MANAGER

Mark Steven Kotsay

Named A's manager, December 21, 2021

Birthdate: December 2, 1975

Birthplace/Resides: Whittier, California / Rancho Sante Fe, California

Contract Status: Signed through 2024 with a club option for 2025

Mark Kotsay begins his second season as manager of the Oakland A's in 2023 after signing a three-year contract through the 2024 season with a club option for 2025 on Dec. 21, 2021. He becomes just the sixth person to manager the A's over the last 36 years, joining Tony La Russa (1986-95), Art Howe (1996-2002), Ken Macha (2003-06), Bob Geren (2007-11) and Bob Melvin (2011-21). Kotsay is the 19th manager in Oakland history and the 31st in Athletics history.

Kotsay's first season at the helm saw the A's use a franchise-record 64 players, more than half of which (34) were rookies. More than one-third of the players (22) made their Major League debuts in 2022, and Oakland finished with a 60-102 record.

Prior to being named Manager, Kotsay spent six seasons on the A's coaching staff. He joined the club as bench coach in 2016 and filled that role until taking a leave of absence June 19, 2017. Kotsay served as the A's quality control coach from 2018-20 and moved into the third base coaching box for the 2021 season. He made his professional coaching debut as the San Diego Padres hitting coach in 2015. Kotsay joins Jeff Newman, who was interim manager in 1986 between Jackie Moore and Tony La Russa, as the only managers in Oakland history with no previous managerial experience.

Kotsay played 17 seasons in the Major Leagues from 1997-2013, including a four-year stint with Oakland from 2004-07. He was acquired from San Diego following the 2003 season for Ramon Hernandez and Terrence Long and went on to hit .282 in 472 games with the A's. Kotsay batted a career-high .313 in 2004 and tallied a career-high 82 RBI in 2005 while belting 15 home runs in each season. He was a member of the A's American League West champions in 2006 and sparked Oakland to its first ALCS appearance in 14 years with an inside-the-park home run in Game 2 of the ALDS at Minnesota. Kotsay joins La Russa and Newman as the only people to both play for and manage the Oakland A's.

A former outfielder, Kotsay batted .276 with 127 home runs and 720 RBI in 1,914 games during his career, which also included stops in Florida (1997-2000), San Diego (2001-03, 12-13), Atlanta (2008), Boston (2008-09), Chicago-AL (2009-10) and Milwaukee (2011). He made his ML debut with Florida in his second professional season in 1997 and appeared in a career-high 154 games in his rookie season of 1998. After batting .298 in 2000, he was traded to San Diego five days prior to Opening Day in 2001. He hit .292 with a career-high 17 home runs in 2002. Following his stay with Oakland, Kotsay returned to the LCS in 2008 with Boston and 2011 with Milwaukee. He concluded his playing career with San Diego in 2012 and 2013.

Kotsay retired following the 2013 season and spent 2014 in the Padres front office as a special assistant to the general manager and baseball operations. In that role, he was involved in all aspects of the club's baseball operations.

A graduate of Sante Fe (Calif.) High School, Kotsay attended Cal State Fullerton, where he led the Titans to the College World Series Championship in 1995. He was the winner of the Golden Spikes Award, was named Collegiate Player of the Year that year and hit .404 in his collegiate career. Kotsay was the Marlins first-round pick and the ninth selection overall in the 1996 draft and also played for the United States in the 1996 Olympics.

Kotsay is married, Jamie, and has three children, Grace, Sienna and Trey. He resides in Rancho Santa Fe, Calif., during the offseason.


FIRST BASE COACH

Michael Peter Aldrete

Named bench coach, October 27, 2014; named first base coach, November 12, 2015; named assistant hitting coach, December 4, 2017; named first base coach, October 31, 2019; named quality control coach, January 14, 2022; named first base coach, November 28, 2022

Birthdate: January 29, 1961

Birthplace/Resides: Carmel, California / Salinas, California



Mike Aldrete returns for his ninth season on the A's coaching staff, his fifth as first base coach. He originally joined the A's as bench coach in 2015, spent two seasons as the A's first base and outfield coach from 2016-17, was assistant hitting coach in 2018-19, first base coach from 2020-21 and quality control coach in 2022. The 2023 season will mark his 19th on a Major League coaching staff.

He began his coaching career in 2001 as hitting coach for Short Season Yakima in the Diamondbacks minor league system. He was promoted to manager of Yakima the following

season and then managed Arizona's High Single-A club in Lancaster in 2003. His first coaching opportunity in the majors came in 2004 when he was named first base coach on Bob Melvin's staff in Seattle. He moved to Arizona the following year when Melvin was named manager of the Diamondbacks, serving as hitting coach there for two seasons.

Tony La Russa, whom Aldrete had played for in Oakland, hired him as assistant hitting coach with St. Louis in 2008. After four seasons in that position, including with the 2011 Cardinals team that was crowned World Series champions, he was promoted to bench coach in 2012, when Mike Matheny replaced the retiring La Russa as manager. During his three-year stint as bench coach, the Cardinals advanced to the World Series in 2013 and to the National League Championship Series in both 2012 and 2014.

Born in Carmel, Calif., and a graduate of Monterey High School and Stanford University, the former first baseman/outfielder played for seven different teams during his 10-year Major League career, including both the San Francisco Giants (1986-88) and the Oakland A's (1993-95). A .263 lifetime hitter in 930 games, Aldrete also played for Montreal (1989-90), San Diego (1991), Cleveland (1991), the California Angels (1995-96) and the New York Yankees (1996).

Aldrete's finest season as a player was with the Giants in 1987, when he batted a career-high .325 on a team that lost to St. Louis in the National League Championship Series. He split his final season between California and New York in 1996, ending his career as a member of the World Series Champion Yankees.

A third-team All-American his senior season at Stanford, Aldrete was chosen by San Francisco in the seventh round of the June Draft in 1983. He enjoyed a pair of trips to the College World Series with the Cardinal and was a member of the U.S. Collegiate All-Star team that toured Japan in 1982. Aldrete graduated from Monterey (Calif.) High School, lettering in baseball, basketball and football.

Aldrete makes his offseason home in Salinas, Calif., with his wife, Gina, and their three children; Michael, Blake and Nicolette. Michael (RHP) was selected by the Cardinals in the 2012 First Year Player Draft out of San Jose State (39th round).

Named bullpen coach, October 26, 2012; named hitting coach, October 30, 2014; named third base/run prevention coach, January 14, 2022; named bench coach, November 28, 2022

Birthdate: January 18, 1974

Birthplace/Resides: Columbus, Ohio / Englewood, Florida



Darren Bush begins his 19th season in the A's organization in 2023, which includes two seasons as a minor league hitting coach, six seasons as a minor league manager and 11 seasons on the Major League coaching staff.

Bush joined Oakland as bullpen coach in 2013 and spent two seasons in that role before serving seven seasons as hitting coach from 2015-21. In 2019, the A's set franchise records for home runs (257) and extra base hits (572). Bush was third base/run prevention coach in 2022 and moves to the dugout as bench coach for Mark Kotsay in 2023.

Bush compiled a 462-386 (.545) record in six seasons as a manager with Single-A Stockton (2007-08), Double-A Midland (2009-10) and Triple-A Sacramento (2011-12). He guided the River Cats to back-to-back division titles with a mark of 88-56 in 2011 and 86-58 in 2012. Bush also led the RockHounds to playoff appearances in 2009 and 2010, including a Texas League Championship in 2009. He skipped Single-A Stockton to the California League Championship in his second year as a manager in 2008. Bush joined the Athletics in 2005 as hitting coach at Stockton and spent two seasons in that capacity before taking over as manager for the Ports in 2007.

Prior to joining the A's organization, Bush coached in independent leagues. He was the hitting coach and Director of Player Personnel with Yuba-Sutter of the Western League in 2002 and then spent two seasons as a manager in the Northeast League with Berkshire (41-51 in 2003) and Quebec (58-34 in 2004).

A former outfielder, Bush began his playing career with three seasons in the independent Frontier League. He played for Zanesville in 1996 and Springfield in 1997-98, hitting .302 with 26 home runs and 133 RBI in 224 games. Bush signed with the San Diego Padres organization Dec. 24, 1998, and hit .259 with 16 home runs and 114 RBI in 231 games in two seasons at Single-A Rancho Cucamonga (1999-2000) and one year at Single-A Clearwater (2001) in the Phillies farm system. He also played one game for Triple-A Las Vegas in 2000 and went 2-for-4. He concluded his playing career by hitting .417 in seven games for Yuba-Sutter of the Western League in 2002. Bush had a .284 average in 456 games overall.

Bush attended Dunedin High School and Valdosta State University. He resides in Englewood, Fla., during the offseason. Bush is married, Rebecca, and has two children, Wyatt and Maggie.

CHRIS CRON

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ASSISTANT HITTING COACH

Christopher John Cron

Named assistant hitting coach, January 14, 2022

Birthdate: March 31, 1964

Birthplace/Resides: Albuquerque, New Mexico / Ahwatukee, Arizona

Chris Cron returns for his second season as the A's assistant hitting coach, his first Major League coaching assignment after 27 seasons in the minors as a manager, hitting coordinator and field coordinator in the Chicago White Sox, Colorado Rockies, Detroit Tigers and Arizona Diamondbacks organizations.

Cron comes to the A's from Arizona where he served as minor league field coordinator in 2021. He joined the Diamondbacks in 2014 as minor league hitting coordinator and spent five seasons in that role before being named manager of Triple-A Reno in 2019. He guided the Aces to a 66-74 record that year and was slated to return as manager in 2020 before the minor league season was canceled due to the pandemic.

Cron is a two-time Manager of the Year, earning the honors with Single-A Winston-Salem in the Carolina League in 1998 and Rookie Great Falls in the Pioneer League in 2010. He guided his clubs to eight playoff appearances (1997-98, 2005, 07-10, 13), including a Pioneer League Championship in 2007.

Cron began his minor league managerial career in 1995 at Rookie Bristol in the Chicago White Sox organization and also had stops at Single-A Hickory (1996-97) and Winston-Salem (1998) and Double-A Birmingham (1999). He spent the three seasons as manager at Triple-A Colorado Springs from 2000-02 in the Rockies organization before returning to the White Sox in 2003. Cron spent one year each at Rookie Great Falls (2004), Single-A Kannapolis (2005),

Winston-Salem (2006) and Birmingham before concluding his White Sox career with four years at Great Falls from 2007-10. He then managed for three seasons at Double-A Erie in the Detroit system from 2011-13 before moving on to the Diamondbacks.

Cron played professionally for 12 seasons, including 12 games in the majors with California (1991) and Chicago-AL (1992). He went 2-for-15 (.133) in six games with the Angels in his debut and was 0-for-10 in six games with the White Sox in 1992. Cron was a .268 hitter with 172 home runs and 785 RBI in 1,250 games as a minor leaguer in the Atlanta, California, Chicago (AL) and Cleveland organizations. He was originally selected by the Braves in the second round of the 1984 draft out of Santa Ana (Calif.) College and is a graduate of El Dorado (Calif.) High School.


Cron resides in Phoenix, Ariz., and has three children: C.J., Kevin and Carly. C.J. was the Angels first round pick in 2011 and made his Major League debut in 2014. Kevin was the Diamondbacks 14th round selection in 2014 and made his ML debut in 2019. Carly graduated from Northern Arizona University in 2020 and completed her Masters degree from Arizona State in 2021.

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PITCHING COACH

Scott Matthew Emerson

Named bullpen coach, October 30, 2014; named pitching coach, June 15, 2017

Birthdate: December 22, 1971

Birthplace/Resides: Baltimore, Maryland / Rockingham, North Carolina

Scott Emerson returns for his ninth season on the A's Major League coaching staff and his 20th in the A's organization. He joined the coaching staff in Oakland for the 2015 season as bullpen coach and took over the reins as pitching coach on June 15, 2017.

Emerson spent two seasons as minor league roving pitching instructor from 2013-14 after 10 years as a pitching coach at various levels. He joined the A's organization in 2003 as pitching coach at Single-A Modesto and served two seasons there before the A's moved their affiliate to Stockton. After two seasons with the Ports, Emerson had a four-year stint at Double-A Midland from 2007-10. He was promoted to Triple-A Sacramento in 2011 and spent two seasons with the River Cats.

Emerson's coaching career began in the Pittsburgh Pirates organization in 2000 when he was named the pitching coach for the Pirates Gulf Coast Rookie League club at Bradenton. He spent two years in the GCL and one at Single-A Williamsport in 2002 before joining the A's organization.

Emerson pitched professionally for six seasons in the Baltimore (1992-95), Boston (1995-96) and Arizona (1997) organizations. He was a 10-game winner at Single-A Albany in 1993 and was traded to the Red Sox organization early during the 1995 season. The left-hander signed with Arizona after being released by Boston in the spring of 1997. He pitched in three games for Single-A High Desert before concluding his professional career with Rio Grande Valley of the independent Texas-Louisiana League in 1997. Emerson was 27-29 with a 4.16 ERA in 135 games, 79 starts in his career.

Emerson was drafted by San Diego in the 21st round of the 1990 June draft out of Shadow Mountain (Phoenix, Ariz.) HS but did not sign. He attended Scottsdale Community College and signed with the Baltimore organization after the Orioles selected him in the 40th round of the 1991 June draft.

Emerson and his wife, Jill, make their offseason home in Rockingham, N.C.

TOMMY EVERIDGE

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HITTING COACH

Thomas James Everidge

Named hitting coach, January 14, 2022

Birthdate: April 20, 1983

Birthplace/Resides: Santa Rosa, California / Mesa, Arizona

Bay Area native Tommy Everidge returns for his second consecutive season as the A's hitting coach after spending eight seasons in that role in the A's farm system. This will be his 17th season in the Oakland organization, as he also had seven years as a player.

Everidge began his coaching career in 2014 when he was named hitting coach at Short-Season Vermont. He spent two seasons with the Lake Monsters and two more at Single-A Stockton from 2016-17 before being moved up to Double-A Midland. Everidge had three seasons with the RockHounds before coaching at Triple-A Las Vegas in 2021.

Everidge had a nine-year playing career, including seven years in the A's system. He made his Major League debut in 2009 and hit .224 with two home runs and seven RBI in 24 games with Oakland in his only big league experience. Everidge was selected by the A's in the 10th round of the 2004 draft and spent seven seasons in the minor leagues with Oakland (2004-10), Seattle (2010) and Houston (2010). He hit 20 home runs in four consecutive seasons from 2006-09 and led the California League with 26 home runs at Stockton in 2007. In 2008, he led the Texas League and ranked third in all of the minors league with 115 RBI at Midland. Everidge concluded his playing career with two seasons at Lancaster in the independent Atlantic League from 2011-12, earning AL Player of the Year honors in 2011 after setting a league record with 69 extra-base hits.

A graduate of Sonoma Valley High School in 2001, Everidge played collegiately at Sonoma State University.

Everidge resides in Mesa, Ariz., with his wife Kellie; three children, Allison, Camden and Jackson; and dog, Rylie.

Oakland native Marcus Jensen returns for his ninth season on the A's Major League coaching staff and his 17th in the A's organization. The 2023 season marks his first as quality control coach after spending the previous five years as bullpen coach. Jensen served as as the A's assistant hitting/catching coach from 2015-17.

Jensen joined the A's organization in 2007 as hitting coach for the A's affiliate in the Arizona Rookie League and served two years in that capacity. He took over the managerial duties for that club in 2009 and guided the A's to a 141-136 (.509) record and one playoff appearance in five seasons. In 2013, he also served as the A's minor league roving catching instructor and then spent the 2014 season as the A's minor league roving hitting instructor.

A former catcher, Jensen was drafted by San Francisco out of Skyline HS in Oakland following the first round of the 1990 June draft as a compensation pick for the loss of free agent

Craig Lefferts. He batted .184 with six home runs and 29 RBI in 145 games in seven seasons with seven different teams.

Jensen made his Major League debut with San Francisco in 1996 and appeared in 39 games over two seasons with the Giants before he was dealt to Detroit in July 1997. After spending parts of the 1998 and 1999 seasons with Milwaukee and St. Louis, respectively, Jensen saw his most big league action with Minnesota in 2000 when he batted .209 with three home runs and 14 RBI in 52 games. He split the 2001 season between Boston and Texas and returned to Milwaukee in 2002, appearing in 40 games in his final big league campaign. Jensen spent the 2003 season at Triple-A Columbus in the New York (AL) farm system and played for Cancún in the Mexican League in 2004. He spent his final two seasons as a professional with Mesa (2005) and Reno (2006) of the independent Golden Baseball League. Jensen was also a member of the 2000 U.S. Olympic team that defeated Cuba for the gold medal.

