CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

Was drafted by Kansas City in the ninth round of the 2011 draft...is 36-27 with a 4.31 ERA in 93 games, including 89 starts, in four professional seasons...made his Major League debut with two stints with the Royals in 2014...compiled a 43.88 ERA in two games, including one start...was named Pitcher of the Year at Triple-A Omaha in 2014 and also earned Pacific Coast League Postseason MVP honors after tossing a two-hit shutout to clinch the PCL title...earned Northwest Arkansas Pitcher of the Year honors in 2013 and was a Pioneer League All-Star in 2011.

2014 HIGHLIGHTS

Had two stints with the Royals, but pitched a majority of the season at Triple-A Omaha...made his Major League debut May 3, pitching 2.0 innings of relief vs. Detroit...he also made his first ML start May 31 at Toronto, taking the loss after tossing the first 2/3 of an inning...tabbed Omaha Pitcher of the Year, tying for second in the Pacific Coast League with 12 victories and ranking seventh in ERA (3.88) and 14th in innings pitched (139.0)...tossed a two-hit shutout in the Pacific Coast League Championship-clinching game, defeating Reno, 4-0...named PCL Postseason MVP, going 3-0 with an 0.75 ERA with three walks and 24 strikeouts in three playoff starts...posted a 5-0 record and a 3.66 ERA over his final six starts of the year...also went 4-0 with a 2.13 ERA over five starts in May.

CAREER

2013—Named Northwest Arkansas Pitcher of the Year after being promoted to Double-A on June 1...tossed one of only six nine-inning shutouts in the Texas League, blanking Arkansas (7-0) on July 24...was named TL Pitcher of the Week on July 29...allowed just 11 walks in 103.2 innings with the Naturals (0.95 per nine innings), which was the fewest in the Texas League among hurlers that recorded at least 100.0 innings.

2012—Ranked among the Midwest League leaders in innings (fourth) and strikeouts (fifth).

2011—Earned Pioneer League All-Star honors...finished second in the league in ERA and innings, tied for fourth in wins and tied for eighth in strikeouts

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

Has appeared in the Major Leagues with Boston (2010-14) and Chicago (2014)...was Boston's youngest player to appear in a game in each of the 2010, 2011, and 2012 seasons...was a member of the 2013 Red Sox World Series championship club...is 28-23 with three saves and a 4.78 ERA in 102 games (73 starts) at the big league level...made his big league debut in 2010 with the Red Sox, going 2-2 with two saves and a 4.32 ERA in 12 games (three starts)...has the most wins ever for a Venezuelan-born Red Sox pitcher with 26...made four appearances during the 2013 postseason, going 1-0 with a 1.93 ERA...earned the victory in Game Four of the World Series vs. St. Louis...was named the 2010 Red Sox Minor League Pitcher of the Year after going 8-3 with a 2.81 ERA in 17 games (16 starts) between Double-A Portland and Triple-A Pawtucket...named the Portland Sea Dogs Pitcher of the Year in his first season at the Double-A level in 2009...went 8-6 with a 3.35 ERA...honored as the Red Sox Minor League Latin Program Pitcher of the Year after going 7-1 with a 0.97 ERA in 13 starts for the Venezuelan Summer League Red Sox in 2005.

2014 HIGHLIGHTS

Was acquired by the Cubs from Boston July 30 for a player to be named (Marco Hernandez) and made four starts for Chicago, going 2-1 with a 3.98 ERA...between the Red Sox and Cubs, was 4-5 with a 5.54 ERA in 21 games (14 starts)...right-handed hitters batted .257 against him...left-handed batters hit .333...posted a 2.55 ERA in five games (four starts) against NL Central opponents...the opposition batted .194 when facing him for the third time in a game...all told, walked 33 batters and struck out 51 in 79.2 major league innings...allowed 12 home runs...was placed on the 15-day disabled list with a right

calf strain when he joined the Cubs, and combined to make three rehab starts between Triple-A Iowa and Double-A Tennessee...picked up the win in his Cubs debut after he was reinstated from the disabled list, Aug. 30 vs. St. Louis (game one)...allowed one run in 7.0 innings in Chicago's 5-1 victory...earned the win Sept. 13 at Pittsburgh, tossing 6.0-scoreless innings while scattering just four hits in Chicago's 6-4 victory...began the year with Boston and was 2-4 with a 5.12 ERA in nine starts before he landed on the 15-day disabled list with a left shoulder strain May 21...struck out a season-high seven hitters in 6.2 innings, April 19 vs. Baltimore...made three rehab appearances between Double-A Portland and Triple-A Pawtucket (2.63 ERA) before he was reinstated from the DL June 20...his final appearance with Boston was on July 28 vs. Toronto...pitched 0.2 innings out of the bullpen and allowed six runs...was traded to Chicago two days later.

