From a 19-31 record to start the 2019 season, to the National League Wild Card game against the Milwaukee Brewers, to Game 7 of the World Series against the Houston Astros, Washington's historic path to its first World Series Championship can best be described by what Nationals manager Dave Martinez said following Game 4 of the National League Championship Series:

*“Often bumpy roads lead to beautiful places.
And this is a beautiful place.”*

HISTORY MADE

On that bumpy road to winning the World Series, the Washington Nationals had many memorable moments and made some history along the way...

- They became the first team in Major League history to win the World Series by winning all four games on the road.
- The Nationals faced elimination five times in the 2019 Postseason. They trailed in all five and came back to win all five. They are the first team in Major League history to have five comeback wins when facing elimination in a single Postseason.
- The pitchers they beat in those games included Josh Hader, Rich Hill, Clayton Kershaw, Justin Verlander and Zack Greinke.
- In those five contests, the Nationals outscored opponents 19-0 from the seventh inning on.
- From Game 4 of the NLDS to Game 3 of the World Series, the Nationals put together an eight-game winning streak. The eight-game winning streak matched the longest winning streak by any Club in a single Postseason, joining the 2014 Kansas City Royals, the 2005 Chicago White Sox and 2004 Boston Red Sox.


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NATIONAL LEAGUE WILD CARD GAME vs. MILWAUKEE BREWERS

After capping the 2019 regular season with a season-long eight-game winning streak, the Washington Nationals hosted the Milwaukee Brewers in their first ever appearance in the National League Wild Card game.

Trailing 3-1 in the bottom of the eighth inning, the Nationals loaded the bases against relief ace Josh Hader. Michael A. Taylor reached on a hit by pitch, Ryan Zimmerman singled and Anthony Rendon worked a walk. With two outs, Juan Soto singled to right field, plating Taylor and pinch-runner Andrew Stevenson. Thanks to a fielding error by right fielder Trent Grisham, Anthony Rendon was able to score from first base to put the Nationals ahead, 4-3.

Daniel Hudson closed the game out and the Nationals moved on to face the Los Angeles Dodgers in the National League Division Series.

NATIONAL LEAGUE DIVISION SERIES vs. LOS ANGELES DODGERS

The Nationals embarked on their fifth appearance in the NLDS, facing off against their 2016 NLDS foe, the Los Angeles Dodgers. Washington dropped Game 1, 6-0, but evened the series at one game apiece by taking Game 2, 4-2, behind Stephen Strasburg and his 10 strikeouts in 6.0 innings of one-run ball. To much surprise, Dave Martinez summoned Max Scherzer from the bullpen, and he went on to strike out the side in the eighth inning.

After a 10-4 loss in Game 3, the Nationals faced elimination in Game 4. Max Scherzer allowed one earned run in 7.0 innings, while Anthony Rendon (1-for-2, 3 RBI, R) and Ryan Zimmerman (2-for-4, HR, 3 RBI, R) led Washington to the 6-1 victory, forcing a Game 5 in Los Angeles.

Game 5 saw the Nationals fall behind, 3-0, after two innings. Washington scored a run in the sixth inning and, in the eighth inning, Anthony Rendon and Juan Soto clubbed back-to-back home runs off Clayton Kershaw to tie the game at 3-3. The game extended into extra innings and in the top of the 10th, Adam Eaton walked, Rendon doubled and the Dodgers intentionally walked Juan Soto, bringing Howie Kendrick to the plate. Kendrick took an 0-1 offering from Joe Kelly over the fence in center field, a grand slam to give the Nationals the 7-3 advantage. A diving catch by Michael A. Taylor in the bottom half of the inning sealed the win for Washington and sent the organization to the National League Championship Series for the first time.



Anibal Sánchez's masterful performance in Game 1 at Busch Stadium set the tone for the 2019 NLCS. He took a no-hitter into the eighth inning before allowing a one-out single to José Martínez. Sánchez handed the ball to Sean Doolittle, who tossed 1.1 perfect innings to earn the save and secure Washington's 2-0 win.



In Game 2, Max Scherzer attempted to match Sánchez's outing from the night before. Scherzer tossed 6.0 no-hit innings before allowing a single to Paul Goldschmidt in the seventh. He finished the outing striking out 11 batters in 7.0 innings of one-hit, shutout ball. Adam Eaton recorded two RBI and Michael A. Taylor clubbed a solo homer in the third inning to help Washington to the 3-1 win.

The series shifted to Washington for Game 3, and while Stephen Strasburg (7.0 IP, 7 H, R, 12 SO) was magnificent once again, the Nationals offense broke out to lead them to the 8-1 win. Howie Kendrick recorded three doubles and three RBI, while Ryan Zimmerman had a double and two RBI, as well. Victor Robles clubbed a sixth-inning solo home run and the Nationals found themselves one win away from the World Series.





WORLD SERIES vs. HOUSTON ASTROS

Representing Washington, D.C. in the World Series for the first time since 1933, the Washington Nationals took Game 1 of the 2019 World Series, 5-4, over the Houston Astros. Trailing 2-0 after the bottom of the first, Ryan Zimmerman clubbed the first home run in Nationals World Series history to put Washington on the board in the second inning. The Nationals tied it in the fourth and took the lead in the fifth inning on an RBI-single by Adam Eaton and a two-run double by Juan Soto. Sean Doolittle closed it out with 1.1 perfect innings to seal the 5-4 victory.

In Game 2, the Nationals and Astros were tied at 2-2 after one inning before the Nationals went on to plate 10 runs from the sixth through ninth innings to take the commanding 2-0 lead in the World Series. Kurt Suzuki and Adam Eaton each clubbed their first career World Series home runs, while Asdrúbal Cabrera went 2-for-5 with three RBI.

Washington's 2-0 lead did not last long. Houston won games three through five at Nationals Park, sending the series back to Minute Maid Park with the Astros leading, 3-2.

In Game 6, Stephen Strasburg capped his historic 2019 Postseason, becoming the only pitcher to go 5-0 in a Postseason in Major League history. He tossed 8.1 innings of five-hit, two-run ball to lead the Nationals. After trailing 2-1 after the first inning, Juan Soto, Adam Eaton and Anthony Rendon homered, and Rendon recorded five RBI on his own to power Washington's offense. Sean Doolittle finished off the ninth inning in relief of Strasburg and the Nationals topped the Astros, 7-2, to force a Game 7.

After being scratched from his Game 5 start with neck spasms, Max Scherzer returned to full strength to take the hill in Game 7. He worked around seven hits and four walks to allow just two earned runs in 5.0 innings of work before handing the ball to rotation mate Patrick Corbin. The first-year National allowed just two hits with three strikeouts in 3.0 shutout innings of relief.



Trailing 2-0 heading to the top of the seventh inning, Anthony Rendon finally got to Astros pitcher Zack Greinke with a solo home run to left field. Juan Soto drew a walk and the Astros replaced the dealing Greinke with Will Harris. Howie Kendrick added to his already clutch Postseason with a two-run home run off the right field foul pole to give the Nationals the 3-2 lead.

The Nationals added a run in the eighth inning thanks to an RBI-single by Juan Soto, and plated two more in the ninth on a bases loaded, two-run single by Adam Eaton to extend the lead to 6-2. Dave Martinez summoned Daniel Hudson for the ninth inning. After inducing a popup by George Springer, Hudson struck out Jose Altuve and Michael Brantley to give the Washington Nationals their first World Series Championship.

WELCOME TO NATIONALS PARK



Located in the heart of the nation's capital, Nationals Park redefines modern sports facility architecture and serves as a cornerstone of the new mixed-use Capitol Riverfront, adjacent to the Navy Yard in Southeast Washington.

INNOVATIVE ARCHITECTURE UNIQUE TO WASHINGTON, D.C.

From South Capitol Street, the ballpark presents a monumental façade of architectural pre-cast concrete, metal and glass, with features consistent with the traditions of D.C.'s most notable civic buildings.

Nationals Park is easily accessible by fans, especially those arriving from the north via the Navy Yard-Ballpark Metro Station, or on foot from nearby offices and residential neighborhoods.

Nationals Park guests are encouraged to visit D.C.'s other attractions on their way to the ballpark. In addition to the area around the Navy Yard and Southwest Waterfront (Green Line), guests can take the Orange/Blue Line to the Capitol South Metro and walk to Nationals Park along New Jersey Avenue to M Street. Guests can also take the Orange/Blue Line to the Eastern Market station and enjoy a multitude of restaurant and retail offerings along Barracks Row's 8th Street SE.

Fans can enter Nationals Park through the Center Field Plaza and continue along the main concourse, which sweeps around the entire ballpark and offers an almost complete 360-degree open view of the playing field.

Other entry gates include: Left Field Gate, with entry access on South Capitol Street SE; Third Base Gate, with entry access on South Capitol Street SE; Home Plate Gate, with entry access on Potomac Avenue SE; First Base Gate, with entry access on Potomac Avenue SE; and Right Field Gate, with entry access on First Street SE.

The seating bowl wraps around the various levels of the facility in a circular expression of steel and concrete, offering openness and panoramic views of the Anacostia waterfront, Navy Yard, and landmarks such as the U.S. Capitol and the Washington Monument.

BEST-IN-CLASS FAN EXPERIENCE

Nationals Park is equipped with advanced high-definition audio-visual technology, including a 4,800 square-foot high-definition scoreboard, as well as more than 600 linear feet of LED ribbon board along the inner bowl fascia.

The ballpark also features a variety of entertainment and fan interactive activities, food service venues, retail operations, and family-friendly entertainment to ensure a compelling gameday experience.

With a fully-functioning meeting and conference center, four large club spaces, luxurious suites and spectacular views, Nationals Park is the ideal backdrop for corporate or personal events.

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GREEN DESIGN

As the first major sports facility in the U.S. to earn the LEED-certified Silver designation by the U.S. Green Building Council, Nationals Park is considered one of the most environmentally friendly ballparks in the country.

2020 Green Glove Award Finalist

- The Washington Nationals were named the finalist representing the National League East for the 2020 Green Glove Award. Since 2008, Major League Baseball has awarded the Green Glove Award to the Club with the highest rate of waste diverted away from landfills through recycling and composting efforts.
- Since there were no fans during the 2020 season, all of the items harvested from the Nationals Park rooftop garden were donated to the Nationals Youth Baseball Academy.
- New furniture was purchased for the area around the Budweiser Terrace that is made from 97% post-consumer HDPE-milk jugs. The existing furniture was taken apart, most of which was recycled or repurposed.
- All metals, cardboard, and pallets that left Nationals Park in 2020 were weighted and recycled, more than doubling the ballpark's diversion rate.
- The Nationals Park playing field was replaced, which resulted in the old field being converted into 688 tons of reusable top soil.

Nationals Park incorporates a variety of other sustainable design elements, including:

Solar Panels

- After the 2018 season, the Washington Nationals and WGL Energy teamed up to install 4,080 solar panels in two locations at Nationals Park.
- The two roof canopies cover the upper deck of the parking garages situated on either side of the ballpark.
- The power from the project generates a combined total of 1.4 megawatts of energy, supplying an estimated ten percent of the ballpark's electricity needs each year.

A Sustainable Site

- Located near the Anacostia River, Nationals Park was categorized as a brownfield redevelopment and has served as a catalyst for urban revitalization in the area.
- The ballpark's location is easily accessible via public transportation, including access to nearby metro stations and local bus routes.

Use of Materials

- Water-conserving plumbing fixtures are used throughout the facility, reducing overall water consumption.
- Energy-saving light fixtures help reduce light pollution and results in a projected 21 percent energy savings over typical field lighting.
- Content of building materials used on the project contained a minimum of 10 percent recycled content.
- Many of the building materials used on the project were produced regionally, which cut down on transportation costs while promoting the local economy.
- Interior materials including adhesives, carpet glues, and paints were specified with low VOC contents.
- Roof materials offer a high degree of reflectance, minimizing the amount of heat released to the environment. A 6,300-square-foot green roof above the concession area beyond left field also minimizes roof heat gain.

An Intricate Ground and Stormwater Filtration System

- Because Nationals Park is within close proximity to the Anacostia River, much care was taken to treat storm and ground water runoff.
- The result is a unique, intricate water filtration system that separates water used for cleaning the ballpark from rainwater falling on the ballpark and treats both sources of water before it is released to the sanitary and stormwater systems.

Playing Surface

- Following the 2017 season, the playing field went through a renovation project that included an upgraded irrigation system, new growing medium for the turf, and new turf across the entire surface consisting of a new blend of Kentucky Bluegrass varieties.
- The natural grass field consists of a four-way blend of Kentucky Bluegrass grown on a 100 percent sand base profile.
- Infield Dirt is a designed mix of sand, silt, and clay; provided by DuraEdge.
- Warning Track is a crushed red lava stone.
- Drainage lines consist of six-inch perforated drainage pipes that were installed in a pea-gravel layer, aligned every 15 feet across the entire playing field.

Interesting Facts

- Inspiration for the look of the ballpark was taken from the I. M. Pei-designed East Wing of the National Gallery of Art.
- Because the field is 24 feet below street level, more than half of the crowd will walk straight off the street, onto the main concourse and into their seats, without ever using elevators or climbing ramps or stairs.
- Populous (formerly HOK Sport), the ballpark's designer, borrowed the inspiration for an odd, right-angled jog into the left center field fence from the now demolished Griffith Stadium, former home of the Washington Senators.
- On Opening Day 2016, the Nationals hit a major milestone when the 25 Millionth Fan walked through the gates at Nationals Park. Among other gifts, the lucky fan received a pair of Opening Day tickets for the next 25 years and a special Nationals jersey and jacket.


NOT JUST FOR BASEBALL

In addition to baseball, Nationals Park was constructed with the purpose of hosting outside organizations and serving as a civic asset for the District of Columbia and surrounding region. Since opening in 2008, Nationals Park has gained a reputation as one of the premier locations for outdoor events and continues to find new and innovative ways to utilize all parts of the ballpark.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, throughout 2020, the Washington Nationals opened Nationals Park to various organizations to help community members in need in D.C. and the surrounding areas.

World Central Kitchen at Nationals Park

- From April to October of 2020, Chef José Andrés' World Central Kitchen and the Washington Nationals utilized Nationals Park as a cooking and distribution site for free meals to community members throughout the DMV.
- World Central Kitchen was able to prepare and distribute over 900,000 cooked meals throughout D.C., including neighborhoods surrounding the Nationals Youth Baseball Academy.
- The NATS4GOOD Community Response Fund raised over \$118,000 issued in two grants to World Central Kitchen and Capital Area Food Bank, through the generous contributions of Nationals fans, players, and personnel, as part of the Nationals World Series virtual ring fundraiser.



DC Central Kitchen at Nationals Park

- From October to December of 2020, the Nationals offered up the Nationals Park kitchens to host DC Central Kitchen's culinary job training program.
- The training program provides culinary arts education, career readiness training, and real-world internships for adults who have experienced barriers to employment.
- Students in the program at the ballpark received guidance from Washington Nationals Executive Chef Tim Jones, and many of the prepared meals were distributed to families at the Washington Nationals Youth Baseball Academy.



2020 General Election Super Voting Center

- Nationals Park proudly served as a super voting center location for the 2020 Presidential Election. The ballpark was utilized for early voting and stayed open through Election Day.
- Additionally, the Nationals Youth Baseball Academy served as a voting center for Wards 7 and 8.
- Nationals Park hosted 7,040 in-person voters, giving the ballpark one of the largest voter turnouts of any location in our nation's capital.



COVID-19 Testing Site

- Throughout the winter, Nationals Park served as a COVID-19 testing site in order to help keep the D.C. community healthy.

CONCERT PREPARATION AT NATIONALS PARK

Thanks to the hard work and dedication of our outstanding grounds crew, Nationals Park is able to host outdoor concerts and other exciting events. Below is a description of the process to transform Nationals Park from a ballpark into a world-class entertainment venue.

- Concert preparation begins several months prior to concert load-in.
- Field transformation begins immediately following the last out of the game preceding the concert. Protective tarps are placed over the entire infield dirt area and protective flooring is placed over the warning track surface.
- The following morning, stage load-in begins. This usually takes place over a two-to three-day period. The grounds crew is responsible for overseeing all movements and placements of stage and sound equipment onto the field. They also supervise all crane movements from the time they enter the building until the time the crane exits the building.
- Once the stage has been constructed, production load-in will begin (generally the day before the concert). This process involves speakers, video screens, lights, musical instruments and other electronics. This takes several hours. The grounds crew oversees all movements and assists the production team in order to limit or prevent field damage.
- Following production load-in, protective flooring is placed across all exposed grass.
- The day of the concert, the grounds crew walks the field and stage area several times looking for any last minute adjustments that need to be made. Air and soil temperatures are closely monitored, as is the soil moisture content.

- Concert load-out begins immediately following the end of the concert and concludes anywhere between 16 to 24 hours later.
- Upon completion of load-out, the grounds crew spends the remaining time prepping the field for when the Nationals return home.

NOTABLE EVENTS AT NATIONALS PARK

Pope Benedict XVI Mass

- On April 17, 2008, as part of his tour of the United States, Pope Benedict XVI celebrated Mass at Nationals Park.
- Approximately 47,000 people were in attendance.
- The audience included 14 cardinals, 250 bishops, and 1,300 priests.
- In accordance with Vatican protocol, Communion wafers were distributed within 20 minutes to more than 40,000 Mass attendees.

Billy Joel and Elton John: “Face to Face” Tour

- The first concert at Nationals Park was a blockbuster event, featuring Billy Joel and Elton John in a joint performance on July 11, 2009, as part of their “Face to Face” tour. A sold-out crowd saw the two legendary musicians perform.
- The duo focused on material from the 1970’s and 80’s during their concert at Nationals Park, and played nothing more recent than John’s 1983 hit “I’m Still Standing.”

Dave Matthews Band

- On July 23, 2010, the Dave Matthews Band performed at Nationals Park in the second-ever show held at the venue.
- The Zac Brown Band was the opening act for the concert, a preview of their 2015 performance at Nationals Park

Jason Aldean: “Burn It Down” Tour

- Multi-Platinum country entertainer Jason Aldean performed on July 25, 2014, at Nationals Park as part of his “Burn It Down” tour. Duo Florida Georgia Line and artist Tyler Farr opened for Aldean.

“Billy Joel in Concert”

- Billy Joel returned to Nationals Park as part of his “Billy Joel in Concert” series on July 26, 2014. The sold-out concert marked Billy Joel’s first solo headlining appearance at the ballpark and featured a 45-minute opening act from Gavin DeGraw.
- During the concert, Joel famously donned a Nationals baseball cap.

One Direction: “Where We Are Tour”

- On Aug. 11, 2014, English-Irish boy band One Direction brought their international “Where We Are Tour” to the nation’s capital.
- Australian pop/rock band 5 Seconds of Summer served as the opening act.

2015 NHL Winter Classic

- On Jan. 1, 2015, Nationals Park became the center of the hockey universe when the playing field was transformed into a hockey rink for the annual NHL Winter Classic. The 42,842 fans in attendance watched the Washington Capitals top the Chicago Blackhawks, 3-2, in dramatic fashion.
- There were two ice rinks built, one to serve as the playing surface and one to represent the Reflecting Pool on the National Mall.
- 3,000 gallons of Glycol coolant were used to help maintain the preferred ice temperature of 22 degrees Fahrenheit.
- The thickness of the ice was three inches.
- 32,000 square-feet of decking was used for construction of the rink.

- 100,000 square-feet of new grass was installed to bring the field back to a safe, consistent surface for baseball.

Taylor Swift: “1989 World Tour”

- International pop superstar Taylor Swift, winner of seven Grammy Awards, brought her “1989 World Tour” to Nationals Park on July 13 and 14, 2015. Swift performed in front of two sold-out crowds at the ballpark, totaling 85,014 fans over two nights.
- During the performance on July 13, Swift was joined onstage by New Zealand phenom Lorde. Swift was joined onstage by multi-platinum singer, songwriter and dancer Jason Derulo during the performance on July 14.
- The rock band Haim and singer-songwriters Vance Joy and Shawn Mendes were the opening acts for Swift.

Zac Brown Band: “Jekyll + Hyde Tour”

- The “Jekyll + Hyde Tour” was the fifth headlining concert tour by country music group Zac Brown Band. The tour, which supported their fourth studio album, hit Nationals Park on Aug. 14, 2015.
- Nine of the shows on the tour took place at MLB parks, including Nationals Park, Fenway Park and Wrigley Field.
- The show, which lasted for two and a half hours, took place on a three-story tier stage and combined country music elements with EDM, rock and pop.
- During a break in the show, Zac Brown changed clothes and returned wearing a button-down shirt and a Washington Nationals baseball cap.

“Billy Joel in Concert”

- On July 20, 2016, legendary musician Billy Joel became the first artist ever to play Nationals Park three times.
- A sold-out crowd watched the Piano Man perform.

Bruce Springsteen and the E Street Band: “The River Tour 2016”

- “The River Tour 2016” marked the first tour in two years for Springsteen and the E Street Band and was performed in support of Springsteen’s 2015 “The Ties That Bind: The River Collection” box set and in celebration of the 35th anniversary of Springsteen’s 1980 album, “The River.”
- After playing at the Verizon Center in January, Bruce Springsteen returned to the nation’s capital and played a nearly three-hour set at Nationals Park on September 1, 2016. Afterward, the band encoored with another eight songs.

James Taylor & His All-Star Band

- James Taylor and His All-Star Band played four concerts at ballparks across the United States in summer 2017.
- Joining Taylor and his band onstage at Nationals Park was a special guest, singer-songwriter Bonnie Raitt.

The 89th Major League Baseball All-Star Game

The Eagles and James Taylor & His All-Star Band

- The legendary Eagles came to Nationals Park on July 26 as part of their 2018 North American Tour. The concert at Nationals Park was one of only two concerts in the summer of 2018 that featured both the Eagles, who have sold more than 120 million albums worldwide, and James Taylor and His All-Star Band.

Zac Brown Band 2018: Down the Rabbit Hole Live! with very special guest OneRepublic

- Country music group Zac Brown Band made their third career appearance at Nationals Park on July 27. The stop was part of their eighth headlining concert tour and the visit featured an opening act from pop-rock band OneRepublic.


- Hard rock band Guns N' Roses is scheduled to play their first show at Nationals Park on July 13, 2021, as part of their 2021 summer stadium tour.

HOME RUN MARKERS

Prior to the 2015 season, the Washington Nationals announced a project to mark the landing spots of long and/or significant home runs at Nationals Park. These historic markers paid homage to the white seats at Robert F. Kennedy Memorial (RFK) Stadium that marked the mammoth home runs hit by Washington Senators slugger, Frank Howard.

WASHINGTON NATIONALS COMMUNITY RELATIONS

The Washington Nationals are committed to enhancing the quality of life for citizens in the Washington, D.C. region. The primary focus is on initiatives that honor military families, encourage youth participation in baseball and softball, and support K-12 education in the community.

MILITARY INITIATIVES

The Washington Nationals are proud to work with the large community of military bases, installations and hospitals that serve as permanent or temporary homes to military service members and their families living in the Washington D.C. metropolitan area.

» NATS ON BASE

While base events and programming were limited in 2020, the Nationals offered support to base leadership by amplifying messages, providing mascot appearances, and delivering promotional items for distribution. The Nationals worked with military partners to shift touchpoints to a virtual setting including players participating in a Zoom call with TAPS surviving family members, as well as Nationals executives providing professional development to transitioning service members.

As the team transitioned to virtual ceremonies and recognitions, the team worked with participating bases to highlight military theme day games, Stories of Service, and a virtual Salute to Service that expanded to include frontline workers.

EDUCATION INITIATIVES

The Washington Nationals are proud to work with the large community of military bases, installations and hospitals that serve as permanent or temporary homes to military service members and their families living in the Washington D.C. metropolitan area.

» SUMMER READING

Entering 2020, the Nationals had two established library partners, the D.C. Public Library and the Arlington Public Library. With the pandemic shifting the team to virtual programming, the Nationals were able to expand the Summer Reading program to include every major library system in the D.C. Metro region. The team is now partnered with the following library systems:

- DC Public Library •Arlington Public Library •Prince George's County Memorial Library
- Alexandria Library •Fairfax County Public Library •Loudoun County Public Library
- Montgomery County Public Libraries •Nats on Base – Military base libraries and youth programs

Each library system was provided videos of Nationals players reading books, as well as Nationals-themed posters to display in their branch locations. Library partners also provided book recommendations for the Team UP summit and monthly newsletter.



» **GRAND SLAM SCHOOLS**

As school partners navigated changes necessitated by the pandemic, the Nationals worked to adapt the Grand Slam School curriculum to reach families who would be educating their children at home. This included the creation of the Home and Away program, utilizing both STEM education content previously used for Grand Slam Schools, as well as Nationals and baseball-themed physical education content.

The Nationals also responded to specific school needs. Most significant of these efforts was helping Van Ness Elementary School obtain laptops to provide to their students in order to address the technology access gap that exists within the school population. Through generous assistance provided by SAIC, the Nationals were able to provide enough laptops to address 80% of the need of the student body, with the school PTA making up the difference to ensure that every student that was in need to a laptop was able to receive one.

YOUTH BASEBALL AND SOFTBALL INITIATIVES

The Nationals are committed to promoting youth baseball and softball through Team UP, a progressive, multi-faceted Youth Baseball Uniform Program, hosting clinics, coordinating player visits, and recognizing significant youth baseball and softball championship achievements.

» **Team UP**

Started in 2015, Team UP connects thousands of kids across the region to Nationals baseball by providing resources and support to youth baseball and softball leagues, while cultivating a passion for the game among young fans. Team UP in 2020 achieved new milestones, with the addition of the first Maryland leagues (Montgomery County RBI, Prince George's County RBI, Rockville RBI) as well as new member leagues from military installations (Fort Belvoir Little League, Quantico Youth Baseball).

With this expansion, Team UP now supports 28 leagues (nine in DC, 16 in VA and three in MD), more than 1,400 teams, and serves nearly 16,000 kids. In the first five years of the program (2015-2019), the leagues report that Team UP has collectively saved them more than \$1,360,000.

The pandemic accelerated planned future programming, including integration of educational and social instruction:

- *Home and Away* – physical education, STEM Education, and reading resources all with a baseball theme were developed and shared with Team UP leagues throughout the shutdown.
- *Summit* – Nationals hosted a virtual Team UP Summit with member leagues, shifting the normal focus to important social issues – discussion of the Negro Leagues and its relevance to current race relations, as well as safe return to play for youth sports. For both topics the Nationals provided experts in the field as guest speakers – Dr. Bernard Demczuk, Retired Professor George Washington University - American Studies and African American History and Culture and Dr. Caitlin Rivers, Senior Scholar Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health.
- *Newsletter* – To further connect youth leagues, players and their families to the Nationals, a monthly offseason newsletter is sent to the member leagues. Content endeavors to reach kids through different educational topics – history (MLB in D.C., Negro Leagues), reading (baseball-themed reading lists), math (calculating baseball statistics) and social/personal awareness (age-appropriate mindfulness moments).



PLAYER PROGRAMS

» JOSH BELL

Service has always been part of Josh's life. Recently this service has come into sharper focus with his passions driving him to address environmental racism - the persistent disparity of resources in many black communities that perpetuate the cycle of inequality and poverty. Josh is dedicated to social reform advocacy, educating kids about food nutrition, teaching skills for self-improvement and for "being a good human."

» ROBERTO CLEMENTE AWARD

Since 1972, Major League Baseball has annually presented an award (originally known as The Commissioner’s Award) to the player who best exemplifies the game of baseball, sportsmanship, community involvement, and the individual’s contribution to his team.

In 1973, following the tragic death of Roberto Clemente, the award was renamed to honor the man whose spirit and goodwill will always be remembered. The award recognizes those individuals who truly understand the value of helping others.

A panel of baseball dignitaries, including Vera Clemente and MLB Commissioner Rob Manfred, annually select a winner from a list of 30 nominees, one from each Major League Baseball club.

» HEART AND HUSTLE AWARD

Created by the Major League Baseball Players Alumni Association in 2005, the Heart & Hustle Award is voted on by Alumni and active Major League players and is presented annually to an active player who demonstrates a passion for the game of baseball and best embodies the values, spirit and traditions of the game.

The MLBPA formed 30 committees, comprised of Alumni players with established relationships to each team. One player from each Major League team is chosen by the committees based on the passion, desire, and work ethic demonstrated both on and off the field. These players are recognized prior to a late-season home game. As the season draws to a close, fans, all Alumni, and active players vote to select the final winner from the 30 team nominees.

After his outstanding 2019 season - and his many heroics to the Nationals to the 2019 World Series Championship - infielder Howie Kendrick was named the winner of the Heart and Hustle Award by the MLBPA.

» BOB FELLER ACT OF VALOR AWARD

The Bob Feller Act of Valor Foundation, through the unique intersection of baseball and the US Navy, recognizes and honors those who support service men and women with the Bob Feller Act of Valor Award. The award uses Bob Feller’s story to educate the youth of today on lessons of citizenship, service to one’s country, and sacrifice in times of great national need. Teaching the legacy of the Greatest Generation to the youngest generation helps instill in them the virtues of service to others. Sean Doolittle was chosen as the league-wide, national winner in 2018.



THE NATIONALS AND THE USO TOUR

On several occasions, the Washington Nationals have been personally invited to join the General Martin E. Dempsey, former Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, on his annual Chairman's USO Holiday Tour. Nationals participants have included Aaron Barrett (2020) and Adam Eaton (2020), as well as former players Doug Fister (2014), Adam LaRoche (2013), Ross Detwiler (2012) and Craig Stammen (2012).

The trip is a whirlwind tour across several countries that is calculated down to the second. For safety reasons, little is known about the trips ahead of time. Past tours have included visits with service members all over the world, including Poland, Romania, Greece, Afghanistan, Italy, Germany, the United Kingdom, Turkey, Bahrain and Kyrgyzstan. Though it's an exhausting stretch of days, every participating player has returned home inspired and with a changed perspective.

Including matching funds from partners, over \$628,440 was distributed in 2020 through 22 grants awarded to local non-profits including Capital Area Food Bank, DC Central Kitchen, Inova Health Foundation, Pathways to Housing DC, and others. » FRONTLINES OF FOOD INSECURITY

For six months, Nationals Park served as the longest running sports venue occupied by World Central Kitchen for meal preparation and distribution to food insecure residents. In total, the historic effort delivered over 900,000 free meals into the community.

» **CULINARY TRAINING PROGRAM**

As the World Central Kitchen operation wound down, DC Central Kitchen took up residence in Nationals Park to operate its Culinary Job Training Program. The program prepares young adults facing barriers to employment for culinary careers.

MISSION STATEMENT AND OVERVIEW

As the signature program of Nationals Philanthropies, the Washington Nationals Youth Baseball Academy uses baseball and softball as vehicles to foster positive character development, academic achievement, and improved health among youth from underserved communities in Washington, D.C. The Academy’s unique program uses a year-round holistic approach, emphasizing academic enrichment, social emotional learning, and wellness for Scholar Athletes and the larger community.

Conceived as part of a public-private partnership between the District government and Major League Baseball in the deal that brought the Nationals to Washington, D.C., the Academy operates out of a state-of-the-art, nine-acre education and recreation campus constructed in the Ft. Dupont Park neighborhood in Ward 7. The Academy began programming in 2013 and opened its facility in 2014. Programs are designed to make a holistic and lasting impact on the lives of children and families living east of the Anacostia River.

In response to COVID-19, Academy staff will continue to modify program delivery. For more information visit natsacademy.org.

PROGRAMMING

The Academy opened in March 2014 and features an 18,000 square foot “education clubhouse” complete with seven classrooms, a teaching kitchen, and multi-purpose training and education space. The grounds include three lighted, turf fields – two multipurpose youth baseball/softball diamonds and a full 90-foot diamond.

The culture at the Academy is grounded in the positive values of sports – instilling in our Scholar Athletes a love of physical activity as well as the qualities of determination, resiliency, teamwork, and goal setting. Our model depends on two cohorts of key personnel: a talented, committed staff of coaches and classroom coordinators who work with Academy youth each day, and community volunteers who serve as tutors, mentors, and coaches. The Academy and its partners train these committed individuals in positive coaching and education methodologies, allowing them to support Scholar Athletes in developing the skills necessary to reach their full academic potential and lead long and healthy lives. In addition to core programming modules, through the activities listed below, the Academy offers innovative, impactful engagements that improve educational, health, and social-emotional outcomes for children, families, and the community as a whole.

» **BOOKS & BASEBALL / Exposure**

Ages 3-5, citywide

A blended approach to introducing children to the game of baseball. We build a foundation, use storytelling to generate excitement for the game, and teach basic athletic skills through fun weekly clinics.

» **YBA PLAY / Engagement**

Ages 5-12, citywide

Fun and free clinic that makes the game more accessible to players. Modified game rules enable a faster pace of play and recognize effort over skill, allowing for deeper engagement and love for the game.

» **HUSTLE / Development****Age 9-17, Wards 7 & 8**

A program for players eager for higher competition and advanced skill development. Participants play games against local talent, engage in tournaments, showcases, and “pro” workouts to hone skills, develop on-field accuracy, discipline, and athleticism. HUSTLE sets players up to pursue athletics in high school and beyond.

» **BASE PROGRAM / Education****Age 8-14, Wards 7 & 8**

A holistic, afterschool enrichment program that blends sports activity, nutrition instruction, mentoring, specialized activities, and STEM-focused academic support with socio-emotional skills development. BASE is geared toward overall wellness and ongoing growth.

» **FIELD OF GREENS MARKET / Food Access****Adults, Wards 7 & 8**

Operated continuously since 2018 to supply healthy and nutrient-dense food, the Field of Greens Farmers Market is the only year-round farmers market for community residents in Ward 7 and features shares of fresh produce at a greatly subsidized rate.