Jensen makes his offseason home in Scottsdale, Ariz., with his wife, Lila, and three children, Mariah, Jahir and Jirah.

Eric Martins is in his fourth season on the A's coaching staff, his first as third base coach. He made his debut on a Major League coaching staff in 2020 as the A's assistant hitting coach and spent two seasons in that capacity before serving as first base/infield coach in 2022. This is Martins' 23rd season in the A's organization, which includes seven years as a minor league player, seven years as an area scout and five years as a minor league hitting coach.

Martins' coaching career began in 2015 when he was named hitting coach for Double-A Midland. He was promoted to Triple-A Nashville in 2016 and spent three seasons with the Sounds before moving west to Las Vegas in 2019 when the A's switched Triple-A affiliates.

Prior to coaching, Martins spent seven seasons as an A's area scout for Southern California from 2008-14. During that time, he was responsible for signing A.J. Griffin, Daniel Robertson, and 2014 first-round selection Matt Chapman, among others.

Originally a 17th-round selection by Oakland in the 1994 draft, Martins hit .276 with 21 home runs and 262 RBI in 661 games over seven seasons in the A's farm system from 1994-2000. He was named to the Northwest League All-Star team in 1994 after hitting .324 in his professional debut. The former infielder was part of the 1997 Edmonton team that captured the Pacific Coast League Championship and the 1999 Vancouver club that won the Triple-A World Series. Martins also played for Long Beach of the independent Western League (2001-02), Somerset of the independent Atlantic League (2003) and Nettuno in Italy (2004).

A graduate of La Serna High School in 1990, Martins attended Long Beach State. He was signed by Ed Crosby.

Martins lives in Mesa, Ariz., with his wife, Madison.

Mike McCarthy is on his first Major League coaching staff at the age of 35 after being named A's bullpen coach on Nov. 28, 2022.

McCarthy comes to the A's with five years of experience as a minor league coach, most recently as pitching coaching at Triple-A El Paso in the San Diego Padres organization in 2022. He began his coaching career as the bullpen coach at Triple-A Rochester in the Minnesota Twins organization in 2018 and served two seasons in that capacity before being named pitching coach for Rochester prior to the canceled 2020 minor league season. McCarthy remained as pitching coach when the Twins Triple-A affiliate moved to St. Paul in 2021.

Originally selected by Boston in the 14th round of the 2011 draft, McCarthy compiled a 28-27 record, eight saves and a 4.57 ERA in 150 games, including 61 starts, in six professional seasons, all in the Red Sox farm system. He won a career-high 10 games for Double-A Portland in 2014 and reached the Triple-A level in each of his final three seasons, pitching in one game for Pawtucket in 2014, 15 and 16. McCarthy also helped Perth to the Australian Baseball League Championship following the 2014 season.

McCarthy graduated from Liberty HS in Brentwood, Calif., and attended the University of Redlands and Cal State Bakersfield. He was instrumental in building CSUB's baseball team from the ground up and earned College Baseball Insider Honorable Mention All-America accolades in 2011. McCarthy received an Association of Professional Ball Players of America scholarship and earned an MBA with a concentration in Global Management from the University of Phoenix.

McCarthy also served as field coordinator for Baseball Miracles, an international organization that teaches baseball and softball to kids experiencing economic and environmental disadvantages. He has taught baseball in 10 countries on six continents and has traveled to all 50 states.

McCarthy was born in Walnut Creek, grew up in Antioch and Brentwood, and now resides in Reno, Nev., during the offseason.

2019—Spent the entire year at Richmond for the second consecutive season and was 7-8 with a 3.60 ERA in 29 games, including 20 starts...had career highs in wins, starts, innings pitched (110.0) and strikeouts (108)...allowed just six home runs in 110.0 innings, an average of 0.49 per nine innings...tied for seventh in the Giants farm system in strikeouts and tied for eighth in wins...led the Eastern League in hit batters (15) and issued the fifth most walks (61)...had a .219 opponents batting average, which broke down to .210 with a .656 OPS against right-handed hitters and .234 with a .661 OPS against left-handers...held the opposition to a .183 batting average with runners in scoring position...opponents were 0-for-9 with a hit by pitch with the bases loaded...was 5-8 with a 3.72 ERA in his 20 starts, 2-0 with a 2.87 ERA in his nine relief appearances...each of his first 19 appearances were starts but nine of his final 10 outings came in relief...had a five start stretch from June 6 to 29 where he did not allow a run four times and surrendered one hit three times...had a 1.33 ERA and .148 opponents batting average over that stretch but posted a 1-1 record...tossed a season-high 7.0 scoreless innings, struck out a season-high nine and allowed just one hit and two walks in a 4-0 win over Hartford on June 29...was named Eastern League Pitcher of the Week for the week of June 24-30...had a three-game winning streak from June 29 to July 17...made his final start of the season Aug. 3 at Harrisburg, allowing an unearned run on one hit in 6.0 innings...that began a season-ending stretch where he went 3-0 with a 1.86 ERA and .189 opponents batting average over his final nine games.

2018—Spent the entire season with Double-A Richmond...began the season as a starter before transitioning to the bullpen in late June...went 2-7 with a 6.10 ERA in 15 starts and 1-2 with one save and a 5.96 ERA in 18 relief outings...was moved to the bullpen on June 28 after 14 starts...played for Scottsdale in the Arizona Fall League following the season and went 3-0 with a 1.88 ERA in six starts for the Scorpions...struck out 27 batters in 24.0 innings and held opponents to a .184 batting average.

2017—Combined to go 6-5 with a 2.32 ERA in 18 games, 16 starts, between Single-A Augusta and Advanced-A San Jose...opened the year with Augusta in mid-May and went 4-3 with a 2.25 ERA in 12 games, 11 starts...was promoted to San Jose in August and made six appearances, five starts...posted a 2.45 ERA with 38 strikeouts in 33 innings...named the California League Pitcher of the Week for the week of August 7-13...spun 6.0 shutout innings and struck out eight on Aug. 9 at Stockton to earn the honor...was rated as the Giants seventh-best prospect by *Baseball America* following the season and listed as having the “Best Curveball” in the magazine’s “Best Tools” survey.

2016—Made his professional debut with the Giants affiliate in the Arizona Rookie League and Salem-Keizer and was a combined 2-2 with a 5.01 ERA in 10 games, including eight starts...allowed just one home run in 32.1 innings.

SEASON IN REVIEW

SEASON IN REVIEW

2022 RECAP: The A's finished the season with a record of 60-102 (.370), which was the second lowest winning percentage in Oakland history to the 1979 club (54-108, .333)...had the second 100-loss season in Oakland history and the 17th in Athletics history (Philadelphia 11, Kansas City 4)...the 102 losses tied for 11th most in Athletics history...had the second lowest winning percentage in the majors ahead of the Nationals (55-107, .340)...it marked the fourth time in Oakland history the A's finished with the lowest winning percentage in the American League (1993, 1997, 2015)...snapped a streak of four consecutive seasons with a winning record and finished with a losing record for the first time since 2017 (75-87)...finished in last place in the AL West, 46 games behind Houston...those were the most games back by any team in AL West history, surpassing the 2013 Astros, who finished 45 games back of the A's...the last time the A's finished 46 or more games out of first place was in 1961 when the Kansas City A's ended the season 47½ games behind the Yankees in the 10-team American League...were 26 games back of the third Wild Card team (Rays), which were the A's most games out in the Wild Card since 1997 when they finished 31 back...have now finished in either last place (4 times) or made the playoffs (6 times) in 10 of the last 11 seasons...had a total of 149 days in sole possession of last place in the West, which were the third most days alone in last in Oakland history (162 in 2009, 153 in 1997)...also spent one day tied for first, two days in second, six days tied for second, seven days in third, five days tied for third, six days in fourth and three days tied for fourth...lost the first two games of the season at Philadelphia but then won eight of the next 12 games to improve to 8-6...a 2-1 win over Baltimore on April 19 moved the A's into a tie for first place in the West with the Angels...split a two-game series at San Francisco on April 26-27, which gave the A's a 10-9 record...had a day off on April 28, but that would be the A's last day over .500 as they went 13-40 (.245) over the next 53 games from April 29 to June 24...had a nine-game losing streak from April 29 to May 8, which was the first of three losing streaks of nine or more games...it was the third time in Athletics history the A's had three losing streaks of nine or more games (1916, 1937)...went 0-6 on a six-game homestand April 29 to May 4, which was the first winless homestand of six or more games in Oakland history...were in fourth place in the West on May 3 but a 3-0 loss to Tampa Bay the next day dropped the A's into fifth...would spend all but one of the final 152 days of the season with at least a share of last...beginning May 27, spent each of the final 129 days of the season alone in last...had a season-long 10-game losing streak from May 30 to June 10, which tied for the fifth longest losing streak in Oakland history...were 23-49 (.319) through June 24 but then went 18-17 over a 35-game stretch from June 25 to Aug. 4...won two of three from Toronto, July 4-6 for their second home series win of the season (April 18-21 vs. Baltimore)...that snapped a 10-series home losing streak, which was the longest such streak by an A's team since June 20, 1916 to May 8, 1917, when they lost 17 straight home series (final 14 of 1916, first three of 1917)...had a season-best four-game winning streak from July 25-July 29...had a nine-game losing streak from Aug. 6 to 15 to begin a 33-game stretch that ran through Sept. 10, during which the A's went 9-24 (.273)...were eliminated from the AL West race in game 129 on Aug. 28, which was the earliest the A's have ever been eliminated from the West...the previous earliest was in 1979 when they were eliminated in game 135 on Aug. 30 and that was the only other time the A's were eliminated before Sept. 1...were eliminated from the playoffs in game 137 on Sept. 7...were 56-96 with 10 games remaining but then lost six straight from Sept. 25 to Oct. 1 to fall a season-high 46 games under .500 at 56-102...finished the year with a season-high tying four-game winning streak.

PLAYERS AND ROOKIES: The A's set an Athletics record for most players used in a season with 64...broke the previous Oakland record of 54 in 2007 and 2017, and the previous Athletics record of 56 set in 1915...more than half of the players were rookies (34), which topped the previous Oakland record of 21 set in 2008...more than a third of the players made their Major League debut in 2022 (23)...19 of the players made their ML debuts with the A's, which is an Oakland record and the most by an A's team since 1943 (22)...tied an Athletics record by employing 34 pitchers, equaling the mark set in 2018...set an Oakland record with 18 rookie pitchers (previous: 12 in 2009, 12, 15, 16) and those rookies combined for 440 games pitched, which is the most in Oakland history...the rest of the pitching staff combined for 252 games pitched...also set an Athletics record for most first basemen (12) and tied the mark for most relievers (27)...fell one short

of the Oakland record for most catchers (5, 6 in 1978 and 2019), second basemen (10, 11 in 1972 and 1973), shortstops (6, 7 in 1975, 1991, 1997 and 2021), left fielders (13, 14 in 2010), right fielders (12, 13 in 1992) and outfielders (17, 18 in 2007)...the 64 players were second most in the American League to the Angels (66) and tied for fifth in the majors...the 34 pitchers were ninth most in the majors...the pitchers included three position players (Bethancourt, Neuse, Pinder) who combined for five games pitched...prior to 2022, the A's had not had more than two games pitched in a season by position players...used 160 different lineups in 162 games...including the starting pitcher, had seven rookies in the lineup once (Sept. 30), at least six 12 times and at least five 30 times...had just two games without a rookie in the batting order or as the starting pitcher (June 12, July 22).

OFFENSE: The A's ranked last in the majors in batting average (.216), on-base percentage (.281) and OPS (.626), second in lowest slugging percentage (.346), fewest runs scored (568) and fewest extra base hits (401), third in fewest walks (433) and fourth in fewest home runs (137)...set Athletics records for lowest batting average and on-base percentage and an Oakland record for lowest OPS...tied the Oakland record for fewest walks in a full season (1978)...the batting average was fourth lowest in Major League history in a season of 140 games ahead of the 1910 Chicago White Sox (.211), 1908 Brooklyn Superbas (.213) and 1968 New York Yankees (.214)...the on-base percentage was seventh lowest in American League history and the lowest by a Major League team since the 1965 Mets (.277)...the OPS was the lowest in the majors since the 1981 Toronto Blue Jays (.617)...had the second lowest slugging percentage in Oakland history (.343 in 1968) and the second fewest runs scored in a full season (532 in 1978)...struck out 1389 times, which was second most in Athletics history to the record of 1491 in 2017...had 15 triples, which tied for second fewest in a full season in Athletics history (13 in 1998)...the 401 extra base hits were the A's fewest in a full season since 1992 (385)...also ranked tied for third in the majors in fewest intentional walks (7) and most sacrifice hits (22) and tied for fourth in fewest sacrifice flies (33)...the intentional walks were the fewest in a full season in Oakland history (previous: 15 in 2017) and the sacrifice flies were second fewest (27 in 1978)...were successful in 78-of-101 (77.2%) stolen base attempts, which was the fourth best percentage in the AL...had the fifth fewest stolen base attempts...were shut out 14 times, which tied for sixth most in the majors...however, were held to one run or fewer 46 times, which was the most in the majors and the most by an AL team since the 1978 Oakland A's also had 46...hit .206 with the bases empty, .232 with runners on and .239 with runners in scoring position.

PITCHING: The A's compiled a 4.52 ERA, which was third highest in the American League...had the highest opponents slugging percentage (.428), the second highest OPS (.750) and the fourth highest batting average (.254) and on-base percentage (.323)...yielded 195 home runs, which were the most in the AL, fourth most in the majors and seventh most in Athletics history...it was the second time in Oakland history the A's led the AL in most home runs allowed (1991)...hit 72 batters, which tied for second most in the AL and broke the Oakland record of 68 set in 2004...had the most hit batters by an A's team since the Philadelphia A's set the record with 81 in 1911...had 1426.1 innings pitched, which was third fewest in the AL and the fewest in a 162-game season in Oakland history...the previous low was 1429.2 in 1979...struck out 1203 batters, which was third fewest in the AL but fifth most in Athletics history...had the fewest shutouts in the AL (7) and the fifth most wild pitches (62).

STARTING PITCHING: A's starting pitchers were 40-74 with a 4.69 ERA...the 74 losses were second most in the majors to the Nationals (86) and tied for third most in Oakland history (86 in 1979, 79 in 1977)...the 40 wins were fourth fewest in the American League and tied for second fewest in a full season in Oakland history (29 in 1997)...had the highest opponents slugging percentage in the AL (.447), the second highest ERA and OPS (.765) and fifth highest batting average (.258)...the slugging percentage was fourth highest in Oakland history and the highest since 1998 (.452)...yielded 129 home runs, which was the most in the AL and third most in the majors...had 850.1 innings pitched, which was sixth most in the AL but second fewest in a full season in Athletics history (824.1 in 2018)...were one of seven AL teams without a complete game and it marked the first time in Athletics history the A's went the entire season without a complete game...the A's last complete game came on June 2, 2021 (Sean Manaea) and the streak of 266 consecutive games without a complete game is the longest in Athletics history (previous: 186, Aug. 20, 2016-Sept. 14, 2017)...it is tied for the fourth longest active streak in the majors.

THE BULLPEN: The A's bullpen compiled a 4.28 ERA, which was third highest in the American League...had the second highest opponents batting average (.248), slugging percentage (.399) and OPS (.728) and third highest on-base percentage (.329)...converted 34-of-59 (57.6%) save opportunities, which was the fifth lowest save percentage in the AL and eighth lowest in Oakland history...had the third fewest saves in the AL...allowed 73-of-255 (28.6%) inherited runners to score, which was the sixth lowest percentage in the AL...had the fourth most inherited runners... had the third lowest batting average against first batters faced (.222)...had the fewest wins in the majors (20) and the fewest strikeouts in the AL (541)...allowed the third most runs in Oakland history (301), the fourth most hits (546) and tied for the fifth most walks (236).

DEFENSIVE DOINGS: The A's committed 92 errors, which were fifth most in the American League but ninth fewest in a full season in Athletics history...had the fifth lowest fielding percentage in the AL (.984)...however, the errors led to 53 unearned runs, which tied for fourth fewest...ranked fourth in double plays (139) and fifth in assists (1466)...A's catchers had three passed balls, which were third fewest in the AL but an Athletics record for fewest passed balls in a season (previous: four in 2001)...A's pitchers led the AL and ranked second in the majors with 13 pickoffs...A's outfielders had 17 assists, which tied for third fewest in the AL and were fourth fewest in Oakland history.

