CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Side-arming veteran of 11 Major League seasons has gone 32-37 with a 2.78 ERA (178ER/576IP), 605 strikeouts and 132 saves in 594 games with the White Sox (2020), Cubs (2018-19), Rays (2017), Mariners (2016-17), Cardinals (2015), and Marlins (2010-15).
- Over the last 11 seasons (since 2010), ranks among the top-10 MLB relievers in ERA (8th), innings pitched (9th), and appearances (9th).
- Has eclipsed 30 saves twice in his career (2013 and 2014 with the Marlins), and has surpassed 20 saves on three occasions (also 2016 with Seattle).
- Established a Marlins franchise record for most consecutive saves converted with 33 from 2013-14.
- Was named the Marlins Charlie Hough Good Guy Award recipient in 2013, and the Marlins Rookie of the Year in 2011, both presented by the South Florida Chapter of the BBWAA.
- Set a Marlins franchise record by tossing 14.2 scoreless innings to begin his MLB career from 2010-11.
- Led the National League in games finished in 2013 with 62.

2020:

- Pitched in 22 games in his first season with the White Sox...posted a 5.40 ERA (12ER/20IP), striking out 21 and walking nine.
- Held lefties to a .194 (6x31) average.
- Recorded his 600th career trikeout on Sept. 6 at KC (Adalberto Mondesi).
- Was released on Sept. 28.

2019:

- Became the first Cubs reliever with at least 70 appearances in consecutive seasons since James Russell in 2012-13.
- Went 4-6 with a 2.95 ERA (21ER/64IP) and 57 strikeouts.

2018:

- In his first season with the Cubs, made a career-high 80 relief appearances, the second-most in the National League.

NOTES

- Graduated from Falmouth High School in Massachusetts in 2004.
- Attended Division II Carson-Newman College in Jefferson City, Tenn. from 2005-07...helped lead the Eagles to a SAC conference championship in 2007, going 2-3 with a 3.14 ERA and 43 strikeouts in 43.0 innings pitched.
- Drafted by the Marlins in the fifth round of the 2007 MLB Draft...signed by Marlins scout Brian Bridges.
- Has used the nickname "Speedpass" on his Players' Weekend jerseys...the nickname is an homage to his days working as a gas station attendant while he was in high school in Falmouth, Mass...the gas station used a Speedpass device to process payments, and his fellow students nicknamed him Speedpass.
- Played for Team USA in the 2013 World Baseball Classic, posting a 3.86 ERA in four games.
- **IN THE COMMUNITY:** Has hosted an annual Steve Cishek Winter Wiffle Ball Classic in his hometown of Falmouth, Mass., with proceeds from the event benefitting youth initiatives.
- Was named the 2014 recipient of the All Heart Award, which is presented to the Marlins player who best exemplifies the team's commitment to the South Florida community by making a positive impact on youth and serving as a role model for others.
- Signed a minor league contract with an invitation to Spring Training with Houston on Feb. 9, 2021.

- Earned a seven-out save on May 19 at WSH...allowed one hit in 2.1 scoreless innings.
- Posted a 0.66 ERA (1ER/13.2IP) over his final 16 outings of the season after returning from the Injured List (left hip inflammation).

- Recorded a career-high 25 holds, tied for the fifth-most in the NL.

- Led all Cubs relievers in innings pitched (70.1), strikeouts (78) and strikeout-to-walk ratio (2.79).
- Stranded 42-of-59 inherited runners (71.2%)...the 59 inherited runners were the most in the Majors.
- Stranded 15 consecutive inherited runners from Aug. 4-Sept. 15.
- **POSTSEASON:** Made his postseason debut with 0.2 perfect innings in the Wild Card Game vs. COL, a 2-1 Cubs loss.

