

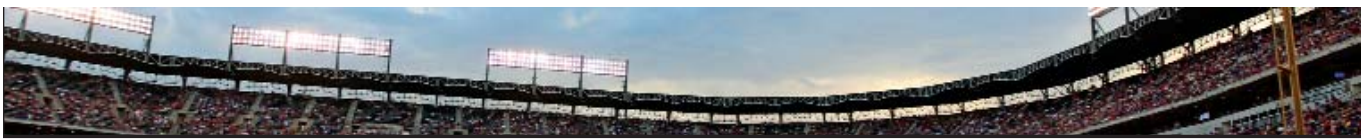

CAREER

Acquired in a July 31 trade with San Diego, the 33-year-old right-hander has rated among the major leagues' best relievers since the start of 2009...he had the lowest ERA and opponents on-base percentage among all major league relievers in 2009-10, posting the majors' 3rd-highest holds total in that span...will be pitching in the American League for the first time...made his major league debut with Milwaukee in 2004, where the pitching coach was current Rangers coach Mike Maddux...a native of Sinton, Texas, near Corpus Christi, Adams still lives in that area and played baseball and basketball at Texas A&M-Kingsville...originally drafted by Milwaukee, Adams has also pitched in the New York Mets and Cleveland organizations, and was acquired by San Diego from Cleveland in exchange for former Ranger Brian Sikorski on July 18, 2006.

RANKINGS IN 2009-10: Over the last two seasons in 2009-10, Adams ranked among major league relief leaders in ERA (1st, 1.93), opponents OBP (1st, .231), opponents OPS (1st, .455), opponents SLG (2nd, .224), holds (3rd, 53), and opponents average (5th, .167).

SAN DIEGO IN 2011: Went 3-1 with a 1.13 ERA (6 ER/48.0 IP) over 48 relief appearances with the Padres this season, recording 49 strikeouts against 9 walks...had one save with 23 holds and finished 5 games...opponents batted just .155 with a .197 on-base percentage and a .256 slugging mark against Adams while with the Padres, and right-handers hit just .107 (8-75)...at the time of the trade, his 1.13 ERA ranked as the 3rd-lowest among major league relievers (minimum 0.3 IP/team G) and was 2nd-lowest in the National League...his .197 opponents OBP was the 3rd-lowest in the majors behind only San Francisco's Sergio Romo (.183) and new teammate Koji Uehara (.191)...he had a 5.44 strikeout-to-walk ratio that ranked 5th in the N.L. and 8th in the majors...Adams' 23 holds with San Diego ranked 3rd in the majors when traded behind only Washington's Tyler Clippard (26) and Boston's Daniel Bard (24).

2010: Worked a career-high 70 games and 66.2 innings for the Padres, posting 73 K's against a career-high 23 walks...recorded a career-high 38 holds, 2nd-most in the majors behind Luke Gregerson's 40 (MLB record)...passed both Scott Linebrink (36 in 2006) and Tom Gordon (36 in 2004) for the second-most holds in a season in MLB history...did not allow a run in 60 of his 70 outings...his 1.76 ERA (13 ER/66.2 IP) was 6th-lowest among major league relievers and 3rd-lowest in N.L...was 0-1 with a 3.93

ERA (8 ER/18.1 IP) in his first 19 outings before going 4-0 with a 0.93 ERA (5 ER/48.1 IP) over his last 51 beginning May 22...had a career-best 14.0-inning scoreless streak from May 22-June 20...retired 18 straight batters faced April 25-May 8, one shy of his career best in '09...allowed a .196 (48-245) opponents average, working hitless ball in 39 outings...left-handers batted .185 (22-119) with right-handers at .206 (26-126)...was on 15-day DL July 12-Aug. 6 with a strained left oblique.

