C. Boscan enters his fifth season as the Royals' minor league catching coordinator. He served in a similar role in 2016, after retiring following the 2015 season. Jason Simontacchi is in his fourth season in the Royals' organization and second as pitching coordinator. As long as we remain under the COVID pandemic protocols, the following policies will remain in place for the \(\mathbf{2 0 2 1}\) season. Should there be any changes in the protocols, we will adjust and advise all media of the changes in policies.

Contact the Royals Media Relations Department for any information and questions (interviews, photos, statistical or credential requests, news releases, etc.). It is our privilege to be of assistance to our local, national and international media.

MLB has placed a maximum number of credentials issued for coverage of each game to start the year. That figure encompasses beat writers, columnists, national writers, one representative from each local radio station and each local television station.

To request daily credentials please visit the MLB credentialing website, credentials.mlb.com. Should you have any questions, contact lan Kraft, Coordinator-Media Relations, at ian.kraft@royals. com or (816) 504-4367. Credential requests must be made at least TWO DAYS IN ADVANCE of the requested date. Late requests will not be honored. For Saturday, Sunday or Monday credentials, please request by noon on Friday. Credential requests will be answered as time permits.

To pick up credentials, please report on game day to Gate D of Kauffman Stadium. Daily credentials will be issued only to working members of the media. Credentials must be displayed at all times while at Kauffman Stadium.

\section*{Media must enter Kauffman Stadium through Gate D.}

Parking credentials can be requested and will be filled when available. Parking, when granted, must be mailed or picked up prior to game day. Media will be required to enter through Gates 3 or 4 in order to redeem parking credentials. Media parking will be in the back rows of Lot \(B\).

Media working areas will include designated press areas (Level six press box and to-be-determined auxiliary areas). The main press box on Level Six will seat a total of 24 based on social distancing regulations. That number includes staff for both teams, the official scorer and MLB statistical crew.

All television live shots must take place from outside the ballpark.

Still photographers will have to work the front row of the seating bowl behind the first and third base dugouts in compliance with social distancing policies. Photographers must remain seated during game action and will have to shoot through the netting.

One manned elevator will be available for media use. No more than two members of the media may ride at a time and only the sixth floor can be accessed.

There will be a limited menu of food available in the main press box from Aramark. There will be a \(\$ 7\) charge for press dining during the abbreviated meal service. There will be no in-game food or snack service. Media members will be allowed to bring their own food and (non-alcoholic) drinks into Kauffman Stadium.

The broadcast press box is located on Level Four at Kauffman Stadium. Radio and television broadcasts will initiate from this level.

Wireless internet access is available in the main press box free of charge. Please contact a Royals Media Relations member if you are having trouble connecting. Interview periods will be prior to and following games, and can be arranged through the Royals Media Relations Department.

Manager Mike Matheny will conduct his general pre-game media session via Zoom at a time to be announced daily. We will post the times on the press level monitors and email advisories for those who wish to participate and not come to the ballpark. We will also post Zoom times and lineups to Twitter (@ Royals_PR).

We will make every effort to have a position player available each day prior to batting practice via Zoom and on some occasions, the next day's starting pitcher. Specific player requests must be made at least 24 hours in advance to the Royals Media Relations Department. These interview requests will be granted based on a player's availability on a given day.

Upon completion of each game, manager Mike Matheny will be available via Zoom approximately 10 minutes after the last out is recorded. Once his session is completed, we will provide that game's starting pitcher and then at least one player who impacted the game on the same Zoom call.

Radio stations and assigned correspondents for out-oftown reports are allowed to give inning or half-inning score updates. Per Major League Baseball regulations, at no time can these correspondents file reports once play has resumed. Any violation of these policies will result in immediate revocation of credentials.

MLB dress guidelines were created prior to the 2012 season. The media is expected to comply with these policies. Please see the posted policy in the press box on Level 6 at Kauffman Stadium or request a copy through the Royals Media Relations Department.

Bally Sports Kansas City will provide fans expansive coverage of the Royals, televising 161 regular-season games along with five spring training contests in 2021.

Ryan Lefebvre and Steve Physioc will provide the play-by-play call on the telecasts, with former big leaguer Rex Hudler as analyst. Every game on Bally Sports Kansas City will be surrounded by a pregame and postgame show, Royals Live, hosted by Joel Goldberg with analysis from Royals' Hall of Fame pitcher Jeff Montgomery. Bally Sports Kansas City will also provide extensive coverage of the Royals on its web site, app and social
media pages. Games will also be streamed live to Bally Sports Kansas City subscribers within the Royals television footprint.
The Royals' local-market TV ratings ranked No. 6 in MLB in 2020, according to Nielsen Media Research, and Royals telecasts delivered more viewing during the 2020 MLB season than the top 15 prime time entertainment shows combined.

In addition to being the home of Royals baseball, Bally Sports Kansas City also serves as the home of Sporting KC soccer and airs more than 300 live events of local interest each year, including St. Louis Blues hockey, Oklahoma City Thunder basketball and Missouri Valley Conference basketball.