HOME AND AWAY: The A's went 29-51 (.362) at home compared to 31-51 (.378) on the road... set an Oakland record for lowest home winning percentage, breaking the previous mark of .383 (31-50) set in 1979...it was the 11th lowest home winning percentage in Athletics history and the lowest since 1964 (26-55, .321)...the road winning percentage tied for seventh lowest in Oakland history...had a losing record at home for the first time since 2016 and a losing record on the road for the first time since 2017...had the second lowest home winning percentage in the majors ahead of the Nationals (26-55, .321)...had the third lowest road winning percentage in the AL and seventh lowest in the majors...played more than 81 games on the road for the third time in Oakland history (83 in 1985, 82 in 1978)...hit .209 with a .605 OPS and 53 home runs at home compared to .222 with a .646 OPS and 84 home runs on the road...ranked last in the majors in home batting average, OPS and runs scored (251) and had the third fewest home runs...had the second lowest road batting average...set Athletics records for lowest home batting average, on-base percentage (.278) and OPS and an Oakland record for fewest runs in a full season...the home batting average was third lowest by an AL or NL team since 1901 and the on-base percentage was eighth lowest...the runs scored were third fewest by an AL team in the designated hitter ERA and the fewest by an A's team since 1942 (249)...had the second lowest road batting average in Athletics history (.203 in 1908) and set an Oakland record for lowest on-base percentage (.283)... had a 4.55 ERA at home and 4.50 ERA on the road, both of which were second highest in the AL... it was just the fourth time in Oakland history the A's had a higher home ERA than road ERA (1971, 1997, 2005)...had the third highest home ERA in Oakland history (5.57 in 1997, 5.12 in 1996)... allowed 111 home runs on the road, which was the most in the AL, fourth most in the majors and one short of the Oakland record of 112 set in 2019...won seven home series, lost 17 and split two...won six road series, lost 17 and split three.

CLOSE CALLS: The A's went 6-4 (.600) in extra inning games, which was the fourth best record in the American League...the 10 games tied with the Tigers, Royals and Nationals for the fewest in the majors and was one more than the fewest extra inning games in Oakland history (9 in 1974 and 1975)...had six extra inning games where both teams scored at least once in extra innings, which matched the 2021 A's for the second most such games in Oakland history (7 in 1969)...are now 20-8

(.714) in extra innings over the last three years, which is the best record in the majors...had seven walk-off wins, which tied for fifth most in the AL...have 56 walk-off wins dating back to 2017, which are seven more than any other team in the majors (Yankees, 49)...were 17-25 (.405) in

one-run games, which was the third lowest winning percentage in the AL and fourth lowest in Oakland history...the 42 one-run decisions tied for second fewest in the AL...were 12-9 (.571) in one-run games at home, 5-16 (.238) on the road...had a 36-44 (.450) record in games decided by two runs or fewer and were 24-58 (.293) in games decided by three runs or more...went 10-18 in games decided in the last at bat...were 54-5 when leading after eight innings and the five losses were the most in the AL and tied for third most in the majors...had a record of 3-80 when trailing after seven innings...the wins tied for the fewest in the majors and the .036 winning percentage was second lowest in Oakland history (2-67, .029 in 2010).

THE INJURED LIST: The A's used the injured list 31 times, which broke the Oakland record of 27 set in 2016 and matched in 2021...however, used the IL nine times for Covid in 2022 and three times in 2021...the players on the IL combined to miss 1,027 games, an average of 33.1 games per stint...the fewest players on the IL at once was three from April 4-6 and Aug. 2-6...the most was 12 on April 19...the only other season in Oakland history in which the A's had 12 or more players on the IL at once was in 2016, when they peaked at 16 players from Aug. 22-28...Deolis Guerra was the only player to spend the entire season on the IL and Brent Honeywell (140 games) and Daulton Jefferies (122) were the only other players to miss 100 or more games...Skye Bolt, Dany Jiménez, Ramón Laureano, Jed Lowrie, Sam Moll and Stephen Piscotty all had two stints on the IL...only Domingo Acevedo, Tony Kemp and Sean Murphy spent the entire season on the active roster.

BEFORE AND AFTER THE ALL-STAR BREAK: The A's had a 32-61 (.344) record at the All-Star Break, which was the second lowest winning percentage in the majors (Nationals, 31-63/.330)...it was also second lowest in Oakland history to the 1979 club (25-69, .266)...it was the first time the A's had a losing record at the break since 2017 (39-50), which was also the last time the A's were in fifth place at the break...were 28 games out of first place, which are second most in Oakland his-

tory to the 1979 club, which was 30% games behind California...then went 28-41 (.406) after the break, which was the second lowest winning percentage in the American League and seventh lowest in the majors...it marks the second consecutive season and sixth time in the last eight full seasons the A's had a losing record after the break...hit .211 with 70 home runs in 93 games before the break, .223 with 67 home runs in 69 games after the break...had a 4.34 ERA and .731 opponents OPS before the break, a 4.76 ERA and .776 OPS after the break...had the lowest batting average and on-base percentage (.272) in Athletics history at the All-Star Break and the lowest OPS in Oakland history (.603)...had the lowest batting average in Athletics history after the break and the lowest on-base percentage in Oakland history (.293).

MONTH-BY-MONTH: The A's went 10-11 in April and posted a losing record in the month for the second time in the last three Aprils (were 16-11 in 2021 and 11-15 in 2019)...the 21 games were the A's fewest in April since 2009 when they had 19...compiled a 3.56 ERA, which was their lowest in April since 2014 (2.81)...hit .212, which was fourth lowest in the American League and fourth lowest in Oakland history...it was the lowest since 2012 (.211)...had a .277 on-base percentage, which was third lowest in the AL and second lowest in Oakland history to the 1968 A's (.276)...finished May with a 10-21 (.323) record, which was second worst in the American League to the Royals (9-20, .310) and fifth worst in Oakland history in the month of May...the 21 losses tied for third most in any month in Oakland history and were the most since the A's went 9-21 in May of 1997...played 31 games in May, which were the A's most in any month since July of 1990 when they also had 31...A's pitchers set an Oakland record for strikeouts in May with 234...tied for fourth in the AL in strikeouts in May but had the third highest ERA (4.47)...the A's slugged .316 with a .598 OPS, both of which were the lowest May marks in Oakland history...it was the first time they finished with an OPS under .600 in any month of 10 or more games since April of 1979 (.581) and it was the A's lowest May OPS since 1917 (.544)...the last time an American League team posted an OPS under .600 in May was in 1972 (Texas, .562; Cleveland, .577)...had a .281 on-base percentage, which was second lowest in Oakland history in May, and a .214 batting average, which was third lowest...stole 22 bases, which was the most by the A's in May since 2012 (22)...ranked last in the majors in batting, slugging and OPS in May, tied for the fewest home runs (15), had the third lowest on-base percentage and the third fewest runs scored (94)...had the third most steals...went 5-21 (.192) in June, which was the lowest winning percentage in the majors and second lowest in a month of five or more games in Oakland history ...the lowest is .172 (5-24) in June of 1979...it was the 14th month in Oakland history with 20 or more losses and the 21 losses tied for third most...went 10-21 in May and lost 21 or more games in consecutive months for the first time since 1954 when the Philadelphia A's went 7-23 in July and 9-23 in August...it is the third time in Oakland history the A's lost 20 or more games in consecutive months (Aug. and Sept. 1978, June and July 1979)...ranked last in the majors in on-base percentage (.262), slugging (.330), OPS (.592) and runs (75) and second to last in batting average (.209)...the on-base percentage was second lowest in Athletics history in a month of more than 15 games (.256 in Sept. 1908) and the batting average was third lowest...the OPS was third lowest in Oakland history...averaged 2.88 runs per game, which was third lowest in Oakland history...had a 5.25 ERA, which was the highest in the American League and third highest in the majors...went 14-12 (.538) in July, which tied for the fifth best record in the AL and their only winning month in 2022...ranked second in the AL in opponents batting average (.225), on-base percentage (.284) and OPS (.671), tied for second in saves (9) and fifth in slugging (.387)...the on-base percentage was fourth lowest in Oakland history in July...the offense had the lowest on-base percentage in the AL (.277), the second lowest batting average (.224) and the third lowest OPS (.676) but had the third most home runs (36)...the on-base percentage was second lowest in Oakland history in July and the batting average was fourth lowest...the batting average was the A's highest in a month in 2022...went 10-17 (.360) in August, which was the third lowest winning percentage in the AL and the A's most losses in August since 2016 (18)...ranked last in the AL in batting (.218), slugging (.335) and runs (89) and second to last in extra base hits (63), home runs (20) and OPS (.635)...the batting average was second lowest in Athletics history in August (.207 in 1906)...the slugging percentage was the A's lowest in a full August since 1978 (.329) and the extra base hits were the A's fewest in a full August since 1990 (48)...the runs were fourth fewest in a full August in Oakland history...A's pitchers had the fewest strikeouts in August (183), the second most home runs (34) and the third highest ERA (4.33), opponents slugging percentage (.428) and OPS (.750)...had a 7-19 (.269) record in September, which was the lowest winning percentage in the majors, the second lowest winning percentage in September in Oakland history (7-20, .259 in 1978) and the eighth lowest

for any full month in Oakland history...had a 6.22 ERA, which was the highest in the majors by nearly a run (Rockies, 5.48)...it was third highest in any month of more than three games in Oakland history (6.73 in Sept. 2015, 6.62 in May 1997)...surrendered 44 home runs, which was the most in the AL and tied for third most in any month in Oakland history...the offense ranked last in the majors in slugging (.357), had the second lowest OPS (.641) and third lowest batting average (.219) and on-base percentage (.284)...the batting average was the lowest in Oakland history for September, the on-base percentage was second lowest and the OPS was fifth lowest.

IN THE PINCH: A's pinch hitters batted .193 with eight doubles, three home runs and 23 RBI...led the American League and ranked third in the majors in RBI...ranked second in the majors in plate appearances (163) to the Giants (257)...also ranked second in the AL in hits (29), doubles and extra base hits (11) and tied for third in home runs...led the AL in strikeouts (55) and had the second lowest on-base percentage (.245)...the 55 strikeouts tied the Oakland record set in 1972...the eight doubles fell one short of the Oakland record of nine set in 1972 and the 11 extra base hits tied for fifth most in Oakland history...the 163 plate appearances were the most by an A's team since 2014 (186)...the A's have the most pinch plate appearances in the AL dating back to 2013 (1369).

DESIGNATED HITTERS: A's designated hitters batted .174 with 17 home runs and 54 RBI...ranked last in majors in batting, on-base percentage (.252), slugging percentage (.307) and OPS (.558)...had the second fewest RBI, the fifth fewest extra base hits (42) and tied for the seventh fewest home runs...the batting average and on-base percentage were the lowest ever by an American League team in a full season (the White Sox hit .148 with a .238 on-base percentage in 60 games in 2020)...the OPS was second lowest in a full season (Tigers, .538 in 2021)...set Oakland records for lowest batting average, on-base percentage, slugging percentage and OPS and also had the fewest RBI in a full season...Jed Lowrie led the A's with 37 starts, which were the fewest by an A's team leader since Alberto Callaspo had 34 in 2014.

INTERLEAGUE PLAY: The A's went 5-15 (.250) in interleague play, which was the second lowest winning percentage in the majors ahead the Pirates (4-16, .200)...it was the lowest in Oakland history behind the 2009 club (5-13, .278)...finished with a losing record against the National League for the first time since 2017 and just the eighth time in 26 seasons of interleague play...compiled a 5.84 ERA and .829 opponents OPS, both of which were second highest in the majors...set Oakland interleague records for highest ERA, highest opponents slugging percentage (.486), fewest saves (1) and most runs (122), home runs (34) and hit batters (13)...the offense hit .222 with a .649 OPS...the batting average was fifth lowest in the majors and the OPS was sixth lowest...set an Oakland record for most interleague strikeouts (185), had the second lowest on-base percentage (.287) and third lowest batting average, slugging percentage (.362) and OPS...Oakland is 254-230 (.525) all-time in interleague play, which is fifth best in Major League history.

THIS AND THAT: The A's were 43-26 (.623) when scoring first compared to 17-76 (.183) when the opponent scored first...the winning percentage when the opponent scored first was the lowest in the majors and the lowest in Oakland history (previous: .227 in 1979)...had 24 come-from-behind wins, which was third fewest in the majors and matched the 2010 A's for the fewest in a full season in Oakland history...went 30-46 (.395) against American League West competition, which was the fourth lowest record against divisional foes in Oakland history and the second lowest mark in intradivision games in the AL (Red Sox, .342)...it marked the seventh time in the last nine years the A's have finished with a .500 or worse record against the West...had winning records against two teams: Detroit (5-2) and Baltimore (4-3)...went 0-4 against Atlanta, 1-6 against Cleveland and 1-5 against Minnesota and Boston...averaged 3 hours and 2 minutes per game, which was third quickest in the majors.







RELIEF PITCHERS SAVE RULE

A pitcher is credited with a save when he meets all three of the following conditions:

1. He is the finishing pitcher in a game won by his club, and
2. He is not the winning pitcher, and
3. He qualifies under one of the following conditions:
 - a. He enters the game with a lead of no more than three runs and pitches for at least one inning, or
 - b. He enters the game with the potential tying run on base, at bat, or on deck (that is, the potential tying run is either on base or is one of the first two batsmen he faces), or
 - c. He pitches effectively for at least three innings

DESIGNATED HITTER RULE

A hitter may be designated to bat for the starting pitcher and all subsequent pitchers without otherwise affecting the status of the pitcher(s) in the game. A designated hitter must be selected prior to the game and must be included on the lineup cards presented to the umpire-in-chief. The DH must come to bat at least one time, unless the opposing Club changes pitchers. The DH is "locked" into the batting order but may be removed for a pinch-hitter or pinch-runner, who in turn becomes the DH. The DH may be used defensively but the pitcher then assumes the batting order of the replaced defensive player. The DH role is terminated if a pitcher switches from the mound to a position on defense, a pinch hitter enters the game to pitch, the pitcher bats or runs for the DH, the DH assumes a position on defense or a player on defense enters the game to pitch. A player listed on the lineup card as both a starting pitcher and DH can continue to bat if he is replaced as the pitcher or continue to pitch if he is replaced as the DH.







HISTORY

ATHLETICS HISTORY

From its beginnings in Philadelphia to its current version in Oakland, the Athletics franchise has been one of the most storied in Major League history. The A's have won nine World Championships, 15 Pennants and 17 Division Titles in 122 years in the American League. Only the New York Yankees (27) and St. Louis Cardinals (11) have won more World Series and only the Yankees (40) have more American League Pennants.

The A's were one of the eight original AL franchises when the league was born in 1901. Connie Mack was named manager of the Philadelphia entry and would guide the A's for 50 years, winning five World Championships and 3,582 games. The Hall of Famer was also an owner of the club for all 54 years in Philadelphia.

Under Mack's leadership, the A's would win six of the first 14 AL Pennants, including World Series titles in 1910, 11 and 13. The first dynasty featured the "\$100,000 infield" of Stuffy McInnis, Eddie Collins, Jack Barry and Frank "Home Run" Baker as well as Hall of Fame pitchers Chief Bender, Eddie Plank and Rube Waddell. Waddell led the AL in strikeouts each year from 1902-07 and Baker earned the "Home Run" nickname by topping the AL in round trippers from 1911-14, with 11, 10, 12 and nine.

The A's won 99 games in 1914 but dropped off to 43 wins in 1915 as the club sold off many of its star players, a pattern that would continue throughout the history of the franchise. The A's had seven straight last place finishes through 1921, but a second dynasty was on the horizon.

Mack again began to assemble Hall of Fame talent in the mid-20's, putting together one of the most feared batting orders in baseball history with catcher Mickey Cochrane, first baseman Jimmie Foxx and outfielder Al Simmons. Add in another Hall of Famer on the mound in Lefty Grove and the A's would win 100 games in three straight seasons, including back-to-back World Championships in 1929 and 30.

The A's won their ninth AL Pennant with a 107-win season in 1931 as Grove won AL Most Valuable Player honors. Foxx won back-to-back MVPs in 1932 and 1933, setting franchise records for home runs (58) and RBI (169) in 1932. However, economics again led Mack to sell or trade his best players. The club would post 13 consecutive losing seasons from 1934-46 and would finish no higher than fourth place in the final 21 years in Philadelphia.