CAREER

2013—Went 11-6 with a 4.32 ERA in 29 appearances (27 starts) for the World Series champion Red Sox...it marked his second double-digit win campaign in as many seasons as a full-time starter...struck out 139 hitters while walking 71 in 162.1 innings of work...surrendered 13 homers...set career-highs in innings pitched and quality starts (16), while matching his career-highs in wins and appearances (also 2012)...held an opponent without an extra-base hit six times, tied for the third-most such starts by an American League left-hander...averaged 7.71 strikeouts per 9.0 innings, good for 10th-most among Major League southpaws...posted a 3.87 ERA in his 27 starts and a 14.85 ERA in two relief outings...had a 3.84 ERA in 15 games (14 starts) at home compared to a 4.94 mark on the road...appeared in four games during the postseason, helping the Red Sox win the World Series...tossed 2.0-scoreless innings of relief in Game Four vs. St. Louis to earn the victory.

2012—Led the Red Sox with 167 strikeouts and tied for the team lead with 11 wins in his first full season at the Major League level...went 11-10 with a 4.86 ERA while making a career-high 29 starts...struck out 167 while walking 71 in 161.0 innings of work...averaged 9.34 strikeouts per nine innings, good for fourth-most among Major Leaguers with at least 160.0 innings pitched...that was the best-ever strikeout rate by a Red Sox pitcher under 25 years old in a season (min. 140.0 ip)...his 167 punch outs were the most by a Red Sox hurler in his age 24 season or younger since Roger Clemens fanned 256 batters in 1987...struck out a career-high 11 hitters, Sept. 23 vs. Baltimore...was the youngest Red Sox southpaw to punch out 11 in a game since Ken Brett (22 years old) did so, Sept. 19, 1967 vs. Washington...received 6.76 runs of support per nine innings, which was second-highest in the majors (min. 150.0 ip)...on May 1 vs. Oakland, he became the first Red Sox player with eight strikeouts in 4.0 innings or less since Tim Wakefield on June 1, 2003 at Toronto...was on Boston's 15-day disabled list from Aug. 10-25 with a right knee contusion.

2011—Began the season on the disabled list, making only 11 big league relief appearances during the campaign...had no record and a 6.10 ERA with the Red Sox...was on the 15-day DL from March 22 to April 8 with left forearm inflammation...was optioned to Triple-A Pawtucket April 17...recalled Sept. 1 and made eight relief appearances...did not allow a run in five of his last eight games...recorded his third-career save with a perfect 14th inning in the nightcap of a twinbill at New York (AL) Sept. 25...held righties to a .238 average and a .286 slugging percentage while with Boston...combined to go 3-5 with a 3.96 ERA in 20 games (18 starts) between Pawtucket, Double-A Portland and Single-A Lowell...spent the majority of the season at Pawtucket, going 2-5 with a 4.22 ERA and 61 strikeouts in 18 games (16 starts)...limited Triple-A foes to a .241 average, including a .212 mark against righties...following the season, was ranked as the No. 2 left-handed pitcher in Boston's farm system by *Baseball America*.

2010—Made his major league debut in his sixth season of professional ball...was named the Red Sox Minor League Pitcher of the Year after going 8-3 with a 2.81 ERA in 17 games (16 starts) between Triple-A Pawtucket and Double-A Portland...went 2-2 with two saves and a 4.32 ERA in 12 games (three starts) at the big league level...earned the victory in his ML debut June 18 vs. Los Angeles (NL)...allowed five runs (three earned) in 5.0 innings of work...became the first Red Sox pitcher to earn the victory in his ML debut since Michael Bowden (2008)...recorded the final two outs, Aug. 14 at Texas, to record his first career ML save...was shut down for the season Aug. 31 due to a strained upper left pectoral muscle...in the minors, he held opponents to two earned runs or less in 12 of his 16 starts...went 4-0 with a 2.51 ERA in eight starts with Portland before being promoted to Pawtucket...following the season, was ranked by *Baseball America* as the No. 8 prospect in the Red Sox farm system.

2009—Named the Portland Sea Dogs Pitcher of the Year in his first season at the Double-A level...went 8-6 with a 3.35 ERA in 26 starts...ranked second among Eastern League qualifiers and seventh in the Red Sox system in ERA...finished eighth in the league with a team-high 101 strikeouts and ranked fourth among starters with a 7.51 strikeouts per nine innings...placed on the disabled list June 16 (retro to June 13) with a calf strain...reinstated June 23...recorded his first-career complete game with a 7.0-inning shutout at New Britain July 22...posted a 1.74 ERA in four games (three starts) for Magallanes for the Venezuelan Winter League.