2009: Posted a 0.73 ERA (3 ER/37.0 IP) in 37 relief appearances for the Padres, missing much of the season while recovering from surgery on his right shoulder...allowed just one earned run over his last 34 appearances, posting a 0.26 ERA (1 ER/34.2 IP) with 6 walks and 44 strikeouts...6 of his 9 runs allowed during the season were unearned...was scored upon in just 5 of his 37 games...did not allow an earned run over a stretch of 24 games (24.0 IP) from June 19-Aug. 16, allowing just 8 hits and 4 walks against 29 K's in that span...struck out at least one batter in 30 outings...last 9 outings: 9.2 IP, 1 H, 2 BB, 15 SO, retiring 29 of 31 batters faced in that span...retired career-best 19 straight batters from Aug. 17-Sept. 23...did not allow a hit or walk to 20 straight batters faced from June 27-July 8 (one reached on an error)...opposing batters hit just .111 (14-126), as he allowed multiple hits in just 4 of 34 outings...lefties hit .130 (9-69), while right-handers batted just .088 (5-57)...allowed just 2 extra-base hits all season...**2008:** Began the season at Triple-A Portland before having his contract purchased by the Padres on May 22...spent the rest of the season in San Diego...his 54 relief outings ranked 3rd on the club behind Heath Bell (74) and Cla Meredith (73)...recorded 10 holds...his 2.48 relief ERA led the Padres and ranked 9th among N.L. relievers (minimum 50.0 IP)...also led San Diego with 74 relief strikeouts, 12th overall in N.L...held opponents to a .209 average (49-235), including a .190 mark (23-121) vs. right-handers...did not allow a run in his last 18 home appearances (20.2 IP) of the season beginning June 27...underwent right shoulder surgery to repair a torn labrum on Oct. 17...**2007:** Did not pitch due to a left knee injury...**2006:** Split the season between the Brewers, Mets, Indians and Padres organizations...only 2 big league outings came with the Brewers...combined to go 1-3 with 2 saves and a 3.94 ERA (26 ER/59.1 IP) in 48 minor league games...in his combined 61.2 innings in the majors and

minors, allowed only 4 home runs...opened the season with Triple-A Nashville...traded to the Mets on May 26 and assigned to Triple-A Norfolk...designated for assignment by Mets on July 4...claimed off waivers by the Indians July 7...appeared in 3 games at Triple-A Buffalo...acquired by the Padres July 18 and spent the remainder of the year at Triple-A Portland...**2005:** Made his first Major League Opening Day roster with the Brewers...picked up his first big league save in his season debut with a scoreless frame April 8 at Chicago-NL...optioned to Nashville on May 27...posted a 5.75 ERA (23 ER/36.0 IP) in 26 regular season games and a 4.15 mark (2 ER/4.1 IP) in 5 postseason appearances...notched one postseason save...**2004:** Recalled by the Brewers on May 15 after beginning the season at Triple-A Indianapolis...made his major league debut on May 18 against Montreal in San Juan, Puerto Rico...received the Brewers Newcomer Award...did not allow a run in 34 of his 46 ML games...earned his first ML win on May 20 against the Expos in San Juan...began his ML career with 13.0 consecutive scoreless innings before allowing a pair of runs on June 17 vs. SEA...named the South Texas Pro Pitcher of the Year at the South Texas Winter Banquet...**2003:** Spent the entire season at Double-A Huntsville...named to the Southern League All-Star Team...had 83 strikeouts and averaged 10 K/9.0 IP...held opponents to a .208 average (58-279)...made his first career start July 3 at Birmingham and allowed 3 runs over 4.0 innings...**2002:** Split the season between Single-A Beloit, Single-A High Desert and Double-A Huntsville...combined to go 3-1 with 11 saves and a 3.00 ERA (16 ER/48.0 IP) in 34 games over the 3 stops...had 61 K's for the year...opened the season at Beloit...recorded at least one strikeout in each of his 11 appearances with the Snappers, finishing with 21 K's before being promoted to High Desert, where he averaged 14.8 K/9.0 IP...**2001:** Made his professional debut with Ogden of the Rookie Pioneer League...posted 44 K's in 32.0 innings against just 6 walks.

