THE A'S ELEPHANT

After helping form the American League in 1901, New York Giants manager John McGraw dismissed the A's with contempt by calling them "The White Elephants," implying Connie Mack should not be allowed to spend money without supervision. Mack defiantly adopted the White Elephant as the team insignia and in 1902, the Athletics won their first American League pennant.

The White Elephant remained the team's mascot and later that decade, made its first appearance on the A's team sweaters. In 1918, the Elephant saw its first game action when Mack had the pachyderm symbol (in blue with a white "A" inside) placed on the left sleeve of every player.

By 1920, Mack had fully adopted the Elephant as the team's symbol. The traditional "A" on front of the team's jersey was replaced by a blue elephant logo. After a few poor seasons, Mack decided change was in order. So, in 1924, the blue elephant was replaced by the traditional white elephant on the team's jersey and the A's played better ball for the next few years.

In 1928, Mack decided the elephant had worn out its brief welcome on the A's jersey fronts and replaced the logo with the familiar "A" on the uniform. The A's went on to win two World Championships and an AL crown in the next three years, although the resurgence was probably due more to the additions of Foxx, Simmons, Grove and Cochrane than the Elephant's absence.

That was the last year for the Elephant on the A's uniform until 1955, when the A's, now in Kansas City, added the patch to their uniform sleeves. However, when Charlie Finley purchased the team in the early 1960's, the Elephant was once again sent packing and replaced by, of all animals, a mule.

Prior to the 1988 season, the A's brought back a new, more aggressive A's Elephant. In 1995, the traditional A's Elephant was reincorporated into many of the team's promotional items and publications and is now a prominent feature on the A's uniform.

On Nov. 17, 2016, David Kaval was named the seventh president in the history of the Oakland Athletics.

As one of the most dynamic leaders currently in sports, Kaval has led a complete transformation of the organization. He has repositioned the internal and external perception of the Club and has driven a number of innovative initiatives to propel the business forward.

In his six seasons as president, Kaval has enhanced the fan experience by making upgrades to the Oakland Coliseum, introduced new ticketing programs, hosted MLB's first completely free game, and welcomed the largest crowd in Oakland Coliseum history when 56,310 fans attended the game versus the San Francisco Giants on July 21, 2018.

In addition to delivering one of the best baseball experiences for the Club's fans, Kaval is committed to increasing the organization's community impact. During the 2020 season, the Club focused on five main community initiatives: COVID-19 relief, social justice, building community, education, and youth baseball and softball. The team donated more than \$2.6 million back to the community, including \$1.62 million for COVID-19 relief efforts.

Kaval worked alongside state and local officials to open an Accessible Voting Center at the Coliseum for the 2020 General Election. The Coliseum Vote Center was the largest in Northern California and included in-person voting in the Oakland Arena, curbside voting from the car, and ballot drop boxes for individuals to deposit their completed mail-in ballots. The A's also provided 3,000 KN95 masks and 1,300 pre-loaded Clipper cards to help ensure the most vulnerable Alameda County residents could vote safely. As part of the Vote Center, Alameda County provided free COVID-19 tests and flu shots.

In February 2021, under Kaval's leadership, the A's partnered with the White House and the State of California to open the first federally operated vaccination center in the country at the Oakland Coliseum.

Kaval is leading the Club's efforts to build a new ballpark for the Athletics. Since 2018, the Club has been focused on opening a new waterfront ballpark in Oakland. Kaval has made it a priority to engage the community to ensure the ballpark project is bigger than baseball. The A's have hosted hundreds of community meetings and workshops since 2018, giving residents a voice to share their perspectives and insights on how the ballpark can benefit and provide opportunities in Oakland. In 2021, MLB instructed the A's to explore other markets while continuing to pursue a waterfront ballpark in Oakland. While the Club continues its work in Oakland, the A's are also exploring Las Vegas as the future home of the team.

Kaval previously served as the president of the San Jose Earthquakes of Major League Soccer. He oversaw the business and soccer sides of the franchise and represented the club on the Major League Soccer Board of Governors. He continues to serve as a Board Member of the San Jose Earthquakes.

During his time with the Quakes, the team won the 2012 Supporters' Shield, which is awarded to the MLS team with the best regular season record. His success with the team culminated in the opening of Avaya Stadium – the Quakes \$100M privately financed soccer stadium – on March 22, 2015. Kaval developed the innovative \$20M naming rights partnership with Avaya, which helped create the first cloud-enabled stadium. Since opening its gates, Avaya Stadium has held numerous events, including the 2016 MLS All-Star Game and World Cup Qualifiers. The 18,000-seat venue also houses the largest outdoor bar in North America.

Prior to joining the Earthquakes, Kaval founded the independent Golden Baseball League (GBL) in 2003. Memorable

GBL alumni include Hall of Famer Rickey Henderson, Jose Canseco, Daniel Nava, Jose Lima, and Mark Prior. Kaval has also spent time in the Office of the President of the United States in Washington, D.C., where he worked on the National Security budget as part of the Office of Management and Budget (OMB).

He serves on a number of boards, including the Bay Area Council and Rocketship Education, in addition to the National Governing Board of the Positive Coaching Alliance (PCA) and the Young Presidents' Organization (YPO).

In 2000, Kaval co-authored a book entitled "The Summer that Saved Baseball," which highlights a tour of all 30 Major League Baseball stadiums in the summer of 1998. He is also a lecturer in management at the Stanford Graduate School of Business (GSB) where he teaches sports management.

A native of Cleveland, Ohio, Kaval earned a B.A. with honors in International Relations and an M.B.A. from Stanford University. He is a long time resident of Menlo Park and lives there with his wife and two daughters.

BILLY BEANE

Executive Vice President, Baseball Operations

Billy Beane, who is considered one of the most progressive and talented executives in the game today, has molded the A's into one of baseball's most respected teams since he was named head of baseball operations following the 1997 season. He was promoted to his current position of executive vice president of baseball operations on Oct. 5, 2015, after 18 seasons as general manager.

Under his watch, the A's have compiled a 2012-1772 (.532) record over the last 24 years, which is the fourth-best record in the American League and sixth-best in all of baseball during that time frame. The A's have seven American League West titles (2000; 2002-03; 2006; 2012-13, 2020) and have secured four AL Wild Card spots (2001; 2014; 2018; 2019) during that span. His teams have posted 90 or more wins in 10 of the last 22 years. The A's 11 postseason appearances since the 2000 season are tied for sixth most among all Major League teams, trailing only New York-AL (18), St. Louis (15), Los Angeles-NL (13) and Atlanta (13).

Beane received MLB's inaugural Executive of the Year award in 2018 and has been named Major League Executive of the Year by *Baseball America* two times (2002; 2013) and The Sporting News Executive of the Year three times (1999; 2012; 2018). He also earned MLB.com's Greatness in Baseball Yearly (GIBBY) Award as the 2012 MLB Executive of the Year and the 2012 Legacy Awards' Rube Foster Award as AL Executive of the Year, presented by the Negro League Baseball Museum. In November of 2001, Beane was named to Street & Smith's Sport Business Journal's "40 Under 40" list, honoring the nation's top 40 sports executives under the age of 40.

Additionally, Beane earned the prestigious Inspirational Leader Award from Leaders in Sport at the 2017 Sport Business Summit in London and was named to the Forbes list of 100 Greatest Living Business Minds in 2017.

During his tenure, A's players have garnered numerous individual accolades. Jason Giambi and Miguel Tejada earned American League Most Valuable Player awards in 2000 and 2002, respectively. Barry Zito was named the American League's Cy Young Award winner in 2002 while Bobby Crosby (2004), Huston Street (2005) and Andrew Bailey (2009) have all won AL Rookie of the Year honors.

Beane has continually remolded a team that has posted one of the Majors' best records over the last decade. Over the years, his ability to acquire pivotal players through trades has proven instrumental in keying several playoff runs.

Beane's executive talents and the organization's baseball philosophy were the subject of Michael Lewis' best-selling book "Moneyball: The Art of Winning an Unfair Game," which opened the eyes of many of the top sports executives and business CEOs in the nation. The book has since been made into a full-length motion picture featuring Brad Pitt in the starring role, which premiered in 2011.

As a result, Beane remains in great demand on the national speaking circuit, where he regularly addresses top companies on his management approach of identifying and using undervalued assets to create and sustain a competitive edge. He is a minority owner and sits on the board



of directors for the Dutch professional football club AZ Alkmaar.

Further demonstrating his unique tastes and interests, Beane was invited to speak at Rupert Murdoch's News Corp. management retreat in Pebble Beach, Calif., in 2006, an event that focused on issues such as volunteerism, technology and politics and featured leaders and luminaries from around the world. Among the VIP who attended were British Prime Minister Tony Blair, Israeli Vice Premier Shimon Peres, former President Bill Clinton, former Vice President Al Gore, former House Speaker Newt Gingrich, former Harvard President Lawrence Summer and U2 lead singer Bono.

In 2008, Beane also collaborated with Gingrich and Sen. John Kerry in co-authoring an article in the New York Times offering possible remedies for the U.S. health care crisis. In addition, he was honored by PromaxBDA Sports Media Marketing Awards with the "Game Changer Award" in 2011, an accolade given to a "cultural trendsetter who, through the development of new technologies, applications, business models and industries, has transformed the business of Sports Media and Sports Media Marketing."

Beane joined the A's front office staff in 1990 as the club's major league advance scout. In 1993, former A's president and general manager Sandy Alderson promoted him to the assistant general manager's position when Walt Jocketty left the organization to accept the assistant general manager's job in Colorado. Alderson handed over his general manager's duties to Beane on Oct. 17, 1997.

A first round draft pick (23rd overall) of the New York Mets in the 1980 June Free Agent Draft, Beane played six major league seasons as an infielder, outfielder and catcher for the Mets, Minnesota Twins, Detroit Tigers and A's. His final season in uniform was 1989 when he was a utility player on the A's World Championship team. Beane retired as an active player in the spring of 1990.

A native of San Diego, Calif., Beane attended Mt. Carmel High School and UC San Diego, where he studied economics. Billy and his wife, Tara, reside in Danville, Calif., with their twins, Brayden and Tinsley. His daughter, Casey, is a graduate of Kenyon (Ohio) College.

RICKEY HENDERSON

Special Assistant to the President

Rickey Henderson enters his fifth season as Special Assistant to the President. In this role, Henderson assists A's President Dave Kaval in promoting the Oakland Athletics brand, in addition to continuing his duties as a roving on-field instructor.

During Henderson's 25-year Hall-of-Fame playing career, he spent 14 seasons with the Green and Gold. Henderson made 10 All-Star teams, won two World Series championships, one AL MVP (1990), one Gold Glove Award (1981), three Silver Slugger awards (1981, 1985, 1990) and one ALCS MVP Award (1989). He holds the record for most career stolen bases (1,406), runs scored (2,295) and lead-off home runs (81), as well as the single-season stolen base record (130, 1982). For his career, Henderson hit .279 with 3,055 hits, 297 home runs, 1,115 RBI, 1,406 stolen bases and 2,295 runs scored. In 2009, he was elected to the Baseball Hall of Fame on the first ballot with 94.8% of the vote.

2022 is the fifth anniversary of Oakland A's naming the playing surface at the Coliseum after Henderson. It was christened Rickey Henderson Field on Opening Day in 2017.

Following his playing career, Henderson joined the New York Mets as a special instructor in 2006 before being promoted to first base coach in 2007. For the past several seasons, Henderson has served as a roving instructor in the Athletics system.



BASEBALL OPERATIONS

DAVID FORST

General Manager

David Forst begins his 22nd season in the Athletics organization and his sixth as General Manager after being appointed to the position on Oct. 5, 2015. The A's have made 11 postseason appearances since he joined the organization in 2000, including six times in the last nine seasons.

The A's 11 postseason appearances since his arrival in the 2000 season are fifth most among all major league teams, trailing only New York-AL (17), St. Louis (14), Los Angeles-NL (12) and Atlanta (12). Since his appointment to his current General Manager role, the club is tied for the fifth-best record in the American League, trailing only Houston, Cleveland, New York and Boston.

Forst's primary duties include working on player acquisitions, contract negotiations and player evaluations, as well as overseeing the day-to-day operations of the entire Baseball Operations Department. Prior to his promotion, Forst spent 12 seasons as assistant general manager after serving as an assistant to the general manager and coordinator of professional scouting.

The 44-year-old Forst graduated Cum Laude from Harvard University in 1998 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in sociology. He played baseball for the Crimson for four seasons and earned third team All-America honors as a senior in 1998. He also played for the Springfield (Ill.) Capitals of the Frontier League in 1998 and 1999.

A native of Encino, Calif., Forst resides in Berkeley, Calif., with his wife, Rebe, son, Judah, and daughter, Sasha.



DAN FEINSTEIN

Assistant General Manager, Major League and International Operations

Dan Feinstein enters his seventh season as assistant general manager, major league and international operations and 21st overall in the Athletics organization. He was promoted to assistant general manager after four years as director of professional scouting/baseball development. Feinstein's primary role is to assist Billy Beane and David Forst in all aspects of baseball operations, including roster construction, contract negotiations, arbitration, trade analysis and the interpretation of MLB rules.

In addition, he oversees the A's international scouting efforts in Latin America, Asia and Europe, as well as the team's professional scouting staff.

This is Feinstein's second stint with the A's, having previously served in a variety of capacities from 1994-2004, including the role of assistant, amateur scouting and video coordinator. He spent the 2005 season as coordinator, baseball operations for the Los Angeles Dodgers and was director, baseball operations for the Tampa Bay Rays for six seasons from 2006-11 prior to rejoining the A's in 2012.

A native of Lafayette, Calif., he attended UC Davis and earned a degree in Medieval European History. Feinstein resides in Lafayette with his wife, Meghan, and two children, Will (11) and Charlotte (6).

Owens' responsibilities include providing input and recommendations for potential trades and free agent signings, along with evaluation in the area of amateur scouting.

Prior to moving into a front office position, Owens spent five seasons as a hitting coach in the A's minor league system, with stops at Southern Oregon (1999), Vancouver (2000-01) and Arizona (2002-03). In addition to his coaching duties, Owens also assumed scouting responsibilities as an area scout and was promoted to East Coast Scouting Coordinator in 2003.

A third round pick (72nd overall) by the Baltimore Orioles in the 1992 June Draft, Owens played seven seasons of minor league ball with the Baltimore (1992-96) and Houston organizations (1997-98) before joining the A's as an area scout.

A native of San Jose, Calif., Owens attended the University of Arizona, where he played both baseball and football. He was a football, basketball and baseball standout at Bellarmine College Preparatory and is a member of the school's hall of fame. Billy O makes his off-season home in Scottsdale, Ariz.



ROB NABERHAUS

Assistant General Manager, Baseball Development and Technology

Rob Naberhaus is entering his 10th year with the Athletics and first as assistant general manager, baseball development and technology. In this role, he oversees all aspects of the data and technology development within baseball operations.

Naberhaus previously served as architect, then director of baseball systems from 2012-19, and senior director, baseball development and technology from 2020-21, and continues to oversee the design and creation of all analytics tools used by baseball operations. Prior to coming to Oakland, Rob spent four years with the Tampa Bay Rays in their baseball systems department. He had previously worked in IT consulting with Accenture from 2004-08.

ED SPRAGUE

Director of Player Development



Entering his seventh season with the A's, Sprague enters his third season as director of player development after serving as assistant director of player development & coordinator of on-field analytics to director of player development during the 2019 season. He previously served the A's as instruction coordinator from 2016-18. He oversees the development and evaluation of players throughout the A's farm system, which consistently ranks among the best in the game. He also coordinates field instruction for the entire minor league system.

Sprague previously served as head coach at the University of Pacific from 2004-15, during which his teams posted an overall record of 250-406. During his tenure, 21 of his players were selected in the Major League Baseball Draft, with multiple players currently active in the professional ranks. He guided Pacific to one of the best seasons in program history in 2010, finishing with a 31-23 overall record that included a new program record of 31 victories over Division I opponents. In addition to his on-field success, he spearheaded the campaign to build an on-campus home field for the Tigers, with Klein Family Field opening on April 18, 2006.

While a student-athlete at Stanford, the baseball program won back-to-back national titles in 1987 & 1988, and he was a member of Team USA Baseball that won an Olympic Gold Medal in Seoul in 1988. After being drafted by Toronto in the first round of the 1988 draft out of Stanford, Sprague played 11 years in the Major Leagues with the Blue Jays, A's, Pirates, Padres, Red Sox and Mariners. He was an integral part of the Blue Jays teams that won back-to-back World Series in 1992-93 and was named a National League All-Star in 1999 with the Pirates.

Sprague and his wife Kristen reside in Lodi, Calif. They have four children: daughters Payton and Paris, and sons Jed and John.

ERIC KUBOTA

Director of Scouting



Eric Kubota is in his 38th season with the Athletics organization and his 21st as director of scouting.

Kubota has overseen the club's last 20 drafts that have produced dozens of players who have risen to the major leagues with various clubs, including current A's Matt Olson (2012), Chad Pinder (2013), Matt Chapman (2014), Sean Murphy (2016) and A.J. Puk (2016). Kubota's talents as an evaluator helped assemble the majority of the A's minor league system that has combined for a 6644-6559 (.503) record over the last 20 seasons.

In January 2014, Kubota was honored as "Scout of the Year" by the Santa Clara County Hot Stove Committee.

Prior to assuming his current position, Kubota served as the club's supervisor of international scouting for three seasons, overseeing the scouting staff and player evaluations in the Dominican Republic and Venezuela.

Kubota, 57, began his baseball career in June of 1984 while he was an undergraduate at the University of California, Berkeley, spending the better part of six seasons working in the A's media relations department. In November of 1989, he joined the baseball operations staff as an assistant director of scouting, handling daily administrative duties of the scouting department, including preparation work for the Rule 4, Rule 5 and June drafts, compiling the team's prospect book and preparing statistical information.

He was elevated to Pacific Rim coordinator in November of 1996, where he acted as a liaison between the A's and Asian baseball teams in addition to his scouting duties in Northern California and Hawaii.

Eric graduated from Cal in 1986 with a bachelor of arts degree in political science. He resides in Rocklin, Calif., with his wife, Karen, and their two children.

MANNY COLÓN

Director of Minor League Operations

Manny Colón enters his first year as Director of Minor League Operations for the A's. In this role, he oversees all minor league logistics including the team's facility in Mesa, Ariz., as well as the Club's relationships with its minor league affiliates.

Prior to joining the A's, Manny spent 19 seasons with the Miami Marlins, most recently as Director of Team Travel. He joined the Marlins in 2002 as a marketing intern before eventually working his way up to the role of Manager of Player Development & International Operations prior to being promoted to travel director in 2010.

A graduate of the University of Tennessee at Martin, Colón also has a master's in sport administration from St. Thomas University in Miami, Fla. He has been an adjunct professor and guest lecturer at various local universities over the past 10 years, and is currently on the advisory board of Arte Publico Press, the largest Latino publisher of contemporary and recovered literature by U.S. Latino authors.

RAYMOND ABREU

Director of Latin American Operations

Raymond Abreu is entering his 28th season with the Athletics and has served as the team's director of Latin American operations for the past 18 years.

In this dual role, Raymond oversees both the day-to-day working function of the Athletics Academy in La Victoria and also supervises the A's scouting efforts throughout the Dominican Republic. He has been with the Athletics since the inception of the Academy in 1994.

To honor Keith for his decades of service to the organization, the A's are inducting him into the Club's Hall of Fame in 2022.

Lieppman's gilded reputation as one of baseball's finest personnel executives was further amplified when he received Baseball America's Tony Gwynn Lifetime Achievement Award prior to the 2020 season. In 2010, he received the Sheldon "Chief" Bender Award from Minor League Baseball for "distinguished service and being instrumental in player development" during his career.

Lieppman has managed at all levels of the A's minor league system, beginning in Modesto in 1980 and most recently with the Triple-A Tacoma Tigers from 1985-87. He also managed the Lacey Tigres of the Dominican Winter League in 1986. He began his baseball career in 1971 as a minor league player for the A's.

Keith is a graduate of the University of Kansas with a degree in journalism. He resides in Prescott, Ariz., with his wife, Corinne.



CHRIS PITTARO

Special Assistant to the General Manager

Chris Pittaro enters his 31st season in the Oakland organization, his 11th as a special assistant to the general manager. Prior to being named to his current position, Pittaro served as director of professional scouting for five years.

He spent the previous six seasons as national field coordinator after serving as an area scout and national cross checker with the Athletics since 1991.

In 2012, Pittaro was inducted into the Professional Baseball Scouts Hall of Fame.

Selected by the Detroit Tigers in the 1982 June First Year Player Draft, Pittaro made his Major League debut with the Tigers in 1985, batting .242 in 28 games. He was traded to the Minnesota Twins in 1986 and spent parts of the '86 and '87 seasons on the Twins big league roster. He retired during the 1988 season.

Pittaro attended the University of North Carolina from 1980-82 before signing with the Tigers following his junior season. After he retired as a player in 1988, he enrolled in Rider College in New Jersey where he obtained a bachelor of science degree in finance in 1991, graduating Summa Cum Laude.

GRADY FUSON

Special Assistant to the General Manager

Grady Fuson, former Oakland Athletics scouting director and one of the game's most respected scouts and baseball executives, returned for his second stint with the A's in 2010 as a special assistant to the general manager.

After beginning his career as an area scout with Oakland in 1982, he has now spent 31 seasons with the A's organization, including seven years as scouting director from 1995-2001.

Prior to his current stint with the Athletics, he served as vice president of scouting and player development with San Diego from 2006-09 after joining the Padres in 2005 as a special assistant to the general manager. His first stint with the A's ended in 2002, when he joined the Texas Rangers as assistant general manager, spending three seasons in charge of the Rangers scouting and player personnel.

In January of 2020, he was honored with the Legends in Scouting Award by the Professional Baseball Scouts Foundation. In 2017, Fuson was named the recipient of the 10th annual Sheldon "Chief" Bender Award, which is given by Minor League Baseball to a person with distinguished service who has been instrumental in player development. He also was named the West Coast Scout of the Year at the 2017 Baseball Winter Meetings in Orlando, which is an award voted on by scouting directors across baseball. The Scout of the Year program—which was founded in 1984 by Tony Pacheco, Jim Russo and Hugh Alexander—recognized members of the scouting community for their excellence in scouting, years of service and professionalism in the performance of the job.

After a two-year stint playing in the minor leagues, Fuson became head baseball coach at the University of Puget Sound in Washington before originally joining the A's franchise. During his tenure in Oakland, he has played a prominent role in drafting such players as Eric Chavez, Tim Hudson, Mark Mulder and Barry Zito, which provided the impetus for the franchise to feature five playoff teams over a seven-year period from 2000-06.



STEVE SHARPE

Special Assistant to Scouting and International Operations

Steve Sharpe enters his third season as Special Assistant to Scouting and International Operations after spending the previous two seasons as special assistant to professional and international scouting for the Athletics. Sharpe was selected by the A's in the 11th round of the 2004 First-Year Player Draft out of the University of Central Missouri. After spending seven



seasons playing in the A's system, Sharpe was hired by Oakland as a professional scout. He served as a pro scout for seven years which included a stint in the international department in 2015.

STEVE VUCINICH


Equipment Manager

A fixture in the A's organization ever since the club moved to Oakland in 1968, Steve Vucinich announced his retirement in 2021 after 28 seasons as the club's equipment manager, preceded by serving as the visiting clubhouse manager from 1974-93. 2021 was his 54th season with the Athletics. He will stay to oversee spring training clubhouse operations in 2022 before officially calling it a career.

An Oakland native, Vucinich joined the A's organization as a ball boy in 1968 when the franchise relocated from Kansas City. From 1969-73, he served as an assistant in the home clubhouse before being named visiting clubhouse manager in 1974. Vucinich is a past president of the Major League Baseball Equipment Manager's Association and currently serves on the MLBMA's board of directors. He is also a past member of the advisory committee for Major League Baseball Properties. Vucinich graduated from St. Joseph's High School in Alameda and Chabot College in Hayward.

In 2021, it was announced Vucinich will be inducted into the Athletics Hall of Fame and that the home clubhouse will be named in his honor.

Commonly referred to as the A's historian, he makes his home in Scottsdale with his wife, Valerie, and daughter, Kayla, who is a graduate of Gonzaga University.



CLAY WOOD

Head Groundskeeper

The 2022 season marks Clay Wood's 28th season as the head groundskeeper of the Oakland Coliseum and his 33rd in the Athletics organization. Under his direction, the Coliseum's playing surface is considered by players to be among the best in the Major Leagues and was the last active baseball/football facility. Clay joined the A's organization in May of 1989 as part of the club's spring training field maintenance team. A native of Fort Worth, Tex., Wood earned his bachelor of science degree in marketing from Arizona State University. Woody and his wife, Lisa, make their home in Danville, Calif., with their son, Tyler, and daughter, Katie.



ADAM RHODEN

Video Coordinator

Adam Rhoden begins his 29th season with the Oakland A's organization and 19th as the team's video coordinator. As a senior in high school, Rhoden first joined the team as an attendant in the home clubhouse. He served in that capacity from 1994-97 before moving to the visiting clubhouse as the main assistant and umpire attendant until 2003. During that time, he also assisted inside the A's player video room, eventually being promoted to his current position in 2004. As the A's video coordinator, Rhoden provides daily advance and video reports to Oakland's players and coaching staff and also travels full-time with the team. In addition to working for the Oakland A's, Adam served as the Golden State Warriors' assistant equipment manager from 1998-2002. A Bay Area native who grew up in Suisun, Rhoden attended UC Davis where he received a bachelor's degree in economics. He currently resides in San Ramon, Calif.



BUSINESS OPERATIONS

CATHERINE AKER

Vice President, Marketing, Communications and Community

Catherine Aker is in her seventh season with the Oakland A's. She oversees marketing, broadcasting, communications, content, and community engagement, along with the Oakland A's Community Fund, which serves as the Club's charitable arm.

In 2017, Aker became just the second female vice president for the Club and first in nearly 30 years. She began her career with the Arizona Diamondbacks in 2001 and quickly rose to become Director of Corporate Communications. After nearly 10 seasons with the D-backs, she took a short hiatus from baseball to start a family before founding her own consulting firm and nonprofit organization.

Aker formed the Women of the A's, which provides networking opportunities along with professional and leadership development for the team's female staff. She serves on the Board of Directors for the Women's Sports Foundation and Make-A-Wish Greater Bay Area. She was awarded the 2017 Oakland Digital's Community Leader, the 2018 Emerging Leader for East Bay Women in Business, and was named as one of the 2019 Most Influential Women in Bay Area Business by the San Francisco Business Times. Aker was also a member of the 2018 class of 40 Under 40 for the San Francisco Business Times and Diablo Magazine.

Aker holds a B.A. in Fine Arts and a M.B.A. from the University of Arizona. She resides in Orinda, Calif., with her husband and two children.



MIGUEL DUARTE

Chief of Staff

Miguel Duarte was hired as chief of staff on December 1, 2016. He is entering his sixth season with the Athletics.

In his role, Duarte oversees the Office of the President arm within the organization. He supports Club President Dave Kaval in heading the day-to-day business operations including the club's real estate, government affairs and investor relations teams.

Duarte spearheaded the move of the Athletics business operations to a 40,000 square-foot, third floor space on Oakland's waterfront at Jack London Square. The move centralized the club in the community it serves while also offering first-class amenities for the staff. The office features a uniquely designed memorabilia hall, state-of-the-art gym and a batting cage. In 2019, he also collaborated with project stakeholders to create critical roadmaps leading to the Alameda County Board of Supervisors vote to sell its share of the 112-acre Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum site. Prior to the 2021 season, Duarte was tasked to lead the concessions business ahead of



the return of fans to the Coliseum. He currently sits on the Board of Directors at The Unity Council and the Bay Area Sports Hall of Fame (BASHOF).

Prior to joining the Athletics, Duarte spent seven seasons with the San Jose Earthquakes of Major League Soccer. He originally joined the Quakes as a Fan Relations Specialist. He led the team in renewal percentage in 2013, earning the club the Commissioner's Award given to the team with the highest retention rate in MLS. Promoted to executive assistant and board liaison in 2013, Duarte exclusively worked under Kaval in the building of Avaya Stadium, a privately financed soccer specific venue near San Jose Mineta International Airport. Avaya Stadium opened to rave reviews and has hosted numerous matches with noteworthy clubs, including the 2016 MLS All-Star Game and friendlies featuring the US Men's & Women's National Teams.

Duarte holds a B.A. in Broadcast Communications from San Francisco State University. He also served as the Earthquakes online reporter and in-stadium video host during his tenure in San Jose. A native of San Francisco, Duarte currently resides with his wife and two daughters in Walnut Creek, Calif.

D'LONRA ELLIS

Chief Legal Officer

D'Lonra Ellis serves as Chief Legal Officer for the Oakland Athletics. She previously served as the A's Vice President and General Counsel from 2019-21 and as its Assistant General Counsel from 2017-18, and has held similar roles for the San Jose Earthquakes.

In her role with the A's, she manages the team's day-to-day legal matters, including its corporate governance, labor and employment, intellectual property, commercial transactions and litigation matters. She also oversees all legal aspects of the A's real estate acquisition, entitlement and development efforts. The people operations and technology departments report to her as well.

Prior to joining the Club, Ellis was the general counsel of Aspire Public Schools, a nonprofit charter management organization that serves over fifteen thousand students throughout California. She has additional experience as a director and senior corporate counsel in the intellectual property, marketing, and advertising group at Gap, Inc.; and as an associate in the litigation practice of Howard Rice Nemerovski Canady Falk and Rabkin (now Arnold & Porter).

Ellis is an Adjunct Professor at UC Hastings College of Law, where she teaches sports law and the corporate counsel externship program. She sits on the board of directors of Bay Area Legal Aid, which provides legal services to low-income residents in seven Bay Area counties; the board of directors of KIPP Northern California Public Schools, which serves over six thousand students in seven Northern California cities, including Oakland; and the board of directors of Seven Stories Institute, which runs a nonprofit bookstore collective in the Washington Heights neighborhood of New York City. She is a member of the Alameda County Bar Association and Golden Gate Chapter of Lambda Alpha International. She received her BA in Architecture, Preservation, and Planning from Columbia University and her JD from Stanford Law School. A lifelong A's fan, Ellis is from Richmond, Calif., and attended Bishop O'Dowd High School in Oakland.



STEVE FANELLI

Vice President, Sales and Business Operations

Steve Fanelli is entering his third consecutive season with the A's, overseeing ticket sales and operations, ticket services, business analytics and corporate partnerships, while keeping a focus on the continued enhancement of the overall fan experience. Steve also oversees business operations for Hohokam stadium for Spring Training in Mesa, Ariz.

An accomplished industry executive with a proven track record, Fanelli previously spent 20 years with the A's in various business operations and development roles, most recently as vice president of sales and services in 2017. Between his two stints with the A's, he spent two seasons with the San Francisco Giants as vice president of ticket strategy and operations (2018-19).

In his two-decade career in baseball, he has consistently been at the forefront of many industry-changing initiatives, including digital ticketing, dynamic pricing, premium product development and subscription-model ticketing. Working closely with Major League Baseball, Fanelli cur-



rently maintains a strong focus on growing the game on both the local and league level, through product development, staffing optimization, digital adoption and business strategy.