Connie Mack managed his final season in 1950 at the age of 87 and the Mack family sold the club to Arnold Johnson, who moved the A's to Kansas City in 1955.

The A's finished in sixth place in their first season in Kansas City, but that would be their highest finish in the midwest, which featured 13 losing seasons. The club again began to develop talent, but most, including the likes of Roger Maris and 1952 AL MVP Bobby Shantz, would end up being traded to the Yankees. Following the death of Johnson in 1960, the A's were sold to Charlie Finley.

Finley began assembling another talented group of A's players, signing Jim "Catfish" Hunter, Rollie Fingers, Bert Campaneris and Joe Rudi and drafting Reggie Jackson, Sal Bando and Vida Blue. While most of these players had limited time with the Kansas City A's, they would form the nucleus of the next A's dynasty.

The A's moved to Oakland in 1968 and won 82 games that year for their first winning season in 16 years. After back-to-back second place finishes in 1969 and '70, the A's won five straight American League West titles from 1971-75. Anchored by Hall of Famers Hunter, Fingers and Jackson, the A's won three straight World Championships from 1972-74.

Although the A's won 98 games in 1975, the third Athletics dynasty was already coming to an end with the departure of Hunter via free agency prior to the season. The rest of the players would be traded in the next two years and the A's reached a low in Oakland with a 108-loss season in 1979. However, that year saw the debut of the next A's superstar, Rickey Henderson.

Billy Martin was hired to manage the A's in 1980 and Henderson flourished under Martin, stealing 100 bases that year and a record 130 in 1982. Finley sold the A's to Haas Family following the 1980 season and Billy Ball, featuring Henderson on the bases and starting pitchers going the distance, was born. The A's won the West in the strike-shortened 1981 season but would face a seven-year drought before returning to the postseason.

The turnaround began in 1986 with the hiring of Tony La Russa as manager and the signing of Dave Stewart as a free agent. A trade for future Hall of Famer Dennis Eckersley in 1987 led to the emergence of the modern day closer, and three straight rookies of the year in Jose Canseco (1986), Mark McGwire (1987) and Walt Weiss (1988) gave the A's the ingredients for a run of four AL West Championships in five years from 1988-92.

Oakland made three straight World Series appearances from 1988-90, including a sweep of the cross-bay rival San Francisco Giants in 1989 that was buoyed by the return of Henderson to Oakland. Two years later on May 1, 1991, Henderson would break Lou Brock's Major League stolen base record with his 939th steal.

The A's had MVPs in 1988 (Canseco), 1990 (Henderson) and 1992 (Eckersley) and Cy Youngs in Bob Welch (1990) and Eckersley (1992), but this time it was age that ended the A's run.

The Moneyball teams of the early 2000's featuring the Big Three of Tim Lincecum, Mark Mulder and 2002 Cy Young winner Barry Zito, and the offensive power of 2000 MVP Jason Giambi, 2002 MVP Miguel Tejada and Gold Glove Eric Chavez, made four straight postseason appearances from 2000-03 and another in 2006. The 2002 club set a then-AL record with a 20-game winning streak, capped off by a Scott Hatteberg pinch hit home run.

Bob Melvin was hired as manager in 2011 and under his guidance, the A's made six postseason appearances over a nine-year span from 2012-20. The run began with two AL West titles and a Wild Card from 2012-14 and two Wild Cards and an AL West title from 2018-20. In between, the A's completely rebuilt, with only Brett Anderson and Jed Lowrie playing in each three-year stretch.

ATHLETICS HALL OF FAME

The Athletics Hall of Fame was founded in 2018 to honor the individuals who have shaped the identity and success of the Athletics franchise.

The inaugural class of seven featured the five Oakland A's National Baseball Hall of Famers: Catfish Hunter, Rollie Fingers, Reggie Jackson, Dennis Eckersley and Rickey Henderson, as well as four-time 20-game winner Dave Stewart and owner Charlie Finley.

The first induction ceremony took place on Sept. 5, 2018. With five additions in 2023, the Athletics Hall of Fame now features 33 members.

Frank "Home Run" Baker
Philadelphia A's 1908-14
Inducted Aug. 22, 2021

Frank "Home Run" Baker led the American League in home runs from 1911-13 and tied for the lead in 1914, but earned his nickname by hitting two home runs in the 1911 World Series against the Giants, the second of three World Champion A's teams that featured Baker as the A's third baseman. A member of the A's famed \$100,000 infield, Baker led the league in triples in his rookie season of 1909 and topped the AL in RBI from 1912-13.




Sal Bando
Kansas City A's 1966-67;
Oakland A's 1968-76
Inducted Aug. 7, 2022

"Captain Sal" was the leader that held the A's together in the early 70's when Oakland won five straight American League West titles and three consecutive World Series. Bando finished in the top four in Most Valuable Player voting three times and was a four-time All-Star. His durability put him atop the AL leader board in games played four times and although he never led the league in any other major category, his 33.0 WAR from 1969-73 was the best in baseball.




Charles "Chief" Bender
Philadelphia A's 1903-14

Charles "Chief" Bender was a Native American who pitched in five World Series for the A's. He had his finest season in 1910 when he authored a no-hitter while compiling a 23-5 record and a 1.58 ERA before helping the A's to their first World Championship. Bender, who was Connie Mack's choice "if there was one game I wanted to win above all others" won five of his seven World Series starts in 1910, 11 and 13 to lead the A's to their first three World Championships.




Vida Blue

Vida Blue made his Major League debut in 1969 eight days before his 20th birthday, tossed a no-hitter in 1970, and then burst onto the national scene in 1971 when he won both the American League Cy Young Award and Most Valuable Player Award after compiling a 24-8 record, a league-leading 1.82 ERA and 301 strikeouts. Blue started two All-Star Games for the AL in 1971 and 1975, and in between pitched for the A's three consecutive World Champions.

When you trace the roots of the A's three straight World Championships from 1972 to 1974, it all began on April 25, 1961, when the Kansas City A's signed a 19-year-old Cuban named Dagoberto Campaneris. "Campy" played 13 seasons for the A's and was a six-time All-Star. He stole 649 bases in his career and led the American League in steals six times. Campaneris homered twice in his debut and famously played all nine positions in a nine-inning game on Sept. 8, 1965.



Eric Chavez
Oakland A's 1998-2010
Inducted Aug. 7, 2022

Eric Chavez was a mainstay of the third era of great Oakland teams that won four American League West titles and made five playoff appearances from 2000-06. He won six straight Gold Gloves at third base from 2001-06, hit 20 or more home runs in seven straight seasons from 2000-06 and drove in 100 runs four times. Much like the A's teams of his era, Chavez excelled in the second half of the season and retired as the best player in Oakland history never named to an All-Star Team.




Gordon "Mickey" Cochrane
Philadelphia A's 1925-33
Inducted Aug. 22, 2021

One of baseball's greatest catchers, Mickey Cochrane was the backstop for the A's three consecutive American League Pennant winning teams from 1929-31. He was named AL MVP in 1928 and homered twice in the 1930 World Series as the A's won their second straight World Championship. Cochrane had a .321 batting average in nine seasons with the A's and also had a .419 on-base percentage nearly 70 years before it gained mainstream acceptance.




Eddie Collins
Philadelphia A's 1906-14; 27-30
Inducted Aug. 22, 2021

The first Athletic to be elected to the National Baseball Hall of Fame, Eddie Collins batted .337 and stole 373 bases in 13 seasons over two stints with the A's. He finished in the top six in Chalmers' Award Voting, a precursor to the MVP, in four straight seasons from 1911-14 and won the award in 1914. He hit .429 in the 1910 World Series to start the A's championship run of three Series titles in four years. The second baseman led the AL in steals in 1910 and runs from 1912-14.



Dennis Eckersley
Oakland A's 1987-95
Inducted Sept. 5, 2018

When Dennis Eckersley was traded to the A's in April of 1987, he had a successful 12-year career as a starting pitcher. By the time his nine seasons in Oakland concluded, he redefined the role of closer, saving an Athletics record 320 games. Born in Oakland and raised in Fremont, he was the AL MVP and Cy Young winner in 1992. Eckersley was a four-time All-Star with Oakland and was a member of the A's World Champions in 1989.



Rollie Fingers
Oakland A's 1968-76
Inducted Sept. 5, 2018

Rollie Fingers made his ML debut with Oakland in 1968 and was used both as a starter and reliever over his first four seasons. He moved to the bullpen full time in 1972, when the A's began their run of three consecutive World Championships. Fingers spent the first nine seasons of his 17-year Hall of Fame career with Oakland. The mustachioed right-hander was a four-time All-Star with the A's and earned 1974 World Series MVP honors.



Charlie Finley
Kansas City A's 1961-67;
Oakland A's 1968-80
Inducted Sept. 5, 2018

After purchasing the Kansas City A's following the 1960 season, Charlie Finley moved the club to Oakland in 1968 where the team he assembled would win three consecutive World Championships from 1972-74. He would be remembered as much for his off-field antics and innovations, as he proposed the designated hitter, interleague play and World Series night games. Finley also introduced baseball to Charlie O the mule, Harvey the mechanical rabbit, white cleats, colorful uniforms and more.



Ray Fosse
Oakland A's 1973-75, 1985-2021
Inducted Aug. 7, 2022

Ray Fosse blazed a unique trail to A's immortality. It began with three years as a player from 1973-75 and concluded with 37 seasons in the front office, including 36 as a broadcaster. Fosse was a catcher for the A's World Champion teams in 1973 and 1974 and he returned to Oakland in 1985 in a front office role. He moved into the radio booth in 1986 and was a mainstay on A's radio and television broadcasts until passing away following the 2021 season.




Jimmie Foxx
Philadelphia A's 1925-35
Inducted Aug. 22, 2021

Jimmie Foxx did not finish his senior year of high school as he went to spring training with the Philadelphia A's in 1925 and made his Major League debut later that year at the age of 17. He would go on to hit 302 home runs in 11 seasons as an Athletic, a franchise record that stood for 61 years. Foxx earned back-to-back MVP awards from 1932-33 and a Triple Crown in 1933. He represented the A's in the first three All-Star Games from 1933-35 and was a World Champion in 1929 and 30.



Jason Giambi
Oakland A's 1995-2001, 09
To be inducted 2023

Jason Giambi was a key presence both on and off the field in eight seasons with the A's. He hit .300 with 198 home runs, 715 RBI and a .406 on-base percentage in 1,036 games as an Athletic, earning American League Most Valuable Player honors in 2000 and AL All-Star honors in 2000-01. Giambi concluded his playing time with the A's as the only .300 career hitter in Oakland history and his leadership led to a relaxed clubhouse atmosphere that remained long after his playing days.



Robert "Lefty" Grove
Philadelphia A's 1925-33
Inducted Aug. 22, 2021

Lefty Grove pitched for nine seasons with the Philadelphia A's, leading the league in strikeouts seven times, ERA five times and wins four times. He won the pitching Triple Crown by leading the league in wins, ERA and strikeouts in back-to-back seasons from 1930-31. Grove capped that streak by going 31-4 with a 2.06 ERA and 175 strikeouts in 1931 to earn American League MVP honors. He was a member of the A's back-to-back World Champions in 1929-30 and was a 1933 All-Star.




Walter A. Haas, Jr.
Oakland A's 1981-95
Inducted Sept. 21, 2019

Walter A. Haas, Jr. purchased the A's following the 1980 season and during his 15 years as owner, Oakland won five American League West titles, three AL Pennants and the 1989 World Championship. The A's set franchise records for attendance five times, but Haas will be remembered just as much for his commitment to the community and staying in the background while bright young innovators grew the A's reputation to one of the best in baseball.




Rickey Henderson
Oakland A's 1979-84, 89-93,
94-95, 98
Inducted Sept. 5, 2018

Raised in Oakland and drafted by the A's, Rickey Henderson went on to become the greatest player in Oakland A's history and one of the greatest leadoff hitters of all time. He played 14 of his 25 seasons in an Oakland uniform and finished his career in 2003 as the all-time leader in stolen bases (1,406), runs scored (2,295) and walks (2,190). Henderson was a six-time All-Star with the A's, AL MVP in 1990 and a member of the 1989 A's World Champions.



Jim "Catfish" Hunter
Kansas City A's 1965-67;
Oakland A's 1968-74
Inducted Sept. 5, 2018

Jim "Catfish" Hunter was the anchor of the A's teams that won three consecutive World Championships from 1972 to 1974. He had four straight 20-win seasons with Oakland, including a career-high 25 victories in 1974 when he won the AL Cy Young. Hunter was a six-time All-Star with the A's and tossed the first perfect game in Oakland history on May 8, 1968. He pitched three seasons in Kansas City and seven in Oakland and was inducted to the National Hall of Fame in 1987.




Reggie Jackson
Kansas City A's 1967;
Oakland A's 1968-75, 87
Inducted Sept. 5, 2018

"Mr. October" was born in 1973 when Reggie Jackson earned World Series MVP honors as the A's won their second of three straight World Championships. He was also named AL MVP that year after leading the league in runs, home runs and RBI. Jackson made his debut with the Kansas City A's in 1967, spent the next eight seasons with Oakland and then concluded his 21-year Hall of Fame career with the A's in 1987. He played in six All-Star Games in an Oakland uniform.




Bob Johnson
Philadelphia A's, 1933-42
To be inducted 2023

Bob Johnson played 10 of his 13 seasons in the majors with the Philadelphia A's from 1933-42 where he was a five-time All-Star. His 997 runs scored were a franchise record until Rickey Henderson broke the mark in 1993. Johnson slugged 20 or more home runs and scored 90 or more runs in each of his first nine seasons and had seven consecutive 100-RBI seasons from 1935-41. He finished his A's career with a .298 average, 252 home runs and 1,040 RBI in 1,459 games.



Carney Lansford
Oakland A's 1983-92
To be inducted 2023

The second in a line of great Oakland third basemen, Carney Lansford was an All-Star in 1988, a World Champion in 1989 and a key cog in the A's teams that won three straight pennants from 1988-90 and an AL West title in 1992. He set an Oakland record with a .336 batting average in 1989 and then went on to hit .455 in the ALCS and .438 in the World Series win over the Giants. Lansford was also a stand-out defensively and led AL third basemen in fielding in 1987, 88 and 90.



Tony La Russa
Oakland A's 1986-95
Inducted Sept. 21, 2019

Tony La Russa managed the A's for 10 seasons from 1986 to 1995. Under his guidance, the A's won four American League West titles, three consecutive AL Pennants from 1988 to 1990 and the World Championship in 1989. La Russa won 798 games during his tenure with Oakland, including 104 in 1988 when he was named AL Manager of the Year. He would garner the honor again in 1992 and was elected to the National Baseball Hall of Fame in 2014.



Keith Lieppman
Oakland A's 1971-present
Inducted Aug. 7, 2022

Keith Lieppman grew up in Missouri in the 1960's attending Kansas City A's games and would end up spending over 50 years with the club after it moved to Oakland. He played for nine seasons in the minors from 1971-79, managed for eight from 1980-87 and then served for more than 25 years as Director of Player Development. In his roles, he tutored many of the players that would win 11 American League West titles and make 15 playoff appearances from 1988-2020.



Connie Mack
Philadelphia A's 1901-54
Inducted Aug. 22, 2021

Connie Mack managed the A's for 50 seasons from 1901-50 and was part-owner of the club for all 54 seasons in Philadelphia. Under his leadership, the A's would win five World Championship and nine American League Pennants. He built two dynasties, winning back-to-back World Series in 1910-11 as well as 1913, and then did it again in 1929-30. Known for managing in a suit, with a derby or bowler in place of a baseball cap, the A's won 3,582 games with Mack at the helm.



Mark McGwire
Oakland A's 1986-97
Inducted Sept. 21, 2019

Mark McGwire played 12 seasons with Oakland and hit 363 home runs, breaking the franchise record in 1996. He was named to nine American League All-Star teams, including six straight beginning in 1987 when he was named AL Rookie of the Year after hitting 49 home runs. He earned the AL Gold Glove for first basemen in 1990 and hit 52 home runs in 1996. The A's reached the Postseason four times with McGwire, highlighted by a World Championship in 1989.