2017:

- Combined to go 3-2 with a 2.01 ERA (10ER/44.2IP) and 41 strikeouts in 49 appearances between Seattle and Tampa Bay.
- Opened the season on the 10-day injured list while recovering from surgery to repair a left hip labrum tear in October of 2016.
- Led American League relievers with a 1.43 ERA (7ER/44.0IP) over 47 games from May 21 through the end of the season.
- Traded from Seattle along with cash considerations to the Rays for Erasmo Ramírez on July 28.
- Posted a 1.09 ERA (3ER/24.2IP) in 26 appearances (25 scoreless) with the Rays.
- From the time of the trade through the end of the season, ranked among top AL relievers in ERA (3rd), opponents average (6th, .153) and WHIP (9th, 0.81).
- Made a career-best 20 consecutive scoreless appearances from July 25-Sept. 5.

2016:

- Led Seattle relievers in appearances (62) and innings pitched (64.0).
- Limited opponents to .190 (44x232) average, the 10th-best mark among AL relievers.
- Converted 25-of-32 save opportunities, recording a 3.74 ERA (14ER/33.2IP).
- Was placed on the Injured List on Aug. 2 with a left hip labrum tear...ranked third in the AL with 25 saves at the time of his injury.

2015:

- Went 2-6 with a 3.58 ERA (22ER/55.1IP), four saves and 48 strikeouts in 59 combined relief outings between Miami and St. Louis.
- Began the season with the Marlins and went 1-5 with a 6.98 ERA (15ER/19.1IP) over his first 19 games before being optioned to Double A Jacksonville on June 1.
- Was recalled to the Majors on June 14 and improved to 1-1 with a 1.75 ERA (7ER/36IP) and 31 strikeouts over his final 40 games of the season...his ERA ranked fifth among NL relievers in that span.
- Was traded by Miami to St. Louis on July 24 in exchange for RHP Kyle Barraclough.

2014:

- Ranked among the NL leaders in save percentage (7-4th, 90.7%) and saves (5th with a career-high 39)
- Also ranked among the NL relief leaders in strikeouts (8th, with a career-high 84) and strikeouts per 9.0 innings (8th, 11.57).
- Became the third pitcher in Marlins history to record 30-plus saves in back-to-back seasons, joining Juan Carlos Oviedo (2010-11) and Robb Nen (1996-97).
- Posted a franchise-record streak of 33 consecutive saves, dating back to the 2013 season...his streak came to an end on April 25 at NYM.
- Was named NL co-Player of the Week for the week of July 21-27, along with Jacob deGrom...became the first closer in Marlins history to record five saves in a seven-game road trip and the first Major Leaguer to accomplish the feat since Addison Reed (six) from Aug. 15-22, 2013 (STATS).
- Recorded a save in the club's first home game after the road trip/trip, his sixth in an eight-game span... became the first reliever in team history to accomplish the feat (Elias).
- Earned his 30th save on Aug. 11 vs. STL.

2013:

- Led the NL in save percentage (94.4%) and ranked sixth in saves (34).
- His 94.4 save percentage was the second-best in Marlins history behind Rob Nen (1,000, 15-15) in 1994.
- Received the 2013 Marlins Good Guy Award presented by the South Florida Chapter of the BBWAA
- Established a club record by converting 29 consecutive save chances from June 8 through the end of the season, breaking the mark set by RHP Todd Jones (27) in 2005.
- Recorded a scoreless innings streak of 17 from June 8-July 14.
- Named NL co-Player of the Week with teammate José Fernández for the period of July 22-28.

2012:

- Ranked second on the Marlins with 15 saves.
- Limited right-handers to a .185 average, the 11th-best mark among NL relievers with a minimum of 40 appearances.
- Recorded a streak of 16.0 consecutive scoreless innings from
- June 27-Aug. 11...converted all six save chances during the streak.



2011:

- Was named the Marlins' Rookie of the Year by the South Florida Chapter of the BBWAA.
- Ranked among the NL rookie relief leaders in ERA (2nd, 2.63), innings (6th, 54.2), opponent average (8th, .221) and strikeouts (T-8th, 55).
- His 9.05 strikeouts per 9.0 innings ranked eighth among NL rookie relievers and was the sixth-best mark in club history by a rookie.
- Opened the season with Triple A New Orleans, making 15 appearances, before being recalled by Miami on May 24.
- Began the season with the Marlins on a scoreless innings streak of 11.2 consecutive innings after finishing 2010 with 4.1 scoreless IP ...the combined 16.0-inning streak marked a club rookie record.
- Recorded his first career win on July 2 at TEX.

