Spent three seasons with Minnesota from 2006 through 2008 before missing the 2009 season following right shoulder surgery...was 18-25 with a 5.12 ERA in 96 games, 60 starts...started one game for the Twins in the ALDS against Oakland in 2006 after making his Major League debut earlier in the season...was named American League Rookie of the Month in September, 2006 after going 4-1 with a 2.63 ERA...led the International League with 168 strikeouts for Triple-A Rochester in 2005...was the South Atlantic League's Most Valuable Pitcher in 2001 after leading all San Francisco minor leaguers in wins (16), ERA (2.49) and strikeouts (178) in 27 starts with Single-A Hagerstown...was originally drafted by the Giants in the first round (21st selection overall) of the 2000 draft before he was dealt to the Twins with Joe Nathan and Francisco Liriano for A.J. Pierzynski following the 2003 season.

2009 HIGHLIGHTS

Missed the entire season recovering from surgery on his right shoulder...underwent arthroscopic surgery on February 25 to repair partial tears to the labrum and rotator cuff in his right shoulder...the procedure was performed by Dr. Coco Eaton in St. Petersburg, Florida...made one rehabilitation appearance on September 6 for Single-A Fort Myers, tossing 1.0 scoreless frame.

CAREER

2008—Appeared primarily in relief in his second straight full season with the Twins...pitched in a career-high 47 games...started his first 12 games before going to the bullpen...went 2-6 with a 5.97 ERA in 12 starts and 1-1 with a 5.88 mark in 35 relief outings...tossed 6.0 or more innings in each of his first three starts, going 1-2 with a 2.84 ERA from April 1-12...tied his season-high with 7.0 innings and fanned a season-high eight batters, April 29 vs. Chicago...made his second career relief appearance (first of the season) and recorded the win with 2.2 innings of scoreless relief, June 4 vs. Baltimore...posted a 2.40 ERA over 10 appearances in August...tossed a career relief-high 3.2 frames on September 19 at Tampa Bay, yielding three runs on a Carlos Pena homer.

2007—Made 31 appearances, including 30 starts, for the Twins in his first full season at the Big League level...pitched 6.0 or more innings in 15 of 30 starts and 7.0 or more in eight starts...compiled 11 quality starts...had a 4.16 run support average, second lowest in the American League...did not record a decision while posting a 1.00 ERA in three starts, April 26-May 8...tied his career high with a four-game win streak, earning the victory in four consecutive starts, May 13-29...went 4-0 with a 3.04 ERA, 29 strikeouts and nine walks in 23.2 innings during that span...recorded a career-high 11 strikeouts over 7.0 frames, May 18 at Milwaukee...went 12 starts without a win from June 16 to August 23...tossed a career-high 7.2 innings, allowing two runs on five hits, July 21 vs. Los Angeles...lasted just 1.2 frames (his shortest career start) after allowing five runs on seven hits, September 2 vs. Kansas City.

2006—Made his Major League debut and started 18 games overall in three stints with Minnesota...started one game for the Twins during the ALDS, earning a no decision in a Game 2 loss to Oakland despite recording a quality start...tossed 6.0 innings and allowed two runs in a 5-2 decision...recalled from Triple-A Rochester on May 19 and made his Major League debut in a start at Milwaukee on May 21...did not factor in the Twins 5-3 loss, tossing 6.0 innings of one-run ball...struck out eight batters, setting a record for most strikeouts by a Twin in his Major League debut...recorded his first Big League win in his second start, May 27 vs. Seattle...optioned to Rochester, July 5...recalled to make a spot start on August 2 and optioned back after that game...recalled again August 10 for the rest of the season...

in five starts from September 4-25, went 4-0 with a 2.20 ERA...named American League Rookie of the Month for September, finishing with a 4-1 record, a 2.63 ERA and 30 strikeouts in six starts...started 14 games over three stints with Rochester...named International League Pitcher of the Week, April 6-13, after going 1-1 with a 1.50 ERA and 13 strikeouts over two starts.

2005—Spent the entire season at Triple-A Rochester...led the International League with 168 strikeouts...led Rochester in starts (28), wins (11), innings pitched (160.1) and strikeouts (168)...pitched 6.0 or more innings in 17 of his 28 starts...compiled 13 quality starts...earned Twins Minor League Player of the Week honors, April 30-May 6, going 2-0 with a 3.75 ERA and 14 strikeouts compared to three walks in two starts during that span...tossed 6.0 or more frames in six consecutive starts, going 2-2 with a 3.41 ERA, May 21 to June 18...struck out a season-high 13 batters, June 12 vs. Indianapolis.

