### OAKLAND ATHLETICS (58-36) VS. SEATTLE MARINERS (51-43)

SUNDAY, JULY 13, 2014 – SAFECO FIELD – 1:10 P.M. PDT  
RHP SONNY GRAY (9-3, 2.97) VS. RHP CHRIS YOUNG (8-5, 3.08)

**ABOUT THE A'S:** Have lost three of the past four games to snap a season-high tying six-game winning streak...however, have won seven of the last 10 games, 11 of the last 17 and 16 of the last 24...are now 22 games over .500 at 58-36, which is tied for the fourth best record after 94 games in Oakland history...have the **best record in the majors** for the 25<sup>th</sup> consecutive day (since June 18) and 27<sup>th</sup> day this year (also May 21-22)...lead the American League West by 1½ games, which is their smallest lead since May 29 when the also lead by 1½ games...have not led by less than 1½ games since they took sole possession of first place with a one game lead April 28...have been alone in first every day since then and have held at least a share of first since April 24...have spent 89 days in sole possession of first this year, four days tied for first, four days in second, three days tied for second, one day tied for third and three days in fourth...have held the best record in the AL every day since May 31.

**PITCHING:** The A's have allowed one run or fewer in six of the last 10 games and have a 1.90 ERA (19 er in 90.0 ip) over that span...have the second lowest ERA in the majors for the season (3.12)...also rank second in the majors in opponents batting average (.232), on-base percentage (.293) and slugging percentage (.349)...are tied for third in the American League in most shutouts (9) and fourth in fewest home runs (80).

**STARTING PITCHING:** A's starting pitchers have allowed one run or fewer in seven of the last 10 games and are 6-3 with a 1.64 ERA (12 er in 65.2 ip) over that span...have a 3.17 ERA (200 er in 567.2 ip) for the season, which is second lowest in the majors (Los Angeles-NL, 3.11)...have the fewest losses in the majors (23) and are tied for the third most wins (40).

**RUN DIFFERENTIAL:** The A's have outscored the opposition by 142 runs, which is the most in the majors (Los Angeles-AL, 86)...since 1940, only four American League teams have finished with a run differential greater than 139 before the All-Star Break (Baltimore, +168 in 1969; New York, +157 in 1998; Seattle, +149 in 2001; Baltimore, +143 in 1966)...the best run differential at the All-Star Break in Athletics history is 95 in 1973.

**BEFORE THE BREAK:** The A's 58 wins are the **most in Athletics history** before the All-Star Break (previous: 56 in 1971, 1972 and 1973)...the last team with more than 58 wins before the break is Detroit in 2006 (59)...will go into the break in first place in the American League West for the second consecutive season...had a two game lead last year and have not had a larger lead at the break since 1988 when they led by 5½ games...the pitching staff has 721 strikeouts, which is the most in Athletics history before the All-Star Break (650 in 2013)...has a 3.12 ERA...the last AL team with an ERA under 3.13 at the break was the 1990 A's (3.09) and the last under 3.09 was the 1989 Angels (2.89)...the offense has scored 462 runs, which is third most in Athletics history before the break (522 in 2000, 494 in 1996)...Scott Kazmir leads the A's with 11 wins and Sonny Gray has nine...the last time the A's had two 10-game winners at the All-Star Break was in 1990 (Welch 13, Stewart 11).

**OFFENSE:** The A's **lead the majors** in walks (359), rank second in runs (462), tied for fourth in fewest strikeouts (664), fifth in on-base percentage (.329), tied for seventh in triples (19) and eighth in home runs (96), extra base hits (273) and slugging percentage (.400)...are tied with Baltimore and Milwaukee for the Major League lead with four grand slams and tied for second with 48 home runs with runners on base.

**HOME AND AWAY:** The A's are 1-3 on this five-game road trip to San Francisco (1-1) and Seattle (0-2)...will finish the road trip with a losing record, snapping an 11-trip streak in which they finished with a .500 or better record...that matched the second longest such streak in Oakland history (June 26, 1989-July 11, 1990)...the longest is a 14-trip streak from April 12, 1971 to July 23, 1972...this is the first time they have finished a road trip with a losing record since going 2-5 at Texas and Seattle June 17-23, 2013...are 28-21 (.571) on the road, which is the fourth best road record in the American League...went 6-0 on the

last homestand against Toronto (4-0) and San Francisco (2-0)...it was the 11<sup>th</sup> undefeated homestand of six or more games in Oakland history...the last was Sept. 28-Oct. 3, 2012 when the A's went 6-0 against Seattle and Texas...have won 11 of the last 12 home games, 24 of the last 30 and are 30-15 (.667) at home for the season...that is the second best home record in the majors (Los Angeles-AL, 32-15)...begin post All-Star Break play Friday with a six-game homestand against Baltimore (three games) and Houston (three games).