2008—Spent the majority of the season with Single-A Greenville before a late-season promotion to Single-A Lancaster...all told, went 13-9 with a 3.69 ERA and a career-high 138 strikeouts in 26 starts...combined to lead all Red Sox minor leaguers in strikeouts while his wins and 129.1 innings pitched ranked third...was one of four Greenville players selected to the South Atlantic League All-Star Game in Greensboro, N.C...added to the Red Sox 40-man roster Nov. 20.

2007—Split the season between Single-A Greenville and Short-A Lowell, going 4-10 with a 7.45 ERA in 19 starts...landed on Greenville's seven-day disabled list July 13-21 with an elbow strain...was 0-1 with an 18.00 ERA in his first two starts with Lowell before going 1-2 with a 3.60 ERA in his final six starts.

2006—In his first professional season in the United States, went 4-3 with a 2.92 ERA and 43 strikeouts in 13 starts between the Red Sox Gulf Coast Rookie League team and Short-A Lowell...led the Gulf Coast League with 11 starts and tied for fourth in innings pitched (53.2)...promoted to Lowell Aug. 28 before returning to pitch in the GCL playoffs, helping the Red Sox to the championship.

2005—Named the Red Sox Minor League Latin Program Pitcher of the Year after going 7-1 with a 0.97 ERA in 13 starts for the Venezuelan Summer League Red Sox.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

Has pitched for five teams in nine seasons in the majors... began his career with Cleveland (2006-08) and has also pitched for San Diego (2009-10), Florida/Miami (2011-12), St. Louis (2012-13) and Boston (2014)...has 393 strikeouts and 82 walks in his career for a strikeout-to-walk ratio of 4.79...that is the best mark in modern (beginning in 1990) Major League history among pitchers with at least 400 innings pitched...using the same minimum, his average of 1.48 walks per nine innings is fourth lowest since 1930...since 2009, he ranks third among ML relievers in innings pitched (412.2) and walks per nine innings (1.5) and seventh in strikeout-to-walk ratio (4.9)...

has made 60 or more appearances in each of the last four seasons (2011-14) and five of the last six seasons with the exception being 2010 (59 games)...helped the Cardinals to the 2013 National League pennant...is 1-0 with a 2.79 ERA in 11 career postseason games, all with the Cardinals in 2012 and 2013.

since 2011)...ended the season posting a 2.08 ERA over his final 42 games (since June 6) after beginning the year with a 7.29 ERA in his first 22 games...did not allow a run in 32 of his final 42 games...allowed runs in nine of his first 22 games of the year...did not allow an ER in 14 consecutive appearances from July 27-Aug. 22 (11.0 ip)...that stretch lowered his season ERA from 5.45 on July 24 to 4.18 on Aug. 22...recorded eight saves in nine chances overall, including five in his last seven games of the season...allowed six home runs on the season, all of which came in his first 31 appearances (29.2 ip)...did not allow a home run over his final 33 games (30.1 ip)...posted a 2.76 ERA in 31 road games compared to a 4.99 ERA in 33 games at Fenway Park...earned his first win as a Red Sox in the club's walk-off victory April 20 vs. Baltimore...his second victory came in another Sox come-from-behind win May 26 at Atlanta (overcame a five-run deficit).

CAREER

2013—Went 2-1 with 37 saves and a career-low 2.78 ERA in 65 games for the National League Champion Cardinals...led all Major League relievers with a 0.70 walks per nine innings ratio (5 bb) and led all NL relievers with a strikeout-to-walk ratio of 9.2...ranked fifth among NL relievers in saves with 37 and sixth with a 90.2 save percentage...converted each of his first 21 save chances of the season...posted a 1.01 WHIP, the 12th-best mark among NL relievers and the second-lowest mark of his career (0.93 in 2010)...stranded 21 of his 25 inherited runners (84.0%)...50 of his 65 appearances were scoreless...pitched more than 1.0 inning nine times, including four outings of 2.0 innings...had four multiple inning saves: April 18 at Philadelphia (1.1 ip), June 17 vs. Chicago (1.1), Aug. 11 vs. Chicago (2.0) and Aug. 21 at Milwaukee (1.1)...had a season-best 20.1-inning scoreless streak that spanned 18 games from July 5-Aug. 19...converted 11 of 12 save opportunities in that span...had 11 strikeouts compared to one walk and held opponents to a .192 average over that stretch...was on the Cardinals' NLDS, NLCS and World Series rosters but appeared in only two games...threw 1.0 scoreless inning in Game 2 of the NLDS vs. Pittsburgh Oct. 4...allowed a solo home run to A.J. Ellis in Game 5 of the NLCS at Los Angeles Oct. 16...did not appear in the World Series against Boston.