Fanelli is a founding member of the Bay Area Professional Ticketing Association (BAPTA) and a current International Ticketing Association (INTIX) committee member. He is also active with the Sports Technology Awards, serving as a judge for the leading global celebration of technology led innovation across the international sports sector. A graduate of the University of Kansas with a Bachelor of Arts in Communications Studies, Fanelli serves on the KU Sport Management Board of Directors and is also currently serving a term as a KU Sport Management Mentor. He currently resides in San Ramon, Calif., with his wife, Amanda, and two sons.

DAVID RINETTI

Vice President, Stadium Operations

David Rinetti enters his 41st season with the A's organization and his 21st as vice president, stadium operations.

In his current position, Rinetti coordinates event management, oversees all game day employees, including ushers, security officers, ticket takers, parking attendants and grounds crew, and assists in all construction-related issues at the Oakland Coliseum. He is also the team's liaison with local law enforcement agencies and Major League Baseball's security department.

The 57-year-old Rinetti began his career with the A's in 1981, serving as stadium operations assistant, where he organized in-stadium promotions and giveaways. From 1987-93, he managed game day operations and maintenance of the A's luxury suites. In 1994, he was promoted to director of stadium operations and was elevated to vice president in March of 2000.

Rinetti also worked with Major League Baseball's security department at the 1995, 1998, 2007, 2010, 2012 and 2015 World Series, in addition to the 1998, 2002, 2007 and 2011 All-Star Games. He is a member of the Major League Baseball Stadium Operations Advisory Committee.

A 1986 graduate of California State University, Hayward with a degree in business administration, Rinetti served as the A's chief liaison during the filming of the movie Moneyball at the Coliseum in 2010.



TAJ TASHOMBE

Vice President, Government Affairs

Taj Tashombe enters his sixth season with the A's organization and fifth as the club's vice president of government affairs. In his current role, he oversees political, business and community engagement for the team's ballpark effort.

He originally joined the club in January 2017 as director of external affairs. Prior to joining the A's, he spent 15 years as a branding executive, producing strategic media and experiential partnerships with major networks and Fortune 100 brands, as well as leading sports and entertainment portfolios in conjunction with the NBA on TNT, NFL Sunday Night Football and MLB Network.

His leadership experience includes stints with Toyota, Hilton Hotels, Hyundai and his own consultancy Canyon Oaks, where he was a strategic advisor to Participant Media, Los Angeles World Airports (LAX) and Southern California Edison. 





Mark Steven Kotsay

Named as A's manager, December 21, 2021

Birthdate: December 2, 1975

Birthplace/Resides: Whittier, California / Rancho Sante Fe, California

Contract Status: Signed through 2024 with a club option for 2025

Mark Kotsay begins his first season as manager of the Oakland A's in 2022 after signing a three-year contract through the 2024 season with a club option for 2025 on Dec. 21, 2021. He becomes just the sixth person to manage the A's over the last 36 years, joining Tony La Russa (1986-95), Art Howe (1996-2002), Ken Macha (2003-06), Bob Geren (2007-11) and Bob Melvin (2011-21). Kotsay is the 19th manager in Oakland history and the 31st in Athletics history.

Prior to being named Manager, Kotsay spent six seasons on the A's coaching staff. He joined the club as bench coach in 2016 and filled that role until taking a leave of absence June 19, 2017. Kotsay served as the A's quality control coach from 2018-20 and moved into the third base coaching box for the 2021 season. He made his professional coaching debut as the San Diego Padres hitting coach in 2015. Kotsay joins Jeff Newman, who was interim manager in 1986 between Jackie Moore and Tony La Russa, as the only managers in Oakland history with no previous managerial experience.

Kotsay played 17 seasons in the Major Leagues from 1997-2013, including a four-year stint with Oakland from 2004-07. He was acquired from San Diego following the 2003 season for Ramon Hernandez and Terrence Long and went on to hit .282 in 472 games with the A's. Kotsay batted a career-high .313 in 2004 and tallied a career-high 82 RBI in 2005 while belting 15 home runs in each season. He was a member of the A's American League West champions in 2006 and sparked Oakland to its first ALCS appearance in 14 years with an inside-the-park home run in Game 2 of the ALDS at Minnesota. Kotsay joins La Russa and Newman as the only people to both play for and manage the Oakland A's.

A former outfielder, Kotsay batted .276 with 127 home runs and 720 RBI in 1,914 games during his career, which also included stops in Florida (1997-2000), San Diego (2001-03, 12-13), Atlanta (2008), Boston (2008-09), Chicago-AL (2009-10) and Milwaukee (2011). He made his ML debut with Florida in his second professional season in 1997 and appeared in a career-high 154 games in his rookie season of 1998. After batting .298 in 2000, he was traded to San Diego five days prior to Opening Day in 2001. He hit .292 with a career-high 17 home runs in 2002. Following his stay with Oakland, Kotsay returned to the LCS in 2008 with Boston and 2011 with Milwaukee. He concluded his playing career with San Diego in 2012 and 2013.

Kotsay retired following the 2013 season and spent 2014 in the Padres front office as a special assistant to the general manager and baseball operations. In that role, he was involved in all aspects of the club's baseball operations.

A graduate of Sante Fe (Calif.) High School, Kotsay attended Cal State Fullerton, where he led the Titans to the College World Series Championship in 1995. He was the winner of the Golden Spikes Award, was named Collegiate Player of the Year that year and hit .404 in his collegiate career. Kotsay was the Marlins first round pick and the ninth selection overall in the 1996 draft and also played for the United States in the 1996 Olympics.

Kotsay is married, Jamie, and has three children, Grace, Sienna and Trey. He resides in Rancho Santa Fe, Calif., during the offseason.



Mike Aldrete returns for his eighth season on the A's coaching staff, his first as the quality control coach. He originally joined the A's as bench coach in 2015, spent two seasons as the A's first base and outfield coach from 2016-17, was assistant hitting coach in 2018-19 and first base coach from 2020-21. The 2022 season will mark his 18th on a Major League coaching staff.

He began his coaching career in 2001 as hitting coach for Yakima in the Diamondbacks minor league system. He was promoted to manager of Yakima the following season and then managed Arizona's High Class A club in Lancaster in 2003. His first coaching opportunity in the majors came in 2004 when he was named first base coach on Bob Melvin's staff in Seattle. He moved to Arizona the following year when Melvin was named manager of the Diamondbacks, serving as hitting coach there for two seasons.

Tony La Russa, whom Aldrete had played for in Oakland, hired him as assistant hitting coach with St. Louis in 2008. After four seasons in that position, including with the 2011 Cardinals team that was crowned World Series champions, he was promoted to bench coach in 2012 when Mike

Matheny replaced the retiring La Russa as manager. During his three-year stint as bench coach, the Cardinals advanced to the World Series in 2013 and to the National League Championship Series in both 2012 and 2014.

Born in Carmel, Calif., and a graduate of Monterey High School and Stanford University, the former first baseman/outfielder played for seven different teams during his 10-year Major League career, including both the San Francisco Giants (1986-88) and the Oakland A's (1993-95). A .263 lifetime hitter in 930 games, Aldrete also played for Montreal (1989-90), San Diego (1991), Cleveland (1991), the California Angels (1995-96) and the New York Yankees (1996).

Aldrete's finest season as a player was with the Giants in 1987, when he batted a career-high .325 on a team that lost to St. Louis in the National League Championship Series. He split his final season between California and New York in 1996, ending his career as a member of the World Series Champion Yankees.

A third team All-American his senior season at Stanford, Aldrete was chosen by San Francisco in the seventh round of the June Draft in 1983. He enjoyed a pair of trips to the College World Series with the Cardinal and was a member of the U.S. Collegiate All-Star Team that toured Japan in 1982. Aldrete graduated from Monterey (Calif.) High School, lettering in baseball, basketball and football.

Aldrete makes his off season home in Salinas, Calif., with his wife, Gina, and their three children; Michael, Blake and Nicolette. Michael (RHP) was selected by the Cardinals in the 2012 First Year Player Draft out of San Jose State (39th round).

BENCH COACH

Bradley David Ausmus

Named A's bench coach, January 14, 2022

Birthdate: April 14, 1969

Birthplace/Resides: New Haven, Connecticut / Del Mar, California



Brad Ausmus joins the A's coaching staff in 2022 as bench coach, bringing with him five years of experience as a Major League manager. He guided Detroit to a 314-332 record and one postseason appearance from 2014-17 and Los Angeles (AL) to a 72-90 record in 2019 for a 386-422 (.478) record overall.

Ausmus was named the 37th manager in Tigers history on Nov. 3, 2013. In his first year at the helm, he led the club to a 90-72 (.556) record and the American League Central title, joining Hughie Jennings (1907), Mickey Cochrane (1934) and Jim Leyland (2006) as the only managers in Tigers history to lead the club to a playoff berth as first-year managers. Detroit was swept by Baltimore in the ALDS that year and fell to 74-87 (.460) in 2015 before rebounding to an 86-75 (.534) mark in 2016. In his final season with the Tigers in 2017, the club finished last in the AL Central with a 64-98 (.395) record. Ausmus returned to the managerial ranks with the Angels in 2019 and finished with a 72-90 record in his one season at the helm.

After retiring as a player following the 2010 season, Ausmus joined the San Diego Padres as Special Assistant, Baseball Operations in 2011. He spent three seasons in that capacity before being named manager of Detroit. He also served as a Special Assistant to the General Manager with the Angels in 2018.

Ausmus managed Team Israel during the 2013 World Baseball Classic. The club won its first two games to advance to the pool finals against Spain, before losing the pool championship game 9-7 in 10 innings.

Ausmus was a .251 hitter with 80 home runs, 607 RBI and 102 stolen bases in 1,971 games during an 18-year career with San Diego (1993-96), Detroit (1996, 1999-2000), Houston (1997-98, 2001-08) and Los Angeles-NL (2009-10). The former catcher led the league in fielding five times and was a three-time Gold Glove winner with Houston in 2001, 02 and 06. He is still the Astros all-time leader in games caught (1,243). Ausmus was an All-Star in 1999 with Detroit when he had career highs in home runs (9) and RBI (54).

Originally drafted by the New York Yankees in the 47th round of the 1987 First Year Draft, Ausmus elected to alternate between attending Dartmouth and playing minor league baseball. He served as a volunteer coach and bullpen catcher at Dartmouth and graduated with an A.B. in Government. Ausmus was selected by Colorado in the 1992 expansion draft and was traded to San Diego on July 26, 1993. He made his Major League debut two days later at Chicago (NL).


Ausmus and his wife, Liz, have two daughters, Sophie and Abigail. They reside in Del Mar, Calif., during the offseason.

Named A's bullpen coach, October 26, 2012; named A's hitting coach, October 30, 2014; named A's third base/run prevention coach, January 14, 2022

Darren Bush begins his 18th season in the A's organization in 2022, which includes two seasons as a minor league hitting coach, six seasons as a minor league manager and 10 seasons on the Major League coaching staff.

Bush joined Oakland as bullpen coach in 2013 and spent two seasons in that role before serving seven seasons as hitting coach from 2015-21. In 2019, the A's set franchise records for home runs (257) and extra base hits (572). Bush takes over as third base/run prevention coach in 2022.

Bush compiled a 462-386 (.545) record in six seasons as a manager with Single-A Stockton (2007-08), Double-A Midland (2009-10) and Triple-A Sacramento (2011-12). He guided the River Cats to back-to-back division titles with a mark of 88-56 in 2011 and 86-58 in 2012. Bush also led the RockHounds to playoff appearances in 2009 and 2010, including a Texas League Championship in 2009. He skipped Single-A Stockton to the California League Championship in his second year as a manager in 2008. Bush joined the Athletics in 2005 as hitting coach at Stockton and spent two seasons in that capacity before taking over as manager for the Ports in 2007.

Prior to joining the A's organization, Bush coached in independent leagues. He was the hitting coach and Director of Player Personnel with Yuba-Sutter of the Western League in 2002 and then spent two seasons as a manager in the Northeast League with Berkshire (41-51 in 2003) and Quebec (58-34 in 2004).

A former outfielder, Bush began his playing career with three seasons in the independent Frontier League. He played for Zanesville in 1996 and Springfield in 1997-98, hitting .302 with 26 home runs and 133 RBI in 224 games. Bush signed with the San Diego Padres organization Dec.

24, 1998, and hit .259 with 16 home runs and 114 RBI in 231 games in two seasons at Single-A Rancho Cucamonga (1999-2000) and one year at Single-A Clearwater (2001) in the Phillies farm system. He also played one game for Triple-A Las Vegas in 2000 and went 2-for-4. He concluded his playing career by hitting .417 in seven games for Yuba-Sutter of the Western League in 2002. Bush had a .284 average in 456 games overall.

Bush attended Dunedin High School and Valdosta State University. He resides in Englewood, Fla., during the offseason. Bush is married, Rebecca, and has two children, Wyatt and Maggie.

Chris Cron was named the A's assistant hitting coach on Jan. 14, 2022 for his first Major League coaching assignment after 27 seasons in the minors as a manager, hitting coordinator and field coordinator in the Chicago White Sox, Colorado Rockies, Detroit Tigers and Arizona Diamondbacks organizations.

Cron comes to the A's from Arizona where he served as minor league field coordinator in 2021. He joined the Diamondbacks in 2014 as minor league hitting coordinator and spent five seasons in that role before being named manager of Triple-A Reno in 2019. He guided the Aces to a 66-74 record that year and was slated to return as manager in 2020 before the minor league season was cancelled due to the pandemic.

Cron is a two-time Manager of the Year, earning the honors with Single-A Winston-Salem in the Carolina League in 1998 and Rookie Great Falls in the Pioneer League in 2010. He guided his clubs to eight playoff appearances (1997-98, 2005, 07-10, 13), including a Pioneer League Championship in 2007.

Cron began his minor league managerial career in 1995 at Rookie Bristol in the Chicago White Sox organization and also had stops at Single-A Hickory (1996-97) and Winston-Salem (1998) and Double-A Birmingham (1999). He spent the three seasons as manager at Triple-A Colorado Springs from 2000-02 in the Rockies organization before returning to the White Sox in 2003. Cron spent one year each at Rookie Great Falls (2004), Single-A Kannapolis (2005), Winston-Salem (2006) and Birmingham before concluding his White Sox career with four years at Great Falls from 2007-10. He then managed for three seasons at Double-A Erie in the Detroit system from 2011-13 before moving on to the Diamondbacks.

Cron played professionally for 12 seasons, including 12 games in the majors with California (1991) and Chicago-AL (1992). He went 2-for-15 (.133) in six games with the Angels in his debut and was 0-for-10 in six games with the White Sox in 1992. Cron was a .268 hitter with 172 home runs and 785 RBI in 1,250 games as a minor leaguer in the Atlanta, California, Chicago (AL) and Cleveland organizations. He was originally selected by the Braves in the second round of the 1984 draft out of Santa Ana (Calif.) College and is a graduate of El Dorado (Calif.) High School.

Cron resides in Phoenix, Ariz., and has three children: C.J., Kevin and Carly. C.J. was the Angels first round pick in 2011 and made his Major League debut in 2014. Kevin was the Diamondbacks 14th round selection in 2014 and made his ML debut in 2019. Carly graduated from Northern Arizona University in 2020 and completed her Masters degree from Arizona State in 2021.

Scott Emerson returns for his eighth season on the A's Major League coaching staff and his 19th in the A's organization. He joined the coaching staff in Oakland for the 2015 season as bullpen coach and took over the reins as pitching coach on June 15, 2017.

Emerson spent two seasons as minor league roving pitching instructor from 2013-14 after 10 years as a pitching coach at various levels. He joined the A's organization in 2003 as pitching coach at Single-A Modesto and served two seasons there before the A's moved their affiliate to Stockton. After two seasons with the Ports, Emerson had a four-year stint at Double-A Midland from 2007-10. He was promoted to Triple-A Sacramento in 2011 and spent two seasons with the River Cats.

Emerson's coaching career began in the Pittsburgh Pirates organization in 2000 when he was named the pitching coach for the Pirates Gulf Coast Rookie League club at Bradenton. He spent two years in the GCL and one at Single-A Williamsport in 2002 before joining the A's organization.

Emerson pitched professionally for six seasons in the Baltimore (1992-95), Boston (1995-96) and Arizona (1997) organizations. He was a 10-game winner at Single-A Albany in 1993 and was traded to the Red Sox organization early during the 1995 season. The left-hander signed with Arizona after being released by Boston in the spring of 1997. He pitched in three games for Single-A High Desert before concluding his professional career with Rio Grande Valley of the independent Texas-Louisiana League in 1997. Emerson was 27-29 with a 4.16 ERA in 135 games, 79 starts in his career.

Emerson was drafted by San Diego in the 21st round of the 1990 June draft out of Shadow Mountain HS (Phoenix, Ariz.) but did not sign. He attended Scottsdale Community College and signed with the Baltimore organization after the Orioles selected him in the 40th round of the 1991 June draft.

Emerson and his wife, Jill, make their offseason home in Rockingham, N.C.

Bay Area native Tommy Everidge joins the Oakland coaching staff as hitting coach in 2022 after spending eight seasons in that role in the A's farm system. This will be his 16th season in the Oakland organization, as he also had seven years as a player.

Everidge began his coaching career in 2014 when he was named hitting coach at Short-Season Vermont. He spent two seasons with the Lake Monsters and two more at Single-A Stockton from 2016-17 before being moved up to Double-A Midland. Everidge had three seasons with the RockHounds before coaching at Triple-A Las Vegas in 2021.

Everidge had a nine-year playing career, including seven years in the A's system. He made his Major League debut in 2009 and hit .224 with two home runs and seven RBI in 24 games with Oakland in his only big league experience. Everidge was selected by the A's in 10th round of the 2004 draft and spent seven seasons in the minor leagues with Oakland (2004-10), Seattle (2010) and Houston (2010). He hit 20 home runs in four consecutive seasons from 2006-09 and led the California League with 26 home runs at Stockton in 2007. In 2008, he led the Texas League and ranked third in all of the minors league with 115 RBI at Midland. Everidge concluded his playing career with two seasons at Lancaster in the independent Atlantic League from 2011-12, earning AL Player of the Year honors in 2011 after setting a league record with 69 extra-base hits.

A graduate of Sonoma Valley High School in 2001, Everidge played collegiately at Sonoma State University.



Oakland native Marcus Jensen returns for his eighth season on the A's Major League coaching staff and his 16th in the A's organization. He took over as bullpen coach in 2018 after serving as the A's assistant hitting/catching coach from 2015-17.

Jensen spent the 2014 season as the A's minor league roving hitting instructor. He joined the A's organization in 2007 as hitting coach for the A's affiliate in the Arizona Rookie League and served two years in that capacity. Jensen took over the managerial duties for that club in 2009

and guided the A's to a 141-136 (.509) record and one playoff appearance in five seasons. In 2013, he also served as the A's minor league roving catching instructor.

A former catcher, Jensen was drafted by San Francisco out of Skyline HS in Oakland following the first round of the 1990 June draft as a compensation pick for the loss of free agent Craig Lefferts. He batted .184 with six home runs and 29 RBI in 145 games in seven seasons with seven different teams.

Jensen made his Major League debut with San Francisco in 1996 and appeared in 39 games over two seasons with the Giants before he was dealt to Detroit in July 1997. After spending parts of the 1998 and 1999 seasons with Milwaukee and St. Louis respectively, Jensen saw his most big league action with Minnesota in 2000 when he batted .209 with three home runs and 14 RBI in 52 games. He split the 2001 season between Boston and Texas and returned to Milwaukee in 2002, appearing in 40 games in his final big league campaign. Jensen spent the 2003 season at Triple-A Columbus in the New York (AL) farm system and played for Cancun in the Mexican League in 2004. He spent his final two seasons as a professional with Mesa (2005) and Reno (2006) of the independent Golden Baseball League. Jensen was also a member of the 2000 U.S. Olympic team that defeated Cuba for the gold medal.

Jensen makes his offseason home in Scottsdale, Ariz., with his wife, Lila, and three children, Mariah, Jahir and Jirah.

Eric Martins is in his third season on the A's coaching staff, his first as first base/infield coach. He made his debut on a Major League coaching staff in 2020 as the A's assistant hitting coach and spent two seasons in that capacity. This is Martins' 22nd season in the A's organization, which includes seven years as a minor league player, seven years as an area scout and five years as a minor league hitting coach.

Martins' coaching career began in 2015 when he was named hitting coach for Double-A Midland. He was promoted to Triple-A Nashville in 2016 and spent three seasons with the Sounds before moving west to Las Vegas in 2019 when the A's switched Triple-A affiliates.

Prior to coaching, Martins spent seven seasons as an A's area scout for Southern California from 2008-14. During that time, he was responsible for signing A.J. Griffin, Daniel Robertson, and 2014 first-round selection Matt Chapman, among others.



The former infielder was part of the 1997 Edmonton team that captured the Pacific Coast League Championship and the 1999 Vancouver club that won the Triple-A World Series. A graduate of La Serna High School in 1990, Martins attended Long Beach State. He was signed by Ed Crosby.

2020—Was hampered by a back injury for much of the season and batted .194/.252/.330/.582 with three home runs and seven RBI in 29 games with Texas...while he appeared in less than half the Rangers games in the abbreviated campaign, it marked his lowest batting average and OPS in any season...his batting average was above .200 following just two games all season: July 29 (.235) and Aug. 1 (.208)...produced a negative baseball-reference WAR figure (-0.5) for the first time in his career...all 29 of his games came at shortstop...had two stints on the 10-day injured list: Aug. 20-30 (lower back strain) and Sept. 12 (Game 2) through the end of the season (back strain)...his back ailment was a facet joint sprain, which is a ligament in the left side of his lower back...while the condition did not require surgery, he received treatment in the form of injections on Sept. 14...set a Rangers record with his 12th consecutive Opening Day start on July 24 against Colorado, all of which have come at shortstop...broke the previous mark of 11 by Ivan Rodriguez and Michael Young...went homerless over his first 21 games before going deep three times over a seven-game stretch from Sept. 1-11...his only game with multiple strikeouts was July 31 at San Francisco...three of his eight walks came in the second game of the season on July 25 vs. Colorado...collected his 300th career double Aug. 5 at Oakland.

2018—Endured career lows in most categories due to a stint on the disabled list from April 12 to June 17 with an olecranon fracture in his right elbow...moved from the 10-day to 60-day disabled list on May 2...suffered the injury when he was hit by a Keynan Middleton pitch while batting in the ninth inning on April 11 vs. Los Angeles (AL)...from his ML debut on April 6, 2009 through the start of the 2018 DL stint, he had been inactive for just three of Rangers 1,515 regular season and postseason games (on suspended list, May 17, 2016; on paternity list, July 5-7, 2017)...collected his 1500th career hit on July 23 against Oakland...then hit his first career grand slam the next day against the A's...had a career-high 19-game hitting streak from July 15 to Aug. 8 (29-for-84, .345), which was second longest in the majors in 2018...had career bests with 20 go-ahead RBI and 10 game-winning RBI.

- The first-time American League All-Star missed a month of the season after being hit in the face by a line drive on Aug. 17 but returned in late September to make two starts...went 12-4 with a 3.15 ERA and .218 opponents batting average in 27 starts overall.
- Had career highs in wins, strikeouts (159), winning percentage (.750), games started (27), innings pitched (157.1) and hits allowed (127) and matched his high in wild pitches (5)...his opponents batting average was a career low as was his .278 on-base percentage...walked just 39 batters in 157.1 innings for a career-low average of 2.23 walks per nine innings...had a career best strikeout-to-walk ratio of 4.08...also tossed the first complete game and shutout of his career.

- Spent the balance of the season with the Isotopes and went 3-11 with a 6.25 ERA and .256 opponents batting average in 24 games, including 23 starts.
- Issued a career-high 71 walks, which was third most among all minor league pitchers...averaged 6.73 walks per nine innings.
- Led the Triple-A West in games started and walks and tied for second in losses, hit batters (11) and wild pitches (11)...his .395 opponents on-base percentage was second highest among pitchers with 75 or more innings and he had the fifth highest ERA.

The A's first round selection (25th pick overall) in the 2014 draft made his Major League debut with Oakland in 2017 and is a .243 hitter with 111 home runs and 296 RBI in 573 games in five seasons with the A's...is a three-time American League Gold Glove winner at third base (2018-19, 21), a two-time AL Platinum Glove winner (2018-19) and the 2018 Wilson Defensive Player of the year...has played 571 career games at third base, which is fifth most in Oakland history...set the Athletics single season record for strikeouts in 2021 (202)...was named to his first American League All-Star team in 2019 and also participated in the Home Run Derby...was the third baseman on *Baseball America's* All-Rookie Team in 2017...was named Texas League Player of the Year in 2016...hit 36 home runs that season, which ranked third in all of minor league baseball...was rated by *Baseball America* as the A's fourth-best prospect following the 2014 season and third-best after 2015 and 2016.

2021 HIGHLIGHTS

at Houston, July 9, 2018) and a two-game record with eight strikeouts on Sept. 4 and 5 (fourth time, last: Seth Smith, May 1-3, 2013)...would not play again following the Padres series as he underwent surgery on his right hip Sept. 12...the surgery was performed by Dr. Marc Philippon in Vail, Col. at the Stedman Clinic.

2019—Had career highs in runs (102), home runs (36), RBI (91) and extra base hits (75) in his third season in the majors...won his second consecutive Rawlings Gold Glove for American League third basemen, his second straight Wilson Defensive Player of the Year for Major League third basemen and his second straight AL Platinum Glove Award...tied for sixth in the AL in extra base hits and tied for seventh in home runs and games played (156)...set an Athletics record for home runs by a third baseman, breaking the previous mark of 32 by Eric Chavez in 2001...led AL third basemen and ranked fourth among Major League third basemen in home runs...was second among AL third basemen in RBI...scored 100 runs in 2018 and is the fifth player in Oakland history with two seasons of 100 or more runs (Henderson 7, Tejada and Giambi 3, Canseco 2)...his 75 extra base hits tied for ninth most in Oakland history...his 36 home runs are third most in Athletics history by a player in his first three seasons in the majors behind Mark McGwire (49 in 1987) and Reggie Jackson (47 in 1969)...17 of his 36 home runs came in the seventh inning or later, which was the most in the AL, tied for second in the majors and second most in Oakland history to Khris Davis' 19 last year...was fourth in the AL in RBI in the seventh or later...17 of his home runs put the A's ahead, which was second most in the AL...ranked 10th in the AL in game-winning RBI (13) and tied for 10th in go-ahead RBI (23)...had 36 doubles and joins Marcus Semien as the first Athletics with at least 30 doubles and 30 homers in a season since 2002 when both Eric Chavez and Miguel Tejada did it...75 of his 145 hits (51.7%) went for extra bases...also had career highs in hit by pitches (11), games (156) and at bats (583)...tied with Olson for the team-lead in home runs and led the club in strikeouts (147)...batted .249 with an .848 OPS...was named to his first AL All-Star team and also participated in the Home Run Derby...finished sixth in AL MVP voting after placing seventh in 2018...led ML third basemen in fielding percentage (.981), total chances (466), putouts (146) and defensive runs saved (18) and his 311 assists were second to the Rockies Nolan Arenado (337)...led all players, regardless of position, in ultimate zone rating (14.8)...was second among AL third basemen in double plays (27)...his 156 games played were fifth most by a third baseman in Oakland history and were the most since Sal Bando had 160 in 1975...was named best third baseman in the Fielding Bible Awards for the second consecutive season...batted .254 with an .848 OPS against right-handed pitchers compared to .234 with an .848 OPS against left-handers...hit .263 with 21 of his 36 home runs and a .926 OPS at home, .235 with a .770 OPS on the road...tied for the AL lead in home runs at home...was batting .268 with 21 home runs and 52 RBI in 89 games before the All-Star Break...then hit .222 with 15 home runs and 39 RBI in 67 games after the break...entered the season with a .236 career average before the break, .280 after the break...averaged 4.19 pitches per plate appearance, which was sixth most in the AL...made a team-leading 88 starts hitting second and also had 64 starts batting third...made his second consecutive Opening Day start at third base on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo and had a double, home run and three RBI...homed in the A's 1-0 win over Boston April 2 to become the first player in Athletics history to hit a first inning home run in a 1-0 victory...had six putouts the next day against the Red Sox to set an Oakland record for putouts in a nine-inning game by a third baseman...the last Athletic to do it was Joe Burns on Aug. 2, 1944 at Chicago...batted .306 with nine home runs and 22 RBI over his first 35 games through May 4...had his first career game-ending RBI May 10 against Cleveland, a walk-off home run off Brad Hand to lead off the 12th...it was the third time he was at the plate for a walk-off (single and error on July 22, 2018; wild pitch on Sept. 22, 2018)...homed in a career-high tying three consecutive games from May 25-27...had a season-best nine-game hitting streak from June 14 to 22 (14-for-34, .412)...that began a 25-game stretch where he hit .366 with 22 runs, 11 doubles, two triples, six home runs, 23 RBI and 13 walks (.443 obp, .770 slug, 1.164 OPS)...hit his second career walk-off home run June 20 against Tampa Bay, a three-run shot off Diego Castillo...had a career-high six RBI June 30 at Los Angeles (AL) when he went 3-for-5 with a double, triple and home run...became the 10th player in Oakland history to fall a single short of the cycle (last: Canha, May 19, 2017)...drove in five runs nine games later against Seattle on July 16...was named to his first AL All-Star team June 30...finished second on the Player Ballot to Alex Bregman, who was voted in by the fans...walked in his only at bat in the All-Star Game July 9 at Cleveland and also scored a run...is the fifth third baseman in Oakland history to be named to the All-Star team (Bando, 1969, 72-74; Gross, 1977;

Lansford, 1988; Donaldson, 2014)...also participated in the Home Run Derby on July 8 and hit 13 home runs in a first round loss to Vladimir Guerrero, Jr. (29)...had back-to-back two-homer games Aug. 14 at San Francisco and Aug. 15 against Houston, the third and fourth multi-homer games of his career...it marks the 12th time in Oakland history a player had back-to-back multi-homer games (last: Khris Davis, April 10-11, 2019)...scored three runs in each of those two games, marking the 16th time in Oakland history a player scored three or more runs in back-to-back games (last: Ben Zobrist, June 14-15, 2015)...collected his 100th career double Aug. 31 at New York (AL)...started at third base in the AL Wild Card Game on Oct. 2 against Tampa Bay and went 1-for-3 with a walk.