2004—In his first season in the Twins organization, made 27 starts for Double-A New Britain and one for Triple-A Rochester...began the season at Double-A New Britain...led the club in wins (12), starts (27), innings pitched (154.1) and strikeouts (146)...pitched 6.0 or more innings in 15 of the 27 starts...logged 12 quality starts...had six consecutive quality starts, going 4-1 with a 2.35 ERA from May 17-June 12...had a season-high, seven-game win streak, July 23-August 30...went 7-0 with a 2.39 ERA in eight starts during that span...had a season-high 12 strikeouts, August 2 vs. Norwich...promoted to Triple-A Rochester on September 3...made one start, earning the win with 7.0 innings of one-run ball with strikeouts on September 4 at Pawtucket.

2003—Led San Francisco's Double-A Norwich club in games started (24) and strikeouts (103) and was second in wins (7) and innings pitched (135.0)...also made four starts for Triple-A Fresno...began the season at Double-A Norwich...did not allow more than two earned runs in seven consecutive starts to begin the campaign (April 6-May 11), going 1-3 with a 2.09 ERA...promoted to Triple-A Fresno on August 15...prior to the season, was rated the sixth best prospect in the Giants organization by *Baseball America*...after the season, pitched for Grand Canyon in the Arizona Fall League...was traded to Minnesota along with RHP Joe Nathan and LHP Francisco Liriano in exchange for catcher A.J. Pierzynski and cash, November 14.

2002—Finished second in the California League with a 2.88 ERA in 23 starts with Single-A San Jose...also made five starts for Double-A Shreveport...ranked second among Giants minor leaguers in strikeouts (162), tied for second in wins (9) and seventh in ERA (3.30)...began the season at Double-A Shreveport and was transferred to Single-A San Jose on May 2...held hitters to a .195 average at San Jose...named San Jose's Co-Player of the Month for June, going 3-0 with a 2.38 ERA in six starts...went 3-1 with a 1.95 ERA in five starts, July 31-August 23.

2001—Named San Francisco's Organizational Player of the Year by *USA Today* after leading all Giants minor leaguers in wins (16), ERA (2.49) and strikeouts (178) in 27 starts with Single-A Hagerstown...also selected as the South Atlantic League's Most Valuable Pitcher and a postseason All-Star and was named to SportsTicker's All-Teen team...led the SAL in wins, was second in strikeouts and sixth in ERA...held opponents to a .192 average...named Hagerstown's Player of the Month for April, June and July...strung together a season-high, 10-game win streak from May 28-August 2...went 10-0 with a 1.43 ERA in 13 starts during that span...logged a season-high 13 strikeouts, June 13 vs. Kannapolis.

2000—Spent his first professional season with Short-A Salem-Keizer...averaged 11.2 strikeouts per nine innings.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

Spent the first eight years of his professional career with the Florida Marlins organization before being traded to Boston following the 2009 season...saw Major League action in parts of five seasons from 2005 to 2009...finished the 2009 season with a career best 104-game errorless streak...had career highs in batting (.296), home runs (18) and RBI (63) in 2007...knocked a pinch-hit grand slam off Al Reyes in his first career at bat, August 31, 2005 against St. Louis...became the first player in ML history to club a pinch-hit grand slam in his first at bat, and the second with a grand slam in his first at bat, joining Bill Duggleby (April 21, 1898 with Philadelphia).

2009 HIGHLIGHTS

Played all 129 of his games with the Marlins...missed time at the end of the season due to an intercostal strain in his right side...drew a career-high 56 walks, which was third most on the club...began the season as the starting left fielder and made 40 starts overall at that position...started 73 of his last 91 games in right field...posted a .995 fielding percentage (1 error in 205 chance), which ranked sixth best among all National League outfielders...did not commit an error in his last 104 games and 183 total chances beginning April 27...that marks the longest errorless streak of his career...his previous best was 103 total chances over 52 tilts, June 6-August 6, 2008...knocked a game-tying two-run homer in the ninth and game-winning three-run homer in the 11th on April 18 at Washington in a 9-6 win, collecting a career-high five RBI...became the first Marlin in club history to hit a ninth-inning, game-tying home run and game-winning homer in the same game...was the first player to hit a game-tying homer in the ninth inning and a game-winning homer in extra innings since Adrian Beltre accomplished the feat for Los Angeles (NL) against Atlanta on August 20, 2004...hit his first career, walk-off home run, a solo shot in a 4-3 win June 9 vs. St. Louis...it marked his first-career walk-off hit...missed 28 of the club's final 29 games with an intercostal strain in his right side but did not go on the disabled list...suffered the strain September 2...had one pinch-hit appearance after that on September 28 at Atlanta (0 for 1).