**IN THE PINCH:** A's pinch hitters lead the American League in walks (16), doubles (5) and extra base hits (8), rank second in RBI (15) and plate appearances (96), tied for second in hits (20) and home runs (3), third in slugging percentage (.436) and fourth in batting (.256) and on-base percentage (.385)...the 20 pinch hits match the A's season total from last year and the 16 walks are tied for third in the majors.

**ON THE BASES:** The A's are 54 for 66 (81.8%) in stolen base attempts, which is the second best percentage in the majors (Washington, 84.5%)...opponents have been successful in 52 of their 62 (83.9%) attempts, which is fourth highest in the majors.

**CLOSE CALLS:** The A's have won eight of their last 11 games decided by two runs or fewer after starting the season 12-17...are 38-16 in games decided by three runs or more...are 10-5 (.667) in extra inning games...lead the majors in extra inning games and wins and have the fourth best record...the 15 extra inning games are already two more than the A's played last year (7-6)...are 16-10 in games decided in the last at bat...lead the majors in last at bat wins and are fourth in games decided in the last at bat...have six walk-off wins, which is tied for second in the AL (Chicago, 7).

**THIS AND THAT:** Yoenis Céspedes recorded the 26<sup>th</sup> assist by an A's outfielder last night, which is tied for the **most in the majors** and is one more than the A's season total from last year...have not used a rookie this year, which is the longest season-opening streak by a ML team since the 1971 Baltimore Orioles went the first 152 games (source: Elias)...have posted a winning record in 13 consecutive months, which matches the longest such streak in Oakland history (Sept. 1970-Sept. 1972).

**ALL-STARs:** The A's had six players named to the American League All-Star team (Céspedes, Donaldson, Doolittle, Kazmir, Moss and Norris) and one named to the National League All-Star team (Samardzija)...the six All-Stars are the most of any team this year and are the A's most since they had an Athletics record seven in 1975...this marks the first time since 2003 the A's are sending a non-pitcher to the All-Star Game (Hernandez)...have four non-pitchers for the first time since 1991...have two players participating in the Home Run Derby (Céspedes and Donaldson) for the second time (Canseco and McGwire in 1990).

**A's vs. MARINERS:** The A's trail the season series, 7-5...are 3-4 in Oakland and 2-3 in Seattle...are hitting .207 (82 for 396) with 35 runs scored (2.92 per game) but have a 3.06 ERA (37 er in 109.0 ip)...over the previous eight seasons, the A's have won the season series in even numbered seasons (2006, 2008, 2010, 2012) and the Mariners have won in odd numbered years (2007, 2009, 2011, 2013)...Oakland is 84-80 (.512) against the Mariners since 2006...all-time, the A's are 317-242 (.567) against Seattle, which is the second best mark by any team against the Mariners to Boston's .579 mark (min. 20 games)...are 175-105 in Oakland, 141-136 in Seattle and 1-1 in Tokyo...are 65-71 at Safeco Field.

#### TODAY'S TIDBITS

**Yoenis Céspedes** has 14 career home runs against Seattle, which are tied for fifth most in Oakland history against the Mariners...**Jed Lowrie** extended his hitting streak to eight games last night, which is an ongoing season-high...is 14 for 31 (.452) with six runs scored and six multiple hit games over that span...**Stephan Vogt** has a career-high 12-game hitting streak (19 for 42, .452)...is batting .371 overall, which is the best mark in the majors among batters with 100 or more plate appearances.

#### THIS DATE IN A's HISTORY

In **1930** Philadelphia defeats St. Louis 12-1 to take over first place for good in the American League en route to their second consecutive pennant and world championship...in **1935** Doc Cramer goes 6 for 6, his second career six-hit game...in **1974** Reggie Jackson hits his 200th career home run, but the A's lose 12-6 at New York...in **2003** Mark Ellis scores on a Ramon Hernandez fielders choice in the bottom of the ninth inning to break a scoreless tie as the A's defeat Baltimore, 1-0.