2012—Posted a 15-8 record with a 4.15 ERA and one complete game in 32 starts, his best campaign in a Giants uniform...his 15 wins were his most with the Giants and the most he had since winning 16 games with the A's in 2006...the Giants went 21-11 (.656) in his starts, matching Matt Cain for the most club victories in his starts...San Francisco won his last 11 outings of the season...the last time the Giants won 11-consecutive starts by one of their pitchers was when they won 11-straight when Bill Swift started from April 6 to June 27, 1992 (source: Stats, LLC)...went 7-0 with a 3.92 ERA in his last 11 starts of the season...finished the season with a seven-game win streak, which marked his longest win streak in a Giants uniform and his longest since an eight-game win streak from June 28-Aug. 4, 2005...received an average of 5.96 runs of support in his starts, which was the highest average on the Giants' staff and the third highest figure in the National League...tossed his fifth career complete game shutout in his very first start, allowing just four hits with no walks in the Giants' 7-0 win at Colorado...ended his streak of 274 consecutive starts without a shutout, the third-longest drought in Major League history...he became just the ninth opponent and first Giant to throw a shutout at Coors Field...had an outstanding postseason, going 2-0 with a 1.69 ERA in three starts...had his best start in a Giants uniform in Game 5 of the NLCS at St. Louis, tossing 7.2-scoreless innings with one walk and six strikeouts in the Giants' 5-0 possible elimination game victory...became just the fourth Giants pitcher to not allow a run with one or fewer walks in 7.0-or-more innings in a postseason game during the live ball era (since 1920)...the other Giants pitchers to accomplish the feat are: Tim Lincecum (2010 NLDS vs. Atlanta), Jason Schmidt (2003 NLDS vs. Florida) and Jack Scott (1922 WS vs. New York-AL)...made his first-ever World Series appearance in Game 1 against Detroit, matching up with Justin Verlander...ended his season with the Giants winning his last 14 starts, including all three in the postseason.

2011—Had an injury plagued season for the first time in his career and spent most of the season either on the disabled list or in the minors...went 3-4 with a 5.87 ERA in 13 games, nine starts, at the Major League level, his fewest games he's ever appeared in the big leagues...the night before Opening Day was in a two-car wreck in West Hollywood, traveling through an intersection on Sunset Blvd., when a taxi ran a light while trying to make a left turn...was examined by a head and neck specialist at Cedars Sinai Medical Center and X-rays came back negative...pitching four days after his violent collision, Zito showed little effects of whiplash, allowing just three runs on three hits through 6.0 innings in his first start of the season on April 3 at Los Angeles (NL)...did not receive a decision...two starts later on April 16 at Arizona, left in the 2nd inning after fielding a pop out bunt from pitcher Joe Saunders...made one pitch after that and after team athletic trainer Dave Groeschner examined him, he was removed from the game...was later diagnosed with a right mid foot sprain (X-rays came back negative), that placed him on the 15-day disabled list the next day...his 12-year career streak of never missing a start due to an injury came to an end as he made his first-ever appearance on the disabled list...traveled back to San Francisco following the series with the D-Backs to have his ankle examined by team doctors...X-rays ruled out a fracture, but had to wear an immobilization boot for two weeks...was examined by Carolina

Panthers' team orthopedist, Dr. Robert Anderson on April 27 in North Carolina and was told he could begin bearing weight on his foot and no longer had to wear an immobilization boot...made four rehab starts (two with Single-A San Jose and two with Triple-A Fresno) from June 6-24...returned from his rehab assignment and was activated off the disabled list June 25...was placed on the disabled list for the second time Aug. 1 after re-injuring his sprained right ankle...making a rehab start for Fresno Aug. 13, he had to be helped off field after re-injuring his ankle again...turned his right ankle while running towards home to back up plate on ground ball to right field...X-rays came back negative...was activated from the 15-day disabled list Sept. 11...missed a total of 91 games due to the injury...was moved to the bullpen for the third time in his career (also Aug., 2007 and Aug. 2010) after returning from his second DL stint and made four relief appearances for the Giants.

2010—After a strong start to the season, struggled down the stretch, finishing campaign with a 9-14 record and a 4.15 ERA in 34 games, including 33 starts...did not reach the double-digit win plateau for the first time since his rookie season in 2000...snapped nine-straight years of 10-plus victories per season...kicked off the campaign by posting a perfect 5-0 record in his first six starts...became the first Giants pitcher to win his first five decisions in a season since Noah Lowry in 2004...after starting off 5-0, went just 4-14 with a 4.87 ERA over his final 28 games...was 7-2 through his first 13 starts, matching the most wins he's ever had in his first 13 starts of a season...he was 7-2 through 13 starts in 2002 and 7-4 in 2003 (Elias)...made just the second relief appearance of his career Aug. 25 vs. Cincinnati, taking the mound just three days after throwing 73 pitches in St. Louis...was summoned in the 12th inning of an 11-11 tie game, however gave up the winning run after Joey Votto drove in the game-winner with a ground ball single to right field...lost a career-high nine-straight decisions from July 21-Sept. 14, going 0-9 with a 5.00 ERA in 12 games, 11 starts...the nine-straight losses were the most by a Giants pitcher for a single season since Terry Mulholland also dropped nine-straight from May 11-July 29, 1995...was left off San Francisco's roster for the postseason.