PERSONAL: Jon Michael Adams...married to Shelly...the couple has a daughter, Keira, and a son, Kaiden...graduated from Sinton (TX) High School where he played basketball and baseball, earning All-State honors in both sports...attended Texas A&M-Kingsville, continuing in both baseball and basketball...signed by Brewers scout Fred Beene.

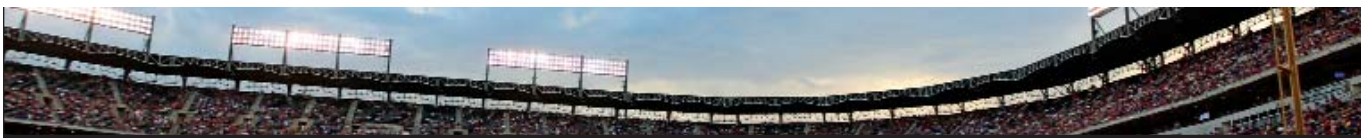

CAREER

Pronounced KEEN-tah-NEE-yah...the 29-year-old left-handed batter is in his first season in the Texas organization after signing a minor league contract with the club on Dec. 14...began the '11 campaign at Triple-A Round Rock...played in 5 'A' games for Texas this spring, going 3-for-8 (.375) with a homer, double, and 4 RBI...entered this season as a career .309 hitter in the minor leagues...is in his ninth professional season since being selected by Oakland in the first round (33rd overall) of the 2003 June draft... was acquired by Colorado, along with OF Eric Byrnes, in exchange for LHP Joe Kennedy and RHP Jay Witasick on July 13, 2005...saw major league action in 5 straight seasons with Colorado from 2005-09, and has batted .220 (110-500) with 2 home runs and 32 RBI in 216 career games in the big leagues, all with the Rockies...made his lone Opening Day roster in 2009, spending the entire campaign with the Rockies...his last big league contest entering this season came on Oct. 4, 2009 at Los Angeles...both ML home runs came in 2008, including a walk-off long ball in the 12th inning on Aug. 24, 2008 vs. Cincinnati...has seen action in the majors and minors at second base, shortstop,

and third base, with limited action at the hot corner...a native of El Paso, he was the starting shortstop for the 2002 University of Texas Longhorns club that won the College World Series, a squad that included ...while at UT in 2003, he was the second batter for the Longhorns in an exhibition against the Rangers at Surprise Stadium on Feb. 27, 2003, a 17-1 Rangers win...that was a night game immediately following the Rangers' first-ever Cactus League contest.

2010: Played in only 34 games for the year due to injuries and a suspension, and did not play in the majors all year...was on the Colorado Springs disabled list April 8-May 2 with a left knee sprain, and May 4-June 5 with a left calf strain...first game of season was May 3 vs. Fresno, going 2-for-4 with 2 doubles and an RBI, but was on the DL the next day with a calf injury...lone HR was July 5 at Fresno...went 10-for-23 (.435) his first 7 games, then batted .208 (20-96) the rest of the way, including just 1-for-21 his last 6 contests...saw action at second, short, and third...hit .270 (17-63) in the Springs, .232 (13-56) on the road...last game was July 25...placed on MLB Restricted List on Aug. 11 for testing positive for Methylhexanamine, a performance-enhancing substance, in violation of the Minor League Drug Prevention and Treatment Program...did not play the rest of the season...**2009:** Spent the entire season on the Rockies active Major League roster, hitting .172 (10-for-58) with 2 RBI in 58 games...made 5 starts (8/23 at 2B, 8/7-8 at 2B; 5/20, 10/4 at SS)...also started at 2B and batted 8th 5/10 vs. FLA, for first start of '09... played in the field in 44 games (75.2 inn. at 2B, 14.0 inn. at 3B, 41.0 inn. at SS)...made one error at second base and one at shortstop...went 3-for-16 (.188), 3 walks, 11 K's as a pinch-hitter...had just 12 AB's against left-handed pitchers and collected one hit vs. southpaws (.083)...17 AB's in August were his most in any month of the season...went 2-for-11 with runners in scoring position, while his first hit in that situation was also with 2 outs (1-for-6 w/RISP, 2 out)...recorded lone multi-hit game (2-for-3) 8/8 vs. CHC...had 2 doubles, both of which were against Arizona (4/21 at ARI, 9/6 vs. ARI)...had 27 strikeouts in 58 AB's...drew 8 walks...did not hit any home run... was on the Opening Day roster for the first time in his career... recorded first pinch-hit of the season 4/28 vs. SD (began 1-for-5 as PH)...started at 2B and batted 8th 5/10 vs. FLA, first start of '09...had 10 at-bats (2-for-10), no starts in June...went 0-for-5 in 4 games in July...made consecutive starts for first time in '09, 8/7-8...had multi-hit/RBI game 8/8 vs. CHC...started at shortstop in the final game of the regular season, 10/4 at LAD...went 1-for-4 in that games...had just 2 hits in his final 15 at bats of the season...