2018—Was one of the top fielders in the game and one of the top hitters in the game after the All-Star Break...earned the American League Gold Glove for third basemen after leading all Major League fielders with 29 defensive runs saved and topping ML third basemen in total chances (484) and assists (331)...also won the Platinum Glove for all AL fielders and was named Defensive Player of the Year by Wilson...hit .309 with 14 home runs, 39 RBI and a .961 OPS in 64 games after the break after batting .250 with 10 home runs, 29 RBI and a .776 OPS in 81 games before the break...led the majors in doubles after the break (25) and led the AL in runs (52) and extra base hits (42)...also ranked third in the AL in hits (80) and OPS (.961), fifth in slugging (.591), seventh in batting and tied for ninth in home runs and RBI...the 25 doubles set an Oakland post-break record and were the most since Ferris Fain had 26 in 87 games in 1952...the 42 extra base hits tied the Oakland record at the time...overall, hit .278 with 24 home runs and 68 RBI in 145 games...tied for seventh in the AL in doubles (42), tied for eighth in triples (6), ranked ninth in OPS (.864) and 10th in runs (100) and extra base hits (72)...finished seventh in AL MVP voting and was one of seven players to be named on all 30 ballots...led the A's in batting, on-base percentage, runs, doubles and triples...became the first Athletic to score 100 runs since Nick Swisher had 106 in 2006...hit .274 with 20 of his 24 home runs against right-handed pitchers, .288 against left-handers...batted .311 with 16 of his 24 home runs and a .984 OPS on the road...ranked third in the AL in OPS on the road...11 of his 24 home runs and 35 of his 68 RBI came with two strikes...tied for eighth in the AL in two-strike home runs and tied for ninth in RBI...in addition to leading ML third basemen in total chances and assists, he ranked second in putouts (133) and third in double plays (37) and games (145)...his 20 errors were second most (Devers, BOS 24)...the total chances were the second most in Oakland history to the record of 523 set by Sal Bando in 1969...the errors tied for sixth most...made a team-leading 60 starts batting second where hit .291 with 12 home runs and 35 RBI...hit .359 with a 1.074 OPS against AL Central teams...made his first career Opening Day start March 29 against Los Angeles (AL) and became the A's fifth different Opening Day starter at third base in the last five years (Plouffe, Valencia, Lawrie, Donaldson)...had a career-best streak of five consecutive multiple hit games from April 2-6...batted .358 with five home runs and 12 RBI over his first 14 games through April 13...tied an Oakland record June 12 against Houston with three doubles and did it again Aug. 13 against Seattle...is the third player in Oakland history with two three-double games in a season (Rudi, 1974; Grieve, 1998)...had his consecutive games played streak of 149 end on June 15...was placed on the 10-day disabled list June 16 retroactive to June 15 with a right thumb contusion...was reinstated July 3 and hit .300 with 14 home runs, 42 RBI and a .921 OPS over his final 76 games...went 4-for-4 with two doubles, a walk and a stolen base July 7 at Cleveland...it was his first career four-hit game, his first stolen base and the first time he reached base safely five times in a game...reached base safely in a career-high 30 consecutive games from July 11 to Aug. 17...hit .342 with a .415 on-base percentage and .658 slugging percentage during the streak, which was the longest by an Athletic since Jack Cust had a 39-game streak from Aug. 26, 2008-April 18, 2009...tied an Oakland record with two triples July 26 at Texas...also homered to join Adam Piatt (April 30, 2000 vs. Minnesota) as the only players in Oakland history to homer in a two-triple game...23 of his 33 hits from July 26 to Aug. 24 were for extra bases (13 doubles, three triples, seven home runs)...had an A's season-high tying 14-game hitting streak from July 31 to Aug. 17...hit .328 with 12 runs, eight doubles, a triple, three home runs and nine RBI during the streak...batted .322 in July...had his only two-homer game of the season and the second of his career Aug. 26 at Minnesota...batted .319 with 22 runs, 12 doubles, one triple, nine home runs and 18 RBI in 27 games in August...led the majors with 22 extra base hits, which match the most by an Athletic in August (Bob Johnson, 1938)...it was the second-highest total in any month in Oakland history to Reggie Jackson's 24 in June of 1969...tied for the Major League lead with 12 doubles, which fell one short of the Oakland record for August (13, Lowrie in 2013)...

tied for third in the AL in home runs, which also fell one short of the Oakland record of 10 (Davis in 2018, Chavez in 2002, Brosius in 1995)...went 1-for-5 in a start at third base in the Wild Card game at New York on Oct. 3...had surgery on his right thumb following the season...Dr. Steven Shin performed an ulnar sided sesamoid bone excision along the right thumb at the Cedars-Sinai Kerlan-Jobe Institute in Los Angeles on Oct. 16...also had surgery on his left shoulder two months later...Dr. William Workman performed a distal clavicle resection procedure at the Bass Surgical Center in Walnut Creek, Calif. on Dec. 14.

2017—Was selected from Triple-A Nashville June 15 and started 83 of the A's 84 games at third base while on the active roster following his promotion (had a 14-day stint on the DL)...led Major League rookies in doubles (21) and extra base hits (37) after the All-Star Break and ranked third among American League rookies in runs (37), home runs (14) and RBI (37)...batted .234 with 14 home runs and 40 RBI in 84 games overall in his ML debut...ranked sixth among AL rookies in walks (32), seventh in doubles (23), eighth in extra base hits (39), ninth in total bases (137), 10th in home runs and tied for 10th in RBI...was the third baseman on *Baseball America's* All-Rookie Team...had 68 hits, 39 of which went for extra bases (57.4%)...that was the second highest percentage of hits going for extra bases in Athletics history among players with 250 or more plate appearances (59.8%, McGwire in 1995)...turned 34 double plays in 84 games as a third baseman, which ranked fourth among AL third basemen...they were the most in ML history among third basemen with fewer than 100 games played...averaged 3.57 total chances per nine innings, which is the best mark in Oakland history by a third baseman with 40 or more games played...committed 13 errors, which tied for sixth most among AL third basemen...his 83 starts were the most by an A's rookie third baseman since Eric Chavez had 98 in 1999...was selected from Nashville June 15 and made his ML debut that night against New York (AL)...went 0-for-3 with two walks...collected his first big league RBI on a second inning ground out against the Yankees on June 16...then had the game-winning two-run single in the bottom of the eighth inning off Jonathan Holder for his first hit...started all four games at third base in the series against New York before he was placed on the 10-day disabled list June 22 retroactive to June 19 with left knee cellulitis...was reinstated July 3...hit his first Major League home run July 15 off Corey Kluber, a solo blast in the third inning...added his second home run in the eighth inning and the two-homer game came in the 13th game of his career...at the time, the only other player in Oakland history with a two-homer game that early in his career is Mitchell Page, who did it in his sixth game on April 13, 1977...was ejected from the game in the fourth inning Sept. 6 by home plate umpire Mike Everitt...hit .257 with 16 home runs and 30 RBI in 49 games with Nashville...added six doubles and two triples for a .589 slugging percentage...the home runs were tied for third most in the Pacific Coast League and tied for fifth in all of the minor leagues at the time of his June 15 promotion to Oakland...also ranked fifth in the PCL in slugging...hit .304 with 11 home runs and 19 RBI over his final 28 games...hit .320 against left-handed pitching, .338 in the sixth inning or later and .417 with a .475 on-base percentage when leading off an inning...was on the disabled list from April 8 to 21 with a sprained left wrist...had two home runs May 2 at Round Rock...had six home runs over a 10-game span from May 16-25...batted .272 with 11 home runs and 20 RBI in 29 games in May...the home runs led all of minor league baseball...hit safely in each of his final 11 Triple-A games, going 14-for-42 (.333) with five home runs and 10 RBI.

2016—Was named Texas League Player of the Year after batting .244 with 29 home runs and 83 RBI in 117 games with Double-A Midland...led the league in runs (78), home runs, slugging percentage (.521), extra base hits (59) and strikeouts (147), ranked second in RBI and tied for third in walks (59)...was named to the TL Midseason and Postseason All-Star teams and was a *Baseball America* Double-A All-Star...was promoted to Triple-A Nashville in mid-August and hit .197 with seven home runs and 13 RBI in 18 games with the Sounds...combined to hit .237 with 36 home runs and 96 RBI in 135 games...the home runs were third most in all of minor league baseball behind Dylan Cozens (40) and Rhys Hoskins (38) of the Phillies organization...also tied for fourth in the minors in extra base hits (68), ranked sixth in total bases (267) and tied for 10th in RBI...led the A's farm system in home runs, RBI, runs (92), extra base hits and total bases, ranked second in slugging (.519) and third in walks (68)...hit 21 home runs and drove in 60 runs over his final 67 contests...led TL third basemen in fielding (.971), total chances (342), putouts (87), assists (245) and double plays (41)...overall, he appeared in 118 games at third base and 10 at shortstop...committed 11 errors as a third baseman (.973 fielding percentage) and five as a shortstop (.911)...was

rated as the A's number 3 prospect by *Baseball America* following the season...went 3-for-4 with two home runs and five RBI April 17 against Northwest Arkansas...it was his first of five multi-homer games...started at third base for the South Division All-Stars in the Texas League All-Star Game on June 28 at Springfield and went 0-for-2 with a walk...went 4-for-5 with three doubles and four RBI on July 19 against Corpus Christi...hit .342 with seven home runs and 22 RBI over his final 20 games with Midland...finished July with 27 RBI in 29 games...had two home runs and a season-high six RBI Aug. 6 against Corpus Christi...was named TL Player of the Week Aug. 15 after going 7-for-22 (.318) with three doubles, three home runs and eight RBI in six games during the week of Aug. 8-14...was promoted to Nashville Aug. 17...combined in the month of August for nine home runs and 24 RBI in 28 games...hit three home runs Sept. 3 at New Orleans...went 2-for-14 (.143) with three walks in four postseason games for Nashville.

2015—Spent the entire season at Single-A Stockton but appeared in just 80 games due to two stints on the disabled list...batted .250 with 23 home runs and 57 RBI...despite the limited playing time, he led the A's farm system in home runs...tied for seventh in the California League in home runs but his 23 home runs were the most in the league from May 7 to Aug. 3 (between his two stints on the DL)...appeared exclusively at third base on defense where he committed 19 errors in 77 games for a .922 fielding percentage...began the season on the DL with a strained left knee and was reinstated May 7...connected for his lone two-homer game of the season May 31 against Lake Elsinore...had his best month in July when he hit .280 with 10 doubles, a triple, 10 home runs and 22 RBI in 29 games...slugged .673...tied for the lead in all of minor league baseball in July home runs (Adam Duvall, Louisville)...was placed on the DL a second time Aug. 4 with a left wrist contusion...was reinstated Sept. 2 and went 0-for-11 over his final three games...was rated as the A's third-best prospect by *Baseball America* following the season.

2014—Spent most of his first professional season at Single-A Beloit of the Midwest League where he batted .237 with five home runs and 20 RBI in 50 games...also appeared in three games with the A's affiliate in the Arizona Rookie League and one with Double-A Midland and hit .246 in 54 games overall...appeared exclusively at third base on defense where he committed 12 errors in 41 games for a .910 fielding percentage...went 2-for-5 with a double in his professional debut with the A's affiliate in the Arizona Rookie League on June 20 against the Angels...was transferred to Beloit June 23 and hit his first professional home run June 29 against Kane County...was on the disabled list from July 17 to 24 with a left hip contusion...hit his first career grand slam and drove in six runs Aug. 22 against Quad Cities...was sent to Midland Sept. 1 and went 0-for-3 in his only game that day at Frisco...then batted .310 with two home runs and four RBI in eight postseason games to help the RockHounds to the Texas League Championship...was rated as the A's fourth-best prospect by *Baseball America* following the season.







Spent the entire 2021 season in the A's starting rotation and was 10-15 with a 4.24 ERA in 32 starts...made his Major League debut with Philadelphia in 2019 and went 2-2 with a 6.75 ERA in 19 games, including three starts, in two seasons with the Phillies...is 12-17 with a 4.75 in 51 games, 35 starts, in his career...was used mostly as a starter in the minors where he is 34-15 with a 3.07 ERA in 78 games, including 72 starts...has a .246 opponents batting average and has walked just 95 batters in 452.0 innings, an average of 1.89 per nine innings...was selected as the International League Most Valuable Pitcher and a *Baseball America* Triple-A All-Star in 2018 after going 14-4 with a 2.57 ERA for Lehigh Valley...led the IL in ERA and wins and ranked third in strikeouts (131).



CONSECUTIVE GAMES WITHOUT BEING NO-HIT

When the Cincinnati Reds were no-hit by the Cubs Jake Arrieta on April 21, 2016, the A's took over the longest active streak of consecutive games with one or more hits, a streak that reached 4,767 at the conclusion of the 2021 season. The streak is third longest in American League history and would need to last another five years before breaking the record set of 5,550 set by Kansas City from May 16, 1973 to May 18, 2008. The last time the A's were no-hit was July 13, 1991 when Bob Milacki, Mike Flanagan, Mark Williamson and Gregg Olson combined to no-hit Oakland for Baltimore.

- Started 53 games at second base and 37 in left field...appeared in a team-leading 89 games at second base and made five errors for a .980 fielding percentage...did not make an error in 49

games in the outfield and now has a 218-game errorless streak as an outfielder dating back to his last error on May 25, 2016 against Baltimore.





two RBI, a walk and a hit by pitch in three openers...stole two bases on April 7 vs. Los Angeles (NL) for the second two-steal game of his career...swiped two bags a second time on April 12 at Arizona and had eight stolen bases over his first nine games through April 13...did not steal another base until July 4 against Boston for a career-high 55-game streak without a stolen base...had just four steals over his final 79 contests...hit .323 over his first eight games through April 12 but then went 4-for-36 (.111) over his next nine contests, which saw his average fall to .209...had his first assist of the season in the first inning on April 18 against Detroit on an 8-5 fielders choice...it was the first such play by an A's center fielder since Dwayne Murphy in the second game of the July 10, 1980 doubleheader against the Angels (Murphy did it twice that year: June 1)...went 16-for-49 (.327) with three doubles, five home runs and eight RBI over a 13-game stretch from April 24-May 5...stole eight bases in April, which were the most an Athletic in the month of April since 2013 when Coco Crisp also had eight...homered in three consecutive games for the second time in his career May 1-3 (also July 6-12, 2019)...went 2-for-3 with two home runs and a walk-off sacrifice fly May 18 against Houston...it was the third multi-homer game of his career...the first two came against Texas on Aug. 20 and Sept. 7, 2018, also in the Coliseum...it was his fourth career game-ending RBI, his second against Houston (Sept. 9, 2020)...was also at the plate for a game-ending E-5 on April 21 against Minnesota...went 4-for-4 with three runs scored May 21 at Los Angeles (AL), tying career highs in runs and hits...it was his third four-hit game (last: June 18, 2019 vs. Baltimore)...then had three hits the next day to give him back-to-back games with three or more hits for the second time in his career (July 17-18, 2019)...batted .292 with eight home runs and 13 RBI in 24 games in May...the home runs matched his most ever in a month (July, 2019) and tied for third in the American League in May...was hitting .257 with 11 home runs and 22 RBI in 48 games overall when he was placed on the 10-day injured list June 1 retroactive to May 29 with a strained right hip...did not have a rehab assignment and was reinstated for the IL on June 16...was 7-for-22 (.318) with two home runs and five RBI over his first seven games following his return but then went 4-for-43 (.093) over his next 11 contests from June 23 to July 4...was 0-for-9 in his first two games after the All-Star Break...then hit .305 with eight doubles over his next 15 games before he was suspended for 80 games on Aug. 6 after testing positive for Nandrolone, a performance-enhancing substance in violation of Major League Baseball's Joint Drug Prevention and Treatment Program...had successful core injury surgery on Sept. 30 in Philadelphia, Pa. with Dr. William Meyers at the Vincera Institute.

2020—After hitting .288 in each of his first two seasons, batted .213 with six home runs and 25 RBI in 54 games in the shortened 2020 season...walked 24 times and was hit by a pitch a career-high 12 times for a .338 on-base percentage...the hit by pitches were second most in the majors (Contreras, CHC)...tied for ninth in the majors in game winning RBI (6)...was batting .262 with three home runs, 12 RBI and an .859 OPS in 19 games before serving a four-game suspension from Aug. 14-17 for his actions in the A's game against the Astros on Aug. 9...hit .186 with three home runs, 13 RBI and a .616 OPS in 35 games following his return...batted .216 with 21 of his 24 walks and 10 of his 12 hit by pitches against right-handers pitchers compared to .205 against left-handers...his average improved to .278 with runners in scoring position and he was 7-for-16 (.438) with RISP and two outs...was 2-for-5 (.400) with four RBI with the bases loaded...hit four of his six home runs with two outs...batted .278 with a .409 on-base percentage when leading off an inning...had a .161 batting average against a pitcher the first time he faced him in a game, .267 the second time and .346 after that...started 53 games on defense, all in center field, and did not commit an error after making seven errors in 2019...his 146 total chances were second most in the majors among outfielders (Robert, CWS 154) but they were the most among outfielders with no errors...they were 10th most in Oakland history by an outfielder with no errors...led Major League outfielders in total chances per nine innings (2.94) and ranked second in putouts (144)...had just two assists...also made one start at designated hitter...started games in every spot in the order except fourth, fifth and ninth and saw his most action with a team-leading 28 starts batting second...hit .233 against the American League West, .160 against the National League West...made his second consecutive Opening Day start in center field on July 24 against Los Angeles (AL)...doubled, homered, drove in two runs, was hit by a pitch and scored a career-high tying three runs (third time)...tied the Oakland Opening Day record for runs scored (fourth time, last: Lance Blankenship, 1993)...struck out at least once in 18 consecutive games

from July 28 to Aug. 20, which doubled the previous longest streak of his career (9, Aug. 11-23, 2018)...made his first career start at designated hitter July 29 against Colorado and went 0-for-3 with a walk...had three home runs and 10 RBI over his first 12 games through Aug. 5 but just three home runs and 15 RBI over his final 42 contests...hit safely in four consecutive games from Aug. 5-8 (4-for-14, .286), which was his longest hitting streak of the season...was hit by a pitch an Oakland record tying two times Aug. 9 against Houston (42nd time, last: Robbie Grossman vs. Houston on Aug. 7, 2020)...it was his second career two-hit by pitch game and it gave him five hit by pitches over his first 16 games...served a four-game suspension from Aug. 14-17 for his actions in the game against the Astros on the 9th...batted lead off in the second game of the Aug. 29 doubleheader at Houston following an injury to Marcus Semien and led off the game with a home run...it was the second leadoff home run of his career (Sept. 7, 2018 vs. Texas)...was hit by a pitch seven times in August, which tied the Athletics franchise record for hit by pitches in August (Eddie Murphy, 1914)...hit just .203 in 23 games in August but had 12 walks and a .357 on-base percentage...then batted .185 with a .287 on-base percentage in 24 games in September...had the walk-off RBI single Sept. 9 against Houston...it was his third career walk-off RBI...hit the game-winning two-run home run in the ninth inning off former Athletic Blake Treinen on Sept. 23 at Los Angeles (NL)...three of his six home runs put the A's ahead and another tied the game...started all seven of the A's postseason games in center field and went 5-for-26 (.192) with two home runs and five RBI...went 2-for-11 (.182) with an RBI in the ALWCS against Chicago with both hits coming in Game 2...then went 3-for-15 (.200) with a double, two home runs and four RBI in the ALDS against Houston at Dodger Stadium...had two home runs and four RBI in Game 4...it was the 10th two-homer postseason game in Athletics history, the first since Brandon Moss in the 2014 AL Wild Card game...the four RBI tied the Oakland record for an ALDS game (Pinder, 2020 Game 3; Scutaro, 2006 Game 3)...matches Dave Henderson (1989 World Series Game 3) for the most home runs and RBI by an A's center fielder in a postseason game.

2019—Batted .288 with 24 home runs and 67 RBI in 123 games in a season interrupted by a five-week stay on the injured list with a right lower leg stress reaction...added 29 doubles for a .521 slugging percentage...was successful in 13-of-15 (86.7%) stolen base attempts...led the A's in steals and they were the fewest by an A's team-leader since Shannon Stewart had 11 in 2007... at the age of 24, he was the youngest Athletic with 20 or more home runs and 10 or more stolen bases in a season since Jose Canseco did it in 1988 at the age of 23...despite missing 32 games while on the IL, he tied for third among American League outfielders with 10 assists, including five in his first 18 games...tied for fifth in the AL in sacrifice flies (8) and tied for ninth in hit by pitches (11)...was hitting .265 with a .468 slugging percentage and .782 OPS in 91 games before the All-Star Break...then batted .358 with a .679 slugging percentage and 1.090 OPS in 32 games after the break...his post-break batting average was the best in the AL among players with 100 or more plate appearances...had the third-best slugging percentage and fourth-best OPS...hit 21 of his 24 home runs and collected 59 of his 67 RBI in 109 games as a center fielder...ranked third among AL center fielders in RBI and tied for third in home runs...the home runs were fifth most in Oakland history by a center fielder and the most since Dave Henderson had 25 in 1991...hit .296 against left-handed pitchers, .285 against right-handers...batted .292 at home, .284 on the road... was a perfect 8-for-8 in stolen base attempts at home...hit .288 during the day, .288 at night... batted .333 with nine doubles and eight home runs (.700 slugging percentage) when leading off an inning...ranked seventh in the AL in slugging and OPS (1.081) leading off an inning and 10th in batting...hit .226 with 11 of his 24 home runs and 30 of his 67 RBI with two strikes...committed seven errors in 122 games overall in the outfield, which tied for second among AL outfielders... had a .977 fielding percentage...made a team-leading 104 starts in center field and 11 of his final 12 in right field...went 0-for-3 as a pinch hitter...started games at every spot in the order except third and ninth...saw his most action with a team-leading 45 games batting eighth...hit .358 with seven home runs and 18 RBI in 26 games batting fifth...became the A's sixth different Opening Day starter in center field in the last six years on March 20 against Seattle in Tokyo (Crisp, Fuld, Burns, R.Davis, Powell)...had five outfield assists over a 12-game span from April 1 to 14...had his first career four-hit game April 5 at Houston (also June 18 vs. Baltimore)...batted .317 over his final 87 games beginning May 8...was awarded Major League Baseball's Play of the Week April 22 after robbing Teoscar Hernández of a home run in the second inning on April 21 against Toronto... reached base safely in a career-high 28 consecutive games from May 8 to June 9...hit .318 with a .353 on-base percentage during the streak...it was the second-longest reaching base streak by

a center fielder in Oakland history (33, Dwayne Murphy, May 18-June 21, 1979)...grounded into the first double play of his career May 10 against Cleveland...that snapped a career-opening 83-game streak without a GDP, which was the second-longest such streak in Oakland history (84, Jason McDonald, June 5, 1997-May 9, 1998)...had the walk-off RBI single May 11 vs. Cleveland...had a career-high 16-game hitting streak from May 16 to June 4...went 23-for-63 (.365) with nine doubles and three home runs during the streak...had an Oakland record-tying streak of five consecutive games with a double from May 20-25 (fifth time: Tejada, 2003; Long, 2001; Stairs, 1997; Rudi, 1973)...had six home runs and 18 RBI in 57 games through the end of May...then had seven home runs and 22 RBI in 28 games in June...tied for fourth in the AL in RBI in June...had his first career grand slam, a career-high tying five RBI and his first career two-steal game June 12 at Tampa Bay...became the first Athletic with a grand slam and two stolen bases in the same game since Elmer Valo on June 21, 1949...is the first Athletic with five RBI and two steals in one game since Bing Miller on June 21, 1929...the last Major Leaguer to do it was Brandon Phillips on July 30, 2015 (7 RBI, 2 SB)...was hit by a pitch an Oakland record-tying two times June 22 against Tampa Bay...scored a run in 11 consecutive games from July 5 to 20 (17 runs total), which was the longest such streak by an Athletic since Ben Grieve also had an 11-game streak from April 29-May 10, 2000...it fell one short of the Oakland record of 12...homered in three straight games for the first time in his career, July 6-12...was named AL Player of the Week for the week of July 15-21 after going 13-for-24 (.542) with 10 runs, six doubles, two home runs, two RBI and five multiple hit games in six games...it was his first career weekly honor...batted .392 with 22 runs, nine doubles, eight home runs, 18 RBI and 11 multiple hit games in 22 games in July...led the American League in on-base percentage (.443), ranked second in batting (.392), slugging (.838) and OPS (1.281), tied for fourth in runs, tied for fifth in extra base hits (17), tied for sixth in doubles and tied for sixth in home runs...based on a minimum of 75 plate appearances, he had the best July batting average in Oakland history and the second-best slugging percentage and OPS to Mark McGwire in 1996 (.859/1.318)...was placed on the injured list July 31 retroactive to July 28 with a right lower leg stress reaction...did not have a rehab assignment before he was reinstated Sept. 6...made his first two starts in center field before making 11 of his final 12 starts in right...hit .315 in 16 games overall in September...started in right field in the AL Wild Card Game on Oct. 2 against Tampa Bay and went 1-for-3...drove in the A's only run with a third inning sacrifice fly.

2018—Spent the first four months of the season with Triple-A Nashville where he batted .297 with 14 home runs and 35 RBI in 64 games...was recalled by Oakland Aug. 3 and hit .288 with five home runs and 19 RBI in 48 games with the A's in his Major League debut...started 42 of the A's 52 games in center field following his promotion...had nine outfield assists, which led ML rookies and tied for second in Oakland history by a rookie (11, Mitchell Page in 1977)...they tied for fifth among all American League outfielders...had just 47 games in the outfield and his assists were second most in Athletics history by an outfielder with fewer than 50 games played to Wally Schang, who had 12 in 41 games for the 1915 Philadelphia A's...they matched the most by an ML outfielder with fewer than 50 games over the last 95 years (sixth time, last by Alex Escobar with Cleveland in 42 games in 2004)...all 47 of his defensive appearances came in center field, including 42 starts...was 7-for-8 (87.5%) in stolen base attempts and tied for sixth among AL rookies in steals...did not ground into a double play and his 156 at bats were fourth most in Oakland history among players with no GDP...they were the most since Jason McDonald had 236 in 1997...hit .297 with all five of his home runs against right-handed pitchers, .267 against left-handers...had a .324 batting average with runners in scoring position...batted .322 with four of his five home runs and 16 of his 19 RBI at home...hit .353 with a .455 on-base percentage and .676 slugging percentage when leading off an inning...batted .309 with all five of his home runs at night...started games at every spot in the order except third and fourth...had his most starts in the eight spot (13) and hit .356 in 16 games overall batting eighth...was recalled from Triple-A Nashville Aug. 3 and went 1-for-5 in a start in center field in his Major League debut that night against Detroit...collected his first hit and RBI with a walk-off RBI single off Buck Farmer in the bottom of the 13th inning of the A's 1-0 win...since the RBI became an official stat in 1920, he is the first Athletic with a walk-off RBI for his first ML hit...had an assist that night and the next game against the Tigers to become the first player in Oakland A's history with an outfield assist in each of the first two games of his career...stole the first base of his career and had his first multiple hit game in a 3-for-4 performance in his third game, Aug. 5 against Detroit...hit the first two home runs of his career Aug. 20 against Texas, both off Bartolo Colon (second and sixth inning)...became the 10th player

in Athletics history to hit his first two home runs in the same game (last: Chapman on July 15, 2017)...is the fourth player in Oakland history to hit his first Major League home run off a pitcher with at least 200 career wins (last: Kurt Abbott off Jack Morris on Sept. 9, 1993)...was 21 years and 52 days younger than Colon...was three months shy of his third birthday when Colon made his ML debut on April 4, 1997...also had a career-high five RBI on the 20th against the Rangers...batted .317 in 23 games in August...collected his second career two-homer game Sept. 7 against Texas...it came in his 29th game and he is the first player in Athletics history with two-multi homer games in his first 29 games...the previous earliest was Jose Canseco, who did it in his 42nd game on April 21, 1986...his first home run that day led off the game, which was the first leadoff home run of his career...was the A's starting center fielder in the Wild Card game Oct. 3 at New York and went 0-for-3 with a walk...had 31 walks with the Sounds for a .380 on-base percentage...was successful in 11-of-13 (84.6%) stolen base attempts...missed the first seven weeks while on the disabled list and the final five with Oakland...while he was with the Sounds (May 21-Aug. 1), he ranked fourth in the Pacific Coast League in hits (73), tied for fourth in runs (44) and tied for fifth in home runs...led the A's farm system in slugging (.524) and ranked fifth in on-base percentage...batted .372 with nine home runs and 19 RBI in 29 games in July and August...batted .324 with nine of his 15 home runs on the road...had a .336 batting average with runners on base...hit .384 in the sixth inning or later...appeared in 45 games in right field, 19 in center field and one in left field...had 13 assists, which ranked third among PCL outfielders...batted .350 with a .450 on-base percentage in 26 games batting leadoff...began the season on Nashville's disabled list with a non-displaced fracture of the fifth metacarpal bone on his left hand...was reinstated May 21...went 4-for-5 with three doubles June 13 at El Paso...stole the 100th base of his minor league career July 30 at Salt Lake...hit .373 with eight home runs and 18 RBI in 28 games in July...walked 13 times and was hit by a pitch four times for a .450 on-base percentage...slugged .673 and had a 1.122 OPS...led the PCL in runs in July (24), tied for the lead in hits (41), ranked second in home runs and slugging, tied for second in extra base hits (16) and fourth in OPS.

2017—Spent his final season in the Houston organization at Double-A Corpus Christi where he batted .227 with 11 home runs and 55 RBI in 123 games...tied for third in the Texas League in triples (6) and ranked fourth in stolen bases (24)...led TL outfielders in games, assists (16) and double plays (6)...batted .295 with an .891 OPS against left-handed pitching...hit .262 with eight home runs in 60 games in the second half...committed four errors in 123 games in the outfield for a .984 fielding percentage...appeared in 95 games in right field and 31 in center field...had a 74-game errorless streak from April 23 to July 23...was named Texas League Batter of the Week for the week of July 3 to 9...went 14-for-29 (.483) with five doubles, two triples, two home runs and five RBI during the week...was a perfect 5-for-5 with two doubles, a triple and three RBI July 9 against Arkansas...had an RBI in eight consecutive games from Aug. 22-31 and batted .484 with five home runs and 12 RBI over that span...collected his lone two-homer game of the season Aug. 23 against Midland.

2016—Had a breakout campaign while splitting his season between Double-A Corpus Christi and Single-A Lancaster...combined to hit .319 with 28 doubles, seven triples, 15 home runs, 73 RBI and a .955 OPS...named an Astros Organization All-Star by MiLB.com as a utility player...led all of minor league baseball with a .428 on-base percentage...began the year with Lancaster where he was named a California League All-Star...named Lancaster's Player of the Month for July as he hit .460 with a 1.350 OPS in 17 games...also named the California League Player of the Week for the week of July 11-17 after hitting .652 (15-for-23) with six doubles, two triples, four home runs and 11 RBI in seven games...was promoted to Corpus Christi on July 21...named the Hooks Player of the Month for August after hitting .318 with a .944 OPS in 24 games...following the season, was assigned to Glendale in the Arizona Fall League, where he hit .295 with an .817 OPS...earned AFL Player of the Week the first week after hitting .571 (8-for-14) with two triples, two doubles, three RBI, eight runs scored and three steals in four games.