2009—Went 10-13 with a 4.03 ERA in 33 starts...was tabbed with the Majors' second-lowest run support, receiving an average of just 3.38 runs...only Cincinnati's Aaron Harang had a lower mark (3.22)...on his ninth-straight Opening Day roster, Zito pitched as the Giants' number four starter for the majority of the season...pitched an 8.0-inning complete game May 19 at San Diego, however was charged with the loss after surrendering a pair of solo home runs in the Giants' 2-1 defeat...it marked his 10th career complete game and his first since Aug. 7, 2003 at Detroit, while pitching for Oakland...had gone 185-straight starts without recording a complete game, which according to Elias, was the second-longest streak in Major League history, behind former Giant Kirk Rueter (193-straight starts without CG from 1999 to end of his career in 2005)...pitched one of his best games of the year June 21 against Texas in a 3-2 victory at AT&T Park...took a no-hitter into the seventh inning before allowing a two-run home run to Andruw Jones (his second batter faced in inning)...it marked fourth time in his career he had a no-hitter through 6.0 innings.

2008—Was the Giants' Opening Day starter for the second straight year and went 10-17 with a 5.15 ERA in 32 games, all starts, for San Francisco...lost a career-high 17 decisions, the most losses by a Giants pitcher since Dave LaPoint went 7-17 in 1985...was one loss shy of matching San Francisco's record for losses in a season, set by Ray Sadecki in 1968 (18)...set a franchise mark for the most losses prior to the All-Star Break with 12 defeats (first All-Star Game was in 1933)...was removed from the rotation for one turn following his April 27 start, marking the first time in his career that he missed a start...opened the year 0-6 with a 7.53 ERA in first seven outings...became one of only three pitchers since 1956 to have an 0-6 record through the month of April, joining Dave Stewart (1984) and Mike Maroth (2003)...was also the first Giant since Rod Beck went 0-9 in 1996 to drop his first six decisions.

2007—Suffered his first losing season of his career, going 11-13 with a 4.53 ERA in 34 games, 33 starts...led the Giants in starts, while placing second in wins, innings, and average against (.244)...was also third on staff with 131 strikeouts...was the third San Francisco hurler to make his Giants debut in an Opening Day assignment, joining Mike Krukow (1983 vs. San Diego) and Bill Swift (1992 at Los Angeles)...posted his first win in a Giants uniform April 6 at Colorado, tossing 6.0-scoreless frames in an 8-0 victory...it was only the second San Francisco shutout in Coors Field history...made first career relief appearance (regular or post season) Aug. 5 in San Diego, working a perfect seventh inning...led the pitching staff in batting average, while tying for the lead for hits by pitchers with Matt Morris...collected his first National League hit May 7, a single off NY's Oliver Perez.

2006—Went 16-10 with a 3.83 ERA in 34 starts in his final season with the A's...tied for the American League lead in games started, ranked third in innings pitched (221.0), tied for eighth in wins and 10th in ERA...also led the AL in pitches thrown (3665), ranked second in walks (99) and third in hit batters (13) and grounded into double plays (31)...the hit batters matched his career high and the Oakland record that he set in 2001 and 2005...has hit 66 batters as an Athletic, which is an Oakland record...had the seventh lowest opponents average with runners in scoring position in the AL (.227)...was 10-3 with a 2.97 ERA in 17 starts on the road compared to 6-7 with a 4.71 ERA in 18 starts in Oakland...ranked second in the AL in road ERA and tied for second in road wins...was 8-6 with a 3.29 ERA in 19 starts before the All-Star Break and 8-4 with a 4.55 ERA in 15 starts after the break...had the eighth lowest run support in the AL (4.97)...the A's scored just four runs while he was pitching in his 10 losses...left with a lead five times only to have the bullpen blow the save...went 9-4 with a 2.52 ERA over a 16-start stretch from May 1 to July 19...made his second consecutive Opening Day start April 3 against New York...went 3-1 with a 1.32 ERA in six starts in May...had the second lowest ERA in the AL in the month...made his 200th career start on June 1 against Minnesota and struck out Lew Ford in the sixth inning for his 1000th career strikeout...became the fourth pitcher in Oakland history (Blue, Stewart and Hunter) and the eighth pitcher in Athletics history (Plank, Waddell, Bender and Grove) to fan 1000...struck out a career high tying 11 batters in a 7-3 win on June 16 against Los Angeles (NL)...was the A's lone All-Star and retired the side in order on eight pitches in the fifth inning...it was the third time he has been named to the AL All-Star team...picked up his 100th career win in the A's 9-3 victory at Texas on August 25...took a no-hitter into the eighth inning for the third time in his career (also July 15, 2005 vs. Texas and September 13, 2002 vs. Seattle)...committed his only error of the season in that game, snapping a 76-game errorless streak dating back to his last error on July 21, 2004 at Seattle...that was the second longest errorless streak by a starting pitcher in Oakland history (115, Rick Langford)...went 1-1 with a 4.63 ERA in two postseason starts...the win came in the A's 3-2 victory in Game 1 of the ALDS at Minnesota (8.0 ip, 4 h, 1 r, 1 er, 3 bb, 1 so)...then took the loss in a 5-1 decision to Detroit in Game 1 of the ALCS (3.2 ip, 7 h, 5 r, 5 er, 3 bb, 0 so).