2008: Spent the majority of the season with the Rockies, earning a call-up on 4/30 and staying with the big league club the rest of the year...played in career-high 81 games and recorded career-best 210 at-bats... also notched career highs in virtually every offensive category including hits (50), doubles (17), RBI (15) and walks (15)...played 40 games at second base (21 starts) and 39 at shortstop (32 starts)...started at shortstop almost exclusively (24 of 25 games) for an extended period (5/24-6/19) while Tulowitzki and Barmes both spent time on the DL; filled in with a .279 avg. (24-for-86) while committing only one error in that span... overall committed only 4 errors in 258 total chances, including just one error as a second baseman (212.2 innings at the position)...17 of his first 46 hits were doubles as he slugged .381 in his first 58 games (.214 slugging pct. with one extra-base hit in final 23 games)...started just 10 games after the A/S break (8-for-46 in 2nd half, .174 avg.)...went 0-for-5 with one strikeout as a pinch-hitter...hit 2 home runs including Rockies' only walk-off home run of 2008, the 28th game-ending HR in Rox history, in 12th inn. 8/24 vs. CIN; was his 2nd career HR in 427 AB's and snapped personal 0-for-16 streak at the plate with HR...recalled from Triple-A Colorado Springs on 4/30...made '08 debut as def. replacement at 2B in 8th inn. on 4/30 at SF...started first game of '08 5/2 vs. LAD



