- **Seattle Totals** – Went 2-2 with 10 holds while posting a 3.77 ERA (13 ER, 31.0 IP) with 51 strikeouts and 14 walks in 29 appearances (2 starts) with the Mariners.
- **Ouch** – Underwent left ACL reconstruction surgery in Dallas, performed by Dr. Daniel Cooper, on October 15...sustained the injury on September 21 at Baltimore.
- **What a Relief** – In 27 relief outings with Seattle, posted a 3.07 ERA (10 ER, 29.1 IP) with 49 strikeouts and 12 walks...tallied at least 1 strikeout in 23 of 27 relief appearances as a Mariner, including 13 games with multiple strikeouts.
- **Ring 'Em Up** – Posted 15.03 strikeouts-per-9.0-innings as a reliever (49 K, 29.1 IP), 3rd-best among American League relievers (min. 100 BF)...trailed Darwinzon Hernández-BOS (16.46) and Matt Barnes-BOS (15.39)...ranked ahead of Josh James-HOU (14.77) and Ken Giles-TOR (14.09).
- **Seattle Strikeout Rate** – In 27 relief appearances with the Mariners, averaged 15.03 strikeouts-per-9.0-innings (49 K, 29.1 IP), 3rd-best by a Mariners reliever in single-season club history (min. 100 BF)...trails only Edwin Díaz in 2016 (15.33) and Díaz in 2018 (15.22).
- **On the Shelf** – Placed on the 10-day Injured List with a right shoulder strain on July 6 (retro to 7/4)...made 4 appearances on a rehab assignment with Triple-A Tacoma, beginning Aug. 22...his rehab was transferred to Double-A Arkansas on Aug. 26, where he made 2 appearances...reinstated from the IL on September 1...missed 45 games.
- **Return** – Had scoreless outings in each of his first 2 outings (1.2 IP) after being reinstated from the IL (9/1 at TEX and 9/5 at HOU)...allowed at least 1 run in each of his next 3 appearances (3.2 IP)...bounced back to work 2.1 scoreless innings over his next 3 games.
- **For Openers** – Made 2 starts – including his first career start on June 6 vs. Houston – as an “opener”...on June 6 against the Astros, allowed 3 runs on 3 hits (1 home run) and 2 walks in 0.2 innings pitched...on June 9 at Los Angeles-AL, tossed a 1-2-3 bottom of the 1st, striking out Mike Trout and Shohei Ohtani.
- **The Other Washington** – Began the season in the Nationals organization...made 1 relief appearance for Washington (4/20 at MIA)...designated for assignment on April 30.
- **Welcome to Seattle** – Acquired by the Mariners from the Nationals in exchange for minor leaguer Nick Wells (lhp) and cash considerations on May 4...optioned to Triple-A Tacoma, where he made 2 relief appearances (2.1 IP) before being recalled by Seattle on May 13.
- **Winner** – Earned his first career win on July 2 vs. St. Louis...struck out all 4 batters faced (José Martínez, Paul DeJong, Paul Goldschmidt and Tyler O'Neill) in 1.1 scoreless innings.
- **Do the Splits** – Limited opposing left-handed batters to a .149 (7x47) average against while striking out 24 and walking only 5...limited opposing right-handed batters to a .200 (13x65) average against while striking out 29 and walking 11.
- **On the Road Again** – Posted a 1.62 ERA (3 ER, 16.2 IP) in 16 outings (1 start) on the road.
- **Minor Details** – Made 8 relief appearances for Triple-A Fresno (WAS), posting a record of 0-1 with 1 save and a 2.70 ERA (3 ER, 10.0 IP) with 20 strikeouts and 3 walks.



2019 SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

- ◆ Split second straight season between Columbus and Cleveland, spending four overall stints with the Indians after making his first Major League Opening Day roster...Was on the OD roster until April 28 and other stints came May 25-June 3, July 6-30 and again August 6 thru the remainder of the season....Started the year 4-for-46 over his first 22 games before connecting on a 2-run, 9th inning home run on May 28 at Boston that tied the game, 5-5...From May 28-end of season he batted .263 (49-186) with 7 2B, 3 3B, 4 HR and 21 RBI over his final 66 games.
- ◆ Overall on the year he made 35 starts in left field (60 games), 15 starts in center field (18 games) and 8 starts in right field (13 games)...Enjoyed a pair of four-hit games, the first of his career, on July 7 at Cincinnati and August 15 at NYY...In the 8/15 game at Yankee Stadium he went 4-for-5 with a 2B, HR, 4 RBI and 4 runs (single-game career-highs for hits, runs, RBI).
- ◆ From Aug. 16-end of season he batted .183 (15-for-82)...With Columbus, he batted .268 (53-for-198) w/9 2B, 3 3B, 5 HR, 17 RBI and 37 runs in 48 games...Recorded an OPS of .726 vs. right-handed pitching and a .423 OPS vs. left-handed pitching, batting just .186 (13-for-70 from the right side of the plate (2 2B)...Hit .170 (17-for-100) with runners on base and .345 (19-for-55) when leading off an inning.