Eddie Plank
Philadelphia A's 1901-14
Inducted Aug. 22, 2021

Eddie Plank was a member of the original 1901 Philadelphia A's and in 14 seasons as Athletic, he won 284 games, started 459, completed 362, had 59 shutouts and struck out 1,985, all franchise records that still stand. He never led the American League in wins, strikeouts or ERA but was always one of the top pitchers in the game, earning him a spot in the National Baseball Hall of Fame in 1946. Plank's tenure with the A's included six AL Pennants and three World Championships.




Joe Rudi
Kansas City A's 1967;
Oakland A's 1968-76, 82
Inducted Aug. 7, 2022

The A's reached the World Series three straight years from 1972-74 but winning those series required clutch performances, and Joe Rudi delivered. He made one of the greatest catches in World Series history in 1972 against the Reds and then hit .333 with four RBI in both 1973 against the Mets and 1974 against the Dodgers. Rudi won three consecutive Gold Gloves from 1974-76, was a three-time All-Star and finished second in American League MVP balloting in 1972 and 1974.



Al Simmons
Philadelphia A's 1924-32; 40-41;
44
Inducted Aug. 22, 2021

Al Simmons was a major factor in the A's three consecutive American League pennant winning clubs from 1929-31, hitting .346 with 92 home runs and 450 RBI. He led the AL in RBI in 1929 and then won back-to-back batting titles in 1930 and 31. Simmons hit .341 or better in seven consecutive seasons from 1925-31 and had a .356 average in 12 seasons with Philadelphia. He drove in at least 100 runs in each of his first nine seasons with the A's and had at least 200 hits five times.



Gene Tenace
Oakland A's 1969-76
To be inducted 2023

Gene Tenace played eight seasons in an Oakland uniform and reached the postseason five times. He began the A's run of three consecutive World Championships from 1972-74 by earning MVP honors in the 1972 World Series against the Reds after hitting four home runs and driving in nine of the A's 16 runs. Tenace was an All-Star in 1975, had four straight 20-homer seasons from 1973-76 and walked 100 or more times in three straight seasons from 1973-75.




Roy Steele
Oakland A's 1968-2005, 07-08
To be inducted 2023

For four decades, fans were blessed with "the voice of God" at the Coliseum. Roy Steele joined the A's as their public address announcer in 1968, their inaugural season in Oakland, and would miss just five games over the next 38 years before continuing in a part-time role over the next three seasons. He worked six World Series and an All-Star Game, and his booming baritone introduced players from the Mustache Gang to Billy Ball, the Bash Brothers and Moneyball.



Steve Vucinich
Oakland A's 1968-2021
Inducted Aug. 7, 2022

The one constant in the A's first 54 years in Oakland was Steve Vucinich. The A's have been erased like a blackboard, rebuilt and then erased again. But Vuc has marked the time. From the first batter in Oakland history, Bert Campaneris, to the most recent acquisitions, Yan Gomes and Josh Harrison, Steve has known them all. He joined the organization as a ballboy in 1968, moved to the visiting clubhouse in 1974 and then returned to the home clubhouse as equipment manager in 1994.



Dave Stewart
Oakland A's 1986-92, 95
Inducted Sept. 5, 2018

Born in Oakland and a graduate of St. Elizabeth High School, Dave Stewart spent six seasons in the majors with three teams before breaking through with the A's. He joined Oakland in 1986 and would go on to win 20 games in four consecutive seasons from 1987-90. The big-game pitcher went 8-3 with a 2.22 ERA in 14 postseason starts for Oakland, including two wins in the 1989 World Series when he earned MVP honors in the A's sweep of the Giants.



George "Rube" Waddell
Philadelphia A's 1902-07
Inducted Aug. 22, 2021

A fan favorite at the turn of the century not only for his skills on the mound but for his eccentricities that earned him the nickname Rube, George Waddell pitched six seasons for the Philadelphia A's from 1902-07. He led the AL in strikeouts in each of those six campaigns and won the pitching Triple Crown in 1905 with a 27-10 record, a 1.48 ERA and 287 strikeouts. Waddell fanned a career-high 349 batters in 1904 and his 24 wins in 1902 led the A's to their first AL Pennant.

THE CHAMPIONSHIP YEARS

1910: Finished with a 102-48 record and outdistanced the New York Highlanders by 14.5 games in the American League standings...defeated the Chicago Cubs in five games to win the first of five World Championships in Philadelphia...102 wins set a new American League record...opened the season in Washington in a game attended by President William Howard Taft, who honored the game by throwing out the first ball, setting a precedent which was followed by each of

his successors until the Senators left Washington following the 1971 season...the pitching staff, headlined by Jack Coombs, Chief Bender, Cy Morgan and Eddie Plank, finished with a 1.79 ERA...Coombs emerged as the ace of the pitching staff and finished with a 31-9 record and a 1.30 ERA, including 13 shutouts...compiled a 46-inning scoreless streak during the season...the infield of Stuffey McInnis, Eddie Collins, Jack Barry and Frank Baker would become known as the “\$100,000 Infield”...won the first three games of the World Series before the Cubs took game four, 4-3 in 10 innings...Coombs won his third game of the series in Game 5, out-pitching Mordecai Brown to lift the A’s to their first world title.

1911: Dominated the American League for the second straight season, finishing with a 101-50 record...defeated the New York Giants in six games to capture a second straight world championship... offense was paced by Eddie Collins, Frank Baker, Stuffy McInnis, Eddie Murphy and Bris Lord...Baker captured the American League home run title with 11 round trippers, earning him the nickname “Home Run” Baker...clinched the pennant on Sept. 26 with an 11-5 win over Detroit at Shibe Park, as Baker hit two

doubles and two home runs...faced the New York Giants in the World Series in a rematch of the 1905 Fall Classic, won by the Giants...Christy Mathewson and Chief Bender squared-off in Game 1, just as they did in the 1905 Series finale...a run-scoring double by New York’s Josh Devore in the seventh inning broke a 1-1 tie as the Giants captured the first game...the A’s won Game 2, 3-1, behind the pitching of Eddie Plank and a home run by Baker...A’s took a 2-1 lead in the series by winning Game 3, 3-2 in 11 innings at the Polo Grounds...after heavy rains forced postponement of the series for a week, the A’s captured Game 4 at Shibe Park, 4-2, as Bender outdueled Mathewson...the Giants staved off elimination by winning Game 5 at the Polo Grounds, 4-3 in 10 innings...the A’s routed the Giants, 13-2 in Game 6 to capture their second straight World Series title.

1913: The Athletics posted a 96-57 regular season record and outdistanced Washington by six-and-a-half games to reclaim the American League pennant...defeated the New York Giants in five games to capture their third World Series title in four years... moved into first place in April and stayed atop the AL standings the rest of the way...Jack Coombs, three years removed from a 31-win season, missed the entire campaign with typhoid fever...Chief Bender (21-10), Eddie Plank (18-10), Boardwalk Brown (17-11), Byron “Duke” Houck (14-6) and rookie “Bullet” Joe Bush (14-6) anchored the pitching staff... the “\$100,000 Infield” turned in another solid season...Frank Baker hit .336 to go along with an American League-best 12 home runs and 117 RBI...Stuffy McInnis hit .324 with 90 RBI, Collins finished with a .345 average while Barry batted .275...the Athletics and Giants split the first two games of the series before the A’s won Games 3, 4 and 5 to capture their third World Series title.

AL cellar before finishing seventh in 1922...finished sixth in 1923, fifth in '24, second in '25, third in '26 and second in '27 and '28 before winning the pennant in 1929...Al Simmons leads the American League with 157 RBI and finished second with a .365 batting average...Jimmie Foxx hit .354 with 33 home runs while catcher Mickey Cochrane finished with a .331 average...Bing Miller (.335), Jimmy Dykes (.327) and Mule Haas (.313) also topped the .300 mark for the season...Earnshaw (24-8, 3.29) and Grove (20-6, 2.81) combined for 44 wins.

1930: After posting a 102-52 regular season record, the Athletics successfully defended their World Championship by defeating a hard-nosed St. Louis Cardinals team in six games...offensively, Al Simmons led the AL with a .381 average to go along with 36 home runs...Jimmie Foxx hit .335 and his 37 home runs ranked tied for third in the league behind Babe Ruth (49) and Lou Gehrig (41)...Mickey Cochrane finished the year with a .357 average...Lefty Grove posts a 28-5 record to go along with a 2.54 ERA while George Earnshaw finished with a 22-13 record and a 4.44 ERA...the 1931 Athletics won a franchise record 107 games, but were denied a third straight championship after losing to the St. Louis Cardinals in a seven-game World Series...after finishing second in 1932 and third in 1933, the A's would average 92 losses a season for the next 21 years before relocating to Kansas City for the 1955 season.

Gene Tenace, who hit just .225 with five home runs during the regular season, hits a then-Fall Classic record four home runs to go along with a .348 average to earn World Series MVP honors.

1973: The A's claimed their third straight AL West title with a 94-68 record and dispatched the Baltimore Orioles to win a hard-fought five-game ALCS...defeated the New York Mets in seven games to capture a second straight World Championship...Reggie Jackson led the American League in home runs (32) and RBI (117) and hit .293 to earn AL MVP honors...after hitting just .143 against Baltimore in the ALCS, Jackson earned World Series MVP honors after hitting .310 with three doubles, a triple and a home run against the Mets...third baseman Sal Bando hit .287 with 29 home runs and 98 RBI

while playing all 162 games at third base...All-Star shortstop Campy Campaneris reached the 150-hit plateau for the second consecutive season and for the sixth time in 10 years...hit .333 vs. Baltimore and set then-ALCS records for total bases (14) and stolen bases (3) and tied an ALCS record with two home runs...hit .290 with six runs, three stolen bases, a triple and home run vs. the Mets in the World Series...Dick Green bounced back from an injury-plagued 1972 campaign to set a then-Oakland record for highest fielding percentage by a second baseman (.988)...Bill North, acquired in a trade with the Cubs in the off-season, emerged as the A's everyday center fielder, but a late season ankle injury forced him to miss both the ALCS and World Series... catcher Ray Fosse was acquired from Cleveland during spring training and established career highs in games played (143), at bats (492), doubles (23) and triples (2)...pitching staff was paced

1972: The Swingin' A's finished with a 93-62 regular season record and held off the Chicago White Sox to capture a second straight American League West title... defeated the Detroit Tigers in five games in the American League Championship Series to advance to the World Series, where they defeated the heavily-favored Cincinnati Reds in seven games...the pitching staff, led by Jim "Catfish" Hunter (21-7), Ken Holtzman (19-11), John "Blue Moon" Odom (15-6) and closer Rollie Fingers (11-9, 21 saves), finished second in the American League with a 2.58 ERA...a contract dispute forced

by 20-game winners Catfish Hunter (21-5), Ken Holtzman (21-13) and Vida Blue (20-9)...Hunter posted his third straight 21-win season despite missing a month of the season with an injury...strung together 13-straight victories from June 2 to September 5... Hunter posted two wins over Baltimore in the ALCS, including a 3-0 shutout in Game 5...he kept his record perfect in World Series play, winning Game 6 against the Mets...Holtzman won seven games in the month of May and finished with four shutouts among his 16 complete games...after a slow start, Blue won 11 of his last 13 decisions down the stretch to notch his second 20-win season in just his third full Major League season...Blue tossed a team-high four shutouts during the season...Manager Dick Williams resigned shortly after the season after failing to come to terms on a new contract.

1974: Under new manager Alvin Dark, the A's defeated the Los Angeles Dodgers to claim their third straight World Series...finished the regular season with a 90-72 record and won their fourth straight AL West title by five games over Texas...defeated the Baltimore Orioles in a four-game ALCS to set up the first ever All-California World Series against the Dodgers... Catfish Hunter captured the American League Cy Young Award after winning a career high 25 games to go along with a 2.49 ERA...Rollie Fingers made a career high 76 appearances to set a then-Oakland

record...he was named World Series MVP after chalking up a win, two saves and a 1.93 ERA in four appearances...Fingers earned the win in Game 1 as he worked 4.1 innings in relief of Ken Holtzman...Campy Campaneris hit a career high .290 and stole over 30 bases for the 10th straight season...Campy batted .353 in five World Series games against the Dodgers...Joe Rudi led the AL in doubles (39) and total bases (287) while finishing third in RBI (99), fourth in slugging (.484) and fifth in hits (174)...Sal Bando finished second in the American League with 103 RBI...he hit game-winning home runs in the second and third games of the ALCS vs. Baltimore... Reggie Jackson started the season by batting .399 with 15 home runs and 42 RBI over the first 50 games...he made his fifth All-Star Game appearance in six years and amassed over 3.5 million votes in the fan balloting, nearly 800,000 more than runner up Hank Aaron...after a blazing start, Jackson hit just .239 with 14 home runs and 51 RBI over the final 104 games of the season... Claudell Washington made the jump from Double-A to appear in 73 games and was named to Topps Rookie All-Star Team.



for the second straight season, won more regular season games than any team in the Majors...never led the AL West by more than 4.5 games until the final week and never were more than three games out of the division lead...were an injury-plagued team for the first four months of the season as 11 different players spent time on the disabled list, including Jose Canseco, Mark McGwire, Storm Davis, Walt Weiss, Dennis Eckersley and Bob Welch...pitching staff posted the lowest ERA in the American League (3.09) for the second straight season...tossed a Major League-best 20 shutouts on the year...starting pitchers Dave Stewart (21-9), Mike Moore (19-11), Storm Davis (19-7) and Bob Welch (17-8) combined for a 76-35 record with a 3.25 ERA...Stewart became the first pitcher to string together three 20-win seasons since Hall of Famer Jim Palmer accomplished the feat from 1975-78...became just the second player in Oakland history to reel off three straight 20-win seasons...was the first since Catfish Hunter won 20 or more games during a four year stretch from 1971-74...was 4-0 in four postseason starts and earned World Series MVP honors...third baseman Carney Lansford set an Oakland single-season record with a .336 batting average, which was the second best mark in the AL...offense received a tremendous boost when the team reacquired Oakland native Rickey Henderson in a trade with the New York Yankees on June 20th...Henderson hit .294 and reached base safely in 80 of the 85 games he played with Oakland down the stretch...tied Wade Boggs for the AL lead in runs scored (113) and topped the loop with a career high 126 walks...was named ALCS MVP after hitting .400 with 15 total bases, eight runs scored, five RBI and seven walks in five games vs. the Blue Jays...hit a combined .441 in nine postseason games...Dave Parker topped the team with 97 RBI to go along with 22 home runs...McGwire ranked third in the AL with 33 home runs and ranked 10th in RBI (95)...Mike Gallego, who was thrust into the starting shortstop's role with Weiss sidelined for 65 games with an injury, finished the season with career highs in virtually every offensive category, including average (.252), runs (45), hits (90), home runs (3) and RBI (30)...Canseco, who won AL MVP honors the year before, missed the first 88 games of the season due to a stress fracture of the hook of the hamate bone in his left hand...despite missing the first half of the season, still managed to finish third on the team in homers (17) and fourth in RBI (57)...hit a tremendous home run in Game 4 of the ALCS off Mike Flanagan, a blast that carried into the fifth deck in Toronto's SkyDome.

The A's make their first appearance in the World Series and lose to the New York Giants, four games to one. Three of the losses come against Christy Mathewson who tosses three complete game shutouts. The A's collect just 25 hits in the series for a .161 batting average and score just three runs. Topsy Hartsel paces the A's offense with a .294 batting average and Bris Lord has the only two RBI. The A's use three pitchers in the Series and all toss complete games. Chief Bender makes two starts and has a 1.06 ERA.

The A's lose the first game in Philadelphia, 3-0, as Mathewson tosses a four-hit shutout. Chief Bender returns the favor in the second game of the series as he tosses a four-hit shutout and strikes out nine in a 3-0 A's win at New York. Lord has RBI singles in the third and eighth innings. Mathewson tosses a four-hit shutout in the Giants 9-0 win in Game 3 and Joe McGinnity blanks the A's on five hits in a 1-0 win in Game 4. Eddie Plank allows just four hits in Game 4 and the only run of the game is unearned after a Monte Cross error. Mathewson tossed a six-hit shutout in Game 5 as the Giants clinch the series with a 2-0 win.

1910 WORLD SERIES

The A's win their first World Series and use just two pitchers to defeat the Chicago Cubs, four games to one. Jack Coombs wins three of the games and posts a 3.33 ERA while Chief Bender is 1-1 with a 1.93 ERA. Eddie Collins paces the A's offense with a .429 batting average and four doubles and Frank Baker hits .409. Danny Murphy connects for the only home run of the series and leads the A's with nine RBI. The A's hit .316 and score 35 runs in the five games while the two pitchers combine for a 2.76 ERA and allow 15 runs.