- DAY-BY-DAY:** Made his sixth Opening Day start with Oakland on April 1 against Houston, his fourth at second base...only Mark Ellis (8) and Dick Green (6) have more Opening Day starts at second in Oakland history...it was his first game since Sept. 29, 2019 with the Mets against Atlanta and his first start since Sept. 30, 2018 with the A's against the Angels...singled in the fourth inning April 2 against Houston for his first hit since Sept. 29, 2018 at Los Angeles (AL)...hit safely in a season-high seven consecutive games from April 8-16 (13-for-27, .481)...drove in a run in each of the first six games of that streak (11 RBI total)...hit his first home run April 9 against Houston...it was his first home run since Sept. 29, 2018 with Oakland against the Angels...had a streak of six consecutive multiple hit games from April 9-16, which was the longest such streak of his career (12-for-26, .462)...that gave him a .360 batting average and 12 RBI over his first 14 games...then went 4-for-44 (.091) with five RBI over his next 12 contests from April 18-May 1...committed his first error of the season on April 21 against Minnesota...would not make his second until Aug. 11 at Cleveland for a 50-game errorless streak as a second baseman...hit .244 in the month of April, which was just the second time in his career he hit under .292 in April...went 1-for-18 (.056) in five games with Boston in 2009...now has a .305 career average in April...had back-to-back three-hit games last May 2 and 3...it was the sixth time in his career he has put together consecutive three-hit games (last: April 5-6, 2018)...went 3-for-28 (.107) over a nine-game stretch from May 9-19...had a 1-for-24 skid from June 11-20...went 11 consecutive games without an extra base hit from June 11-23, which was the second longest streak of his career (15, Sept. 20, 2015-April 9, 2016)...played third base on June 21 at Texas, his first game action at third base since July 1, 2018 against Cleveland...hit .393 (24-for-61) with six home runs, 14 RBI and nine multiple hit games over a 16-game span from June 24-July 16...capped that stretch with a season-high tying seven-game hitting streak from July 6-16 (13-for-29, .448)...hit the game-ending two-run home run in the bottom of the ninth inning July 16 against Cleveland...it was his third career "walk-off" home run (last: May 28, 2017 vs. Los Angeles-AL) and his sixth career "walk-off" RBI (last: Sept. 8, 2017 vs. Houston)...it extended his streak of consecutive games with a home run to a career-high tying three (June 7-9, 2012)...batted .294 with four home runs and 17 RBI in July, all his best single-month marks of 2021...had a 1-for-23 streak from Aug. 17-27...made his final start of the season at second base on Aug. 26...each of his remaining 21 games were as a pinch hitter or designated hitter...went 3-for-23 (.130) over his final 13 games beginning Sept. 10...was placed on the injured list Sept. 26 with a sprained right wrist and missed the remainder of the season.

2017—Set an Oakland record with 49 doubles, breaking the previous mark of 47 set by Jason Giambi in 2001...ranked second in the majors to Cleveland's Jose Ramirez (56) and second in Athletics history to Al Simmons (53 in 1926)...had the eighth best double total by a switch hitter in Major League history...had career highs in runs (86), doubles and extra base hits (66)...led the A's in batting (.277) hits (157), doubles, triples (3) and on-base percentage (.360)...ranked second among ML second basemen with a .991 fielding percentage (Dozier, MIN .993) and was fourth among American League second basemen in double plays (98)...the double plays tied for second most in Oakland history and were the most since Mark Ellis set the record with 104 in 2007... appeared in 136 games at second base and one at third base (Sept. 6 vs. Los Angeles-AL)...led the majors in line drives (155) and line drive percentage (33.0%)...the line drives were the most by an Athletic since Stats, Inc. began tracking them in 1988 (previous: 136 by Carney Lansford in 1989)...made a team-leading 102 starts batting third...committed his first error of the season April 28 at Houston, which snapped a 75-game errorless as a second baseman...it was his first error since May 4, 2016 and the errorless streak was third longest in Oakland history by a second baseman...later had a 43-game errorless streak from July 4 to Aug. 26...had his third career two-homer game May 8 against Los Angeles (AL), but it was his first since Oct. 3, 2010 vs. New York (AL)...his second home run that night was the game-ending shot with two outs in the bottom of the 11th inning...it was his fourth career game-ending hit, his second home run...was a perfect 4-for-4 May 24 against Miami, which matched his career high for hits...doubled in the first inning July 6 at Seattle for the 200th two-bagger of his career...had his eighth and final two-double

- Was 2-2 in five interleague starts but had a 2.67 ERA, .180 opponents batting average and .531 OPS...over the last two years, he is 4-3 with a 3.00 ERA in 10 interleague starts compared to 11-10 with a 4.37 ERA in 33 starts against AL competition.
- Had just one unearned run, which matched the fewest in Oakland history by a qualifier for the ERA title.
- Had a career-high 11 no decisions and the A's went 8-3 in those games...were 19-13 (.594) in his starting assignments and are 30-18 (.625) when he starts over the last three years.
- Walked two batters or fewer in 26 of his 32 starts, including eight starts with no walks and 13 with one...had three 10-strikeout games and is the 11th pitcher (12th time) in Oakland history with three or more 10-strikeout games...now has six in his career, which is tied for seventh most in Oakland history.
- **DAY-BY-DAY:** Allowed five runs on six hits and a season-high three walks in 4.2 innings for the loss in his first start on April 4 against Houston...it was his first of six games with three walks...then went 3-0 with a 1.50 ERA over his next four starts...picked up his first win of the season in the 100th game of his career, an 8-4 victory over Detroit on April 15...tossed a six-hit, seven-inning shutout in the A's 7-0 win over Minnesota in the first game of the doubleheader April 20...it was the 11th complete game shutout of fewer than eight innings in Oakland history (last: Mike Minor, Sept. 14, 2020 at Seattle)...it was his second career complete game and shutout, with the first being his no-hitter on April 21, 2018 against Boston...the start was the 100th of his career and he became the 25th pitcher in Oakland history to make 100 starts...went 0-1 with a 6.64 ERA and .326 opponents batting average over a four-start stretch from May 2 to 18...had 10 strikeouts on May 7 against Tampa Bay, but had a no decision in the A's 2-1 win...retired each of the first 18 batters he faced before walking Arozarena to start the seventh...then retired the next three before Brousseau led off the eighth inning with a double...allowed a season-high seven runs on a season-high 10 hits in 2.0 innings for the loss at Boston on May 13...has allowed seven or more runs in a start four times in his career, three of which have come at Fenway Park (8 on May 10, 2016; 7 on Sept. 12, 2017)...also allowed 10 hits in his next start on May 18 against Houston to become the first A's pitcher to yield 10 hits in back-to-back starts since Kendall Graveman in 2016 (April 25-May 2)...allowed one run or fewer in five consecutive starts from May 23 to June 14 and went 3-0 with a 0.84 ERA over that span...became the first A's pitcher with five consecutive games of one run or fewer and five innings pitched or more since Trevor Cahill (April 17-May 9, 2011)...had a no decision in the A's 6-5 loss at Los Angeles (AL) on May 23...left with a 4-1 lead but the bullpen blew the save...it was the first of three times the pen blew the save in a game in which he was the pitcher of record (July 16 vs. Cleveland, Sept. 3 at Toronto)...struck out Justin Upton to lead off the game for the 50,000th strikeout in Oakland history...fanned Taylor Ward to end the fourth inning for his 500th career strikeout...finished May 0-1 with a 4.78 ERA and .300 opponents batting average in six starts...is now 5-9 with a 5.51 ERA in 21

career starts in May...tossed a four-hit shutout in the A's 6-0 win at Seattle on June 2...it was his third career complete game and shutout, his second in 2021...logged a season-high 111 pitches, which are his most in a game over the last four years...then tossed 111 pitches in his next start on June 9 against Arizona when he combined with Petit, Trivino and Diekman on a two-hit shutout in the A's 4-0 win...it was the second time in his career he did not allow a run in back-to-back starts (Sept. 14-20, 2016)...had a career-high 16.0-inning scoreless streak from June 2 to 14...lost four consecutive starts from June 20 to July 7 for the longest losing streak of his career (previous: 3, Aug. 1-18, 2017)...had a 3.91 ERA and .213 opponents batting average during the losing streak and received a total of four runs of support...struck out 11 batters in 5.1 innings June 20 at New York (AL) but was the losing pitcher in the A's 2-1 loss...the 11 strikeouts match the most in Athletics history by a pitcher with fewer than six innings pitched (Kirk Saarloos on Sept. 19, 2006 and Tim Hudson on June 8, 1999)...went 2-for-2 with a double on June 25 at San Francisco, collecting the first extra base hit by an A's pitcher since Joe Kennedy doubled on June 12, 2007 at Houston...was named AL Pitcher of the Month for June after going 3-2 with a 1.13 ERA and .181 opponents batting average in five starts...struck out 34 batters in 32.0 innings and allowed just one home run...it was the second time he was named Pitcher of the Month (April 2018)...based on a minimum of 30 innings, his ERA was the lowest by an A's pitcher in June since Lefty Grove had a 0.51 ERA in June of 1926...had the lowest ERA in the majors in June...had the lowest opponents OPS (.496), slugging percentage (.250), on-base percentage (.246) and batting average in the AL...struck out a career-high 13 batters in 7.0 innings in a 4-1 win at Seattle on July 22...matched the most strikeouts in Athletics history by a pitcher with seven innings or fewer (Montas, Sept. 27, 2020 vs. Seattle; Blue, April 9, 1971 vs. Kansas City) and equaled the seventh highest single-game total in Oakland history...Vida Blue is the only other Oakland lefty to fan 13 or more (five times, last: July 23, 1976 vs. Kansas City (13))...retired each of the first 16 batters he faced in a 10-4 win at San Diego on July 28...it was his third career start where he was perfect through at least five innings (Sept. 10, 2020 vs. Houston, 5.0; May 7, 2021 vs. Tampa Bay, 6.0)...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the second pitcher in Oakland history with three or more starts where he was perfect through five innings (Barry Zito)...went 2-2 with a 3.30 ERA and .211 opponents batting average in five starts in July...struck out 41 and walked just five in 30.0 innings...the strikeouts tied for third in the AL in July and tied Mike Moore (1989) for the third highest total in July in Oakland history behind Vida Blue (55 in 1971, 42 in 1976)...tossed 1.2 innings in a no decision at Cleveland on Aug. 10...it was the second shortest start of his career (0.1, Aug. 17, 2017 vs. Baltimore)...yielded three home runs in a game for the first time in his career and allowed a season-high tying seven runs in 5.0 innings in a 7-4 loss at Texas on Aug. 15...sur-rendered three home runs again two starts later on Aug. 27 against New York (AL)...finished August 0-3 with a 9.90 ERA and .344 opponents batting average in five starts...the ERA was the highest by an Athletics pitcher in a month with 20 or more innings pitched since Carl Scheib posted a 9.99 ERA in July of 1947...tossed five innings or fewer in all five starts...is now 8-12 with a 6.01 ERA in 26 career starts in August...the losses are his most in any month and the ERA is his highest...then went 2-1 with a 3.77 ERA in five starts in September...struck out 32 and walked just four in 31.0 innings...is now 12-4 with a 2.55 ERA (37 er in 130.1 ip) in 22 career starts in the month...the wins are his most for any month of the season and the ERA is his lowest.

2020—Went 4-3 with a 4.50 ERA in 11 starts...the ERA was the highest of his career as was his .270 opponents batting average...his .427 slugging percentage matched his high...went 4-1 with a 2.65 ERA and .234 opponents batting average over his final six starts dating back to Aug. 20...the wins tied for fourth most in the majors over that span...went 0-2 with a 7.65 ERA and .325 opponents average over his first five starts...tied for the team lead in starts...walked just eight batters in 54.0 innings, an average of 1.33 walks per nine innings...that was the lowest mark of his career and was sixth lowest in the majors among pitchers with 50 or more innings pitched...struck out 45 for a career-best 5.63 strikeout-to-walk ratio...had five starts without a walk, five with one and three in his other...had a 2.56 ERA and .233 opponents batting average over the first three innings of his starts compared to a 7.59 ERA and .319 opponents average from the fourth inning on...his .270 opponents batting average broke down to .250 against left-handed hitters compared to .277 against right-handers...issued seven of eight walks to righties...went 2-1 with

a 3.32 ERA and .182 opponents batting average in four starts during the day, 2-2 with a 5.29 ERA and .321 opponent average in seven starts at night...was 3-1 with a 3.91 ERA and .232 opponents batting average in five starts in Oakland, 1-2 with a 5.02 ERA and .302 opponents average in five starts on the road...was 2-1 with a 3.33 ERA in five interleague starts compared to 2-2 with a 5.67 ERA in six starts against the American League...had a .204 opponents batting average the first time through the lineup, .327 with seven of his eight walks after that...had a .281 batting average against batters leading off an inning but issued just one walk (.293 on-base percentage)...yielded a .222 average with the bases empty, .373 with runners on...opponents hit .375 with runners in scoring position and were 7-for-15 (.467) with RISP and two outs...allowed a .248 opponents average and four of his seven home runs with two strikes...was charged with five unearned runs, which tied for eighth most in the majors...tossed fewer than six innings in nine of his 11 starts... was 0-3 in four starts with two runs of support or fewer, 4-0 in seven starts with three or more... the A's were 7-4 (.636) in his starting assignments...began the season as the A's number two starter and took the loss in his first start on July 25 against Los Angeles (AL)...it was his first loss since Aug. 19, 2018 against Houston and it snapped a career-high tying five-game winning streak...lost again on July 31 at Seattle, which marked the first time he lost consecutive decisions since May 25-30, 2018...then went 2-0 with a 5.06 ERA in five starts in August...won four consecutive starts from Aug. 20-Sept. 10...allowed one earned run in each start and compiled a 1.61 ERA and .210 opponents average during the winning streak, which fell one short of his career high of five...tossed a season-high 7.0 innings Sept. 10 against Houston...retired each of the first 15 batters he faced before Reddick doubled to lead off the sixth...struck out a season-high seven batters on Sept. 15 at Colorado but was the losing pitcher in the A's 3-1 loss...it snapped his four-game winning streak and it also snapped an eight-game winning streak in the month of September... it was his first September loss since Sept. 12, 2017 at Boston...tossed a season-high 91 pitches in his final start on Sept. 23 at Los Angeles (NL)...went 2-1 with a 3.04 ERA and .216 opponents batting average in four starts in September...was on the A's roster for the American League Wild Card Series but did not pitch...started and lost Game 2 of the ALDS against Houston on Oct. 6 at Dodger Stadium (4.1 ip 5 h, 4 r, 4 er, 1 bb, 2 so, 2 hr).

2019—Began the season on the 60-day injured list as he continued his recovery from Sept. 19, 2018 surgery on his left shoulder...went 3-3 with a 4.71 ERA and .222 opponents batting average in eight rehab starts before he was reinstated from the IL Sept. 1...made five starts with Oakland and was 4-0 with a 1.21 ERA and .160 opponents batting average...the ERA was second lowest in the majors among pitchers with 25 or more innings pitched (Yates SD, 1.19) and fifth lowest in Oakland history...using the same minimum, the batting average was third lowest in the majors and sixth lowest in Oakland history...allowed two runs or fewer in all five starts and four hits or fewer four times...struck out 30 batters in 29.2 innings and walked just seven (2.12 per nine innings)...had a .229 opponents on-base percentage and .280 slugging percentage...his opponents batting average broke down to .129 against right-handed hitters compared to .211 against left-handers...opponents were 3-for-31 (.097) with runners on base, 0-for-15 with runners in scoring position and 0-for-8 with RISP and two outs...all three of the home runs he allowed were solo shots...did not allow a run in innings one through four (20.0 ip) and opponents were 8-for-63 (.127)...had a 3.72 ERA and .216 opponents average from the fifth inning on...was 2-0 with a 0.50 ERA in three starts during the day, 2-0 with a 2.31 ERA in two starts at night...yielded a .073 batting average with two strikes...did not allow a hit to the opponent's eight (0-for-9) or nine (0-for-10) hitter...went 4-0 in four starts with three runs of support or more...made his first start at New York (AL) on Sept. 1 and had a no decision in the A's 5-4 loss...it was his first Major League appearance since Aug. 24, 2018 at Minnesota...tossed five scoreless innings and allowed just one hit while walking three...then picked up the win in each of his final four starts to extend his winning streak to a career-high tying five games dating back to Aug. 24, 2018 (also May 20-June 10, 2017)...had a 1.04 ERA and .178 opponents batting average during the winning streak, which spanned six starts...struck out 10 batters in his second start on Sept. 8 against Detroit and was the winning pitcher in the A's 3-1 victory...tossed 6.0 scoreless innings to defeat Texas 6-1 on Sept. 15...finished September with a 4-0 record and a 1.21 ERA in five starts...ranked second in the AL in opponents OPS in September (.509), third in ERA and tied for third in wins...it was the second time he won four games in a month in his career (April 2018)...made his postseason debut with a start in the American League Wild Card Game Oct. 2 against Tampa Bay...was the losing pitcher in the A's 5-1 loss in Oakland (2.0 ip, 4 h, 4 r, 4 er, 5 so)...surrendered three home runs

after yielding two home runs or fewer in each of his first 86 career regular season appearances... started his rehab assignment with Single-A Stockton July 8 and was 0-1 with a 9.72 ERA in three starts when he was transferred to Triple-A Las Vegas July 23...went 0-1 with a 6.10 ERA in two starts with the Aviators before his rehab assignment was halted on Aug. 2 due to a strained right oblique...returned to action Aug. 13 and went 3-0 with a 1.53 ERA over his final three starts...was 3-3 with a 4.71 ERA and .222 opponents batting average in eight rehab starts overall...struck out 53 batters in 36.1 innings (13.13 per nine innings) and walked 10 for a strikeout-to-walk ratio of 5.3...struck out 10 batters in 5.2 innings Aug. 13 at Omaha and 12 on Aug. 23 at Tacoma.

2018—Was 12-9 with a 3.59 ERA and .232 opponents batting average in 27 starts before going on the disabled list Aug. 26 with a shoulder injury...underwent surgery Sept. 19 and missed the remainder of the season...his ERA, opponents batting average, on-base percentage (.278), slugging percentage (.385) and OPS (.663) were the lowest of his three seasons with at least 20 starts...also had career lows in strikeouts per nine innings (6.05) and walks per nine innings (1.79)...matched his career best in wins...based on a minimum of 150 innings, he had the fifth-fewest walks per nine innings in the American League, the seventh-lowest on-base percentage and the 10th-lowest OPS...led the A's in wins, starts, innings, strikeouts (108), hits (141), runs (67), home runs (21) and losses (9)...it marked the second consecutive season, fourth time in Oakland history (also 1996-97) and fifth time in Athletics history (1957) the A's did not have a pitcher with enough innings to qualify for the ERA title...his nine losses matched the fewest by a team-leader in a non-strike season in Oakland history...his .232 opponents batting average broke down to .231 against right-handed hitters compared to .236 against left-handers...surrendered 19 of his 21 home runs to righties...opponents hit .197 with a .254 on-base percentage and .306 slugging percentage when leading off an inning...had a .193 opponents batting average the first time through the lineup...allowed a .189 batting average with two strikes...received a total of eight runs of support in his nine losses (1.61 RSA)...received two runs of support or fewer in 14 of his 27 starts and was 2-8 in those games...was 10-1 in his other 13 starts...went 1-4 with a 5.00 ERA in seven interleague starts...the interleague starts and losses are the most in Oakland history...averaged 14.8 pitches per inning, which was the lowest mark in the AL among pitchers with 150 or more innings pitched...walked two batters or fewer in 24 of his 27 starts...allowed one run in 7.2 innings in his first start on March 30 against Los Angeles (AL) and one run in 8.0 innings in his second start on April 4 against Texas to become the first A's pitcher on an Opening Day roster to start the season with back-to-back outings of seven innings or more and one run or fewer since Steve Karsay in 1994...won three consecutive starts from April 15 to 27 and allowed just two runs (one earned) on six hits over that stretch (0.39 ERA, .078 opponents batting average)...no-hit the Boston Red Sox April 21 in the A's 3-0 win...walked two and struck out 10...walked Betts to start the game but then retired 14 straight before Leon reached on a Semien error...set down the next 12 before walking Benintendi with two outs in the ninth...then got Ramirez to hit into a game-ending force out...the no-hitter was his first career complete game...it was the seventh no-hitter in Oakland history and the 12th in Athletics history...it was the earliest by date (Catfish Hunter, May 8, 1968 vs. Minnesota) and second earliest by game number (Chief Bender, May 12, 1910 vs. Cleveland, game 18)...it was the 10th no-hitter in Coliseum history (six by A's, four by opponents)...it was the first since Dallas Braden's perfect game on May 9, 2010 vs. Tampa Bay...is the third Oakland pitcher to strikeout 10 or more in a no-hitter (Dave Stewart had 12 and Catfish Hunter had 11)...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, the Red Sox .895 winning percentage entering the game was the highest in Major League history by a team that was no-hit at least five games into the season...the last pitcher to no-hit a team that led the majors in runs per game entering the game was the A's Dave Stewart, who did it against Toronto on June 29, 1990 (also Elias)...was named AL Co-Player of the Week for the week of April 16-22 along with Manny Machado for his efforts...it was his first Player of the Week award...allowed a fourth-inning single to Correa in his first start after the no-hitter on April 27 at Houston, snapping his streak of consecutive hitless innings at an Oakland-record 14.0...broke the previous mark of 13.0 held by John "Blue Moon" Odom from June 1-7, 1968...opponents went 0-for-47 off him during the hitless streak...went 4-1 with a 1.00 ERA and .130 opponents batting average in five starts in April...led the AL in ERA and opponents batting in April and tied for the lead in wins...was named AL Pitcher of the Month in April, his first Pitcher of the Month honor...it was the first time in his career he won four games in a month...had a .395 OPS to become the fourth pitcher in Oakland history with an OPS under .400 in a month with a minimum of 100 batters faced (last: .358, Lidle

in Aug. 2002)...yielded four runs in a 4-1 loss at Seattle May 3 to snap a season-opening streak where he allowed two runs or fewer and tossed five innings or more in each of his first six starts... that tied for the third-longest such season-opening streak in Oakland history...had a four-game winning streak from June 16 to July 15...compiled a 3.25 ERA and .226 opponents batting average over that six-start stretch...was 3-0 with a 2.84 ERA and .202 opponents batting average in five starts in June...singled off Kyle Freeland in the second inning on July 27 at Colorado for his first Major League hit...took the loss on Aug. 19 against Houston, snapping a 12-game winning streak in day games...it was his first loss during the day since April 9, 2017 at Texas...tossed 5.0 innings without allowing an earned run to win at Minnesota Aug. 24 but it would be his final start of the season...was placed on the disabled list Aug. 26 with left shoulder inflammation...underwent arthroscopic surgery on the shoulder Sept. 19 at the Cedars-Sinai Kerlan-Jobe Institute in Los Angeles...the surgery, a subacromial decompression, acromioplasty and posterior labral repair, was performed by Dr. Neil ElAttrache.

2017—Compiled a 12-10 record and a 4.37 ERA in 29 starts in his second season in the majors... went 1-3 with a 5.52 ERA and .179 opponents batting average over his first six starts, 7-2 with a 2.92 ERA and .246 opponents average over an 11-start span from May 20 to July 16 and 4-5 with a 5.55 ERA and .328 opponents average over his final 12 starts...led the A's in wins, games started, innings pitched (158.2), strikeouts (140), hits (167), walks (55) and hit batters (10)...allowed a .268 opponents batting average, including .227 against left-handed hitters...was 6-1 with a 3.57 ERA and .230 opponents batting average in 11 starts during the day...tied for sixth in the American League in day wins...allowed a .160 batting average with two strikes...tied for third in the AL in pickoffs (4)...received no runs of support in four of his 10 losses...struck out 10 batters in just 5.1 innings in his second start of the season April 9 at Texas...became just the sixth pitcher in Oakland history to strike out 10 or more in fewer than six innings...tossed 5.0 hitless innings in his next start April 15 against Houston but walked a career-high five batters and yielded two runs...is just the second A's pitcher since at least 1908 to toss five or more hitless innings and allow a run (Chris Codiroli, June 27, 1986 against Chicago)...allowed five hits in 6.0 innings April 21 against Seattle to extend his season-opening streak of consecutive starts with five innings or more and five hits or fewer to four...that matched the second-longest such streak in Oakland history...was 1-2 with a 5.18 ERA in five starts when he was placed on the 10-day disabled list April 30 retroactive to April 27 with a strained left shoulder...made one start on a rehab assignment with Triple-A Nashville May 9 against El Paso and was reinstated May 15...walked a career-high tying five batters but yielded just two hits in 5.0 innings that day in a 6-5 loss to Seattle...defeated Boston May 20 to start a career-high five-game winning streak that spanned five starts through June 10... compiled a 1.97 ERA and .193 opponents batting average during the streak and issued just seven walks in 32.0 innings (1.97 walks per nine innings)...finished May with a 3-1 record, a 2.63 ERA and .167 opponents batting average in four starts...allowed six hits June 10 in the second game of a doubleheader at Tampa Bay...that snapped a streak of 16 consecutive games with five hits or fewer and two innings pitched or more from Aug. 23, 2016 to June 5, 2017...that was tied for the third-longest such streak by a Major League pitcher since at least 1901 at the time...tossed a career-high 116 pitches for his 10th win of the season Sept. 6 against Los Angeles (AL)...allowed a career-high tying 11 hits in 3.2 innings at Boston Sept. 12...was scratched from his scheduled start Sept. 23 against the Rangers with a left upper back strain...returned to make his final start Sept. 28 at Texas and allowed one unearned run in 6.2 innings for the win.

2016—Made his Major League debut with the A's following an April 29 promotion and went 7-9 with a 3.86 ERA in 25 games, including 24 starts...ranked second among American League rookies in strikeouts (124), innings pitched (144.2) and games started and tied for fifth in wins...the strikeouts tied for sixth most in Oakland history by a rookie...allowed a .248 opponents batting average and walked 37 batters for a .298 on-base percentage...was 2-4 with a 6.02 ERA and .282 opponents batting average in nine starts when he was placed on the 15-day disabled list June 14 with a left pronator strain...was reinstated June 29 and went 5-5 with a 2.74 ERA and .229 opponents batting average in 16 games, 15 starts, following his return...his ERA following his return from the DL was fifth lowest in the AL...held left-handed hitters to a .180 batting average and .504 OPS...based on a minimum of 140 innings pitched, the mark against lefties was second lowest in the AL...opponents hit .192 with runners in scoring position, which was third lowest in the AL among pitchers with 140 or more innings pitched...went 4-4 with a 2.67 ERA and .220 op-

ponents batting average in 13 games after the All-Star Break and had the fifth-lowest post-break ERA in the AL...was 5-3 with a 3.02 ERA in 14 games (13 starts) at home and had the fifth-lowest home ERA in the AL...in four no decisions with support of one run or fewer, he had scoreless outings of 8.0 innings, 7.0 and 6.0 and one outing where he allowed one run in 7.0 innings...tied for eighth in the AL with three pickoffs...was selected from Nashville April 29 and made his ML debut that day against Houston after just 42 minor league appearances, all starts, in three professional seasons...had a no decision in the A's 7-4 win, allowing four runs on four hits and four walks in 5.0 innings...struck out Carlos Correa to end the first inning for his first big league strikeout...was credited with his first ML win in the A's 3-1 victory over Texas May 16 in Oakland when he allowed a run on four hits in 6.2 innings...left his outing on June 13 against Texas after 4.1 innings with a left pronator muscle strain and was placed on the 15-day disabled the next day...made his first career relief appearance July 17 against Toronto and tossed 5.0 innings...walked Escobar with two outs in the fifth inning on Aug. 2 at Los Angeles to snap a streak of four games, 30.2 innings and 126 batters faced without a walk from July 10 to Aug. 2...the streak of 30.2 innings without a walk was the longest single-season streak in Oakland history and fifth longest overall...left his start on Aug. 29 at Houston after 3.1 innings with a strained left rhomboid...would not pitch again until Sept. 14 at Kansas City when he tossed 5.0 scoreless innings for the win...it snapped a career-opening six-game road losing streak, which matched the longest such streak in Oakland history...went 2-0 with a 1.13 ERA and .181 opponents batting average in his final four starts following his injury...was 2-0 with a 1.50 ERA in three starts with Nashville in his Triple-A debut...allowed a .232 opponents batting average, including .077 against left-handed hitters.



2020—The rookie catcher started 39 of the A's 60 games behind the plate and batted .233 with seven home runs and 14 RBI in 43 games overall...added 24 walks to fuel a .364 on-base percentage...ranked fourth among Major League rookies in walks, sixth in home runs and on-base percentage, seventh in OPS (.821) and slugging (.457) and tied for eighth in runs (21)...was named as the catcher on the Topps All-Star Rookie Team and the *Baseball Digest* MLB Rookie All-Star Team... tied for fourth in American League Rookie of the Year balloting...tied for second among Major League catchers in walks (24), tied for third in on-base percentage (.367) and tied for fifth home runs (7)...was hitting .203 with two home runs, five RBI and a .654 OPS in 27 games through the end of August...then reached base safely in each of his 16 games in September and batted .277 with five home runs, nine RBI and a 1.062 OPS...hit .235 against left-handed pitchers, .232 against right-handers...batted .270 with all seven of his home runs with the bases empty, .189 with runners on...was 1-for-13 (.077) with runners in scoring position and two outs...started 65.0% of the A's games at catcher, which was the second highest percentage by a rookie catcher in Oakland history...the highest is 67.3% (109-of-162) by A.J. Hinch in 1998...tied for third among Major League catchers in games (43), ranked fifth in innings (339.1), sixth in catcher's ERA (3.79), tied for sixth in games started (39), eighth in putouts (334) and ninth in total chances (350)... tossed out 6-of-21 (28.6%) attempted base stealers, which was the second best percentage among catchers in the West divisions and ninth best in the majors...committed two errors for a .994 fielding percentage...the A's were 26-13 (.667) when he started at catcher...went 0-for-1 in one pinch hitting appearance...made a team-leading 26 starts batting ninth...went 6-for-12 (.500) when putting the first pitch in play...went 0-for-1 with a walk and strikeout on Opening Day, July 24 against Los Angeles (AL)...became the first A's rookie catcher to start an opener since A.J. Hinch in 1998...went 7-for-20 (.350) with five walks, three doubles and a home run during

a career-high seven-game hitting streak from Aug. 10-19...had his first career three-strikeout game Aug. 23 against Los Angeles (AL)...his second came on Sept. 22 at Los Angeles (NL)...went 1-for-3 on Sept. 4 against San Diego in the A's first game back following a positive Covid-19 test and reached base safely via hit or walk in each of his final 16 regular season games...batted .277 with 13 runs, two doubles, five home runs, nine RBI, 12 walks and a 1.062 OPS during the streak... had his first multiple hit game of the season Sept. 7 against Houston when he was 2-for-3 with a home run and a season-high three RBI...collected all three of his two-hit games over a five-game stretch from Sept. 7-12 when he went 6-for-14 (.429) with six runs, two home runs, six RBI and six walks...had the first three-walk game of his career Sept. 9 against Houston...hit his 10th career home run in the first game of the Sept. 14 doubleheader at Seattle and it came in his 55th game...is the seventh player in Athletics history to reach 10 career home runs in 55 games or fewer (Canseco, Chapman, Held, Gross, McGwire, Olson)...started all seven postseason games and caught all 62 innings...went 5-for-22 (.227) with two home runs and four RBI...hit safely in all three ALWCS games against Chicago (3-for-8, .375)...homed in Game 3 to start the A's comeback from a 3-0 deficit and also homered in Game 1 of the ALDS against Houston...it marked the 12th time an A's player homered in back-to-back games in the postseason, the first since Dave Parker in 1989 (ALCS Games 2 and 3)...is the first rookie catcher to homer in back-to-back post-season games in Major League history...the only other A's rookies to homer in the postseason are Wally Schang (1913 WS G#3), Terrence Long (2000 ALDS G#3) and Mark Ellis (2002 ALDS G#5)... ended up going 2-for-14 (.143) in the ALDS against the Astros...had surgery for a collapsed lung during the offseason.