PRO CAREER

- ◆ **2018** Split the season between AAA Columbus and Cleveland, spending five stints at the Major League level...His fifth and final stint was his most productive of the campaign, compiling a career-high 14-game hitting streak that spanned from 7/15-8/21...His 21 steals were the most by an Indians rookie since Kenny Lofton's 66 in 1992...Finished tied for 10th in the American League in steals (most by an A.L. rookie) and T11th in sac hits (4)...He hit his second career home run on 5/27 vs. Houston, a solo homer, walk-off shot in the 14th inning of a 10-9 win off Brad Peacock that capped a five-run comeback...The 14-game hit streak was the longest by a rookie Indians batter since Michael Brantley in August/September 2010.
- ◆ **2017** Spent most of the season at AA Akron before spending the last month of the regular season in Cleveland after a 9/1 promotion... Missed two months, 5/8-7/13, due to a broken hamate bone in his right hand (surgery) and spent five games rehabbing in the Arizona Rookie League in early July...Entered the season as the ninth-rated prospect in the Indians system according to **MLB.com**...Named an **MLB.com** organization All-Star (OF)...Made his Major League debut on 9/1 at Detroit (night game) and collected his first hit the following day against the Tigers...Hit his first career home run on 9/7 at Chicago-AL off Jace Fry, a 2-run shot...Appeared in one game in CF and one game as PR in the ALDS.
- ◆ **2016** Hit a combined .295 (145-491) with 119 runs scored between A Lynchburg and AA Akron...Led all Minor League players in runs scored (13 more than the runner-up) and was tied for fifth with a combined 45 steals in 58 attempts...His .416 combined on-base pct. led all Indians farmhands and his .830 OPS was fourth-best in the system...Led the Carolina League in runs (93) and on-base pct and was second in steals despite being promoted to AA Akron on 7/25...Spent the remainder of the season in Akron, helping them to the Eastern League title... Lemon (Sept. 3, 1946-May 7, 1948) and Addie Joss (Sept. 14, 1908-July 31, 1909) hold the franchise record at 11, while Guy Morton also has a run of 8 straight road victories (Sept. 17, 1915-May 24, 1916).
- ◆ Combined over the last two seasons, Clevinger is 26-12 with a 2.90 ERA (326.0IP, 260H, 105ER, 376), the third-lowest ERA in the AL and sixth-lowest in MLB over the span among hurlers with at least 300.0 innings of work...Right-handed batters have hit just .199 (169-for-850) against Clevinger since the start of 2017, the best mark in the American League (min. 200.0IP)...Righties hit just .198 (44-222) against him, the 4th-best mark in the AL (min. 20 starts).
- ◆ Clevinger punched out 10-or-more batters in each of his first two starts of 2019, becoming the 6th Cleveland starter to strike out 10+ in consecutive starts to begin a season since 1908 and the first since Danny Salazar in 2015...Clevinger posted seven double-digit strikeout performances in 2019.
- ◆ Following two straight scoreless starts to begin the season, April 1 vs. CWS and April 7 vs. Toronto (12.0 scoreless IP, 2 hits, 22 strikeouts), Mike was placed on the 60-day Injured List with a strained muscle in his upper back (right Teres major)...Was on the IL, April 8-June 16, for the first time in his career and upon returning on June 17 at Texas, suffered a left ankle sprain covering first base and was placed on the 10-day IL, June 18-27...Rehabbed in Columbus and Akron, June 6-12.
- ◆ Clevinger was named the American League Pitcher of the Month for August after posting a 5-0 record with a 1.96 ERA (8ER/36.2IP), 11 walks and 51 strikeouts over 6 starts... The right-hander ranked 2nd in the AL in wins and strikeouts for the month, 3rd in ERA and strikeouts-per-nine innings (12.52), 4th in innings pitched, 5th in opponent batting average (.207) and 6th in WHIP (1.06)...According to *Fangraphs*, his 1.7 WAR was the highest among any MLB pitcher for the month.... Marked the first weekly or monthly award of Clevinger's career...Also led the AL in July ERA (1.74) and was 12th in September ERA (2.30)...Was second in the AL in the month of Sept. in innings (40) and fourth in strikeouts (46).
- ◆ Opponents hit just .212 against Clevinger with runners on(36-for-170) in 2019, the 8th-lowest batting average in the AL...His .331 season slugging pct. allowed was third-lowest in MLB behind deGrom (.323) and Sonny Gray (.325, min. 125IP) ...Had an ERA of 1.78 (12ER/60.2 IP) at home this season -- best in MLB among starting pitchers with at least 80 total IP...Using the same 80 IP metric, his season OPS of .602 was fifth-best among MLB starters and 40.8% (95/233) SO pct. of right-handed batters faced was highest in MLB.

CTRIBE TIDBITS

Attended the Citadel at the urging of his parents... Military life did not quite suit Clevinger, who accumulated "over 1,000 hours" of dorm confinement (which he never served) due to various dress-code violations before transferring to Seminole State after the fall semester of his sophomore year at Citadel...His mom was the daughter of a Navy veteran and was born in Hawaii while her dad was stationed there.

First wore custom designed cleats during his All-Star appearance in 2016 (Triple-A All-Star Game)...His cleats from 2018 featuring Lilo & Stitch and Moana and Maui (his daughters' favorite cartoons) ended up in the National Baseball Hall of Fame after he became the fourth member of the 200-strikeout quartet of Clevinger, Bauer, Kluber and Carrasco.

Has not come up for the concept of his 2019 cleats, but did pick the winning design of the custom cleat competition at Tribe Fest 2019. Clevinger picked a "sunshine" inspired design that will be Hrusovsky Custom Kicks.

Met his wife in Jacksonville Beach, where she worked for a swimwear design company.

Active on social media with Prayers from Maria and visited the Avon sunflower field in August of 2019.