CAREER

2008—Posted career highs in games (142), at bats (502) and triples (3)...went 6 for 13 (.462) with the bases loaded, which ranked ninth best in the National League...batted at a .375 (3 for 8) clip as a pinch-hitter...collected his second career homer in the pinch, July 25 at Chicago, a game-winning solo shot off Bob Howry in the top of the ninth...started a career high 124 games in right field...began the season on the disabled list with a left hamstring strain and was out from March 21 to May 13...was part of four back-to-back home run combos: April 11 at Houston (Mike Jacobs), May 12 at Cincinnati (Hanley Ramirez), May 25 vs. San Francisco (G1) (Jorge Cantu) and July 11 at Los Angeles (Cantu)...connected for two home runs, April 11 at Houston...it marked his first career multi-homer game...accomplished the feat again, July 26 at Chicago...strung together a career-best, 12-game hitting streak from June 12-25...batted .367 (18 for 49) with five doubles, two home runs and eight RBI over the streak.

2007—Finished third among Marlins regulars with a .296 batting average...set career highs in most offensive categories, including average, home runs (18) and RBI (63)...appeared in 116 games in right field, accumulating seven outfield assists...batted .340 with 10 home runs and 36 RBI in 72 games after the All-Star Break...his second half clip ranked ninth in the National League and first among team qualifiers...raised his average from .231 to .296...missed the first six weeks of the season with a bone bruise (right knee) suffered during Spring Training...reinstated from 15-day disabled list and returned from rehab on May 14...knocked his second career grand slam, June 8 vs. Tampa Bay...hit safely in

10 straight games, August 16-26 (.457, 16 for 35, three home runs, seven RBI) and tallied an 11-game streak from September 3-15 (.340, 16 for 47, three home runs and seven RBI).

2006—Spent his first full season with Florida, missing time with a right hip flexor...appeared in 85 games, including 78 starts, in right field and nine games, including six starts, in center...was placed on the 15-day disabled list April 17, retroactive to April 12, with a right hip flexor...reinstated from the DL May 22...hit .345 with one home run and eight RBI in 24 June games...set a career high with four hits, June 22 at Baltimore.

2005—Made his Big League debut August 31 against St. Louis, hitting a pinch-hit grand slam in his first at bat of Al Reyes...became the first player in Major League history to hit a pinch-hit grand slam in his first at bat and the second to hit a grand slam in his first ML at bat, joining Philadelphia's Bill Duggleby (April 21, 1898)...also became just the second Marlin to hit a home run in his first Big League at-bat, joining Mitch Lyden (June 16, 1993)...spent most of the year with Double-A Carolina and was named to the Southern League All-Star team...led the Florida organization and the Southern League and finished third overall in the minor leagues with 111 walks with Carolina...selected to play in the All-Star Futures Game but did not appear...named MVP of the Southern League All-Star Game, going 3 for 5 with a double, four RBI and two runs...garnered Marlins Hitter of the Month honors for April, hitting .274 with four doubles, eight home runs, 17 RBI, 20 runs and 20 walks...earned Southern League Player of the Week honors for July 18-24, batting .450 (9 for 20) with four doubles, one triple, one home run, six RBI and seven runs...entered the season ranked as the Marlins top prospect according to *Baseball America*, the second consecutive year he earned the top spot.

2004—Named an outfielder in the Florida State League All-Star Game with Single-A Jupiter...had a stint on the DL from May 11 to June 7.

2003—Led the South Atlantic League with 80 walks and ranked fourth with a .387 on-base percentage...topped Single-A Greensboro in batting average (.284), runs (73), hits (133), doubles (23), triples (5), walks, on-base percentage and hit by pitch (2)...named to the SportsTicker All-Teen Team.

2002—Began his professional career with 51 games between Rookie-level Gulf Coast Marlins and Short-A Jamestown.