The A's win the first two games in Philadelphia as Bender tosses a three-hitter in Game 1 and strikes out eight in a 4-1 win while Baker has three hits and two RBI. Coombs allows eight hits and nine walks in Game 2 but the Cubs strand 14 in a 9-3 A's win. Eddie Collins has three of the A's 14 hits and all nine Athletics collect at least one hit. The series moves to Chicago for Game 3 and Coombs comes back on one day of rest and defeats the Cubs, 12-5, collecting three hits and three RBI. Harry Davis and Jack Berry add three hits each and Barry and Murphy have three RBI. Bender suffers the A's only loss in Game 4 when the Cubs win 4-3 in 10 innings. The A's have a 3-2 lead entering the ninth but the Cubs score once in the ninth and once in the 10th for the win. The A's wrap up the series with a 7-2 win in Game 5 as Coombs picks up his third win of the series. Collins has three hits and the A's score five times in the eighth to break open a 2-1 game.

1911 WORLD SERIES

The A's win their second consecutive World Championship as they defeat the New York Giants, four games to two. The A's pitching staff, which consists of Chief Bender, Jack Coombs and Eddie Plank, allows just 13 runs in the series for a 1.29 ERA. Bender goes 2-1 with a 1.04 ERA, Coombs is 1-0 with a 1.35 ERA and Plank is 1-1 with a 1.86 ERA. Frank "Home Run" Baker earns his nickname as he paces the A's offense with a .375 batting average, two home runs and five RBI. Jack Barry hits .368 and the A's offense hits .244 with 27 runs scored in the six games.

The A's lose Game 1 at New York by a 2-1 score as Bender strikes out 11 in eight innings in a complete game effort but loses to Christy Mathewson who tosses a six-hitter. The A's then win each of the next three games, beginning with a 3-1 win at Philadelphia in Game 2. Plank tosses a five-hitter and Baker breaks a 1-1 tie with a two-run home run in the sixth inning. Game 3 lasts 11 innings at New York and the A's are 3-2 winners. Trailing 1-0 entering the ninth inning, Baker homers to tie the game and the A's score two in the 11th for the win. Coombs goes the distance, allowing just three hits in 11 innings. The series is delayed for seven days because of rain but it resumes with a 4-2 A's win in Philadelphia in Game 4. Bender tosses a seven-hitter, Barry has three hits and Eddie Collins, Danny Murphy and Baker have two hits each. 1913 WORLD SERIES

The A's win their third World Championship over a four-year span as they defeat the New York Giants, four games to one. The A's use just three pitchers in the series with all going the distance, including Chief Bender, who wins Games 1 and 4, and Eddie Plank, who posts a 1-1 record and a 0.95 ERA. Frank Baker paces the A's offense with a .450 batting average and matches Wally Schang for the team-lead with seven RBI. Eddie Collins hits .421 and steals three bases.

Bender allows 11 hits in Game 1 at New York, but the A's defeat the Giants, 6-4. Collins goes 3 for 3 and scores three runs and Baker is 3 for 4 with three RBI, including a two-run home run. The A's lone loss comes in a Game 2 at Philadelphia, a 3-0 decision in 10 innings. Plank tosses nine shut-out innings before allowing three runs in the top of the 10th, while Christy Mathewson blanks the A's on eight hits. The series returns to Philadelphia for Game 3 and the A's score five times in the first two innings en route to an 8-2 win. Collins has his second three-hit game of the series and drives in three runs and Joe Bush tosses a five-hitter. The A's take a 6-0 lead into the seventh inning of Game 4 at Philadelphia and hold on to win 6-5. Jack Barry has three hits and Schang goes 2 for 2 with four RBI. The A's then clinch the series at New York with a 3-1 win in Game 5 as Plank tosses a two-hitter, allowing just one unearned run in the fifth inning. The A's score early again as Baker has a sacrifice fly in the first inning and a RBI single in the A's two-run third.

1914 WORLD SERIES

The A's return to the World Series for the fourth time in five years but are swept in four games by the Boston Braves. The pitching staff posts a 3.41 ERA in the series, including 1.00 by Eddie Plank. The offense is held to a .172 batting average and scores just six runs in the four games. Frank Baker leads the A's with four hits in the series.

The A's drop a 7-1 decision in Game 1 at Philadelphia as Dick Rudolph limits the A's to an unearned run in the second inning. Chief Bender takes the loss, allowing six runs in 5.1 innings. Bill James shuts out the A's 1-0 in Game 2, yielding just two hits. The game is scoreless over the first eight innings before Plank allows a Les Mann RBI single with two outs in the top of the ninth. The series moves to Boston for Game 3, a 5-4 A's loss in 12 innings. The score is tied at 2-2 when Frank Baker delivers a two-run single in the top of the 10th inning. Joe Bush, who goes the distance for the A's, then allows two runs in the bottom of the 10th. Bush takes the loss when his own throwing error on a Herbie Moran sacrifice bunt attempt in the 12th allows the winning run to score. The A's then drop a 3-1 decision in Game 4 as Rudolph again holds the A's to just one run. Starting pitcher Bob Shawkey allows three runs in 5.0 innings for the loss.

1929 WORLD SERIES

The A's return to the World Series for the first time in 15 years and win their fourth World Championship, besting the Chicago Cubs four games to one. The pitching staff posts a 2.40 ERA, including 1.42 by Howard Ehmke. The offense hits .281 and scores 26 runs in the five-game series. Jimmy Dykes hits .421 and Mickey Cochrane adds a .400 batting average. Jimmie Foxx, Mule Haas and Al Simmons all hit two home runs each.

Ehmke strikes out 13 and tosses an eight-hitter in the opener as the A's win 3-1 at Chicago. Foxx breaks a scoreless tie with a solo home run in the seventh inning and the A's have a 3-0 lead before Ehmke allows an unearned run in the bottom of the ninth. In Game 2, Simmons drives in four runs and Foxx is 3 for 5 with three RBI and his second home run in a 9-3 victory. The series moves to Philadelphia for Game 3 when the A's lose their only game of the series, 3-1. George Earnshaw goes the distance and strikes out 10, after tossing 4.2 innings two days earlier. The A's fall behind 8-0 in Game 4 before scoring 10 times in the bottom of the seventh inning to win, 10-8. Haas and Simmons both homer in the inning and Haas and Jimmy Dykes drive in three runs each as the A's send 15 batters to the plate. Philadelphia then clinches the series with a 3-2 win in Game 5. Ehmke allows two runs in 3.2 innings before Rube Walberg comes on to pitch 5.1 innings of scoreless relief. The A's trail 2-0 entering the bottom of the ninth before Haas hits a two-run home run to tie the game. Bing Miller then has a walk-off double to drive in Simmons and win the series.

Offensively, the A's hit just .197 but add six home runs. Al Simmons hits .364 with two home runs and Jimmie Foxx bats .333. Mickey Cochrane adds two home runs and Jimmy Dykes drives in a team-best five runs.

Grove tosses a complete game in Game 1, a 5-2 A's win at Philadelphia. The A's are held to just five hits in the game, including a pair of solo home runs by Simmons and Cochrane. Earnshaw fires a six-hitter in the A's 6-1 win in Game 2. Simmons has two hits and Cochrane homers again, a solo shot in the first inning. The Cardinals win Game 3 in St. Louis as Bill Hallahan shuts out the A's on seven hits in a 5-0 win. Jesse Haines four-hits the A's in a 3-1 loss in Game 4 to even the series at two games each. Earnshaw and Grove then combine on a three-hit shutout in a 2-0 win in Game 5. Foxx hits a two-run home run in the ninth inning to account for all the scoring. The series returned to Philadelphia for Game 6 and the A's win their fifth and final World Championship in Philadelphia with a 7-1 victory. Earnshaw tosses a complete-game five-hitter and Dykes and Simmons both homer.

The A's then fall behind in the series with a 5-2 loss in Game 3 at Philadelphia. Burleigh Grimes no hits the A's over the first seven innings before Bing Miller singles in the eighth. Al Simmons hits a two-run home run in the ninth for the A's only runs. The A's even the series at two games each with a 3-0 win in Game 4. Earnshaw tosses a two-hit shutout and Foxx hits a solo home run in the sixth. St. Louis wins the final game in Philadelphia, 5-1, but the A's win Game 6 at St. Louis, 8-1 to force a seventh game. In the final game, Grimes again shuts down the A's in a 4-2 win. He does not allow a run over the first eight innings before yielding a pinch hit two-run single to Doc Cramer with two outs in the ninth. Max Bishop comes to the plate as the potential winning run but Hallahan relieves Grimes and gets Bishop to fly out to end the series.

In their first trip to the ALCS, the Oakland A's ran into the defending World Champion Baltimore Orioles, losing in three straight games. Touted A's pitchers Vida Blue and Jim "Catfish" Hunter ran into problems during the series, leading to the A's downfall. Offensively, the A's got solid performances out of third baseman Sal Bando and right fielder Reggie Jackson, who hit .364 and .333 respectively.

In Game 1, Vida Blue took a 3-1 lead into the bottom of the seventh before allowing a RBI single to Mark Belanger, a RBI double by Curt Motton and a two-run double by Paul Blair. ALCS MVP Mike Cuellar tossed a complete game six-hitter to defeat the A's in Game 2. Jim Hunter also went the distance for the A's, allowing seven hits, including four home runs. In Game 3, Reggie Jackson homered twice and Sal Bando once but that was the A's only scoring as Jim Palmer tossed a complete game seven-hitter.

1972 AMERICAN LEAGUE CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

Forty-one years after the Philadelphia Athletics won the American League Pennant, the Oakland A's recorded the organization's next pennant with a hard fought three games to two triumph over Detroit. It was the first time in the four-year history of the ALCS that the playoffs had gone more than three games. The A's used superb pitching, scoring just a total of 13 runs in the five games, but allowing only 10. The series also saw a near brawl between Tigers manager Billy Martin and A's shortstop Campy Campaneris, who threw his bat at Tiger hurler Lerrin LaGrow after being hit by a pitch.

In Game 1, the Tigers scored a run in the top of the 11th inning on an Al Kaline home run to take a 2-1 lead but Gonzalo Marquez tied the game in the bottom of the inning on a pinch-hit RBI single. A Kaline throwing error on the play allowed Gene Tenace to score the winning run. ALCS MVP Blue Moon Odom tossed a three-hit shutout in a 5-0 A's win in Game 2. Campaneris had three hits, two runs and two steals but was suspended for the remainder of the playoffs by American League President Joe Cronin after the bat throwing incident. Joe Coleman blanked the A's 3-0 on seven hits in Game 3 and the Tigers won 4-3 in 10 innings in Game 4. The A's scored two runs in the top of the 10th for a 3-1 lead but the Tigers scored three times in the bottom of the 10th, including the game-winning single by Jim Northrup. In Game 5, Vida Blue pitched four innings of shutout relief to pick up the save for Odom. Gene Tenace's two-out RBI single in the fourth inning scored George Hendrick with the winning run.

1972 WORLD SERIES

The A's win their first World Championship in Oakland, the first for the Athletics franchise since 1930, defeating Cincinnati, four games to three. Six of the seven games are decided by one run and Gene Tenace picks up the offensive slack for Reggie Jackson who misses the entire series after pulling a hamstring in the ALCS. Tenace hits .348 with four home runs and nine RBI in the seven games to earn World Series MVP honors.

Tenace homered in his first two at bats of the series, hitting a two-run homer in the second and a solo shot in the fifth to lead the A's to a 3-2 win in Game 1. Catfish Hunter tossed 8 2/3 innings of six-hit, one-run baseball in Game 2 before yielding to Rollie Fingers who got the final out in the A's 2-1 win. Joe Rudi homered and made a spectacular catch off the bat of Denis Menke in the ninth. After a rainout in Oakland, the Reds won Game 3, 1-0 on a combined three-hitter by Jack Billingham and Clay Carroll. In Game 4, the A's trailed 2-1 entering the bottom of the ninth before scoring twice on pinch hit RBI singles by Don Mincher and Angel Mangual to take a 3-1 lead in the series. The Reds scored once in the eighth and once in the ninth off Rollie Fingers to win Game 5, 5-4 and then won 8-1 in Game 6 to even the series at three games each. In Game 7, the score was tied at one after five innings when Tenace delivered a RBI double to give the A's the lead. Sal Bando followed with a RBI double and Rollie Fingers pitched two scoreless innings for the save.

The A's win their second consecutive American League Pennant, defeating Baltimore three games to two. It was the second consecutive year that the ALCS had gone the maximum five games after having been decided in three games each year previously. In a rematch of the 1971 ALCS, it was pitching again that was the key, this time for the A's. Five of the six A's pitchers had ERAs under 2.00 for the series.

Jim Palmer tossed a five-hit shutout to defeat the A's 6-0 in Game 1 but the A's evened the series with a 6-3 win in Game 2. Sal Bando homered twice off Dave McNally and Campy Campaneris and Joe Rudi also homered for the A's. The A's won Game 3, 2-1 in 11 innings as both Ken Holtzman and Mike Cuellar went the distance. Holtzman allowed just three hits and Cuellar had allowed just three before Campaneris homered to lead off the bottom of the 11th. The A's appeared to have the series locked up in Game 4 as they had a 4-0 lead after six innings. Baltimore then scored four times off Vida Blue in the seventh and once off losing pitcher Rollie Fingers in the eighth for a 5-4 win. ALCS MVP Catfish Hunter then tossed a five-hit shutout in Game 5 as the A's won 3-0 to clinch the series.

1973 WORLD SERIES

The A's win their second consecutive World Championship, winning Games 6 and 7 to defeat the New York Mets, four games to three. Reggie Jackson was named MVP of the series after hitting .310 with a home run and six RBI and Ken Holtzman was the winning pitcher in two of the A's four victories. The series also featured the "firing" of Mike Andrews by A's owner Charlie Finley after his two 12th-inning errors in Game 2 helped the Mets to a 10-7 win. Andrews did make another appearance in the series, grounding out as a pinch hitter in Game 4.

Holtzman picks up the win in the A's 2-1 victory in Game 1. The A's collect just three hits off Mets starter Jon Matlack but all come in the third inning as Holtzman doubles and scores on an error and Joe Rudi has a RBI single. The Mets score four runs off Rollie Fingers in the 12th inning of Game 2 to defeat the A's 10-7, but only one run was earned as Andrews committed two errors. Game 3 went 11 innings but the A's won 3-2 on a RBI single by Campy Campaneris in the top of the 11th. The A's lost Game 4, 6-1 as Rusty Staub was a perfect 4-for-4 to even the series at two games apiece. Jerry Koosman and Tug McGraw then combined to three-hit the A's in a 2-0 win in Game 5 but the A's came back to win the final two games in Oakland. In Game 6, Reggie Jackson doubled twice, singled and drove in two runs in the A's 3-1 victory. The A's had gone the entire series without a home run before Campaneris hit a two-run home run in the third inning in Game 2. Jackson added a two-run homer later in the inning and Darold Knowles retired Wayne Garrett with runners on first and third in the ninth to save the A's 5-2 win.

1974 WORLD SERIES

The A's win their third consecutive World Championship to become the first team to win at least three straight since the New York Yankees won five straight, 1949-53. The A's defeated the Los Angeles Dodgers in five games in a series where four of the five games were decided by a 3-2 score. Bert Campaneris hit .353 in the series and Joe Rudi topped the A's with four RBI. World Series MVP Rollie Fingers had a win and two saves while posting a 1.93 ERA and the A's used just five pitchers the entire series.

The A's open the series with a 3-2 win as Rollie Fingers pitched 4.1 innings of relief for the win before Catfish Hunter comes on to strike out Joe Ferguson in the bottom of the ninth with the tying run at first base. The Dodgers even the series with a 3-2 win in Game 2 as Don Sutton shuts out the A's on four hits over the first eight innings. Joe Rudi has a two-run single in the ninth but the A's rally falls short. Hunter starts Game 3 and kept the Dodgers off the board over the first seven innings in a 3-2 win. Ken Holtzman is the winning pitcher in the A's 5-2 win in Game 4 and he also contributes to the A's offense with a solo home run in the third inning. The A's trailed 2-1 entering the bottom of the sixth but score four times, highlighted by Jim Holt's two-run pinch hit single. Rollie Fingers clinches his series MVP honors by pitching two scoreless innings for the save in the A's 3-2 win in Game 5. Joe Rudi homers to lead off the seventh inning to break a 2-2 tie.