The Royals Radio Network, one of the largest in Major League Baseball, will broadcast all of the Kansas City Royals' regular-season games in 2021. The network will also broadcast a 20-game Spring Training schedule. All regular season games will be heard on the Royals' Kansas City affiliate, 610 Sports Radio-KCSP. The Royals and 610 Sports Radio extended their agreement in 2020, with the deal running through 2024.

The Royals Radio Network is made up of 87 affiliate stations throughout the Midwest in seven states. Royals' Hall of Famer and 2007 Ford C. Frick Award winner, Denny Matthews, will be behind the microphone for his 53 rd season. Veteran announcer Steve Physioc returns for his 10th season as a part

\section*{Kc DENNY MATTHEWS \\ ANNOUNCER}

Denny Matthews is in his 53rd season behind the microphone, calling Royals games since the club's inception in 1969. He's the third announcer in Major League history to broadcast for the same team for 50+ seasons, joining Vin Scully (Brooklyn/Los Angeles Dodgers, 67 seasons) and Jaime Jarrín (Los Angeles Dodgers, 61 seasons). This is Matthews' seventh decade of broadcasting the Royals, with only Jarrín's eight decades (1959-present), being a longer run with one team.

The 2007 Ford C. Frick Award winner was honored during the Hall of Fame Induction Ceremonies in Cooperstown on July 29, 2007. He also became a member of the Royals' Hall of Fame in 2004.

Matthews has seen more Royals games than anyone else during his time with Kansas City. He was chosen from more than 300 applicants for the No. 2 announcer position alongside the late Buddy Blattner prior to the Royals initial season in 1969, before taking over the No. 1 job following the 1975 season. He teamed with Fred White on the Royals Radio Network from 197498 before Ryan Lefebvre joined him in the booth in 1999 through 2007. Over the last 12 seasons, Steve Physioc and Steve Stewart have served as Denny's partners, along with Bob Davis (200812).

The veteran broadcaster has lent his play-by-play skills to the CBS Radio Network during portions of the regular season and during the 1982 and 1985 World Series. He worked with Hall of Famer Ernie Harwell, calling the CBS broadcast of the 1982 ALCS between the California Angels and Milwaukee Brewers.

He is also the author the two books: the 2004, Tales from the Royals Dugout, and the 2009 Hi , Anybody and co-author of the 1999 book Play by Play-25 Years of Royals on Radio. He's also a 2005 inductee into the Missouri Sports Hall of Fame. In 2017, he lent his writing talents to the book, Kansas City Royals 50 Years: A Golden History.
Matthews graduated from Central Catholic High School in Bloomington, Illinois, and was inducted into the school's Hall of Fame in August, 2001. He is a 1966 graduate of Illinois Wesleyan where he lettered in football and baseball for three years and finished eighth in the nation (NAIA) in pass receiving in 1965, despite not playing football in high school. In 2016, he received a "Distinguished Alumnus" honor from IWU.
Prior to joining the Royals, Matthews worked for WMBD-TV and radio and KMOX-TV. His brother, Mike, is the radio analyst for Illinois State University basketball.

Matthews, an avid collector of sports publications, enjoys playing golf and hockey. He resides in Leawood, Kansas.

Steve Physioc is in his 10th season with the Royals serving both as a voice on the Royals Radio Network and as a play-by-play broadcaster on Bally Sports Kansas City. Physioc was awarded a Mid-America Emmy in 2013 for his outstanding work on Royals' broadcasts.

Physioc previously worked 14 seasons for the Los Angeles Angels from 1996-2009 as the television play-by-play voice on FOX Sports West and KCOP. In addition to his television duties, Physioc also worked on the Angels' radio broadcasts on AM 830.
A graduate of Kansas State University, he was the voice of Wildcats football and basketball from 1979-82. During that time, he also served as a sports anchor for WIBW-TV in Topeka, Kansas, from 1979-83. His sports anchor career continued at WLWT-TV in Cincinnati from 1983-87 and KTUV-TV in Oakland, California, from 1987-89.
He began his Major League play-by-play announcing career in 1983, broadcasting Cincinnati Bengals football and Cincinnati Reds baseball through the 1986 season. He then moved to San Francisco where he worked as a Giants announcer in 1987 and 1988. Physioc moved from the Giants to ESPN in 1989, where he broadcast Major League Baseball, college basketball, baseball and Big Ten football. In 1995, he worked for the San Diego Padres and Pac-10 football for FOX Sports West.

Physioc also broadcast on television and radio for Fresno State University (1992-95), Stanford University (199295), the NBA's Golden State Warriors (1989-91) and Vancouver Grizzlies in their inaugural season of 1995-96.

In 2018 Physioc tried his hand at writing historical fiction and was honored when his debut novels, "The Walls of Lucca," and "Above the Walls," won Gold Medals from Readers Favorite in their 2019 International Book Award Contest. "The Walls of Lucca" also won the 2018 Reader Views Literary Award for Best Historical Fiction. Steve released his third book in February 2021, "Walks with the Wind," the story of a Native American boy's quest to make it to the Major Leagues.