2005—Was 14-13 with a 3.86 ERA in 35 starts for the A's...matched his career highs in games started and hit batters (13)...the hit batters tied his own Oakland single season record, which he set in 2001...led the A's in losses, games started, innings pitched (228.1), runs (106), earned runs (98), hit batters, walks (89) and strikeouts (171) and tied for the team lead in wins and home runs (26)...tied for the American League lead in games started, ranked second in opponents batting average (.221) and slugging percentage (.361), third in innings pitched and fifth in strikeouts...was also second in walks, tied for fourth in hit batters and tied for eighth in losses...also led the AL with a career high 3805 pitches thrown...struggled in the first and last month of the season as he was 0-4 with a 6.60 ERA and .269 opponents batting average in five starts in April and 2-3 with a 6.50 ERA and .278 opponents batting average in six starts in September...was a combined 12-6 with a 2.77 ERA and .197 opponents batting average in 24 starts in the four months in between...received run support of one run or less in 14 of his 35 starts...went 6-8 with a 3.91 ERA in 19 starts before the All-Star Break and 8-5 with a 3.81 ERA in 16 starts after the break...allowed a .222 opponents batting average with runners in scoring position, which ranked fifth lowest in the AL, and opponents batted .228 when leading off an inning, which was sixth lowest in the AL...did not commit an error in 46 chances which tied for the third most chances among AL pitchers with no errors...ranked sixth among all AL pitchers with 34 assists...made the first Opening Day start of his career on April 4 at Baltimore but took the loss...allowed a first inning grand slam to Bret Boone on April 20 at Seattle, the first grand slam he has allowed in his career...recorded his first Major League hit June 7 at Washington with a fifth inning single off Tony Armas...won eight consecutive starts from June 28 to August 4 and compiled a 2.33 ERA and .199 opponents batting average over that span...pitched 7.1 no-hit innings on July 15 against Texas before Mench homered with one out in the eighth inning...went 6-0 with a 2.51 ERA in six starts in July to earn AL Pitcher of the Month honors for the third time in his career (August, 2001 and September, 2001)...led the Majors in wins in July and topped the AL in ERA...became just the second Oakland pitcher since 1991 to win six games in a month (Mulder in June, 2002)...tossed 9.0 innings on August 30 at Los Angeles but had a no decision in the A's 2-1 win in 11 innings...it was the first time he tossed nine innings since April 18, 2003, a span of 93 starts without going nine innings.

2004—Was 11-11 with a 4.48 ERA in 34 starts...led the A's with 34 games started and tied for the team lead with 28 home runs allowed...tied for seventh in the American League with 81 walks and was 10th with 163 strikeouts...his .263 opponents batting average broke down to .248 against right-handers and

.323 against left-handers...the A's scored just 15 runs in his 11 losses (65.2 ip, 2.06 per nine innings), 34 runs in his 12 no decisions (79.1 ip, 3.86 per nine innings) and 71 runs in his 11 wins (68.0 ip, 9.40 per nine innings)...had 12 no decisions which tied for sixth most in the AL...had his highest one month ERA in April as he went 2-3 with a 6.83 ERA in five starts...had a 62.2 inning, 268 batter homerless streak dating back to August 27, 2003 snapped on April 23 against Anaheim when he allowed a first inning home run to Troy Glaus...posted his best single month ERA in May when he went 1-0 with a 3.18 ERA in five starts...left with the score tied in three of his May starts, including May 28 at Cleveland when he pitched 8.0 shutout innings in a 1-0 A's loss...put together a three-game winning streak over his first four starts after the All-Star Break from July 16 to 31, his only winning streak longer than two games in 2004...went 3-3 despite a 3.76 ERA and .213 opponents batting average over his final 10 starts...left with the lead in four of those starts only to have the bullpen blow the lead all four times...had the A's only 10-strikeout game of the season on September 12 when he fanned 10 Cleveland Indians.