2010:

- Made three Major League appearances in September for his first stint in the Majors, throwing 4.1 scoreless innings.
- Was recalled to Miami on Sept. 26 and made his MLB debut that night at MIL (OER/2IP).
- Combined to go 3-7 with a 3.53 ERA (26ER/66.1IP), 62 strikeouts, six saves and zero home runs allowed between Class A Jupiter and Double A Jacksonville.
- Pitched in the Arizona Fall League for Phoenix in the offseason and was an AFL Rising Stars selection.

MINOR LEAGUE CAREER:

- Spent the entire 2009 season with Class A Jupiter but missed the final three weeks of the year with right elbow inflammation.
- Appeared in 50 games with Class A Greensboro in 2008.
- Debuted as a professional with Rookie Level Jamestown in 2007, leading the club in appearances (25) and ranking second in ERA (1.95).

2020 SEASON

- Appeared in 41 games in his fourth and final season with Washington ... made 41 starts in right field.
- Batted .351 (13-37) with RISP, the third-highest mark on the club ... hit in the No. 2 spot 28 times.
- Compiled an eight-game hitting streak to start the season, going 8-27 (.296) with a double, homer, three RBI, three walks and four runs scored ... homered on Opening Day (7/23) vs. the Yankees, a solo shot off Gerrit Cole.
- Homered with a career-high tying four RBI on 8/24 vs. Miami.
- Suffered a fractured left index finger on 9/16 at Tampa Bay ... was placed on the injured list the next day and missed the remainder of the season.

2019 SEASON

- Was a member of Washington's World Series winning club.
- Hit a career-high 15 home runs in his first full season since 2016 ... tied for ninth in the National League with a career-high 103 runs scored.
- Ranked among the NL outfield leaders in triples (T2nd, 7), runs (4th, 103), on-base percentage (8th, .365), average (10th, .279) and walks (10th, 65).
- Posted a season-high, 11-game hitting streak from 4/13-26.
- Hit .308/.403/.485 (80-260) with 15 doubles, five triples, seven homers, 27 RBI, 36 walks, eight stolen bases and 57 runs scored over 71 games from 6/1-8/31.
- Connected on five homers in August, his career high for any month ... homered in three consecutive games from 8/17-19.
- Made his postseason debut, hitting .246/.361/.410 (15-61) with two doubles, one triple, two home runs, 10 RBI and 11 runs scored over 17 games as the Nationals won their first ever World Series title.
- Batted .320 (8-25) with two home runs and six RBI in the Fall Classic ... recorded three straight multihit efforts to open the World Series, including a two-run homer in Game 2 ... hit a solo homer and scored twice in Game 6 and drove in two runs in Game 7 as the Nationals won both games at Houston to overcome a 3-2 series deficit.



2018 SEASON

- Returned to the Nationals Opening Day lineup after missing most of the 2017 season with a torn ACL in his left knee.
- His .394 on-base percentage would have ranked fifth in the NL with the required plate appearances ... hit .300-plus for the second time in his career (.300 in 2014).
- Went 8-13 (.615) with two doubles, two homers, five RBI and seven runs scored in the season-opening series from 3/30-4/1 at Cincinnati, earning NL Player of the Week honors.
- Registered a career-high five hits on 3/31 at the Reds, and homered in consecutive games from 3/31-4/1.
- Recorded a .314/.411/.434 slash line vs. right-handed pitchers ... 22 of his 24 extra-base hits came against righties.
- Was on the injured list from 4/11-6/9 (left ankle bone bruise).
- Hit .336/.440/.496 (38-113) with 10 doubles, 19 walks, five stolen bases and 22 runs scored over the final 36 games.

