**Contract Status:** First year of a three-year contract through 2008

Ken Macha has compiled a 368-280 record in four seasons as manager of the Oakland A's, which is the fourth best record in baseball over the last four years. His .568 winning percentage is the second best mark in franchise history to Dick Williams, who compiled a .603 winning percentage from 1971-73. Macha's 368 wins are fourth most in Athletics history behind Connie Mack (3627), Tony La Russa (798) and Art Howe (600).

The A's won their second American League West championship under Macha in 2006, compiling a 93-69 record despite using the Disabled List 15 times. Four players from the Opening Day starting lineup (Bradley, Crosby, Ellis and Thomas), two members of the starting rotation (Harden and Loaiza) and four pitchers from the Opening Day bullpen (Duchscherer, Kennedy, Street and Witasick) all spent time on the DL in 2006.

The A's finished in second place in the AL West in 2005 for the second consecutive season, compiling an 88-74 record despite a roster that featured a rookie closer, a rookie starting pitcher, two rookies in the starting lineup and a starting rotation that included Barry Zito and four other pitchers who entered the season with a combined 32 wins on the Major League level. In 2005, Macha was also a member of Terry Francona's AL coaching staff for the All-Star Game in Detroit. Macha guided the A's to their second consecutive 90-win season in 2004 when the A's finished 91-71 and were eliminated from contention in the AL West on the second to last day of the season. The A's won the AL West Championship in his Major League managerial debut in 2003, posting a 96-66 record. The win total tied for the 10th best mark by a rookie manager in ML history.

Macha was named as the 16th manager in Oakland history and the 27th manager in franchise history on October 29, 2002 after spending the previous four seasons with the A's as the bench coach for the man he succeeded, Art Howe. In addition to his four years as a manager, he has 15 years of experience on a Major League coaching staff and has also managed for four seasons in the Minor Leagues.

Macha came to the A's in 1999 from the Boston organization where he spent four seasons as a manager in the Red Sox farm system. In his first season in 1995, he guided Double-A Trenton to a 73-69 record and a tie for first place in the Southern Division of the Eastern League before losing to Reading in the playoffs. In 1996, he managed the American League affiliates in the Double-A All-Star game in July and the Thunder finished the year 86-56, winning their division for the second consecutive season before losing to Harrisburg in the playoffs. Macha was promoted to Triple-A Pawtucket in 1997 and guided his team to a third straight post-season appearance before losing to Rochester in the first round of the playoffs after an 81-60 record during the regular season. He was named International League Manager of the Year in 1998 after his club went 77-64 and combined for a 317-249 record in his four seasons as manager.

Macha's coaching career began in the Major Leagues with Montreal in 1986 when he was named to Buck Rodgers coaching staff. His responsibilities included pre-game workouts, defensive positioning and charting pitches. He was named third base coach in 1987 and remained in that role until taking a job as bullpen coach for the California Angels in 1992. He was moved to third base following the May 21 team bus crash and remained with the Angels through 1994.

Macha played professionally for 14 seasons in the Pittsburgh, Montreal and Toronto organizations. He was originally drafted by the Pirates in the sixth round of the 1972 June draft and played portions of the 1974, 77 and 78 seasons with Pittsburgh. The former infielder also played for both Canadian teams, spending two seasons with Montreal (1979-80) and one with Toronto (1981). He saw his most significant playing time

with the Expos in 1980, batting a career high .290 in 49 games with his only major league home run. Macha concluded his playing career in Japan, slugging 82 home runs with the Chunichi Dragons from 1982-85. In six seasons in the majors, Macha hit .258 with one home run and 35 RBI in 180 games as a catcher, first baseman, third baseman and outfielder.

Ken graduated from Gateway High School in Pittsburgh and then earned a degree in civil engineering from the University of Pittsburgh. He and his wife, Carolyn Virginia, have two children, Eric and Kristin. Eric was drafted by the A's in the 33rd round of the 2003 June draft.

**Bradley James Fischer**

**Born:** Blissfield, Michigan, June 28, 1956

**Height:** 6-3      **Weight:** 198

Named as A's bullpen coach, December 6, 1995.

Brad Fischer is in his 28th season in the A's organization, his 10th at the Major League level. He had been a minor league player, minor league manager, minor league instructor and assistant director of player development before Art Howe named him as his bullpen coach in 1996. Brad was the A's first base coach in 1997 before moving back to the bullpen for the 1998 season. He returned to the first base coaching box in 2003 and switched back to the bullpen in 2006.

Fischer's playing career lasted just one season (1978) at Bend, the A's rookie league club, although he did appear in emergency situations at Madison in 1983 and '84. He was out of baseball in 1979 but returned to the Oakland organization in 1980 as manager of Single-A Medford.