COVID-19 RESPONSE AT THE ACADEMY

In late March 2020, the Academy cancelled regular programming in alignment with school closures and municipal guidance. The facility remained open as a food access point throughout the spring and summer, and in September began welcoming students back to campus for onsite programming at limited capacity. Continuity of service is critical to deepening trust with the community. Public support allows Academy staff to continue to adapt programs and propelled these outcomes last year:

- » Over 15,000 grab & go meals distributed from the Academy to members of the surrounding community
- » More than 2,050 bags of produce distributed through the Field of Greens Market, representing a 210% increase over typical distribution in the same period last year
- » 22 YBA PLAY TV episodes and instructional playbook kept children active during the summer and fall – with videos also distributed to select schools for use in virtual PE curriculum
- » 95 volunteers contributed over 630 hours serving as mentors, tutors, and volunteer coaches for program participants
- » Over 29,000 masks distributed to partner schools and Scholar Athletes to facilitate a safe return to play.

Although we still have a ways to go before we can begin returning to "normal," we are filled with renewed hope thinking about everything we have overcome together during the past year and thinking about the beginning of another baseball season.

Our first priority heading into this offseason was to solidify the leadership of our team. By signing Mike Rizzo and Davey Martinez to multi-year contract extensions, we feel we have set ourselves up for success for years to come.

Mike and his staff have been hard at work filling out our roster this offseason and we are very excited to welcome several new players. New sluggers Josh Bell and Kyle Schwarber should add a lot of power to our lineup, and Alex Avila will provide many years of big league experience behind the plate. 



For a lifelong baseball fan who paid 25 cents to sit in the bleachers at Griffith Stadium to watch the Senators, and worked as an usher in the ballpark as a teenager, owning the Washington Nationals is the realization of a lifetime dream.

Since becoming the Managing Principal Owner of the Nationals on May 3, 2006, Ted Lerner and his family have worked non-stop to build the Nationals into a world-class baseball team in their hometown.

Knowing how important baseball is to the Nation's Capital, Ted Lerner and the Lerner family are dedicated to making the team a winner and Nationals Park a success for the fans.

Born and raised in Washington, D.C., Ted Lerner founded Lerner Enterprises in 1952, and it is the largest private real estate development company in the metropolitan Washington, D.C. area. Lerner Enterprises is based in Rockville, Md., and was voted Family Business of the Year by the Kogod School of Business at The American University in 1999, and in 2008 was named Visionaries of the Year and Most Influential Commercial Real Estate Company in the Washington area by Bisnow Real Estate. In February 2015, Transwestern awarded Lerner Enterprises the 2015 Private Company TrendSetter of the Year award for their dedication to growth and innovation in the Washington D.C., Maryland and Virginia region. He is a graduate of The George Washington University and has a law degree from The George Washington University National Law Center.

Mr. Lerner has served on the Board of Trustees and Executive Committee of The George Washington University. Two buildings have been donated to the University - the Annette and Theodore Lerner Family Health and Wellness Center and the Theodore N. Lerner Hall at the GWU National Law Center. Their private foundation, The Annette M. and Theodore N. Lerner Family Foundation, provides support to many local and international organizations, including the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, the Weizmann Institute of Science, Junior Achievement of the Greater Washington Area, Georgetown Day School, Charles E. Smith Jewish Day School, The Jewish Federation of Greater Washington, B'nai Brith Youth Organization (BBYO), Washington Hospital Center Foundation, the Anti-Defamation League, the Jewish Community Centers of Greater Washington and District of Columbia, Imagination Stage of Bethesda, Food and Friends, YouthAids, The John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, and many more. Adding to this history of community involvement in the Washington area, the Lerner family is pleased to be able to expand their active participation in the region through the Washington Nationals Dream Foundation.

Mr. Lerner is a founding member of the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum. In 1990, the American Academy of Achievement awarded him the Golden Plate Award of Excellence. He was elected to the Washington Business Hall of Fame by Junior Achievement in 2003, in 2007 was honored as the charter inductee in The George Washington University School of Business Sports Executives Hall of Fame and the Jewish Community Center of Greater Washington Sports Hall of Fame, in 2014 he was inducted into the Washington D.C. Sports Hall of Fame and received the Thomas G. Corcoran Award by the University Club of D.C., and in 2015 he was awarded the Urban Land Institute Lifetime Achievement Award.



The Lerner organization has developed millions of square feet of office buildings, retail centers, hotels and residential communities in the Washington, D.C., Maryland and Virginia area. The principals of the company include Mark's father Ted, and his brothers-in-law, Edward L. Cohen and Robert K. Tanenbaum. He received his BBA from The George Washington University in 1975.

An enthusiastic sports fan since childhood, Mark also represents the Lerner, Cohen and Tanenbaum families as a Partner in Monumental Sports & Entertainment – the sports investment group that owns the 2018 NHL Stanley Cup Champion Washington Capitals, the NBA Washington Wizards, the 2019 WNBA Champion Washington Mystics, and the Capital One Arena. Mark holds numerous volunteer positions within the community. He is currently on the Council of Advisors of the Jewish Community Center of Greater Washington, a member of the Board of Directors of the George Washington University Hillel, a member of the Advisory Board of Israel Bonds, a member of the board of the Washington DC Sports Hall of Fame, Vice President of The Annette M. and Theodore N. Lerner Family Foundation, and an Officer of Washington Nationals Philanthropies. In 2007, he received the prestigious Chadesh Yameinu Award from the Charles E. Smith Jewish Day School in Rockville, Maryland, where he previously served as a member of the Board of Directors and as Chair of the Building & Grounds Committee. He was also Co-Chair of the 2004 JCC Maccabi Games of Greater Washington. In 2015, he was awarded Trendsetter of the Year in commercial real estate by Transwestern and Delta Associates. In 2018, the Lerner family was awarded the Irene and Abe Pollin Humanitarian Award by the Jewish Community Center of Greater Washington. In the spirit of #Nats4Good, Nationals Philanthropies catalyzes the energy of Nationals fans and the generosity and philanthropic goals of Nationals players, corporate champions, and community partners to fuel even greater good for a better Washington. In 2020, a total of 50 community impact grants were disbursed to nonprofit partners across the region to support critical programs and services. This marks a record number of grants issued by the Nationals foundation in a given year, demonstrating the collective power of the Nationals family to deliver direct support to our neighbors when they need it most. Philanthropic efforts are highlighted by the organization’s programmatic arm, the Washington Nationals Youth Baseball Academy, which implements holistic youth development programming and hosts games and community events serving thousands of young people and other area residents throughout the year at its nine-acre education and recreation campus in the Ward 7 neighborhood of Ft. Dupont Park.

Nationals Philanthropies builds on the legacy of the Dream Foundation and its indelible impact on the region made through field refurbishments, grants to local non-profits, and the Washington Nationals Diabetes Care Complex at Children’s National Medical Center.

Marla, who sits on Major League Baseball’s Diversity Committee, is also a past chair of the board for the Koby Mandell Foundation, which sponsors healing programs and camps for children who have lost family to acts of terror in Israel; past chair and current member of the Anti-Defamation League’s Washington, D.C. region; and a member of the National Board of the Hebrew University of Jerusalem. She is presently serving on the Anti-Defamation League’s Sports Leadership Council.



ALAN H. GOTTLIEB

CHIEF OPERATING OFFICER, LERNER SPORTS GROUP

Alan Gottlieb is the longtime Chief Operating Officer of Lerner Enterprises and its affiliated entities. He is responsible for the day-to-day operation of its businesses, which include real estate and sports.

Mr. Gottlieb oversees an operating real estate portfolio consisting of over 20 million square feet and is comprised of high- and low-rise office buildings, large regional malls, retail centers, rental residential communities, hotels and other income producing assets. He also oversees new homebuilding, as well as the Washington Nationals Baseball Club.

A life-long resident of the Baltimore/Washington region, he has served with a variety of community organizations, including as a board member for the Capital Children’s Museum.



MIKE RIZZO

PRESIDENT OF BASEBALL OPERATIONS & GENERAL MANAGER

Mike Rizzo was the first and most significant hire made by the Lerner family after assuming control of the Nationals franchise in July of 2006. Brought on first as Assistant General Manager, Rizzo's arrival in The District signaled a renewed emphasis on amateur talent and building a successful organization from the bottom up.

Rizzo was promoted to President of Baseball Operations and General Manager on Aug. 1, 2013, continuing his swift ascension within the organization and reflecting his strong working relationship with the Lerner Family.

On September 5, 2020, Rizzo agreed to a contract extension. He enters the 2021 season – his 13th as the head of Washington's baseball operations – as the third-longest tenured General Manager in Major League Baseball.

Previously, Rizzo served the organization as Executive Vice President of Baseball Operations and General Manager for beginning Oct. 19, 2010. Rizzo, who is also a member of the Board of Directors at the Nationals' Youth Baseball Academy, was appointed Senior Vice President and General Manager on Aug. 20, 2009, and acted as the team's General Manager since earlier that year.

Under Rizzo's leadership, the Nationals are 964-877 (.524) since the start of the 2009 season. That is tied for the sixth-best record in Major League Baseball over the last 12 seasons. With a 2-0 win on July 24, 2019 vs. Colorado, Rizzo recorded his 900th win since taking over the club during 2009 Spring Training.

Since 2012, the Nationals are 756-600 (.558), the third-best regular season record in Major League Baseball over this span, behind only the Los Angeles Dodgers (800-557, .590) and the New York Yankees (762-594, .562).

In 2019 – after 11 seasons as the head of Washington's baseball operations – Rizzo guided the Washington Nationals to their first World Series title. On the stage at Minute Maid Park in Houston, Rizzo held the Commissioner's Trophy and exclaimed:

“For our 94-year-old Owner, for my 90-year-old Dad – special assistant to the GM. To all of the scouts and player development people out there, to the players who make it all happen, we're World Champs tonight!”

And at the World Series parade a few days later, he reminded the hundreds of thousands that lined Constitution Avenue:

“To the Nationals fan base: You are the district of champions and I couldn't be more humbled to be the President of Baseball Operations and General Manager for this franchise.”

Under Rizzo's leadership, the Nationals have transformed into one of Major League Baseball's perennially elite clubs, winning a World Series in 2019, earning four National League East titles (2012, 2014, 2016, 2017) and one Wild Card berth (2019) in the last nine seasons.

For his efforts in leading the Nationals, Rizzo has been honored with several awards during his tenure. He was named Executive of the Year by Baseball America and the Boston Chapter of the BBWAA in 2019. The Boston Chapter of the BBWAA also honored him with the same award following the 2012 season. He also garnered Executive of the Year honors in 2012 from the Pitch and Hit Club of Chicago, which followed 2011 Man of the Year honors from the Lido Civic Club of Washington, D.C.

En route to the World Series Championship, the 2019 Washington Nationals finished the regular season with a 93-69 (.574) record and were winners of the top Wild Card spot in the National League. The 2019 season marked Washington's eighth consecutive winning season, the fourth-longest winning streak in Major League Baseball at the time. Only the New York Yankees (27 seasons), St. Louis Cardinals (12 seasons) and the Los Angeles Dodgers (9 seasons) had longer active consecutive winning streaks in Major League Baseball.

Following the 2018 season, Rizzo and his baseball operations staff made 11 moves from October through February impacting the 40-man roster. The additions of catchers Kurt Suzuki and Yan Gomes, as well as pitchers Patrick Corbin and Anibal Sánchez, brought talent, experience and leadership to Washington's roster. Rizzo brought first baseman Matt Adams back to Washington, D.C. and added veteran second baseman Brian Dozier's steady glove and power bat to the lineup.

As the Nationals battled through the early portion of the 2019 season, Rizzo's additions of Gerardo Parra, Javy Guerra and Fernando Rodney helped stabilize the roster as the Nationals waited for their regulars to return from the Injured List. In early August, Rizzo signed a familiar face in Asdrúbal Cabrera to provide a switch-hitting, versatile infielder to help the Nationals down the stretch.

The 2019 Trade Deadline saw significant additions to Washington's roster, specifically the bullpen. As the deadline neared, Rizzo acquired Daniel Hudson from the Toronto Blue Jays, as well as Hunter Strickland and Roenis Elias from the Seattle Mariners. Rizzo acquired all three pitchers without surrendering any current Major League talent or top prospects.

Utilizing his systematic approach – making moves he feels will better the club for the immediate future, as well as the long-term – Rizzo has guided the Nationals to solidify their Major League team, in conjunction with the impeccable farm system that feeds it.

While scouting and player development have been hallmarks of Rizzo's approach, so too have been shrewd trades and free agent signings. Whether the deals have been to help build up the farm system, or to utilize some of that prospective talent to yield significant Major League contributors, Rizzo has proven himself a deft dealmaker.

Following the 2020 season, Rizzo and his baseball operations staff went to work assembling the 2021 Washington Nationals, making 12 moves impacting the 40-man roster:

Oct. 22 – Signed infielder/outfielder Josh Harrison to a one-year contract

Oct. 30 – Selected the contract of right-handed pitcher Steven Fuentes

Nov. 18 – Signed left-handed pitcher Sam Clay to a Major League contract

Nov. 20 – Selected the contracts of infielder Yasel Antuna and right-handed pitcher Joan Adon

Dec. 7 – Acquired right-handed pitcher Rogelio Armenteros off waivers

Dec. 24 – Acquired first baseman Josh Bell from the Pittsburgh Pirates

Jan. 9 – Signed outfielder Kyle Schwarber to a one-year contract

Jan. 23 – Signed first baseman Ryan Zimmerman to a one-year contract

Jan. 26 – Signed left-handed pitcher Brad Hand to a one-year contract

Jan. 27 – Signed left-handed pitcher Jon Lester to a one-year contract

Feb. 2 – Signed catcher Alex Avila to a one-year contract

Over the course of Rizzo's tenure with the Nationals, there have been several seminal moments. Here are just a few:

In November of 2009, Rizzo convinced Davey Johnson to sign on as Senior Advisor and help revamp the Nationals' on-field operations. In June of 2011, Rizzo appointed him field manager and Johnson stewarded the team to its first playoff appearance and through the 2013 season.

On December 5, 2010, Rizzo signed right fielder Jayson Werth to a seven-year contract that immediately changed the perception of the Nationals, especially within the industry. Little more than a year later, Rizzo was instrumental in signing franchise cornerstone, Ryan Zimmerman, to a six-year contract extension.

From 2009-12 Rizzo's Nationals won at least 10 more games than the season prior: 59 wins in 2009, 69 in '10, 80 in '11, 98 in '12. The last team to do this was the Boston Red Sox from 1906-09, making the Nationals the first team in over 100 years to complete such a feat without the benefit of an artificially deflated win total associated with a work stoppage.

Solidifying arguably the best rotation in the Major Leagues, Rizzo and the Lerner Family signed 2013 American League Cy Young Award winner, right-handed pitcher Max Scherzer to a seven-year contract and introduced him to D.C. on January 21, 2015.

In Dec. of 2015, Rizzo pulled off a three-team trade that yielded shortstop Trea Turner and right-handed pitcher Joe Ross from the San Diego Padres and sent outfielder Steven Souza Jr. to the Tampa Bay Rays.

With the 2016 Baseball Winter Meetings taking place at nearby National Harbor, Md., Rizzo acquired outfielder Adam Eaton from the White Sox in December in exchange for top prospects Lucas Giolito, Reynaldo Lopez and Dane Dunning.

With Washington ahead in the division by nearly 10.0 games following the 2017 All-Star break, Rizzo saw the opportunity to get a jump on the trade market as the non-waiver trade deadline was nearly two weeks away. On July 16 in Cincinnati, with the club trying to complete the four-game sweep of the Reds that afternoon, Rizzo fortified Washington's bullpen by acquiring relievers Sean Doolittle and Ryan Madson from the Oakland Athletics. From July 17 through the end of the season, the Nationals paced the National League with a 3.36 bullpen ERA.

Rizzo was not finished improving the club in 2017, as he made two more deals as the deadline neared. On July 28, he solidified Washington's bench by acquiring veteran Howie Kendrick from the Philadelphia Phillies. Moments before the July 31 deadline, Rizzo strengthened Washington's bullpen even further with the acquisition of Minnesota Twins closer and American League All-Star, Brandon Kintzler.

When Howie Kendrick went down with an Achilles injury on May 19, 2018, Mike Rizzo made the call to bring the 19-year-old Juan Soto to the Major Leagues. From that day Soto put together one of the best seasons by a teenager in Major League history.

On Dec. 7, 2018, Rizzo inked the top free agent pitcher on the market, Patrick Corbin, to a six-year contract that immediately provided dividends in the 2019 regular season and on Washington's run to the 2019 World Series title.

Rizzo continued to invest in starting pitching – the bedrock of his team building philosophy – by signing Stephen Strasburg to a seven-year contract in the winter of 2019. Although Strasburg opted out of his contract following the 2019 World Series, Rizzo convinced the World Series MVP to become a Washington National for life and solidify his mark on D.C. Baseball history.

Other notable contributors Mike Rizzo has brought in via trade during his tenure include Gio Gonzalez, Tanner Roark, Blake Treinen, Mark Melancon, Wilson Ramos, Denard Span, Kurt Suzuki, Michael Morse, and Sean Burnett, among others.

Rizzo's impact on the organization has been wide-ranging and was felt immediately. The Nationals' 2007 First-Year Player Draft – Rizzo's first with the organization – was rated as the best in baseball by Baseball America. In the spring of 2008 as a newly appointed General Manager, Rizzo steadied the Nationals' operation in the Dominican Republic, moving their complex to Boca Chica. The team's Dominican operations have grown exponentially since that time.

Rizzo joined the Nationals after seven seasons with the Arizona Diamondbacks, primarily as Director of Scouting, where he helped transform the Diamondbacks farm system with exceptionally successful drafts. Following the 2005 campaign Rizzo was promoted to Vice President of Scouting Operations. That same year, the Diamondbacks were named Topps' Organization of the Year.



Rizzo earned a World Series ring with Arizona in 2001, and the organization brought an astounding number of homegrown players through to the Major Leagues during his tenure. Brandon Webb (2006 Cy Young Award winner), Carlos Gonzalez, Chad Tracy, Justin Upton, Stephen Drew, Dan Uggla, Micah Owings, Tony Pena, Mark Reynolds, Conor Jackson, Miguel Montero, Chris Snyder, Carlos Quentin, Max Scherzer and Brett Anderson were all signed by Arizona under Rizzo's watch.

Rizzo, who is entering his 38th season of pro baseball, joined the Diamondbacks in 1998. He previously enjoyed stints with the Boston Red Sox (1992-1998, area supervisor, international scout and major league advance scout) and the Chicago White Sox (1986-1992, Midwest and Southeast territorial scout). While with the White Sox, Rizzo signed 2014 Hall of Fame inductee and two-time American League MVP Frank Thomas.

Raised in Chicago, Rizzo is a third-generation scout. He learned the game from his father, Phillip, who spent 50 years in professional baseball, and his grandfather, Vito, who was a semi-pro player before founding the family business: scouting. Phil continued his scouting career with the Nationals as a Senior Advisor to the GM until his recent passing on February 1, 2020.

Rizzo spent four seasons as a minor league infielder in the Angels organization. Upon retiring as a player, he served as an assistant coach at the University of Illinois while earning a Bachelor of Arts in Communications.

Rizzo lives in Washington, D.C., with his wife, Jodi. His son, Michael Jr. is an Entertainment Brand Manager at a talent agency in Los Angeles, Calif.



Johnny DiPuglia enters his second season as Vice President, Assistant GM International Operations, a position to which he was elevated in November of 2019 – marking his fourth promotion within the organization. DiPuglia, who was named the Nationals’ Vice President of International Operations in November 2015 also served in roles as the Nationals’ Director of Latin American Operations and Director of International Scouting dating back to 2009.

During his time with the Nationals, DiPuglia has had a hand in the signing and development of Juan Soto, Victor Robles, Luis García, Wander Suero, Jefry Rodríguez, Reynaldo López, Wilmer Difo, Pedro Severino, Rafael Bautista, Raudy Read, Rafael Martín, and Yunesky Maya, all of whom reached the Major Leagues with the Nationals. DiPuglia was also instrumental in signing top Latin American prospects, Yasel Antuna, Joan Adon, Andry Lara, Jeremy De La Rosa, Israel Pineda, Daniel Marte, Roismar Quintana, and Andry Arias, among others.

At the 2019 Winter Meetings, DiPuglia was awarded the Professional Scouts International Scout of the Year Award. Following the 2020 season, he was inducted into the South Florida Baseball Hall of Fame for over 30 years of service and dedication to the South Florida baseball community.

DiPuglia came to the Nationals on the heels of 11 seasons (1999-2009) with the Boston Red Sox, during which he was part of two World Series Championship seasons (2004 & 2007). While with the Red Sox, DiPuglia, who finished his tenure in Boston as the team’s Latin American Scouting Coordinator, was responsible for coverage in the Dominican Republic, Venezuela, Panama, Mexico, Curacao, Nicaragua, Aruba, Colombia, and all of Central and South America.

DiPuglia has also worked with the San Francisco Giants (1998-1999) and St. Louis Cardinals (1990-1998).

In addition to the impact he’s had with Washington, over the course of his career, DiPuglia was involved in the signings of José Iglesias, Xander Bogaerts, Hanley Ramírez, Anibal Sánchez, Placido Polanco, Felix Díaz, Ángel Chavez, Jorge De La Rosa, Rick Ankiel, Eli Marrero, and René Arocha, among many others. In 1997 he received the Danny Monzon Scout of the Year South Florida Award for his work with the Red Sox and in 2005 he received the Red Sox International Scout of the Year Award.

DiPuglia resides in Miami, Fla., with his wife, Kimberly, and his daughters: Jessica, Summer, Kayla and Katie, as well as his grandchildren: Zoey and Rocko.



Doug Harris begins his 12th season with the Nationals, joining the organization on Oct. 16, 2009 after being appointed as the Director of Player Development. He shifted into his current role following the 2015 season, continuing his ascension in the organization. Harris was promoted to Assistant General Manager and Vice President of Player Development on Nov. 21, 2013, and the oversight of the Pro Scouting department was added to his duties on Dec. 23, 2014.

Harris brought with him more than 25 years of baseball experience as a player, amateur scout and professional scout, and he has overseen the Nationals' farm system for the previous eight seasons. With the additional responsibility of leading the organization's Pro Scouting efforts, Harris' role in the organization has expanded exponentially and significantly in a short amount of time – reflecting his profound impact.

Harris has been integral in the development of the Nationals' amateur players. Harris helped talents such as Trea Turner, Juan Soto, Luis García, Victor Robles, Andrew Stevenson, Bryce Harper, Anthony Rendon, Carter Kieboom, Jake Noll, Michael A. Taylor, Brian Goodwin, Erick Fedde, Koda Glover, Wilmer Difo, among many others, see their development through to the Major Leagues.

Prior to joining the Nationals, Harris spent the 2009 season as a Major League scout and advance scout with the Cleveland Indians, but his lone season with the Indians came at the conclusion of 13 years with the Texas Rangers in various scouting capacities. Among the players Harris helped draft and sign during his time with the Rangers is former Major League outfielder Kevin Mench.

A right-handed pitcher, Harris was selected in the fourth round of the 1990 First-Year Player Draft by Kansas City and played seven professional seasons with three organizations, including the Royals, Baltimore Orioles and Florida Marlins. The Royals named Harris as the organization's 1991 Player of the Year after he posted a 2.39 ERA across Low and High Class-A.

Harris, attended James Madison University in Harrisonburg, Va., and currently resides in Carlisle, Pa., with his wife, Lisa, and three daughters: Alex, Sydney and Jordyn.



Kris Kline enters his eighth season as Assistant General Manager and Vice President of Scouting Operations after being promoted to that spot on Nov. 21, 2013. Kline spent the previous four seasons as the Nationals' Director of Scouting, a position to which he was appointed on October 16, 2009.

A scout for more than 30 years, Kline has been with the Nationals since the fall of 2006. He spent his first three seasons in Washington first as a Special Assignment Scout, then as the Western Crosschecker.

Under his watch as the head of Washington's amateur scouting operation, the Nationals have drafted and signed 59 eventual Major Leaguers – an average of nearly five big leaguers per draft from Ross Detwiler in 2007 (first round) to the most recent debuts of Seth Romero (first round) and Wil Crowe (second round) from the 2017 Draft and Aaron Fletcher (SEA, 14th rd.) from the 2018 Draft.

Entering the 2021 season, the 2016 Draft has yielded nine Major Leaguers, including Carter Kieboom (WSH, 1st rd.), Dane Dunning (CWS, 1st rd.), Sheldon Neuse (OAK, 2nd rd.), Jesus Luzardo (OAK, 3rd rd.), Daniel Johnson (CLE, 5th rd.), Tres Barrera (6th round), Jake Noll (WSN, 8th rd.) Ben Braymer (WSH, 18th rd.) and Sterling Sharp (MIA, 22nd rd.).

Kline has led drafts that yielded first-round talents and eventual Major League players Stephen Strasburg, Drew Storen, Bryce Harper, Anthony Rendon, Alex Meyer, Brian Goodwin, Lucas Giolito and Erick Fedde. Recent first-rounders include Seth Romero (2017), Mason Denaburg (2018), Jackson Rutledge (2019) and Cade Cavalli (2020).

Kline came to the Nationals after spending seven years with the Arizona Diamondbacks, the final three of which were spent as the Diamondbacks' Western Supervisor – where he worked under Nationals President of Baseball Operations and General Manager Mike Rizzo, then the Diamondbacks' Director of Scouting. Kline earned a World Series ring in 2001 as the Diamondbacks topped the New York Yankees in seven games.

During his time in Arizona, Kline was part of a scouting team that brought an astounding 75 players through the system to the Major Leagues.

Among the many players Kline has had a hand in drafting and signing are former Cy Young winner Brandon Webb, a Diamondbacks product, and right-hander John Lackey, who remains one of the youngest pitchers in history to win Game 7 of the World Series.

Before joining the Diamondbacks, Kline spent 10 years working for the California Angels as a scout after he completed his four-year professional playing career in their Minor League system.





TED TOWNE

ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER & VICE PRESIDENT, FINANCE

Ted Towne is entering his 14th season with the Nationals, his seventh with the additional responsibilities of an Assistant General Manager. He was elevated to his current post on Aug. 19, 2014, expanding his role as the Vice President of Finance.




MIKE DeBARTOLO

SAM MONDRY-COHEN


ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER, BASEBALL RESEARCH & DEVELOPMENT

Bob Boone joined the Nationals upon being appointed as Special Assistant to the General Manager on Dec. 11, 2004. He shifted into his current role as Vice President & Senior Advisor to the GM following the 2015 season, after serving as Assistant General Manager & Vice President, Player Development from 2006-2013, and Vice President of Player Personnel from 2014-2015.

Boone has played a vital role in all of the Nationals' Major League evaluations, both internal and external, and helped "recruit" a new wave of talent to join the Nationals' scouting and player development ranks. His presence has also helped secure several Player Development Contracts over the years.


One of the premier catchers of his generation, Boone was named to four All-Star teams ('76, '78-79, '83) and won seven Rawlings Gold Gloves ('78-79, '82, '86-89) during his 19-year career. Only Ivan Rodriguez (13) and Johnny Bench (10) have won more Gold Gloves for catching.

Selected by the Phillies as a third baseman out of Stanford University—where he graduated with a degree in psychology—Boone spent the first 10 years of his Major League career with Philadelphia (1972-81), which won four division titles and a World Series Championship in 1980. From there, Boone played for Anaheim (1982-88) and Kansas City (1989-90). Upon retirement, he held the Major League record for games caught in a career (2225, later broken by Carlton Fisk) and most seasons (15) catching at least 100 games.

In October of 1994, Boone was named manager of the Kansas City Royals, a position he held until July of 1997. Following his tenure with Kansas City, Boone joined Cincinnati as a special assistant, before serving as manager of the Reds from 2001 until July of 2003.

Boone was born on November 19, 1947 in San Diego, Calif. and resides in San Marcos, Calif. with his wife, Sue. Two of their sons played in the big leagues and achieved All-Star status: Bret (three-time All-Star, retired) and Aaron (2003 NL All-Star, retired). Aaron will embark on his second season in the dugout after being hired as the manager of the New York Yankees. Their youngest son, Matt, played six seasons of pro ball after being drafted by the Mariners in the third round of the 1997 First-Year Player Draft.

His father, the late Ray Boone, was an All-Star infielder during his 13-year career in the big leagues (1948-60). Bob's brother, Rodney, played in the Kansas City and Houston farm systems from 1972-75. The Boones are one of only four three-generation baseball families, along with the Bells (Gus, Buddy and David), the Colemans (Joe, Joe and Casey) and the Hairstons (Sam, Jerry Sr. and Jerry Jr.).

VICE PRESIDENT, CLUBHOUSE OPERATIONS & TEAM TRAVEL

Rob McDonald begins his 20th season with the Nationals' organization as the Vice President of Clubhouse Operations & Team Travel. He was elevated to his current position in July of 2011 after previously serving as Director of Team Travel.

McDonald was named the 2003 Don Davidson Memorial Award winner, as voted by his peers, as MLB's Traveling Secretary of the Year, and was the recipient of the fourth annual Wahoff award for the 2015 Traveling Secretary of the Year. In 2018, he was selected by MLB to assist with the MLB All-Star Japan Series.

After attending Northern Illinois University on a football scholarship, McDonald later earned his Bachelor's Degree in Political Science from the University of Arizona. McDonald resides in Washington, D.C.

PHIL RIZZO
1929-2020

SENIOR ADVISOR TO THE GENERAL MANAGER

Phil Rizzo spent 11 seasons as a Senior Advisor to his son, Mike Rizzo, Washington's President of Baseball Operations and General Manager. He was named to the position on Dec. 3, 2009, at the time bringing more than 40 years of scouting experience to the organization.

Phil joined his son for the second time in their respective careers when he was hired by the Nationals in 2009. The two also worked together for seven seasons (1999-2005) with Arizona, where Phil was a Diamondbacks Special Assignment Scout.

While with the Diamondbacks, Rizzo made the first call and filed the first report on University of Kentucky right-hander Brandon Webb, who won the 2006 NL Cy Young Award and represented Arizona in three All-Star Games.

In addition to his time with the Nationals and Diamondbacks, Rizzo's 50-year career in baseball included stints as a scout in the Chicago area for the Chicago White Sox, Los Angeles Angels, Milwaukee Brewers and New York Yankees.

Rizzo is also credited with signing, among others, right-handed pitcher Bob Wickman, left-handed pitcher Bob Kipper, catcher Mike Matheny, infielder Dick Schofield and infielder Mark Loretta.

In May of 2008, Rizzo was one of eight scouts to comprise the inaugural class of the Professional Baseball Scouts Hall of Fame.

Phillip "Butch" Rizzo passed away at age 90 on Feb. 1, 2020. Phil led his family with the values of hard work, grit and loyalty. His impact on the Washington Nationals and the professional baseball scouting community will not be forgotten.



JACK McKEON

SENIOR ADVISOR TO THE GENERAL MANAGER, MAJOR LEAGUE OPERATIONS

Jack McKeon was hired by the Nationals in January of 2019, bringing nearly 70 years of professional baseball experience to Washington’s front office. He joins the Nationals after serving 12 seasons (2006-17) as a special assistant for the Miami Marlins. A World Series Champion in 2003 and a two-time National League Manager of the Year (2003, 1999), McKeon compiled a 1,051-990 (.515) record across 16 seasons as a Major League manager. He skippered the Florida Marlins (2003-05, 2011), Cincinnati Reds (1997-2000), San Diego Padres (1988-90), Oakland Athletics (1977-78) and Kansas City Royals (1973-75).

On June 20, 2011, he was named interim manager of the Marlins, making him the second-oldest manager in Major League history behind Connie Mack, who managed at 87 years old in 1950. He became the Marlins all-time winningest manager on Sept. 16, 2011 with a win over the Washington Nationals.

McKeon joined the Cincinnati Reds in January 1993 and prior to returning to the dugout on July 25, 1997, he served as Cincinnati’s senior advisor for player personnel, consulting on trades, player evaluations and special assignments. In three-plus seasons with Reds, he compiled a 291-259 (.529) record.

From 1980-90, McKeon held roles with the San Diego Padres, starting as an assistant to the general manager before moving in the role himself during the 1980 All-Star break. During his time with the Padres, he earned the nickname “Trader Jack” for his penchant to make trades. McKeon took over as the manager of the Padres on May 28, 1988 and remained in that position until the 1990 All-Star break.


McKeon spent parts of two seasons (1977 and 1978) as the manager of the Oakland Athletics, going 71-105 (.403). Around those stints in the dugout, he served Oakland as an assistant general manager, scouting director, scout and coach.

At the age of 42, McKeon earned his first Major League managing job with the Kansas City Royals, going 215-205 (.512) from 1973 to 1975.

Prior to joining the Royals and between Major League front office and managerial stints, McKeon accumulated a 1146-1123 (.505) record across 17 seasons as a Minor League manager, including stints in the Washington Senators farm system in 1962 and 1963.

McKeon was signed by the Pittsburgh Pirates in 1949 and spent time both as a player and a player/manager during his Minor League career. He played for ten seasons from 1949-59, save for the 1951 season when he was in military service.

A native of South Amboy, NJ, Jackson Aloysius McKeon attended The College of Holy Cross and Seton Hall University before graduating from Elon College. He is married to his wife, Carol Isley. They have two daughters Krist and Kori and two sons, Kelly and Kasey.



Harolyn Cardozo, a native Washingtonian, is entering her 16th season with the Washington Nationals.

