**CAREER:** Butera joined the TEX organization on a 2021 minor league contract with a spring training invitation on 1/13/21...the veteran backup catcher has appeared in 544 MLB games with 5 different clubs...spent all of 2020 with COL, appearing in 29 games with 12 starts at catcher...is one of just 11 catchers to have Major League time in each of the last 11 seasons beginning 2010...was behind the plate for the final out of KC's 2015 World Series championship against NYM...has thrown out 25.3% (70 of 276) attempted base stealers in MLB career...the native of Orlando, FL was selected by the NYM in the 5th round of the 2005 MLB draft out of the University of Central Florida.

**MLB CAREER:** Has caught no-hitters for the Dodgers' Josh Beckett (5/25/14 at PHI) and the Twins' Francisco Liriano (5/3/11 at CWS), one of just 6 individuals to catch a no-hitter in both leagues (Ron Hassey, Ed McFarland, Darrell Porter, Jeff Torborg, Gus Triandos)...is one of 59 MLB catchers all-time to catch multiple no-hitters...has a 7.50 ERA (5 ER/6.0 IP) in 7 career MLB pitching appearances...his 7 mound outings match C Erik Kratz and INF Andrew Romine for the most career by a position player (not 2-way player) among individuals who played in 2020 (Elias Sports Bureau).

**2020:** Served as COL's backup catcher with 25 total games behind the plate including 12 starts...also appeared in 5 games at 1B...went 2-6 with 2 RBI in 3 games versus TEX and started the 2nd regular season game ever at Globe Life Field on 7/25...did not commit an error in 94 TC behind the plate and tossed out 2 of 7 runners trying to steal...made just 2 starts in COL's final 25 games beginning 9/1...issued 3 hits and 1 R-ER with one strikeout over career high 1.2 IP in COL's 23-5 loss to SF on 9/1...held the Giants scoreless in the 9th inning after SF had scored at least once in each of 1st 8 frames.

**2019:** Went to spring training as a non-roster invitee with PHI before being released on 3/21...signed with COL on 3/25 and opened at Albuquerque (AAA), appearing in 67 total games...had minor league career high 9 homers...spent 2 stints with the Rockies (4/15-5/3; 9/3-end of season)...started 13 games at catcher for COL...**2018:** Combined for a .190 average with 3 homers and 21 RBI in 62 games with KC and COL...started 41 games at catcher for the Royals...hit go-ahead, inside-the-park, 3-run home run, 7/22 vs. MIN...was traded to COL on 8/31 with 5 starts rest of year...had pinch-hit HR, 9/26 vs. PHI...played in N.L. Wild Card Game at CHC...**2017:** Made 43 starts as KC's backup catcher...had career-high 4 hits, 8/13 at CWS...played for Italy in the World Baseball Classic with a pair of homers in first round 4-game series at Puerto Rico...**2016:** Set career highs in doubles (10), home runs (4), batting average (.285), OBP (.328) and SLG (.480) in his 1st full season with the Royals...made 34 starts at catcher...batted .347 (25-72) from the 9th spot in the batting order, 3rd best average in MLB (min.

70 AB)...HR in back-to-back games for 1st time in career, 6/2-3 at CLE...recorded an RBI in a career-high 4 consecutive games, 5/31-6/3...pitched twice, combining for 1.1 scoreless innings.