Dennis Eckersley was named ALCS MVP after saving all four games and the bullpen recorded three of the wins. Dave Henderson hit .375 and Jose Canseco hit three of the A's seven home runs.

Jose Canseco homers in the fourth inning of Game 1 but Dave Henderson provides the game-winning single in the eighth inning in the A's 2-1 victory. Game 2 is a scoreless tie until the Red Sox score twice in the sixth off Storm Davis but Jose Canseco hit a two-run home run and Mark McGwire added a RBI single in the seventh to give the A's a 3-2 lead. After the Red Sox tie the game, Walt Weiss has the game-winning RBI single in the ninth. The A's clinch the series with a 4-1 win in Game 4 as Dave Stewart allows one run in seven innings for the win. Jose Canseco homered in the first and Dave Henderson had an RBI single in the third before the A's score two insurance runs in the eighth.

The A's return to the World Series for the first time in 14 years when they also met the Dodgers. After winning the series in five games in 1974, the A's lose to the Dodgers in five games in 1988. Storm Davis loses twice and posts an 11.25 ERA.

Canseco hits a grand slam in the second inning of Game 1 to give the A's a 4-2 lead before Kirk Gibson hits a pinch-hit, two-out, two-run home run in the bottom of the ninth to lift the Dodgers to a 5-4 win. Orel Hershiser shuts out the A's on three hits in a 6-0 Los Angeles win in Game 2. Davis allows six runs in 3.1 innings and Dave Parker has all three of the A's hits. The series moves to Oakland for Game 3 and the A's get their only win of the series when Mark McGwire breaks a 1-1 tie with a one-out home run in the bottom of the ninth. The Dodgers score two runs in the first inning of Game 4 and lead the rest of the way in a 4-3 win. Dave Henderson collects four hits. Hershiser clinches World Series MVP honors by tossing a four-hitter in Game 5 to defeat the A's 5-2.

1990 AMERICAN LEAGUE CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

The A's sweep Boston in the American League Championship Series for the second time in the last three years and become the first team since the 1976-78 New York Yankees to win three straight pennants. The A's pitching staff held the Red Sox to four runs, one in each game, while the offense hit .299 with no home runs. Dave Stewart picked up two wins and posted a 1.13 ERA to earn ALCS MVP honors and Terry Steinbach (.455), Carney Lansford (.438) and Mike Gallego (.400) all hit .400.

Dave Stewart and Roger Clemens engaged in a pitchers duel in Game 1 and when Clemens left after six innings, the A's trailed 1-0. The A's then scored nine runs off the Sox bullpen, including seven in the ninth, to win 9-1. The series moves to Oakland for Game 3 and starts in a familiar way as Boston scores a run in the second before the A's score twice in the fourth and sixth innings to win 4-1. The A's finally score first in Game 4, scoring three times in the second highlighted by a two-run double by Mike Gallego. Dave Stewart pitches eight scoreless innings before allowing a run in the ninth and Rick Honeycutt gets the final three outs for the save in the A's 3-1 win.

The A's lose 5-4 in 10 innings in Game 2 as Dennis Eckersley allows three consecutive hits, including the game winning RBI single to Joe Oliver. Jose Canseco's solo home run highlights the A's three-run third which puts Oakland ahead 4-2 but the Reds score one in the fourth and one in the eighth to tie game. The series moves to Oakland for Game 3 but the Reds win 8-2, scoring seven times in the third inning. Mike Moore allows six runs in 2 2/3 innings for the loss and Scott Sanderson allows two more. A Harold Baines two-run home run and a Rickey Henderson solo shot account for the A's scoring. Dave Stewart tosses a complete game in Game 4, but the A's lose 2-1 as Jose Rijo and Randy Myers combine on a two-hitter. Carney Lansford has a RBI single in the first. Stewart shuts out the Reds over the first seven innings before Cincinnati scores two in the eighth on a fielder's choice and a Hal Morris sacrifice fly.

A Pat Borders sacrifice fly off Kelly Downs in the 11th is the game winner. Dave Stewart keeps the A's alive with a complete game seven hitter as Oakland wins Game 5, 6-2. Jerry Browne provides the offense with four hits and two RBI and Ruben Sierra adds three RBI. The series returns to Toronto for Game 6 and the Blue Jays clinch the AL Pennant with a 9-2 win. Mike Moore takes the loss, allowing six runs on seven hits in 2.2 innings.

The A's lead 4-2 entering the bottom of the sixth but Boston scores a run in the sixth and two more in the eighth off Keith Foulke for the win. Oakland scores twice in the fifth inning on a Scutaro RBI double and a Jason Kendall RBI single, but Esteban Loaiza allows back-to-back home runs to Michael Cuddyer and Justin Morneau in the sixth inning. Mark Kotsay then hits a two-run inside-the-park home run in the seventh inning to give the A's the lead for good. The series moves to Oakland for Game 3 and the A's complete the sweep with an 8-3 win. Scutaro doubles twice and has four RBI and Milton Bradley and Eric Chavez homer. Dan Haren allows two runs in six innings for the win.

2020 AMERICAN LEAGUE WILD CARD SERIES

The A's returned to the postseason for the third consecutive year and defeated the Chicago White Sox two games to one in the best-of-three American League Wild Card series. The series win was the A's first in the postseason since sweeping Minnesota in the 2006 ALDS. Oakland hit just .194 in the series but out-scored the White Sox 12-11 while compiling a 3.67 ERA. Rookie catcher Sean Murphy went 3-for-8 with a home run and two RBI and Jake Diekman pitched in all three games without allowing a run.

Chicago starter Lucas Giolito retired each of the first 18 Oakland batters in Game 1 en route to a 4-1 win, which extended the A's postseason losing streak to an Athletics record-tying six games. Jesús Luzardo started for Oakland and took the loss, allowing three runs on six hits in 3.1 innings. The A's evened the series with a 5-3 victory in Game 2 after Chris Bassitt allowed just one run in seven innings of work for the win. Oakland scored two unearned runs in the first inning and increased their lead to 4-0 when Marcus Semien hit a two-run home run in the second. Closer Liam Hendriks came in with no outs in the eighth and allowed two runs in 1.2 innings before Diekman recorded the final out with the bases loaded in the ninth. The A's then snapped their Major League record nine-game losing streak in winner-take-all postseason games with a 6-4 victory in Game 3. Oakland trailed 3-0 after three innings but then scored four times in the fourth on a two-run home run by Murphy and back-to-back bases loaded walks by Mark Canha and Matt Olson. Chad Pinder added a two-run single in the fifth, Frankie Montas allowed a run in 2.0 innings of relief for the win, and Hendriks struck out the final three batters for the save.

2020 AMERICAN LEAGUE DIVISION SERIES

The A's faced division rival Houston in their first neutral-site postseason series at Dodger Stadium, but lost the American League Division Series three games to one. Each team hit 12 home runs in the four-game series as the A's set franchise record for home runs hit and home runs allowed in a postseason series. The pitching staff compiled a 7.46 ERA, which was the A's highest in a postseason series of more than one game. Marcus Semien hit .533 and had a .611 on-base percentage, which set an Athletics record for highest on-base percentage in a single postseason series.

The A's took a 3-0 lead in Game 1 on a two-run home run by Kris Davis in the second inning and a solo home run by Sean Murphy in the third but would go on to lose 10-5. Oakland starter Chris Bassitt allowed three runs in the fourth and J.B. Wendelken was charged with the blown save and loss when he surrendered four unearned runs in the fifth. The A's again scored first in Game 2 on a solo home run by Davis but Sean Manaea allowed four runs in 4.1 innings in the A's 5-2 loss. Oakland's lone win came in Game 3 when they tied an Athletics postseason record with five home runs en route to a 9-7 win. The A's took a 4-2 lead into the bottom of the fifth but the Astros scored five times, including twice off Oakland starter Jesús Luzardo. Chad Pinder then hit a three-run home run in the seventh inning and added a sacrifice fly in the eighth, and Liam Hendriks closed out the game with three scoreless innings of relief for the win. For the fourth time in the series, the A's scored first in Game 4 but would go on to lose, 11-6. Ramón Laureano hit a three-run home run in the second and added a solo shot in the fifth, but Houston scored five times in the fourth off Oakland starter Frankie Montas, and twice each in the fifth, sixth and seventh innings.

In 2022, the A's had their 17th season with 100 or more losses (2 in Oakland, 4 in Kansas City, 11 in Philadelphia), which is the most in Major League history. It was also the A's 35th last place finish (24 in the American League, 11 in the AL West), which matches the Phillies for the most last place finishes in ML history. However, the A's have 10 seasons with 100 or more wins, a total which is surpassed only by the Yankees (21), and nine World Championships, which trails only the Yankees (27) and Cardinals (11). More recently, over the last 11 seasons (2012-22) the A's have either made the playoffs (6 times) or finished last (4 times) in 10 of the 11 seasons.

DURING THE SPRING

The A's and Giants began playing Spring Training games in the Bay Area in 1983 and have played at least one game in Oakland or San Francisco every year except for 2000, 2021 and 2022. Oakland is 49-43-2 (.532) in those games, which includes 21-16 (.568) in the Coliseum, 16-20-2 (.447) at Oracle Park and 12-7 (.632) at Candlestick Park. The A's have won 17 series, lost 14 and split six. For the last 18 years, the two clubs have played once in Oakland and twice in San Francisco, with the exception of 2014 when the game in Oakland was rained out, 2020 when there was just one game in each city due to Covid-19, and 2021 and 2022 when the two clubs did not play in the Bay Area. There have been four three-game sweeps, with the A's winning all three meetings in 1989 and 2019 and the Giants taking all three in 2011 and 2017.





MINOR LEAGUE FIELD STAFF

JIM EPPARD

Minor League Hitting Coordinator

Originally drafted by the A's in the 13th round of the 1982 draft out of Cal, Jim Eppard rejoined the A's in 2016 as the organization's minor league hitting coordinator and has served in that role ever since. Prior to that, he spent two seasons as assistant hitting coordinator for Los Angeles (AL) after serving as the club's hitting coach from May 15, 2012, through the end of the 2013 season.

Before coaching the big league squad, he served as hitting coach at Triple-A Salt Lake for nine-plus seasons from 2003-12. Prior to joining the Angels organization, he spent nine seasons in the Rockies minor league system as hitting coach for Single-A Central Valley (1994) and Triple-A Colorado Springs (2000-02) and as manager at three different Rockies affiliates from 1995-99. In 1997, Eppard led the Short-Season Portland Rockies to a Northwest League Championship and was named Northwest League Manager of the Year.

As a player, he spent 12 years in pro baseball, including four as a Major Leaguer with the Angels and Blue Jays. He hit .281 in 82 career Major League games and is a lifetime .310 hitter in 1,199 minor league games, winning four minor league batting titles in four different leagues.

Jim lives in Rapid City, S.D., with his wife Lou Ann. They have a daughter, Hannah, who works as a hydrogeologist in Tucson, Ariz.



GIL PATTERSON

Minor League Pitching Coordinator

Gil Patterson returns for his eighth season of his third stint as the A's minor league pitching coordinator after spending the previous three seasons in similar roles with the New York Yankees (2013-15). He previously held this position with the A's in 1996 and from 2008-12. Prior to his second stint with the A's, he spent three years coaching in the Yankees minor league system with the GCL Yankees (2006-07) and Triple-A Columbus (2005).

He has also served as Toronto's bullpen coach in 2001 and its pitching coach from 2002-04, after serving as the Arizona minor league pitching coordinator from 1997-2000. Patterson originally joined the Oakland organization in 1991, coaching in the Arizona Rookie League in Scottsdale. He coached for the A's Single-A affiliate in Madison from 1992-93, Single-A West Michigan in 1994 and the Rookie League Scottsdale A's in 1995 before his first stint as the roving minor league pitching instructor in 1996.

He began his coaching career at Triple-A Columbus and Single-A Oneonta with the New York Yankees organization in 1984. Patterson was the Yankees first selection of the secondary phase of the 1975 June draft. He made his professional debut that year with Single-A Oneonta, leading the New York-Penn League in strikeouts (97). Patterson tossed a no-hitter on June 28, 1976 with Double-A West Haven before being promoted to Triple-A Syracuse. He opened the 1977 season in Syracuse before making his Major League debut with the Yankees at age 21. He appeared in 10 games (six starts) with the eventual World Series champions in 1977 while posting a 1-2 record and 5.45 ERA.

Patterson suffered a torn rotator cuff and spent considerable time on the disabled list in 1978 and 1979. He pitched in the Yankees minor league system in 1980-81 and the San Francisco Giants organization in 1982 before having career-ending Tommy John surgery following Spring Training in 1983. In total, Patterson underwent eight operations during his career.

Patterson makes his offseason home in Odessa, Fla., with his wife, Jan. The couple has four children — Brandy, Raquel, Kyle and G.T.




JUAN NAVARRETE

Minor League Infield Coordinator

Juan Navarrete is in his fourth season as the A's minor league infield coordinator after spending three seasons as the minor league defensive coordinator; two seasons as the minor league defensive, baserunning and bunting coordinator; 12 seasons as minor league roving infield instructor; and two years as minor league roving hitting instructor. Navarrete spent the previous seven seasons as a minor league manager and compiled a 390-338 (.536) record during that span. In his first two seasons as a manager for the A's Arizona Rookie League team (1995-97), he earned manager and co-manager of the year honors after guiding the team to first- and second-place finishes, respectively. Navarrete was promoted to Single-A Modesto in 1998 and took over the managerial duties at Single-A Visalia in 1999, where he guided the Oaks to playoff appearances in two of his three seasons.

A former infielder, Navarrete's playing career spanned 21 years (1970-90). He spent the majority of his career with the Saltillo Saraperos of the Mexican League as a player (1970-71; 78-82) and as a player-manager (1983-85). Navarrete was an eight-time All-Star and a member of Saltillo's 1980 championship squad. He also played six seasons in the Montreal organization (1972-77). Navarrete spent his winters in the Mexican-Pacific Winter League (1972-90) and is among the all-time leaders in various statistical categories. In 1998, Navarrete was inducted into the Mexican Baseball Hall of Fame.

Navarrete makes his home in San Tan Valley, Ariz., with his wife, Maria, and two daughters, Iram and Ana.



STEVE SCARSONE

Arizona Field Coord./Minor League Outfield & Baserunning Coord.

Steve Scarsonne enters his fourth season as minor league outfield and baserunning coordinator and enters his second year in the role of Arizona field coordinator after serving as minor league roving infield and baserunning instructor in 2019 and as a traveling instructor from 2017-19. As field coordinator, Scarsonne will organize all Arizona-based programs, including the Arizona Complex League and instructs.

Prior to working as a traveling instructor, he served four seasons as the manager of the A's top minor league affiliate, including earning the Pacific Coast League's Manager of the Year Award in 2016. Scarsonne previously managed Midland (2011-12), Stockton (2010) and Kane County (2009) in the A's system, as well as Lancaster (2002) and South Bend (2001). He also served as Oakland's interim third base coach for the last half of the 2017 season.

Scarsonne played seven seasons as a Major League utility infielder with Philadelphia (1992), Baltimore (1992), San Francisco (1993-96), St. Louis (1997) and Kansas City (1999). He had his best season in 1995, batting .266 with 11 home runs and 29 RBI for the Giants. Scarsonne was originally drafted by Philadelphia in the 2nd round of the 1986 draft. He played six seasons in the minors before making his Major League debut with the Phillies in 1992.

Scarsonne makes his offseason home in Scottsdale, Ariz., with his wife, Becki. The couple has two children, a daughter, Leah, and son, Ty.



GABRIEL ORTIZ

Minor League Catching Coordinator

Gabriel Ortiz enters his fourth season as minor league catching coordinator and his 17th with the A's organization, which includes five years as a player.

He joined the organization at 20 years old and spent five seasons as a catcher in the A's system. He reached as high as Double-A Midland and was a career .238 hitter with eight homers in 146 games. He has been part of the AZL A's coaching staff as general assignment coach since 2012.

Ortiz resides in Gilbert, Ariz., with his wife, Gerri, and children, Gabriel Jr., Gavin and Genevieve.



CRAIG LEFFERTS

Minor League Assistant Pitching Coordinator

Former Major League pitcher Craig Lefferts enters his first season as minor league assistant pitching coordinator, after spending eight seasons as minor league pitching rehab coordinator. Prior to that, he spent 12 seasons as a pitching coach in Oakland's minor league system with Double-A Midland (2003), Short-Season Vancouver (2004-2010), Single-A Stockton (2011-12), Short-Season Vermont (2013) and Low-A Beloit (2014). Additionally, Lefferts served in the same capacity at Tennessee (2000-02) and Medicine Hat (1999) in the Toronto Blue Jays system.