as second baseman and collected first hit, a double... snapped personal 72-game errorless streak (264 total chances, 161 assists) with an error in the 9th inning at shortstop 5/24...hit first career HR 5/31 at CHC off Ryan Dempster in the 2nd inning; ended 303 at-bat homerless stretch in his career...had career-best 8-game hitting streak from 6/14-7/2 (11-for-27, .407)...hit safely in 9 straight starts (0-for-2 as PH in that span -- otherwise he would have a 9-game hit streak)...delivered 14th last at-bat win (walk-off solo home run) for the Rockies 8/24 in a 4-3, 12-inning win vs. the Reds...for Quintanilla, it was only the second home run of his career in 427 career at-bats...for the Rockies, it was their first walk-off homer of the season; at the time Colorado was the only National League club without a walk-off home run and one of only 4 teams in the Majors without (also: Blue Jays, Twins Indians)... finished his Triple-A season hitting .329 (24-for-73) with one home run and 8 RBI in 20 games...**2007:** Spent most of the season with Triple-A Colorado Springs, but was recalled to the Majors on three different occasions: May 1-20, July 13-16, and Sept. 4-end of season...batted .229 (16-for-70) with 5 RBI, 4 doubles, and 6 runs scored in 27 games for the Rockies...hit safely in 12 of 17 starts at .226 (14-for-62)...all 17 starts came at second base where he did not commit an error in 88 total chances...hit safely in 10 of his first 14 games in his first stint for the Rockies...appeared in just one game in his second recall of the season...was recalled a final time on Sept. 4 when roster expanded and appeared in 12 games, going 5-for-27 (.185) to drop season average from .256 to .229...batted .319 (111-for-348) with 3 home runs, 43 RBI, 30 doubles, 4 triples, and 54 runs scored in 98 games for Colorado Springs... played the majority of his games at shortstop (48), but also played 27 games at second base...had 5 hits (2nd time) in the Sky Sox's 23-11 win on June 7 vs. Tacoma...hit safely in 11 of his final 13 games at .333 (19-for-57)...**2006:** Spent majority of season at Triple-A Colorado Springs, but saw time at Major League level for second consecutive season...recalled June 3, taking roster spot of Jason Smith, who was designated for assignment...batted .176 (6-for-34) with a double, triple and 3 RBI in 11 games for the Rockies...started 9 games, 7 at shortstop and 2 at second base...was placed on the 15-day DL on July 17 (retro to July 16) with a right shin contusion, an injury sustained after fouling a ball off his right shin on July 15 at CIN...was activated from the disabled list on Aug. 4 and optioned to Triple-A Colorado Springs, where he spent the remainder of the year...overall, Quintanilla batted .276 (85-for-308) with 48 runs, 23 doubles, 2 triples, 4 home runs and 29 RBI in 82 games with the Sky Sox...began the season as the Sky Sox's starting shortstop, appearing in 49 games at short, but moved over to second base in early August after the Rockies had acquired Kazuo Matsui, and played 32 games at that position... posted .982 (7 e/399 tc) fielding pct. between the two positions...**2005:** Spent the final 2 months of the season with Colorado after being acquired from Oakland mid- July...entering the year, had never played above the Double-A level...was the Rox starting shortstop for the month of August prior to Clint Barmes' return from the DL...was with Double-A Midland of the Texas League prior to the trade and played 13 games for Colorado Springs before his promotion...batted .219 with no home runs and 7 RBI over 39 games in his MLB season...started 30 games at shortstop and 3 at second base...only error came on Aug. 19 vs. CHC after no er-

rors in the field over his first 169.0 innings in the Majors...was purchased from Colo. Springs July 31 when infielder Desi Relaford was designated for assignment...made MLB debut July 31 vs. PHI as starting shortstop...recorded first MLB hit with a 5th-inning single off Jon Lieber...from July 31-Aug. 31, started at shortstop for 28 of the team's 30 games...hit safely in 6 of his first 7 big league games at .300 (9-for-30)...after Clint Barmes was activated on Sept. 2, Quintanilla made just 5 starts and appeared in 10 total games the rest of the season...began year with Midland RockHounds of the Texas League, hitting .293 with 4 HR and 25 RBI in 78 games prior to the trade...was assigned to Colorado Springs when acquired by the Rockies, batting .346 with one HR and 7 RBI in 13 games prior to his promotion to the Majors...was his first action above Double-A...hit safely in 11 of the 13 games, including each of first 6 contests...**2004:** Combined to hit .321 with 13 HR and 92 RBI in 131 games for Modesto (A) and Midland (AA)...ranked T6th among all minor leaguers in hits (175) and his batting avg. was 10th-best among minor league shortstops...hit all 13 HR vs. RHP...batted .346 (54-for-156) with RISP and went 8-for-20 (.400) with 20 RBI with bases loaded...had a .947 fielding pct. 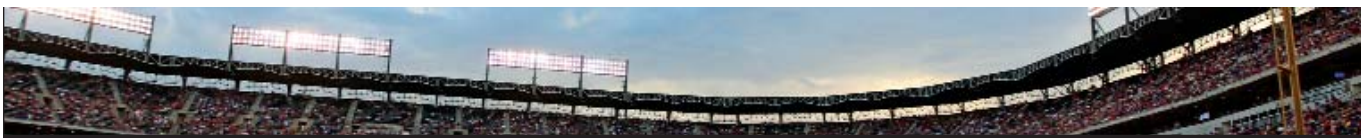