Brought on in 2006 by former General Manager Jim Bowden, Cardozo brought a unique blend of abilities from both sports and politics to this high-profile office. Her skills in sports management were honed over 12 years in competitive tennis at the Bollettieri Tennis Academies, now IGM. Having served two administrations as a member of the White House Staff, Cardozo’s political background brought a sense of order and diplomacy to the Nationals’ baseball operations.

Until his departure in Feb. 2008, Harolyn served as Bowden’s Executive Assistant, a role unexpectedly expanded when a surprise staff shake-up resulted in trial-by-fire job training. Mike Rizzo, who assumed the reigns as GM after Bowden’s departure, credits Cardozo with maintaining an orderly and professional transition.

Now one of Rizzo’s closest aides, Cardozo was promoted in 2011 to Special Assistant to the GM, Major League Operations, a role unique in the organization.

Cardozo is a 1978 graduate of Sophie Newcomb College of Tulane University, married for 39 years to Michael H. Cardozo V, an attorney and founding partner of a D.C.-based merchant banking firm.

Daughter, Eden, is a physician in Boston, daughter, Julia, is an assistant state’s attorney in Maryland, and son, Michael, is in the licensed medical Cannabis business in Maryland. Cardozo is also the proud grandmother of Jack, 5, Gabe, 3 and Emmeline (6 months).

RESUME

Dave Martinez is entering his fourth season as the manager of the Washington Nationals after being named the seventh field manager in team history on Oct. 30, 2017...In his three seasons in Washington, Martinez has led the club through a steady, unwavering approach, consistent strategy and never-ending positivity and support for players...That includes an improbable run to the 2019 World Series Championship...For his efforts, Martinez was awarded with a multi-year contract extension with the Washington Nationals on Sept. 26, 2020...Martinez enters the 2021 season just 24 wins shy of passing Davey Johnson for the most managerial wins (224) in Nationals history (2005-pres.)...Early in the 2021 season, Martinez – with 384 games – will pass Manny Acta as the longest tenured manager in team history (410 games).

In 2019, he navigated a 19-31 (.380) start to become the second team in Major League history to win a World Series after being 12 games under .500 at any point during a season, joining the 1914 Boston Braves...From May 24 through the end of the 2019 season, Martinez led the Nationals to a 74-38 (.661) record, tied for the second-best record in Major League Baseball from that point through the end of the season...En route to Washington's first World Series championship since 1924, Martinez led Washington to become the first team in Major League history to record five comeback wins when facing elimination in a single Postseason...From Game 4 of the National League Division Series against Los Angeles through Game 2 of the World Series against Houston, the Nationals won eight straight games...The eight-game winning streak matched the longest winning streak by any Club in a single Postseason, joining the 2014 Kansas City Royals, the 2005 Chicago White Sox and 2004 Boston Red Sox.

The 2021 season marks Martinez's 33rd season in professional baseball, including 10 years (2008-17) as a Major League bench coach...From 2015-17, he served as the bench coach for the Chicago Cubs where he played an integral role in three Postseason appearances, two National League Central Division titles and the Cubs' 2016 World Series Championship...Prior to joining the Cubs, Martinez spent seven seasons (2008-14) as the bench coach for the Tampa Bay Rays... Martinez joined the Rays in 2008 after serving as a Spring Training instructor for them in 2006 and 2007...Then-manager Joe Maddon offered Martinez the role of bench coach and Martinez went on to serve as Maddon's right-hand man for the next 10 seasons.

A veteran of 16 Major League seasons, Martinez broke into the big leagues with the Chicago Cubs in 1986 at the age of 21...During the 1986 season, he was the 10th-youngest player in Major League Baseball...He made his debut on June 15, 1986 vs. St. Louis and recorded his first hit on June 23 at Philadelphia, a ninth-inning single off Shane Rawley...Martinez played in 1,918 games while amassing 1,599 hits for nine clubs across his 16-year career...Following two-plus seasons with the Cubs (1986-88), Martinez was acquired by the Montreal Expos, where he played from 1988-91...He spent the 1992 season with the Cincinnati Reds before stints with the San Francisco Giants (1993-94) and Chicago White Sox (1995-97)...He was a key member of the 1993 Giants club that won 103 games, but missed out on the Postseason...Following the 1997 season, he signed with the expansion Tampa Bay Devil Rays and in 1998, he recorded the first hit in Devil Rays history, a single off Justin Thompson (DET)...Martinez returned to the Cubs in 2000, while also spending time with the Texas Rangers and Toronto Blue Jays during the 2000 season...He capped his career with the Atlanta Braves, spending the 2001 season with the eventual National League East Division champions.

Veteran All-Star catcher was acquired from Cleveland on Nov. 30, 2018...Signed a two-year contract in Dec. 2019, keeping him with the Nationals through the 2021 season...Has recorded double-digit home runs in six of his last eight full Major League seasons...Also brings leadership and presence behind the plate...Has appeared in 22 Postseason games, including the 2019 and 2016 World Series...Caught the final out of the 2019 World Series.

2020

Combined with Kurt Suzuki to form one of the better offensive catching tandems in Major League Baseball...Ranked among National League catchers (min. 115 PA) in average (3rd, .284), slugging percentage (4th, .468), and OPS (4th, .787)...Hit .323/.346/.531 in his last 26 games after starting 2020 hitless in his first 13 at bats...Clubbed his 100th career homer, Aug. 21 vs. Miami (Hernandez)...Homered the next game as well, Aug. 22 vs. Miami (Sanchez)...Recorded a season-long 10-game hitting streak, Aug. 10-30...Hit .390 (16-for-41) with four doubles, a triple, two homers and seven RBI during the streak.



Polished veteran right-hander, three-time Cy Young Award Winner and seven-time All-Star signed a historic seven-year contract with Washington on Jan. 21, 2015...Joined the Nationals after seven Major League seasons with the Detroit Tigers (2010-14) and Arizona Diamondbacks (2008-09)...Went 3-0 with a 2.40 ERA in six games (five starts) in the 2019 Postseason...Made two starts in the 2019 World Series, including a Game 7 start just days after a neck injury forced him to miss his start in Game 5...Is one of just 10 pitchers in Major League history to take home the Cy Young Award three or more times, having claimed the 2013 American League Cy Young and the 2016 and 2017 National League awards...He joins Roger Clemens (7), HOF Randy Johnson (5), HOF Steve Carlton (4), HOF Greg Maddux (4), Clayton Kershaw (3), HOF Sandy Koufax (3), HOF Pedro Martinez (3), HOF Jim Palmer (3) and HOF Tom Seaver (3) on that list...Hall of Famers Gaylord Perry, Martinez, and Johnson, as well as Clemens and Roy Halladay join Scherzer as the only pitchers to win the award in both leagues...In his first two seasons in Washington, he became just the fifth pitcher in MLB history to throw two no-hitters in the same regular season (2015) and joined Hall of Famer Randy Johnson as the only pitchers in MLB history to have a no-hitter and a 20-strikeout game (2016) on their resume...Helped the Nationals become the first team since the Milwaukee Braves (Aug. 18, 1960 - April 28, 1961) to throw three no-hitters in a 162-game span (Jordan Zimmermann, Game No. 162, 2014; Scherzer, Games No. 69 & 161, 2015).

2020

In his sixth season with the Nationals, recorded his 11th consecutive winning season... In 12 starts, he finished the 2020 season 5-4 with a 3.64 ERA, the best mark among qualified Nationals pitchers...His 3.64 ERA was the best mark among qualified Nationals pitchers...Ranked in the National League in strikeouts per 9.0 innings (3rd, 12.30), strikeouts (6th, 92) and strikeout-to-walk ratio (8th, 4.00)...Struck out 21 batters across his first two starts of the season...Struck out 11 on Opening Day, July 23 vs. New York (AL)...Struck out 10 batters on July 29 vs. Toronto...He recorded at least 10 strikeouts five times, tied for the most in the National League with NYM Jacob deGrom and behind only CLE Shane Bieber (8) for the most in Major League Baseball...Tossed 7.0 innings/0 ER twice (7/29 at TOR, 9/7 vs. TBR)...Passed Hall of Famer Sandy Koufax with 98th 10+ strikeout game on Sept. 13 vs. Atlanta...**2020 Pitch Mix:** Four Seam (46%), Slider (19%), Changeup (16.1%), Cutter (9.7%), Curve (9.2%).

2019

Ranked in the National League in strikeouts per 9.0 IP (1st, 12.69), strikeout-to-walk ratio (1st, 7.36), strikeouts (3rd, 243), opp. OBP (4th, .266), WHIP (4th, 1.03) and walks per 9.0 IP (4th, 1.72)...In 17 starts from May 22 through the end of the season, Scherzer went 9-2 with a 2.44 ERA, 156 strikeouts, 19 walks and a .201 opp. AVG...Entering that start on May 22, he ranked 25th in the National League in ERA at 3.72...He finished the season ranked sixth at 2.92...On May 26th he recorded his 2,500th career strikeouts vs. San Diego (Margot)... Was named National League Pitcher of the Month for June and National League Player of the Week for the final week of the month...He went 6-0 with a 1.00 ERA (5 ER/45.0 IP) in six starts during the month...He recorded 68 strikeouts against just five walks (13.6 SO/BB), including a 24 strikeouts-to-zero-walks stretch spanning his last two starts...Turned in his strongest pitching performance of the year on June 2 to propel the Nationals to the 4-1 win and the series win over the Cincinnati Reds...He struck out 15 batters in 8.0 innings of three-hit, one-run ball to secure his third win of the season...It was the sixth time he struck out 15 or more batters in a game, tying him with Sam McDowell for the sixth-most in Major League Baseball history...Went 8-0 with a 1.86 ERA in 12 starts from June 2 to Sept. 8...Had 114 strikeouts, 13 walks and a .179 opp. AVG during the winning streak... It tied for the longest streak in the season by a Nationals player (Sánchez, 5/29-8/23) and tied for third-longest streak in the National League in 019...The Nationals won 11 of the 12 games...On Sept. 24th he recorded his 93rd, 10+ strikeout game of his career and his 11th of the season...Went 7-2 with a 2.64 ERA in 12 starts on the road this season...According to FanGraphs.com, Scherzer led all Major League Baseball pitchers in Fielding Independent Pitching (2.45) and ranked second in Wins Above Replacement (6.5)...In the 2019 Postseason he went 3-0 with a 2.40 ERA in six games (five starts)...The Nationals went 6-0 when he pitched...Opposing batters hit .193 with three doubles and four homers against him...Right-handed batters were just 10-for-59 (.169) with a double and two homers against him...Started Game 2 of the NLCS against the Cardinals...Struck out 11 batters in 7.0 innings of one-hit ball...Took a no-hitter into the seventh inning before allowing a hit to Paul Goldschmidt...Joined Roger Clemens (2000 ALCS Game 4) as the only pitchers in Postseason history to throw at least 7.0 innings with 11 strikeouts and one hit...According to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, he has taken a no-hitter into the fifth inning in five career Postseason starts, three more than the next closest pitcher...Earned the win in Game 1 of the World Series, tossing 5.0 innings of two-run, five-hit ball...Became the 12th pitcher in World Series history to amass at least seven punchouts while not pitching more than 5.0 innings...According to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, with his start against Zack Greinke, it marked the first time in World Series history that a pair of Cy Young Award winners faced off in Game 7 of the World Series...His 11.01 strikeouts per 9.0 innings in his Postseason career ranked first in MLB history among pitchers with at least 60.0 Postseason innings pitched.

A CLOSER LOOK AT WHAT MAX SCHERZER HAS ACCOMPLISHED WITH THE STRIKEOUT...

- Is one of 11 pitchers in MLB history (since 1900) to post at least eight seasons of 200+ strikeouts...His streak of eight 200+ strikeout seasons is tied for second in MLB history behind Hall of Famer **Tom Seaver** (9, 1968-76).
- Crossed the 250-strikeout mark for five consecutive years (2014-18)...He is the second pitcher in MLB history to compile five consecutive seasons or more with 250+ strikeouts behind only Hall of Famer **Randy Johnson** (1997-2002).
- Is the only active pitcher with more than three seasons of at least 276 strikeouts (2015-16, 2018)
- Recorded 300 strikeouts in 2018, becoming the fifth pitcher since 2001 to hit the 300 strikeout mark in a season...He became the 17th pitcher since 1900 to record a 300-strikeout season - the 36th 300+ strikeout season overall...Also joined HOF **Walter Johnson** as the only pitcher in D.C. baseball history to record 300 strikeouts...Scherzer needed 220.1 innings pitched to record 300 strikeouts, the fifth-fewest innings needed to get to 300 among all pitchers to accomplish the feat according to *Elias*: HOF **Randy Johnson** (2001, 197.2 IP), HOF **Pedro Martinez** (1999, 203.2 IP), **Chris Sale** (2017, 209.1 IP) and HOF **Randy Johnson** (2000, 217.0 IP)...Scherzer allowed just 150 hits in 2018, the fewest ever allowed by a pitcher in a 300-strikeout season, besting **Pedro Martinez's** 158 hits allowed in 1997, according to Stats Inc.

2018

Placed himself in consideration for yet another National League Cy Young Award...Finished second in the voting...Was named to his sixth consecutive All-Star Game...Started the game for the National League in his home park...Went 18-7 with a 2.53 ERA in 33 starts... He led Major League Baseball with 300 strikeouts and led National League pitchers in strikeouts per 9.0 IP (12.24), strikeout-to-walk ratio (5.88), WHIP (0.91), opp. AVG (.188), innings pitched (220.2), hits per 9.0 IP (6.12) and wins (11st, 18)...Also ranked in the NL in opp. OBP (2nd, .247), ERA (3rd, 2.53) and opp. OPS (3rd, .580)...His 51 walks were his fewest since he walked 34 in 2015...Recorded his 1,000th strikeout with Washington on July 2 vs. Boston, becoming the 11th pitcher in MLB history to collect at least 1,000 strikeouts with two different clubs...Was named National League Pitcher of the Month in both April and May...In April, he went 5-1 with a 1.62 ERA (7 ER/39.0 IP) and 57 strikeouts and just nine walks...In three starts from April 9-20, he allowed just seven hits in 71 at-bats, yielding an opponent slash line of .099/169/183...He struck out 30 batters and issued just four walks during this stretch of games...On April 9 against Atlanta, he tossed his ninth career complete game (fifth career shutout) to end Washington's five-game losing streak...In May, he went 4-0 with a 2.21 ERA (10 ER/40.2 IP) and 63 strikeouts against just 10 walks...He led the NL in strikeouts (63) and strikeouts per 9.0 IP (13.9)...Recorded an MLB best nine-game winning streak from April 9 to June 5...In the month of April, he was called upon to help snap five-game (4/9 vs. ATL), three-game (4/14 vs. COL) and four-game (4/25 at SFG) losing streaks...He earned the victory in each start, pitching to a 1.64 ERA (4 ER/22.0 IP) with 31 strikeouts against just three walks...Did not earn the win, but struck out a season-high 15 batters on May 6 vs. Philadelphia...It was his fifth career 15+ strikeout game...On June 2 at Atlanta, as a pinch hitter he singled and scored from first base on a triple by Wilmer Difo to give the Nationals the lead in the 14th inning...He tossed a team-best 20.0 consecutive scoreless innings from Aug. 7 to Aug. 23...Recorded his 285th strikeout of the season on Sept. 20 vs. New York (NL) a then-new career-high and a then-Nationals (2005-pres.) record for most strikeouts in a season...He capped his season with his 300th strikeout on Sept. 25 vs. Miami (Dean)...For more on Scherzer's 300 strikeout-season, see the info box on the following page...Struck out at least 10 batters in 18 of his 33 starts...Struck out at least 10 batters in 10 of his first 15 starts and at least 10 in eight of his last 12 starts.



2017

In his third year in Washington, Scherzer - yet again - placed himself among the top pitchers in MLB and solidified his standing as one of the best in history with his third Cy Young Award...In doing so, he became the first pitcher to win his league's Cy Young Award in back-to-back seasons since Clayton Kershaw took home the honors in 2013 and 2014...Scherzer led the National League in a majority of the significant pitching categories (see info boxes that follow)... He went 16-6 with a 2.51 ERA in 31 starts...Was historically good in the season's first half...Went 10-5 with a 2.10 ERA in 18 starts prior to the All-Star break...Also posted a 0.78 WHIP...That was the fourth-best mark in MLB history (since 1913) among starting pitchers...From May 26 to June 21, he struck out at least 10 batters in six straight games...His six straight 10+ strikeout games was the longest streak in the NL this season, and in Nationals history (2005-pres.)...Was named to his fifth straight All Star Game...Started for the National League squad and tossed a dominant inning, coaxing a ground out from Jose Altuve, and striking out Aaron Judge and George Springer to strand Jose Ramirez...With 12.02 SO/9.0 IP for the season at 12.02, was just the fourth pitcher in MLB history to average as many as 12 SO/9.0 IP over a season of 200-plus innings: Randy Johnson did it six times (1995, 1997-2001), Pedro Martinez (1999) and Chris Sale (2017)...Scherzer (2nd, 2.51), along with Stephen Strasburg (3rd, 2.52) and Gio Gonzalez (5th, 2.96), helped the Nationals become the first team with three starting pitchers ranking in the top five in the National League in ERA in 21 years (since the 1996 Atlanta Braves), according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*...Struck out a season-high 14 batters on June 6 at Los Angeles Dodgers (7.0 IP, 3 H, R, 2 BB, 14 SO)...Tossed 9.0 dominant innings on May 31 at SFG (9.0 IP, 5 H, ER, 11 SO)...Clubbed his first career home run on Aug. 1 at MIA (O'Grady)...Tossed 6.1 strong innings in Game 3 of the NLDS...Struck out seven batters, walked three while allowing just one hit and one run along the way...Did not earn the win as the Cubs pulled away, 2-1...Endured his first disabled list stint since 2009 when he was placed on the 10-day DL with left neck inflammation from Aug. 19-28.

2016

Put together a historic season en route to earning his second Cy Young Award...In doing so, he became the first player in Nationals history (2005-present) to take home baseball's top pitching honor and just the second in franchise history (Nationals/Expos), joining only Pedro Martinez (1997)...Scherzer led the National League in a majority of the significant pitching categories (see info boxes that follow)...He went 20-7 with a 2.96 ERA in a career-high 34 starts...He tallied a career-high and Nationals record (2005-pres.) 284 strikeouts...His season was highlighted by yet another historic performance, striking out 20 Detroit Tigers on May 11 to become just the fourth pitcher in MLB history to strike out 20 batters in a nine-inning game (see info box below)...Was named an All-Star for the fourth consecutive season...He was 10-3 with a 3.03 ERA in the season's first half, won at least 10 games before the All-Star break for the fourth consecutive season...Via the *Elias Sports Bureau*, over the last 20 years, only two other pitchers reached double digits in wins prior to the break in each of four consecutive seasons: Greg Maddux (1997-2001) and Roy Halladay (2005-11)...The NL's only 20-game winner capped his 2016 on an eight-game winning streak...Washington was 10-0 in those 10 starts (8-0, 3.34 ERA)...From June 1 through the end of the season, he went 15-3 with a 2.44 ERA...Struck out 194 batters, walked 34 and posted a 0.91 WHIP in this 23-game span (0.91 WHIP).

2015

In his first season with Washington, earned his third consecutive All-Star selection, going 14-12 with a 2.79 ERA in 33 starts...The 33 starts matched a career high...Became the fifth pitcher in Major League history to throw two no-hitters in the same regular season with his magnificent performances on June 20 vs. PIT and Oct. 3 at NYM...They were the second and third no-hitters in Nationals history (See page 299 in History and Records section for detailed accounts)...Joined Johnny Vander Meer (1938), Allie Reynolds (1951), Virgil Trucks (1952) and Nolan Ryan (1973) as the only pitchers ever to throw two no-hitters in the same regular season, and you can add Roy Halladay (2010) to that list if you include the postseason...His then-career-high 17 strikeouts in no-hitter on Oct. 3 at NYM set a Nationals single-game record...According to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, Scherzer's 17 strikeouts tied Nolan Ryan (vs. DET, 7/15/73) for the MLB record for strikeouts in a no-hitter...Is the first pitcher in MLB history to throw two no-hitters in the same season without walking a single batter in either outing...Is the first to throw no-hitters against two postseason-bound teams in the same season...Led Major League Baseball with a 7.62 strikeout-to-walk ratio...That number ranked 13th in MLB history (since 1914)...His then-career-high 276 strikeouts ranked second in MLB and broke RHP Stephen Strasburg's Nationals (2005-present) single-season mark of 242 in 2014...Also ranked among MLB pitchers in opponent OBP (4th, .242) and WHIP (4th, 0.92)...Ranked in the NL in complete games (T1st, 4), shutouts (T1st, 3), strikeouts per 9.0 innings (2nd, 10.9), innings pitched (3rd, 238.2), ERA (8th, 2.79), and opp. slugging percentage (11th, .358)... Earned back-to-back National League Pitcher of the Month (May/June) and National League Player of the Week honors (June 15-21)...Tossed back-to-back complete games, June 14 at MIL and June 20 vs. PIT...Per *Elias*, is the fifth pitcher in the Modern Era to allow one hit or fewer in back-to-back complete games.

MAKING HISTORY

- Scherzer joined an exclusive club on May 11, 2016 vs. the Detroit Tigers as he became just the fourth pitcher in Major League history to strike out 20 batters in a nine-inning game...He joined Randy Johnson (May 8, 2001), Kerry Wood (May 6, 1998) and Roger Clemens (Sept. 18, 1996 & April 29, 1986)...Scherzer, who in 2015 became just the fifth pitcher in MLB history to throw two no-hitters in the same regular season, joined Johnson as the only pitchers in MLB history to have a no-hitter and a 20-strikeout game on his resume.
- Scherzer's 20 K's marked a Nationals record (2005-pres.), a franchise record (Nationals/Expos) and the most in D.C.-baseball history since Tom Cheney struck out 21 batters on Sept. 12, 1962 at Baltimore, but in a 16-inning performance...In Scherzer's three historic performances with WSH (two no-hitters, 20-K game), he has combined for 47 strikeouts and no walks.
- According to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, Scherzer's 20 strikeouts against the Tigers, for whom he pitched from 2010-14, are the most any pitcher has recorded in a game against his former team in MLB history.

2014

In his final season with the Tigers, went 18-5 with a 3.15 ERA en route to his second consecutive All-Star selection...Ranked among American League pitchers in wins (T1st, 18), winning percentage (2nd, .783), strikeouts per 9.0 innings (2nd, 10.29), strikeouts (3rd, 252), innings pitched (5th, 220.1 IP), quality starts (T8th, 22) and ERA (9th, 3.15)...2014 marked the second straight season in which he led the AL (or tied for the lead) in wins...Established new single-season career highs with 220.1 innings pitched and 252 strikeouts...His strikeout total ranked as the sixth-highest single-season total in DET club history...Finished the season with an 18-5 record, a 3.15 ERA and 252 strikeouts...According to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, this marked the second time in MLB history that a pitcher, in consecutive seasons: won at least 15 games, lost no more than five, and struck out 200 or more batters, joining Sandy Koufax in 1963 and 1964... Named one of six finalists for the 2014 Marvin Miller Man of the Year Award...Struck out at least seven batters in each of his first seven starts...Became the first player in Detroit history to do so and the first player in the majors to do so since SFG's Tim Lincecum in 2010... On July 12 at CWS, making his 179th career start, threw his first career complete game (9.0 IP, 3 H, 3 BB, 8 K)...Earned the win in the 2014 All-Star Game...Struck out a season-high 14 batters on Aug. 14 vs. Pittsburgh.

2013

In his Cy Young Award-winning season, led the American League with 21 wins and ranked second with 240 strikeouts and 10.08 strikeouts per nine innings, while placing fifth with a 2.90 ERA and tied for fifth with 214.1 innings pitched...Was selected to the American League All-Star squad for the first time in his career... Started for the American League (1.0 IP, K)...Struck out a season-high 12 batters on April 17 at SEA... Began the season winning his first 13 decisions, a DET franchise record...Established a franchise record going 19 straight starts without a loss from Sept. 23, 2012-July 8, 2013...Fanned six-or-more batters in each of his first 18 outings to begin the season...According to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, it was the second longest such streak in American League history, (BOS Pedro Martinez's 29 GM - 2000)...Recorded his 1,000th MLB strikeout, Aug. 8 at CLE...Compiled a 13-1 record and a 3.19 ERA (46 ER/129.2 IP) and 152 strikeouts in 19 starts prior to the All-Star break...Finished 8-2 with a 2.44 ERA (23 ER/84.2 IP) and 88 strikeouts in 13 starts after the break...Pitched the 1,000th inning of his MLB career, Sept. 15 vs. KCR, doing so with 71 wins and 1,045 strikeouts...According to *Elias*, is the only other pitcher in MLB history who accumulated both as many wins and as many strikeouts as Scherzer through his first 1,000 innings is Pedro Martinez (71 wins & 1,075 strikeouts)...Earned the win in Games 1 and 4 of the 2012 ALDS vs. OAK...In two starts vs. BOS in the ALCS, went 0-1 with a 2.70 ERA with 21 strikeouts in 13.1 IP...Established a DET franchise record with 34 strikeouts during the 2013 postseason.

2012

Completed his third season with the Tigers, establishing then-career highs with 16 wins and 231 strikeouts...Led the American league with 11.1 strikeouts per nine innings, while ranking second with 231 strikeouts and tied for sixth with 16 wins...Struck out nine-or-more batters in 13 of his starts, topping all Major League pitchers with 13 such outings...Struck out a career high 15 batters, May 20 vs. PIT (W, 7.0 IP, 4 H, 2 ER, BB)...All 15 of his strikeouts came on swinging strikes...According to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, he was the first Major League pitcher with 15 swinging strikeouts since MIN's Johan Santana posted 15 swinging strikeouts, Aug. 19, 2007 vs. TEX...Started three Postseason games, going 1-0 with a 2.08 ERA (4 ER/17.1 IP) in starts between the ALDS vs. OAK, the ALCS vs. NYY and the World Series vs. SFG...Earned the win while striking out 10 batters in Game 4 of the American League Championship Series vs. NYY...Started Game 4 of the World Series (6.1 IP, 7 H, 3 ER, BB, 8 K), a game eventually won by SFG, 4-3, giving them the series sweep.

2011

In his second season with Detroit, won a then career-high 15 games and ranked ninth in the American League with a .625 winning percentage... Earned the win in his first six decisions of the season April 3 to May 9, establishing a career-best winning streak...Compiled a 16.0-inning scoreless streak over a three-start stretch April 18-29... Fanned a season-high 10 batters, Aug. 13 at BAL...Made the 100th start of his MLB career, Sept. 21 at KCR...Opponents hit .188 (29-for-154) with runners in scoring position against him, fourth-best in the AL...Pitched in four postseason games.

2010

Completed his first season with the Tigers, going 12-11 with a 3.50 ERA in 31 starts...He struck out 184 batters and ranked sixth among AL pitchers with 8.5 strikeouts per nine innings...Was on the Opening Day roster, but was optioned to Triple-A Toledo on May 15...He made two starts for the Mud Hens before he was recalled to DET for the remainder of the season...Went 11-7 with a 2.46 ERA (42 ER/53.2IP) and 158 strikeouts in 23 starts after being recalled from Toledo on May 30...2.46 ERA ranked second in the AL and his 158 strikeouts were good for fourth over that stretch...Fanned a then career-high 14 batters in 5.2 innings on May 30 vs. OAK...According to *Elias*, he was the first pitcher in MLB history with as many as 14 strikeouts in a game while pitching fewer than six innings.

2009

In his first full season in the big leagues, went 9-11 with a 4.12 ERA in 30 starts for the Arizona Diamondbacks...Ranked eighth in the National League with 9.19 strikeouts per nine innings...Began the season on the disabled list with a right shoulder strain...Rehabbed at Single A Visalia on April 9 before he was reinstated from the disabled list by ARI on April 14...Earned his first Major League win on May 16 at ATL (6.0 IP, 4 H, 3 BB, 4 K)...Struck out 10 batters in back-to-back starts, May 21 at FLA and May 26 vs. SDP.

2008

Opened the season with Triple-A Tucson but enjoyed two stints with the D-backs...Went 1-1 with a 2.72 ERA in 13 games/10 starts for Tucson...Struck out 79 batters in 53.0 IP... In his first three Major League seasons, has proven to be one of the most productive and feared hitters in the National League while putting together historic numbers for players under 22 years old...Won the National League Batting Title in 2020, the youngest player in MLB history to do so...Learned to play left field in the Major Leagues and was named a finalist for the 2019 Gold Glove...Made Major League Baseball history for a player his age throughout the 2019 Postseason (see 2019 section for list of accomplishments)...Since his Major League debut in 2018, Soto ranks among MLB hitters in on-base percentage (2nd, .415), OPS (4th, .972), wOBA (4th, .405), wRC+ (5th, 152), slugging percentage (6th, .557) and walks (6th, 228).

2019

Once again put together an historic season for a player before turning 21 years old...Was named Babe Ruth Postseason MVP by the New York BBWAA, second-team All-MLB and a Gold Glove Finalist... His 34 home runs were tied for second-most by a 20-year old in Major League history behind Mel Ott (42 in 1929)...Ranked among National League hitters in walks (3rd, 108), on-base percentage (5th, .401), OPS (6th, .949) and slugging percentage (12th, .548)...Hit go-ahead, game-winning three-run homer on April 9 at Philadelphia (Alvarez)...On July 13 he hit a two-run home run to pull ahead of the Philadelphia Phillies, 4-3...It was his third career go-ahead home run in the ninth inning or later...All three coming against Philadelphia...Recorded a career-high four walks on Sept. 23 vs. Philadelphia...Recorded RBI in career-long seven straight games (7/26-8/2)...Homered in three straight games (7/30-8/2)...Appeared in his first career Postseason and went on to start in 17 Postseason games...Laced game-winning, bases loaded, three-run single in the bottom of the eighth inning that plated Michael A. Recorded the first NLCS hit of his career in the top of the ninth inning of Game 1...He became the first player younger than 21 years old to notch a hit in an NLCS game since Justin Upton in Game 4 of the 2007 NLCS...He joined Upton, Miguel Cabrera, Andruw Jones and Claudell Washington as the only players to record a hit in an NLCS contest while younger than 21 years old...In Game 1 of the World Series, he clubbed a mammoth solo home run in the top of the fourth inning, to tie the game at 2-2 and in the fifth inning, his two-run double extended Washington's lead to 5-2...Became the youngest player to appear in a World Series game since Adalberto Mondesi (20.095)...Since 1997, only Mondesi, Miguel Cabrera (2003) and Francisco Rodriguez (2002) had appeared in a World Series game prior to their 21st birthday...He became the fourth different player (fifth time) to homer in a World Series game before his 21st birthday, joining Miguel Cabrera (G4, 2003), Andruw Jones (G1, 1996) and HOF Mickey Mantle (G6 and G7, 1952)... Turned 21-years-old on Oct. 25, the day of Game 3...Clubbed his second home run of the World Series in Game 5...Became the fifth player younger than 22 years to hit multiple World Series home runs, joining Hall of Famers Mickey Mantle (4) and Jimmie Foxx (2), as well as Tony Kubek (2) and Andruw Jones (2)...Game 5 marked the first in World Series history in which multiple players age 22-or-younger hit a home run (Yordan Alvarez and Juan Soto)...Clubbed his third home run of the World Series in Game 6, becoming the youngest player in history to record three home runs in a single World Series...The homer was his fifth of the 2019 Postseason, passing Miguel Cabrera (2003) for the most home runs in a single Postseason by a player younger than 22 years old...He became the youngest player since Mickey Mantle (1952) to log an RBI in a World Series Game 7 and he joined Mantle (1953) as the only players in history age 21-or-younger to collect seven RBI in a single Fall Classic...His 18 hits in the Postseason matched Miguel Cabrera (2003) for most hits in a single Postseason by a player younger than 22 years old.

2018

As a 19 year old, finished runner up in the National League Rookie of the Year voting as he put together one of the most historic seasons for a teenager in MLB history (see info boxes below)...Began his season with Single-A Hagerstown before getting promoted to Single-A Potomac on April 23 and to Double-A Harrisburg on May 10...Appeared in just eight games with the Senators before having his contract selected on May 20...Clubbed a three-run home run in his first at bat the next day, May 21 vs. San Diego (Erlin)...Not only did he rank among the top National League rookies, but from May 15 (the first game in his game log, due to the suspended game vs. NYY) through the end of the season he ranked among all National League hitters in walks (T4th, 79), on-base percentage (5th, .406), runs (T6th, 77) and OPS (8th, .923)...Moreover, among all National Leaguers (min. 490 PA), he ranked in on-base percentage (2nd, .406), OPS (3rd, .923), slugging percentage (10th, .517) and batting average (12th, .292)...Finished his rookie season with a .292 batting average, .406 on-base percentage and a .517 slugging percentage...He is just the 15th rookie in Major League history - and the only teenager - to finish a season with that slash line...His .406 OBP placed him in exclusive company with 2017 AL Rookie of the Year Aaron Judge and 2001 National League Rookie of the Year Albert Pujols (.403 in 2001)...Since 2001, Soto, Judge and Pujols are the only rookies to post an on-base percentage greater than .400 in their rookie season (min. 400 PA)...Named NL Rookie of the Month for June, July and Sept...On June 13, recorded the first multi-home run game of his career with a three-run blast in the fourth inning and a go-ahead solo home run in the seventh inning to help the Nationals top the Yankees at Yankee Stadium...He became the fifth-youngest player in MLB history to record at least two home runs in a game...He joined ATL Andruw Jones (10/20/96), SEA Ken Griffey Jr. (5/30/89) and CWS Brian McCall (9/30/62) as the only teenagers since 1962 to record multi-HR games on the road against the Yankees...Posted a 21-game on-base streak from Aug. 24 to Sept. 16...Hit .370 (30-for-81) with four doubles, five homers, 19 RBI and 15 walks during the streak...His 21-game on-base streak tied HOF Mickey Mantle and trailed only HOF Mel Ott (22 games in 1928) for the longest on-base streak by a teenager in MLB history...With three stolen bases on Sept. 15 at Atlanta, he became the youngest player since 1900 to steal three bases in a game, besting Rickey Henderson (20 years, 241 days)...Following the season, took part in the 2018 Japan All-Star Series...Hit .350 (7-for-20) with two doubles, two homers, five RBI, two walks and six runs scored in five games.