TODAY’S STARTING PITCHER: Sonny Gray (9-3, 2.97 ERA)

**AMONG THE LEADERS:** Ranks fifth in the American League in opponents slugging percentage (.320), tied for seventh in winning percentage (.750), eighth in opponents batting average (.228), ninth in ERA (2.97) and tied for 10<sup>th</sup> in wins (9)...is also tied for third in shutouts (1), tied for sixth in wild pitches (7) and tied for seventh in complete games (1).

**THREE-GAME WINNING STREAK:** Is 3-0 with a 3.12 ERA (9 er in 26.0 ip) over his last four starts...it is his third three-game winning streak of the season...is now 4-2 with a 4.32 ERA (24 er in 50.0 ip) and .257 (49 for 191) opponents batting average over his last eight starts...went 5-1 with a 1.99 ERA and .206 opponents average over his first 10 starts.

**HOME AND AWAY:** Is 3-1 with a 2.91 ERA (15 er in 46.1 ip) and .186 (31 for 167) opponents batting average in seven starts on the road compared to 6-2 with a 3.01 ERA (24 er in 71.2 ip) and .255 (69 for 271) opponents average in 11 starts at home...has the third lowest road opponents batting average in the American League...is tied for third in the AL in home wins.

**AGAINST THE WEST:** Is 6-1 with a 2.40 ERA (13 er in 48.2 ip) in seven starts against American League West competition compared to 3-2 with a 3.38 ERA (26 er in 69.1 ip) in 11 starts against everyone else...is now 8-2 with a 1.91 ERA (18 er in 84.2 ip) in 13 career appearances against the West compared to 6-4 with a 3.70 ERA (40 er in 97.1 ip) in 17 games against all other teams.

**THE LONG BALL:** Has allowed just one home run in his last five starts (42.0 ip) and seven in 118.0 innings for the season...his average of 0.53 home runs per nine innings is seventh lowest in the American League...all seven home runs have come with the bases empty...has yielded just 11 home runs in 182.0 career innings (0.54 per nine innings).

**OPPONENTS BATTING:** Opponents are batting .171 (19 for 111) with a double and two home runs (.234 slugging percentage) when leading off an inning...the slugging percentage is second lowest in the American League, the batting average is third lowest and his .233 on-base percentage is fifth lowest...has allowed a .179 (31 for 173) career batting average and .225 slugging percentage (two doubles, two home run) against batters leading off an inning...the opponents number four hitter is batting .104 (5 for 48) with no extra base hits...the batting average and slugging percentage are the lowest marks in the majors.

**WINS:** Has won nine games this year and now has 14 wins in 30 career games...in Oakland history, only Tim Hudson (15) has more wins in his first 30 career games...recorded his 10<sup>th</sup> career win in his 21<sup>st</sup> career game May 16 at Cleveland...is the fifth pitcher in Oakland history to reach 10 career wins in 21 games or fewer: Tim Hudson (18 games), Barry Zito (19), A.J. Griffin (20) and Bill Krueger (20).

**NIGHT AND DAY:** Is 6-2 with a 2.74 ERA (22 er in 72.2 ip) in 11 starts at night compared to 3-1 with a 335 ERA (17 er in 45.2 ip) in seven starts during the day...has the fourth lowest night ERA in the American League.

**DEFENSIVE DOINGS:** Committed his first error of the season June 28 at Miami...ranks second among American League pitchers with 33 total chances (Keuchel, HOU 44).

**MONTH BY MONTH:** Is 2-0 with a 1.29 ERA (2 er in 14.0 ip) in two starts in July...went 2-2 with a 5.40 ERA in five starts in June...the ERA was the highest single month ERA of his career...was 1-0 with a 3.00 ERA in five starts in May...compiled a 4-1 record and a 2.06 ERA in five starts in April and was named American League Pitcher of the Monthl...allowed just one home run in 35.0 innings and held the opposition to a .211 batting average...tied for the AL lead in wins in April and ranked fourth in ERA (2.06).

**THAT’S ODD:** Has a 4.10 ERA (29 er in 63.2 ip) in odd numbered innings compared to a 1.66 ERA (10 er in 54.1 ip) in even numbered innings...has a 4.00 ERA (8 er in 18.0 ip) in the first inning this year and a 4.82 ERA (15 er in 28.0 ip) in his career.