In his 12-year Major League career, Lefferts compiled a 58-72 record with a 3.43 ERA, which included stints with the Cubs, Padres, Giants, Orioles, Rangers and Angels. A 9th-round selection by the Cubs in 1980, Lefferts made his Major League debut with Chicago in 1983. In 1984, Lefferts posted a career-best 2.13 ERA for the National League West Division champion Padres and tossed 10 scoreless innings in six postseason appearances. He was the winning pitcher in the final two NLCS games against Chicago and earned the save in the Padres only World Series victory against Detroit.

In 1987, Lefferts made 44 appearances for San Francisco, including three scoreless outings in the NLCS against St. Louis. In 1989, he matched Gary Lavelle's team record for saves by a left-handed pitcher with 20 and appeared in five postseason games, making two appearances in the



NLCS against Chicago and three against the A's in the World Series. After recording 23 saves in 1991, he was converted to a starter in 1992 and finished 13-9 with a 3.69 ERA in 27 starts for the Padres. Lefferts retired after making 30 appearances for the California Angels during the 1994 season.

Lefferts and his wife, Wendy, reside in Scottsdale, Ariz. They have five children, Brock, Brady, Taylor, Tanner and Lindsay, and four grandchildren, Rowan, Paxton, Jasper and Brooks.

DAN HUBBS

Pitching Development Coach

Dan Hubbs joins the A's as pitching development coach. From 2020-21, he served as director of pitching development and strategies for the Detroit Tigers.

Prior to that, Hubbs coached for 20 years at the Division 1 collegiate level, spending 12 years as an assistant coach at California, one year as associate head coach at USC and seven years as head coach at USC.

Hubbs was drafted by Los Angeles (NL) in the 16th round of the 1993 First-Year Player Draft out of USC. In six minor league seasons with the Dodgers, he was 27-16 with a 3.75 ERA.

RICK RODRIGUEZ

Minor League Pitching Rehab Coordinator

Rick Rodriguez has been promoted to minor league pitching rehab coordinator after spending last season as the assistant pitching rehab coordinator. Prior to that, he spent six seasons as the A's Triple-A pitching coach (2016-21). He also served as the pitching coach for the A's top affiliate from 2000-02, 2004-10 and 2013-14. In 2015, he was pitching coach for Stockton, and he also held roles as Oakland's bullpen coach from 2011-12 and as the manager of Single-A Modesto in 2003.

This is his 39th year in the A's organization, including seven seasons as a player and 29 as a minor league coach. Prior to becoming the pitching coach in Sacramento in 2000, he coached for the Rookie-level Arizona League A's (1992), Short-Season Southern Oregon (1993-94) and Single-A Modesto (1995-99).

Rodriguez was originally selected by Oakland in the second round of the 1981 June draft and spent seven seasons with the A's organization, including two in the majors with Oakland. He went 1-2 with a 6.61 ERA in three starts in 1986 and 1-0 with a 2.96 ERA in 15 relief appearances in 1987. Rodriguez also pitched for Cleveland (1988) and San Francisco (1990) in his big league career, compiling a 3-4 record and 5.73 ERA in 31 games, including eight starts. His playing career concluded in 1991 when he made three appearances for Triple-A Phoenix in the Giants farm system.

An East Bay native, Rodriguez was born in Oakland and graduated from Castro Valley High School in 1978. He attended Chabot Junior College in Hayward and the University of California, Riverside. Rodriguez was named to the Castro Valley Sports Hall of Fame in 2011.

She also served as acting manager for Double-A Lansing for six games in 2022.

After a four-year collegiate softball career at Villanova University, Alvarez returned to baseball as a catcher on the USA Baseball Women's National Team (2008-15) and won a gold medal at the 2015 Pan-American Games. At the conclusion of her playing career, she joined the WNT coaching staff as an assistant, and in 2019, Alvarez was named the manager of the team, a position she still holds.

In addition to her role with the National Team, Alvarez works with MLB Develops, coaching at youth development events, with a focus on girls baseball. Prior to working full time in professional baseball, she was a firefighter-paramedic for the City of Hollywood (Fla.) for eight years.

OAKLAND COLISEUM



The Oakland Coliseum has served as the home for the A's since the franchise moved to Oakland in 1968.

The A's have used the facility to their advantage over the years, posting a 1082-812 (.571) home record over the last 24 seasons, which is sixth best in the majors. In 2003, the A's set an Oakland record for home wins as they finished with a 57-24 (.704) record in the Coliseum, marking the most home wins in franchise history since 1931 when the Philadelphia Athletics went 60-15 at home. In addition, two of the A's World Championships have been clinched on the Coliseum's turf.

The facility is conveniently located adjacent to I-880 with two exits (Hegenberger Road/66th Avenue) leading directly to the complex. Along with the Oakland Arena, which is located adjacent, it is the only major entertainment facility with a dedicated stop on the Bay Area Rapid Transit (BART) system. The Oakland International Airport is less than a two-mile drive from the Coliseum with shuttle service to several local hotels and restaurants.

In October of 1995, the Coliseum began a one-year, \$120 million renovation project that added 22,000 new seats, 90 luxury suites, two private clubs and two state-of-the-art scoreboards.

As part of the team's new 10-year lease arrangement prior to the 2015 season, an additional \$10 million in improvements was added, including the installation of new High Definition Video boards and the addition of the Treehouse and the A's Stomping Ground.

The first crowd filled the Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum on Sept. 8, 1966, when the AFL's Oakland Raiders played the Kansas City Chiefs. The adjacent arena celebrated its grand opening on Nov. 9, 1966, when the Oakland Seals met the San Diego Gulls in hockey. The first A's game came on April 17, 1968 against the Baltimore Orioles.

In the ensuing 55 years, the facility has hosted every conceivable event in the entertainment industry, including concerts, conventions and other large gatherings. Audiences numbering over 100 million have made the Coliseum and Arena the premier entertainment facilities in Northern California.

KEN KORACH

Radio Play-by-Play

The 2023 season marks Ken Korach's 32nd year in the American League, his 28th with the A's and his 18th as the team's lead radio announcer. In the long history of the A's in Oakland, he has spent the most time doing play-by-play on radio for the A's.

Korach's first MLB job was in Chicago, where he spent four years broadcasting mostly weekend games for the White Sox. He also spent six full seasons in the minor leagues, beginning in 1984 with the Redwood Pioneers of the California League. He also worked in the Pacific Coast League in Phoenix (1986-87) and Las Vegas (1989-91).


Korach was hired in 1985 to broadcast San Jose State football on KCBS Radio and he spent 22 years doing football and basketball on radio and television for Sonoma State, San Jose State and UNLV.

He is the author of *Holy Toledo*, *Lessons from Bill King*, *Renaissance Man of the Mic*, which was published by Wellstone Books in 2013, spent over a month as the number one best-selling baseball book on Amazon.com, and is Ken's homage to the 2017 Ford C. Frick Award recipient. Ken's second book, *If These Walls Could Talk: Oakland A's*, cowritten by then-San Francisco Chronicle A's beat writer Susan Slusser, was released in the spring of 2019 by Triumph Books.

Korach was inducted into the Bay Area Radio Hall of Fame in September of 2019 and honored as the 2013 California Sportscaster of the Year and the 2001 Nevada Sportscaster of the Year by the National Sports Media Association. He was inducted in 2017 into the Jewish Sports Hall of Fame of Northern California and in 2003 into the Nevada Broadcasters Hall of Fame.

In partnership with the Oakland A's community Fund, Korach made a joint contribution of \$15,000 to support the Oakland Athletic League's mission to grow diamond sports with elementary and middle school OUSD students.

Korach is a graduate of UC Santa Barbara and he and his wife Denise are parents of their daughter, Emilee. They make their home in Henderson, Nev. and Pleasanton, Calif.



VINCE COTRONEO

Radio Play-by-Play

Vince Cotroneo begins his 18th season in the A's radio booth, where he again will work with broadcast partner Ken Korach in continuing the team's tradition of broadcasting excellence.

Prior to joining the A's, Cotroneo spent six seasons (1998-2003) as an announcer on the Texas Rangers broadcasts, where he partnered with Eric Nadel on the Rangers Radio Network. He also worked over 20 games on the television side during the 2002 season. Cotroneo joined the Rangers broadcast team in 1998 after spending seven seasons (1991-97) with the Houston Astros.

A 33-year broadcasting veteran, Cotroneo began his career with the Single-A Lynchburg Mets in 1984. He spent the next three seasons with the Double-A El Paso Diablos in the Milwaukee system before moving on to the Triple-A Iowa Cubs for the 1988 season. In his only season with Iowa, he was selected as the National Association's Minor League Announcer of the Year. Cotroneo joined the Astros organization the following season and was the radio voice of the Tucson Toros for two seasons (1989-90) before landing his first Major League job with the Astros in 1991.

A 1983 graduate of the University of Central Florida, Cotroneo and his wife, Veronica, have three children, Dominic, Olivia and Sophia.



JOHNNY DOSKOW

Radio Play-by-Play

Johnny Dосkow begins his first season in the A's radio booth in 2023, where he will broadcast 65+ games as well as contribute to pregame, postgame, and A's Cast Live.

Dосkow has been the voice of the Sacramento River Cats since 2001, where he has been behind the microphone for three Triple-A Championships and five Pacific Coast League Championships. Before joining Sacramento, Dосkow was the radio broadcaster for the Fresno Grizzlies (1998-2000), High Desert Mavericks (1996-1998), and Cedar Rapids Kernels (1993-1995).

Johnny made his MLB debut in 2012, joining the A's radio booth for a brief stint while Ken Korch was recovering from surgery. He also made an appearance in the San Francisco Giants' radio broadcast along with Dave Flemming on September 19, 2022.

In 2020, Dосkow published his book, *Goodnight Em: Baseball and Life Through Haiku*. The title is a nod to his signature sign-off, as he wishes a goodnight to his daughter, Emily, at the end of each River Cats broadcast.

He graduated from the University of La Verne with a bachelor's degree in Communications, Radio and Television. A native of North Tarrytown, NY, Dосkow resides in El Dorado Hills, Calif., with his wife, Deb, and daughter, Emily.



GLEN KUIPER

Television Play-by-Play

Glen Kuiper begins his 20th season in the A's television booth as the club's lead play-by-play voice.

Kuiper has covered the Bay Area baseball scene for NBC Sports California since 1992, serving as pre-game host and fill-in play-by-play announcer for both A's and Giants telecasts. He has also worked on Comcast SportsNet's Golden State Warriors and San Jose Sharks telecasts, along with numerous collegiate assignments and sideline reporting duties for select National Football League games on Fox. Kuiper has won 13 Northern California Emmy Awards for his coverage of Bay Area sports teams.

Glen is the youngest brother in a talented broadcasting family. His oldest brother, Duane, is a longtime member of the San Francisco Giants announcing team while older brother, Jeff, produces the Giants NBC Sports Bay Area telecasts.

Kuiper graduated from San Francisco State University with a bachelor's degree in broadcasting. He also attended the University of New Orleans and spent three years in the minor leagues. A native of Racine, Wis., Kuiper resides in Danville, Calif., with his wife, Amanda and two children, Jack and Annette.



DALLAS BRADEN

Television Analyst

Dallas Braden enters his sixth season as an A's television color commentator after spending 2017 as a pre- and postgame host for NBC Sports California.

Braden was Oakland's 24th round pick in 2004 and made his Major League debut with the A's in 2007. In his five-year playing career—all with Oakland—he compiled a 26-36 record to go along with a 4.16 career ERA. The highlight of Braden's playing career came on May 9, 2010, when he threw the 19th perfect game in MLB history against the Tampa Bay Rays on Mother's Day.

After retiring in 2014, Braden joined ESPN as a studio and color analyst. He left ESPN in 2017 to join NBC Sports California.

A native of Stockton, Calif., Braden resides in Simi Valley, Calif., with his wife, Meg, their daughters Kinslee, Marlee, Wylee, and his grandmother Peggy.



CHRIS TOWNSEND

Host and Senior Broadcast Producer

Chris Townsend enters his fifth season as Host and Senior Broadcast Producer for A's Cast. In this role, he is responsible for creating and delivering multimedia A's content across multiple platforms.

Townsend also hosts A's Cast Live, the A's pre- and postgame shows and is an in-studio host during the broadcasts. Fans will continue to be able to engage with him during the games on his social media channels.

Townsend has worked in numerous capacities covering the A's, from prior roles in both TV and radio. He joins the A's after working for a number of local sports companies, including Oakland Raiders, 95.7 The Game, KNBR 680 and CSN Sports Bay Area. Chris has lived in the Bay Area for more than 25 years after attending San Jose State and playing baseball for the Spartans.

His grandfather Bob Elliott was the first third baseman in baseball history to win the MVP in 1947. Elliott was a seven-time All-Star during his 15 year career. He also was the manager of the Kansas City Athletics in 1960.



AMAURY PI-GONZÁLEZ

Radio Play-by-Play (Spanish)

Amaury Pi-González, a pioneer in establishing Spanish baseball radio play-by-play in the Bay Area, serves as the "Voice of the A's" for Spanish broadcasts. This will be his 30th season doing A's broadcasts, having filled that role from 1978-93, 2009-10 and again the past 11 seasons.

Well-known and respected in both English and Spanish media circles, Pi-González enters his 46th season in Major League Baseball in 2022. He began his career in 1977 with the Athletics and has also broadcast for the San Francisco Giants, Seattle Mariners, and Los Angeles Angels. He was the Spanish play-by-play on Television for the Los Angeles Angels on Fox Deportes LA from 2010-17. Amaury also produces and hosts "Béisbol en la Bahía" for KIQI 1010 AM.

During his tenure, Pi-González has called the 1986 World Series for CBS Hispanic Network, the 1988, 1989 and 1990 Series for the A's, and the 2002 Series for the Giants. The Fremont, Calif., resident previously served five years as sports anchor for Telemundo TV48 in San Jose and was the Spanish voice for the NBA's Golden State Warriors (1992-98) and Los Angeles Clippers. In addition, he was the English voice for the Caribbean World Series for Fox Sports International in 2001 and 2002. Most recently, he called the A's playoff runs from the 2018-20 seasons for A's radio and provided color commentary for a San Jose Sharks game via their Spanish Radio/TV SAP audio formats for the past three years (2018-20). He is a regular contributor to SportsRadioService.com, including a weekly podcast.

Born in Cuba, Amaury was inducted into the Cuban Sports Hall of Fame in 2004 and into the Hispanic Heritage Baseball Museum in 2004. He was inducted into the Bay Area Radio Hall of Fame in 2009 and is a cofounder and vice president of the Hispanic Heritage Baseball Museum and Hall of Fame, a Bay Area based non-profit. He was named to the New York City Advisory Board of the American Sportscasters Association in 2016 and remains on the board today. Pi-

A proud father of two, Franklin and Cristina, and Kayla's, Khloe's and Liliana's grandfather, Manolo resides in San Leandro.




JOSE LUIS ORELLANA

YOUTH EDUCATION

The A's education initiatives focus on literacy, education and scholarships.

- **Home Run Readers** – Home Run Readers, presented by Ross Dress for Less, is a literacy program designed to help young students develop a lifelong love for reading by offering monthly incentives when students hit their reading goals. In 2022, more than 12,000 students and over 430 classrooms participated in the program.
- **Math Hits** – A's Math Hits, presented by PwC, is a free board game and eight-session curriculum designed to engage fourth- through sixth-grade students by combining baseball and math. - **Future A's** – Future A's, presented by Kaiser Permanente, is the Club's youth baseball and softball initiative. In addition to providing complimentary jerseys and hats to local youth baseball and softball leagues, the A's offer teams benefits and support, including grants, coaches clinics, virtual training and other activities. The A's distributed more than 21,000 uniforms and hats to local leagues in the beginning of 2023.
- **Diamond Days** – Diamond Days, presented by Bank of America, is a free, family-friendly day full of baseball activities, including skills stations, special guest appearances, and giveaways. Local youth of all age groups are encouraged to participate
- **Major League Mindset** – Major League Mindset, presented by Chevron, is a speaker series with six total events held throughout the season. This unique program provides local underserved youth the opportunity to meet with a Major League Baseball player and learn what it takes to develop the character needed to succeed at a "Major League level" on and off the field. Participants will also get to hear from members of the A's front office on their career paths in sports.