2003—Named to his second consecutive American League All-Star team but finished with just a 14-12 record despite a 3.30 ERA which ranked seventh in the AL...allowed a .219 opponents batting average which was second lowest in the AL but had the eighth lowest run support in the league (4.62)...tied for fourth in the AL with a career high four complete games but he lost each of the last three games in which he went the distance...was 1-3 with a 1.64 ERA in his four complete games...ranked fourth in the AL with a career high 231.2 innings pitched and issued 88 walks which was second most in the AL...had the third lowest opponents slugging percentage (.324) and seventh lowest opponents on-base percentage (.295) in the league...tied for second in the AL in games started (35)...was 10-6 with a 2.69 ERA and .199 opponents batting average in 20 starts at night and had the best night ERA in the AL...had the second lowest opponents batting average (.192) and third lowest opponents on-base percentage (.253) to hitters leading off an inning in the AL...went 6-3 with a 2.51 ERA over his first 10 starting assignments through May 21, 4-8 with a 3.88 ERA over his next 18 starts through August 22 and 4-1 with a 3.02 ERA over his final seven starts...won his first two starts of the season to extend his winning streak to a career high 10 games dating back to August 13, 2002...picked up his 50th career win on April 18 at Texas, a complete game six-hit shutout in the 88th start of his career...that makes him the second fastest Athletic to reach 50 wins (Rube Waddell, 79 starts)...tossed a complete game three-hitter in the A's 4-3 loss at Minnesota on May 27, the low-hit complete game of his career...tossed another complete-game three hitter on July 18 at Minnesota and lost again, 3-2...made his 100th career start on June 23 at Texas...was named to his second AL All-Star team but did not pitch...finished the season with a 14-12 record to become the first Oakland pitcher to win the Cy Young Award one year and follow it up with a winning season in an Oakland uniform the next year...made two starts against Boston in the ALDS and was 1-1 with a 3.46 ERA...picked up the win in Game 2, a 5-1 A's victory in Oakland (7.0 ip, 5 h, 1 r, 1 er, 2 bb, 9 so) but took the loss in Game 5, a 4-3 A's loss in Oakland (6.0 ip, 4 h, 4 r, 4 er, 2 bb, 4 so).

2002—Was named the American League Cy Young Award winner by the Baseball Writers Association of America...is the fifth Athletic to win the award, the first since Dennis Eckersley in 1992...won the award at the age of 24 to become the youngest Cy Young Award winner since Roger Clemens in 1986, also at the age of 24...was also named AL Pitcher of the Year by *The Sporting News* and was named as the left handed pitcher on TSN's postseason All-Star team...became the A's third different 20-game winner in the last three seasons as he won a career-high 23 games...had just five losses for an .821 winning percentage which set an Oakland record...broke the mark of .818 (27-6) established by Bob Welch in 1990...only Randy Johnson had more wins in the majors in 2002 (24) than Zito's 23...the wins were the fourth best single season total in Oakland history and were the most by an Athletic since Bob Welch won 27 in 1990...it was the 17th 20-win season in Oakland history and he is the ninth different 20-game winner in Oakland history...his win total was the best by an AL left hander since Frank Viola won 24 for Minnesota in 1988 and in Oakland left-handed history, only Vida Blue has more wins (24 in 1971)...one of two A's All-Stars, he led the AL in games started (35) and opponents average with runners in scoring position (.185), was second in winning percentage (.821), third in ERA (2.75) and run support (6.79), tied for third in strikeouts (182), fourth in opponents batting average (.218) and pitches per start (105.4), fifth in innings pitched (229.1), pickoffs (5) and opponents slugging percentage (.340), tied for fifth in most walks (78) and tied for seventh in opponents on-base percentage (.289)...was 13-1 with a 3.09 ERA in his 17 starting assignments following an A's loss...went 12-2 with a 1.92 ERA and .203 opponents batting average in 16 starts after the All-Star Break...led the AL in wins after the break, ranked second in ERA and was third in opponents batting average (.203)...went 22-3 with a 2.39 ERA and .210 opponents batting average over his final 29 starts beginning on May 5...was 11-1 with a 2.56