2017 SEASON

- Appeared in just 23 games in first season with Washington after suffering a torn left ACL running to first base on 4/28 vs. the Mets.
- Hit safely in 17 of his 23 games ... ranked third in the majors with 24 runs scored and tied for ninth with 14 walks at the time of his injury.
- Hit leadoff 16 times, second six times and ninth once ... made 19 starts in center field, two in left and one in right.
- Connected on his first homer with the Nationals on 4/6 vs. Miami ... scored 10 runs in a six-game stretch from 4/22-27.
- Underwent season-ending surgery to repair the ACL on 5/9.

2016 SEASON

- **American League Leaders:** Triples (1st, 9); Infield Hits (1st, 30); Bunt Hits (1st, 10); OF assists (1st, 18); DRS (2nd, 22); HBP (3rd, 14); Multihit Games (T5th, 56); OBP (T13th, .362).
- Appeared in a career-high 157 games in his third season with the White Sox ... started 110 games in right field and 43 in center ... led MLB with 18 outfield assists and ranked second with 22 defensive runs saved.
- Was a finalist for the Rawlings AL Gold Glove Award^(R) ... also was recognized as an AL Gold Glove winner by Fangraphs.com.
- Led the Sox in runs scored (91), triples (9), on-base percentage (.362) and sacrifice hits (7) and tied for the team lead in multihit efforts (56).
- Connected on five leadoff home runs (nine career) ... hit 13 of his 14 homers off right-handers.
- His 18 outfield assists were the most by a Chicago outfielder since Jim Rivera (22) and Minnie Miñoso (19) in 1955.
- Batted a season-high .340/.383/.540 with nine doubles, one triple, three homers, 13 RBI and 21 runs scored in September.
- Hit leadoff in 119 games, batting .276/.360/.421 with 11 home runs and 46 RBI ... started in the No. 2 spot in 30 contests (.314/.379/.458/2 HR/11 RBI).

- Recorded multihit efforts in each of his first four games, becoming the first White Sox to accomplish the feat since Nellie Fox in 1955.
- Was hit by a pitch in the first inning on Opening Day at Oakland ... also connected on a RBI triple in the third inning.
- Was held hitless for the first time on 4/8 vs. Cleveland, snapping the following streaks: multihit to start the season, 26-game on-base and 13-game hitting (both dating to 2015).
- He and wife, Katie, welcomed their first child, son Brayden on 4/9 ... was reinstated from Paternity List on 4/11.
- Started the White Sox 9-3-2-6-2-5 triple play on 4/22 vs. Texas ... joined Harold Baines (1980 and 1981) as the only Sox right fielders to start a triple play.
- Connected on his first home run of the season on 4/26 at Toronto ... hit his fifth career leadoff homer on 5/24 vs. Cleveland.
- Recorded a game-ending, RBI single in the 12th inning on 6/13 vs. Detroit, the third walkoff hit of his career.
- Recorded his fourth career game-ending hit on 7/23 vs. Detroit, a ninth-inning single off Justin Wilson ... the hit occurred on 7/24 after the previous night's game was suspended due to rain ... hit a three-run home run and scored the winning run on Melky Cabrera's game-ending single in the ninth of the regularly scheduled game on 7/24 vs. the Tigers.
- Connected on a leadoff homer on 7/29 at Minnesota, his second of 2016 and sixth career.
- Matched his career high with four hits on 8/12 at Miami ... connected on his seventh career leadoff homer on 8/14 at Miami.
- Hit a game-winning grand slam in the ninth on 8/17 at Cleveland, leading the White Sox to a 10-7 win ... the Sox trailed, 7-5, entering the inning ... the slam was the first of his career, and four RBI were a career high ... scored a career-high four runs on 9/2 at Minnesota.
- Connected on his fourth leadoff home run on 9/3 at the Twins.
- Recorded his fifth leadoff home run of 2016 (ninth career) on 9/21 at Philadelphia, surpassing his total from last season ... the nine leadoff shots tied Tim Lincecum for the second-most in franchise history behind Ray Durham (20) ... five is tied for the second-most in a single season behind Durham (six in 2001).