**THIS AND THAT:** Has received run support of two runs or fewer in eight of his 18 starts...the A’s have been shut out four times this year, three times in his starts...the A’s are 12-6 (.667) in his starting assignments this year and are 18-10 (.643) when he starts in his career...has tossed at least six innings in 16 of his 18 starts and allowed one run or fewer seven times.

**2014 HIGHLIGHTS:** He had a no decision in the A’s 2-0 loss to Cleveland on Opening Night **March 31**...tossed 6.0 shutout innings to become just the second starting pitcher in Oakland history to not allow a run on Opening Day (Tim Hudson, 2003)...it was the first Opening

Day start of his career...becomes the ninth different Opening Day starter for the A’s in the last nine years...became the fifth youngest Opening Day starting pitcher in Oakland history...was the winning pitcher in the A’s 6-3 win over Seattle **April 6** in Oakland...did not allow a run in the first inning to extend his scoreless streak to a career-high 14.0 innings...was the winning pitcher in the A’s 3-1 win at Seattle **April 12**...struck out a career-high tying nine batters...had his career-high six-game winning streak snapped in the A’s 3-0 loss to Texas **April 23** in Oakland...had a 2.35 ERA over that eight-start stretch dating back to Sept. 11, 2013...allowed just two home runs in 46.0 innings during the winning streak...tossed his first career complete game and shutout, a two-hitter in the A’s 4-0 win at Texas **April 28**...became just the fifth pitcher (third visiting pitcher) to allow two hits or fewer in a shutout at Globe Life Park, the first since Matt Garza (Aug. 15, 2008)...had a no decision in the A’s 3-2, 10-inning win at Boston **May 4**...blanked the Red Sox on one hit over the first four innings to extend his scoreless streak to a career-high tying 14.0 innings...was the winning pitcher in the A’s 11-1 win at Cleveland **May 16**...matched his career-high with nine strikeouts...allowed four runs in 6.0 innings **May 27** against Detroit, snapping his season-opening streak of 10 consecutive starts with six innings or more and three runs or fewer...that is the longest such streak to start a season by an Athletics pitcher since at least 1914...lost back-to-back starts **June 7** at Baltimore and **June 13** against New York (AL), marking the first time he has lost consecutive decisions in his career (6.35 ERA).

**LAST START:** He extended his winning streak to three games in the A’s 6-1 win over San Francisco last Tuesday in Oakland...allowed one run in seven innings for the second consecutive start...blanked the Giants on five hits and a walk over the first six innings...had a 4-0 lead when he allowed a leadoff home run to Colvin in the seventh.

**GRAY vs. SEATTLE:** Is 3-0 with a 1.44 ERA (25.0 ip, 16 h, 6 r, 4 er, 9 bb, 27 so, 1 hr) in four career starts...is 2-0 with a 0.75 ERA (1 er in 12.0 ip) in two starts at Safeco Field and 1-0 with a 2.08 ERA (3 er in 13.0 ip) in two starts in Oakland...is 2-0 with a 1.39 ERA (13.0 ip, 11 h, 4 r, 2 er, 4 bb, 12 so) in two starts this year...the first win came in a 6-3 A’s win in Oakland April 6...was charged with two unearned runs in the second inning when he allowed RBI singles to Almonte and Miller...also allowed a RBI single to Smoak in the third to give the Mariners a 3-0 lead but the A’s tied the game in the bottom of the third...retired 11 of the final 12 batters he faced and the A’s scored twice in the fifth to take the lead for good...won again in a 3-1 victory at Seattle April 12...struck out a career-high tying nine batters...allowed back-to-back singles to Almonte and Miller to start the game before retiring 11 straight...Almonte scored on a Cano ground out, but that would be the only run he would allow in seven innings.

- A's relievers have allowed seven runs over their last 26.1 ip (2.39 ERA) but have a 4.12 ERA (41 er in 89.2 ip) in their last 26 games...posted a 2.53 ERA over their first 64 games.
- The A's bullpen is second in the American League in wins (18) and third in ERA (3.01)...ranks first in opponents on-base percentage (.284) and second in batting average (.227) and slugging percentage (.325).
- Has issued the fewest walks (80) among AL bullpens...has issued just 10 walks over its last 24 games and 80.2 innings (since June 16)...are the fewest walks in the majors over that span.
- Converted seven straight save chances from June 1-20 but has converted just five of nine saves (55.6%) since June 21 (18 games)...its 61.8% save percentage for the season is third lowest in the American League.