Ryan Lefebvre is in his 23rd season as a Royals broadcaster on Bally Sports Kansas City and the Royals Radio Network. He will be in his 27th season on a Major League broadcast team this year. Lefebvre won his second Mid-America Emmy Award in 2018, after also earning the honor in 2016.

Before joining the Royals prior to the 1999 season, Lefebvre spent four seasons as a broadcaster for the Minnesota Twins on WCCO Radio, WCCO TV and Midwest Sports Channel. He was hired full-time at the age of 24, one year after graduating from the University of Minnesota. He also broadcast Gophers' football, hockey and volleyball for WCCO and MSC.

The Los Angeles native graduated from Loyola High School in 1989 and began his broadcasting career as a freshman at the University of Minnesota at KUOM radio. As a Gopher baseball player, Lefebvre was a First Team All-Big Ten selection in 1993 and established school records for hits, triples and atbats. He was selected in the 27th round of the 1993 First-Year Player Draft by the Cleveland Indians.

He is the son of former big league player and manager, Jim Lefebvre. Actively involved in a number of Kansas City community activities, Lefebvre is the founder of Gloves for Kids and the Footprints Foundation, which raises money for youth programs in Kansas and Missouri. In 2011, Lefebvre was the recipient of the John J. "Buck" O'Neil MVP Award for his commitment to youth in Kansas City. He was also named the 2006 Boys \& Girls Clubs of Greater Kansas City Role Model of the Year, while in 2008 the Staples store in Zona Rosa (Kansas City) was dedicated in his honor for his "Philanthropic Spirit."

In 2019, Lefebvre and his wife, Sarah, spent a week serving a mountain village in Guatemala with Journey Church International. Sarah, a Registered Nurse, has traveled with various organizations to Mexico, Thailand, India, Kenya, Haiti, and Guatemala to provide aid and medical services.

In 2015, Lefebvre was also named the recipient of the Johnson County NAACP Diversity in Sports Award. He was also named one of the "25 Most Influential People" in the state of Kansas in 2014. In 2008, Lefebvre co-authored a book with Jeffrey Flanagan about his struggles with depression, titled: "The Shame of Me: One Man's Journey to Depression and Back".

A veteran with over 39 years of baseball experience, including 21 as a player with the New York Yankees, Baltimore Orioles, St. Louis Cardinals, California Angels, Philadelphia Phillies and the Tokyo Yakult Swallows, Hudler quickly became a fan favorite at all of his stops. Over 1,083 career big league games, Hudler, nicknamed "Wonder Dog", was a . 261 career hitter with 56 home runs and 169 RBI.

Born in Tempe, Arizona, and a 1978 graduate of Bullard High School in Fresno, California, Hudler was a 1999 inductee into the Fresno Sports Hall of Fame. He excelled in all sports in high school, receiving 25 football scholarship offers before signing a letter of intent to play at Notre Dame. He chose baseball after being selected as the 18th overall pick by the Yankees in 1978.

Hudler is an award-winning broadcaster who began his announcing career as a special consultant for "Good Morning America" during the 1997 playoffs and 1998 Super Bowl. He is a four-time winner (2003, '05, '07, '09) of the Television Color Analyst of the Year by the Southern California Sports Broadcasters. Hudler won an Emmy in 2004 for "Angels in the Infield" and has loaned his voice to several baseball video games.

He is an active motivational speaker and he and his wife, Jennifer, founded "Team Up for Down Syndrome." The Hudlers have been awarded several honors for their community service.

The Royals 53rd Spring Training season in club history will be their 19th in Surprise, Arizona.
The Royals and Texas Rangers share a \(\$ 48\) million, 10,500 -seat multi-purpose Recreation and Major League Spring Training Campus on land owned by the City of Surprise. In addition, the city utilizes the facilities for adult and youth recreation programs, community events and programs, special events and meeting facilities.

The stadium complex and baseball practice fields are incorporated into a master-planned municipal center, including administrative offices, recreation/aquatic center, 23,000-square-foot library and 35-40 acre passive park.

In 2015, the Royals complex underwent an \$8-million renovation, adding approximately 14,000 -square feet to the facility. The project

2003-present included expanding the clubhouse, coaches' locker room, training and dining facilities, while giving the club six additional offices on site.

Surprise is approximately 35 minutes northwest of Phoenix, past Sun City West off Highway 60. The complex is located on 125 acres in the vicinity of Bullard Avenue and Greenway Road.

Populous (formerly HOK), an internationally-renowned Kansas City architectural firm devoted to creating exceptional sports facilities, was designated to design the facility.

Groundbreaking took place with Hall of Famers George Brett and Nolan Ryan in attendance on May 21, 2001. The facility was dedicated during a special ceremony and community celebration attended by members of the Royals and Rangers on December 7, 2002. The two teams played the first game at the complex on February 27,2003 , with the Royals coming away with a \(6-3\) win.

The Royals have won the unofficial Cactus League title three times, their first season in Arizona in 2003, 2011 and 2013.