2015 SEASON

- **AL Leaders:** HBP (T4th, 14); Triples (T6th, 9); Runs (T8th, 98).
- Connected on a career-high 14 home runs, the sixth-most by a Sox No. 1 hitter ... his four leadoff homers were the first of his career and tied for the fifth-highest total in White Sox history.
- His 98 runs scored were the most by a Sox player since Jim Thome (108) and Jermaine Dye (103) in 2006.
- Hit .335 (95-284) with 15 doubles, two triples, eight home runs, 38 RBI, 52 runs scored and a .904 OPS in the second half ... ranked among the AL leaders after the break in OBP (3rd, .418), hits (4th), runs scored (T5th), average (T6th) and doubles (T7th).
- Made his second consecutive Opening Day start in center field and as the White Sox leadoff hitter on 4/6 at Kansas City.
- Posted a 10-game hitting streak from 5/11-21, batting .349 (15-43) with three doubles, one homer and three RBI.
- Hit his first career leadoff homer on 5/28-2 at Baltimore ... accounted for both Sox runs with a two-run shot on 6/2 at Texas.
- Established a career high with his fourth home run, and second career leadoff shot, on 6/25 at Detroit ... opened the 6/26 game at Comerica Park with a solo homer.
- Became the first Sox player to hit a leadoff home run in back-to-back games since Alejandro De Aza from 5/8-10/13 and the first to do so on consecutive days since Kenny Lofton on 7/18-19/02.
- Connected on a game-ending solo home run in the bottom of the 11th inning on 7/8 vs. Toronto ... the walkoff shot was the second of his career (also 8/12/13 vs. Baltimore with Arizona).
- The last Sox leadoff hitter to hit a walkoff shot was Scott Podsednik in Game 2 of the 2005 World Series (last in the regular season was Gary Redus's grand slam on 6/4/88 vs. Texas).

- Reached base safely in each of his first 16 games to start the second half from 7/17-8/2 ... recorded 25 hits, 14 walks, two HBP and eight multihit efforts during that span.
- Hit safely in 11 consecutive games from 7/22-8/2, batting .455 (20-44) with four doubles, one triple, two home runs, five RBI, seven walks and a 1.274 OPS (seven multihit efforts, including five straight from 7/29-8/2).
- Scored a run in 10 straight games from 7/23-8/2 (14 runs total), the longest streak by a White Sox since Jim Thome opened the 2006 season with a club-record 17 in a row.
- Hit his fourth leadoff homer of 2015 on 7/29 at Boston.
- Was named AL co-Player of the Week for 7/27-8/2 (shared with teammate José Abreu), his first career honor ... hit .517 (15-29) with three doubles, a triple, home run, four RBI, 10 runs scored and three stolen bases ... led the AL in average, on-base percentage (.600) and runs scored.
- His 16-game on-base, 11-game hitting and 10-game run-scoring streaks were snapped on 8/3 vs. Tampa Bay (0-4).
- Extended his career high with his 10th home run on 8/14 vs. the Cubs ... joined Alejandro De Aza (17 in 2013) as the only White Sox No. 1 hitters since 2005 to reach the mark.
- Established a career high by reaching base in 22 straight games from 9/9-10/3, batting .367 (33-90) with 10 multihit efforts.
- Hit safely in 11 consecutive games from 9/11-22, matching the second-longest hitting streak (third time) of his career ... hit .388 (19-49) with one double, one triple, one home run, seven RBI, eight runs scored and a .944 OPS during the streak.
- Finished 2015 on a nine-game hitting streak (9/24-10/3), going 14-35 (.400) with three doubles, one HR and six RBI.

2014 SEASON

- **AL Leaders:** Triples (T1st, 10); Average w/RISP (3rd, .355); Average (10th, .300); OBP (12th, .362).
- Batted .300 in his first season with the White Sox ... became the first White Sox player to lead the AL in triples since Lance Johnson from 1991-94.