**2015:** Hit .196 in 55 total games with LAA and KC...began season with Angels before being designated for assignment on 5/4...was traded to the Royals on 5/7 and made 23 starts at catcher and one at 1B over remainder of year...appeared in one game each in the ALDS, ALCS, and WS, catching final out of Game 5 vs. NYM, a Wade Davis strikeout to give Royals 1st World Championship since 1985...was teammates with Rangers General Manager Chris Young on that Royals team, which also included current TEX bench coach Don Wakamatsu...**2014:** Started 48 games behind the plate for LAD while setting career-high for BB (17)...caught Josh Beckett's no-hitter on 5/25 at PHI...made 2 relief appearances...**2013:** Was 1-for-10 in 6 total MLB games with MIN and LAD...opened year at Rochester (AAA) before going on DL from 4/6-6/7 with a left hand fracture...played on 2 games with the Twins from 7/24-28 before trade to LAD on 7/31...was recalled from Albuquerque on 9/1 and saw action in 4 games for the Dodgers in September...played for Italy in the World Baseball Classic...**2012:** Opened at Rochester before recall by MIN on 5/1...started 32 games at catcher over remainder of season...made MLB pitching debut with scoreless inning on 5/20 at MIL...**2011:** Had career bests for games (93), at bats (234), runs (19), and hits (39) with the Twins...started 75 games behind the plate and threw out 29.4% of stolen base attempts (20 of 68), ranking 3rd highest in the A.L....caught Francisco Liriano's no-hitter on 5/3 at CWS...**2010:** Had 44 starts at catcher in 1st MLB season...went 0-for-3 in MLB debut on 4/9 at CWS...singled off CLE's Mitch Talbot on 4/22 for 1st hit...had 1st career home run on 6/19 at PHI, a pinch-hit blast off Chad Durbin in the 10th inning.

**2009:** Spent full season at Rochester...threw out 41.7% of steal attempts (40 of 96)...was named the top defensive catcher in the International League by *Baseball America*...**2008:** Selected as the top defensive catcher in the Eastern League by *Baseball America* at New Britain (AA)...slashed .308/.378/.477 in 21 games in June...**2007:** Combined for a .235 average with 6 homers and 29 RBI in 99 games at St. Lucie (High-A) and Binghamton (AA) in NYM organization and New Britain in MIN system...earned Florida State League midseason all-star honors...was traded to Twins organization on 7/30 and hit .260 in 17 games at New Britain to end season...**2006:** Started 94 games at catcher for Hagerstown (Low-A)...**2005:** Began pro career at Brooklyn (short season A)...threw out 46.8% of base runners attempting to steal while starting 53 games.

### CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Side-arming veteran of 11 Major League seasons has gone 32-37 with a 2.78 ERA (178ER/576IP), 605 strikeouts and 132 saves in 594 games with the White Sox (2020), Cubs (2018-19), Rays (2017), Mariners (2016-17), Cardinals (2015), and Marlins (2010-15).
- Over the last 11 seasons (since 2010), ranks among the top-10 MLB relievers in ERA (8th), innings pitched (9th), and appearances (9th).
- Has eclipsed 30 saves twice in his career (2013 and 2014 with the Marlins), and has surpassed 20 saves on three occasions (also 2016 with Seattle).
- Established a Marlins franchise record for most consecutive saves converted with 33 from 2013-14.
- Was named the Marlins Charlie Hough Good Guy Award recipient in 2013, and the Marlins Rookie of the Year in 2011, both presented by the South Florida Chapter of the BBWAA.
- Set a Marlins franchise record by tossing 14.2 scoreless innings to begin his MLB career from 2010-11.
- Led the National League in games finished in 2013 with 62.

### 2020:

- Pitched in 22 games in his first season with the White Sox...posted a 5.40 ERA (12ER/20IP), striking out 21 and walking nine.
- Held lefties to a .194 (6x31) average.
- Recorded his 600th career trikeout on Sept. 6 at KC (Adalberto Mondesi).
- Was released on Sept. 28.

### 2019:

- Became the first Cubs reliever with at least 70 appearances in consecutive seasons since James Russell in 2012-13.
- Went 4-6 with a 2.95 ERA (21ER/64IP) and 57 strikeouts.

### 2018:

- In his first season with the Cubs, made a career-high 80 relief appearances, the second-most in the National League.