2019—Played in just 41 minor league games due to two stints on the injured list with a strained left knee...was selected by Oakland on Sept. 1 when rosters expanded and hit .245 with four home runs and eight RBI in 20 games...added five doubles for a .556 slugging percentage and nine of his 13 hits (69.2%) were for extra bases...started 13 of the A's 26 games at catcher following his promotion...committed one error in 18 games overall behind the plate for a .994 fielding percentage...tossed out 2-of-6 (33.3%) attempted base stealers...had a 2.76 catchers ERA...hit .400 with all four of his home runs and all eight of his RBI over his first 10 games...went 1-for-23 over his final 10 contests...batted .278 against left-handed pitchers compared to .229 against right-handers...connected for all four of his home runs off righties for a .657 slugging percentage (.389 vs. lefties)...hit .313 with three of his four home runs on the road...hit .295 against a pitcher the first time he saw him in a game and was 0-for-9 after that...was 0-for-1 with two walks in three pinch hitting appearances...started seven games batting eighth, four in the nine spot and two hitting seventh...was selected from Triple-A Las Vegas Sept. 1...made his Major League debut Sept. 4 against Los Angeles (AL) in a start at catcher and went 1-for-3 in the A's 4-0 win...hit a solo home run off Jake Jewell in the fifth inning for his first hit and RBI...became the first Athletic to catch a shutout in his ML debut since Jack Lapp in the second game of a Sept. 11, 1908 doubleheader against Washington...is just the fourth ML catcher since 1908 to catch a shutout and homer in his debut (last: Aramis García, SF vs. NYM on Aug. 31, 2018)...became the sixth player in Oakland history to homer in his debut, the first since Franklin Barreto on June 24, 2017 vs. Chicago (AL)...his next appearance came on Sept. 6 in the resumption of the May 19 suspended game at Detroit...although he appears in a game on May 19, his Sept. 4 game remains his ML debut... had 19 total chances Sept. 7 vs. Detroit, which ties the Athletics record for a catcher in a nine-inning game since (Ossee Schreckengost, May 15, 1903 at St. Louis)...his 18 putouts in that game tied the most for a nine-inning game (Bill Bathe, April 19, 1986 at Seattle)...went 11-for-25 (.440) with 10 runs, five doubles, three home runs and seven RBI over a seven-game span from Sept. 7 to 16...had his first career multi-homer game Sept. 10 at Houston, going 3-for-5 with two home runs and four RBI...it came in his sixth career game, matching Mitchell Page for the earliest two-homer game in a career in Oakland history...homed against the next day against the Astros to become the first player in Athletics history with four home runs over the first seven games of his career...tied an Oakland record with three doubles Sept. 13 at Texas and also scored a career-high four runs...that gave him 10 runs over his first eight games, which are the most by an Athletic in his first eight career games since at least 1908...had an extra base hit in five consecutive games from Sept. 10 to 16, giving him nine extra base hits (five doubles, four home runs) in his first 10 career games, which is the most by an Athletic over his first 10 games since at least 1908...had a career-high 0-for-19 streak from Sept. 16 to 26...started at catcher in the Wild Card Game against Tampa Bay on Oct. 2 and grounded into a double play in his only at bat...following the season, un-

derwent surgery of his left knee on Oct. 10...the surgery was performed by Dr. Thomas Carter at the Gateway Surgical Center in Phoenix, Ariz., and involved a lateral meniscal debridement procedure on Murphy's left knee...was rated as the A's number three prospect by *Baseball America* following the season...combined for a .293 batting average with 11 home runs and 31 RBI in 41 games with Triple-A Las Vegas and both of the A's affiliates in the Arizona Rookie League...added 22 walks for a .384 on-base percentage and slugged .580...hit .324 with 10 of his 11 home runs and 26 of his 31 RBI against right-handed pitchers...had a .359 batting average with runners in scoring position with Las Vegas...batted .388 with six home of his 11 home runs and 17 of his 31 RBI in the seventh inning or later...hit .342 in his home ballparks...tossed out 6-of-30 (20.0%) attempted base stealers...appeared in 35 games at catcher and went 4-for-26 (.154) in seven games as the designated hitter...saw his most action batting fifth (14) and fourth (12)...reached base safely in each of his first 15 games through April 24 and batted .397 with a .478 on-base percentage...committed his first error of the season April 16 at Sacramento, snapping a 61-game errorless streak behind the plate dating back to 2018...was batting .324 with a home run and nine RBI in 19 games when he was placed on the seven-day injured list April 30 with a strained left knee...began a rehab assignment with the A's Gold club in the Arizona Rookie League July 13 and also played one game for the A's Green club on July 23 before he was reinstated from the IL July 25...went 8-for-15 (.533) with seven runs, a double, six home runs and 13 RBI in four games before returning to the IL Aug. 1...homered in each of the four games, including the first three-homer game of his career July 26 at El Paso when he drove in a career-high six runs...had a three-game rehab assignment with the AZL A's-Gold from Aug. 15 to 19 and was reinstated from the IL Aug. 21...had his second multi-homer game of the season that day against Reno when he went 2-for-4 with two home runs and a career-high tying six RBI.

- Started each of the A's final 98 games batting third, which is the third longest such streak in Oakland history (117, Tejada from May 19-Sept. 26, 2002; 102, Giambi from April 21-Aug. 15, 2000)...made a team-leading 121 starts overall in the three spot and also hit fourth (28 starts), second (6) and fifth (1)...had 11 home runs and 26 RBI in 28 games hitting clean-up.
- **DAY-BY-DAY:** Made his fourth straight Opening Day start at first base on April 1 against Houston, which tied Jason Giambi and Daric Barton for the second most Opening Day starts at first base in Oakland history...only Mark McGwire, with nine, has more...only Olson and McGwire (8 from 1988-95) have more than two straight Opening Day starts at first...made his first career start at designated hitter April 8 at Houston and went 0-for-4...was 4-for-21 (.190) with no home runs and three RBI over his first six games through April 8...then went 14-for-36 (.389) with six home runs and 14 RBI over his next 10 games from April 9-21...hit a grand slam in the fourth inning of the first game of the doubleheader April 20 against Minnesota...it was the A's first grand slam of the season and the 200th in Oakland history...it was the fourth of his career...had his ninth career two-homer game April 21 against Minnesota...added number 10 on June 13 against Kansas City and number 11 on July 11 at Texas...hit .155 over a 16-game stretch from April 25-May 14...had a career-high tying 16-game road hitting streak from May 15-June 22 (27-for-65, .415)...reached base safely in a career-high 21 consecutive games from May 30-June 22...hit .405 with seven home runs, 22 RBI and a .473 on-base percentage during the streak...drove in at least one run in a career-high six consecutive games from May 30-June

5 (nine RBI total)...had a career-high 80-game errorless streak from June 1-Sept. 7, which tied for the third longest errorless streak by a first baseman in Oakland history...it was the longest since Daric Barton also had an 80-game streak from June 15, 2011-Sept. 24, 2013...matched his career high with four hits on June 12 against Kansas City...also had four-hit games on Aug. 7 against Texas and Sept. 10 against Texas and now has five in his career...had two hits in the sixth inning on June 16 against Los Angeles (AL)...had a career-high 13 game streak without an RBI from June 21 to July 4 and a career-high 12-game streak without an extra base hit from June 23 to July 6...batted .340 with 20 runs, six doubles, seven home runs and 20 RBI in 26 games in June...ranked 10th in the AL in batting in June...it was the second time he hit .300 in a month in his career (.305 in Aug. 2017)...played in the 500th game of his career on July 6 and had 123 career home runs...the home runs are second most in Athletics history and 11th most in Major League history by a player over the first 500 games of his career...went 16-for-52 (.308) with 13 runs, five doubles, seven home runs and 11 RBI over a 14-game stretch from July 7-25...was named to his first AL All-Star team as a reserve on the player ballot...went 0-for-2 with two strikeouts in the game...also participated in the Home Run Derby for the first time and hit 23 home runs in a first round loss to Trey Mancini (24)...had an average distance of 447 feet and an average exit velocity of 104.8...topped out at 495 feet and with an exit velocity of 111...had the walk-off two-run double Aug. 4 against San Diego...it was his fifth career walk-off RBI, his first since his Opening Night walk-off grand slam in 2020 against the Angels...had a career-high tying 15-game homerless streak from Aug. 24 to Sept. 10 (third time, previous: Sept. 19, 2020-April 8, 2021)...snapped the homerless streak with his 500th career hit on Sept. 11 against Texas...went 10-for-43 (.233) over a 12-game stretch from Sept. 11-23 but six of the 10 hits were home runs...was intentionally walked twice on Sept. 19 at Los Angeles (AL) and Sept. 26 against Houston...had his fourth four-RBI game of the season Sept. 24 against Houston and doubled in the eighth inning for his 100th career double...walked four times in a game for the first time in his career on Sept. 26 vs. Houston...hit .263 with six home runs and 25 RBI in 27 games in September...the RBI were his most ever in a month, topping his 23 in Sept. of 2019...now has 37 home runs and 109 RBI in 126 games in September over the last five years...the home runs and RBI are the most in the majors over that span.

CAREER

2020—Was the only Athletic to appear in all 60 games and batted .195 with 14 home runs and 42 RBI...had the sixth lowest batting average in the majors but tied for 10th in RBI...seven of his 14 home runs put the A's ahead and he tied for second in the majors in go-ahead home runs...tied for the lead in game-winning RBI (8) and tied for fourth in go-ahead RBI (11)...among players in the West divisions, he tied for fourth in RBI, tied for fifth in walks (34) and tied for ninth in home runs...had the third most strikeouts (77)...led the A's in home runs, RBI, total bases (89) and strikeouts...is the first qualifier in Oakland history and the third in Athletics history to bat under .200 in a season...the other two are Monte Cross in 1904 (.189) and Joe Dugan in 1918 (.195)...his average of 3.18 plate appearances per strikeout was third lowest in Athletics history at the time (Jack Cust, 3.04 in 2008 and 3.09 in 2007)...had the first triple of his career...batted .208 against left-handed pitchers, .191 against right-handers...hit .231 with nine home runs, 29 RBI and an .880 OPS in 32 games at home, .157 with five home runs, 13 RBI and a .576 OPS in 28 games on the road...hit nine of his 14 home runs with runners on base, which tied for fourth in the majors...had seven plate appearances with the bases loaded and had two grand slams, two walks and three strikeouts...was 2-for-5 (.400) with 10 RBI...tied for the most grand slams in the majors and tied for third in walks with the bases loaded...ranked third among Major League first basemen in home runs (14) and walks (34) and fourth in RBI (42)...batted .222 with 11 home runs and 35 RBI over innings 1-6, .123 with three home runs and seven RBI from the seventh inning on...hit .162 against American League West teams, .265 against the National League West...batted .115 with two strikes...started 59 games at first base and committed just one error in 60 games overall at first for a .998 fielding percentage...the fielding percentage rounded to four decimal places was .9977, which was second highest in Athletics history to Vic Power of the 1957 Kansas City A's (.9981)...his average of 0.865 assists per nine innings was second highest in Oakland history to Dave Revering in 1978 (0.872)...ranked second among ML first basemen in assists (48) and innings (499.1), tied for third in defensive runs saved (5), fourth in fielding percentage and sixth in total chances (442) and putouts (393)...was one of two first basemen to play in 60 games

(Santana, CLE)...won the Fielding Bible Award for best defensive first baseman in the majors for the third consecutive season...made a team-leading 27 starts batting clean-up...also batted fifth 18 times, third 13 times and sixth once...went 5-for-50 (.100) with a double and four home runs from the three spot...hit a walk-off grand slam in the bottom of the 10th inning on Opening Day, July 24 against Los Angeles (AL)...it was the third Opening Day walk-off grand slam in Major League history along with Jim Presley (Seattle, 1986) and Sixto Lezcano (Milwaukee, 1980)...it was the first Opening Day walk-off home run in Oakland history and the third Opening Day grand slam (Eric Fox, 1993; Terry Steinbach, 1994)...it was his fourth career game-ending RBI, his third walk-off home run and his second grand slam...it was the eighth walk-off grand slam in Oakland history, the first since Khris Davis on May 17, 2016...homered in back-to-back games on Aug. 5 and 6 against Texas, including his eighth career multi-homer game on the 5th...that began an 11-game stretch where he hit .222 with seven home runs and 10 RBI in 11 games...went 0-for-5 with a walk and four strikeouts Aug. 7 against Houston...it was the first four-strikeout game of his career...his second came on Sept. 13 at Texas...homered in three straight games Aug. 12-15...had three hits Aug. 16 at San Francisco, all singles...each of his previous seven hits dating back to Aug. 5 were home runs...that is the second time in Oakland history a player has had seven straight hits with each being a home run...the other time was also by Olson (Sept. 13-22, 2017)...also scored a career-high tying three runs in that game against the Giants...batted .168 in 27 games in August but walked 16 times and hit nine home runs, which tied for sixth most in the majors...had his first career triple Sept. 5 against San Diego...his streak of 388 consecutive games without a triple was seventh longest in Athletics history and the second longest career-opening streak to Ramon Hernandez (503)...hit .333 with three home runs and 16 RBI in 10 games from Sept. 5-12...belted his 100th career home run in the second game of the Sept. 8 doubleheader against Houston, a three-run shot off De Jong in the third inning...it came in his 399th game and he became the 11th player in Major League history to hit 100 home runs before his 400th career game (Joe DiMaggio, Joey Gallo, Bob Horner, Ryan Howard, Aaron Judge, Ralph Kiner, Chuck Klein, Eddie Mathews, Mark McGwire, Gary Sanchez)...is the second Athletic (McGwire did it in 393 games)...became the 19th player in Oakland history and the 28th in Athletics history with 100 career home runs...had a season-best six-game hitting streak from Sept. 8-12...went 7-for-21 (.333) with three home runs and 12 RBI during the streak...hit his second grand slam of the season and the third of his career on Sept. 11 at Texas...added an RBI single in the second inning for a career-high tying five RBI (third time, last: June 28, 2019 at Los Angeles-AL)...snapped a 0-for-18 streak with a double in the sixth inning Sept. 16 at Colorado...the hitless streak matched his career high (May 29-June 5, 2019)...stole his first base of the season Sept. 19 against San Francisco, which was his first steal since April 24, 2018 at Texas...committed his only error of the season Sept. 22 at Los Angeles (NL), which snapped a 64-game errorless streak dating back to Sept. 16, 2019...that was the eighth longest errorless streak by a first baseman in Oakland history...batted .233 with four home runs and 20 RBI in 26 games in September...the RBI tied for sixth most in the majors...started all seven games at first base for the A's during the postseason and went 3-for-23 (.130) with two home runs, three RBI and five walks...went 0-for-9 in three games against Chicago in the ALWCS and 3-for-14 (.214) with both of his home runs in the ALDS against Houston.

2019—Missed 34 games while on the injured list early in the season but still hit 36 home runs and drove in 91 runs while batting .267 in 127 games...won his second consecutive Rawlings Gold Glove for American League first basemen...tied for seventh in the AL in home runs...was hit by a pitch 12 times, which tied for seventh in the AL...ranked fifth in the AL in go-ahead RBI (26) and tied for eighth in go-ahead home runs (14)...among first basemen, his 36 home runs led the AL and ranked third in the majors...joins Mark McGwire (eight times) and Jason Giambi (twice) as the only first basemen in Oakland history with 30 or more home runs...ranked second among AL first basemen in RBI (91)...the A's compiled a 15-19 (.442) record while he was on the 10-day IL from March 27 to May 6 following a right hamate excision...was reinstated May 7 and Oakland went 82-44 (.651) following his return...hit .288 with 42 of his 51 walks and a .956 OPS against right-handed pitchers compared to .223 with a .767 OPS against lefties...batted .300 with 23 of his 36 home runs and a 1.023 OPS on the road...slugged .644 on the road, which was the second-best mark in the majors and fifth-best in Oakland history...ranked third in the AL in road OPS, fourth in home runs and tied for eighth in RBI (53)...19 of his home runs came with runners on base, which tied for second in the AL...17 came with two strikes, which ranked fourth in the AL and was the most by an Athletic since Miguel Tejada had 18 in 2002...led Major League first base-

men in defensive runs saved (13)...led AL first basemen total chances (1121), putouts (1023) and assists (90), ranked second in fielding percentage (.993), double plays (95) and games (127) and tied for second in games started (125) and errors (8)...the assists tied for seventh most in Oakland history by a first baseman and were the most since Mark McGwire had 101 in 1991...was a unanimous choice as best first baseman in the Fielding Bible Awards...won the award for the second consecutive season...made a team-leading 73 starts batting third...hit .358 with 13 home runs and 35 RBI in 37 games batting clean-up...had a .305 batting average leading off an inning...hit .241 against a pitcher the first time he saw him in a game, .307 after that...batted .315 with no outs, .262 with one out and .228 with two outs...hit .447 in the sixth inning...tied for sixth in the AL in intentional walks (7) and bunt hits (5) and ranked eighth in pitches per plate appearance (4.17)...was on the A's Opening Day roster and started each of the first two games before injuring his hand on a foul tip in his final at bat on March 21 against Seattle in Tokyo...underwent surgery on March 22 at the Kerlan-Jobe Clinic in Los Angeles, Calif...the surgery was performed by Dr. Steven Shin and involved a right hamate excision to Olson's right hand...was placed on the 10-day injured list March 27, retroactive to March 25, ending his consecutive games played streak at 164...began a rehab assignment with Las Vegas May 2 and went 4-for-22 (.182) with a home run, two RBI, three runs, a walk and three strikeouts in five games with the Aviators...was reinstated from the IL May 7...committed his first error of the season May 29, snapping a 75-game errorless streak dating back to Aug. 1, 2018...hit .301 with 13 home runs and 29 RBI over a 38-game span from June 5 to July 19...had his first multi-homer game of the season June 28 at Los Angeles (AL) and matched his career-high with five RBI...also had two-homer games on Aug. 15 vs. Houston and Sept. 10 at Houston...had a career-high 16-game hitting streak from June 30 to July 21, which tied for fifth longest in Oakland history by a first baseman...went 19-for-64 (.297) with four home runs and nine RBI during the streak...collected seven doubles, nine home runs and 20 RBI in 28 games in June...tied for second in the AL in June extra base hits (16) and tied for third in home runs (9)...hit his second career walk-off home run July 30 against Milwaukee...it was his third career game-ending RBI...had a 10-game hitting streak from Aug. 28 to Sept. 7 (16-for-41, .390)...collected an extra base hit in a career-high six consecutive games from Aug. 30 to Sept. 5 (five doubles, two home runs)...reached base safely five times twice over a seven-game span, going 3-for-4 with two walks at New York on Aug. 31 and 4-for-4 with a walk Sept. 7 against Detroit...the four-hit game was the second of his career...hit .263 with nine home runs and 23 RBI in 25 games in September...tied for third in the AL in RBI and tied for fourth in home runs...started at first base in the AL Wild Card Game against Tampa Bay on Oct. 2 and went 1-for-3 with a walk.

2018—Played in all 162 games and batted .247 with 29 home runs and 84 RBI in his first full season in the majors...also won the American League Gold Glove Award for first basemen after leading Major League first basemen in games (162), total chances (1494), putouts (1403) and defensive runs saved (14)...joins Mark McGwire (1990) as the only A's first basemen to win a Gold Glove...hit all 29 of his home runs as a first baseman, which led AL first basemen and ranked third in the majors...led AL first basemen and ranked fourth in the majors in RBI (83)...was named to the *Sporting News* AL All-Star team...walked 70 times to fuel a .335 on-base percentage...his 162 games played marked the 13th time in Oakland history a player appeared in every game in a season, the first since Miguel Tejada in 2003...was the only player in the AL to appear in every game and one of five in the majors (Freeman, ATL; Galvis, SD; Markakis, ATL; Turner, WAS)...struck out 163 times, which tied for eighth most in the AL...hit .251 against left-handed pitchers compared to .244 against right-handers...hit 25 of his 29 home runs against righties...14 came in day games, which tied for seventh in the AL...batted .301 from the seventh inning on...topped AL first basemen in games started (152), assists (84), double plays (115) and innings (1403.1)...tied for the fourth-most errors in the AL (7) but ranked third in fielding (.995)...is one of four first basemen in AL history to play in 162 games in a season along with Norm Siebern (KC, 1962), Bill Buckner (BOS, 1985) and Carlos Delgado (TOR, 2000)...is one of 19 ML first basemen to do it...is the fourth player in Athletics history to play every game at first base (Norm Siebern, 1962; Dick Siebert, 1940; Stuffey McInnis, 1912)...his 152 starts were second most to the Oakland record of 155 set by Daric Barton in 2010...set an Oakland record for total chances by a first baseman (1494), breaking Daric Barton's record of 1492 in 2010, and had 1403 putouts, which fell one short of Barton's 1404...had the most total chances by an AL first baseman since Mark Teixeira had 1572 for Texas in 2006...batted fifth 114 times, which was sixth most in Oakland history and the most since Sal Bando had 128 in 1976...ranked second in the AL pitches per plate appear-

ance (4.31)...was the A's Opening Day starter at first base on March 29 against Los Angeles (AL) and became the second player in Oakland history and the fifth in Athletics history to make an Opening Day start on their birthday (Ray Fosse, 1974; Pete Suder, 1952; Charlie Pick, 1916; Ossee Schreckengost, 1907)...went 1-for-5 with a home run to become the fourth Major Leaguer dating back to 1901 to hit an Opening Day home run on his birthday...joins Jeff Mathis (2011), Ian Stewart (2010) and Scott Rolen (2000)...was the A's seventh different Opening Day starter at first base in the last seven years (Alonso, Canha, Davis, Barton, Moss, Allen)...stole the first base of his career April 3 against Texas...went 3-for-4 as a substitute on April 11 at Los Angeles (NL) to tie an Oakland record for most hits in a game by a non-starter...went 4-for-6 with two doubles, two walks and his first career walk-off RBI, a single in the bottom of the 14th inning of the A's 12-11 win over Chicago (AL)...it was his first career four-hit game...hit .306 with nine home runs and 18 RBI over a 23-game stretch from May 14 to June 7...had his first of two two-homer games June 1 at Kansas City (also July 22 vs. San Francisco)...added a career-high five RBI against the Royals...tied for third in the AL in home runs in June (9) and ranked fifth in RBI (22)...hit his first career walk-off home run Aug. 17 against Houston...had 11 doubles in August, which tied for third in the AL...hit his first career grand slam Sept. 26 at Seattle...went 0-for-2 with two walks in a start at first base in the Wild Card game at New York Oct 3.

2017—Batted .259 with 24 home runs and 45 RBI in 59 games over six stints with the A's in his rookie campaign...added 22 walks for a .352 on-base percentage...slugged .651 and had a 1.003 OPS...the slugging percentage was fourth highest in Oakland history among players with 200 or more plate appearances and the OPS was ninth best...tied for third among American League rookies in home runs and ranked eighth in RBI...his 24 home runs were third most in Athletics history by a rookie and the most since Mark McGwire set the record with 49 in 1987...they were the most by an Athletic 23 years old or younger since Eric Chavez hit 32 as a 23-year old in 2001...added 23 home runs with Nashville to become the first player to hit 20 home runs in both the majors and the minors since Giancarlo Stanton in 2010 (22 with Florida, 21 with Jacksonville)...averaged 7.88 at bats per home run, which was fourth fewest in ML history among players with a minimum of 200 plate appearances...had more home runs (24) than singles (23)...the home runs were second most in Athletics history (McGwire, 39 homers and 35 singles in 1995) among players with more home runs than singles...49.0% of his hits were home runs, which is the second-highest percentage in ML history among players with 200 or more plate appearances (McGwire, STL, 51.8% in 2001)...had just two doubles, which are the fewest in ML history by a player with 20 or more home runs (previous: 4 by Wes Covington, 1957 and Mark McGwire, 2001)...had five separate stints over the first four months of the season and hit .196 with four home runs and nine RBI in 18 games...following the Yonder Alonso trade, he was recalled for a sixth time Aug. 8 and batted .283 with 20 home runs and 36 RBI in 41 games before a hamstring strain on Sept. 24 ended his season with a week remaining...the 20 home runs were the most in the AL and tied for second most in the majors over that span (Aug. 8-Sept. 24)...hit 20 home runs after the All-Star Break, which tied for fifth in the AL...it was second most among ML rookies (Judge, NYY 22)...hit .280 with 20 of his 24 home runs against right-handed pitching...started 38 games at first base (including each of his 36 starts during his final stint) and 10 in right field...committed two errors, both at first base for a .995 fielding percentage...the A's had a 26-22 (.542) record with him in the starting lineup, 49-65 (.430) without...appeared in one game in each of his first two stints from April 21-26 and June 3-4, and four during his third stint from June 10-13...recalled for a fourth time June 22 and hit .225 with four home runs and eight RBI in 10 games...hit his first Major League home run June 24 at Chicago (AL), a two-run shot off James Shields in the first inning...added another two-run homer in the seventh inning for his first career multi-homer game...played in two games during his fifth stint from July 21-23...was recalled for good Aug. 8 and hit .283 with 20 home runs and 36 RBI over his final 41 games...homered in five consecutive games from Sept. 15-19 to tie the ML rookie record for consecutive games with a home run...was the first Oakland player to do it and the second Athletic (George Alusik, Aug. 7-11, 1962)...homered in each of his final nine series from Aug. 25 to Sept. 24...was the first rookie in Major League history with 15 home runs over a 21-game stretch (Aug. 27-Sept. 19) and 16 home runs over a 23-game span (Aug. 27-Sept. 22)...his 15 home runs over 21 games are the most by any player in Oakland history...hit .305 with seven home runs and 14 RBI in 19 games in August...led AL rookies and tied for second among ML rookies in August home runs...then hit .266 with 13 home runs and 22 RBI in 22 games in September...the home runs were second most in ML history by a

rookie in the month of September to Aaron Judge, who had 15 in 2017 and tied for the most by any Athletics player in September (Jason Giambi, 2000)...had his second career two-homer game Sept. 4 against Los Angeles (AL)...homered nine times over a 12-game stretch from Sept. 9 (Game 2) to 22...strained his hamstring Sept. 24 against Texas and missed the final seven games of the season...was named the A's Organization Hitter of the Year after batting .272 with 23 home runs and 60 RBI in 79 games with Nashville...added 45 walks for a .367 on-base percentage...was tied for fifth in the Pacific Coast League in home runs at the time of his final promotion to Oakland on Aug. 8...hit .293 with 19 of his 23 home runs against right-handed pitchers (.995 OPS)...batted .344 on the road and reached base safely in all 34 of his road games (.442 on-base percentage)... appeared in 73 games at first base, six at designated hitter and one at third base...slugged his first two-homer game of the season May 13 against Albuquerque...finished May with nine home runs and 26 RBI in 29 games...had his second two-homer game with the Sounds June 2 at Iowa... had four walks and a grand slam July 19 at Iowa.

2016—Made his Major League debut with Oakland as a September call-up and went 2-for-21 (.095) in 11 games...added seven walks for a .321 on-base percentage...appeared in five games (four starts) in right field and four games (two starts) at first base...was selected from Triple-A Nashville Sept. 12 following the conclusion of the Sounds season...made his debut that day at Kansas City and walked as a pinch hitter in the ninth inning...become the first player drafted by the A's out of high school to reach the majors with Oakland since Trevor Cahill (2nd round in 2006, debut in 2009) and the first non-pitcher since Eric Chavez (1st round 1996, debut in 1998)...went 0-for-3 with two walks in his first start (first base) Sept. 15 against the Royals... singled off Nick Martinez in the third inning Sept. 25 against Texas for his first Major League hit...his first extra base hit was a double in his final game on Oct. 2 at Seattle...batted .235 with 17 home runs and 60 RBI in 131 games in his Triple-A debut with Nashville...added 71 walks for a .335 on-base percentage...tied for third in the Pacific Coast League in doubles (34) and ranked fifth in walks...ranked second in the A's farm system in doubles and walks and tied for second in extra base hits (52)...hit .256 with 16 of his 17 home run off right-handed pitchers...appeared in 81 games in right field and 49 at first base...did not commit an error at first base but had five as an outfielder for a .966 fielding percentage...hit his 100th career minor league home run Aug. 20 at Omaha...batted .263 with four walks, a home run and three RBI in five games for Nashville in the PCL Semifinals.

2015—Made his Double-A debut with Midland and spent the entire season with the RockHounds, batting .249 with 17 home runs and 75 RBI in 133 games...added 105 walks for a .388 on-base percentage...ranked second in all of minor league baseball in walks to teammate Colin Walsh (124)...tied for the Texas League lead in intentional walks (6), ranked second in walks, tied for second in extra base hits (54), third in doubles (37), RBI and on-base percentage, fourth in runs (82), tied for fourth in home runs and fifth in games...ranked second in the A's farm system in walks and on-base percentage, tied for second in extra base hits, third in doubles, tied for third in RBI and fourth in runs and home runs...named to the Texas League Midseason All-Star team and the All-Star Futures Game...appeared in 62 games at first base, 59 in right field and two at third base... had 11 outfield assists, which tied for fourth in the TL...reached base safely via hit or walk in 116 of his 133 games...reached base safely in 21 consecutive games from April 20 to May 12 (.404 on-base percentage)...went 0-for-4 in the Texas League All-Star Game on June 30 and 1-for-2 in the All-Star Futures Game at Cincinnati July 12...batted .185 with a home run and four RBI in seven postseason games for the Texas League Champion RockHounds...was rated as the A's sixth-best prospect by *Baseball America* following the season.