In his second season as manager, the A's won the Northwest League championship with a 42-28 record as Fischer earned Manager of the Year honors. After a promotion to Madison he guided the Muskies to a league championship in 1982 and a playoff appearance in 1984. Fischer managed at Huntsville from 1985-87 and reached the playoff all three years, including his second league championship in 1985. The former catcher took over the helm of the A's Triple-A affiliate at Tacoma from 1988-90 and in his final season with the Tigers he reached the postseason for the seventh time. Fischer finished his 11-year minor league managerial career with a 743-670 record.

Following his stint as a manager, Fischer was a minor league instructor for the A's from 1991-93. He then spent two seasons working with Keith Lieppman as the assistant director of player development.

Fischer attended Western Michigan University in Kalamazoo and earned a B.S. degree in Industrial Education. He hit .352 with 34 RBI in 40 games as a senior and signed with the A's as a non-drafted free agent. He and his wife, Mary, have four children, Dan (24), Kelly (21), Kaitlyn (16) and Ryan (12).

**Robert Peter Geren**

**Born:** San Diego, California, September 22, 1961

Named as A's bullpen coach, November 13, 2002

Former Major League catcher Bob Geren is in his first season as bench coach after spending each of the previous three seasons as the A's bullpen coach. His stint with the A's is Geren's first assignment at the Major League level.

Geren joined the A's organization in 1999 as a manager at Single-A Modesto and spent the next three seasons at the helm of Triple-A Sacramento. In his first season, the Modesto club finished 88-52 and won both halves in the Northern Division of the California League before losing to San Jose in the Cal League semi-finals. For his efforts, Geren was named California League Manager of the Year. He then led Sacramento to consecutive first place finishes in the Southern Division of the Pacific Coast League, finishing 90-54 in 2000 and 75-69 in 2001, before losing in the first round of the playoffs both times. Sacramento went 66-78 in 2002, giving Geren a 319-253 record in four seasons as a manager in the A's farm system. Geren continued to gain managerial experience by guiding Escogido in the Dominican Winter League last winter.

Geren has a 452-390 record in seven seasons as a minor league manager as he also managed in three of his five seasons in the Boston Red Sox organization from 1994-98. He joined the Red Sox as the minor league roving catching instructor in 1994 and made his managerial debut at Utica of the New York-Penn League in 1995. The Blue Sox went 33-40 that year and Geren moved on to the Red Sox Gulf Coast League team in 1996 where his club went 24-36. He returned to his duties as minor league catching instructor in 1997 before managing Sarasota of the Florida State league to a 76-61 record in 1998.

Geren's professional playing career spanned 15 seasons, including five years in the majors with the New York Yankees and the San Diego Padres. Originally a first round pick of the San Diego organization in 1979, he was traded to the St. Louis organization prior to making his Major League debut with the Yankees in 1988. He played four seasons with New York from 1988-91 and enjoyed his best season in 1989 when he batted .288 and hit a career best nine home runs. After spending the 1992 season in Boston's minor league system, Geren finished his playing career with San Diego in 1993. He owns a .233 career batting average in 307 Major League games.

Geren graduated from Clairemont High School in San Diego in 1979 and he was the San Diego High School Baseball Player of the Year as a senior.

**Rene George Lachemann**

**Born:** Los Angeles, California, May 4, 1945  
**Height:** 6-0 **Weight:** 200  
 Named as A's bench coach, October 26, 2004

Rene Lachemann returns to the A's coaching staff for the second consecutive season. After serving as the A's bench coach in 2005, Lachemann moved to first base in 2006. This is Lachemann's second stint with the A's as he was a member of Tony LaRussa's coaching staff from 1987-92, spending two seasons as the first base coach and four years at third base.

Lachemann's career in professional baseball spans 42 years and includes Major League managerial stints in Seattle (1981-83), Milwaukee (1984) and Florida (1993-96). His career record as a Major League manager stands at 428-559 (.434). This is the sixth time he has been on a coaching staff of a team that has reached postseason play (1986 with Boston; 1988-90; 92; 2006 with Oakland), including four World Series appearances. He was also a member of the American League's coaching staff for the 1987 and 1990 All-Star Games.

Prior to joining the A's, Lachemann served as the bench coach for the Seattle Mariners (2003-04) and Chicago Cubs (2000-02) and third base coach in St. Louis (1997-99), where he was reunited with Tony LaRussa.

Lachemann began his managerial career in 1973, spending five seasons in Oakland's minor league system. He also gained managerial experience during winter ball, managing in Puerto Rico, Venezuela and Mexico during the 1976-81 off-seasons. In 1978, he earned manager of the year honors at Mayaguez after leading the Puerto Rican team to the Caribbean World Series championship.