CAREER

Acquired by Texas in a July 30 trade with Baltimore, the 36-year-old Uehara (pronounced EW-eh-hara) is in his third season in the United States, his 13th professional season...he pitched for the Yomiuri Giants in the Japanese Central League for 10 seasons from 1999-2008, an eight-time All-Star in his native country...a starter for the bulk of his pro career, the right-hander has flourished in the bullpen after an injury-plagued 2009 season in which he made his major league debut in the Baltimore rotation...at the time of the trade to Texas, Uehara rated among the majors' best relievers in ERA, strikeout-to-walk ratio, WHIP, and strikeouts-per-9-innings since the start of 2010...has been effective for Japan in international competition, combining to go 12-0 with 2 saves in 25 combined appearances in various events...he was on the bronze medal-winning team at the 2004 Olympics in Athens, and the Japan club that won the 2006 World Baseball Classic...Uehara was voted the 1999 Central League Rookie of the Year in Japan, when he went 20-4 with a 2.09 ERA in 25 starts, leading the circuit in wins and strikeouts (179)...he also led the league in strikeouts in 2003 and won the ERA title again in 2004...he was twice named to the league's "Best Nine" (1999

and 2002), and also won the Eiji Sawamura Award (top starting pitcher) in 1999 and 2002...he won the Japanese Gold Glove in 1999 and 2003.

REUNITED: When he was acquired from Baltimore, Uehara was reunited with his former high school teammate Yoshinori Tateyama in the Texas bullpen...the pair played together at Tokaidai Gyosei High School in Osaka, Japan, where Tateyama was a starting pitcher and Uehara was an outfielder...Uehara would become a pitcher in college and was eventually drafted in the first round by Yomiuri.

2011 WITH BALTIMORE: Went 1-1 with a 1.72 ERA (9 ER/47.0 IP) over 43 relief appearances for Baltimore this season prior to the trade, allowing just 8 walks against 62 strikeouts...opposing batters hit just .152 with 9 home runs against Uehara with the Orioles...had 13 holds and 19 games finished...over his last 13 outings with the O's, Uehara tossed 15.0 scoreless innings with 2 walks and 23 strikeouts, as opponents went just 5-for-50 (.100) in that span with 2 extra-base hits (both doubles)...he had at least one strikeout in his final 16 straight games with Baltimore, and in 38 of 43 contests overall for the O's...his last outing with Baltimore was a scoreless inning on July 29 at New York-AL...at the time of the trade, Uehara ranked among American League relief leaders in opponents average (1st, .152), opponents slugging (1st, .191), strikeouts (2nd, 62), and ERA (6th, 1.72)...his 7.75 strikeout-to-walk ratio when traded was the best among A.L. relievers, 2nd-best in the majors at that point behind San Francisco's Sergio Romo (12.75)...compiled a 0.702 WHIP figure with the O's, the lowest figure in the major leagues among pitchers with at least 40.0 innings at that point.

FEW WALKS: Did not issue any walks for 36 consecutive appearances from July 19, 2010-April 15, 2011, the 3rd-longest such streak by a relief pitcher since 1954...only longer streaks in that span were Dennis Eckersley in 1989-90 (41 G) and John Smoltz in 2003-04 (38 G)...had 46 strikeouts between walks, the most without a free pass by any A.L. pitcher since Boston's Pedro Martinez had 49 K's between walks in 2000...Martinez won his 2nd straight Cy Young that year.

2010: In his first full major league season as a reliever, finished the year as O's closer while ranking among league relief leaders in several categories...was limited in innings and games due to 2 stints on the disabled list, March 26-May 5 with a left hamstring strain and May 20-June 26 with a right forearm strain...went 1-2 with 13 saves and a 2.86 ERA (14 ER/44.0 IP) in 43 relief appearances...opponents batted .220, with right-handers at .185 (17-92), which ranked 15th in A.L. (50+ AB)...retired first batter faced in 37 of 43...set a franchise record by not walking a batter in 32 consecutive appearances (34.0 innings) from July 19 through the end of the season...ended the season with a streak of 44 strikeouts since his last walk allowed...allowed 5 R/ER in 3.0 innings against Yankees, had a 1.98 ERA (9 ER/41.0 IP) against all other teams...recorded first major league relief win on July 20 vs. Tampa Bay.