2015—Was named to his first American League All-Star team...hit .261 with 18 home runs and 71 RBI in 136 games...led the A's with 56 walks and a .341 on-base percentage...started 89 games at catcher and 20 at first base...committed just three errors behind the plate for a .996 fielding percentage...tossed out 15-of-58 (25.9%) attempted base stealers...made 34 of his first 35 starts at catcher but just 55 of his last 80...hit .268 with 17 of his 18 home runs against right-handed pitching compared to .239 against left-handers...had a .316 average with runners in scoring position...batted .303 in the seventh inning or later, which ranked 10th in the AL...tied for the AL

SEASON IN REVIEW

SEASON IN REVIEW

2021 RECAP: The A's finished the season with an 86-76 (.531) record, which was eighth best in the American League...it was their fourth consecutive season with a winning record, which is the first time they have done that since 1999-2006 when they did it eight straight years...it is the first time they had a winning record and did not make the playoffs since 2005 (88-74)...finished in third place in the AL West, nine games behind Houston...it was the first time they did not finish first or second in the West since 2017...were fifth in the AL Wild Card, six games behind Boston and New York, who tied for the two Wild Card spots...the only other times in Oakland history the A's have missed the playoffs by six games or fewer were in 1987 (4 games) and 1976 (2½ games)...held at least a share of a playoff spot each day from April 17-Aug. 22...held at least a share of first in the West for 61 of 62 days from April 20 to June 20 and spent 71 consecutive days in sole possession of second place from June 21 to Sept. 3...overall, spent 58 days alone in first place in the West, three days tied for first, 78 days in second, seven days tied for second, 21 days in third, two days in fourth, three days tied for fourth and 10 days in fifth...are now 316-230 (.579) over the last four seasons, which is the fifth best record in the majors...began the season by losing each of the first six games, which matched the 1916 Philadelphia A's for the worst start in franchise history...then went a Major League best 44-21 (.677) from April 7-June 18 before going 42-49 (.462) over the final 91 games...won their first game on April 7 against Los Angeles (NL), lost the next day at Houston, but then had a 13-game winning streak from April 9 to 24...the streak was third longest in Oakland history, tied for fifth longest in Athletics history and tied for second longest in the majors in 2021...began the streak in fifth place in the West with a 5½ game deficit and finished it in first place and a 1 game lead...shut out the Twins in both games of an April 20 doubleheader to move into a tie for first place in the West...the 13-game winning streak improved the A's record to 14-7 entering play on April 25...had the streak snapped with an 8-1 loss at Baltimore that day and went 17-18 over the next 35 games from April 25-May 31...remained in first for all but one day over that span and saw their lead peak at 2½ games...were 31-25 at the end of May and then won 13 of the first 15 games in June...won the first game of a three-game series at New York (AL) on June 18 but then lost the final two games to drop into a tie for first place on June 20...that would be the A's last day in first place as they went 6-13 from June 19-July 9...won the final two games before the All-Star Break and started the second half 16-9 to improve to a season-high 19 games over .500 on Aug. 14 (68-49)...then lost 10 of their next 12 games to fall to 70-59 on Aug. 27...were 6½ out in the West but were in third place in the Wild Card and were just 3½ back...were swept in a three-game series at Toronto Sept. 3-5 to fall four back in the Wild Card but were passed by Seattle and moved into a tie with Toronto...a three-game winning streak from Sept. 8-10 made the A's one of five teams within one game of each other for the two Wild Cards...lost their next three games to fall 3½ back...won five straight from Sept. 15-19 to get to two games back but would not get any closer the rest of the way...lost seven of 10 games from Sept. 20 to 29, all to Seattle...were eliminated from the AL West in game 157, a 13-4 loss at Seattle on Sept. 27...were eliminated from the Wild Card in a 4-2 loss to the Mariners in game 159 on Sept. 29...it was just the third time in Oakland history the A's were eliminated from the playoffs in game 159 or later (159 in 1976, 161 in 2004).

OFFENSE: The A's batted .238, which was fifth lowest in the American League but third lowest in a full season in Oakland history...however, were hit by an Athletics record 98 pitches, which were the most in the AL, third most in the majors and third most in AL history...added 545 walks, which were fifth most in the AL, and ranked seventh with a .317 on-base percentage...also ranked sixth in the AL in runs (743) and extra base hits (489), eighth in OPS (.723), tied for eighth in home runs (199) and 10th in slugging (.406)...had a .258 average with runners in scoring position, which ranked ninth in the AL...had the second lowest slugging percentage (.368) and OPS (.684) with the bases loaded and the fourth lowest batting average (.272)...struck out 1349 times, which was fourth fewest in the AL but fourth most in Athletics history...grounded into 99 double plays, which was third fewest in the AL and fifth fewest in a full season in Oakland history...ranked fourth in the AL in sacrifice flies (49), fifth in reaching base on an error (46) and tied for fifth in sacrifice hits (17)...the 17 sacrifice hits were sixth fewest in a full season in Oakland history but were the most since they had 19 in 2014...A's second basemen hit .285 with a .794 OPS, both of which were second best in the AL...A's clean-up hitters had the lowest OPS (.659) and batting average (.205) in the majors (.659) and the second lowest slugging percentage (.371)...the batting average was the lowest in Athletics history.

PITCHING: The A's compiled a 4.02 ERA, which was sixth lowest in the American League...had the fifth lowest opponents OPS (.711) and slugging percentage (.403), the sixth lowest on-base percentage (.309) and eighth lowest batting average (.247)...walked just 439 batters, which was second fewest in the AL and fifth fewest in a full season in Oakland history...had just 11 intentional walks, which set an Athletics record for fewest in a season...broke the mark of 17 in 2017...set a franchise record with 1332 strikeouts, breaking the previous mark of 1299 set in 2019...however, ranked 10th in the AL in strikeouts...had a strikeout-to-walk ratio of 3.03, which ranked fifth in the AL and was second best in a full season in Oakland history (3.06 in 2014)...tied for the third most hit batters in Oakland history (64) and allowed the fifth most home runs (191)...ranked fifth in the AL in shutouts (11) and innings pitched (1433.0)...the innings tied for fifth fewest in a full season in Oakland history...tossed the fewest pitches in the AL (23,102) and averaged the second fewest pitches per inning (16.1).

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers were 57-52 with a 3.91 ERA...ranked fourth in the American League in ERA, fifth in opponents slugging percentage (.408), sixth in OPS (.715) and on-base percentage (.307) and seventh in batting average (.250)...it was the first time A's starters had an ERA under 4.00 since 2015 (3.91)...led the majors with 894.0 innings pitched, but that was the fewest by a Major League leader in modern ML history (since 1900)...the previous low was 941.1 by the 2019 New York Mets...starters averaged 5.52 innings per game...ranked second in the AL in strikeout-to-walk ratio (3.48), tied for second in complete games (3) and fourth in wins, strikeouts (862) and fewest walks (248)...the strikeouts and strikeout-to-walk ratio set Athletics records, breaking the mark of 847 strikeouts in 2014 and a 3.22 strikeout-to-walk ratio in 2020...averaged the fewest walks per nine innings in the AL and the fourth fewest in Oakland history (2.50).

THE BULLPEN: The A's bullpen compiled a 4.21 ERA, which ranked 10th in the American League...was fifth in opponents on-base percentage (.312), ninth in batting average (.243) and OPS (.706) and 11th in slugging percentage (.394)...converted 39-of-67 (58.2%) save opportunities, which was the third lowest percentage in the AL...had 28 blown saves, which tied for second most in the AL (Mariners, 33) and in Oakland history (30 in 2019)...had a 29-24 record and finished with the second fewest losses and third fewest wins...had the fewest innings pitched (539.0) and fewest strikeouts per nine innings (7.85), the third fewest walks per nine innings (3.19) and the fourth most home runs per nine innings (1.22)...allowed 64-of-180 (35.6%) inherited runners to score, which was the ninth best percentage in the AL...the 180 inherited runners were third fewest in the AL and the fewest by an A's bullpen in a full season since at least 1974...had the second highest slugging percentage against first batters faced in the AL (.441) and the fifth highest batting average (.246)...had the fewest first batter strikeouts (109), the second fewest walks (35) and the second most home runs (21)...the 21 first batter home runs were the most by an A's team since at least 1974.

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: The A's set an Athletics record for fewest errors in a season with 72...broke the previous mark of 80 set in 2019...had a .9873 fielding percentage, which was the highest in franchise history a full season (had a mark of .9874 in 2020)...ranked second in the American League in fielding percentage and fewest errors (Astros, .988/69)...the errors led to 47 unearned runs, which was second fewest to the Orioles (46)...turned 116 double plays, which were fourth fewest in the AL and third fewest in a full season in Oakland history...had 1320 assists, which was third fewest in the AL and the fewest in a full season in Athletics history...had the fourth fewest total chances in the AL (5691), which were the fewest in a season of more than 144 games in Athletics history... had 16 outfield assists, which tied for second fewest in the AL and was third fewest in a full season in Oakland history...tied for second in the AL in fewest passed balls (6).

ON THE BASES: The A's were successful in 88-of-108 (81.5%) stolen bases attempts, which was the second best percentage in the American League to Cleveland (86.5%)...it was the fifth best percentage in AL history in a full season and the best in Athletics history, topping the previous record of 80.7% in 2008 (had a mark of 89.7% in 2020)...tied for fourth in the AL in stolen bases and the 88 steals were the A's most since 2012 (122)...opponents were 65-for-87 (74.7%) in stolen base attempts...the stolen bases and attempts were fifth fewest in the AL and the stolen base percentage was sixth lowest.

CLOSE CALLS: The A's had 12 walk-off wins, which tied for third most in Oakland history...tied Colorado and Philadelphia for the most walk-off wins in the majors to mark the fifth consecutive season the A's finished at least tied for second in the majors in walk-off wins...have 49 walk-off wins over that span, which is 11 more than any other team...were 23-27 (.460) in one-run games, which was the fifth worst record in the American League...led the AL in one-run losses and the 50 one-run decisions were second most to Seattle (52)...had a 37-43 (.463) record in games decided by two runs or fewer compared to 49-33 (.598) in games decided by three runs or more...were 8-3 (.727) in extra in-

ning games, which was the second best record in the majors to St. Louis (7-2, .778) and sixth best in Oakland history...the 11 extra inning games tied for third fewest in the AL...are 14-4 (.778) in extra innings over the last two years, which is the best record in the majors...were 19-12 in games decided in the last at bat...tied for second in the AL in most wins when trailing after eight innings (4) but also tied for second in most losses when leading after seven innings (8)...had five walk-off losses, which tied for second fewest in the AL (Los Angeles, 1).

HOME AND AWAY: The A's went 43-38 (.531) at home and on the road, which marks the third time in Athletics history the A's had identical records both at home and on the road (1947, 2015)...tied for the sixth best road record in the American League and had the eighth best home record...posted a .500 record or better on the road for the fourth straight season, which is the second longest such streak by an A's team over the last 89 years (had five straight from 1971-75)...had a winning record at home for fifth consecutive season and 10th time in the last 12 years...hit .229 with a .699 OPS and 339 runs scored at home compared to .247 with a .745 OPS and 404 runs scored on the road...had the second lowest home batting average in the AL, the third lowest OPS and the fourth fewest runs scored...had the third most runs scored on the road and the fourth best batting average and OPS...the home batting average was second lowest in Oakland history to a mark of .225 in 1979...had a 3.74 ERA and .687 OPS at home, a 4.31 and .737 OPS on the road...ranked fifth in the AL in home ERA and OPS...were sixth in road ERA and seventh in OPS...won 10 home series, lost 12 and split four...won 14 road series, lost nine and split three.

THE INJURED LIST: The A's used the injured list 27 times, which ties the Oakland record set in 2016...however, it was second fewest in the majors to Cleveland (18)...used it eight times in 2020, which was also second fewest to Cleveland (4), and 18 times in 2019, which tied for second fewest...the players on the IL combined to miss just 794 games, which was the fewest in a full season since 2013 (658)...averaged 29.4 games per stint, which was the lowest over a full season since 2002 (26.3)...the fewest players on the IL at once was two for the first three games of the season... had a season-high eight players on the IL on May 7 and for the final three games of the season... Trevor Rosenthal was the only player to spend the entire season on the IL and Mike Fiers missed the second most games with 151 over two stints...no other player missed more than 70 games... Mitch Moreland had three stints on the IL and Fiers, Guduan, Pinder and Piscotty had two each.

most in Oakland history (1975, 1991, 1997)...in 2021, only the Cubs (8) used more...were one of five teams in the majors with four 10-game winners...had three pitchers with at least 150 strikeouts for the fourth time in Oakland history (1968, 2001, 2002)...used 155 different lineups in 162 games...employed 13 rookies, including six pitchers...according to baseball-reference formulas, the A's had the oldest pitch age in the majors (30.1) and the second oldest bat age (30.1).

BEFORE AND AFTER THE ALL-STAR BREAK: The A's went into the All-Star Break with a 52-40 (.565) record, marking their third consecutive season with a winning record at the break (51-41 in 2019, 55-42 in 2018)...the last time the A's had three straight winning records at the break was from 2000-06 when they had seven straight...it is the first time the A's have been at least 10 games over .500 at the break in three straight years since 1988-90...were in second place and trailed first place Houston by 3½ games, which is the closest they have been to first at the break since 2014 when they were in first with a 1½ game lead...then went 34-36 (.486) after the break, which marked the fifth time in the last seven seasons the A's had a losing record after the break...the pitching staff set an Athletics record with 755 strikeouts before the break (previous: 728 in 2014)...had a 3.80 ERA before the break, which was their lowest since 2015 (3.37), and a 4.31 ERA after the break...the offense hit .232 before the break, which was third lowest in Oakland history (.225 in 2012, .231 in 1982), and .245 after the break.

MONTH-BY-MONTH: The A's finished April with a 16-11 record, which was the third best record in the American League and their best mark in April since 2014 when they went 18-9...A's pitchers set an Athletics record for strikeouts in April with 233...A's batters set Athletics records for hit by pitches (19) and strikeouts (244)...hit .214, which was fourth lowest in the AL and fourth lowest in Oakland history in April...it was the lowest since 2012 (.211)...tied for second in the AL with 19 stolen bases...had a 15-14 record in May, which marked their third consecutive winning May (16-10 in 2019, 15-14 in 2018)...tied for third in the AL in doubles (55) and hit by pitches (12), ranked fourth in walks (108) and fifth in home runs (37)...had the fewest stolen bases (4) and the most grounded into double plays (30)...the stolen bases were the fewest in Oakland history in the month of May (previous: 5 in 2018)...A's pitchers had the fewest walks in the AL in May (75), ranked third in fewest strikeouts (232), tied for third in fewest home runs (25) and fourth in opponents OPS (.675) and on-base percentage (.300)...the strikeouts set an Oakland record for the month of May (previous: 230 in 2015) and were third most in any month (246 in Sept. 2013, 233 in April 2021)...finished June with a 17-9 record (.654) record, which was second best in the AL (Astros, 19-9) and tied for fourth best in the majors...it was their third consecutive winning June and have won 17 games in each of those Junes...had the second lowest ERA (3.55) and OPS (.697) in the AL and issued the fewest walks (66)...starters had a 2.92 ERA, which was the lowest in the majors...the offense tied for second in the AL in hit by pitches (14) and ranked fifth in runs (140) and on-base percentage (.326)...hit .314 with runners in scoring position, which was second best in the majors (Cleveland, .347)...grounded into six double plays, which was the fewest in the majors...the last time the A's grounded into fewer than 10 double plays in a month with 12 or more games was in April, 1987 (5 in 23 games)...out-scored the opposition 140-94 (+46) after being outscored 242-231 (11) in April and May...went 11-13 (.458) in July, which was the fifth worst record in the AL...it was the A's first losing record in a month of 10 or more games since they went 11-15 in April of 2019, snapping a streak of 10 consecutive months with a winning record...however, had the second lowest ERA (2.98) and OPS (.618) in July in the majors (Brewers, 2.56 and .599)...A's pitchers set a franchise record for July strikeouts (221)...had the second lowest opponents batting average (.219) and on-base percentage (.282) in July in Oakland history, the fourth lowest slugging percentage (.335), fifth lowest OPS and seventh lowest ERA...on offense, the A's had the second lowest batting average (.223) and OPS (.668) and the second fewest runs scored (90) in the majors to Texas (.198, .615, 76)...had the second lowest July batting average in Oakland history and the third lowest on-base percentage (.294) but were hit by a pitch 15 times, which tied for the most (2018)...outscored the opposition 90-78...went 14-12 (.538) in August, which was the fourth best record in the AL...were 33-for-35 (94.3%) in stolen base attempts...the 33 steals were the most in the majors, the most by the A's in August since 1983 (42) and their most in any month since September of 2010 (36)...led the AL in hit by pitches (19), had the second fewest strikeouts (202) and ranked third in on-base percentage (.332)...the pitching staff had the second fewest strikeouts (196), tied for the second fewest walks (73) and had the fifth lowest opponents batting average (.239)...went 12-15 (.444) in September, which tied for the fourth worst record in the AL...it was their first losing September since 2016 when they went 10-17...hit .247

with a .719 OPS...ranked fourth in the AL in runs (137) and walks (90)...had the third fewest stolen bases (7) and tied for the third fewest extra base hits (77)...A's pitchers had the second highest opponents OPS (.795) and third highest ERA (5.15)...the bullpen was 4-8 with five saves, seven blown saves and a 6.37 ERA.

IN THE PINCH: A's pinch hitters batted .241 with six doubles, five home runs and 26 RBI...led the American League in hits (35), homers and plate appearances (158), tied for the lead in RBI and extra base hits (11) and tied for second in doubles...tied for third in Oakland history in home runs, tied for fifth in extra base hits, tied for sixth in RBI and tied for ninth in hits...the 26 RBI were the most by an A's team since 1997 (31) and the 35 hits were the most since 1998 (35)...Chad Pinder led A's pinch hitters with nine RBI, which were fifth most in Oakland history...in the designated hitter era, the only Athletic with more pinch RBI is Jeff Burroughs, who had 12 in 1982.

DESIGNATED HITTERS: A's designated hitters batted .202 with 19 home runs and 65 RBI...the batting average, on-base percentage (.276), slugging percentage (.368) and OPS (.644) were all second lowest in the American League to Detroit (.192/.255/.282/.537)...had the third fewest home runs and RBI, tied for the third fewest walks (51) and had the fifth fewest extra base hits (49)...the batting average was the lowest in Oakland history, one point lower than the 1987 club, which hit .203...the on-base percentage was second lowest (.270 in 1986) and the OPS was third lowest...Mitch Moreland led the A's with 57 starts and Jed Lowrie was second with 49.

INTERLEAGUE PLAY: The A's went 11-9 (.550) in interleague play, which tied for the 10th best record in the majors...it marked the 15th time in 25 seasons of interleague play the A's finished with a winning record against the National League...stole 22 bases, which ranked second in the majors and was an Oakland interleague record, topping the previous mark of 16 in 2011...also ranked fifth in the majors in hit by pitches (13) and tied for seventh in doubles (38) but tied for the second fewest home runs (15)...were 15th in runs scored (90), 19th in batting average (.238) and 22nd in OPS (.681)...had the second most hit by pitches and strikeouts (180) in Oakland history...the pitching staff ranked 11th in the majors in ERA (4.07) and opponents OPS (.711)...had 160 strikeouts, which tied for third most in Oakland interleague history...A's pitchers were 4-for-20 (.200) with a double, RBI, four sacrifice hits and 11 strikeouts...the double by Sean Manaea was the first extra base hit by an A's pitcher since 2007 (double, Joe Kennedy)...Oakland is 249-215 (.537) all-time in interleague games, which is fourth best in Major League history.

WINS AND LOSSES: The A's were 37-26 (.587) when the opponent started a left-handed pitcher compared to 49-50 (.495) when they started a right-hander...the mark against lefties was second best in the American League (Chicago, 25-17/.595)...the 63 games against left-handed starters are the most by an A's team since the 1983 club had 65...had a 15-7 (.682) record following an off day, which was the second best record in the majors (San Francisco, 19-4/.826)...went 37-39 (.487) against AL West teams compared to 49-37 (.570) against all other competition...it marked the sixth time in the last eight years the A's have finished with a .500 or worse record against divisional foes...had a 23-10 (.697) record against AL Central teams, which was the best record in the majors...are 74-26 (.740) against the Central over the last four years and are 88-30 (.746) dating back to June 23, 2017...had their best records against Arizona (4-0) and Detroit (6-1) and their worst against Seattle (4-15).

DESIGNATED HITTER RULE

A hitter may be designated to bat for the pitcher in any spot in the batting order in any game without affecting the status of the pitcher. The designated hitter must be selected and be included on the lineup cards presented to the umpire-in-chief prior to the game. Failure to do so precludes the use of a designated hitter for that game.

The designated hitter is "locked" into the batting order but may be removed for a pinch-hitter or pinch-runner, who in turn becomes the designated hitter. The designated hitter, while still in the game, may be used defensively but the pitcher then assumes the batting order of the replaced defensive player, thus terminating the designated hitter role. The designated hitter is eligible for all American League batting titles.

A pitcher is credited with a save when he meets all three of the following conditions:

1. He is the finishing pitcher in a game won by his club, and
2. He is not the winning pitcher, and
3. He qualifies under one of the following conditions:
 - a. He enters the game with a lead of no more than three runs and pitches for at least one inning, or
 - b. He enters the game with the potential tying run on base, at bat, or on deck (that is, the potential tying run is either on base or is one of the first two batsmen he faces), or
 - c. He pitches effectively for at least three innings

ATHLETICS BIGGEST COMEBACK

On July 20, 2009, the A's set an Oakland record by overcoming a 10-run deficit to win. Trailing Minnesota 12-2 entering the bottom of the third inning, the A's scored three times in the third, twice in the fourth and seven times in the seventh to win 14-13. The all-time Athletics record is also the Major League record, set by the Philadelphia A's on June 15, 1925 against Cleveland. HISTORY

ATHLETICS HISTORY

From its beginnings in Philadelphia to its current version in Oakland, the Athletics franchise has been one of the most storied in Major League history. The A's have won nine World Championships, 15 Pennants and 17 Division Titles in 121 years in the American League. Only the New York Yankees (27) and St. Louis Cardinals (11) have won more World Series and only the Yankees (40) have more American League Pennants.

The A's were one of the eight original AL franchises when the league was born in 1901. Connie Mack was named manager of the Philadelphia entry and would guide the A's for 50 years, winning five World Championships and 3,582 games. The Hall of Famer was also an owner of the club for all 54 years in Philadelphia.

Under Mack's leadership, the A's would win six of the first 14 AL Pennants, including World Series titles in 1910, 11 and 13. The first dynasty featured the "\$100,000 infield" of Stuffy McInnis, Eddie Collins, Jack Barry and Frank "Home Run" Baker as well as Hall of Fame pitchers Chief Bender, Eddie Plank and Rube Waddell. Waddell led the AL in strikeouts each year from 1902-07 and Baker earned the "Home Run" nickname by topping the AL in round trippers from 1911-14, with 11, 10, 12 and nine.

The A's won 99 games in 1914 but dropped off to 43 wins in 1915 as the club sold off many of its star players, a pattern that would continue throughout the history of the franchise. The A's had seven straight last place finishes through 1921, but a second dynasty was on the horizon.

Mack again began to assemble Hall of Fame talent in the mid-20's, putting together one of the most feared batting orders in baseball history with catcher Mickey Cochrane, first baseman Jimmie Foxx and outfielder Al Simmons. Add in another Hall of Famer on the mound in Lefty Grove and the A's would win 100 games in three straight seasons, including back-to-back World Championships in 1929 and 30.

The A's won their ninth AL Pennant with a 107-win season in 1931 as Grove won AL Most Valuable Player honors. Foxx won back-to-back MVPs in 1932 and 1933, setting franchise records for home runs (58) and RBI (169) in 1932. However, economics again led Mack to sell or trade his best players. The club would post 13 consecutive losing seasons from 1934-46 and would finish no higher than fourth place in the final 21 years in Philadelphia.

Connie Mack managed his final season in 1950 at the age of 87 and the Mack family sold the club to Arnold Johnson, who moved the A's to Kansas City in 1955.

The A's finished in sixth place in their first season in Kansas City, but that would be their highest finish in the midwest, which featured 13 losing seasons. The club again began to develop talent, but most, including the likes of Roger Maris and 1952 AL MVP Bobby Shantz, would end up being traded to the Yankees. Following the death of Johnson in 1960, the A's were sold to Charlie Finley.

Finley began assembling another talented group of A's players, signing Jim "Catfish" Hunter, Rollie Fingers, Bert Campaneris and Joe Rudi and drafting Reggie Jackson, Sal Bando and Vida Blue. While most of these players had limited time with the Kansas City A's, they would form the nucleus of the next A's dynasty.

The A's moved to Oakland in 1968 and won 82 games that year for their first winning season in 16 years. After back-to-back second place finishes in 1969 and '70, the A's won five straight American League West titles from 1971-75. Anchored by Hall of Famers Hunter, Fingers and Jackson, the A's won three straight World Championships from 1972-74.

Although the A's won 98 games in 1975, the third Athletics dynasty was already coming to an end with the departure of Hunter via free agency prior to the season. The rest of the players would be traded in the next two years and the A's reached a low in Oakland with a 108-loss season in 1979. However, that year saw the debut of the next A's superstar, Rickey Henderson.

Billy Martin was hired to manage the A's in 1980 and Henderson flourished under Martin, stealing 100 bases that year and a record 130 in 1982. Finley sold the A's to Haas Family following the 1980 season and Billy Ball, featuring Henderson on the bases and starting pitchers going the distance, was born. The A's won the West in the strike-shortened 1981 season but would face a seven-year drought before returning to the postseason.

The turnaround began in 1986 with the hiring of Tony La Russa as manager and the signing of Dave Stewart as a free agent. A trade for future Hall of Famer Dennis Eckersley in 1987 led to the emergence of the modern day closer, and three straight rookies of the year in Jose Canseco (1986), Mark McGwire (1987) and Walt Weiss (1988) gave the A's the ingredients for a run of four AL West Championships in five years from 1988-92.

Oakland made three straight World Series appearances from 1988-90, including a sweep of the cross-bay rival San Francisco Giants in 1989 that was buoyed by the return of Henderson to Oakland. Two years later on May 1, 1991, Henderson would break Lou Brock's Major League stolen base record with his 939th steal.

The A's had MVPs in 1988 (Canseco), 1990 (Henderson) and 1992 (Eckersley) and Cy Youngs in Bob Welch (1990) and Eckersley (1992), but this time it was age that ended the A's run.

The Moneyball teams of the early 2000's featuring the Big Three of Tim Lincecum, Mark Mulder and 2002 Cy Young winner Barry Zito, and the offensive power of 2000 MVP Jason Giambi, 2002 MVP Miguel Tejada and Gold Glove Eric Chavez, made four straight postseason appearances from 2000-03 and another in 2006. The 2002 club set a then-AL record with a 20-game winning streak, capped off by a Scott Hatteberg pinch hit home run.

Bob Melvin was hired as manager in 2011 and under his guidance, the A's made six postseason appearances over a nine-year span from 2012-20. The run began with two AL West titles and a Wild Card from 2012-14 and two Wild Cards and an AL West title from 2018-20. In between, the A's completely rebuilt, with only Brett Anderson and Jed Lowrie playing in each three-year stretch.

ATHLETICS HALL OF FAME

The Athletics Hall of Fame was founded in 2018 to honor the individuals who have shaped the identity and success of the Athletics franchise.

The inaugural class of seven featured the five Oakland A's National Baseball Hall of Famers: Catfish Hunter, Rollie Fingers, Reggie Jackson, Dennis Eckersley and Rickey Henderson, as well as four-time 20-game winner Dave Stewart and owner Charlie Finley.

The first induction ceremony took place on Sept. 5, 2018. With six additions in 2022, the Athletics Hall of Fame now features 28 members.

ATHLETICS HALL OF FAMERS



Frank "Home Run" Baker
Philadelphia A's 1908-14
Inducted Aug. 22, 2021

Frank "Home Run" Baker led the American League in home runs from 1911-13 and tied for the lead in 1914, but earned his nickname by hitting two home runs in the 1911 World Series against the Giants, the second of three World Champion A's teams that featured Baker as the A's third baseman. A member of the A's famed \$100,000 infield, Baker led the league in triples in his rookie season of 1909 and topped the AL in RBI from 1912-13.



Sal Bando
Kansas City A's 1966-67;
Oakland A's 1968-76
To Be Inducted 2022

"Captain Sal" was the leader that held the A's together in the early 70's when Oakland won five straight American League West titles and three consecutive World Series. Bando finished in the top four in Most Valuable Player voting three times and was a four-time All-Star. His durability put him atop the AL leader board in games played four times and although he never led the league in any other major category, his 33.0 WAR from 1969-73 was the best in baseball.




Charles "Chief" Bender
Philadelphia A's 1903-14
Inducted Aug. 22, 2021

Charles "Chief" Bender was a Native American who pitched in five World Series for the A's. He had his finest season in 1910 when he authored a no-hitter while compiling a 23-5 record and a 1.58 ERA before helping the A's to their first World Championship. Bender, who was Connie Mack's choice "if there was one game I wanted to win above all others" won five of his seven World Series starts in 1910, 11 and 13 to lead the A's to their first three World Championships.




Vida Blue
Oakland A's 1969-77
Inducted Sept. 21, 2019

Vida Blue made his Major League debut in 1969 eight days before his 20th birthday, tossed a no-hitter in 1970, and then burst onto the national scene in 1971 when he won both the American League Cy Young Award and Most Valuable Player Award after compiling a 24-8 record, a league-leading 1.82 ERA and 301 strikeouts. Blue started two All-Star Games for the AL in 1971 and 1975, and in between pitched for the A's three consecutive World Champions.



Bert Campaneris
Kansas City A's 1964-67;
Oakland A's 1968-76
Inducted Sept. 21, 2019

When you trace the roots of the A's three straight World Championships from 1972 to 1974, it all began on April 25, 1961, when the Kansas City A's signed a 19-year-old Cuban named Dagoberto Campaneris. "Campy" played 13 seasons for the A's and was a six-time All-Star. He stole 649 bases in his career and led the American League in steals six times. Campaneris homered twice in his debut and famously played all nine positions in a nine-inning game on Sept. 8, 1965.



Eric Chavez
Oakland A's 1998-2010
To Be Inducted 2022

Eric Chavez was a mainstay of the third era of great Oakland teams that won four American League West titles and made five playoff appearances from 2000-06. He won six straight Gold Gloves at third base from 2001-06, hit 20 or more home runs in seven straight seasons from 2000-06 and drove in 100 runs four times. Much like the A's teams of his era, Chavez excelled in the second half of the season and retired as the best player in Oakland history never named to an All-Star Team.




Gordon "Mickey" Cochrane
Philadelphia A's 1925-33
Inducted Aug. 22, 2021

One of baseball's greatest catchers, Mickey Cochrane was the backstop for the A's three consecutive American League Pennant winning teams from 1929-31. He was named AL MVP in 1928 and homered twice in the 1930 World Series as the A's won their second straight World Championship. Cochrane had a .321 batting average in nine seasons with the A's and also had a .419 on-base percentage nearly 70 years before it gained mainstream acceptance.




Eddie Collins
Philadelphia A's 1906-14; 27-30
Inducted Aug. 22, 2021

The first Athletic to be elected to the National Baseball Hall of Fame, Eddie Collins batted .337 and stole 373 bases in 13 seasons over two stints with the A's. He finished in the top six in Chalmers' Award Voting, a precursor to the MVP, in four straight seasons from 1911-14 and won the award in 1914. He hit .429 in the 1910 World Series to start the A's championship run of three Series titles in four years. The second baseman led the AL in steals in 1910 and runs from 1912-14.



Dennis Eckersley
Oakland A's 1987-95
Inducted Sept. 5, 2018

When Dennis Eckersley was traded to the A's in April of 1987, he had a successful 12-year career as a starting pitcher. By the time his nine seasons in Oakland concluded, he redefined the role of closer, saving an Athletics record 320 games. Born in Oakland and raised in Fremont, he was the AL MVP and Cy Young winner in 1992. Eckersley was a four-time All-Star with Oakland and was a member of the A's World Champions in 1989.



Rollie Fingers
Oakland A's 1968-76
Inducted Sept. 5, 2018

Rollie Fingers made his ML debut with Oakland in 1968 and was used both as a starter and reliever over his first four seasons. He moved to the bullpen full time in 1972, when the A's began their run of three consecutive World Championships. Fingers spent the first nine seasons of his 17-year Hall of Fame career with Oakland. The mustachioed right-hander was a four-time All-Star with the A's and earned 1974 World Series MVP honors.