ERA in 17 starts in Oakland and 12-4 with a 2.92 ERA in 18 starts on the road...ranked second in the AL in home wins and tied for second in road wins...those were the most road wins by an A's pitcher since Bob Welch had 13 in 1990...the one home loss came on August 2 against Detroit and it snapped his Oakland record 16-game home winning streak, breaking the mark of 15 set by Kenny Rogers who went 15-0 in Oakland in his two seasons with the A's from 1998-1999...the winning streak lasted 24 starts from June 18, 2001 until July 18, 2002...his opponents batting average in 2002 broke down to .275 against left-handers and .203 against right-handers...put together a nine game winning streak from May 5 to June 22 (2.22 ERA, .197 opponents batting average)...was 4-0 with a 2.18 ERA in five May starts...matched his career-high with 11 strikeouts on June 1 at Tampa Bay...finished June with a 5-1 record and a 3.69 ERA in six starts...named to his first AL All-Star team and faced just one batter in the game, getting Shawn Green to ground out to teammate Miguel Tejada to start the sixth inning...had a 21.0-inning scoreless streak from July 7 to 23...went 5-0 with a 1.66 ERA in six starts in July...finished the season with an eight game winning streak, posting a 2.04 ERA and .202 opponents batting average over his final 10 starts...recorded his 20th win on September 8 at Minnesota, the fifth earliest date an Oakland pitcher has won 20, the earliest since Bob Welch on August 17, 1990...won his only playoff start, Game 3 of the ALDS at Minnesota, a 6-3 A's win.

2001—Started slowly but dominated American League hitters over the final two months of the season...was 6-7 with a 5.01 ERA in 22 starts through July 24...then went 11-1 with a 1.32 ERA and .174 opponents batting average over his final 13 starts, including a nine-game winning streak to finish the regular season...lost his only ALDS start against New York although he allowed just one run on two hits in eight innings (1 bb, 6 so) in the A's 1-0 loss in Game 3...finished the season 17-8 with a 3.49 ERA and 205 strikeouts in 35 starts...became just the fourth pitcher in Oakland history to strikeout 200 in season, the second left hander...is one of five left-handed pitchers in Athletics history with 200 strikeouts (Waddell, Plank, Grove and Blue)...finished fourth in the AL in strikeouts...tied teammate Tim Hudson for the AL lead in games started, tied for third in opponents batting average (.230), tied for fourth in shutouts (2), tied for sixth in wins, was eighth in ERA, tied for ninth in complete games (3) and 10th in winning percentage (.680)...tied for fifth with an Oakland record 13 hit batters, the most hit batters by an A's pitcher since Harry Byrd hit 14 in 1953...also ranked second in opponents slugging (.345), fourth in average by right-handers (.229), sixth in opponents on-base percentage leading off an inning (.281), seventh in fewest home runs per nine innings (0.76) and 10th in strikeout to walk ratio (2.56)...went 9-0 with a 2.21 ERA over his last 13 starts in Oakland...had a 28.1 inning scoreless streak at the Coliseum from July 29 to August 25...had 44 strikeouts in 37.1 innings in April, the most strikeouts by an A's pitcher in one month since Dave Stewart struck out 45 in September of 1988...retired 23 consecutive batters from August 4 to 9...started his season ending nine-game winning streak with a four-hit shutout in the A's 9-0 win over Cleveland on August 20...struck out a career high 11 against the Indians, one of five 10 strikeout games in 2001...went 5-1 with a 1.02 ERA and .163 opponents batting average in six starts in August and 4-0 with a 1.33 ERA and .168 opponents batting average in four starts in September and was named American League Pitcher of the Month in both months.

Martin's 2014 Season Recap

- Spent the entire season with Triple-A Gwinnett, going 7-8 with a 3.52 ERA (61 ER/156.0 IP), 13 quality starts and one save (1-for-1) in 27 games (26 starts).
- Ranked among International League leaders in strikeouts (3rd, 142), SO/9.0 IP ratio for starters (5th, 8.12 SO/9.0 IP), starts (15th, 26), innings (6th, 156.0) and ERA (6th, 3.52).
- Led Gwinnett in wins (11st), ERA, starts, quality starts, complete games (1), innings and strikeouts.
- Made a team-high 13 quality starts, including a pair of season-high 7.2-inning outings on 7/21 vs. Scranton/WB (ND, 7.2 IP, 7 H, 1 ER, 0 BB, 6 SO) and 8/17 at Norfolk (ND, 7.2 IP, 6 H, 2 R, 1 ER, 0 BB, 5 SO).
- Named the Gwinnett Braves Most Outstanding Pitcher during the 2014 Team Awards.
- Went 6-3 at home with a 2.42 ERA (25 ER/93.0 IP) and a .232 BAA (81-for-349, 9 HR) over 15 starts.
- Struck out a season-high 10 batters over 5.0 scoreless no-hit innings on 4/26 at Toledo.
- Had his best month in April, going 2-1 with a 2.66 ERA (7 ER/23.2 IP), one save (1-for-1) and a .186 opponents' average (16-for-86, 0 HR).
- Entered 2015 tabbed by *Baseball America* as the organization's 29th-best prospect, while his slider is labeled by the publication as the best among Atlanta farmhands.