When it was all said and done, Juan Soto's 2018 season was arguably the best season by a teenager in Major League history...Here is where he ranked among teenagers in several categories:

CAREER

Tall, powerful right-handed pitcher, World Series MVP and three-time All-Star is Washington's all-time (2005-present) leader in wins (112) and strikeouts (1,697)...Has signed two long-term contracts: May 10, 2016 (7 years with opt out) and Dec. 10, 2019 (7 years) that will make him a National for life and cement his place in D.C. baseball history... Since his debut in 2010, Strasburg ranks among Major League pitchers in strikeouts per 9.0 innings (4th, 10.58), opponents' slugging percentage (5th, .353), opponents' OPS (4th, .632), walks and hits per innings pitched (7th, 1.09), strikeout-to-walk ratio (8th, 4.49), ERA (9th, 3.19) and strikeouts (12th, 1,697)...He enters 2021 ranked fifth among Major League pitchers with 1,605 strikeouts and is eighth with 107 wins since September of 2011 - his return from Tommy John ligament-replacement surgery... His 242 strikeout season in 2014 tied for the NL lead, set a single-season team record (2005-present) and were most posted by a D.C.-based pitcher in 101 years (Walter Johnson, 243 K in 1913)...Max Scherzer has since eclipsed that mark...Has put together two historic streaks, a 16-game winning streak (9/15/15 - 7/15/16) and a 35.0 scoreless inning streak (8/19/17-9/17/17)...In 2019, he became the first pitcher in Major League history to finish a Postseason with a 5-0 record as the Nationals won the 2019 World Series...On May 2, 2019, he became the fastest pitcher to 1,500 career strikeouts - in terms of innings pitched (1,272.1) - in Major League history.

2020

Had his 2020 season cut short due to carpal tunnel neuritis in his right hand...Was scratched from his first start of the season, July 25 vs. New York (AL)...Returned on Aug. 9 vs. Baltimore (4.1 IP, 7 H, 5 ER, BB, 2 SO)...Took the mound on Aug. 14 at Baltimore, but was removed in the first inning with discomfort in his right hand...He underwent surgery on Aug. 26, ending his season.

2019

Went 18-6 with a 3.32 ERA and struck out a career-high 251 batters in 33 starts...He led the National League in wins (18) and innings pitched (209.0) and ranked among National League pitchers in strikeouts (2nd, 251), opponents' OPS (4th, .620), opponents' batting average (5th, .210), strikeouts per 9.0 innings (5th, 10.81), WHIP (5th, 1.04), opponents' slugging percentage (6th, .349) and opponents' on-base percentage (7th, .271)...Along with Max Scherzer (243) and Patrick Corbin (238), he helped the 2019 Nationals become the first team in MLB history to have a rotation feature at least three players with at least 222 strikeouts...They were the first National League team since the 1969 Houston Astros (Larry Dierker/Tom Griffin/Don Wilson) to have three pitchers record at least 200 strikeouts...Finished the season strong, going 3-1 with a 1.76 ERA in his final eight starts of the season...Over his last eight starts of the regular season and into Postseason play, opponents hit .098 (6-for-61) with one double, two homers, nine RBI and 26 strikeouts with runners in scoring position...Put together an historic 2019 Postseason and was named World Series Most Valuable Player after going 2-0 with a 2.51 ERA (4 ER/14.1 IP) and 14 strikeouts in two World Series starts...Helped the Nationals avoid elimination in Game 6 of the World Series (8.1 IP, 5 H, 2 ER, 7 SO)...In doing so, he became the first pitcher since Curt Schilling (Game 5, 1993) to toss at least 8.1 innings while not surrendering more than two runs in a potential World Series elimination game...All told, he became the first pitcher in Major League history to finish a Postseason with a 5-0 record...Recorded a 1.98 ERA (8 ER/36.1 IP) and 47 strikeouts against just four walks in six Postseason games (five starts)... Opponents went 2-for-22 (.091) with 11 strikeouts and one walk with runners in scoring position during the Postseason...He made his first career relief appearance in the Wild Card game against Milwaukee, tossing 3.0 innings of two-hit, shutout ball to help Washington top the Milwaukee Brewers, 4-3.

ALL-TIME KS

2018

Started his ninth Major League season strong, going 6-5 with a 3.20 ERA in his first 12 starts before exiting his start on June 8 with right-shoulder inflammation...Put together his strongest start of the season on April 10 vs. Atlanta...Tossed 8.0 innings of three-hit, shutout ball, striking out eight in Washington's 4-1 win...At the time of the injury, he ranked among National League pitchers in strikeouts (4th, 93), strikeout-to-walk ratio (5th, 4.89), WHIP (7th, 1.06), opp. OBP (7th, .274) and wins (17th, 6)...Returned from disabled list on July 20, but again was placed on the DL on July 22 with a cervical nerve impingement...Was reinstated on Aug. 22 and finished the season strong, going 4-0 with a 2.66 ERA (12 ER/40.2 IP) and 50 strikeouts in his final seven starts...The Nationals went 6-1 in those starts...Recorded four 10+ strikeout games in 2018.

2017

Put together a strong first half of the season en route to being named an All-Star for the third time in his career...Was selected by the Commissioner's Office and was slated to pitch the 12th had the game reached that point, but it ended in a 2-1 American League victory after 10 innings...Ranked third in the National League (4th in MLB) with a career-best 2.52 ERA...Ranked second in the NL in FanGraphs.com WAR (5.6)...Also ranked in NL in home runs per 9.0 IP (1st, 0.67), opp. SLG (1st, .317), opp. OPS (2nd, .581), WHIP (3rd, 1.02), opp. OBP (3rd, .265), and opp. AVG (3rd, .204)...Coupled with Max Scherzer (2nd, 2.51) and Gio Gonzalez (5th, 2.96), Strasburg (3rd, 2.52), helped the Nationals become the first team with three starting pitchers ranking in the top five in the National League in ERA in 21 years (since the 1996 Atlanta Braves), according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*...On May 27 at San Diego, he struck out a career-high 15 batters in 7.0 shutout innings...On Aug. 19 at San Diego, he returned from a three-week stint on the disabled list...Since that game, Strasburg went 5-1 with a 0.84 ERA (5 ER/53.2 IP) in his final eight starts of the regular season...All told, went 6-1 with a 0.86 ERA in 10 starts after the All-Star break...Via *Elias*, it was the second-lowest post-ASB ERA in MLB history for any pitcher with at least 10 starts...Recorded a 35.0 scoreless innings streak from that first start back from the DL in San Diego (Aug. 19) that ran until Sept. 17, when an unearned run ended the historic stretch...It was the longest consecutive scoreless innings streak in franchise history (Nationals/Expos) and, per *Elias*, the longest for any player in the Major Leagues since 2015 (Greinke, 45.2 IP; Kershaw, 37.0 IP)...Was dominant in the NLDS...Was saddled with the loss in Game 1 despite striking out 10 batters in 7.0 innings without allowing an earned run (7.0 IP, 3 H, 2 R, BB, 10 SO)...He pushed aside a virus that had made him ill for much of the week, to rack up 12 strikeouts (re-setting his own Postseason franchise record for single-game strikeouts) over 7.0 scoreless innings in Washington's Game 4 victory...Became the second pitcher in MLB Postseason history to record a win with 12 or more strikeouts while his team faced elimination...Also per *Elias*, became just the third pitcher in Major League history to post multiple 10-plus strikeout games and no earned runs in a single Postseason series, joining Sandy Koufax (1965 World Series vs. MIN) and Justin Verlander (2013 ALDS vs. OAK).

2016

Opened his season in historic fashion, beginning the year 13-0 and on a personal 16-game winning streak that dated to Sept. 15, 2015 (see info box below)...Was the first pitcher in franchise history (WSH/MON) to win at least 15 of his first 16 decisions...With a strikeout of Bud Norris in the bottom of the third inning on April 4 at ATL, Strasburg became the Washington Nationals (2005-pres.) all-time leader in strikeouts (904), passing former teammate Jordan Zimmermann (903)...Was named NL Pitcher of the Month for July (4-1, 2.08 ERA, 37 SO, 12 BB)...Was named to his second All-Star Game, but did not pitch due to his start on July 8...Endured two stints on the disabled list (6/16 to 7/3 with upper back soreness and 8/21 to 9/7 with right elbow soreness)...He returned to action on Sept. 7 but was shut down following that start...At that time, he ranked among National League pitchers in wins (3rd, 15), strikeouts per nine innings (3rd, 11.2), strikeouts (6th, 183), hits per nine innings (8th, 7.25) and walks/hits per innings pitched (10th, 1.10)... With 15, matched a career-high in wins (15 in 2012)...Recorded his 1,000th strikeout, June 4 at CIN (Straily) becoming the first player in Nationals history (2005-pres.) to record all 1,000 strikeouts in a Nationals uniform.

STRAS WENT STREAKING

Stephen Strasburg opened his 2016 season without suffering a losing decision until July 21, beginning the year 13-0 and on a personal 16-game winning streak that dated to Sept. 15, 2015...Strasburg culminated the historic start to his season with 8.0 innings of three-hit, one-run baseball on July 15 vs. the Pittsburgh Pirates to open the second half.

- Strasburg became the eighth starting pitcher in Major League history to begin a season 13-0, and the first since teammate **Max Scherzer** opened the 2013 season 13-0 for the Detroit Tigers...According to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, Scherzer and Strasburg are the first set of teammates (at any point in their careers) to begin a season 13-0 since Hall of Famers "**Iron Man**" **Joe McGinnity** and **Rube Marquard**...McGinnity went 14-0 for the New York Giants in 1904, while Marquard started 19-0 for the Giants in 1912 (18-0 as a starting pitcher)...While Strasburg and Scherzer figure to remain teammates for quite some time, McGinnity and Marquard were teammates only briefly with NYG in 1908.
- Strasburg's personal 16-game winning streak set a new franchise best (Nationals/Expos) and trails only that of **Firpo Marberry** (17 G, 6/23/30-7/25/31) for the longest by a starting pitcher in D.C.-baseball history.
- Strasburg became just the third National League starting pitcher ever to open a season with a 13-0 record, and the first since Marquard in 1912...He also joined Scherzer (2013) and **Ron Guidry** (1978) for the the sixth-longest streak to open a season in MLB history.

2015

Endured two stints on the 15-day disabled list: May 30-June 23 (neck tightness) and July 5-August 8 (left oblique strain)...Missed 49 games...Finished the season very strong, going 8-2 with a 1.76 ERA (16 ER/82.0 IP) in 13 starts while striking out 110 batters and walking just 12 from June 23 to the end of the season...After returning from the disabled list on Aug. 8, through the end of the season, ranked among MLB pitchers (min. 10 GS) in strikeouts per nine innings (1st, 12.5), strikeout-to-walk ratio (1st, 11.50), strikeouts (3rd, 92), WHIP (3rd, 0.75), opp. batting average (3rd, .179), opp. OBP (3rd, .206) and ERA (5th, 1.90)...Matched a career-high with 14 strikeouts, Sept. 15 at PHI...His 55 percent swing-and-miss rate was highest by a starting pitcher in any start of >=100 P in past 10 seasons...Including his start on Sept. 9 vs. NYM (13 SO), he became the first starting pitcher in Washington history (2005-present) to fan 13+ batters in back-to-back starts...Joined Pedro Martinez (2x,1997: 6/8 & 6/14, and 8/20 & 8/25) as the only pitcher in franchise history (WSH/MON)...Named NL Player of the Week for the week of Sept. 14-20...Struck out at least 10 batters in four straight starts, Sept. 9-26, the longest streak in Nationals history (2005-present) and second-longest streak in MLB in 2015, behind CWS Chris Sale (8 games)...Since 2005, only five pitchers have put together a streak of 10+ strikeouts of four games or more: Chris Sale (2015; 8 G), David Price (2014; 5 G), Jon Lester (2015; 4 G), Jake Peavy (2007; 4 G)...His 50 strikeouts in that four-start span were the most in Montreal/Washington history since Pedro Martinez (51, 1997)...Over his final five starts, recorded 57 strikeouts against just five walks...Per *Elias*, since 1900, only six players have recorded 57 strikeouts and five or fewer walks over a five-start span: Sandy Koufax (1965, 57 SO/5 BB), Mike Scott (1986, 57 SO/5 BB), Pedro Martinez (1999, 69 SO/5 BB), Curt Schilling (2002, 59 SO/3 BB), Corey Kluber (2015, 59 SO/3 BB) and Stephen Strasburg (2015, 57 SO/5 BB).

2014

Washington's Opening Day starter for a third straight season...Went 14-11 with a 3.14 ERA in a career-high 34 starts...Led the club with 215.0 innings pitched, becoming the first National to start 34 games since 2005...242 strikeouts tied for NL lead (J.Cueto), set a single-season team record (2005-present) and were most posted by a D.C.-based pitcher in 101 years (Walter Johnson, 243 K in 1913)...Ranked among NL leaders: starts (1st, 34), strikeouts (1st, 242), strikeouts per nine innings (2nd, 10.13), strikeout-to-walk ratio (3rd, 5.63/1), WHIP (9th, 1.12), walks per nine innings (10th, 1.80)...Paced the Nationals with nine home wins...From Aug. 14 to season's end, went 6-1 with a 1.69 ERA (11 ER/58.2 IP) in his final nine starts...Struck out 56 and walked eight over that stretch...Received two runs or fewer of support 20 times in 34 starts...Struck out at least 10 batters on five separate occasions, matching a career-high (also: 2012)...Was tied for fifth in the National League with 11 unearned runs allowed...Made his first career Postseason start, taking the ball in Game 1 of the NLDS vs. SFG (L, 5.0 IP, 8 H, 2 R, ER, BB, 2 K).

2013



His .342 batting average was the highest by any rookie with at least 290 at-bats since Ichiro Suzuki hit .350 for Seattle in his first MLB season (2001)...Turner collected 105 hits and stole 33 bases in just 73 games, becoming the first rookie in franchise history (Nationals/Expos) to post more than 100 hits in fewer than 100 games...According to *Baseball Reference*, he was the only rookie in MLB history (since 1900) to record at least 13 homers, 33 stolen bases and an average of .340 or better in no more than 73 games...His 1.44 hits per game was the fifth-highest mark by a rookie with at least 70 games since 1900... After the All-Star break, Turner led MLB in triples (8), and ranked in the National League in stolen bases (2nd, 33), hits (2nd, 102), total bases (3rd, 170), runs scored (T5th, 53), and average (5th, .340)...According to *Elias*, only three rookies in MLB history have hit as high as .340 with as many as 13 home runs after the break: Hal Trosky (CLE, 1934: .349, 19 HR), Ted Williams (BOS, 1959: .345, 19 HR) and Willie McCovey (SFG, 1959: .354, 13 HR)...Was the first rookie in WSH/MON history w/20+ stolen bases since Mike Lansing (1993)... Was the first draft selection in the history of the Washington Nationals and quickly emerged as the face of the young franchise...Is the Nationals' all-time leader in virtually every offensive category...Is the all-time home run leader in D.C. baseball history, franchise history (Montreal/Washington) and Nationals history (2005-pres.)... Clubbed the first home run in Nationals World Series history in Game 1 of the 2019 World Series off Houston's Gerrit Cole...Is a two-time All-Star (2009, 2017), two-time Silver Slugger winner (2009, 2010) and winner of a Rawlings Gold Glove in 2009... Named the National League Comeback Player of the Year by the MLBPA in 2017...His 11 walk-off home runs are tied for eighth in MLB history, tied for second in National League history (Stan Musial-12; Tony Perez-11) and second among active players behind Albert Pujols (12)...Former Gold Glove third baseman made the transition across the diamond to first base in 2015...Was ESPN's initial Web Gem Champion in 2009...Finished second in the 2006 Rookie of the Year voting (finished four points shy of FLA's Hanley Ramirez in BBWAA voting)...Was the second player, the first position player, from the 2005 First-Year Player Draft to reach the big leagues...Was inducted into the University of Virginia Baseball Hall of Fame in January 2018...See "Walk It Off" info box for more information on Zimmerman's walk-offs.

2020

Did not play after opting out of the season.

2019

Battled plantar fasciitis in his right foot, allowing him to appear in just 52 games - his fewest since his rookie season of 2005...When he returned for good on Sept. 1, hit .283 (15-for-53) with one double, three homers, 12 RBI, five walks and eight runs scored in 19 games during the month...Hit three home runs and 10 RBI in his first seven games back...Recorded his 1,000th career RBI in July 5 vs. Kansas City...Also matched career-high with three doubles the same day...Recorded his 26th career multi-HR game April 21 at Miami...Started the season strong, recording eight RBI in the first eight games of the season...Endured two stints on the Injured List: April-28-June 28 and July 22-Sept. 1...Hit safely in 10 of Washington's 16 Postseason games...Homered in Game 4 of the NLDS, a three-run shot in the fifth inning off Pedro Baez...Also homered in Game 1 of the World Series, a solo shot in the top of the second inning...Was the first World Series home run in Nationals history.

2018

His 14th Major League season was broken up by a stint on the 60-day disabled list from May 12 through July 20 (strained right oblique)...Following his return, hit .295 with 18 doubles, eight homers, 35 RBI, 21 walks and 22 runs scored in 52 games from July 20 through the end of the season... He ranked 14th in the National League in OPS (.911) following the All-Star break...Ranked 16th in the NL in slugging percentage (.538) following the break...Passed Tim Wallach for the most hits (1,695) in Nationals/Expos history on July 31 vs. New York (NL)...Matched a career-high with six RBI on Aug. 11 at Chicago (3-for-5, 2 HR, 6 RBI, 3 R)...Clubbed his 11th career walk-off home run on Aug. 22 vs. Philadelphia (Dominguez).

2017

Put up career numbers in his 13th season, en route to being named a National League All-Star starter and the National League Comeback Player of the Year by his fellow players (MLBPA)...Clubbed a career-high 36 home runs...Approached his career high in RBI (110 in 2006)...Appeared in 144 games, his most since 2013 (145)...Was tied for second in MLB with seven multi-HR games...Ranked in the National League in RBI (6th, 108), homers (16th, 36), and slugging percentage (7th, .573)...Ranked just outside of the top 10 in batting average (13th, .303)...His 2017 season was just the seventh 30-double, 30-homer season in Nationals history, and he is the only two-time 30-homer/30-double player in club history...It was just the fourth 30-HR/30-double/100-RBI season in Nationals history...Became the franchise (Montreal/Washington) leader in several offensive categories throughout the course of the season (See info box below)...Started off the season strong, garnering Player of the Week (April 30) and Player of the Month honors for the month of April...Hit .420 with eight doubles, 11 homers, 29 RBI and 22 runs scored in 24 April contests...His 29 RBI set a Nationals record for home runs in a month...Hit his second career pinch hit home run, a game-tying three-run shot on April 9 at PHI (Gomez)...Clubbed his sixth career grand slam on April 19 at ATL (Krol)...On July 27 against Milwaukee, he combined with Brian Goodwin, Wilmer Difo, and Bryce Harper to hit back-to-back-to-back-to-back home runs - tying a Major League record for consecutive home runs (joining seven other clubs) and marking the first time in franchise history a Nationals or Expos team had accomplished that feat...Capped the season strong, hitting .329 (27-for-82) with six doubles, seven homers, 20 RBI and 13 runs scored in 22 Sept. games...Clubbed a career-high 13 go-ahead home runs, including seven in the sixth inning and beyond...Hit .311 (47-for-151) with runners in scoring position...Hit a dramatic, towering, go-ahead three-run home run in the eighth inning of Game 2 of the NLDS...Came as a part of Washington's five-run eighth inning...Was his third career Postseason home run.

MOVING ON UP

Ryan Zimmerman became Washington D.C.'s all-time home run leader on July 30, 2017 against the Colorado Rockies, passing **Frank Howard** with his 238th career longball...The record blast, which dropped into the Nationals' bullpen and tied the game, 4-4, was Zimmerman's 23rd of his career-best 36 in the 2017 season.

In addition to becoming Washington D.C.'s all-time home run leader, Zimmerman has been moving up the franchise's all-time record list since the 2017 season...

- July 17, 2017 at Cincinnati, Zimmerman passed **Vladimir Guerrero** (234) for the most home runs in franchise history.
- With nine total bases on July 30, 2017, Zimmerman became the franchise's all-time leader in total bases, passing **Tim Wallach** (2,728).
- On July 22, 2017 at Arizona, he passed **Tim Wallach** (360) to move into first place on the franchise's all-time doubles list.
- On Aug. 9, 2017 at Miami, he passed **Tim Wallach** (905) to move into first place on the franchise's all-time RBI list.
- On July 31, 2018 vs. New York (NL), he passed **Tim Wallach** (1,694) on the franchise's all-time hits list.



2016

Endured two stints on the 15-day disabled list (left ribcage strain, July 7-26, 12 games; and left wrist contusion, Aug. 1-20, 16 games)...Legged out his first career inside-the-park-home run, May 15 vs. MIA (Fernandez)...It was the third ITPHR in Nationals history...Posted a .996 fielding percentage (4 errors) in his second full season at first base...Recorded a .542 slugging percentage (7 2B, 3B, 7 HR) in the month of May...Turned the first triple play in WSH history, July 30 at SFG (see page 337 for a detailed account of the play)...115 games played were his most since 2013 when he played in 147...Recorded his 15th career multi-home run game, May 10 vs. DET and his 16th on, May 28 vs. STL...Hit .353/.450/.471 while starting in all five games of the 2016 NLDS vs. LAD...Went 2-for-4 with a double, two RBI, one walk and one run scored in Washington's 8-3 win in Game 3 at LAD.

2015

His season was twice interrupted by injury due to plantar fasciitis in his left foot (June 11-July 28) and a left oblique strain (Sept. 7-end of the season)... Clubbed his 10th career walk-off home run, a two-run blast off the right field foul pole in the 10th inning, May 19 vs. NYY (Miller)...It was the first of his 10 walk-off home runs to come in extra innings...Zimmerman's 10 walk-off home runs rank third in National League history behind Stan Musial (12) and Tony Perez (11), according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*...In addition, his 10 walk-offs are third among active players behind David Ortiz (11) and Albert Pujols (11)...Hit .209/.265/.346 before his DL stint, but .311/.372/.652 with 13 doubles, 11 home runs, 39 RBI and 21 runs scored in 39 games after return...Hit safely in his final 11 games played of 2015, going 20-for-46 (.435) with four doubles, six home runs, 18 RBI and 11 runs scored... Clubbed his 200th career home run (Sept. 2 at STL) during an 11-game span Aug. 23-Sept. 2 in which he collected 23 RBI, the most over an 11 game span in franchise history (Nationals/Expos).

2014

Was limited to just 61 games due to two stints on the disabled list...Fractured his right thumb sliding head first into second base, April 13 at ATL... Returned June 3...Upon return, selflessly shifted to left field to allow Matt Williams flexibility when filling out the lineup card...Did not commit an error in 30 starts in left field...Strained his right hamstring on June 23 on a sprint to first base attempting to beat out a ground ball...Rejoined the Nationals active roster on Sept. 20...Started four games, all in left field...Hit .263 (5-for-19) with a triple, two RBI and a walk upon return...Despite injuries, .790 OPS in 61 games ranked fourth on the Nationals...Played defensively in left field (30 games), at third base (23) and first base (1)...Did not commit an error in left field while connecting on two outfield assists.

2013

Hit 11 homers in September to match Hunter Pence for MLB lead, establish a Nationals record for the ninth month and cap off another strong campaign... Tied for seventh in the NL with a team-leading 26 home runs after being tied for 38th with 15 HR at the completion of play on Sept. 1...15 homers after the All-Star break tied for third in MLB...Paced the Nationals outright in home runs for the second time in career (also 2007, tied for the team lead in 2008)...Batted .310 at Nationals Park, but 19 of his 26 long balls were hit on the road...Hit his ninth career walk-off homer, July 26 vs. NYM (W2-1)... Hit more home runs against NL East competition (career-high 16) than any player in baseball in 2013...Blasted three home runs to match a Nationals single-game record on May 29 at Oriole Park (Alfonso Soriano 4/21/06 vs. ATL, Adam Dunn 7/7/10 vs. SDP)...Hit .345 in close-and-late situations... Swiped six bases without being caught...Committed 21 errors, but only seven occurred after the All-Star break (as strength in shoulder increased)... Became the first National to play in 1,000 career games on April 12 vs. ATL...Trailing 4-1, laced a three-run double with two outs in the eighth inning to tie the game and set stage for Washington's eventual 6-4 victory at NYM, June 28...Hit fourth career grand slam (off Robbie Erlin) to spark an 11-7 series-sweep clinching win on July 7 vs. SDP.



2012

Managed a sore right shoulder for most of season, but hit 25 home runs and tallied 95 RBI in 145 games to help the Nationals claim their first NL East title...Hit 20 of his 25 homers against right-handers, but his OPS was higher against southpaws (.861 vs. LHP, .810 vs. RHP)...Started slow, but beginning June 24, hit .321 with 26 doubles, 22 homers, 73 RBI and a .967 OPS in 90 games...In that span (June 24 through season's end), his .967 OPS ranked fifth in MLB among those with at least 300 plate appearances...Recorded career-best .908 OPS at Nationals Park...Recorded 1,000th career hit—a fifth inning single off Guillermo Moscoso—on June 26 at Coors Field...With an eighth-inning sacrifice fly on April 10 at Citi Field, reached the 500-RBI plateau...Hit 10 home runs in July...From Sept. 3-12, recorded at least one RBI in nine straight games...The nine-game RBI streak was the longest ever posted by a D.C.-based player since outfielder John Stone turned the same nine-game trick in 1936 for the AL Nationals...Appearing in the postseason for the first time, went 8-for-21 (.381) with one double, two homers, four RBI and three runs scored in five games of the 2012 NLDS vs. STL.

2011

Was limited to 101 games by a left abdominal strain, hit .289 with 21 doubles, 12 home runs and 49 RBI...The abdominal strain required surgery, which was performed by Dr. Bill Meyers in Philadelphia on May 3...Missed six weeks of big league action (58 games)...Began a rehab stint on June 5 and hit .381 (8-for-21) with three doubles, one triple and 3 RBI in six games...Returned to Washington's lineup on June 14 vs. STL...Batted a team-best .314 at Nationals Park...Hit .300-plus against each of the Nationals' four NL East rivals (FLA .375, PHI .323, ATL .316, NYP .306)...On June 14 vs. STL, in his first game back after missing 58 games with a left abdominal injury, laced an opposite-field RBI double in midst of decisive six-run seventh inning, which capped a come-from-behind 8-6 victory...Hit his eighth career game-ending homer, his second such grand slam (also May 13, 2007 vs. FLA), to cap a six-run ninth and a wild 8-4 win vs. PHI on Aug. 19...Posted team season-high 19-game hit streak from July 22-Aug. 11, going 32-for-79 (.405) with six doubles, a triple, a homer, eight RBI and five walks...Recorded the 14th career game-ending plate appearance in a win via Washington's 8-7 victory on Sept. 3 vs. NYM...Blooped a bags-loaded two-run broken-bat single in front of diving right fielder to erase a 7-6 deficit in the victory over the Mets.

2010

Earned his second straight Silver Slugger citation from Louisville Slugger...Hit .300-plus for the first time...Posted career highs in batting (.307), OBP (.388) and OPS (.899) in 2010...Became the first qualified Washington National (2005-present) to hit .300 or better against both left- (.331) and right-handed (.300) pitching in the same season...Ranked among NL leaders in batting average against LHP (7th, .331), game-winning RBI (17th, 14), OBP (8th), OPS (8th, .899), batting average (8th), runs created/27 (9th, 6.75), batting average with runners on base (9th, .335), slugging percentage (10th, .511), batting average at home (10th, .317) and go-ahead RBI (tied 10th, 26)...Hit two home runs en route to a career-high six RBI-effort in 14-6 win on May 13 at COL...Registered seventh career two-home run effort in an 11-inning, 3-2 setback, May 30 at SDP...The first of those two home runs (off John Garland) was the 100th of his career...Became the second player drafted in 2005 or later to reach the 100-home run plateau (MIL's Ryan Braun was first)...Led off the ninth inning with a game-ending solo shot, his second homer of the game, to power the Nationals to a 6-5 win over the first-place Padres, July 6 at Nationals Park...His game-winning three-run home run in third inning, Aug. 30 at FLA, triggered a 9-3 win and broke a left-field electronic scoreboard that was left reading "Sun Life Stadiu" (the "m" missing).

2009

In a breakout effort, hit .292 with 37 doubles, 33 homers, 106 RBI in 157 games...Earned the Rawlings Gold Glove and claimed his first Silver Slugger at third base...Joined LAD's Matt Kemp as the only two NL players to earn a Gold Glove and Silver Slugger in 2009...Ranked among NL leaders in total chances (MLB-best 459), assists (MLB-best 325) and Ultimate Zone Rating (17.9)...Also led all MLB players with 19 Web Gems and 61 Web Gem points and was subsequently named ESPN's 2009 Web Gem Champion in mid-October...Recorded career highs in most offensive categories, including runs (110), hits (178), home runs, extra-base hits (73), walks (72), total bases (320), OBP (.364), slugging (.525), OPS (.888) and pitches per plate appearance (4.05)...Posted a career-best and MLB season-high 30-game hitting streak from April 8-May 12, going 50-for-131 (.382) with 11 doubles, eight homers, 26 RBI, 11 walks and 26 runs...The 30-gamer was the longest posted in MLB since NYM's Moises Alou's 30-game run in 2007, and the longest by a 3B since George Brett's 30-game hit streak, July 18-Aug. 18, 1980...Was the 26th player to record a hit streak of at least 30 games since Joe DiMaggio's 56-gamer in 1941...Reached base safely in career-high 43 straight games, April 4-May 25, to match SEA's Ichiro Suzuki for longest streak in MLB...Became the first third baseman to represent D.C. in an All-Star Game since Harmon Killebrew (1959)...Became the first National to homer in four straight individual games, Aug. 3-7...From July 27-Aug. 13, hit safely in 16 straight...Coupling the 16- and 30-gamers, became the first big leaguer since ARI's Luis Gonzalez in 1999 to record hit streaks of 30- and 15-plus games in the same year.

2008

After playing all but five games the previous two seasons, battled the first significant injury of career while hitting .283 with 24 doubles, 14 home runs and 51 RBI in 106 games...Missed 48 games from May 26-July 22 with a small labral tear in the left (non-throwing) shoulder...Sustained the injury while sliding head-first into second base, May 18 at BAL...In 56 games after returning from the injury, batted .306 with 13 doubles, six homers and 24 RBI...Endured slow April (.233), but hit .301 with 18 doubles, 11 home runs and 38 RBI in 78 contests thereafter...In the inaugural contest at Nationals Park, March 30, hit game-ending solo shot with two outs in the ninth inning to become just the third player in MLB history to hit a game-ending home run in the first game at a MLB ballpark.

2007

Turned in a solid sophomore season, batting .266 with 43 doubles, 24 home runs and 91 RBI...18 game-winning RBI ranked second in MLB behind only COL's Matt Holliday (19)...Became just the fifth player in franchise annals, the first Washington National, to start 162 games in a season...Started 161 at 3B and one at DH (June 10 at MIN)...Ranked third in the NL (4th in MLB) by hitting .374 against left-handed pitchers...Also ranked among NL leaders in games (tied for first, 162) and at-bats (4th, 653)...Paced all MLB third basemen with 43 doubles, which also tied Ryan Church for team lead...Broke a 3-3 tie with a game-ending grand slam off Jorge Julio on May 12 vs. FLA...The game-ending slam came after nearly three hours of rain delays and actually occurred at 1:42 a.m. on May 13...Two-run shot off David Wells, June 3 vs. SDP, was the first to reach the yellow seats (500 level) at RFK since MLB returned to D.C. in 2005.

2006

Turned in the finest rookie season in the history of the franchise to date...Hit .287 with 47 doubles, three triples, 20 home runs, 110 RBI and 11 stolen bases in 157 games...Finished second in the NL Rookie of the Year balloting, four points behind FLA's Hanley Ramirez...20 home runs matched Brad Wilkerson's 2002 franchise rookie record...One of MLB's top clutch hitters in 2006...Paced MLB with 64 hits with RISP...In all, batted .323 (64-for-198) with RISP, including a .366 (49-for-134) mark from June 6 through the end of the season...110 RBI were the most posted by a rookie since STL's Albert Pujols notched 130 in 2001...Became only the third NL rookie in 53 seasons (beginning with 1954) to post 100 or more RBI (Mike Piazza 112 in 1993 and Pujols 130 in 2001)...Also became just the fifth rookie since 1988 to record 100 RBI in a season, joining Hideki Matsui (106, 2003), Pujols (130, 2001), Carlos Beltran (108, 1999) and Mike Piazza (112, 1993)...Paced MLB rookies with a franchise-rookie record 25 go-ahead RBI...Also led MLB rookies in RBI, doubles, walks (61) and longest hitting streak (hit .406 [28-for-69] with eight doubles, two homers and 13 RBI in 17 games, June 28-July 18)...29 multi-RBI games were the most posted by an MLB rookie since Pujols tallied 34 in 2001...47 doubles tied for second on the all-time list among rookies joining Pujols (2001), Fred Lynn (1975) and Vada Pinson (1959) behind only Johnny Frederick (52) of the 1929 Brooklyn Robins...Posted a .965 fielding percentage which tied STL's Scott Rolen and CHI's Aramis Ramirez for the NL lead...Set the franchise rookie-record with a 17-game hitting streak, June 28-July 18...Hit .327 and blasted 10 of 20 homers at cavernous RFK...Reached the 100-RBI plateau on Sept. 22 at NYM via a third-inning RBI single off Orlando Hernandez.