Charlie Finley
Kansas City A's 1961-67;
Oakland A's 1968-80
Inducted Sept. 5, 2018

After purchasing the Kansas City A's following the 1960 season, Charlie Finley moved the club to Oakland in 1968 where the team he assembled would win three consecutive World Championships from 1972-74. He would be remembered as much for his off-field antics and innovations, as he proposed the designated hitter, interleague play and World Series night games. Finley also introduced baseball to Charlie O the mule, Harvey the mechanical rabbit, white cleats, colorful uniforms and more.



Ray Fosse
Oakland A's 1973-75, 1985-2021
To Be Inducted 2022

Ray Fosse blazed a unique trail to A's immortality. It began with three years as a player from 1973-75 and concluded with 37 seasons in the front office, including 36 as a broadcaster. Fosse was a catcher for the A's World Champion teams in 1973 and 1974 and he returned to Oakland in 1985 in a front office role. He moved into the radio booth in 1986 and was a mainstay on A's radio and television broadcasts until passing away following the 2021 season.



Jimmie Foxx
Philadelphia A's 1925-35
Inducted Aug. 22, 2021

Jimmie Foxx did not finish his senior year of high school as he went to spring training with the Philadelphia A's in 1925 and made his Major League debut later that year at the age of 17. He would go on to hit 302 home runs in 11 seasons as an Athletic, a franchise record that stood for 61 years. Foxx earned back-to-back MVP awards from 1932-33 and a Triple Crown in 1933. He represented the A's in the first three All-Star Games from 1933-35 and was a World Champion in 1929 and 30.



Robert "Lefty" Grove
Philadelphia A's 1925-33
Inducted Aug. 22, 2021

Lefty Grove pitched for nine seasons with the Philadelphia A's, leading the league in strikeouts seven times, ERA five times and wins four times. He won the pitching Triple Crown by leading the league in wins, ERA and strikeouts in back-to-back seasons from 1930-31. Grove capped that streak by going 31-4 with a 2.06 ERA and 175 strikeouts in 1931 to earn American League MVP honors. He was a member of the A's back-to-back World Champions in 1929-30 and was a 1933 All-Star.




Walter A. Haas, Jr.
Oakland A's 1981-95
Inducted Sept. 21, 2019

Walter A. Haas, Jr. purchased the A's following the 1980 season and during his 15 years as owner, Oakland won five American League West titles, three AL Pennants and the 1989 World Championship. The A's set franchise records for attendance five times, but Haas will be remembered just as much for his commitment to the community and staying in the background while bright young innovators grew the A's reputation to one of the best in baseball.




Rickey Henderson
Oakland A's 1979-84, 89-93,
94-95, 98
Inducted Sept. 5, 2018

Raised in Oakland and drafted by the A's, Rickey Henderson went on to become the greatest player in Oakland A's history and one of the greatest leadoff hitters of all time. He played 14 of his 25 seasons in an Oakland uniform and finished his career in 2003 as the all-time leader in stolen bases (1,406), runs scored (2,295) and walks (2,190). Henderson was a six-time All-Star with the A's, AL MVP in 1990 and a member of the 1989 A's World Champions.




Jim "Catfish" Hunter
Kansas City A's 1965-67;
Oakland A's 1968-74
Inducted Sept. 5, 2018

Jim "Catfish" Hunter was the anchor of the A's teams that won three consecutive World Championships from 1972 to 1974. He had four straight 20-win seasons with Oakland, including a career-high 25 victories in 1974 when he won the AL Cy Young. Hunter was a six-time All-Star with the A's and tossed the first perfect game in Oakland history on May 8, 1968. He pitched three seasons in Kansas City and seven in Oakland and was inducted to the National Hall of Fame in 1987.



Reggie Jackson
Kansas City A's 1967;
Oakland A's 1968-75, 87
Inducted Sept. 5, 2018

"Mr. October" was born in 1973 when Reggie Jackson earned World Series MVP honors as the A's won their second of three straight World Championships. He was also named AL MVP that year after leading the league in runs, home runs and RBI. Jackson made his debut with the Kansas City A's in 1967, spent the next eight seasons with Oakland and then concluded his 21-year Hall of Fame career with the A's in 1987. He played in six All-Star Games in an Oakland uniform.



Tony La Russa
Oakland A's 1986-95
Inducted Sept. 21, 2019

Tony La Russa managed the A's for 10 seasons from 1986 to 1995. Under his guidance, the A's won four American League West titles, three consecutive AL Pennants from 1988 to 1990 and the World Championship in 1989. La Russa won 798 games during his tenure with Oakland, including 104 in 1988 when he was named AL Manager of the Year. He would garner the honor again in 1992 and was elected to the National Baseball Hall of Fame in 2014.



Keith Lieppman
Oakland A's 1971-present
To Be Inducted 2022

Keith Lieppman grew up in Missouri in the 1960's attending Kansas City A's games and would end up spending over 50 years with the club after it moved to Oakland. He played for nine seasons in the minors from 1971-79, managed for eight from 1980-87 and then served for more than 25 years as Director of Player Development. In his roles, he tutored many of the players that would win 11 American League West titles and make 15 playoff appearances from 1988-2020.



Connie Mack
Philadelphia A's 1901-54
Inducted Aug. 22, 2021

Connie Mack managed the A's for 50 seasons from 1901-50 and was part-owner of the club for all 54 seasons in Philadelphia. Under his leadership, the A's would win five World Championship and nine American League Pennants. He built two dynasties, winning back-to-back World Series in 1910-11 as well as 1913, and then did it again in 1929-30. Known for managing in a suit, with a derby or bowler in place of a baseball cap, the A's won 3,582 games with Mack at the helm.



Mark McGwire
Oakland A's 1986-97
Inducted Sept. 21, 2019

Mark McGwire played 12 seasons with Oakland and hit 363 home runs, breaking the franchise record in 1996. He was named to nine American League All-Star teams, including six straight beginning in 1987 when he was named AL Rookie of the Year after hitting 49 home runs. He earned the AL Gold Glove for first basemen in 1990 and hit 52 home runs in 1996. The A's reached the Postseason four times with McGwire, highlighted by a World Championship in 1989.



Eddie Plank
Philadelphia A's 1901-14
Inducted Aug. 22, 2021

Eddie Plank was a member of the original 1901 Philadelphia A's and in 14 seasons as Athletic, he won 284 games, started 459, completed 362, had 59 shutouts and struck out 1,985, all franchise records that still stand. He never led the American League in wins, strikeouts or ERA but was always one of the top pitchers in the game, earning him a spot in the National Baseball Hall of Fame in 1946. Plank's tenure with the A's included six AL Pennants and three World Championships.



Joe Rudi
Kansas City A's 1967;
Oakland A's 1968-76, 82
To Be Inducted 2022

The A's reached the World Series three straight years from 1972-74 but winning those series required clutch performances, and Joe Rudi delivered. He made one of the greatest catches in World Series history in 1972 against the Reds and then hit .333 with four RBI in both 1973 against the Mets and 1974 against the Dodgers. Rudi won three consecutive Gold Gloves from 1974-76, was a three-time All-Star and finished second in American League MVP balloting in 1972 and 1974.



Al Simmons
Philadelphia A's 1924-32; 40-41;
44
Inducted Aug. 22, 2021

Al Simmons was a major factor in the A's three consecutive American League pennant winning clubs from 1929-31, hitting .346 with 92 home runs and 450 RBI. He led the AL in RBI in 1929 and then won back-to-back batting titles in 1930 and 31. Simmons hit .341 or better in seven consecutive seasons from 1925-31 and had a .356 average in 12 seasons with Philadelphia. He drove in at least 100 runs in each of his first nine seasons with the A's and had at least 200 hits five times.



Dave Stewart
Oakland A's 1986-92, 95
Inducted Sept. 5, 2018

Born in Oakland and a graduate of St. Elizabeth High School, Dave Stewart spent six seasons in the majors with three teams before breaking through with the A's. He joined Oakland in 1986 and would go on to win 20 games in four consecutive seasons from 1987-90. The big-game pitcher went 8-3 with a 2.22 ERA in 14 postseason starts for Oakland, including two wins in the 1989 World Series when he earned MVP honors in the A's sweep of the Giants.



Steve Vucinich
Oakland A's 1968-2021
To Be Inducted 2022

The one constant in the A's first 54 years in Oakland was Steve Vucinich. The A's have been erased like a blackboard, rebuilt and then erased again. But Vuc has marked the time. From the first batter in Oakland history, Bert Campaneris, to the most recent acquisitions, Yan Gomes and Josh Harrison, Steve has known them all. He joined the organization as a ballboy in 1968, moved to the visiting clubhouse in 1974 and then returned to the home clubhouse as equipment manager in 1994.



George "Rube" Waddell
Philadelphia A's 1902-07
Inducted Aug. 22, 2021

A fan favorite at the turn of the century not only for his skills on the mound but for his eccentricities that earned him the nickname Rube, George Waddell pitched six seasons for the Philadelphia A's from 1902-07. He led the AL in strikeouts in each of those six campaigns and won the pitching Triple Crown in 1905 with a 27-10 record, a 1.48 ERA and 287 strikeouts. Waddell fanned a career-high 349 batters in 1904 and his 24 wins in 1902 led the A's to their first AL Pennant.

THE RON BERGMAN AWARD

The Ron Bergman Award was established in 2019 to honor a journalist for meritorious contributions to the coverage of the Athletics. The award is named after the inaugural recipient, Ron Bergman, who covered the A's for the Oakland Tribune and San Jose Mercury News, and was the author of *Mustache Gang*, which chronicled the A's first World Championship in Oakland in 1972.

THE MONTE MOORE AWARD

The Monte Moore Award was established in 2021 to celebrate an individual for excellence in broadcasting Athletics games. The award is named after the inaugural recipient, Monte Moore, who called A's games on radio from 1962-77 and television from 1968-80 and 1988-92.

THE CHAMPIONSHIP YEARS

1910: Finished with a 102-48 record and outdistanced the New York Highlanders by 14.5 games in the American League standings...defeated the Chicago Cubs in five games to win the first of five World Championships in Philadelphia...102 wins set a new American League record...opened the season in Washington in a game attended by President William Howard Taft, who honored the game by throwing out the first ball, setting a precedent which was followed by each of his successors until the Senators left Washington following the 1971 season...the pitching staff, headlined by Jack Coombs, Chief Bender, Cy Morgan and Eddie Plank, finished with a 1.79 ERA...Coombs emerged as the ace of the pitching staff and finished with a 31-9 record and a 1.30 ERA, including 13 shutouts...compiled a 46-inning scoreless streak during the season...the infield of Stuffy McInnis, Eddie Collins, Jack Barry and Frank Baker would become known as the "\$100,000 Infield"...won the first three games of the World Series before the Cubs took game four, 4-3 in 10 innings...Coombs won his third game of the series in Game 5, out-pitching Mordecai Brown to lift the A's to their first world title.

doubles and two home runs...faced the New York Giants in the World Series in a rematch of the 1905 Fall Classic, won by the Giants...Christy Mathewson and Chief Bender squared-off in Game 1, just as they did in the 1905 Series finale...a run-scoring double by New York's Josh Devore in the seventh inning broke a 1-1 tie as the Giants captured the first game...the A's won Game 2, 3-1, behind the pitching of Eddie Plank and a home run by Baker...A's took a 2-1 lead in the series by winning Game 3, 3-2 in 11 innings at the Polo Grounds...after heavy rains forced postponement of the series for a week, the A's captured Game 4 at Shibe Park, 4-2, as Bender outdueled Mathewson...the Giants staved off elimination by winning Game 5 at the Polo Grounds, 4-3 in 10 innings...the A's routed the Giants, 13-2 in Game 6 to capture their second straight World Series title.

1913: The Athletics posted a 96-57 regular season record and outdistanced Washington by six-and-a-half games to reclaim the American League pennant...defeated the New York Giants in five games to capture their third World Series title in four years...moved into first place in April and stayed atop the AL standings the rest of the way...Jack Coombs, three years removed from a 31-win season, missed the entire campaign with typhoid fever...Chief Bender (21-10), Eddie Plank (18-10), Boardwalk Brown (17-11), Byron "Duke" Houck (14-6) and rookie "Bullet" Joe Bush (14-6) anchored the pitching staff...the "\$100,000 Infield" turned in another solid season...Frank Baker hit .336 to go along with an American League-best 12 home runs and 117 RBI...Stuffy McInnis hit .324 with 90 RBI, Collins finished with a .345 average while Barry batted .275...the Athletics and Giants split the first two games of the series before the A's won Games 3, 4 and 5 to capture their third World Series title.

AL cellar before finishing seventh in 1922...finished sixth in 1923, fifth in '24, second in '25, third in '26 and second in '27 and '28 before winning the pennant in 1929...Al Simmons leads the American League with 157 RBI and finished second with a .365 batting average...Jimmie Foxx hit .354 with 33 home runs while catcher Mickey Cochrane finished with a .331 average...Bing Miller (.335), Jimmy Dykes (.327) and Mule Haas (.313) also topped the .300 mark for the season...Earnshaw (24-8, 3.29) and Grove (20-6, 2.81) combined for 44 wins.

1930: After posting a 102-52 regular season record, the Athletics successfully defended their World Championship by defeating a hard-nosed St. Louis Cardinals team in six games...offensively, Al Simmons led the AL with a .381 average to go along with 36 home runs...Jimmie Foxx hit .335 and his 37 home runs ranked tied for third in the league behind Babe Ruth (49) and Lou Gehrig (41)...Mickey Cochrane finished the year with a .357 average...Lefty Grove posts a 28-5 record to go along with a 2.54 ERA while George Earnshaw finished with a 22-13 record and a 4.44 ERA...the 1931 Athletics won a franchise record 107 games, but were denied a third straight championship after losing to the St. Louis Cardinals in a seven-game World Series...after finishing second in 1932 and third in 1933, the A's would average 92 losses a season for the next 21 years before relocating to Kansas City for the 1955 season.

1929: Behind a high-powered offense that featured six .300 hitters and the league's best pitching staff paced by Lefty Grove and George Earnshaw, the A's finished with a 104-46 record and captured the American League pennant by 18 games over the New York Yankees...defeated the Chicago Cubs in five games to win their fourth World Series title...the championship was the culmination of a long journey back to the top of the baseball world for Connie Mack's club...after winning the 1914 pennant, the A's spent the next seven seasons in the

Vida Blue, who won both the AL Cy Young Award and league MVP honors a year before, to miss spring training and he did not make his first start until May 28th...led by Mike Epstein (26) and Reggie Jackson (25), the A's led the American League with 134 home runs...Jackson tore a hamstring muscle in the fifth game of the ALCS vs. Detroit and was sidelined for the World Series... Gene Tenace, who hit just .225 with five home runs during the regular season, hits a then-Fall Classic record four home runs to go along with a .348 average to earn World Series MVP honors.

1973: The A's claimed their third straight AL West title with a 94-68 record and dispatched the Baltimore Orioles to win a hard-fought five-game ALCS...defeated the New York Mets in seven games to capture a second straight World Championship...Reggie Jackson led the American League in home runs (32) and RBI (117) and hit .293 to earn AL MVP honors...after hitting just .143 against Baltimore in the ALCS, Jackson earned World Series MVP honors after hitting .310 with three doubles, a triple and a home run against the Mets...third baseman Sal Bando hit .287 with 29 home runs and 98 RBI

while playing all 162 games at third base...All-Star shortstop Campy Campaneris reached the 150-hit plateau for the second consecutive season and for the sixth time in 10 years...hit .333 vs. Baltimore and set then-ALCS records for total bases (14) and stolen bases (3) and tied an ALCS record with two home runs...hit .290 with six runs, three stolen bases, a triple and home run vs. the Mets in the World Series...Dick Green bounced back from an injury-plagued 1972 campaign to set a then-Oakland record for highest fielding percentage by a second baseman (.988)...Bill North, acquired in a trade with the Cubs in the off-season, emerged as the A's everyday center fielder, but a late season ankle injury forced him to miss both the ALCS and World Series...catcher Ray Fosse was acquired from Cleveland during spring training and established career highs in games played (143), at bats (492), doubles (23) and triples (2)...pitching staff was paced

1972: The Swingin' A's finished with a 93-62 regular season record and held off the Chicago White Sox to capture a second straight American League West title...defeated the Detroit Tigers in five games in the American League Championship Series to advance to the World Series, where they defeated the heavily-favored Cincinnati Reds in seven games...the pitching staff, led by Jim "Catfish" Hunter (21-7), Ken Holtzman (19-11), John "Blue Moon" Odom (15-6) and closer Rollie Fingers (11-9, 21 saves), finished second in the American League with a 2.58 ERA...a contract dispute forced

by 20-game winners Catfish Hunter (21-5), Ken Holtzman (21-13) and Vida Blue (20-9)...Hunter posted his third straight 21-win season despite missing a month of the season with an injury...strung together 13-straight victories from June 2 to September 5... Hunter posted two wins over Baltimore in the ALCS, including a 3-0 shutout in Game 5...he kept his record perfect in World Series play, winning Game 6 against the Mets...Holtzman won seven games in the month of May and finished with four shutouts among his 16 complete games...after a slow start, Blue won 11 of his last 13 decisions down the stretch to notch his second 20-win season in just his third full Major League season...Blue tossed a team-high four shutouts during the season...Manager Dick Williams resigned shortly after the season after failing to come to terms on a new contract.

1974: Under new manager Alvin Dark, the A's defeated the Los Angeles Dodgers to claim their third straight World Series...finished the regular season with a 90-72 record and won their fourth straight AL West title by five games over Texas...defeated the Baltimore Orioles in a four-game ALCS to set up the first ever All-California World Series against the Dodgers... Catfish Hunter captured the American League Cy Young Award after winning a career high 25 games to go along with a 2.49 ERA...Rollie Fingers made a career high 76 appearances to set a then-Oakland

record...he was named World Series MVP after chalking up a win, two saves and a 1.93 ERA in four appearances...Fingers earned the win in Game 1 as he worked 4.1 innings in relief of Ken Holtzman...Campy Campaneris hit a career high .290 and stole over 30 bases for the 10th straight season...Campy batted .353 in five World Series games against the Dodgers...Joe Rudi led the AL in doubles (39) and total bases (287) while finishing third in RBI (99), fourth in slugging (.484) and fifth in hits (174)...Sal Bando finished second in the American League with 103 RBI...he hit game-winning home runs in the second and third games of the ALCS vs. Baltimore... Reggie Jackson started the season by batting .399 with 15 home runs and 42 RBI over the first 50 games...he made his fifth All-Star Game appearance in six years and amassed over 3.5 million votes in the fan balloting, nearly 800,000 more than runner up Hank Aaron...after a blazing start, Jackson hit just .239 with 14 home runs and 51 RBI over the final 104 games of the season... Claudell Washington made the jump from Double-A to appear in 73 games and was named to Topp's Rookie All-Star Team.

the final week and never were more than three games out of the division lead...were an injury-plagued team for the first four months of the season as 11 different players spent time on the disabled list, including Jose Canseco, Mark McGwire, Storm Davis, Walt Weiss, Dennis Eckersley and Bob Welch...pitching staff posted the lowest ERA in the American League (3.09) for the second straight season...tossed a Major League-best 20 shutouts on the year...starting pitchers *Dave Stewart* (21-9), *Mike Moore* (19-11), *Storm Davis* (19-7) and *Bob Welch* (17-8) combined for a 76-35 record with a 3.25 ERA...*Stewart* became the first pitcher to string together three 20-win seasons since Hall of Famer *Jim Palmer* accomplished the feat from 1975-78...became just the second player in Oakland history to reel off three straight 20-win seasons...was the first since *Catfish Hunter* won 20 or more games during a four year stretch from 1971-74...was 4-0 in four postseason starts and earned World Series MVP honors...third baseman *Carney Lansford* set an Oakland single-season record with a .336 batting average, which was the second best mark in the AL...offense received a tremendous boost when the team reacquired Oakland native *Rickey Henderson* in a trade with the New York Yankees on June 20th...*Henderson* hit .294 and reached base safely in 80 of the 85 games he played with Oakland down the stretch...tied *Wade Boggs* for the AL lead in runs scored (113) and topped the loop with a career high 126 walks...was named ALCS MVP after hitting .400 with 15 total bases, eight runs scored, five RBI and seven walks in five games vs. the Blue Jays...hit a combined .441 in nine postseason games...*Dave Parker* topped the team with 97 RBI to go along with 22 home runs...*McGwire* ranked third in the AL with 33 home runs and ranked 10th in RBI (95)...*Mike Gallego*, who was thrust into the starting shortstop's role with *Weiss* sidelined for 65 games with an injury, finished the season with career highs in virtually every offensive category, including average (.252), runs (45), hits (90), home runs (3) and RBI (30)...*Canseco*, who won AL MVP honors the year before, missed the first 88 games of the season due to a stress fracture of the hook of the hamate bone in his left hand...despite missing the first half of the season, still managed to finish third on the team in homers (17) and fourth in RBI (57)...hit a tremendous home run in Game 4 of the ALCS off *Mike Flanagan*, a blast that carried into the fifth deck in Toronto's SkyDome.

The A's make their first appearance in the World Series and lose to the New York Giants, four games to one. Three of the losses come against Christy Mathewson who tosses three complete game shutouts. The A's collect just 25 hits in the series for a .161 batting average and score just three runs. Topsy Hartsel paces the A's offense with a .294 batting average and Bris Lord has the only two RBI. The A's use three pitchers in the Series and all toss complete games. Chief Bender makes two starts and has a 1.06 ERA.

The A's lose the first game in Philadelphia, 3-0, as Mathewson tosses a four-hit shutout. Chief Bender returns the favor in the second game of the series as he tosses a four-hit shutout and strikes out nine in a 3-0 A's win at New York. Lord has RBI singles in the third and eighth innings. Mathewson tosses a four-hit shutout in the Giants 9-0 win in Game 3 and Joe McGinnity blanks the A's on five hits in a 1-0 win in Game 4. Eddie Plank allows just four hits in Game 4 and the only run of the game is unearned after a Monte Cross error. Mathewson tossed a six-hit shutout in Game 5 as the Giants clinch the series with a 2-0 win.

1910 WORLD SERIES

The A's win their first World Series and use just two pitchers to defeat the Chicago Cubs, four games to one. Jack Coombs wins three of the games and posts a 3.33 ERA while Chief Bender is 1-1 with a 1.93 ERA. Eddie Collins paces the A's offense with a .429 batting average and four doubles and Frank Baker hits .409. Danny Murphy connects for the only home run of the series and leads the A's with nine RBI. The A's hit .316 and score 35 runs in the five games while the two pitchers combine for a 2.76 ERA and allow 15 runs.

The A's win the first two games in Philadelphia as Bender tosses a three-hitter in Game 1 and strikes out eight in a 4-1 win while Baker has three hits and two RBI. Coombs allows eight hits and nine walks in Game 2 but the Cubs strand 14 in a 9-3 A's win. Eddie Collins has three of the A's 14 hits and all nine Athletics collect at least one hit. The series moves to Chicago for Game 3 and Coombs comes back on one day of rest and defeats the Cubs, 12-5, collecting three hits and three RBI. Harry Davis and Jack Berry add three hits each and Barry and Murphy have three RBI. Bender suffers the A's only loss in Game 4 when the Cubs win 4-3 in 10 innings. The A's have a 3-2 lead entering the ninth but the Cubs score once in the ninth and once in the 10th for the win. The A's wrap up the series with a 7-2 win in Game 5 as Coombs picks up his third win of the series. Collins has three hits and the A's score five times in the eighth to break open a 2-1 game.

1911 WORLD SERIES

The A's win their second consecutive World Championship as they defeat the New York Giants, four games to two. The A's pitching staff, which consists of Chief Bender, Jack Coombs and Eddie Plank, allows just 13 runs in the series for a 1.29 ERA. Bender goes 2-1 with a 1.04 ERA, Coombs is 1-0 with a 1.35 ERA and Plank is 1-1 with a 1.86 ERA. Frank "Home Run" Baker earns his nickname as he paces the A's offense with a .375 batting average, two home runs and five RBI. Jack Barry hits .368 and the A's offense hits .244 with 27 runs scored in the six games.

The A's lose Game 1 at New York by a 2-1 score as Bender strikes out 11 in eight innings in a complete game effort but loses to Christy Mathewson who tosses a six-hitter. The A's then win each of the next three games, beginning with a 3-1 win at Philadelphia in Game 2. Plank tosses a five-hitter and Baker breaks a 1-1 tie with a two-run home run in the sixth inning. Game 3 lasts 11 innings at New York and the A's are 3-2 winners. Trailing 1-0 entering the ninth inning, Baker homers to tie the game and the A's score two in the 11th for the win. Coombs goes the distance, allowing just three hits in 11 innings. The series is delayed for seven days because of rain but it resumes with a 4-2 A's win in Philadelphia in Game 4. Bender tosses a seven-hitter, Barry has three hits and Eddie Collins, Danny Murphy and Baker have two hits each. The A's lead 3-0 after six innings in Game 5 but the Giants score once in the bottom of the seventh, twice in the ninth and once in the 10th for the win. The A's then wrap up the series with a 13-2 win at Philadelphia, scoring seven times in the seventh inning. Murphy has four hits, Bris Lord adds three and Bender tosses a four-hitter.

The A's win their third World Championship over a four-year span as they defeat the New York Giants, four games to one. The A's use just three pitchers in the series with all going the distance, including Chief Bender, who wins Games 1 and 4, and Eddie Plank, who posts a 1-1 record and a 0.95 ERA. Frank Baker paces the A's offense with a .450 batting average and matches Wally Schang for the team-lead with seven RBI. Eddie Collins hits .421 and steals three bases.

Bender allows 11 hits in Game 1 at New York, but the A's defeat the Giants, 6-4. Collins goes 3 for 3 and scores three runs and Baker is 3 for 4 with three RBI, including a two-run home run. The A's lone loss comes in a Game 2 at Philadelphia, a 3-0 decision in 10 innings. Plank tosses nine shut-out innings before allowing three runs in the top of the 10th, while Christy Mathewson blanks the A's on eight hits. The series returns to Philadelphia for Game 3 and the A's score five times in the first two innings en route to an 8-2 win. Collins has his second three-hit game of the series and drives in three runs and Joe Bush tosses a five-hitter. The A's take a 6-0 lead into the seventh inning of Game 4 at Philadelphia and hold on to win 6-5. Jack Barry has three hits and Schang goes 2 for 2 with four RBI. The A's then clinch the series at New York with a 3-1 win in Game 5 as Plank tosses a two-hitter, allowing just one unearned run in the fifth inning. The A's score early again as Baker has a sacrifice fly in the first inning and a RBI single in the A's two-run third.

The A's return to the World Series for the fourth time in five years but are swept in four games by the Boston Braves. The pitching staff posts a 3.41 ERA in the series, including 1.00 by Eddie Plank. The offense is held to a .172 batting average and scores just six runs in the four games. Frank Baker leads the A's with four hits in the series.

The A's drop a 7-1 decision in Game 1 at Philadelphia as Dick Rudolph limits the A's to an unearned run in the second inning. Chief Bender takes the loss, allowing six runs in 5.1 innings. Bill James shuts out the A's 1-0 in Game 2, yielding just two hits. The game is scoreless over the first eight innings before Plank allows a Les Mann RBI single with two outs in the top of the ninth. The series moves to Boston for Game 3, a 5-4 A's loss in 12 innings. The score is tied at 2-2 when Frank Baker delivers a two-run single in the top of the 10th inning. Joe Bush, who goes the distance for the A's, then allows two runs in the bottom of the 10th. Bush takes the loss when his own throwing error on a Herbie Moran sacrifice bunt attempt in the 12th allows the winning run to score. The A's then drop a 3-1 decision in Game 4 as Rudolph again holds the A's to just one run. Starting pitcher Bob Shawkey allows three runs in 5.0 innings for the loss.

The A's return to the World Series for the first time in 15 years and win their fourth World Championship, besting the Chicago Cubs four games to one. The pitching staff posts a 2.40 ERA, including 1.42 by Howard Ehmke. The offense hits .281 and scores 26 runs in the five-game series. Jimmy Dykes hits .421 and Mickey Cochrane adds a .400 batting average. Jimmie Foxx, Mule Haas and Al Simmons all hit two home runs each.

Ehmke strikes out 13 and tosses an eight-hitter in the opener as the A's win 3-1 at Chicago. Foxx breaks a scoreless tie with a solo home run in the seventh inning and the A's have a 3-0 lead before Ehmke allows an unearned run in the bottom of the ninth. In Game 2, Simmons drives in four runs and Foxx is 3 for 5 with three RBI and his second home run in a 9-3 victory. The series moves to Philadelphia for Game 3 when the A's lose their only game of the series, 3-1. George Earnshaw goes the distance and strikes out 10, after tossing 4.2 innings two days earlier. The A's fall behind 8-0 in Game 4 before scoring 10 times in the bottom of the seventh inning to win, 10-8. Haas and Simmons both homer in the inning and Haas and Jimmy Dykes drive in three runs each as the A's send 15 batters to the plate. Philadelphia then clinches the series with a 3-2 win in Game 5. Ehmke allows two runs in 3.2 innings before Rube Walberg comes on to pitch 5.1 innings of scoreless relief. The A's trail 2-0 entering the bottom of the ninth before Haas hits a two-run home run to tie the game. Bing Miller then has a walk-off double to drive in Simmons and win the series.

1930 WORLD SERIES

The Athletics win back-to-back World Series for the second time, defeating St. Louis four games to two. The pitching staff allows 12 runs in the six-game series for a 1.73 ERA. George Earnshaw goes 2-0 with a 0.72 ERA in three starts and Lefty Grove picks up the other two wins, posting a 1.42 ERA in three games, two starts. Offensively, the A's hit just .197 but add six home runs. Al Simmons hits .364 with two home runs and Jimmie Foxx bats .333. Mickey Cochrane adds two home runs and Jimmy Dykes drives in a team-best five runs.

Grove tosses a complete game in Game 1, a 5-2 A's win at Philadelphia. The A's are held to just five hits in the game, including a pair of solo home runs by Simmons and Cochrane. Earnshaw fires a six-hitter in the A's 6-1 win in Game 2. Simmons has two hits and Cochrane homers again, a solo shot in the first inning. The Cardinals win Game 3 in St. Louis as Bill Hallahan shuts out the A's on seven hits in a 5-0 win. Jesse Haines four-hits the A's in a 3-1 loss in Game 4 to even the series at two games each. Earnshaw and Grove then combine on a three-hit shutout in a 2-0 win in Game 5. Foxx hits a two-run home run in the ninth inning to account for all the scoring. The series returned to Philadelphia for Game 6 and the A's win their fifth and final World Championship in Philadelphia with a 7-1 victory. Earnshaw tosses a complete-game five-hitter and Dykes and Simmons both homer.

1931 WORLD SERIES

The A's and Cardinals meet in the World Series for the second consecutive season but the A's lose in seven games. The pitching staff posts a 2.66 ERA, including 1.88 by George Earnshaw and 2.42 by Lefty Grove, who picks up two of the A's three wins. Earnshaw and Grove both start three games each. The offense hits .220 and scores 22 runs in the seven-game series. Jimmie Foxx hits .348 and Al Simmons bats .333 with two of the A's three home runs and eight RBI.