## NOTES

- Graduated from Falmouth High School in Massachusetts in 2004.
- Attended Division II Carson-Newman College in Jefferson City, Tenn. from 2005-07...helped lead the Eagles to a SAC conference championship in 2007, going 2-3 with a 3.14 ERA and 43 strikeouts in 43.0 innings pitched.
- Drafted by the Marlins in the fifth round of the 2007 MLB Draft...signed by Marlins scout Brian Bridges.
- Has used the nickname "Speedpass" on his Players' Weekend jerseys...the nickname is an homage to his days working as a gas station attendant while he was in high school in Falmouth, Mass...the gas station used a Speedpass device to process payments, and his fellow students nicknamed him Speedpass.
- Played for Team USA in the 2013 World Baseball Classic, posting a 3.86 ERA in four games.
- **IN THE COMMUNITY:** Has hosted an annual Steve Cishek Winter Wiffle Ball Classic in his hometown of Falmouth, Mass., with proceeds from the event benefitting youth initiatives.
- Was named the 2014 recipient of the All Heart Award, which is presented to the Marlins player who best exemplifies the team's commitment to the South Florida community by making a positive impact on youth and serving as a role model for others.
- Signed a minor league contract with an invitation to Spring Training with Houston on Feb. 9, 2021.

- Earned a seven-out save on May 19 at WSH...allowed one hit in 2.1 scoreless innings.
- Posted a 0.66 ERA (1ER/13.2IP) over his final 16 outings of the season after returning from the Injured List (left hip inflammation).

- Recorded a career-high 25 holds, tied for the fifth-most in the NL.

# 2021 HOUSTON ASTROS

- Led all Cubs relievers in innings pitched (70.1), strikeouts (78) and strikeout-to-walk ratio (2.79).
- Stranded 42-of-59 inherited runners (71.2%)...the 59 inherited runners were the most in the Majors.
- Stranded 15 consecutive inherited runners from Aug. 4-Sept. 15.
- **POSTSEASON:** Made his postseason debut with 0.2 perfect innings in the Wild Card Game vs. COL, a 2-1 Cubs loss.

## 2017:

- Combined to go 3-2 with a 2.01 ERA (10ER/44.2IP) and 41 strikeouts in 49 appearances between Seattle and Tampa Bay.
- Opened the season on the 10-day injured list while recovering from surgery to repair a left hip labrum tear in October of 2016.
- Led American League relievers with a 1.43 ERA (7ER/44.0IP) over 47 games from May 21 through the end of the season.
- Traded from Seattle along with cash considerations to the Rays for Erasmo Ramirez on July 28.
- Posted a 1.09 ERA (3ER/24.2IP) in 26 appearances (25 scoreless) with the Rays.
- From the time of the trade through the end of the season, ranked among top AL relievers in ERA (3rd), opponents average (6th, .153) and WHIP (9th, 0.81).
- Made a career-best 20 consecutive scoreless appearances from July 25-Sept. 5.

## 2016:

- Led Seattle relievers in appearances (62) and innings pitched (64.0).
- Limited opponents to .190 (44x232) average, the 10th-best mark among AL relievers.
- Converted 25-of-32 save opportunities, recording a 3.74 ERA (14ER/33.2IP).
- Was placed on the Injured List on Aug. 2 with a left hip labrum tear...ranked third in the AL with 25 saves at the time of his injury.

## 2015:

- Went 2-6 with a 3.58 ERA (22ER/55.1IP), four saves and 48 strikeouts in 59 combined relief outings between Miami and St. Louis.
- Began the season with the Marlins and went 1-5 with a 6.98 ERA (15ER/19.1IP) over his first 19 games before being optioned to Double A Jacksonville on June 1.
- Was recalled to the Majors on June 14 and improved to 1-1 with a 1.75 ERA (7ER/36IP) and 31 strikeouts over his final 40 games of the season...his ERA ranked fifth among NL relievers in that span.
- Was traded by Miami to St. Louis on July 24 in exchange for RHP Kyle Barraclough.

## 2014:

- Ranked among the NL leaders in save percentage (7-4th, 90.7%) and saves (5th with a career-high 39)
- Also ranked among the NL relief leaders in strikeouts (8th, with a career-high 84) and strikeouts per 9.0 innings (8th, 11.57).
- Became the third pitcher in Marlins history to record 30-plus saves in back-to-back seasons, joining Juan Carlos Oviedo (2010-11) and Robb Nen (1996-97).
- Posted a franchise-record streak of 33 consecutive saves, dating back to the 2013 season...his streak came to an end on April 25 at NYM.
- Was named NL co-Player of the Week for the week of July 21-27, along with Jacob deGrom...became the first closer in Marlins history to record five saves in a seven-game road trip and the first Major Leaguer to accomplish the feat since Addison Reed (six) from Aug. 15-22, 2013 (STATS).
- Recorded a save in the club's first home game after the road trip/trip, his sixth in an eight-game span... became the first reliever in team history to accomplish the feat (Elias).
- Earned his 30th save on Aug. 11 vs. STL.