A former catcher, Lachemann was signed by the Kansas City Athletics in 1964 and made his Major League debut with the A's in 1965, spending the entire season in Kansas City. His first Major League hit was a pinch hit home run off Chicago's Gary Peters. He also appeared briefly in the Majors with the Athletics in both 1966 and 1968. In 118 big league contests, he hit .210 with nine home runs and 33 RBI.

Lachemann's brothers, Marcel and Bill, also have Major League coaching experience. Marcel served as Rene's pitching coach with the Florida Marlins in 1993 and when Marcel left the Marlins to manage the California Angels in May of 1994, it marked the second time in big league history two brothers were managing at the same time (1879 - Boston's Harry Wright and Providence's George Wright).

A native of Los Angeles, Lachemann attended Dorsey High School and the University of Southern California. He resides in Scottsdale, Ariz. with his wife, Lauri and has two sons, Jim and Britt, and three grandchildren.

**Gerald June Perry**

**Born:** Savannah, Georgia, October 30, 1960  
**Height:** 6-0 **Weight:** 210  
 Named as A's hitting coach, November 1, 2005

Gerald Perry is in his first season as the A's hitting coach and his seventh season as a hitting coach at the Major League level. He spent three seasons with the Seattle Mariners from 2000-02 and was with the Pittsburgh Pirates for the last three seasons.

In his first season as the Pirates hitting coach in 2003, the team batting average improved 23 points from .244 and a last place finish in 2002 to a .267 mark and a third place ranking in the National League in 2003. In his first season as the Mariners hitting coach in 2000, the team set a club record in walks (775). In 2001, the Mariners led the Major Leagues in on-base percentage (.360) and runs scored (927), while pacing the American League with a .288 batting average. In his final season in 2002, Seattle ranked fourth among AL teams with a .275 batting average. During his three-year stay in Seattle, the Mariners led the Major Leagues in on-base percentage (.357) and walks (2,018) and topped the American League in batting (.278) and runs (2,648).

Originally selected by Atlanta in the 11th round of the 1978 June draft, Perry made his Major League debut with the Braves in 1983 and doubled off San Francisco's Bill Laskey in his first at bat on August 11. He had a career high 12 home runs and 74 RBI with the Braves in 1987 and compiled his best batting averages with St. Louis in 1993 (.337) and 1994 (.325) when he saw most of his playing time as a pinch hitter. During his 13 big league seasons with Atlanta (1983-89), Kansas City (1990) and St. Louis (1991-95), he compiled a .265 batting average, 59 home runs and 396 RBI in 1193 games. In 1987, Perry set an Atlanta record with 42 stolen bases, the most by a full-time Major League first baseman since Rod Carew swiped 49 with Minnesota in 1976 (the club record was broken by Otis Nixon, who stole 72 bases in 1991). Perry was elected to the National League All-Star team in 1988 and went 0 for 1 in the game. He finished his career as the Cardinals all-time leader with 70 pinch hits.

Following his playing days, Perry spent three seasons in the Boston organization, serving as the hitting coach with Single-A Michigan in 1997, the hitting coach with Triple-A Pawtucket in 1998 and as the Red Sox minor league hitting coordinator in 1999.

Perry and his wife, Tara, have three children; daughters Portia (4/10/84) and Falon (8/8/85) and son Gerald, Jr. (10/5/90). He is a 1978 graduate of H.E. McCracken High School in Buffton, NC where he led the conference in batting in 1977 and was named conference MVP in 1978. Perry is the nephew of former Major Leaguer Dan Driessen.

**Ronald Washington****Born:** New Orleans, Louisiana, April 29, 1952**Height:** 5-11 **Weight:** 170

Named as A's first base coach, December 6, 1995; named third base coach, September 30, 1996.

Ron Washington is in his 11th season as A's coach. After serving as the A's first base coach in 1996, Ron moved across the diamond to third base in 1997 and has remained there ever since. In addition, Washington has also worked with the A's infielders and has been instrumental in the development of five-time Gold Glove third baseman, Eric Chavez. Washington came to the A's after five years in the New York Mets organization.

Washington's coaching career began in 1991 at Tidewater, the Mets Triple-A affiliate in the International League. He spent two seasons there before taking over as manager of New York's Single-A Columbia Bombers of the South Atlantic League. In 1993 he guided the Bombers to a 64-77 record and Columbia finished 59-76 in 1994. In 1995, he returned as a coach for the Mets Triple-A affiliate, now at Norfolk.

The former infielder spent all or parts of 10 seasons in the Major Leagues with Los Angeles, Minnesota, Baltimore, Cleveland and Houston. He made his debut with the Dodgers in 1977 and, despite hitting .368 in 10 games, did not return to the majors until 1981 with Minnesota. The New Orleans native hit .271 with a career high 5 HR and 39 RBI in his first full season in the majors in 1982 and he batted a career high .294 for the Twins in 1984. Washington was released by the Twins prior to the 1987 season and played 26 games for Baltimore that year. He played 69 games with Cleveland in 1988 and seven games for the Astros in 1989. Washington finished his professional playing career with the Texas Rangers Triple-A Oklahoma City farm team in 1990.