2005

Completed a dream season, producing success at the collegiate, Minor League and big league levels...Began the year as the University of Virginia's third baseman...Capped the season as Frank Robinson's starting third baseman in a pennant race...Using wood bats, hit more homers (9) in five weeks of Double-A ball than in three seasons at UVA swinging an aluminum bat...On June 7, was the first draft selection in the history of the Nationals, the fourth-overall selection out of Virginia...Upon being promoted on Sept. 1, he became the second franchise first-rounder to reach the big leagues in the same season he was drafted...Joined Chad Cordero, who pitched for the Expos in August of 2003 after being selected 20th overall in June...Also became the first player to be signed and developed exclusively by the Washington Nationals...In his second at-bat, he collected his first big league hit, a double off Vicente Padilla, Sept. 2 vs. PHI...With the initial hit, he became the youngest franchise player (20 years, 339 days) to record a hit since Vladimir Guerrero in Sept. 1996...Was also the first player from the 2005 Draft to record an MLB hit...In the throes of a Wild Card chase, made his lone Major League start at SS, on Sept. 7 vs. FLA.

PERSONAL

Ryan Wallace Zimmerman...Following the 2006 season, established the zIMS Foundation, dedicated to the treatment and ultimate cure of Multiple Sclerosis by funding comprehensive support and educational programs...The zIMS Foundation hosts local events in his hometown of Virginia Beach, VA, and in Washington, D.C. to raise funds for the Foundation...Is on the board of the National MS Society and the Washington, D.C. chapter...In 1995, mother, Cheryl, was diagnosed with MS, a chronic and unpredictable disease that affects the central nervous system...In 2016, he donated \$1 million to the University of Virginia's baseball program...A standout at UVA, he hit .393 with six home runs and 59 RBI as a senior in 2005 and helped Virginia earn a second consecutive NCAA berth...Capped his collegiate career as a .355 career hitter with 47 doubles and 140 RBI in three seasons at UVA...Helped the Cavaliers end the program's eight-year postseason void with a pair of NCAA berths (2004, 2005)...Was first UVA player to be selected in first round since 1996 (Seth Greisinger)...With Team USA, was named MVP at the FIFI II World University Games, played during the summer of 2004 in Taiwan...Led or tied for the Team USA club lead in all three triple crown categories, hitting .468 with four homers and 27 RBI...For his efforts, was named USA Baseball's Athlete of the Year in 2004...He and his wife, Heather, have two daughters, Mackenzie and Hayden and one son, Henry.

NATIONALS NEWS

THE 2020 SEASON

The World Champion Washington Nationals completed their 16th season of baseball in Washington, D.C. with a 26-34 (.433) record, finishing in fifth place in the National League East...It was Washington's first sub-.500 record since the 2011 Nationals went 80-81 (.497)...Washington finished the season strong, winning seven of nine games to cap the 2020 campaign.

- The 2020 season snapped a streak of eight consecutive winning seasons...Only the New York Yankees (28 seasons), St. Louis Cardinals (13 seasons) and the Los Angeles Dodgers (10 seasons) recorded longer active consecutive winning streaks in Major League Baseball during that stretch.
- Since 2012, the Nationals are 756-600 (.558), the third-best regular season record in Major League Baseball over this span...Only the Los Angeles Dodgers (800-557, .590) and the New York Yankees (762-594, .562) have better records since 2012.

MIKE RIZZO

Nationals President of Baseball Operations and General Manager **Mike Rizzo** completed his 12th season as the head of Washington's baseball operation and his 37th season in professional baseball in 2020...Under Rizzo's leadership, the Nationals have transformed into one of Major League Baseball's perennially elite clubs, winning a World Series in 2019, earning four National League East titles (2012, 2014, 2016, 2017) and one World Card berth (2019) in the last nine seasons.

- The Nationals are 964-877 (.524) since the start of the 2009 season when Rizzo took over Washington's baseball operations...That is tied for the sixth-best record in Major League Baseball over the last 12 seasons.
- On Sept. 5, Rizzo agreed to a multi-year contract extension with the Washington Nationals...He finished the 2020 season as the fourth-longest tenured General Manager in Major League Baseball.

DAVE MARTINEZ

Dave Martinez completed his third season as the manager of the Washington Nationals in 2020 after being named the seventh field manager in team history on Oct. 30, 2017...In his three seasons in Washington, Martinez has led the club through a steady, unwavering approach, consistent strategy and never-ending positivity and support for players...That includes an improbable run to the 2019 World Series Championship...For his efforts, Martinez was awarded with a multi-year contract extension with the Washington Nationals on Sept. 26.

- With 201 wins following the 2020 season, Martinez is just 24 wins shy of passing **Davey Johnson** for the most managerial wins (224) in Nationals history (2005-pres.)...Early in the 2021 season, Martinez – with 384 games – will pass **Manny Acta** as the longest tenured manager in team history (410 games).

BATTING CHAMPION...AND SO MUCH MORE

Juan Soto secured the National League batting title, finishing the season with a .351 batting average...According to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, at 21 years old, he became the youngest player to win the National League batting title in Major League history (since 1900)...Elias notes that – prior to Soto – since 1900, the youngest player to win the National League batting was **Pete Reiser** in 1941 (22 years, 195 days).

- Soto put himself in the National League MVP discussion by pacing Major League Baseball in the significant rate categories (see box).
- Despite missing 13 games, Soto ranked in the National League in intentional walks (1st, 12), walks (4th, 41), fWAR (9th, 2.4), runs scored (T12th, 39), and home runs (T14th, 13).

TREA TURNER

For six of the eight weeks of the regular season, **Trea Turner** was one of the top players in Major League Baseball...For those efforts, Turner positioned himself to garner consideration for the Louisville Slugger Silver Slugger Award as well as National League MVP Award (see box).

- Turner led Major League shortstops in slugging percentage (.588), on-base percentage (.394), batting average (.335), OPS (.982), extra-base hits (31) and triples (T1st, 4).
- He ranked among National League shortstops in doubles (T1st, 15), stolen bases (2nd, 12), home runs (3rd, 12) and runs scored (3rd, 46).
- Turner posted a career-long 16-game hitting streak from Aug. 14-31 and a 10-game streak from Sept. 3-12...He was one of seven players in Major League Baseball to have two hitting streaks of at least 10 games.

MAD MAX

Max Scherzer ranked in the National League in strikeouts per 9.0 IP (3rd, 12.30), strikeouts (6th, 92) and strikeout-to-walk ratio (8th, 4.00)...In 12 starts, he finished the 2020 season 5-4 with a 3.64 ERA, the best mark among qualified Nationals pitchers.

- He recorded at least 10 strikeouts five times, tied for the most in the National League with NYM **Jacob deGrom** and behind only CLE **Shane Bieber** (8) for the most in Major League Baseball.

NATIONALS NEWS

RAIN MAN

Tanner Rainey led the Nationals and ranked tied for fourth in the National League with nine holds this season...He also paced Washington's pen and ranked among NL relievers in opp. batting average (3rd, .119), opp. on-base percentage (5th, .213) and strikeouts (11th, 32).

- He tossed scoreless relief in 14 of 16 outings to start the season (7/25-9/3) and opposing batters hit just .096 (5-for-52) average against him during that stretch...He struck out 24 batters and issued six walks in 16.1 innings.
- According to MLB Statcast, he ranked in the 99th percentile in MLB in strikeout rate (42.7%) and whiff rate (75.5%)...His average fastball velocity (96.6) ranked in the 92nd percentile.

WELCOME TO THE SHOW

Seven players made their Major League debuts for the Washington Nationals in 2020...From **Luis García** (20 years, 90 days old) to **Yadiel Hernandez** (32 years, 337 days old), each had their own story.

- After six seasons in Oakland's system, **Kyle Finnegan** made the Opening Day roster and his MLB debut at the age of 28...He eventually became one of the more trusted members of **Dave Martinez's** bullpen.
- **Dakota Bacus** spent parts of eight Minor League seasons in Oakland and Washington's systems before making his debut at the age of 29.
- Washington's top pick (No. 25 overall) in the 2017 First-Year Player Draft, **Seth Romero** returned from Tommy John surgery to make his Major League debut in 2020.
- **Luis García** proved to be the next in the line of young Latin American talent in Washington's player development system...Despite his inexperience, García put together an impressive rookie season...He was the first player born in the year 2000 or later to play Major League Baseball.
- Washington's second-round pick in 2017, **Wil Crowe** was called upon to make three starts.
- An 18th round pick in 2016, **Ben Braymer** capped his rookie season with 5.0 innings of one-hit, shutout ball in his first career start on Sept. 20 at Miami.
- One of the best stories of the 2020 season for Washington, **Yadiel Hernandez** made his Major League debut after six seasons in Cuba and three in Washington's system...On Sept. 22 vs. Philadelphia, he clubbed his first MLB homer, a walk-off shot to beat the Marlins.

- The Nationals are 15-4-25 (sweeps-swept-splits) in doubleheaders and 55-33 (.625) when playing twice in a single day since baseball returned to Washington in 2005.

BACKSTOP BATS

Combined, **Yan Gomes** and **Kurt Suzuki** hit .286, the second-best among catching tandems in the National League...They also ranked among NL catching corps in doubles (2nd, 14), on-base percentage (4th, .345), slugging percentage (5th, .448), and OPS (5th, .792).

- Gomes ranked among National League catchers (min. 115 PA) in average (3rd, .284), slugging percentage (4th, .468), and OPS (4th, .787).
- Suzuki ranked among National League catchers (min. 125 PA) in average (3rd, .270), on-base percentage (4th, .349), slugging percentage (5th, .396), and OPS (5th, .745).

THE KID IS ALRIGHT

In 17 games from Sept. 1-20, **Luis García** hit .375 (21-for-56) with four doubles, one homer, six RBI, one walk and nine runs scored.

- On the season, he ranked among National League rookies (min. 135 PA) in batting average (3rd, .276), slugging percentage (4th, .366) and OPS (4th, .668).
- García also ranked fifth among NL rookies with 37 hits despite playing in only 40 games.
- Tied at 2-2 in the top of the 10th inning on Sept. 16 at Tampa Bay, **García** launched (427 feet, per StatCast) a two-run home run to put the Nationals ahead of the Tampa Bay Rays, 4-2...According to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, the only other player in franchise (MON/WSH) history, at age 20 or younger, to homer in extra innings is **Juan Soto**, (19 years old, 9/11/18 at PHI and 20 years old, 4/9/19 at PHI).

NATIONALS NEWS

STREAKIN' STEVENSON

Andrew Stevenson capped his 2020 season with a career-long 12-game hitting streak that began on Sept. 18...During the streak, he hit .417 (15-for-36) with seven doubles, one triple, two homers, 12 RBI, four walks, one stolen base and 10 runs scored.

- Within the 12-game streak, Stevenson also recorded one extra-base hit in seven straight games, tied for the fourth-longest streak in Nationals history (2005-pres.).

REPLAY RANKINGS

Washington's replay team has challenged 12 plays in 2020 and eight were overturned (8-for-12; 66.7%)...They ranked fourth in Major League Baseball - and first in the National League - behind the Boston Red Sox (10-for-13, 76.9%), Chicago White Sox (8-for-11, 72.2%) and Kansas City Royals (7-for-10, 70%).

GET 'EM IN

With runners in scoring position, the Nationals hit .276 (6th in MLB, 4th in the NL)...**Juan Soto** (.421, T5th MLB/ 4th in NL) and **Trea Turner** (.378, 17th in MLB/10th in NL) ranked among the best in batting average with runners in scoring position.

- Washington's seven games of 10 or more runs were tied for the fourth-most for any club in Major League Baseball behind Atlanta (10), San Diego (8) and New York Yankees (8).

LEFT IS RIGHT

Against left-handed pitching in 2020, Washington led the National League with a .284 batting average, a .505 slugging percentage and was fifth with a .341 on-base percentage...All told, the Nationals were 11-6 this season when facing a left-handed starting pitcher.

- **Trea Turner** (T3rd, .375), **Juan Soto** (6th, .360), **Victor Robles** (14th, .326) and **Asdrúbal Cabrera** (18th, .314) all ranked near the top of the National League in average vs. lefties.

HARRISON AND HOLT

Mike Rizzo brought in two veterans - **Josh Harrison** and **Brock Holt** - to help provide depth to **Dave Martinez's** lineup and bench.

- Harrison hit .309 (21-for-68) with two doubles, three homers, 14 RBI, one stolen base, six walks and 10 runs scored in 22 starts.
- After coming to D.C. from Milwaukee at the end of August, Holt hit .262 (17-for-65) with six doubles, four RBI, five walks and 11 runs scored in 20 games for the Nationals...From Sept. 4-8, he went 12-for-20 (.600) with four doubles, two RBI, five runs scored and one walk in five games.

REALLY BIG RINGS

7.9.20 - RING CEREMONY - The moment the players and staff waited all summer for

When they arrived for practice on this Thursday morning, members of the 2019 World Champion Washington Nationals had a special box waiting for them at their locker. That box contained their 2019 World Series Championship rings. Although not the traditional ring ceremony, players, coaches and staff took pictures with their ring and the Commissioner's Trophy at home plate.

7.23.20 - OPENING DAY - Nationals raise 2019 World Series banner - Yankees 4, Nationals 1

The Washington Nationals and New York Yankees opened Major League Baseball's 2020 season before a nationally televised audience on ESPN. During a pregame ceremony, the 2019 World Series banner was raised above the Nationals Park scoreboard where it will fly alongside banners honoring the 1924, 1925 and 1933 Washington Senators. In a moment of unity and in support of social justice, members of the Nationals and Yankees took a knee while holding a black fabric to connect each person during a moment of silence prior to the National Anthem.

7.29.20 - EXTRA! EXTRA! - Nationals and Blue Jays try out the new extra inning rule - Nationals 4, Blue Jays 0 (10)

The "visiting" Washington Nationals beat the Toronto Blue Jays, 4-0, snapping their seven-game losing streak to Toronto (since 2015). **Adam Eaton's** infield single - and **Andrew Stevenson's** heads-up base running - put the Nationals ahead, 1-0 in the 10th inning. **Asdrúbal Cabrera** followed that with a bases-clearing, three-run triple to extend the lead for good. This was the final game of four between the clubs at Nationals Park. These four games were originally scheduled as a home-and-home series (two in D.C., two in Toronto). The Nationals were the home team for the first two games, while the Blue Jays served as the "home" team for the final two.

8.10.20 - NEW YORK CABBY LEADS THE WAY - Asdrúbal Cabrera clubs two home runs - Nationals 16, Mets 4

Washington scored a season-high 16 runs on 17 hits to beat the New York Mets. **Asdrúbal Cabrera** led the way, going 4-for-4 with two doubles, two homers, five RBI and three runs scored. He set a career-high in extra-base hits (4) and total bases (12) and matched a career-high with five RBI. According to STATS Inc, Cabrera is the first player to go 4-for-4 with four extra-base hits against a former team since **Johnny Cooney** of the Dodgers did it against the Boston Bees on Aug. 21, 1937.

8.11.20 - LEADING MAN - Trea Turner sets Nationals record for career leadoff homers - Nationals 2, Mets 1

Trea Turner led off the game with his 10th career leadoff home run and finished it with a spectacular grab down the left field line to help **Daniel Hudson** eventually secure his third save of the season. Turner's leadoff home run passed Alfonso Soriano, who clubbed nine during his only season in Washington (2006).

8.14.20 - SHOWING HE BELONGS - Luis García makes Major League debut - Nationals 15, Orioles 3

In between games of the doubleheader, the Nationals selected the contract of 20-year-old infielder **Luis García**. He started at second base and went 2-for-5 with a double, two RBI and one run scored. He recorded his first Major League hit in the third inning, a single to left field off Orioles starter **Tommy Milone**.

8.25.20 - PLAY OF THE YEAR - Victor Robles doubles off Jean Segura - Phillies 8, Nationals 3

All was not lost in this defeat at the hands of the Philadelphia Phillies. In the top of the sixth inning, **Alec Bohm** hit a deep fly ball to center field that **Victor Robles** tracked down and jumped to catch. He gathered himself and fired a laser to first base to double off **Jean Segura** at first base. Major League Baseball selected this play as the Play of the Week.

9.11.20 - WALK IT OFF - Michael A. Taylor wins it in extras for Washington - Nationals 8, Braves 7 (12)

Tied at 7-7 in the bottom of the 12th inning, **Adam Eaton** started the inning on second base and advanced to third on a fly ball by **Trea Turner**. **Michael A. Taylor** singled to right to score Eaton and give Washington its first walk-off win of the season. **Kyle Finnegan** tossed 2.0 innings of scoreless, one-hit relief. **James Bourque** tossed a scoreless 12th inning to earn his first career win. Both pitchers stranded the runners who started the inning on second base.

9.16.20 - SEE YOU WAYYYYYY LATER - Luis Garcia's monster go-ahead home run - Nationals 4, Rays 2 (10)

Tied at 2-2 in the top of the 10th inning at Tampa Bay, **Luis García** launched (427 feet, per StatCast) a two-run home run to put the Nationals ahead of the Tampa Bay Rays, 4-2. According to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, the only other player in franchise (MON/WSH) history, at age 20 or younger, to homer in extra innings is **Juan Soto**, (19 years old, 9/11/18 at PHI and 20 years old, 4/9/19 at PHI).

9.20.20 - START ME UP - Ben Braymer tosses 5.0 shutout innings in first Major League start - Nationals 15, Marlins 0

The Nationals split the doubleheader with the Marlins, but the story of the day was Game 2. Making his first Major League start, **Ben Braymer** tossed 5.0 innings of one-hit, shutout ball to earn his first Major League win in Washington's 15-0, 7.0 inning win. He allowed his lone hit in the fourth inning, a single by **Jesus Aguilar**. **Trea Turner**, **Asdrúbal Cabrera** and **Victor Robles** homered, while **Juan Soto** went 3-for-3 with a double, walk and three runs scored.

9.22.20 - WENT 2-0 TODAY - Austin Voth and Yadiel Hernandez lead the way Nationals 5, Phillies 1

In Game 1 of the doubleheader, **Austin Voth** (7.0 IP, 3 H, ER, BB, 7 SO) outdueled **Aaron Nola** (6.0 IP, 6 H, 5 R, 3 ER, 2 BB, 6 SO) to earn his first win of the season and first career complete game. Voth tossed a career-high 7.0 innings and matched a career-high with seven strikeouts.

Nationals 8, Phillies 7 (8)

In Game 2, **Yadiel Hernandez** propelled the Nationals to the 8-7, extra-inning, walk-off victory with his first career home run. With a runner at second base in the bottom of the eighth inning, Hernandez launched a 2-1 offering from **Brandon Workman** into Washington's bullpen. According to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, Hernandez (32 years, 349 days) became the oldest player in Major League Baseball history to hit a walkoff homer for his first career home run.

BASEBALL RETURNS TO THE NATION'S CAPITAL - 2004

On Wednesday, Sept. 29, 2004, Major League Baseball selected the Washington, D.C. proposal as its choice for relocation of the Montreal Expos. Commissioner Allan H. (Bud) Selig made the announcement. Relocation of the club was subject to certain contingencies, including a formal vote of ownership at the next owners' meeting in November and passage of legislation by the District of Columbia Council to provide for financing and construction of a ballpark on the Anacostia River waterfront in Southeast Washington. MLB also provided the United States District Court for the Southern District of Florida the required notice of MLB's intent to move forward with relocating the team.

The D.C. agreement also included financing for the refurbishing of RFK Stadium, where the Washington, D.C. franchise played through the 2007 campaign.

"Washington, D.C., as our nation's capital, is one of the world's most important cities and Major League Baseball is gratified at the skill and perseverance shown by (then) Mayor Anthony Williams throughout this long process," Selig said. "There has been tremendous growth in the Washington, D.C. area over the last 33 years and we in Major League Baseball believe that baseball will be welcomed there and will be a great success."

Selig also said: "I would like to thank the representatives who worked on behalf of Northern Virginia, Norfolk, Va., Las Vegas, Nev., Portland, Ore., Monterrey, Mexico and others for devoting so much time and energy in their attempts to bring a Major League Baseball team to their communities."

At the time, Washington, D.C. was the largest market in the country in terms of population (5.4 million) and television market size (eighth) without a Major League Baseball team.

Even though Washington, D.C. baseball has a long history with the American League, the team plays in the National League East Division, which in fact marks a return to its baseball roots. The first Washington, D.C. franchise joined the National League in 1886 and was part of the NL, except for a two-year hiatus in 1890-91, until the National League contracted Washington and three other franchises in 1900.

But a year later, Ban Johnson organized the American League and included Washington, D.C. as one of its charter franchises. Although the original Senators were mostly mediocre throughout their history, they fielded one of the game's greatest all-time pitchers, Walter "Big Train" Johnson, and made three trips to the World Series, winning it in 1924 in a seven-game series against the New York Giants. In 1925, the Senators lost in seven games to Pittsburgh and lost in five games to the Giants in 1933.

The second incarnation of the Senators came in 1961 in the form of an expansion team. Like its predecessor, the Senators often finished in the second division and had only one winning season in their 11-year history. The Senators moved after the 1971 season and Washington, D.C. was without Major League Baseball until 2005.

THE HISTORY OF BASEBALL IN WASHINGTON, D.C.

When the first professional baseball games were played in the nation's capital, the enduring symbol of freedom in America - the Statue of Liberty - was still two years away from being dedicated. There were 38 states in the Union and what would become the State of Oklahoma had yet to be settled. More than seven decades had passed since Washington, D.C. became the capital of the United States and baseball was quickly evolving into the National Pastime.

A Washington team was admitted to the National League in 1885 and played during the League's 10th professional season in 1886. Washington played 12 years in the National League - 1886-89 and 1892-99 - but was part of a four-team contraction in 1900 as the National League went from 12 franchises to eight.

Later that same year, former Western League president Ban Johnson was organizing a second Major League to compete with the National League and announced plans to include a franchise in the nation's capital. The new league was called the American League and began play in 1901.

This Washington franchise was awarded to James Manning and Detroit businessman Fred Postal. Manning retired later that year and Tom Loftus replaced him as the club's primary executive. The Senators finished in sixth place in 1901 with a 61-72 mark and would eventually be sold to an ownership group including Thomas C. Noyes, Benjamin Minor and Harry Rapley, among others.

The first of two individual tragedies struck the organization in only its third season as the Senators lost a key figure when future Hall of Fame outfielder Ed Delahanty was tragically killed in July 1903, when he was swept over Niagara Falls. Delahanty was the reigning American League batting champion and his sudden death took its toll on the team as the Senators finished the campaign with a 43-94 mark.

Effective for the 1905 campaign, the team name was changed to Nationals. Newspaper accounts used the names Senators and Nationals interchangeably for the next five decades.

While it took 12 years before the Nationals finished a season with a winning record, the signing of 20-year-old pitcher Walter Johnson in 1907 would signify a key moment in the franchise's history. Under first-year manager Clark Griffith, the 1912 Washington club posted a 91-61 mark and ended up in second place, 14 games behind the eventual World Champion Boston Red Sox.

Johnson appeared in a remarkable 50 games that year - 37 as a starter - and went 33-12 with a league-leading 1.39 ERA and 303 strikeouts. The following year he was even better as he led the Nationals to their second consecutive 90-win season. The "Big Train" went 36-7 with 11 shutouts and a 1.14 ERA, which still stands today as one of the lowest ERAs by a starting pitcher in a single season.

In 1912, 40 year-old team president Thomas C. Noyes fell ill to pneumonia and eventually succumbed to the disease. Noyes had been instrumental in the franchise's improvements since he took over and was replaced as team president by Minor, a prominent Washington attorney. Minor, unable to devote the necessary time to the club, subsequently sold the controlling interest to Griffith and Philadelphia businessman William Richardson in 1919.

Following a 75-78 season in 1923, Griffith made a controversial decision by appointing 27-year-old second baseman Stanley "Bucky" Harris as field manager. Harris was the fifth manager in the previous five seasons for the Nationals, but he guided one of the great reversals in baseball history as the Nationals won more games in 1924 than ever before, 92, and captured their first American League pennant.

In the 1924 World Series, the Nationals took on famed manager John McGraw and the New York Giants. The Series was one of the closest in history as four games were decided by a single run, including the deciding Game Seven. On the strength of Walter Johnson's four innings of relief pitching - on two days' rest - and the series-clinching hit by Earl McNeely in the bottom of the 12th inning, the Nationals won their first and only World Series Championship.

United States President Calvin Coolidge, who threw out the ceremonial first pitch on three occasions during the series, paid tribute to the hometown victors immediately following the triumph:

"I have only the heartiest praise to bestow upon the individual players of both teams. Naturally, in Washington, we were pleased to see Walter Johnson finish the final game, pitching for our home team. Everybody was pleased to see him come back at the close of the last game. The three contests I witnessed maintained throughout a high degree of skill, and every evidence of high-class sportsmanship which will bring to every observer an increased respect and confidence in our national game."

The following year, Harris once again led the Nationals to a record regular season finish as they posted 96 wins and clinched a second-straight American League pennant. Their second trip to the World Series was just as close, but this time they came up short in a seven-game series to the Pittsburgh Pirates. The Senators had a 7-6 lead entering the bottom of the eighth in Game Seven, but could not hold it as the Pirates scored three runs in the inning off Johnson and held on to clinch the series victory.

Johnson concluded his amazing 21-year playing career with the Nationals in 1927 with career totals of 417-279, a 2.36 ERA, 3,508 strikeouts and a big league-record 110 shutouts. He was among the first class of inductees into the Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, NY, in 1936.

The "Big Train" was not gone from the Washington scene long, as Griffith brought him back to replace Harris as the Nationals' manager in 1929. Despite posting three straight 90-win seasons, Johnson was removed from his post after the 1932 season and replaced by Joe Cronin, the team's 26-year-old shortstop.

Cronin's first season with the Nationals produced the franchise's best regular season mark ever at 99-53 and its third American League pennant. Washington again faced the New York Giants in the Fall Classic but fell in five games to a team led by the pitching of Carl Hubbell (20 IP, 0 ER) and the hitting of Mel Ott, who clinched the series for New York with a 10th-inning homer in Game Five.

The Nationals franchise then fell on hard times. Washington won just 66 games in '34 and the team posted only two more winning seasons over the next 25 years. The team name was officially changed to Senators for the '56 campaign.

Calvin Griffith, who became team president after his father's death in 1955, was granted permission to seek relocation in Sept. 1960, and an announcement was made in Oct. 1960 that the Senators were moving to Minneapolis, Minn.

At that time, the American League announced plans to expand by two teams for the 1961 season. One team would be located in Los Angeles and the other in Washington, D.C.

The expansion Senators fared no better than their predecessors, as they lost at least 100 games in each of their first four seasons. In 1964, the Senators acquired five players in a deal with the Los Angeles Dodgers for pitcher Claude Osteen. One of those five players was slugging outfielder and the 1960 National League Rookie of the Year, Frank Howard.

An imposing presence at 6-7, 250 lbs., Howard brought a much-needed offensive punch to the Senators lineup and the Senators win total increased in each of his first three seasons in Washington. After struggling again in 1968, new team president Robert Short brought in Hall of Fame outfielder Ted Williams as the new manager of the Senators.

Howard and his teammates responded to the "Splendid Splinter" during his rookie managerial campaign as Washington's win total improved 21 games to 86 in 1969. It was also Howard's best year in the Majors, as he batted .296 with 48 home runs, 111 RBI and 111 runs scored and finished fourth in the balloting for American League Most Valuable Player.

Unfortunately, the team was unable to build upon their success in '69. The Senators lost 92 games in '70 and 96 in '71. On Sept. 21, 1971, owners approved the transfer of the Senators to Arlington, Tex., where the franchise became the Texas Rangers.

After 71 years in the American League and nearly 100 since the debut of professional baseball in the nation's capital, Washington, D.C., hosted its "final" regular season game on Sept. 30, 1971 at Robert F. Kennedy Stadium. The Senators moved after the 1971 season and Washington, D.C. was without Major League Baseball until 2005.

BASEBALL IN WASHINGTON, D.C. – TIMELINE

- Nov. 7, 1859.....The first professional baseball team is founded in Washington, named the Washington Nationals Baseball Club.
- May 5, 1869.....The first recorded Nationals game takes place on a field called the “White Lot” just south of the White House gates, now known as the Ellipse.
- 1870.....After four years of informal play, Georgetown University’s baseball team is founded, making it the school’s oldest sport and the first collegiate baseball program in Washington.
- April 13, 1883.....The first recorded meeting of a professional baseball team and a sitting U.S. President takes place at the White House when the Cleveland Forest Citys meet with Chester A. Arthur.
- Jan. 1886.....The National League admits the Washington franchise to the National League for the 1886 season. They go on to feature catcher Connie Mack and outfielder William Ellsworth “Dummy” Hoy, the most accomplished deaf player in baseball history. Gallaudet University’s baseball field is named Hoy Field in his honor.
- March 1900.....Washington is one of four franchises contracted when the National League reduces its membership from 12 to eight. Reportedly, the franchise is purchased for \$10,000.
- Jan. 28, 1901.....Former Western League President Ban Johnson formally organizes the American League with eight franchises, including the Washington Senators.
- April 26, 1901.....The Washington Senators play their first game in the newly established American League against the Philadelphia Athletics at Shibe Park. The Senators win, 5-1.
- April 29, 1901.....The Washington Senators defeat the Baltimore Orioles, 5-2, in the first American League game played in Washington, D.C.
- July 2, 1903.....Washington’s future Hall of Famer Ed Delahanty is killed when he is swept away over Niagara Falls.
- 1904-05.....Following the 1904 season, Washington’s team name changes, effective in 1905, to the Nationals. Newspaper accounts use “Senators,” “Nationals” and “Nats” interchangeably for next five decades.
- Aug. 2, 1907.....19-year-old Walter Johnson makes his Major League debut with Washington and loses to Detroit, 3-2. The future Hall of Famer gives up his first hit to Ty Cobb, a bunt single.
- Sept. 7, 1908.....Washington pitcher Walter Johnson shuts out the New York Yankees (then called Highlanders) for the third consecutive game over a span of four days.
- April 14, 1910.....President William Howard Taft throws the first-ever ceremonial first pitch prior to a Major League Baseball game. Legend has it he also “invents” the seventh-inning stretch when he stands to stretch himself and fans follow suit.
- Oct. 30, 1911.....Clark Griffith is named manager of the Washington franchise, where he would remain a prominent figure - as manager and then owner - until his death in 1955.

THE CATCH

Who made the most famous catch in the history of the World Series? Some might reference Willie Mays’ over-the-shoulder catch in ‘54, but when considering intrigue, it is tough to top Sam Rice’s catch in Game 3 of the 1925 World Series against the Pirates.

On Oct. 10, 1925, Rice (HOF ‘63) was patrolling Griffith Stadium’s right field for the AL Nationals. In the eighth inning, Rice made a dynamic catch of a would-be Earl Smith game-tying home run. Upon making the catch, Rice toppled over the fence and disappeared from sight. When Rice reappeared and showed the ball, umpires ruled that the catch had been made on the field of play and that Smith was out.

After the game, Rice was coy about his heroic catch. He later turned down numerous requests for interviews, some for money. Rice never disclosed any information about the catch. Instead, he wrote a letter that was opened only after his death in 1974. The contents of the letter said, “At no time did I lose possession of the ball.” Washington eventually lost the Series, however, in seven games.