## 2013:

- Led the NL in save percentage (94.4%) and ranked sixth in saves (34).
- His 94.4 save percentage was the second-best in Marlins history behind Rob Nen (1,000, 15-15) in 1994.
- Received the 2013 Marlins Good Guy Award presented by the South Florida Chapter of the BBWAA
- Established a club record by converting 29 consecutive save chances from June 8 through the end of the season, breaking the mark set by RHP Todd Jones (27) in 2005.
- Recorded a scoreless innings streak of 17 from June 8-July 14.
- Named NL co-Player of the Week with teammate José Fernández for the period of July 22-28.

## 2012:

- Ranked second on the Marlins with 15 saves.
- Limited right-handers to a .185 average, the 11th-best mark among NL relievers with a minimum of 40 appearances.
- Recorded a streak of 16.0 consecutive scoreless innings from
- June 27-Aug. 11...converted all six save chances during the streak.



## 2011:

- Was named the Marlins' Rookie of the Year by the South Florida Chapter of the BBWAA.
- Ranked among the NL rookie relief leaders in ERA (2nd, 2.63), innings (6th, 54.2), opponent average (8th, .221) and strikeouts (T-8th, 55).
- His 9.05 strikeouts per 9.0 innings ranked eighth among NL rookie relievers and was the sixth-best mark in club history by a rookie.
- Opened the season with Triple A New Orleans, making 15 appearances, before being recalled by Miami on May 24.
- Began the season with the Marlins on a scoreless innings streak of 11.2 consecutive innings after finishing 2010 with 4.1 scoreless IP ...the combined 16.0-inning streak marked a club rookie record.
- Recorded his first career win on July 2 at TEX.

## 2010:

- Made three Major League appearances in September for his first stint in the Majors, throwing 4.1 scoreless innings.
- Was recalled to Miami on Sept. 26 and made his MLB debut that night at MIL (OER/2IP).
- Combined to go 3-7 with a 3.53 ERA (26ER/66.1IP), 62 strikeouts, six saves and zero home runs allowed between Class A Jupiter and Double A Jacksonville.
- Pitched in the Arizona Fall League for Phoenix in the offseason and was an AFL Rising Stars selection.

## MINOR LEAGUE CAREER:

- Spent the entire **2009** season with Class A Jupiter but missed the final three weeks of the year with right elbow inflammation.




## LET'S PLAY TWO!

The Rays have played 34 doubleheaders in their history, going 5-14-15 (W-L-T). They are 2-4-7 in traditional doubleheaders and 3-10-8 in split doubleheaders. The five times they swept a doubleheader occurred on Sep 17, 2020 at BAL, May 1, 2014 at BOS, June 24, 2012 at PHI, April 28, 2011 at MIN and Sep 23, 2008 at BAL.

Four of these doubleheaders occurred at Tropicana Field, all of them traditional, and each time they split the twin bill.

- ◆ The first Tropicana Field doubleheader, Sep 30, 2004 vs. DET, was a result of games rescheduled due to Hurricane Frances four weeks prior. They lost the first game, 8-0, and won the second, 6-4.
- ◆ On June 10, 2017 vs. OAK, the Rays hosted MLB's first scheduled twin bill since July 16, 2011 (Angels at Athletics). They won the first game, 6-5, on a 10th-inning walk-off single by Evan Longoria. Forty minutes later, they began the next game, a 7-2 loss.
- ◆ On Sep 3, 2019 vs. BAL, the series finale was moved up a day as part of a doubleheader as Hurricane Dorian approached. The Rays lost the first game, 4-2, and won the second, 2-0.
- ◆ On Aug 8, 2020 vs. NYY, a schedule change due to the COVID-19 pandemic prompted a doubleheader. The Rays lost the first game, 8-4, and won the second, 5-3.