He graduated from John McDonogh High School in 1970 and attended Manatee Junior College. He was signed as a free agent by Kansas City out of the Royals Baseball Academy. Ron and his wife, Geraldine, live in New Orleans, Louisiana.

**Curtis Allen Young****Born:** Saginaw, Michigan, April 16, 1960**Height:** 6-1 **Weight:** 180

Named as A's pitching coach, December 2, 2003

Curt Young completed his third consecutive season as the A's pitching coach in 2006. The A's ranked fourth in the American League with a 4.21 ERA this year after finishing fourth with a 3.69 ERA last year. In Young's first season in 2004, the A's staff finished second in the AL with a 4.17 ERA. This is Young's 19th in the Oakland organization, which includes 12 years as a player and four years as a minor league coach.

Young began his coaching career in 2000 as the pitching coach at Double-A Midland. His first Midland staff compiled a 4.64 ERA which was the lowest figure posted by the club in 15 years. His 2001 staff bettered the previous year's figure by 24 points, finishing with a 4.40 ERA, and in 2002 the Rockhounds finished with a 3.88 ERA. Young was moved up to Triple-A Sacramento for the 2003 season and the River Cats posted the fourth best ERA in the Pacific Coast League (3.90) en route to the PCL Championship.

Young compiled a 69-53 record and a 4.31 ERA in 251 games, 162 starts, in an 11-year Major League career that included stints with Oakland (1983-91, 93), Kansas City (1992) and the New York Yankees (1992). He was originally drafted by the A's in the fourth round of the 1981 June draft and made his Major League debut in 1983. The left-hander went 13-9 with a 3.45 ERA in 1986 and led the team in victories, earning him an Opening Day start in 1987. He matched his career best in wins in 1987, posting a 13-7 record and a 4.08 ERA in a career high 31 starts. Young was also a member of the A's starting rotation when they won three consecutive American League pennants from 1988-90. He tossed two one-hitters during his career: October 5, 1986 against Kansas City and June 9, 1987 against Chicago.

Young graduated from Arthur Hill High School in Saginaw, Michigan, where he also starred as a quarterback, and attended Central Michigan University. In 1980, he pitched for the United States team in the World Amateur Baseball Tournament in Japan. Young makes his off-season home in Scottsdale, Arizona.

second compared to .289 (78 for 270) in all other spots in the order...had his best success hitting seventh where he batted .333 (53 for 159) with 16 home runs and 40 RBI...had six home runs and 18 RBI in 18 games against Texas and now has nine home runs and 32 RBI in 39 career games against the Rangers, his most home runs and RBI against any team...batted .130 (9 for 69)

ERA (6 er in 41.0 ip) in six starts in May...had the second lowest ERA in the AL in the month and it was his second lowest ERA ever in a month to his 1.02 ERA in August of 2001...made his 200<sup>th</sup> career start on June 1 against Minnesota and struck out Lew Ford in the sixth inning for his 1000<sup>th</sup> career strikeout...became the fourth pitcher in Oakland history (Blue, Stewart and Hunter) and the eighth pitcher in Athletics history (Plank, Waddell, Bender and Grove) to fan 1000...struck out a career high tying 11 batters in a 7-3 win on June 16 against Los Angeles (NL)...it was his 11<sup>th</sup> career start with 10 or more strikeouts...in Oakland history, only Vida Blue (21) has more career 10-strikeout games...that extended his winning streak to a season best six games (May 17-June 16)...it was his sixth career winning streak of five or more games (one 10-game winning streak, two nines, one eight, one six and one five)...followed that up by losing three consecutive starts from June 27 to July 7, despite posting a 2.91 ERA...that was the only time he put together consecutive losses in 2006...went 0 for 3 with two strikeouts in his two interleague starts on June 21 at Colorado and June 27 at San Diego...is now 1 for 29 (.034) with 15 strikeouts and three sacrifice hits in his career...tossed 128 pitches on July 2 against Arizona, equaling his most ever in a game (August 24, 2000 at Cleveland)... was the A's lone All-Star this year and retired the side in order on eight pitches in the fifth inning...it was the third time he has been named to the AL All-Star team...allowed a career high tying four home runs on August 9 against Texas (also April 29, 2004 at New York)...picked up his 100<sup>th</sup> career win in the A's 9-3 victory at Texas on August 25...took a no-hitter into the eighth inning for the third time in his career (also July 15, 2005 vs. Texas and September 13, 2002 vs. Seattle)...committed his only error of the season in that game, snapping a 76-game errorless streak dating back to his last error on July 21, 2004 at Seattle...that was the sec-