May 19, 1918	Washington defeats Cleveland, 1-0 in 18 innings, in the first Sunday baseball game played in Washington, D.C. Reportedly, a crowd of more than 15,000 are in attendance at American League Base Ball Park.
Nov. 10, 1919	Clark Griffith, the team's manager since Oct. of 1911, also becomes Washington's owner and president, when he joins William Richardson in purchasing the controlling interest of the Senators for \$175,000.
May 14, 1920	Walter Johnson defeats the Detroit Tigers for his 300th career victory.
July 1, 1920	Walter Johnson pitches the first no-hitter in Nationals history, defeating the Boston Red Sox at Fenway Park, 1-0. The lone baserunner allowed reached on a Bucky Harris error.
Sept. 29, 1924	The Washington Nationals defeat the Boston Red Sox, 4-2, behind the pitching of Walter Johnson and clinch their first pennant in franchise history.
Oct. 10, 1924	The Nationals defeat the New York Giants four games to three to win the World Series, the first and only World Series championship for the city of Washington at the time.
Sept. 24, 1925	The Nationals clinch their second pennant and advance to the World Series, falling to the Pittsburgh Pirates in seven games.
May 2, 1926	Walter Johnson wins his 400th career game with a 4-3 victory over the Philadelphia Athletics.
Aug. 2, 1927	Washington celebrates Walter Johnson Day at Griffith Stadium on the 20th anniversary of his big league debut. Johnson is presented with gifts prior to the game against the Detroit Tigers.
Oct. 15, 1928	Former Washington pitcher Walter Johnson signs a three-year contract to manage the team.
Aug. 8, 1931	Bobby Burke pitches the first no-hitter at Griffith Stadium by a Nationals pitcher, defeating Boston, 5-0.
Sept. 21, 1933	The Washington Nationals defeat St. Louis, 2-1, clinching their third and final AL pennant.
Feb. 6, 1936	Walter Johnson is part of the first class of players voted into the Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, NY.
July 7, 1937	Washington hosts its first MLB All-Star Game, and the AL prevails, 8-3, behind a Lou Gehrig home run.
1940	The Homestead (Pa.) Grays begin playing half of their home games in D.C., where they are known as the Washington Grays and alternately the Washington Homestead Grays. They are led by Hall of Famers Josh Gibson, Cool Papa Bell and Buck Leonard, under the guidance of Hall of Fame owner Cumberland Posey.
Nov. 5, 1940	Walter Johnson was defeated as a Republican candidate in his run for a U.S. House of Representative seat from the State of Maryland.
May 28, 1941	The Washington Nationals host the New York Yankees at Griffith Stadium in the first night game ever held in Washington, D.C. Future Senators general manager George Selkirk hit a pinch-hit grand slam off future Senators pitching coach Sid Hudson in the top of the eighth inning to propel the Yankees to a 6-5 win.
1942	Clark Griffith reportedly meets with Grays stars Josh Gibson and Buck Leonard about the possibility of breaking baseball's color line with the Nationals, but no deal is struck.
Oct. 5, 1943	The Grays win their first Negro World Series championship, part of a stretch of nine straight pennants.
Sept. 24, 1944	The Grays repeat as champions, taking the decisive Game 5 at Griffith Stadium. It remains the last championship won on D.C. soil by a team in one of the four major professional sports (baseball, basketball, football and hockey).
Sept. 21, 1946	Washington surpasses one million fans for the first and only time in franchise history (1,027,216).
Sept. 7, 1947	Washington's Joe Kuehl hits the only home run by the home team at Griffith Stadium all year long — an inside-the-park homer against the New York Yankees.
Oct. 5, 1948	The Grays win the final Negro World Series ever played, as integration of Major League Baseball finally begins to take hold. They take the decisive Game 5 on the road in Birmingham against the Black Barons.
April 17, 1953	New York Yankees outfielder Mickey Mantle is credited with what many consider to be the longest home run in baseball history. It is estimated to have traveled 565 feet at Washington's Griffith Stadium off pitcher Chuck Stobbs.
1954	The Nationals sign Cuban outfielder Carlos Paula, making him the first player in club history to break the color line.
1956	The Washington team name is officially changed to the Senators, effective for the 1956 season.
July 10, 1956	Griffith Stadium hosts its second and final All-Star Game. Four first ballot Hall of Famers — Willie Mays, Stan Musial, Mickey Mantle and Ted Williams — blast home runs.
Sept. 29, 1957	Washington's Roy Sievers becomes the first player in franchise history to lead the American League in home runs with 42. Sievers outdistanced future Hall of Famers Ted Williams of the Boston Red Sox (38) and Mickey Mantle of the New York Yankees (34) to capture the home run title.
Oct. 27, 1960	Washington Senators President Calvin Griffith is granted permission to move the franchise to Minneapolis. The American League simultaneously admits an expansion team to Washington, D.C., to replace the Senators.
Nov. 17, 1960	A native of Washington and head of the Federal Aviation Administration, Elvin Quesada was awarded the expansion Washington Senators.
Sept. 21, 1961	The final game is played at Griffith Stadium, with the expansion Senators losing to the former Senators — now the Minnesota Twins — 6-3, before just 1,498 fans.
April 9, 1962	D.C. Stadium, later renamed Robert F. Kennedy Memorial Stadium in 1969, opens as the new home of the expansion Washington Senators. The Senators defeat the Detroit Tigers, 4-1, before a crowd of 42,143 fans including President John F. Kennedy.
July 10, 1962	The All-Star Game comes to D.C. Stadium, as Washington native Maury Wills earns MVP honors in a 3-1 win for the National League.
Aug. 1, 1962	An all-time Washington record crowd of 48,147 fans attend a twinbill at D.C. Stadium vs. the New York Yankees.
Sept. 12, 1962	Washington pitcher Tom Cheney establishes a big league record when he strikes out 21 batters during a 16-inning victory at Baltimore.

Dec. 4, 1964.....	The Nationals acquire Frank Howard in a seven-player trade with the Los Angeles Dodgers. He goes on to win two AL home run titles in Washington.
April 11, 1966.....	Emmett Ashford becomes the first African-American umpire to work a Major League game when he works the Opening Day game at D.C. Stadium between Washington and Cleveland.
June 12, 1967.....	The Washington Senators defeat the Chicago White Sox, 6-5, in 22 innings at D.C. Stadium, marking the longest night game in baseball history. It requires 6 hours, 38 minutes and ends at 2:43 a.m.
April 8, 1969.....	The New York Yankees spoil the managerial debut of Ted Williams at RFK Stadium in Washington, 8-4. More than 45,000 fans - including President Richard Nixon - are in attendance.
June 5, 1969.....	Washington holds the first overall pick in the Major League Baseball Rule 4 Draft for the first time since the draft's inception in 1965. The Senators chose outfielder Jeff Burroughs from Wilson High School in Long Beach, Calif.
July 22, 1969.....	For the first time in its history, the All-Star Game is postponed due to rain. The game is played the following day at RFK Stadium and hometown favorite Frank Howard delights the fans with a homer.

1991 and 1994.....	Washington is considered for expansion by Major League Baseball, but teams are awarded to Denver, Miami, Phoenix and Tampa-St. Petersburg.

Baseball finally returns to the nation's capital for the first time in 33 years, as Major League Baseball selects the Washington, D.C. proposal as its choice for relocation of the Montreal Expos. Commissioner Allan H. (Bud) Selig makes the announcement. Relocation of the club is subject to certain contingencies, including a formal vote of ownership at the next owners' meeting in Nov. and passage of legislation by the D.C. Council to provide for financing and construction of a ballpark on the Anacostia River waterfront in Southeast Washington. MLB also provides the United States District Court for the Southern District of Florida the required notice of MLB's intent to move forward with relocating the team. Feb. 14, 2005.....	Pitchers and catchers report to Viera, Fla. for the Nationals' first Spring Training.
March 2, 2005.....	The Nationals play their first Spring Training game against the New York Mets and is televised by ESPN.
April 4, 2005.....	Washington Nationals open their inaugural season at Philadelphia, just 132 miles north of RFK Stadium, with an 8-4 setback. Terrel Sledge hits the first homer in the history of the Nationals in the sixth inning.
April 6, 2005.....	Brad Wilkerson hits his second-career cycle and the Nationals collect their first win, 7-3, at Philadelphia
April 14, 2005.....	Major League Baseball returns to D.C. as the Nationals defeat the Arizona Diamondbacks, 5-3, as Vinny Castilla delights a capacity crowd of 45,596 by tallying a double, triple and homer. President George W. Bush met the Nationals and threw out the ceremonial first pitch.
June 7, 2005.....	With the No. 4 overall pick in the First-Year Player Draft, the Nationals select University of Virginia infielder Ryan Zimmerman as the first draft choice in team history.
July 3, 2005.....	The Nationals down the Cubs, 5-4, in 12 inn. to go a season-high 19 games above .500 at 50-31. The club's offense flounders in the second half, and Washington caps its return to MLB with an 81-81 mark by season's end.
Feb. 7, 2006.....	After midnight, the D.C. Council approves a ballpark lease after voting down the measure earlier in the evening.
March 14, 2006.....	Washington, D.C. Mayor Anthony Williams, the D.C. Sports & Entertainment Commission and the Washington Nationals unveil plans for a 41,000-seat state-of-the-art baseball stadium located in Southeast D.C.
May 4, 2006.....	Ground is officially broken on the Nationals' new ballpark in Southeast D.C.
July 24, 2006.....	MLB and the Nationals announce the official transfer of ownership from Major League Baseball to an ownership group headed by Washington developer Theodore N. Lerner, his son Mark D. Lerner, sons-in-law Edward L. Cohen and Robert K. Tanenbaum, and their families.
Sept. 16, 2006.....	Alfonso Soriano becomes the fourth member of the 40/40 club when he steals his 40th base of the season. He goes on to hit 46 homers and collect 41 stolen bases on the year.

The Nationals host Atlanta in the inaugural regular-season contest at Nationals Park. The Nationals top the Braves, 3-2, on Ryan Zimmerman's game-ending solo shot in the ninth inning. The game is televised worldwide on ESPN's Sunday Night Baseball.
July 27, 2009.....	Josh Willingham hits two grand slams in game at Milwaukee, becoming the 13th player in history to do so.
Aug. 17, 2009	The Nationals agree to terms with Stephen Strasburg, the No. 1 overall selection in the 2009 First-Year Player Draft (June 9).
Aug. 20, 2009.....	Mike Rizzo is named the Nationals' Senior Vice President & General Manager. Rizzo had filled the position with an "interim" tag since March 1, when former GM Jim Bowden stepped down from his post.
Nov. 12, 2009	Jim Riggleman is named the third full-time manager of the Nationals. Riggleman skipped the club as "interim manager" for the second half of the 2009 season, after Manny Acta was relieved of his duties on July 13.
April 5, 2010	President Barack Obama tosses first pitch prior to season-opening loss vs. Philadelphia (L, 1-11).
June 8, 2010	Stephen Strasburg strikes out 14 batters without a walk and earns the win in his Major League debut vs. Pittsburgh.
Aug. 16, 2010.....	The Nationals agree to terms with outfielder Bryce Harper, the No. 1 overall selection in the 2010 Draft.
Dec. 5, 2010.....	Washington inks free agent outfielder Jayson Werth to monumental seven-year contract.
May 17, 2011.....	Former Washington Senators slugger Harmon Killebrew dies at the age of 74.
May 31, 2011.....	The Lerner family and the Washington Nationals Dream Foundation break ground on the Washington Nationals Youth Baseball Academy, located east of the Anacostia River.
June 23, 2011.....	Jim Riggleman resigns from his position of manager. Bench coach John McLaren serves as interim manager.
June 26, 2011.....	Davey Johnson is named manager of the Nationals, and begins his new role the following day at the Los Angeles Angels.
Aug. 16, 2011.....	Nationals agree to terms with top five selections from 2011 First-Year Player Draft: Infielder Anthony Rendon (6th overall, first round), right-handed pitcher Alex Meyer (23rd overall, first round), outfielder Brian Goodwin (34th overall, comp round), left-handed pitcher Matt Purke (3rd round) and left-handed pitcher Kylin Turnbull (4th round).
Dec. 23, 2011.....	Nationals acquire Gio Gonzalez in six-player trade with the Oakland Athletics.
Feb. 1, 2012	<i>Baseball America</i> names Washington Nationals top minor league system in MLB.
Feb. 26, 2012.....	Ryan Zimmerman agrees to terms on a long-term contract extension that keeps him in D.C. through at least 2019.
April 28, 2012.....	Bryce Harper makes MLB debut at Los Angeles, going 1-for-3 with a double and an RBI.
July 10, 2012.....	Stephen Strasburg, Gio Gonzalez and Bryce Harper compete in 83rd MLB All-Star Game in Kansas City...Ian Desmond was named to team, but did not attend due to injury.
June 13, 2012.....	Nationals agree to terms with Lucas Giolito, No. 16 selection in 2012 First-Year Player Draft (June 4).
Sept. 3, 2012.....	With a 2-1 win over the Cubs, the Nationals secure the first winning season by a D.C. baseball team since 1969.
Sept. 20, 2012.....	The Nationals clinch their first Postseason berth with 4-1 win vs. the Dodgers. (D.C.'s first Postseason berth since 1933).
Sept. 22, 2012.....	Gio Gonzalez wins 20th game and notches 200th strikeout vs. Milwaukee.
Oct. 1, 2012.....	The Nationals clinch the franchise's first NL East title.
Oct. 3, 2012.....	Teddy wins his first Presidents Race in the season finale.
Oct. 7, 2012.....	The Nationals collect the first Postseason win by a D.C. baseball team since 1933 with 3-2 win at St. Louis (Game 1 of NLDS).
Oct. 11, 2012.....	Jayson Werth hits a dramatic walk-off blast in ninth inning, giving the Nationals a 2-1 win in Game 4 of the NLDS.
Oct. 12, 2012.....	Nationals surrender two-run lead in ninth and lose Game 5 of NLDS by a 9-7 score, ending first postseason run.
Nov. 12, 2012.....	Bryce Harper is named Rookie of the Year, becoming the NL's youngest position player to earn the award.
April 1, 2013.....	Bryce Harper homers in his first two at bats of the season in a 2-0 Opening Day victory over Miami.
May 29, 2013.....	Ryan Zimmerman hits a career-high three home runs, all off Baltimore starter Chris Tillman, in Washington's 9-6 defeat at the hands of the Orioles.
July 16, 2013.....	At 20 years, 273 days old, Bryce Harper starts in center field for the National League in the 84th MLB All-Star Game, becoming the youngest player to start for the NL.
Sept. 19, 2013.....	Denard Span's career-long hitting streak is snapped at 29 games. It is the longest hitting streak in MLB in 2013 and the second-longest in the nine-year history of the Nationals.
Sept. 29, 2013.....	Washington falls, 3-2, at Arizona in Davey Johnson's final game as manager of the Nationals. Johnson finishes with a record of 224-183 (.550) in two-and-a-half seasons with Washington. Johnson's final managerial record stands at 1372-1071 (.562).

NAME GAME

At a ceremony held Nov. 22, 2004 in the historic Main Hall at Union Station, (then) team president Tony Tavares announced the new Washington MLB franchise would be named the Washington Nationals and the color scheme would consist of red, white and blue.

The Nationals moniker had previously served two other Washington baseball franchises. A team called the Nationals first played in the District during the 1870s and 1880s, and a second American League team played at Griffith Stadium from 1901 until 1956. Owner Calvin Griffith then officially changed Washington's name to Senators for the 1957 season.

The name was selected based on an evaluation of a myriad of factors, including data collected through local focus groups and other forms of research.

Nov. 1, 2013.....	Matt Williams is named the fifth full-time manager of the Washington Nationals.
Dec. 2, 2013.....	Mike Rizzo fortifies the Nationals starting pitching rotation, acquiring Doug Fister from the Detroit Tigers in exchange for Ian Krol, Steve Lombardozzi and Robbie Ray.
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March 30, 2014.....	The Washington Nationals Youth Baseball Academy opens in Southeast Washington, D.C.
June 24, 2014.....	Ryan Zimmerman mercifully hits a two-run HR in the 16th inning to lift Washington past the Brewers, 4-3, at Miller Park in the longest game (by innings) in Nationals (2005-pres.) history at the time. Zimmerman's first career extra-inning HR is made possible by a seven-reliever collaboration that lasted 10.0 scoreless innings. Washington's defense turns three double plays and individually, shortstop Ian Desmond makes two dazzling 6-3 putouts in the 5.5 hole, while Denard Span made a game-saving catch at the wall in the 14th. Anthony Rendon's 12th HR, a solo shot in the eighth, ties the score at 2-2 and ultimately sends the game to extra innings.
July 21, 2014.....	Gio Gonzalez becomes the first pitcher to record his 1,000th career strikeout while pitching for the Nationals.
Aug. 12-21, 2014.....	The Nationals post a 10-game winning streak, tied for the longest in Nationals history (2005-present). The 10-game streak ties the longest in MLB in 2014 and featured five walk-off victories.
Aug. 24, 2014.....	Stephen Strasburg becomes the second Nationals pitcher to eclipse the 200-strikeout plateau when he strikes out Giants pitcher Ryan Vogelsong in the second inning.
Sept. 3, 2014.....	Adam LaRoche hits a game-tying homer, laces a go-ahead single and legs out the game-winning RBI in a legendary performance (back tightness, bruised elbow, body flu) in Washington's 14-inning, 8-5 win Sept. 3 at the Los Angeles Dodgers. At 5 hours and 34 minutes, the 14-inning marathon was the longest game (by time) in the 10-year history of the Washington Nationals at that point.
Sept. 13, 2014.....	Ian Desmond steals his 20th base, becoming the fourth shortstop in MLB history to achieve 20-20 status for the third time (Alex Rodriguez - 3, Jimmy Rollins - 4, Hanley Ramirez - 4).
Sept. 16, 2014.....	Nationals clinch their second National League East title via a 3-0 win over the Atlanta Braves at Turner Field. By the end of the 2014 campaign, Washington builds a 17.0 game lead over the rest of the NL East, MLB's largest since the 100-win Angels won the AL West by 21.0 games over Texas in 2008 and the largest in the 81-year history (1901-pres.) of modern baseball in D.C.
Sept. 28, 2014.....	In Washington's season-ending 1-0 home win over the Marlins, Jordan Zimmermann walks one and strikes out 10 while tossing not only the first no-hitter in Nationals history, but the first tossed in the nation's capital since AL Nationals Bobby Burke turned the trick on Aug. 31, 1931 vs. Boston. Steven Souza Jr.'s miraculous diving catch on deep line drive to left field by Christian Yelich secures Zimmermann's no-hitter. In the same game, Denard Span sets a new Nationals single-season mark with his 184th hit, a third-inning double.
Oct. 4, 2014.....	In Game 2 of the National League Division Series, the Giants top the Nationals, 2-1, in 18 innings. At 6 hours, 23 minutes, the game marks the longest (by time) in MLB Postseason history and the 18 innings played are tied for the most (Atlanta at Houston, Game 4 2005 NLDS) in MLB Postseason history.
Oct. 7, 2014.....	The Nationals are eliminated from MLB's Postseason after falling to the Giants, 3-2, in Game 4 of the NLDS.
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Jan. 21, 2015.....	The Nationals sign Max Scherzer to an historic seven-year contract.
April 6, 2015.....	The Nationals are awarded the 2018 MLB All-Star Game, as announced by Commissioner Robert D. Manfred Jr.
May 6-9, 2015.....	Bryce Harper clubs six home runs in a span of three games, culminating in his third career walk-off home run on May 9 vs. Atlanta. On May 7 vs. Miami, Harper (22 years, 202 days) becomes the 10th-youngest player in MLB history to hit three home runs in a game. He is only the fifth player since 1920 (when RBI became a statistic) to hit at least six home runs and record at least 12 RBI over a span of three games.
May 19, 2015.....	Ryan Zimmerman, aka "Mr. Walk-Off," hits his 10th career walk-off blast.
June 20, 2015.....	Max Scherzer tosses his first career no-hitter and the second in Washington Nationals history. He was perfect through 8.2 innings before a 2-2 slider hits pinch hitter Jose Tabata on the left elbow. Scherzer finishes the day with 10 strikeouts as the Nationals top the Pirates, 6-0.
Sept. 2, 2015.....	With two home runs against St. Louis, Ryan Zimmerman becomes the first player in Nationals history (2005-present) to reach the 200 home run mark exclusively with the Nationals. He joins Vladimir Guerrero (234), Andre Dawson (225), Gary Carter (220) and Tim Lincecum (204) as the only players in Montreal/Washington history to reach 200 home runs.
Sept. 4, 2015.....	Pinch hitter Michael A. Taylor hits the first pinch-hit, walk-off home run in Washington Nationals history, a three-run homer to center field as the Nationals top the Atlanta Braves, 5-2. It is the first walk-off home run and first pinch-hit home run of Taylor's career.
Oct. 3, 2015.....	In the second game of a doubleheader, Max Scherzer turns in one of the most dominant pitching performances in Major League history. Scherzer joins Johnny Vander Meer (1938), Allie Reynolds (1951), Virgil Trucks (1952), Nolan Ryan (1973) and Roy Halladay (2010), becoming just the sixth pitcher in MLB history to throw two no-hitters in the same season (including the Postseason). Just one baserunner, catcher Kevin Plawecki, reaches base, due to a fielding error by third baseman Yunel Escobar. Scherzer strikes out a Nationals record (2005-pres.) and new career-best 17 batters, including a franchise record (Nationals/Expos) nine consecutive batters from the sixth to the ninth inning.
Oct. 5, 2015.....	Manager Matt Williams is relieved of his duties and the coaching staff is informed that their contracts will not be renewed.
Nov. 3, 2015.....	Dusty Baker is named the sixth full-time manager of the Washington Nationals.
Nov. 19, 2015.....	Bryce Harper is named the unanimous National League MVP by the BBWAA. He becomes the youngest player to unanimously win the award and the first player in Nationals history (2005-pres.) to win the award.

Jan. 6, 2016	The Nationals sign Daniel Murphy to a three-year contract.
April 4, 2016	Bryce Harper and Daniel Murphy homer to propel Washington to a 10-inning, 4-3 victory over the Atlanta Braves on Opening Day. It is Harper's fourth career Opening Day home run and Murphy's first homer in a Nationals uniform. After the game, the Nationals players deliver the game ball to manager Dusty Baker as a memento of his first victory in a Washington uniform.
April 14, 2016	Bryce Harper clubs his 100th career home run, and first career grand slam, in the bottom of the third inning.
April 19, 2016	Jayson Werth becomes the fourth player in Nationals history (2005-pres.) to record his 200th home run in a Nationals uniform, joining Alfonso Soriano, Adam LaRoche and Ryan Zimmerman. Werth's solo shot with one out in the seventh clanks off the Marlins' home run sculpture in center field, lodges behind a light in the piece of art, breaks the scoreless tie and adds Werth's name to the 200-homer club.
April 24, 2016	In the longest regular season game (by time) in Nationals history (2005-pres.), OF Chris Heisey clubs his first career walk-off home run in the bottom of the 16th inning.
May 10, 2016	The Nationals and Stephen Strasburg agree to a seven-year contract extension that keeps the pitcher under contract through the 2023 season.
May 11, 2016	Max Scherzer becomes the fourth pitcher in MLB history to strike out 20 batters in a nine-inning game, fanning 20 Detroit Tigers. He joins Randy Johnson, Kerry Wood and Roger Clemens. Only Scherzer and Johnson have a 20-K game and no-hitter on their career ledger. The 20 K's were a Nationals record (2005-pres.), a franchise record (Nationals/Expos) and the most in D.C.-baseball history since Tom Cheney struck out 21 batters on Sept. 12, 1962 at Baltimore, but in a 16-inning performance.
June 12 and 15, 2016	Jayson Werth records two walk-off hits in the span of four games. On June 12, he laces a two-run single in the bottom of the ninth inning against the Phillies. On June 15, his two-out single in the bottom of the 12th inning gives the Nationals the 5-4 win on getaway day over the Cubs. Werth's excitement carries over postgame, leading to a memorable interview on the field with MASN sideline reporter, Dan Kolko.
June 30-July 3, 2016	Danny Espinosa puts together one of the more dominant series in MLB history. Over the course of the Nationals four-game series with the Reds, Espinosa clubs five home runs to drive in 15, a franchise record (Nationals/Expos) for RBI in a single series. He records two multi-homer games in a four-game span, including a grand slam in each of those contests, and in both games hit one home run from the left side of the plate and one home run from the right side.
July 29, 2016	Ryan Zimmerman initiates the first triple play in Nationals history (2005-pres.). With the bases loaded and nobody out in the bottom of the eighth inning, Giants shortstop Brandon Crawford hit a line drive at Zimmerman. Zimmerman stepped on first to double off Buster Posey for the second out, and fired the ball across the diamond to Anthony Rendon to catch Denard Span for the third out. It was the first 3-3-5 triple play turned in Major League Baseball history.
Aug. 23-24, 2016	Trea Turner matches a franchise record (Nationals/Expos) with hits in eight straight plate appearances.
Sept. 9, 2016	Trea Turner produces his first career multi-home run game, with the second of the two coming in walk-off fashion to help the Nationals beat the Phillies, 5-4. Since 1958 (the first season with official rookie designations) Turner became the fourth with at least two homers, including a walk-off, in a game he hit from the leadoff spot.
Sept. 17, 2016	With a strikeout of Freddie Freeman in the bottom of the first inning, Gio Gonzalez records Washington's 1,343rd strikeout of the season, a new franchise and D.C.-baseball record, besting the previous high of 1,342 strikeouts in 2015. The Nationals go on to strike out 1,476 batters in 2016.
Sept. 23, 2016	Wilson Ramos' solo home run in the top of the sixth inning is Washington's 195th home run of the season, setting a new franchise record and a D.C. baseball record for team home runs in a season. The previous high was 194 in 2012. The Nationals go on to hit 203 home runs during the 2016 season.
Sept. 24, 2016	With a 6-1 win over the Pirates coupled with a loss by the Mets, the Nationals clinch their third National League East Division title in the last five seasons. Washington's game concludes slightly before the Mets' game, so the Nationals gather in the visiting clubhouse at PNC Park to watch the final outs of the Phillies' victory over New York before popping the champagne.
Oct. 13, 2016	The Nationals fall to the Los Angeles Dodgers, 4-3, in Game 5 of the 2016 National League Division Series, ending their season.
Nov. 16, 2016	Max Scherzer is named the 2016 NL Cy Young Award winner, the first Cy Young award winner in Nationals history. He joins Hall of Famers Gaylord Perry, Pedro Martinez, and Randy Johnson, as well as Roger Clemens and Roy Halladay as the only pitchers to win Cy Young Awards in both the AL and NL.
Dec. 7, 2016	At the 2016 Baseball Winter Meetings held at nearby National Harbor, MD, the Nationals acquire Adam Eaton from the Chicago White Sox in exchange for Lucas Giolito, Reynaldo Lopez, and Minor Leaguer Dane Dunning.
April 25, 2017	Trea Turner joins Christian Guzman (8/28/08) and Brad Wilkerson (4/6/05) as the only players in Nationals history (2005-pres.) to hit for the cycle...Not only does he record the cycle, but Turner records seven RBI and becomes the eighth player in Major League history to drive in seven or more runs in a game while hitting for the cycle.
April 30, 2017	Anthony Rendon becomes the first player in MLB history to go 6-for-6 with 3 home runs and 10 RBI. His performance helps the Nationals score a franchise record 23 runs in a 23-5 win over the New York Mets.
July 17, 2017	Washington acquires Sean Doolittle and Ryan Madson from Oakland in exchange for Blake Treinen and a pair of minor leaguers...From July 18 through the end of the season, the Nationals lead the National League with a 3.40 bullpen ERA.
July 27, 2017	In the bottom of the third inning against Milwaukee, Brian Goodwin, Wilmer Difo, Bryce Harper and Ryan Zimmerman club back-to-back-to-back-to-back home runs -- tying a Major League record for consecutive home runs (joining

seven other clubs) and marking the first time in franchise history a Nationals or Expos team has accomplished that feat. After a one-batter pause, Anthony Rendon also homers, making the Nationals just the sixth team in Major League history to hit five home runs in a single inning (per the *Elias Sports Bureau*). Washington's eight home runs tie a franchise record for homers in a single game (July 30, 1978 vs. Atlanta).

July 30, 2017 Ryan Zimmerman surpasses Frank Howard for the most home runs in D.C. baseball history with his 238th career longball.

Sept. 10, 2017 The Nationals clinch their fourth division championship, soaking themselves in champagne after a 3-2 victory over the Phillies was coupled with the Atlanta Braves' 10-8 extra-innings walk-off win over the Miami Marlins.

Sept. 17, 2017 Stephen Strasburg's historic scoreless innings streak ends at 35.0...It was the longest in franchise history and, per *Elias*, the longest for any player in MLB since 2015: (Zack Greinke, 45.2 IP; Clayton Kershaw, 37.0 IP).

Oct. 30, 2017 Dave Martinez is officially named the seventh manager in Washington Nationals history.

Nov. 15, 2017 Max Scherzer earns his second straight NL Cy Young Award, while becoming the 10th pitcher in MLB history to win the Cy Young Award three times.

May 20, 2018 The Nationals select the contract of 19-year-old Juan Soto, making him the 10th player since 2001 to debut during his age-19 season (19 years, 207 days) and the second Nationals player to debut at the age of 19, joining Bryce Harper (19 years, 195 days).

July 31, 2018 Washington scores a franchise record (MON/WSH) 25 runs on a Nationals record (2005-pres.) 26 hits en route to the 25-4 win over the New York Mets...The 21-run margin of victory was a franchise mark and the largest differential in the Major Leagues since Philadelphia topped Cincinnati, 22-1 on July 6, 2009...Washington became the 17th team in Major League history (since 1900) to score at least 25 runs in a game.

Aug. 22, 2018 Ryan Zimmerman hits his 11th career walk-off home run, giving Washington the 8-7 win over the Phillies.

Sept. 25, 2018 Max Scherzer strikes out Miami's Austin Dean to record his 300th strikeout of the season.

Dec. 7, 2018 The Nationals agreed to terms with left-handed pitcher Patrick Corbin on a six-year contract.

May 11, 2019 Trailing 2-0 heading into the top of the eighth inning, the Nationals plate five runs in the frame to take the 5-2 lead. The inning is capped by a two-out, two-strike grand slam by newest National Gerardo Parra to give his new team the lead. It is Parra's first hit as a member of the Nationals and his second career grand slam.

June 9, 2019 Powered by back-to-back-to-back-to-back solo home runs in the top of the eighth inning, the Nationals top the San Diego Padres. Pinch hitter Howie Kendrick's homer puts the Nationals ahead and Trea Turner, Adam Eaton and Anthony Rendon follow to extend the lead one swing at a time. According to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, the Nationals are the only team to go back-to-back-to-back-to-back more than once in their history.

June 19, 2019 A freak bunting accident during batting practice the day before sent Max Scherzer to the hospital ahead of his scheduled start against the Phillies. He fractured his nose and suffered an extremely noticeable black eye as a result. Max insists his start was never in doubt and he went on to throw seven shutout innings of four-hit baseball.

July 23, 2019 Trea Turner records his second career cycle and the fourth cycle in Nationals history (2005-pres.) in the 11-1 win over Colorado. He becomes the fourth player in Major League Baseball to record a cycle this season and is one of 26 players in Major League history to put together more than one cycle in their career.

Sept. 3, 2019 Trailing 10-4 heading into the bottom of the ninth inning, the Nationals plate seven runs on seven hits to stage the largest ninth inning comeback in franchise history, eventually topping the Mets, 11-10. Kurt Suzuki finishes the historic comeback with his third career walk-off home run, a three-run blast off Edwin Diaz.

Sept. 24, 2019 The Nationals clinch a Wild Card berth following a doubleheader sweep of the Philadelphia Phillies coupled with a loss by the Chicago Cubs. Following the 6-5 win in game two, the Nationals stay on the field to watch the Pirates finish off the Cubs to officially put the Nationals in the Postseason. A celebration ensues on the field and eventually carries into the clubhouse. It will be Washington's fifth Postseason appearance and first via one of two National League Wild Card spots.

Oct. 2019 The Washington Nationals go on improbable run to win the World Series...It started with a three-run eighth inning to take the lead over Milwaukee in the Wild Card game and carried through a five-game NLDS victory over the Los Angeles Dodgers and a sweep of the St. Louis Cardinals in the NLCS to the World Series against the Houston Astros.

Oct. 25, 2019 A World Series game takes place in Washington D.C. for the first time since 1933. The Nationals fell, 4-1, to the Houston Astros in Game 3.

Oct. 30, 2019 With a 6-2 win over the Houston Astros, the Washington Nationals won their first World Series in franchise history and the brought the first World Series title to Washington D.C. since 1924.

Nov. 2, 2019 Fans line Constitution Ave. on a sun-filled Saturday afternoon to witness the championship parade honoring the 2019 World Series Champion Washington Nationals.

Nov. 4, 2019 Members of the Washington Nationals visit the White House and present President Donald Trump with a commemorative jersey.

Dec. 9, 2019 After opting out of his current contract following the 2019 season, Stephen Strasburg agrees to terms on a seven-year contract - making him a Washington National for life.

March 12, 2020 Major League Baseball decides to suspend Spring Training games and to delay the start of the 2020 regular season by at least two weeks due to the national emergency created by the coronavirus pandemic. The season is delayed until July 1, the start of Summer Camp.

July 9, 2020 Members of the 2019 World Champion Washington Nationals receive their World Series rings. Although not the traditional ring ceremony, players, coaches and staff took pictures with their ring and the Commissioner's Trophy



at home plate.

July 18, 2020The Nationals host the Philadelphia Phillies in the first team-vs-team exhibition during the historically different Summer Camp.

July 23, 2020The Nationals and New York Yankees open Major League Baseball's 2020 season before a nationally televised audience on ESPN. During a pregame ceremony, the 2019 World Series banner was raised above the Nationals Park scoreboard where it will fly alongside banners honoring the 1924, 1925 and 1933 Washington Senators. In a moment of unity and in support of social justice, members of the Nationals and Yankees took a knee while holding a black fabric to connect each person during a moment of silence prior to the National Anthem.

Sept. 5, 2020.....Nationals President of Baseball Operations and General Manager Mike Rizzo agrees to a multi-year contract extension.

Sept. 26, 2020Nationals Manager Dave Martinez agrees to a multi-year contract extension.



WASHINGTON, D.C. BALLPARKS

Pro baseball teams were formed in our nation's capital beginning in the early 1870s and those franchises played their games in ballparks commonly known as Swampoodle Grounds, Capitol Grounds and Boundary Field.

In 1892, the Washington Senators joined the expanding National League and began playing their home games at a site that would host professional baseball games into the early 1960s. From 1892-99, the Senators played at National Park, which had a seating capacity of approximately 6,500. Although never finishing above sixth place, the team drew fairly well, including more than 200,000 fans in 1896.

When the National League contracted from 12 franchises to eight following the 1899 season, the team was disbanded. However, it would only be two seasons before a professional team occupied that site again.

During those two years, former Western League president Ban Johnson was working to put together a second Major League to rival the NL. In 1901, the American League began play with eight franchises, including the Washington Nationals.

This franchise would play its home games on the same site as the previous National League Washington team, but the ballpark was appropriately renamed American League Base Ball Park and the capacity was expanded to nearly 10,000.

On March 17, 1911, tragedy struck the American League Base Ball Park. The all-wooden ballpark and four surrounding buildings were completely destroyed by a fire started by a plumber's blow lamp and a strong wind. American League Base Ball Park could not be saved as plumbers working on the park's drain pipes had shut off the water supply and by the time firefighters arrived, the grand stand and bleachers were engulfed in flames. At the time, the loss of the ballpark was estimated at \$20,000.