The series opens in St. Louis and the A's take a 1-0 lead with a 6-2 win in Game 1. Grove goes the distance, allowing 12 hits, and Simmons drives in three runs, including a two-run home run in the seventh. Bill Hallahan tosses a three-hit shutout as the A's lose Game 2, 2-0. The A's then fall behind in the series with a 5-2 loss in Game 3 at Philadelphia. Burleigh Grimes no hits the A's over the first seven innings before Bing Miller singles in the eighth. Al Simmons hits a two-run home run in the ninth for the A's only runs. The A's even the series at two games each with a 3-0 win in Game 4. Earnshaw tosses a two-hit shutout and Foxx hits a solo home run in the sixth. St. Louis wins the final game in Philadelphia, 5-1, but the A's win Game 6 at St. Louis, 8-1 to force a seventh game. In the final game, Grimes again shuts down the A's in a 4-2 win. He does not allow a run over the first eight innings before yielding a pinch hit two-run single to Doc Cramer with two outs in the ninth. Max Bishop comes to the plate as the potential winning run but Hallahan relieves Grimes and gets Bishop to fly out to end the series.

Touted A's pitchers Vida Blue and Jim "Catfish" Hunter ran into problems during the series, leading to the A's downfall. Offensively, the A's got solid performances out of third baseman Sal Bando and right fielder Reggie Jackson, who hit .364 and .333 respectively.

In Game 1, Vida Blue took a 3-1 lead into the bottom of the seventh before allowing a RBI single to Mark Belanger, a RBI double by Curt Motton and a two-run double by Paul Blair. ALCS MVP Mike Cuellar tossed a complete game six-hitter to defeat the A's in Game 2. Jim Hunter also went the distance for the A's, allowing seven hits, including four home runs. In Game 3, Reggie Jackson homered twice and Sal Bando once but that was the A's only scoring as Jim Palmer tossed a complete game seven-hitter.

1972 AMERICAN LEAGUE CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

Forty-one years after the Philadelphia Athletics won the American League Pennant, the Oakland A's recorded the organization's next pennant with a hard fought three games to two triumph over Detroit. It was the first time in the four-year history of the ALCS that the playoffs had gone more than three games. The A's used superb pitching, scoring just a total of 13 runs in the five games, but allowing only 10. The series also saw a near brawl between Tigers manager Billy Martin and A's shortstop Campy Campaneris, who threw his bat at Tiger hurler Lerrin LaGrow after being hit by a pitch.

In Game 1, the Tigers scored a run in the top of the 11th inning on an Al Kaline home run to take a 2-1 lead but Gonzalo Marquez tied the game in the bottom of the inning on a pinch-hit RBI single. A Kaline throwing error on the play allowed Gene Tenace to score the winning run. ALCS MVP Blue Moon Odom tossed a three-hit shutout in a 5-0 A's win in Game 2. Campaneris had three hits, two runs and two steals but was suspended for the remainder of the playoffs by American League President Joe Cronin after the bat throwing incident. Joe Coleman blanked the A's 3-0 on seven hits in Game 3 and the Tigers won 4-3 in 10 innings in Game 4. The A's scored two runs in the top of the 10th for a 3-1 lead but the Tigers scored three times in the bottom of the 10th, including the game-winning single by Jim Northrup. In Game 5, Vida Blue pitched four innings of shutout relief to pick up the save for Odom. Gene Tenace's two-out RBI single in the fourth inning scored George Hendrick with the winning run.

1972 WORLD SERIES

The A's win their first World Championship in Oakland, the first for the Athletics franchise since 1930, defeating Cincinnati, four games to three. Six of the seven games are decided by one run and Gene Tenace picks up the offensive slack for Reggie Jackson who misses the entire series after pulling a hamstring in the ALCS. Tenace hits .348 with four home runs and nine RBI in the seven games to earn World Series MVP honors.

Tenace homered in his first two at bats of the series, hitting a two-run homer in the second and a solo shot in the fifth to lead the A's to a 3-2 win in Game 1. Catfish Hunter tossed 8 2/3 innings of six-hit, one-run baseball in Game 2 before yielding to Rollie Fingers who got the final out in the A's 2-1 win. Joe Rudi homered and made a spectacular catch off the bat of Denis Menke in the ninth. After a rainout in Oakland, the Reds won Game 3, 1-0 on a combined three-hitter by Jack Billingham and Clay Carroll. In Game 4, the A's trailed 2-1 entering the bottom of the ninth before scoring twice on pinch hit RBI singles by Don Mincher and Angel Mangual to take a 3-1 lead in the series. The Reds scored once in the eighth and once in the ninth off Rollie Fingers to win Game 5, 5-4 and then won 8-1 in Game 6 to even the series at three games each. In Game 7, the score was tied at one after five innings when Tenace delivered a RBI double to give the A's the lead. Sal Bando followed with a RBI double and Rollie Fingers pitched two scoreless innings for the save.

Baltimore then scored four times off Vida Blue in the seventh and once off losing pitcher Rollie Fingers in the eighth for a 5-4 win. ALCS MVP Catfish Hunter then tossed a five-hit shutout in Game 5 as the A's won 3-0 to clinch the series.

1973 WORLD SERIES

The A's win their second consecutive World Championship, winning Games 6 and 7 to defeat the New York Mets, four games to three. Reggie Jackson was named MVP of the series after hitting .310 with a home run and six RBI and Ken Holtzman was the winning pitcher in two of the A's four victories. The series also featured the "firing" of Mike Andrews by A's owner Charlie Finley after his two 12th-inning errors in Game 2 helped the Mets to a 10-7 win. Andrews did make another appearance in the series, grounding out as a pinch hitter in Game 4.

Holtzman picks up the win in the A's 2-1 victory in Game 1. The A's collect just three hits off Mets starter Jon Matlack but all come in the third inning as Holtzman doubles and scores on an error and Joe Rudi has a RBI single. The Mets score four runs off Rollie Fingers in the 12th inning of Game 2 to defeat the A's 10-7, but only one run was earned as Andrews committed two errors. Game 3 went 11 innings but the A's won 3-2 on a RBI single by Campy Campaneris in the top of the 11th. The A's lost Game 4, 6-1 as Rusty Staub was a perfect 4-for-4 to even the series at two games apiece. Jerry Koosman and Tug McGraw then combined to three-hit the A's in a 2-0 win in Game 5 but the A's came back to win the final two games in Oakland. In Game 6, Reggie Jackson doubled twice, singled and drove in two runs in the A's 3-1 victory. The A's had gone the entire series without a home run before Campaneris hit a two-run home run in the third inning in Game 2. Jackson added a two-run homer later in the inning and Darold Knowles retired Wayne Garrett with runners on first and third in the ninth to save the A's 5-2 win.

The A's trailed 2-1 entering the bottom of the sixth but score four times, highlighted by Jim Holt's two-run pinch hit single. Rollie Fingers clinches his series MVP honors by pitching two scoreless innings for the save in the A's 3-2 win in Game 5. Joe Rudi homers to lead off the seventh inning to break a 2-2 tie.

The series moves to Oakland for Game 3 and the A's get their only win of the series when Mark McGwire breaks a 1-1 tie with a one-out home run in the bottom of the ninth. The Dodgers score two runs in the first inning of Game 4 and lead the rest of the way in a 4-3 win. Dave Henderson collects four hits. Hershiser clinches World Series MVP honors by tossing a four-hitter in Game 5 to defeat the A's 5-2.

Oakland sweeps San Francisco for the A's first World Championship in 15 years in a series halted 12 days after an earthquake struck just prior to Game 3. The A's outscore the Giants 32-14 in the four-game set, hitting nine home runs and batting .301. Dave Stewart earns series MVP honors with two wins and a 1.69 ERA, Mike Moore wins the other two games and Rickey Henderson hits .474.

Stewart tosses a five-hit shutout in Game 1 as the A's win 5-0 in Oakland. The A's score three times in the second and Dave Parker and Walt Weiss hit solo home runs in the third and fourth innings. Moore and the A's bullpen hold the Giants to one run in a 5-1 victory in Game 2. With the score tied 1-1 after three innings, the A's break the game open with a four-run fourth, highlighted by Terry Steinbach's three-run homer. The series moves to San Francisco for Game 3 and the A's outslug the Giants 13-7. Dave Henderson homers twice and Tony Phillips, Jose Canseco and Carney Lansford also homer as the A's tie a series record with five home runs. Moore picks up the win in the A's 9-6 win in Game 4 and also adds a two-run double. Rickey Henderson homers and collects three hits as the A's lead 8-0 entering the bottom of the sixth.

1990 AMERICAN LEAGUE CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

The A's sweep Boston in the American League Championship Series for the second time in the last three years and become the first team since the 1976-78 New York Yankees to win three straight pennants. The A's pitching staff held the Red Sox to four runs, one in each game, while the offense hit .299 with no home runs. Dave Stewart picked up two wins and posted a 1.13 ERA to earn ALCS MVP honors and Terry Steinbach (.455), Carney Lansford (.438) and Mike Gallego (.400) all hit .400.

Dave Stewart and Roger Clemens engaged in a pitchers duel in Game 1 and when Clemens left after six innings, the A's trailed 1-0. The A's then scored nine runs off the Sox bullpen, including seven in the ninth, to win 9-1. Rickey Henderson had three RBI, Lansford and Steinbach had three hits each and Stewart allows one run in eight innings. Boston again took a 1-0 lead in Game 2, but the A's scored four unanswered runs this time, tying the game on a Harold Baines RBI single in the fourth and taking the lead on a Baines ground out in the seventh. The series moves to Oakland for Game 3 and starts in a familiar way as Boston scores a run in the second before the A's score twice in the fourth and sixth innings to win 4-1. The A's finally score first in Game 4, scoring three times in the second highlighted by a two-run double by Mike Gallego. Dave Stewart pitches eight scoreless innings before allowing a run in the ninth and Rick Honeycutt gets the final three outs for the save in the A's 3-1 win.

Cory Lidle starts Game 4 and allows two unearned runs in the second, two in the third and two of the Yankees three runs in the fourth in a 9-2 loss. Lidle allows six runs on five hits and three walks in 3 1/3 innings. Miguel Tejada has four hits and Jermaine Dye breaks his leg after fouling off a pitch in the third inning. The series returns to Yankee Stadium for Game 5 and New York completes its comeback with a 5-3 win. RBI singles by Jason and Jeremy Giambi in the first and second innings give the A's a 2-0 lead but New York scores two in the second and unearned runs in the third and fourth off Mulder to take the lead for good. Mulder allows four runs on seven hits in 4 1/3 innings for the loss.

The A's then score twice in the eighth when Céspedes scores on a wild pitch and Josh Reddick homers, but the Tigers tie the game in the eighth and win it on a Don Kelly sacrifice fly off Grant Balfour in the ninth. The series moves to Oakland for Game 3 where Brett Anderson combines with three A's relievers on a four-hit, 2-0 shutout. Céspedes has a RBI single in the first and Seth Smith homers in the fifth. In Game 4, the A's trail 3-1 entering the bottom of the ninth before scoring three times to send the series to a fifth game. Smith ties the game with a two-run double and scores two outs later on a Crisp RBI single. The A's then lose Game 5 in Oakland 6-0 as Verlander tosses a four-hit shutout. Parker makes his second start of the series and loses for the second time, allowing four runs on seven hits in 6.1 innings.

Oakland won two of the first three games but then lost two straight to fall to 1-12 in potential clinch games since 2000, including 0-6 in Game 5's. The A's pitching staff compiled a 3.48 ERA and held the Tigers to a .235 batting average, but the offense hit just .217 and struck out 57 times in the five games. 2020 AMERICAN LEAGUE WILD CARD SERIES

The A's returned to the postseason for the third consecutive year and defeated the Chicago White Sox two games to one in the best-of-three American League Wild Card series. The series win was the A's first in the postseason since sweeping Minnesota in the 2006 ALDS. Oakland hit just .194 in the series but out-scored the White Sox 12-11 while compiling a 3.67 ERA. Rookie catcher Sean Murphy went 3-for-8 with a home run and two RBI and Jake Diekman pitched in all three games without allowing a run.

Chicago starter Lucas Giolito retired each of the first 18 Oakland batters in Game 1 en route to a 4-1 win, which extended the A's postseason losing streak to an Athletics record-tying six games. Jesús Luzardo started for Oakland and took the loss, allowing three runs on six hits in 3.1 innings. The A's evened the series with a 5-3 victory in Game 2 after Chris Bassitt allowed just one run in seven innings of work for the win. Oakland scored two unearned runs in the first inning and increased their lead to 4-0 when Marcus Semien hit a two-run home run in the second. Closer Liam Hendriks came in with no outs in the eighth and allowed two runs in 1.2 innings before Diekman recorded the final out with the bases loaded in the ninth. The A's then snapped their Major League record nine-game losing streak in winner-take-all postseason games with a 6-4 victory in Game 3. Oakland trailed 3-0 after three innings but then scored four times in the fourth on a two-run home run by Murphy and back-to-back bases loaded walks by Mark Canha and Matt Olson. Chad Pinder added a two-run single in the fifth, Frankie Montas allowed a run in 2.0 innings of relief for the win, and Hendriks struck out the final three batters for the save.

2020 AMERICAN LEAGUE DIVISION SERIES

The A's faced division rival Houston in their first neutral-site postseason series at Dodger Stadium, but lost the American League Division Series three games to one. Each team hit 12 home runs in the four-game series as the A's set franchise record for home runs hit and home runs allowed in a postseason series. The pitching staff compiled a 7.46 ERA, which was the A's highest in a postseason series of more than one game. Marcus Semien hit .533 and had a .611 on-base percentage, which set an Athletics record for highest on-base percentage in a single postseason series.

The A's took a 3-0 lead in Game 1 on a two-run home run by Khris Davis in the second inning and a solo home run by Sean Murphy in the third but would go on to lose 10-5. Oakland starter Chris Bassitt allowed three runs in the fourth and J.B. Wendelken was charged with the blown save and loss when he surrendered four unearned runs in the fifth. The A's again scored first in Game 2 on a solo home run by Davis but Sean Manaea allowed four runs in 4.1 innings in the A's 5-2 loss. Oakland's lone win came in Game 3 when they tied an Athletics postseason record with five home runs en route to a 9-7 win. The A's took a 4-2 lead into the bottom of the fifth but the Astros scored five times, including twice off Oakland starter Jesús Luzardo. Chad Pinder then hit a three-run home run in the seventh inning and added a sacrifice fly in the eighth, and Liam Hendriks closed out the game with three scoreless innings of relief for the win. For the fourth time in the series, the A's scored first in Game 4 but would go on to lose, 11-6. Ramón Laureano hit a three-run home run in the second and added a solo shot in the fifth, but Houston scored five times in the fourth off Oakland starter Frankie Montas, and twice each in the fifth, sixth and seventh innings.

DURING THE SPRING

The A's and Giants began playing Spring Training games in the Bay Area in 1983 and have played at least one game in Oakland or San Francisco every year except for 2000 and 2021. Oakland is 49-43-2 (.532) in those games, which includes 21-16 (.568) in the Coliseum, 16-20-2 (.447) at Oracle Park and 12-7 (.632) at Candlestick Park. The A's have won 17 series, lost 14 and split six. For the last 17 years, the two clubs have played once in Oakland and twice in San Francisco, with the exception of 2014 when the game in Oakland was rained out, 2020 when there was just one game in each city due to Covid-19, and 2021 when the two clubs did not play in the Bay Area due to Covid-19. There have been four three-game sweeps, with the A's winning all three meetings in 1989 and 2019 and the Giants taking all three in 2011 and 2017.

Minor League Hitting Coordinator



Originally drafted by the A's in the 13th round of the 1982 draft out of Cal, Jim Eppard rejoined the A's in 2016 as the organization's minor league hitting coordinator. Prior to that, he spent two seasons as assistant hitting coordinator for Los Angeles (AL) after serving as the club's hitting coach from May 15, 2012 through the end of the 2013 season. Before coaching the big league squad, he served as hitting coach at Triple-A Salt Lake for nine-plus seasons from 2003-12. Prior to joining the Angels organization, he spent eight seasons in the Rockies minor league system as hitting coach for Triple-A Colorado Springs (2000-02) and as manager at three different Rockies affiliates from 1995-99.

As a player, he spent 12 years in pro baseball, including four as a Major Leaguer with the Angels and Blue Jays. He hit .281 in 82 career Major League games and is a lifetime .310 hitter in 1,199 minor league games, winning four minor league batting titles in four different leagues.

Jim lives in Rapid City, S.D., with his wife, Lou Ann. They have a daughter, Hannah.

GIL PATTERSON

Minor League Pitching Coordinator

Gil Patterson returns for his seventh season of his third stint as the A's minor league pitching coordinator after spending the previous three seasons in similar roles with the New York Yankees (2013-15). He previously held this position with the A's in 1996 and from 2008-12. Prior to his second stint with the A's, he spent three years coaching in the Yankees minor league system with the GCL Yankees (2006-07) and Triple-A Columbus (2005).

He has also served as Toronto's bullpen coach in 2001 and its pitching coach from 2002-04, after serving as the Arizona minor league pitching coordinator from 1997-2000. Patterson originally joined the Oakland organization in 1991, coaching in the Arizona Rookie League in Scottsdale. He began his coaching career at Triple-A Columbus and Single-A Oneonta with the New York Yankees organization in 1984. Patterson was the Yankees first selection of the secondary phase of the 1975 June draft. He made his professional debut that year with Single-A Oneonta, leading the New York-Penn League in strikeouts (97). Patterson tossed a no-hitter on June 28, 1976 with Double-A West Haven before being promoted to Triple-A Syracuse. He was 9-2 with West Haven and 9-2 with Syracuse, including two postseason wins, before going 5-3 in winter ball. Patterson opened the 1977 season in Syracuse before making his Major League debut with the Yankees at age 21. He appeared in 10 games (six starts) with the eventual World Series champions in 1977 while posting a 1-2 record and 5.45 ERA.

Patterson suffered a torn rotator cuff and spent considerable time on the disabled list in 1978 and 1979. He pitched in the Yankees minor league system in 1980-81 and the San Francisco Giants organization in 1982 before having career-ending Tommy John surgery following Spring Training in 1983. In total, Patterson underwent eight operations during his career.

Patterson makes his offseason home in Odessa, Fla., with his wife, Jan. The couple has four children — Brandy, Raquel, Kyle and G.T.



JUAN NAVARRETE

Minor League Infield Coordinator

Juan Navarrete is in his third season as the A's minor league infield coordinator after spending three seasons as the minor league defensive coordinator, two seasons as the minor league defensive, baserunning and bunting coordinator, 12 seasons as minor league roving infield instructor, and two years as minor league roving hitting instructor. After recording 23 saves in 1991, he was converted to a starter in 1992 and finished 13-9 with a 3.69 ERA in 27 starts for the Padres. Lefferts retired after making 30 appearances for the California Angels during the 1994 season.

RICK RODRIGUEZ





MISCELLANEOUS

OAKLAND COLISEUM



The Oakland Coliseum has served as the home for the A's since the franchise moved to Oakland in 1968.

The A's have used the facility to their advantage over the years, posting a 1053-761 (.580) home record over the last 23 seasons, which is fourth best in the majors. In 2003, the A's set an Oakland record for home wins as they finished with a 57-24 (.704) record in the Coliseum, marking the most home wins in franchise history since 1931 when the Philadelphia Athletics went 60-15 at home. In addition, two of the A's World Championships have been clinched on the Coliseum's turf.

The facility is conveniently located adjacent to I-880 with two exits (Hegenberger Road/66th Avenue) leading directly to the complex. Along with the Oakland Arena, which is located adjacent to the stadium, it is the only major entertainment facility with a dedicated stop on the Bay Area Rapid Transit (BART) system. The Oakland International Airport is less than a two-mile drive from the Coliseum with shuttle service to several local hotels and restaurants.

In October of 1995, the Coliseum began a one-year, \$120 million renovation project that added 22,000 new seats, 90 luxury suites, two private clubs and two state-of-the-art scoreboards.

As part of the team's new 10-year lease arrangement prior to the 2015 season, an additional \$10 million in improvements was added, including the installation of new High Definition Video boards and the addition of the Treehouse and the A's Stomping Ground.

The first crowd filled the Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum on Sept. 8, 1966, when the AFL's Oakland Raiders played the Kansas City Chiefs. The adjacent arena celebrated its grand opening on Nov. 9, 1966, when the Oakland Seals met the San Diego Gulls in hockey. The first A's game came on April 17, 1968 against the Baltimore Orioles.

In the ensuing 54 years, the facility has hosted every conceivable event in the entertainment industry, including concerts, conventions and other large gatherings. Audiences numbering over 100 million have made the Coliseum and Arena the premier entertainment facilities in Northern California.

KEN KORACH

Radio Play-by-Play

The 2022 season marks Ken Korach's 31st year in the American League, his 27th with the A's and his 17th as the team's lead radio announcer. In the long history of the A's in Oakland, he has spent the most time doing play-by-play on radio for the A's.

Korach's first MLB job was in Chicago, where he spent four years broadcasting mostly weekend games for the White Sox. He also spent six full seasons in the minor leagues, beginning in 1984 with the Redwood Pioneers of the California League. He also worked in the Pacific Coast League in Phoenix (1986-87) and Las Vegas (1989-91).


Korach was hired in 1985 to broadcast San Jose State football on KCBS Radio and he spent 22 years doing football and basketball on radio and television for Sonoma State, San Jose State and UNLV.

He is the author of *Holy Toledo, Lessons from Bill King, Renaissance Man of the Mic*, which was published by Wellstone Books in 2013, spent over a month as the number one best-selling baseball book on Amazon.com, and is Ken's homage to the 2017 Ford C. Frick Award recipient. Ken's second book, *If These Walls Could Talk: Oakland A's*, cowritten by then-San Francisco Chronicle A's beat writer Susan Slusser, was released in the spring of 2019 by Triumph Books.

Korach was inducted into the Bay Area Radio Hall of Fame in September of 2019 and honored as the 2013 California Sportscaster of the Year and the 2001 Nevada Sportscaster of the Year by the National Sports Media Association. He was inducted in 2017 into the Jewish Sports Hall of Fame of Northern California and in 2003 into the Nevada Broadcasters Hall of Fame.

His charitable work includes the establishment of Ken Korach's A's Winning for the Community, which raised \$50,000 for the high school baseball programs in Oakland, including Ken's personal contribution of \$15,000.

Korach is a graduate of UC Santa Barbara and he and his wife Denise are parents of their daughter, Emilee. They make their home in Henderson, Nev. and Pleasanton, Calif.



VINCE COTRONEO

Radio Play-by-Play

Vince Cotroneo begins his 17th season in the A's radio booth, where he again will work with broadcast partner Ken Korach in continuing the team's tradition of broadcasting excellence.

Prior to joining the A's, Cotroneo spent six seasons (1998-2003) as an announcer on the Texas Rangers broadcasts, where he partnered with Eric Nadel on the Rangers Radio Network. He also worked over 20 games on the television side during the 2002 season. Cotroneo joined the Rangers broadcast team in 1998 after spending seven seasons (1991-97) with the Houston Astros.

A 33-year broadcasting veteran, Cotroneo began his career with the Single-A Lynchburg Mets in 1984. He spent the next three seasons with the Double-A El Paso Diablos in the Milwaukee system before moving on to the Triple-A Iowa Cubs for the 1988 season. In his only season with Iowa, he was selected as the National Association's Minor League Announcer of the Year. Cotroneo joined the Astros organization the following season and was the radio voice of the Tucson Toros for two seasons (1989-90) before landing his first Major League job with the Astros in 1991.

A 1983 graduate of the University of Central Florida, Cotroneo and his wife, Veronica, have three children, Dominic, Olivia and Sophia.



GLEN KUIPER

Television Play-by-Play

Glen Kuiper begins his 19th season in the A's television booth as the club's lead play-by-play voice.

Kuiper has covered the Bay Area baseball scene for NBC Sports California since 1992, serving as pre-game host and fill-in play-by-play announcer for both A's and Giants telecasts. He has also worked on Comcast SportsNet's Golden State Warriors and San Jose Sharks telecasts, along with numerous collegiate assignments and sideline reporting duties for select National Football League games on Fox. Kuiper has won 13 Northern California Emmy Awards for his coverage of Bay Area sports teams.

Glen is the youngest brother in a talented broadcasting family. His oldest brother, Duane, is a longtime member of the San Francisco Giants announcing team while older brother, Jeff, produces the Giants NBC Sports Bay Area telecasts.

Kuiper graduated from San Francisco State University with a bachelor's degree in broadcasting. He also attended the University of New Orleans and spent three years in the minor leagues. A native of Racine, Wis., Kuiper resides in Danville, Calif., with his wife, Amanda and two children, Jack and Annette.



DALLAS BRADEN

Television Analyst

Dallas Braden enters his fifth season as an A's television color commentator after spending 2017 as a pre- and postgame host for NBC Sports California.

Braden was Oakland's 24th round pick in 2004 and made his Major League debut with the A's in 2007. In his five-year playing career—all with Oakland—he compiled a 26-36 record to go along with a 4.16 career ERA. The highlight of Braden's playing career came on May 9, 2010, when he threw the 19th perfect game in MLB history against the Tampa Bay Rays on Mother's Day.

After retiring in 2014, Braden joined ESPN as a studio and color analyst. He left ESPN in 2017 to join NBC Sports California.

A native of Stockton, Calif., Braden resides in Simi Valley, Calif., with his wife, Meg, their daughters Kinslee and Marlee, and his grandmother Peggy.



CHRIS TOWNSEND

Host and Senior Broadcast Producer

Chris Townsend enters his fourth season as Host and Senior Broadcast Producer for A's Cast. In this role, he is responsible for creating and delivering multimedia A's content across multiple platforms.

Townsend also hosts A's Cast Live, the A's pre- and postgame shows and is an in-studio host during the broadcasts. Fans will continue to be able to engage with him during the games on his social media channels.

Townsend has worked in numerous capacities covering the A's, from prior roles in both TV and radio. He joins the A's after working for a number of local sports companies, including Oakland Raiders, 95.7 The Game, KNBR 680 and CSN Sports Bay Area. Chris has lived in the Bay Area for more than 25 years after attending San Jose State and playing baseball for the Spartans.

His grandfather Bob Elliott was the first third baseman in baseball history to win the MVP in 1947. Elliott was a seven-time All-Star during his 15 year career. He also was the manager of the Kansas City Athletics in 1960.



AMAURY PI-GONZÁLEZ

Radio Play-by-Play (Spanish)

Amaury Pi-González, a pioneer in establishing Spanish baseball radio play-by-play in the Bay Area, serves as the “Voice of the A’s” for Spanish broadcasts. This will be his 29th season doing A’s broadcasts, having filled that role from 1978-93, 2009-10 and again the past 10 seasons.

Well-known and respected in both English and Spanish media circles, Pi-González enters his 45th season in Major League Baseball in 2022. He began his career in 1977 with the Athletics and has also broadcast for the San Francisco Giants, Seattle Mariners, and Los Angeles Angels. He was the Spanish play-by-play on Television for the Los Angeles Angels on Fox Deportes LA from 2010-17. Amaury also produces and hosts “Béisbol en la Bahía” for KIQI 1010 AM.

During his tenure, Pi-González has called the 1986 World Series for CBS Hispanic Network, the 1988, 1989 and 1990 Series for the A’s, and the 2002 Series for the Giants. The Fremont, Calif., resident previously served five years as sports anchor for Telemundo TV48 in San Jose and was the Spanish voice for the NBA’s Golden State Warriors (1992-98) and Los Angeles Clippers. In addition, he was the English voice for the Caribbean World Series for Fox Sports International in 2001 and 2002. Most recently, he called the A’s playoff runs from the 2018-20 seasons for A’s radio and provided color commentary for a San Jose Sharks game via their Spanish Radio/TV SAP audio formats for the past three years (2018-20). He is a regular contributor to SportsRadioService.com, including a weekly podcast.

Born in Cuba, Amaury was inducted into the Cuban Sports Hall of Fame in 2004 and into the Hispanic Heritage Baseball Museum in 2004. He was inducted into the Bay Area Radio Hall of Fame in 2009 and is a cofounder and vice president of the Hispanic Heritage Baseball Museum and Hall of Fame, a Bay Area based non-profit. He was named to the New York City Advisory Board of the American Sportscasters Association in 2016 and remains on the board today. Pi-Gonzalez also called the victory parades for the Giants in 2010, 2012 and 2014, for the Warriors in 2015, and Sharks games in the Stanley Cup Finals in 2016 for Telemundo.



MANOLO HERNÁNDEZ-DOUEN

Radio Analyst and Play-by-Play (Spanish)

Manolo Hernández-Douen is in his 14th season as the Athletics analyst and play-by-play announcer for Spanish broadcasts. He has over 50 years of experience in journalism and has covered a variety of sports during that span.

A graduate of Universidad Católica Andrés Bello in his native Caracas, Hernández-Douen has covered the Olympic and Pan American Games, world championship boxing matches and winter league baseball, including the Caribbean Series. He was Venezuela’s Sportswriter of the Year in 1979 and for five seasons was the basketball radio analyst for the Caracas Liga Especial de Baloncesto team.

Since moving to California in 1982, he has covered the NBA and Major League Baseball for several of the highest circulation Spanish newspapers in the United States including La Opinión in Los Angeles.

A proud father of two, Franklin and Cristina, and Kayla's, Khloe's and Liliana's grandfather, Manolo resides in San Leandro.


JOSE LUIS ORELLANA

Ray Fosse *April 4, 1947-October 13, 2021*

Ray Fosse was born on April 4, 1947, in the small town of Marion, Ill. Exactly 23 years later, and three years after making his Major League debut, Ray married his wife, Carol. During their 51 years of marriage, Ray and Carol welcomed two daughters and four grandchildren.

With the support of Carol and the girls, Ray dedicated his life to the game of baseball. The 12-year Major League veteran made two All-Star teams, earned two Gold Glove Awards, and won two World Series titles, both with the Oakland A's in 1973 & 1974. For as skilled as he was on the field, Ray was equally gifted in the booth. His illustrious playing career was followed by an Emmy Award-winning career on the air, consisting of 36 unforgettable seasons broadcasting A's games on both TV and radio.

Few people have as much love for the game of baseball as Ray did. You'd expect as much from someone who spent more than 50 years at the ballpark, but for Ray, baseball was more than a game. If Ray wasn't calling an A's game, he was watching other teams play. If he was on the team plane, he was watching "Trouble with the Curve." If there were no games on and another person was around, he'd talk to them about the intricacies of the sport he loved. For some people, baseball is a passion. For Ray, it was a way of life.

Despite all his personal and professional success, Ray will be remembered by those who were lucky enough to know him by the way he made you feel. The first time you meet Ray Fosse, his enormous hand envelops yours in the type of handshake you'd expect from a former big league catcher. The next time you see him, he calls you by name and stops to ask how your family is doing. He never fails to give you a pat on the back, both literal and figurative. His presence in your life is irreplaceable.

It's never easy to lose a franchise icon. It's even harder to lose a friend.