Thomas C. Noyes, president of the Washington franchise, gained approval from the Board of Directors to announce that work would begin immediately on a new ballpark with a steel grandstand. With the players at Spring Training and Opening Day less than a month away, crews worked tirelessly to get the ballpark ready for the home opener.

By Opening Day 1911, the grandstands were sufficiently erected for the Nationals to host the Boston Red Sox with President William Howard Taft in attendance. The work on the ballpark continued when the team was on the road and was completed on July 24, 1911 at a final cost of approximately \$100,000. Seating capacity was more than 27,000, including a presidential box near the first base dugout.

In 1920, the American League Base Ball Park was renamed Griffith Stadium in recognition of the franchise's owner and president, Clark Griffith. The only major alteration to the ballpark was also made in 1920 as the double-decked stands were extended from the bases to the foul poles.

During the late-1930s and 1940s, Griffith Stadium had another part-time tenant - the famed Homestead Grays of the Negro Leagues. Originally from Pennsylvania, the Grays played half of their games at Forbes Field in Pittsburgh and half at Griffith Stadium when the Washington franchise was on the road. Some of the most revered players in Negro League history played for the Grays, including Josh Gibson, Buck Leonard, Cool Papa Bell and Sam Bankhead, as they won nine Negro League championships.

Griffith Stadium, which also hosted the Major League Baseball All-Star Game in 1937 and 1956 and three World Series in 1924, 1925 and 1933, remained the home of the Washington franchise until it was moved to Minneapolis following the 1960 season.

The expansion Washington Senators played their inaugural season at Griffith Stadium in 1961 before moving into District of Columbia Stadium for the 1962 season.

After having been the site of professional baseball in Washington, D.C., since 1892, the final game at Griffith Stadium was played on Sept. 21, 1961 as the Senators fell to Minnesota, 4-3, before a crowd of 1,498 fans. Griffith Stadium was demolished in 1965 and the land is now utilized by Howard University. Nearly 1,000 of the original seats from Griffith Stadium were moved to a Spring Training facility near Orlando, Fla., Tinker Field.

A federally-owned stadium, District of Columbia Stadium was a new three-tiered, multi-purpose facility constructed near the Potomac River at a cost of approximately \$24 million. The Senators signed a 10-year lease on September 29, 1961 with the D.C. Armory Board for the stadium, which had a seating capacity of 45,016.

On April 9, 1962, the Senators played their first regular season game at District of Columbia Stadium. A crowd of 42,143 - including President John F. Kennedy - saw Senators pitcher Bennie Daniels defeat the Detroit Tigers, 4-1. Interestingly enough, Daniels suffered the loss at both the final game at Ebbets Field in 1957 and the final game at Griffith Stadium in 1961.

Under the direction of the D.C. Armory Board, the stadium was officially renamed Robert F. Kennedy Memorial Stadium on January 18, 1969.

The 1969 Major League Baseball All-Star Game was the fourth hosted by the Senators and the second at RFK Stadium (also first game in 1962). Despite the American League dropping a 9-3 decision to the National League, Washington fans saw future Hall of Famer Willie McCovey hit a pair of homers and hometown favorite Frank Howard hit one as well.

In 1971, the Senators played their final season at RFK Stadium before moving to Arlington, Tex. The final regular season Major League Baseball game was played at RFK on September 30, 1971. Washington hosted the New York Yankees before a crowd of just 14,460 in a game that was never finished. The Senators were holding on to a 7-5 lead with two outs in the top of the ninth inning when fans rushed the field. The umpiring crew could not clear the field and the game was forfeited to the Yankees, 9-0, per MLB forfeit rules.

RFK Stadium hosted 16 exhibition games involving Major League teams after the Senators moved in 1971. A portion of the proceeds from most of the games was donated to various charities. Attendance at the 16 contests averaged more than 27,600 per game. Following is a listing of those games:

On March 14, 2006, Washington, D.C. Mayor Anthony Williams, the D.C. Sports & Entertainment Commission and the Washington Nationals unveiled plans for a 41,000-seat state-of-the-art baseball stadium located in Southeast D.C. Seven weeks later, on May 4, ground was officially broken on the ballpark site. Washington opened Nationals Park on March 30, 2008 with a 3-2 win over Atlanta, televised nationally on ESPN's Sunday Night Baseball. President George W. Bush threw the ceremonial first pitch, then Ryan Zimmerman led the club to victory with a game-ending solo shot in the ninth inning.

Frank Howard blasted 237 of his 382 career home runs during his seven-year tenure with the the Senators from 1965-71. Only Ryan Zimmerman (264) has hit more long balls while representing Washington D.C. Roy Sievers is third with 180.

"Hondo" came to D.C. on Dec. 4, 1964 via a seven-player trade with the Dodgers that also netted Ken McMullen, Phil Ortega, Dick Nen and Pete Richert in exchange for John Kennedy, Claude Osteen and \$100,000.

A love affair between player and town began almost immediately, as teammates, media and fans alike marveled at Howard's tape-measure home runs, many of which taunted cavernous D.C. Stadium's dimensions.

Howard's 172 homer runs from 1967-70 were the most in MLB in that span, as Hall-of-Famers Harmon Killebrew and Willie McCovey tied for second with just 151.

Howard eventually represented the Senators in four Mid-Summer Classics and led the American League in home runs twice (44 in both 1968 and '70). "The Capital Punisher" also paced the AL in RBI (126) and walks (132) in 1970.

THE TRADITION OF OPENING DAY IN WASHINGTON, D.C.

Each Major League Club has its own unique celebration to mark the opening of the Major League Baseball season, but Opening Day in the nation's capital, Washington, D.C., was always a special and sometimes historic event. Washington, D.C.'s Opening Day tradition dates to April 14, 1910. William Howard Taft, the 27th President of the United States, attended the home opener of the Washington Senators against the Philadelphia Athletics. Numerous other government officials, including Vice President James Sherman, joined President Taft at the ballpark.

An overflow crowd of 12,000 fans—the largest baseball crowd in Washington at that time—gave President Taft a standing ovation as he made his way to his seats on the first-base side. Team president Thomas C. Noyes then took the two managers—Washington's Jimmy McAleer and Philadelphia's legendary Connie Mack—to meet the President.

Just prior to the start of the game, umpire Billy Evans walked over to President Taft's box and presented him with a new baseball. Evans instructed President Taft that he was to throw the ball from his seat in the stands to Senators pitcher Walter Johnson, who was standing at home plate, to officially commence the start of the American League championship season. After giving the ball briefly to First Lady Helen Taft, the President adjusted his gloves and made a good throw to Johnson, who immediately gave the ball to catcher Charles Street to have it secured in a safe place.

President Taft watched the entire game, a 3-0 Washington victory in which Johnson hurled a one-hit, complete-game shutout. After the game, Johnson sent the historic ball to the White House accompanied by a note to President Taft asking for his autograph on the ball. President Taft returned the ball after penning the following on it:

"For Walter Johnson, with the hope that he may continue to be as formidable as in yesterday's game. William H. Taft."

Although President Taft was the first to throw out a ceremonial first pitch, it was not the first time a President of the United States attended a Major League Baseball game. Benjamin Harrison, the 23rd U.S. President, is believed to be the first sitting President to attend a Major League game when he witnessed a NL game between Cincinnati and Washington in June 1892. That wasn't even the first interaction with a professional baseball team as nine years earlier President Chester A. Arthur welcomed the Cleveland franchise of the National League to the White House.

Having the President throw out the ceremonial first pitch at Washington's home opener was such an enormous success—not only in the nation's capital but around the country—that it led to the American League granting Washington permission to open the American League championship season one day before the rest of the League. This action was approved on December 13, 1927, in recognition of the U.S. President throwing out the ceremonial first pitch.

Including President Taft's precedent-setting throw in 1910, 12 different Presidents attended a home opener of the Washington Senators a total of 46 times. The Senators posted a 23-23 mark in home openers with a President present.

President Taft (2-0) and Woodrow Wilson (3-0), the 28th U.S. President, were the only two to never see the Senators lose. The only U.S. Presidents never to see Washington win a home opener were Lyndon Johnson (0-3), Richard Nixon (0-2) and Barack Obama (0-1). Following is the breakdown of Washington's record on Opening Day, listed by President:

Prior to the Senators move to Texas in 1972, each President since Taft was in attendance for a Washington Senators home opener at least once. Several Presidents had to miss on occasion, including President Taft in 1912 because of the sinking of the Titanic and President Wilson in 1918 and 1919 because of World War I.

Since 1972, the tradition of Presidents and Opening Day has continued in other Major League cities. The only President to never throw out a ceremonial first pitch at an Opening Day game was Jimmy Carter. President George W. Bush threw out the ceremonial first pitch at RFK Stadium on April 14, 2005 to usher the return of baseball to the nation's capital, then again to open Nationals Park on March 30, 2008. President Barack Obama continued the tradition on April 5, 2010, throwing out the first pitch prior to the Nationals' season opener vs. Philadelphia.

The 2021 season - the Nationals 17th in the nation's capital - begins on April 1 when they face the New York Mets at Nationals Park...The Nationals are 7-9 on Opening Day, including 3-6 at home and 4-3 on the road...Washington opened 2020 with a 4-1 loss at home to the New York Yankees.

- The Nationals/Expos record on Opening Day is 25-27 (.481), including an all-time mark of 6-9 in just 15 season openers at home and 19-18 in road openers... The Expos went 18-18 (.500) on Opening Day (15-15 in road openers; 3-3 in Quebec and 3-3 when playing host on Opening Day).
- Opening Day 2021 will mark the fifth time the Nationals (2005-pres.) have faced the Mets on Opening Day...Washington faced New York on Opening Day in 2006, 2014, 2015 and 2019.
- The Washington Nationals opened Nationals Park and earned their first Opening Day victory on March 30, 2008, with a 3-2 win over Atlanta on ESPN's Sunday Night Baseball...Ryan Zimmerman led the Nationals to victory with a walk-off solo homer in the bottom of the ninth inning, snapping a streak of four consecutive losses in season openers for the Nationals/Expos...Opening Day in Washington, D.C. has long been a baseball tradition, as from 1952-71, the Senators annually opened the American League schedule by hosting a game.

When a Washington-based team has kicked off the season by celebrating Opening Day in the District (as opposed to marking Opening Day on the road), 13 U.S. Presidents have thrown the season's ceremonial first pitch at either a Nationals or Senators game since 1910...The 13 Commanders in Chief to open the season with a ceremonial first pitch: William H. Taft (1901-11), Woodrow Wilson (1912, '14), Warren Harding (1921-22), Calvin Coolidge (1924, '27-28), Herbert Hoover (1929-32), Franklin D. Roosevelt (1933, '35-41), Harry S. Truman (1946, '48-50, '52), Dwight Eisenhower (1953-58, '60), John F. Kennedy (1961-63), Lyndon Johnson (1964-65, '67), Richard Nixon (1969), George W. Bush (2008), and Barack Obama (2010).

WASHINGTON, D.C. AND THE WORLD SERIES (SEE PAGES 9-12 FOR DETAILED LOOK AT 2019 WORLD SERIES)

Washington, D.C. has hosted four World Series, with the original Washington (AL) Nationals claiming the 1924 World Championship and the 2019 Washington Nationals winning the 2019 World Series. Washington needed seven games to top heavy favorites in both Fall Classics. The 1924 New York Giants were appearing in their eighth World Series in 14 seasons and was managed by John McGraw. The Nationals won despite Walter Johnson losing each of his first two starts. However, Washington won, 4-3, in 12 innings as Johnson came out of the 'pen to earn the win in Game 7. The 1924 World Series remains the second of only five World Series to be decided in extra innings of the decisive seventh game.

The Washington (AL) Nationals would go on to play in two more Fall Classics, losing both. As defending World Champions in 1925, the Nationals won 92 games and claimed another AL Pennant, but lost to Pittsburgh in seven games. The Pirates topped the Nationals, 9-7, in Game 7 as Walter Johnson squandered a 4-0 lead after the first inning and eventually suffered the loss. The New York Giants provided payback for the 1924 Series by claiming the 1933 World Series over the AL Nationals in five games.

POSTSEASON HISTORY (AL NATIONALS)

1924 The **AL Nationals** claim their first of three AL pennants and lone World Championship. The AL Nationals finished the regular season with a 92-62 (.597) mark and a 2.0-game lead over the second-place Yankees (89-63). The AL Nationals won a memorable seven-game World Series over the heavily-favored New York Giants, who were competing in their eighth Fall Classic in 14 seasons. The series is best remembered for Game 7. The Giants led, 3-1, in the eighth, but Freddie Lindstrom's critical error on a routine grounder allowed the AL Nationals to send the game to extra innings. Washington won, 4-3, in 12 innings with Walter Johnson earning the win with 4.0 scoreless innings of relief. Earl McNeely's RBI double with one out in the 12th plated Muddy Reul, who had doubled earlier in the decisive inning that included a pair of Giants errors. While pitching in a starting role, Walter Johnson took the loss in both Games 1 and Game 5. Three of Washington's four wins in the Fall Classic were of the one-run variety. The 1924 World Series remains one of only five World Series to be decided in extra innings of the decisive seventh game.

1925 As defending World Champions in 1925, the **AL Nationals** won 92 games and claimed another AL flag, but lost to Pittsburgh in a seven-game Fall Classic. The Pirates topped the Nationals, 9-7, in Game 7 as Walter Johnson and the AL Nationals squandered a 4-0 first-inning lead and eventually suffered the loss. In Game 3, Sam Rice made the most intriguing catch in World Series history. Rice was patrolling Griffith Stadium's right field for the AL Nationals when, in the eighth inning, he made a dynamic catch of a would-be Earl Smith game-tying homer. Rice toppled over the fence in doing so and disappeared from sight. When Rice reappeared and showed the ball, umpires ruled he had successfully made the catch. Following the game, Rice was coy about the catch and penned a letter that was opened only after his death in 1974. The letter simply said, "at no time did I lose possession of the ball."





1933 The '33 **AL Nationals** earned a Postseason berth, going an MLB-best 99-53 (.651) and claiming the AL Championship by 7.0 games over the 91-win Yankees. Washington's pitching staff included a pair of 20-game winners: General Crowder (24 wins) and Earl Whitehill (22). However, the heavily-favored AL Nationals struggled offensively in the Fall Classic, plating two runs or less thrice and hitting a collective .214 with just two home runs in five games. Mel Ott's solo shot in the top of the 10th snapped a 3-3 tie as the Giants claimed both Game 5 and the World Championship.

POSTSEASON HISTORY (EXPOS/NATIONALS)

1981 In a season marred by a six-plus week labor stoppage, the **Montreal Expos** record a 30-23 (.566) mark in the season's second half to earn Montreal's lone Postseason berth in 36 National League seasons. The Expos finished 0.5-game ahead of the Cardinals in the second-half standings (Montreal played one extra game). Montreal matched up against the Phillies in the NLDS and won a decisive Game 5 as Steve Rogers tossed a six-hit shutout to outperform Steve Carlton for the second time in the series. The Expos' dreams of hosting the first World Series games outside of the United States were dashed, however, as Rick Monday hit a ninth-inning solo shot off Rogers to provide the Dodgers a 2-1 win in Game 5 of the NLCS. To this day, October 19 is still referred to as "Blue Monday" in Montreal.

2012 Eight years after landing in D.C., the **Washington Nationals** claimed their first Postseason berth by winning the NL East with a 98-64 record. En route to reach the 98 victories and the best winning percentage (.605) in MLB, the Nationals became the first baseball team representing the nation's capital to reach the Postseason since the AL Nationals won the American League pennant in 1953. In the NLDS, the Nationals squared off against the defending World Champion St. Louis Cardinals, who survived MLB's first one-game Wild Card playoff game at Turner Field thanks to a controversial infield fly ruling. Washington stole Game 1 behind rookie Tyler Moore's two-run pinch-hit single, which erased a 2-1 deficit with two outs in the eighth inning. The October-tested Cardinals rebounded in Games 2 and 3 with resounding victories. Game 4 rendered one of the great Postseason games in D.C. history when, with the game tied 1-1, Jayson Werth led off the bottom of the ninth with a game-ending homer that came on the 13th pitch of his epic at-bat. The collective euphoria following Werth's bolt evaporated just 24 hours later as the Nationals squandered 6-0 (after three innings) and 7-5 (after eight innings) leads before losing the decisive contest, 9-7.

2014 For the second time in three years, the **Washington Nationals** were crowned National League East Division champions, recording the best record in the National League at 96-66. The Nationals finished the season 17.0 games ahead of the second-place Braves and Mets. In the NLDS, Washington faced off against San Francisco, who survived a one-game Wild Card playoff, topping Pittsburgh in the Steel City. The Nationals dropped the first two games at home, including an 18-inning affair that would turn out to be the longest postseason game in MLB history. Brandon Belt's solo home run in the 18th gave the Giants the 2-1 lead for good. Washington won Game 3 thanks to a three-run seventh inning in which they plated two runs on a throwing error by Madison Bumgarner. In Game 4, the Giants scored the eventual go-ahead run in the seventh inning when Aaron Barrett's 2-1 pitch skipped away from Wilson Ramos, allowing Joe Panik to score. Bryce Harper clubbed three home runs in the series, giving him four career Postseason homers before the age of 22, joining Andruw Jones, Miguel Cabrera and Mickey Mantle as the only players in baseball history to do so.

2016 In his first season at the helm, Dusty Baker led the **Washington Nationals** to their third National League East Division title in the last five years. The 2016 Nationals did so with a balanced attack and a steady approach, with an average of 15.8 wins per month and a 95-67 (.586) final regular-season record, the second-best mark in the National League (Chicago Cubs: 103-58, .640) and tied with the Texas Rangers for the second-best record in Major League Baseball. Washington faced off against the National League West Division champion Los Angeles Dodgers in the NLDS. Jose Lobaton's three-run home run in the fourth inning of Game 2 propelled the Nationals to the 5-2 win, evening the series, 1-1. In Game 3, Washington scored four runs in both the third and ninth innings to take control of the series with an 8-3 win. In Game 4, Postseason veteran Chase Utley capped a back-and-forth affair with an RBI single in the bottom of the eighth to put the Dodgers ahead, 5-4, and in Game 5, Kenley Jansen (21 IP, H, 4 BB, 4 SO) and Clayton Kershaw (SV, 0.2 IP, SO) came out of the bullpen to shut down the Nationals in the final three innings and claim the series. Daniel Murphy reached base safely in every game of the NLDS, running his streak to 19 straight Postseason games. The 19-game Postseason on-base streak is the second-longest to start a Postseason career in MLB history behind Boog Powell (25 games, 1966-71).

2017 The **Washington Nationals** claimed their second consecutive National League East title and fourth in the last six years. Their 97-65 (.599) regular-season record was the second-best mark in the National League (Los Angeles Dodgers: 104-58, .642) and the fourth-best record in all of Major League Baseball. At 50-31 (.617), the Nationals owned the best road record in the NL this season, as well as a new franchise record (Nationals/Expos) for road wins in a single season (50). The 50 road wins were the most for any National League team since the 2011 Philadelphia Phillies also went 50-31. Washington took over sole possession of first on April 18 and did not relinquish it for the remainder of the season, ultimately winning the division by a 20.0-game margin. The Nationals faced off against the National League Central division champion Chicago Cubs. After dropping Game 1, the Nationals topped the Cubs, 6-3, in dramatic fashion in Game 2. Trailing 3-1 in the eighth inning, Bryce Harper clubbed a two-run home run to tie the game at 3-3 and three batters later, Ryan Zimmerman put Washington ahead 6-3 with a towering three-run home run. Facing defeat in Game 4, Stephen Strasburg pushed aside a virus that had made him ill for much of the week to rack up 12 strikeouts (re-setting his own Postseason franchise record (Nationals/Expos) for single-game strikeouts) over 7.0 scoreless innings as the Nationals won, 5-0. A dramatic back-and-forth affair in Game 5 eventually led to the 9-8 Cubs victory, advancing them to the 2017 National League Championship Series against the Los Angeles Dodgers.

WASHINGTON, D.C. AND THE NO-HITTER

Throughout the history of baseball in the nation's capital, four pitchers have accomplished the feat of completing a no-hitter. Walter Johnson, Bobby Burke, Jordan Zimmermann and Max Scherzer made their mark in D.C. baseball history with performances detailed below.

Walter Johnson

Bothered by what fans and media would later learn to be a "sore arm," Walter Johnson (H.O.F. 1936) tossed the only no-hitter of his Hall of Fame career on July 1, 1920 in a 1-0 win over the Boston Red Sox. Johnson struck out 10 batters and faced just one over the minimum due to a Bucky Harris' error, allowing Boston's Harry Hooper to reach base in the seventh inning. With two outs in the ninth inning, Hooper again stepped to the plate. He connected on a hard ground ball down the first-base line that many thought would be a base hit. Nationals first baseman Joe Judge made a leaping stab and threw to a covering Walter Johnson to record the final out. Writer Denman Thompson wrote in *The Evening Star* the following day that Johnson:

"...earned it solely on the strength of his superb hurling. It is doubtful if Walter ever displayed more speed. He did not depend upon his fast ball entirely. He used plenty of curves and also resorted to slow balls upon occasion, but when he chose to he lined the ball over the plate with such velocity that it was physically impossible for a human to gage its flight."



Bobby Burke

With Walter Johnson patrolling the dugout as Manager of the 1931 Nationals, Bobby Burke recorded the second no-hitter in D.C. baseball history on August 8th, 1931 in a 5-0 win over the visiting Boston Red Sox at Griffith Stadium in Washington, D.C. The 24-year-old lefty struck out eight batters, walking five, en route to the accomplishment. Remarkably, this was Burke's first start for the Nationals in more than a month, as he appeared in six games out of the bullpen in between starts. Burke's no-hitter would be the last one thrown by a D.C. ballplayer until Jordan Zimmermann accomplished the feat more than 83 years later. Manager Walter Johnson told the media following Burke's no hitter:


"Before I sent Burke into the game, I told him to cut loose...He gained a lot of confidence in those early innings when the Red Sox started missing those third strikes. He was throwing the last pitch over there as if it was the first one and he soon found out he was getting away with it, like we told him he would." - The Washington Post, Aug. 10, 1931

WASHINGTON, D.C. AND THE NO-HITTER

Jordan Zimmermann

On the final day of the 2014 National League East Division championship season, Jordan Zimmermann took the hill against Miami's Henderson Alvarez. Coincidentally, Alvarez tossed a no-hitter on the final day of the 2013 season for the Marlins. Zimmermann was his calm, efficient self, striking out 10 batters while walking just one, Justin Bour, on a 3-2 pitch that home plate umpire Alan Porter determined was just a bit low. Alvarez also spun a gem of his own, with the lone run of the game coming on an Ian Desmond solo home run into the Miami bullpen. Zimmermann's feat would have never materialized had it not been for Steven Souza Jr.'s miraculous play on the final out. His diving, over-the-shoulder catch of a line drive off the bat of Christian Yelich made an out of what was certain to be an extra-base hit. In a moment of pure emotion not usually shown by the stoic Zimmermann, he dropped his head, put his hands on his hips and would later tell the media, he thought "Double. No-doubt double," as the ball carried to deep left field. To make the catch, Souza Jr. dove backward, almost parallel to the ground, in an attempt to secure the ball. When he fell to the ground and reached his glove to the sky, Zimmermann thrust his right arm in the air as the crowd at Nationals Park erupted and the dugout emptied onto the field, mobbing Zimmermann and Souza Jr.

Max Scherzer

Coming off one of the most dominant pitching performances in Nationals history (2005-present), Max Scherzer took the hill at Nationals Park on June 20, 2015 looking to pick up where he left off. In his previous start, Scherzer struck out a then-Nationals-record and career-best 16 Milwaukee Brewers, while allowing just one hit (a Carlos Gomez flare to right field) in 9.0 shutout innings on June 14 at Miller Park. With a severe rain storm in the evening forecast for the Metro D.C. area, Scherzer took the mound at 4:05 p.m. and was perfect through 8.2 innings against a potent Pittsburgh Pirates lineup, striking out 10 batters along the way. With two outs in the top of the ninth inning, Pirates manager Clint Hurdle sent pinch-hitter Jose Tabata to the plate. A battle ensued, with Tabata quickly down 0-2 before working the count to 2-2. With Scherzer on the doorstep of history, Tabata managed to foul off three straight pitches before a slider from Scherzer ran in and hit him on the left elbow. Replays would spark debate as to whether or not Tabata attempted to move out of the way of the pitch, but Scherzer quickly moved on, telling the media: "You just focus on what you can do next. Just move on to the next hitter and go after Harrison, and do everything you can do and just pound him with fastballs. I was able to collect that final out." Indeed, one batter later Scherzer gathered himself and coaxed Josh Harrison into hitting a high fly ball to deep left field that settled into the glove of rookie Michael A. Taylor, completing the first no-hitter of Scherzer's career.





Max Scherzer

With the 2015 season coming to a close, and once again after carrying a no-hitter through 7.1 innings in his previous outing, Max Scherzer took the hill for the final start of his inaugural season in Washington, D.C., vs. the 2015 National League East Division Champion New York Mets. In the second game of a doubleheader, Scherzer turned in one of the most dominant pitching performances in Major League history. Becoming just the sixth pitcher in MLB history to throw two no-hitters in the same season (including the postseason), Scherzer joined Johnny Vander Meer (1938), Allie Reynolds (1951), Virgil Trucks (1952), Nolan Ryan (1973) and Roy Halladay (2010). Scherzer was the first, however, to throw no-hitters against two postseason-bound teams in the same season, and the first to accomplish the dual feats without walking a single batter in either outing. Just one baserunner, catcher Kevin Plawecki, was able to reach base, due to a fielding error by third baseman Yunel Escobar. When his masterpiece was complete, Scherzer struck out a Nationals record (2005-present) and new career-best 17 batters, including a franchise record (Nationals/Expos) nine consecutive batters from the sixth to the ninth inning. According to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, Scherzer's 17 strikeouts tied Nolan Ryan (7/15/73 vs. DET) for the MLB record for strikeouts in a no-hitter. When asked about his place in Major League Baseball history, Scherzer said he was speechless. "You go out there and accomplish as much as you can," he said. "When you start talking about that (kind of history), you don't have words for it."

WASHINGTON, D.C. AND THE ALL-STAR GAME

JULY 7, 1937

The 1937 Midsummer Classic, which was the fifth Major League Baseball All-Star Game, was played on July 7th at Griffith Stadium. President Franklin D. Roosevelt was in attendance for the contest, marking the first All-Star Game to be played in front of a sitting President. Six future Presidents would later follow Roosevelt's lead, combining for eight overall All-Star appearances. The American League won the game, 8-3, improving to 4-1 overall in the five games. In the bottom of the third inning, Cleveland's Earl Averill hit a line drive off the foot of St. Louis Cardinals pitcher Dizzy Dean. Dean suffered a fractured toe and never fully recovered, pitching in just 42 games over the next four seasons. The AL started the scoring with two runs in the bottom of the third inning on a two-run home run by Hall of Famer Lou Gehrig. The homer drove home his Yankees teammate and fellow Hall of Famer Joe DiMaggio. After the NL cut the lead to 2-1 in the top of the fourth, the AL answered with three more runs of its own in the bottom of the inning and never looked back. The game featured 21 future Hall of Famers, including Earl Averill, Joe Cronin, Dizzy Dean, Bill Dickey, Joe DiMaggio, Rick Ferrell, Jimmie Foxx, Lou Gehrig, Charlie Gehringer, Lefty Gomez, Hank Greenberg, Lefty Grove, Gabby Hartnett, Billy Herman, Carl Hubbell, Ernie Lombardi, Joe Medwick, Johnny Mize, Mel Ott, Arky Vaughan and Paul Waner.

JULY 10, 1956

The 1956 Midsummer Classic returned to Griffith Stadium for a second time to host the 23rd All-Star Game. The National League, using just three pitchers for the fourth time in All-Star history defeated the American League, 7-3, for their second consecutive victory and sixth in seven years. The game was highlighted by home runs from four of the greatest players to ever play the game: Willie Mays and Stan Musial for the NL and Ted Williams and Mickey Mantle for the AL. After the NL built a 5-0 lead, Williams and Mantle hit back-to-back homers in the bottom of the sixth inning to make it a 5-3 game, but that was as close as the AL would get. Musial responded with his solo home run in the top of the seventh and his Cardinals teammate Ken Boyer made one outstanding defensive play after another to go along with his three hits to help the NL maintain the lead. The back-to-back homers by Williams and Mantle was the second such instance, and one of the five overall in All-Star history. NL starting pitcher Bob Friend picked up the victory after tossing three scoreless innings with three strikeouts. The game featured 18 Hall of Famers, including Hank Aaron, Ernie Banks, Yogi Berra, Roy Campanella, Whitey Ford, Nellie Fox, Al Kaline, George Kell, Mickey Mantle, Eddie Mathews, Willie Mays, Stan Musial, Robin Roberts, Frank Robinson, Duke Snider, Warren Spahn, Ted Williams and Early Wynn.

JULY 7, 1962

The first of two All-Star games in 1962 was hosted at D.C. Stadium, marking the third time the Midsummer classic was held in the nation's capital and the first time at the venue. President John F. Kennedy threw out the ceremonial first pitch. The NL topped the AL, 3-1, winning its 11th game in its last 15 attempts. Los Angeles Dodgers shortstop Maury Wills went 1-for-1 with two runs scored and a stolen base to capture the Arch Ward Trophy in the first year it was given to the game's Most Valuable Player. Hall of Famer Roberto Clemente recorded three of the NL's eight hits while the AL scattered just four hits in the game with their lone run coming on a Roger Maris sacrifice fly to score Rich Rollins. National League starting pitcher Don Drysdale threw three scoreless innings before handing the ball to his rival Juan Marichal of the Giants, who picked up the win with two scoreless innings. The game featured 18 Hall of Famers, including Hank Aaron, Luis Aparicio, Riche Ashburn, Ernie Banks, Jim Bunning, Orlando Cepeda, Roberto Clemente, Don Drysdale, Bob Gibson, Sandy Koufax, Mickey Mantle, Juan Marichal, Willie Mays, Bill Mazeroski, Stan Musial, Brooks Robinson, Warren Spahn and Hoyt Wilhelm.

JULY 23, 1969

RFK Stadium played host to the first of two All-Star Games in history to be played on July 23rd. The game was originally scheduled for the night of July 22nd, but rain forced the postponement to the afternoon of the 23rd. The 40th Midsummer Classic was won by the National League, 9-3, marking the seventh consecutive victory for the Senior Circuit. Reds catcher Johnny Bench hit a two-run home run in the second inning to extend the NL lead to 3-0. The hometown hero, Frank Howard, put the AL on the board in the second inning with a solo home run. The NL answered back with five runs in the top of the third, highlighted by Willie McCovey's two-run homer and back-to-back doubles by Steve Millan and pitcher Steve Carlton. McCovey later homered to capture MVP honors. The game featured 19 Hall of Famers, including Hank Aaron, Ernie Banks, Johnny Bench, Rod Carew, Steve Carlton, Roberto Clemente, Bob Gibson, Reggie Jackson, Harmon Killebrew, Juan Marichal, Willie Mays, Willie McCovey, Phil Niekro, Tony Perez, Brooks Robinson, Frank Robinson, Ron Santo, Tom Seaver and Carl Yastrzemski.


The American League topped the National League, 8-6, in 10 innings. Tied at 2-2 heading to the top of the eighth inning, the two clubs combined to plate 10 runs in a thrilling final three innings. Seattle's Jean Segura clubbed a three-run home run in the top half of the eighth inning, while Milwaukee's Christian Yelich hit a solo homer and Cincinnati's Scooter Gennett hit a game-tying two-run shot in the bottom half. Alex Bregman of the Houston Astros was awarded the Ted Williams Most Valuable Player Award presented by Chevrolet after leading off the 10th inning with a solo home run to give the American League the 6-5 lead. 13 of the 14 runs came via an All-Star Game record 10 home runs. Max Scherzer tallied four strikeouts across 2.0 innings while making the start for the National League. Bryce Harper started the game in center field. Nationals manager Dave Martinez served as a coach on Dave Roberts' National League staff. Prior to the game, MLB paid tribute to 29 Medal of Honor recipients with a special video narrated by Bradley Cooper and a unique national anthem with performers dressed and positioned to create a large American Flag.

Nationals outfielder Bryce Harper - with the help of father Ron Harper and motivation from teammates Max Scherzer and Sean Doolittle, as well as former teammates Wilson Ramos and Felipe Vasquez - claimed victory in the T-Mobile Home Run Derby. Harper beat Atlanta's Freddie Freeman (1st rd.), Los Angeles Dodger Max Muncy (2nd rd.) and Chicago's Kyle Schwarber (final) en route to becoming the third player ever to win the Derby in his home ballpark, joining Hall of Famer Ryne Sandberg (1990, Wrigley Field) and Todd Frazier (2015, Great American Ball Park). In the final round, Harper clubbed nine home runs in the final minute and a half before receiving an additional 30 seconds of time. He hit his 19th home run of the round on his second swing, giving him the title. After the Derby-winning homer left his bat, Harper was mobbed by teammates Max Scherzer and Sean Doolittle, and was lifted in the air by manager Dave Martinez.

SiriusXM ALL-STAR FUTURES GAME

Team USA and Team World combined for eight home runs as the U.S. squad topped the World, 10-6. Cincinnati Reds prospect Taylor Trammell earned MVP honors, going 2-for-2 with a home run and a triple. Top Nationals prospects Carter Kieboom (0-for-2) and Luis Garcia (0-for-0, BB) entered the game as defensive replacements.



LEGENDS & CELEBRITY SOFTBALL GAME

The All-Star Legends & Celebrity Softball Game, part of All-Star Sunday, featured legends and celebrities competing together. Celebrities such as Jamie Foxx, Jennie Finch, Quincy Brown, Ashley Greene, Chris Jackson, Skai Jackson, Brian Kelley, Tim Kurkijan, Sascha Polanco, Taylor Kinney, Brandon Larracuenta, J.R. Martinez, Jessica Mendoza, Mike “The Miz” Mizanin, Bill Nye, Josh Norman, Scott Rogowsky and John Wall joined Major League Baseball Legends Hall of Famer Andre Dawson, Steve Finley, Cliff Floyd, Torii Hunter, Carlos Peña, Hall of Famer Tim Lincecum and Bernie Williams. Additionally, Wounded Warriors Softball Team players Sargent Jonathan Herst and Sargent Cody Rice participated.

Shaquille O’Neal, also known as “DJ Diesel,” performed during the Legends & Celebrity Softball Game and fans in attendance watched a two-song set from Florida Georgia Line live at Nationals Park.



GEICO ALL-STAR FANFEST

2018 GEICO All-Star FanFest - a five-day long celebration of baseball at the Walter E. Washington Convention Center - drew 112,390 fans from July 13-17. FanFest is annually the largest interactive baseball theme park in the world. For five days, baseball and softball fans had the opportunity to meet MLB Legends, get free autographs, and receive daily giveaways and more. Activities included interactive games and prizes, MLB legends autograph signings, photo opportunities, Nationals artifacts and MLB trophies and awards on display, traditional ballpark food, vendor booths, and official 2018 MLB All-Star Game souvenirs.



PLAY BALL PARK

The 2018 PLAY BALL Park was located at The Yards at the Intersection of First and M Streets SE, Washington, D.C. PLAY BALL Park was a 56,000 square foot interactive area where MLB and its programming partners provided fun, engaging and educational activities for youth baseball and softball players and their families - all in the backdrop of the Midsummer Classic. Nearly 40,000 fans (38,907) of all ages attended the 2018 version of PLAY BALL Park. The festive and expanded space included a turf diamond featuring daily programming of baseball/softball activities, batting & stickball tunnels, pitching inflatables, and MLB sponsor-activation zones.

Notable appearances at PLAY BALL Park included Commissioner Manfred, Jennie Finch, SiriusXM All-Star Futures Game players, Hall of Famer Cal Ripken, Jr., David Ortiz, Rapper & D.C. native WALE, the Cast and Director of *The Sandlot* and more.

MLB ASSEMBLY

MLB Assembly combined music, fashion, art and baseball in a free event that included performances by Wale and Blocboy JB, live and interactive art installations from artists like Skylar Grey, Futura and Stash, and unique fashion collaborations featuring exclusive custom gear from brands like Levi’s, Fear of God x New Era, Mitchell & Ness and Billionaire Boys Club.



ALL-STAR SUMMER RIVERFEST PRESENTED BY COCA-COLA

The Yards and the Capitol Riverfront BID hosted an unforgettable family-friendly All-Star Summer Riverfront Festival at Yards Park and the Boardwalk. The Yards Park was transformed into a real-life sandlot where attendees enjoyed live music, pop-up bars, tasty food, photo booths, baseball-themed activities and games including bocce, sand art and oversized board games such as scrabble and chess.



MLB DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION PRESENTS: CULTURE + CODE

Taking place at the iconic Blind Whino, MLB’s inaugural “Culture + Code” event highlighted entrepreneurship, esports, culture and the arts thriving within the nation’s capital. With the intent of illustrating the diversity of Washington, DC and expanding the exposure to Major League Baseball, “Culture + Code” provided a platform for topics relevant to future leaders and fans of our game.

THE COLOR RUN MLB ALL-STAR 5K PRESENTED BY NIKE

The Color Run MLB All-Star 5K, presented by Nike, allowed participants to run in the shadow of their favorite baseball team's ballpark and through Anacostia Park during its 100th anniversary. As they ran, volunteers blasted various colors -- blue, yellow, pink, red -- at the runners and their provided white shirts. The runner's kit featured a unicorn hero medal and a limited edition All-Star 5K Nike tee.

ARMED SERVICE CLASSIC PRESENTED BY T-MOBILE

The Armed Services Classic was a co-ed adult softball tournament comprised of teams of active duty personnel from each of the five military branches. The Air Force and Army won the right to play for the newly-minted trophy crowned by an eagle figurine in the first installment of the tournament. On June 2nd and 3rd, the five branches of the military competed in a round robin tournament, with the Air Force and Army each compiling 3-1 records to advance. The inaugural All-Star Armed Services Classic presented by T-Mobile ended in a 9-2 win for the Air Force over the Army. Major League Baseball and the Washington Nationals designed the event to support and honor the general military community, as well as the many service members and families stationed in the National Capital Region.

NEGRO LEAGUES TRIBUTE AT BEN'S CHILI BOWL

MLB unveiled a mural honoring Negro Leagues Baseball and trailblazing players Mamie "Peanut" Johnson and Josh Gibson on the Lincoln Theatre across from historic Washington, DC restaurant Ben's Chili Bowl.



LEGACY PROJECTS

Shortly after Washington, D.C. was announced as the host of the 89th MLB All-Star Game, Major League Baseball, the Washington Nationals, and the Nationals Dream Foundation began planning the 2018 All-Star Legacy initiative. Through this annual Midsummer Classic program, approximately \$5 million was given to seven community enrichment projects designed to leave a lasting impact throughout the local community, as well as support national charitable organizations with close ties to baseball.

Nationals All-Star Field at Walker Mill Regional Park (Prince George's County, Md.)

One baseball field was fully renovated while a secondary field was reconfigured and improved to allow different age groups to utilize the fields and expand youth baseball play overall. Areas of improvements included field grading, upgrades to sod and ballfield mix, and the additions of a new irrigation system, scoreboard, and covered dugouts, bleachers with shade structures, batting cage and storage shed. Upgrades to the field will allow for a variety of youth-focused activities, including PLAY BALL events (e.g., Scotts MLB Pitch, Hit & Run; Jr. Home Run Derby), youth showcase and league games, and more. The Prince George's County Parks and Recreation Foundation and Prince George's County Department of Parks and Recreation will be able to promote baseball and healthy, active lifestyles to more than 3,000 kids.

Bryce Harper All-Star Complex (Herndon, Va.)

In association with the Fairfax County Park Authority, MLB, the Nationals and the Dream Foundation worked to renovate two youth baseball fields that will serve as a beacon for youth baseball players in Northern Virginia, particularly Reston Herndon Little League. This field renovation project will expand overall play after enlarging one of the fields, which will accommodate various age levels. The improvements also included laser grading of the field being expanded, an extended irrigation system, as well as additions of new scoreboards, covered dugouts, bleachers with shade structures, and enhancements to a storage shed, fencing, batting cages, bullpens, a concession stand and restrooms. The Scotts® Company, the Official Lawn Care Company of Major League Baseball, generously supported this project. The complex was renamed after Bryce Harper following his significant personal contribution to this project.

USO-Metro All-Star Depot at Fort Belvoir (Fairfax County, Va.)

This project included a fully renovated 12,000-square-foot USO logistics facility at Fort Belvoir, featuring a new HVAC system and commercial-grade refrigeration units. The facility is primarily used to receive and store non-perishable goods and program supplies that are delivered weekly to the nine USO-Metro locations in the Washington D.C. region. This renovation increased the amount of products and supplies that can be stored at the facility, including the addition of bulk perishable foods to the inventory distributed to the nine USO-Metro locations. The facility also serves as an important program and event venue throughout the year, and these renovations expanded USO-Metro's reach and provides more programming throughout the year to local service members and their families.



Boys & Girls Clubs of Greater Washington -- All-Star Teen Room at Richard England Clubhouse #14 (Washington, D.C.)

This project featured a complete renovation and expansion of Clubhouse #14's Teen Room, including new furniture, TVs, computers and games, allowing much needed space and supplies for multifaceted afterschool activities. Four inoperative HVAC units were replaced, providing a temperate climate year-round for the entire Clubhouse. Many inoperable doors were also replaced, providing increased safety for all at Clubhouse #14. MLB, the Nationals and the Dream Foundation hope to help retention rates among current members, as well as attract new ones to Clubhouse #14.

Mobile Dental Unit with Children's National (Various Locations throughout Greater Washington, D.C.)

MLB, the Nationals, the Dream Foundation, and Jeff Franzen and Sons provided a brand-new mobile dental unit serving 19 sites in Wards 7 & 8 and Prince George's County, Md. In these areas there is just one dentist for every 4,000 residents (less than half of the national average) and this unit is bringing dental health professionals directly to more children and providing them with much needed dental services. The unit also provides a more comfortable experience for both health professionals and children being treated. This mobile dental unit replaced another unit that Children's National, the leading pediatric health system in the Washington D.C. area, launched in 2001 to serve District of Columbia's Wards 7 & 8 and Prince George's County. Additionally, the new unit comes with the latest dental equipment and more patient chairs to serve more children than the previous unit allowed.

All-Star Pavilion at Washington Nationals Youth Baseball Academy (Washington, D.C.)



The Washington Nationals Youth Baseball Academy has become a hub for youth baseball and softball in the District, and the All-Star Pavilion, which is located next to the Academy's main field, has become a key element to programming and events since being unveiled during All-Star Week. The All-Star Pavilion is a 2,880 square foot open-air space that covers four short-throw batting cages. These covered batting cages provide much needed, weather-protected spaces and give scholar-athletes the ability to practice their baseball and softball skills in an open and airy environment. Additionally, the All-Star Pavilion allows for the creation of an outdoor gathering area with picnic tables for the Academy's famers' market and community use. The All-Star Pavilion is utilized year-round.

All-Star Teen Room, Playground, Computer Lab & Community Room at SOME Spring Road (Washington, D.C.)

MLB, the Nationals and the Dream Foundation provided a teen room, playground, computer lab, and community room in cooperation with a much larger project with SOME (So Others Might Eat) Spring Road. SOME Spring Road offers safe, affordable housing to 37 homeless and extremely low-income families, including more than 100 children, currently living in Washington D.C. SOME's high-level supportive programs are being housed in these new MLB & Nationals-supported areas, and have given the resident children the ability to safely play and have fun right outside of their front door. Providing onsite programming for Spring Road's resident children and teens not only eliminates transportation barriers impacting participation, but gives parents peace of mind knowing that their children are safe at their family's home base.

BIG TRAIN

How dominant was Senators right-hander Walter Johnson, who was a member of the National Baseball Hall of Fame's inaugural class in 1936? Johnson was a two-time American League MVP (1913, 1924) who paced the AL in strikeouts 12 times, shutouts seven times, wins six times, complete games six times, ERA five times, innings five times, games started four times and winning percentage twice. He never once posted a triple-digit walk total.

THE HISTORY OF THE MONTREAL EXPOS (1969-2004)

The city of Montreal had a long association with professional baseball even before it was awarded a Major League franchise in 1968. On April 18, 1946, the Montreal Royals, a minor league affiliate of the Brooklyn Dodgers in the International League, secured their place in baseball history when Jackie Robinson made his professional debut and became the first African-American to play professional baseball in the 20th Century.

More than two decades later, as the National League was seeking to expand by two franchises, former Montreal city councillor Gerry Snyder presented the city's formal bid during an owners' meeting in Mexico City, Mexico. Six months later on May 27, 1968, it was announced that Major League Baseball was expanding outside the United States for the first time as Montreal was awarded a National League franchise to begin play in 1969.

Despite some early concerns about the team's financing, Montreal met its initial deposit deadline and officially became a member of the National League on Aug. 14, 1968. Charles Bronfman, a distillery magnate and an original investor, was named chairman with Paul Beaudry and Lorne Webster as vice-chairmen. John McHale was named president and chief executive officer, while Jim Fanning was appointed the team's first general manager.

On Sept. 5, 1968, the Montreal franchise named Gene Mauch field manager. Mauch was returning to familiar ground as he played two seasons for the minor league Montreal Royals in 1943 and 1944. McHale also announced that the team would be known as the Expos, in recognition of Expos 67, an international exhibition that attracted 50 million visitors to the city in 1967.

Only five days later, pitcher Dave Hartman became the first player to sign a contract with the Expos. Hartman never actually played for the Expos or made it to the Major Leagues. However, an expansion draft was conducted on Oct. 14, 1968 and the Expos selected the following 30 players:

Manny Mota, Mack Jones, John Bateman, Gary Sutherland, John Billingham, Donn Clendenon, Jesus Alou, Mike Wegener, Skip Guinn, Bill Stoneman, Maury Wills, Larry Jackson, Bob Reynolds, Dan McGinn, Jose Herrera, Jim Williams, Angel Hermoso, Jim Grant, Jerry Robertson, Don Shaw, Ty Cline, Garry Jesteadt, Carl Morton, Larry Jaster, Ernest McAnally, Jim Fairey, Jose Laboy, John Boccabella, Rob Brand and John Glass.

The Expos' first home ballpark was Jarry Park, a converted minor league stadium named after former councillor Raoul Jarry in 1927. Jarry Park's initial capacity was 3,000, but was expanded to 28,450 as the ballpark met MLB standards.

Montreal made its National League debut on April 8, 1969 at Shea Stadium in New York against one of the National League's last expansion teams, the Mets. The Expos held off a furious ninth inning rally to claim an 11-10 victory. Pitcher Dan McGinn hit the first home run in franchise history, a solo shot off future Hall of Famer Tom Seaver in the fourth inning.

Jarry Park hosted its first regular season game six days later as 29,814 fans witnessed Major League Baseball in Canada for the first time. Despite facing a St. Louis Cardinals lineup that featured names such as Lou Brock, Curt Flood, Dal Maxvill and Joe Torre, the Expos treated their fans to an 8-7 win.

One of the highlights of the inaugural season came on April 17 at Connie Mack Stadium in Philadelphia. Bill Stoneman, later a general manager with the Expos and the Anaheim Angels, pitched the franchise's first no-hitter in defeating the Phillies, 7-0. The Expos would go on to finish the season with a 52-110 mark.

The following season saw Montreal improve by 21 games under Mauch. Twenty-six-year-old pitcher Carl Morton went 18-11 with a 3.26 ERA en route to being named the 1970 NL Rookie of the Year. In 1973, the Expos made their first pennant chase as they won 79 games and were in the race for the National League East title until the final weekend of the season.

After a few disappointing seasons, the Expos moved into Olympic Stadium in 1977, which was the main venue for the 1976 Olympic Games. A crowd of 57,592 fans attended the first game at The Big O as the Expos fell to the Phillies, 7-2.

Montreal started to form the nucleus of a team that would bring home its first NL East title with players such as Ellis Valentine, Andre Dawson, Warren Cromartie, Gary Carter and Steve Rogers. The Expos won 95 games in 1979 only to fall two games shy of the title and were again in the pennant race until the final game of the 1980 season.

In 1981, the Expos finally cleared the hurdle as they won the NL East's second half title in a season shortened by a players' strike. In a best-of-five Divisional Series, Montreal topped first-half champion Philadelphia, three games to two, and advanced to their first NLCS.

The NLCS against Tommy Lasorda's Los Angeles Dodgers went down to the ninth inning of the fifth and deciding game. With the game tied at 1-1, Dodgers outfielder Rick Monday hit a two-out solo homer off Rogers. The Expos put two runners on in the bottom of the ninth, but could not tie the score as Los Angeles advanced to the World Series.

In 1982, Montreal hosted the first Major League Baseball All-Star Game to be held outside of the United States. The National League won its 11th consecutive Midsummer Classic on the strength of a home run by Cincinnati's Dave Concepcion. Five players represented the Expos on the NL squad: Carter, Rogers, Dawson, Tim Lincecum and Al Oliver.

Montreal remained competitive throughout much of the next decade, including 91 wins in 1987 by a team led by Raines, Andres Galarraga, Hubie Brooks and Tim Lincecum.

Bronfman sold the franchise to team president Claude Brochu on June 14, 1991. The next season Brochu appointed long-time Montreal coach Felipe Alou as field manager. Alou guided the Expos to 87 victories and a second-place finish in his first year at the helm and then improved upon that with 94 wins in 1993.

The 1994 season saw a core group of players such as Larry Walker, Marquis Grissom, Moises Alou, Pedro Martinez, Ken Hill and John Wetteland storm out to a 74-40 mark - the best in the Major Leagues - and a six-game lead in the newly-formed National League East on Aug. 11. However, the season was never completed. A players' strike began the following day that would wipe out the remainder of the 1994 schedule.

After the changing economics of the baseball landscape forced the Expos to trade some of those core players, the '95 team finished in last place in the NL East. It was only the second time since 1977 that Montreal finished in last place.

Two years later, Martinez continued to establish himself as one of the top starting pitchers in the Major Leagues. He posted a 17-8 record with a 1.90 ERA, 305 strikeouts and 13 complete games en route to being the only Expos' pitcher to win the National League Cy Young Award. That winter, Martinez was traded to the Boston Red Sox.

The 1998 season was marked by stellar individual performances on the field and uncertainty off the field. Outfielder Vladimir Guerrero, 22, displayed his immense talent by setting six Montreal records, including the club single-season home run mark. Also, 24-year-old closer Ugueth Urbina recorded 34 saves with a 1.30 ERA, and Alou became the franchise's most successful manager with his 521st victory on Aug. 19.

Off the field, Brochu struggled in an attempt to finalize funding for a new downtown ballpark and announced his willingness to sell his shares of the franchise. In 1999, Jeffrey Loria was officially approved as the Expos controlling person following a buy-back of Brochu's shares. In February 2002, Major League Baseball approved the sale of the Florida Marlins to Loria and the sale of the Expos to Major League Baseball and the 29 other Major League Clubs. A new Expos senior management team was announced: Tony Tavares (president), Omar Minaya (general manager) and Hall of Famer Frank Robinson (field manager). Baseball Commissioner Allan H. (Bud) Selig also announced the formation of a relocation committee to seek a new permanent home for the franchise.

The 2003 and 2004 seasons saw the Expos make baseball history by playing a portion of their home schedule at Hiram Bithorn Stadium in San Juan, Puerto Rico. Fans in Puerto Rico celebrated the return of Major League Baseball to the island. The Expos drew nearly 530,000 fans and posted a 20-23 mark over their 43 games played at Hiram Bithorn Stadium during the two-season trial. On Sept. 29, 2004, Commissioner Selig announced the formal approval of the relocation of the Expos franchise to the nation's capital, Washington, D.C., for the 2005 season.

It took 1,882 games, and more than 11 seasons in D.C. before the Nationals experienced the thrill of turning a triple play.

On July 29, 2016 at AT&T Park in San Francisco, the Nationals clung to a 4-1 lead in the bottom of the eighth inning. The Giants loaded the bases with nobody out, bringing the dangerous Brandon Crawford to the plate. Dusty Baker brought lefty Sammy Solis in to pitch and bolstered his defense, inserting shortstop Danny Espinosa and first baseman Ryan Zimmerman behind Solis. Some may be inclined to refer to this as a "triple switch," but Espinosa was inserted straight up for Wilmer Difo, while Solis and Zimmerman entered on a "double switch."

Crawford ripped a line drive directly at Zimmerman, who was playing the line to prevent an extra base hit. Zimmerman caught the line drive and stepped on first base to double off Buster Posey. Former National Denard Span read the line drive off the bat as a base hit and broke from third base, assuming he would trot home. Zimmerman calmly tossed the ball across the diamond, where Anthony Rendon was waiting near the bag. He caught it, stepped on third base and completed the first triple play in Washington Nationals history (2005-present). It was also the first 3-3-5 triple play in Major League history.

Beyond that historic night, below are some notes on where the triple play fits into Washington's baseball history:

THE LAST TIME A D.C.-BASED TEAM HIT INTO A TRIPLE PLAY: May 19, 2010 vs. NYM. Cristian Guzman laced a sinking liner to center field that resulted in an unconventional 8-2-6-3 triple play. Angel Pagan retired Guzman by snagging the line drive, but Pagan's throw to second base was off target and bounced toward the mound, where the catcher Henry Blanco raced to scoop it up. Blanco immediately fired the ball to shortstop Jose Reyes at second base to double off Livan Hernandez. Reyes then gunned the ball to first baseman Ike Davis, who toed the bag to "triple" off Nyjer Morgan, who began the play at first base.

THE LAST TRIPLE PLAY TURNED BY THE WASHINGTON SENATORS: July 30, 1968 at Cleveland Stadium. It was an unassisted triple play turned by Ron Hansen, who caught Joe Azcue's popup before tagging Dave Nelson (began play on second base) and Russ Snyder (began play on first base) out in sequence to cap the bottom of the first inning.

THE LAST TIME A DC-BASED TEAM TURNED A TRIPLE PLAY IN A HOME GAME: April 24, 1954 vs. BOS. With runners on first (Billy Goodman) and second (Tom Brewer) base, BOS' Karl Olsen popped up a bunt and the AL Nationals turned a 1-6-3 triple play as left-handed pitcher Mickey McDermott and shortstop Mel Hoderlein each recorded a putout and an assist on the play. First baseman Roy Sievers finished feat with a putout.

RING OF HONOR AT NATIONALS PARK

On Aug. 10, 2010, the Washington Nationals unveiled their Ring of Honor at Nationals Park, honoring baseball Hall of Famers with distinct ties to Washington's baseball heritage. The display, located directly behind home plate and extending to the right field facade, features Hall of Famers and those with distinguished histories with the Washington Nationals, Washington Senators, Homestead Grays and Montreal Expos.

The Nationals, in conjunction with the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum in Cooperstown, NY, initially developed the following criteria to honor Hall of Famers: The player had to be elected to the National Baseball Hall of Fame, the player had to have played or managed with the Washington Nationals, Washington Senators, Homestead Grays or Montreal Expos, the player had to have played significant years with those teams. In 2016, the criteria was adjusted to honor others who have made significant contributions to the game of baseball in Washington, D.C.

PHIL RIZZO SCOUT OF THE YEAR AWARD

On Feb. 25, 2021, the Washington Nationals announced the inaugural Phil Rizzo Scout of the Year Award on Thursday. The award will be given annually to the Washington Nationals scout who represents the integrity, character, and work ethic exemplified by Phil Rizzo. **Steve Arneri**, Special Assistant to the President of Baseball Operations and General Manager, is the first winner. The award will be presented annually at the baseball Winter Meetings. Nationals President of Baseball Operations and General Manager Mike Rizzo made the announcement.

Arneri has been with the Nationals since the fall of 2006 when he joined the organization as an area supervisor scouting amateur players in the Midwest, Upper Midwest and Canada. He was named Special Assistant to the President of Baseball Operations and General Manager on Dec. 23, 2014. Arneri provided extensive scouting reports on Trea Turner, Joe Ross, Blake Treinen, Drew Storen, Tanner Roark and Aaron Barrett. He was a trusted voice in the recent signings of Kyle Schwarber and Jon Lester and he is credited with signing eventual Major Leaguers Jordan Zimmermann, James Bourque, and Jake Smolinski out of the First-Year Player Draft.

Prior to joining the Nationals, Arneri covered the same region for the San Francisco Giants from 1999-2006. He spent three seasons (1996-98) as an associate scout for the Boston Red Sox and from 1991-95, he scouted the Midwest for the Chicago White Sox organization. He began his scouting career as an associate scout for the Chicago White Sox in 1988 and stayed there until 1989 before a stint as the hitting coach for Rookie-Level Butte (TEX) in 1990. From 1982-87, Arneri served as the hitting coach for the University of Illinois where he worked alongside Mike Rizzo, then a graduate assistant on the coaching staff.

"We created this award to both recognize an outstanding member of our scouting department and honor the memory of my dad who had a tremendous impact not only on my life but on the scouting community throughout all of Major League Baseball," said President of Baseball Operations and General Manager Mike Rizzo. "I have known Steve since we coached together at the University of Illinois in 1985. We've scouted together our whole careers. Not just for the last 16 seasons in Washington, but with Boston and Chicago. He's one of the best scouts in the game and he has been a huge part of the success we've had over the years. He embodies all of the traits of what this award means and I cannot think of a better scout to be the inaugural winner."

"I'm honored and humbled to be the first recipient of this award," said Steve Arneri. "The fact that it bears Phil Rizzo's name means even more to me, since he served as a true scouting mentor and trusted friend to so many of us. Scouting is baseball and baseball is life to all of us. I'm proud to be a part of the best true scouting organization in Major League Baseball."

BOB CARPENTER

Bob Carpenter is in his 16th season with MASN and the Nationals, and his 38th in Major League Baseball. After earning a Radio-TV-Film degree with honors from the University of Missouri-Kansas City in 1975, Carpenter began his broadcasting career in 1976 on radio baseball play-by-play with the Tulsa Oilers. Carpenter came to Washington in 2006 after 10 years on TV and radio with the St. Louis Cardinals and 16 seasons of MLB on ESPN. During the spring of 2017, Carpenter retired from calling college basketball games after 40 years, the last 15 with the University of Oklahoma, and many with ESPN and USA Network. He was inducted into the

Oklahoma Broadcasters Association Hall of Fame in March 2017. A St. Louis native, Carpenter's MLB debut came in 1984 with Cardinals baseball on Sportstime Cable Network, and he returned in 1995 on KPLR-TV and KMOX Radio. Carpenter was nominated for four St. Louis/Mid-America Emmys, winning twice (1996 and 1997), and a National Capital/Chesapeake Bay Emmy in 2008 for his Nationals play-by-play. Carpenter was also named co-D.C. Sportscaster of the Year in 2014 by the National Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association. Carpenter appeared on TV in the 1980s and 1990s, calling MLB games with the Rangers, Mets and Twins. He announced MLB, college basketball, and college football during 18 seasons of play-by-play with ESPN from 1988-2005, and, as a reporter, was in Denver and Phoenix for two MLB Expansion Drafts. Carpenter has broadcast baseball playoffs, five Triple-A All-Star Games, NCAA/NIT Basketball Tournaments and College Football bowl games. His studio work includes College Gameday and College Football Scoreboard shows. Carpenter announced the 2005 NCAA Basketball Final Four in his hometown of St. Louis for NCAA International TV, one of the seven NCAA tournaments he has called. Before joining ESPN, Carpenter handled a variety of sports for USA Network, including pro soccer, college basketball and football, PGA Golf (including The Masters) and professional tennis (including the U.S. Open). Carpenter announced numerous soccer matches at RFK Stadium, starting as the TV voice of Team America in 1983, and worked several matches in D.C. during the 1994 World Cup. Bob and his wife of 41 years, Debbie, have two daughters, a son-in-law and grandson: Katie, Allison and Ryan, and James.



F.P. SANTANGELO

F.P. Santangelo returns for his 11th season broadcasting Nationals games on MASN, working alongside play-by-play veteran Bob Carpenter. Prior to joining MASN in 2011, Santangelo earned broadcast experience announcing San Francisco Giants games on CSN Bay Area and the Giants Radio Network, as well as hosting radio talk shows on San Francisco's KNBR-680 AM and Sacramento's KHTK-1140 AM. Santangelo played parts of seven seasons in the Major Leagues with the Giants, Montreal Expos, Los Angeles Dodgers, and Oakland A's during his 14-year professional career. In 665 MLB games, he batted .245 with 87 doubles, 14 triples, 21 homers,

162 RBI and 37 stolen bases. He appeared in one Postseason with Oakland in 2001. Primarily an outfielder, Santangelo played six different positions during his career and played under former Nationals Managers Dusty Baker in 1999 (SF) and Davey Johnson in 2000 (LAD). He was selected by the Expos in the 20th round of the 1989 First-Year Player Draft, and finished fourth in the 1996 NL Rookie of the Year voting. Santangelo played collegiately at Sacramento City College and the University of Miami after graduating from Oak Ridge High School in El Dorado Hills, Calif. He is a father of two: F.P. Jr., 25, and Summer Jo, 23.

NATIONALS ON THE RADIO

106.7 THE FAN

For the eleventh consecutive season, 106.7 The Fan will serve as the official flagship radio station for Washington Nationals baseball. Entercom Communications owns and operates 106.7 The Fan, which broadcasts select Nationals Spring Training games, as well as all regular season and potential Postseason games. Charlie Slowes and Dave Jageler are back in the booth once again, marking their 16th consecutive season together as the Nationals' radio broadcast team. Slowes has been with the Nationals since the club's inaugural campaign in 2005, while Jageler joined him behind the mic in 2006.

As part of their agreement, 106.7 The Fan will broadcast a variety of Nationals-related programs, including daily reports from Spring Training and pre- and post-game shows. The station will also operate a studio set at Nationals Park for pre- and post-game coverage, as well as special live broadcasts of its local sports talk shows. 106.7 The Fan broadcasts an exciting lineup of local sports talk shows including *The Sports Junkies*, *BMitch & Finlay*, and *The Grant & Danny Show*.



CHARLIE SLOWES

Charlie Slowes has been behind the microphone for every season of Nationals baseball, from the call of the first pitch in club history on April 4, 2005 through Daniel Hudson's historic strikeout of Michael Brantley to end Game 7 of the 2019 World Series. That moment sits atop Slowes' Nationals highlights, a list that includes Jayson Werth's memorable walk-off home run in Game 4 of the 2012 National League Division series, Max Scherzer's 20-strikeout game, three no-hitters, Bryce Harper's three-homer game, Washington's four consecutive home runs in San Diego and Kurt Suzuki's walk-off, three-run homer that capped a seven-run bottom of the ninth inning to beat the Mets. Slowes' call "and if you walked out of this ball park when the Mets scored five runs in the top of the 9th inning, you BLEW IT!"

with partner Dave Jageler, became a tv/radio/internet/social media phenomenon shortly thereafter. Slowes became the original voice of the Nationals on February 24, 2005, in time for their inaugural Spring Training. His trademark taglines—"BANG, ZOOM go the fireworks!" and "A CurlyW is in the books!"—after Nationals victories soon became part of the Beltway baseball lexicon. Joined by long-time partner Jageler in 2006, the 2021 season marks Slowes' 17th with the Nationals, his 24th consecutive year calling Major League Baseball, and 29th overall. Slowes called his 2,500th Nationals broadcast in 2020 (9/4), and enters 2021 having called 3,686 Major League regular season and Postseason games, including 2,523 with the Nationals. Baseball's return to our nation's capital in 2005 also marked a return for Slowes, named the radio voice of the NBA's Washington Bullets in 1986 at just 25 years of age. Slowes called Bullets games through the 1996-97 season, covering 11 seasons, including two years of radio/TV simulcasts. Slowes made the switch to Major League Baseball full-time in 1998 as an original radio voice of the Tampa Bay Rays, calling their first seven seasons. Slowes had previously called games for the New York Mets (1988 & 1991) on WFAN-AM, the Baltimore Orioles (1989-90) on WBAL-AM, and on the network level for NBC-TV and CBS Radio. Slowes also called Triple-A baseball for the Tidewater Tides on radio and TV in 1986, 1988, 1991 and 1992. Slowes is among those (starting with legendary Ford Frick Award-winner and Hall of Famer Vin Scully) to have entered sports broadcasting after graduating from Fordham University in his native New York City, and having honed his skills on Fordham's 50,000-watt blowtorch, WFUV 90.7 FM. Slowes' first career break came not long after graduation, in the spring of 1984 at KMOX Radio in St. Louis, where for three years he was exposed to the likes of Ford Frick Award-winners, the late Jack Buck, and Bob Costas. In his three years in St. Louis, Slowes was involved in broadcasts of Cardinals baseball, Cardinals football, Blues hockey and play-by-play of St. Louis University basketball. In three-plus decades as a play-by-play broadcaster, Slowes has also called boxing for ESPN, MISL soccer for the New York Arrows (1983) and college basketball at the University of South Florida. During the Nationals' 2012 NL East Division Championship chase, Slowes joined MLB Network's afternoon show, "The Rundown," and will again report for the TV network in 2021. Slowes called play-by-play for his third Washington pro sports team when he filled in for John Walton on Washington Capitals radio during the Caps run to their first Stanley Cup Championship in February of 2018. Charlie and his wife, Tina, have two adult sons, Jim and Alex, and the family splits time between homes in Alexandria, Va. and Palm Harbor, Fla.



DAVE JAGELER

Dave Jageler enters his 16th season with the Nationals, teaming with Charlie Slowes since 2006 to form the longest-running radio play-by-play duo in the District. Jageler has been at the mic for the Nationals' historic run to the 2019 World Series championship, plus four NL East championships, three no-hitters and Max Scherzer's MLB record-tying 20-strikeout performance. In 2020, he was honored by the National Sports Media Association as Washington DC's co-Sportscaster of the year. Jageler joined the Nationals after spending the 2005 campaign as the radio and TV voice of the Pawtucket Red Sox of the Triple-A International League. Prior to joining Pawtucket, he worked in Boston co-hosting an afternoon talk show and serving in various capacities with the Boston Celtics radio network, including

fill-in play-by-play. Jageler spent six years in Charlotte as the voice of UNC-Charlotte basketball and co-hosting a morning drive talk show. While in Charlotte, he built his baseball resume with the Triple-A Charlotte Knights in the 1995, 1996 and 2001 seasons doing play-by-play. Jageler's voice was also heard in D.C., as he served as a host on the Virginia Tech Sports Network during the 1993-94 basketball season. He has also served as the studio host for Westwood One's NHL Game of the Week, the Florida State and Texas Longhorns football networks, and has done fill-in play-by-play for both the Seminoles and Longhorns. The Windsor, Conn. native is a graduate of Syracuse University's S.I. Newhouse School of Public Communications, where he began his play-by-play career broadcasting Syracuse football and basketball games on WAER, and baseball for the Triple-A Syracuse Chiefs on Time Warner Cable and the Empire Sports Network. Dave and his wife, Jennifer, have two children: Jared (21) and Sarah (17).
